2. Structure, governance and management

The Rotary Club of Bradford West Charity Fund is an unincorporated charity and is constituted under a trust deed dated 14th December 1993

The Trustees are nominated and appointed by the Club. The Club is managed by the Club Council which comprises of the Officers and six elected members. The Council and Trustees meets monthly to facilitate the administration of the Charity.

3. Objectives and activities

The primary objectives are to apply the capital and income of the fund to the benefit of such charitable institutions, societies and objects as the Club shall, in duly constituted meeting, from time to time direct.

4. Club Service Report

District Handover 23rd June 2024

A great start to our 50th year. District 1040 welcomed one of our members was made District Governor at the handover luncheon at Brighouse.



50th Charter dinner

It was a sellout. A 'good night was had by all. ' Certainly a special event which was extremely well attended. Whilst Jody was our guest speaker and something different to the norm, the applause must go one of our members, who gave a spontaneous and heartfelt talk about his 50 years with Bradford West. We were honoured to host our Lord Mayor and our very own DG. It shows what we can do as a club as everyone mucks in.



Working with The Bradford (Park Avenue) Sports Foundation. (BPASF)

We were approached in April to partner with BPASF in a new scheme which will harness the power of football and sport to inspire and engage young people, particularly those at risk of anti-social behaviour, youth violence, or those from high-need areas. This would be known as The Rotary Kickback Programme. Members were enthused by this proposed programme, which should lead young people away from a life of crime. It was decided to explore ways of progressing this.

Steps taken so far are:

- We arranged a meeting between representatives of BPASF and representatives of Rotary Clubs in the Bradford Group as it was felt that working with other Clubs in the area would be beneficial both BPASF and Rotary in Bradford.
- We have agreed to donate £555 towards the costs in undertaking the programme.
- We have arranged a fund-raising event to, hopefully, raise the additional £645 towards the initial £1200 required to enable the programme to be launched in mid-July.
- We have offered them corporate membership.

For their part BPASF have undertaken a bucket collection to raise funds for the Rotary School in Sri Lanka, and have offered replica kit for us to donate to worthwhile projects etc.

Webmaster

Re Website. The website has been kept to date with event and project reports and with prior publicity. The Cognito online booking system seems to work well.

As in previous years we have a "2024/25 Projects and Events" page, and all projects and events held during the year have been set up as sub-pages.

The six featured pages on the home page have been regularly changed to keep them up to date and relevant.

A new page has been set up to simplify the procedure for submitting new projects and events to council for approval.

Re Social Media. Regular postings on Facebook have kept our club in the spotlight and thanks must be given to our two main contributors. (You know who you are!) In order to appeal to a younger demographic, we need to perhaps look at other areas of social media e.g. TikTok, Instagram, BlueSky etc. Volunteers to do this will be welcomed!

Balloon Race.

An online eco balloon race was held in conjunction with our 50th Charter anniversary dinner on 21st September 2024. The race lasted for 7 days and finished during the event. The winners were announced after the meal.

We sold 119 tickets at £5 each (£595.) After payment of prizes and expenses (£167) a profit of £428 was made for our Charity Trust.

I won't mention any names but the 1st and 2nd placed balloons were owned by a member who has a habit of winning our lunchtime raffle. This member very kindly made a donation to the Charity Trust out of the winnings.

Foundation / Fellowship Weekend

Our principal source of fund raising has been the weekly wine raffle. Collection has been by direct debit from all participating members, whether attending or not, enabling us to raise more and more by year.

Last year we exceeded £2000 for the first time. This year we anticipate a similar total of £ 2000 or so by the financial year end.

The loose change jar has become an ever more important source of income as members embrace the concept.

Raffles during the year have also added to the total.

The Fellowship Weekend this year took in Coventry/Stratford and Leamington Spa. The weather was good and all members who attended had an enjoyable weekend, despite the coach breaking down on our return Journey.

Hopefully we can continue these trips for a few years longer.

Rotary Children's Fun Day - Tuesday 23rd July 2024

42 pupils and 14 staff from Southfield School attended Hesketh Farm Park on the day. The weather was perfect and the students fed animals, go-karted, explored the play areas, had a picnic and finished with a tractor ride.

The lead Teacher was very grateful for what we do each year and explained how beneficial the day out is for the students.

Littlemoor Park

During the year, members attended a tree planting session., and in the space of less than 2 hours, over 300 shrubs were planted and covered with protective sheaths.

That did not stop some vandals by the next day pulling out a number of stacks.

Not daunted, they were replaced, and all is well.

Last year's planted shrubs have taken well with very few perishing.

Littlemoor Park is now a designated nature reserve

Malawi 2024-25

Two visits were done, the first in November 2024 and again during April/May 2025.

Apart from the usual clinical workload, we had a 2 day teaching session with the Clinical Officers and hosted the second international endoscopic course.



Development planning within the department was constructive. Various technical and maintenance issues were identified and plans left to correct.

Visits to The Butterfly Foundation were enjoyable. The children are really benefiting from there additional education. The grants from York RC have gone to purchase tools for the vocational trained students.

May visit – as part of the sustainability maintenance and improvement to the 'private rooms' was required. He hosted an open day with the help of Limbe Rotary. This led to meeting other NGO's which will help. Rotarian Mahesh Kotecha has step up to help with the various tasks. He will supply the work force if we supply the 'product'

The programme will involve improvements to water supply, repair of bathrooms, hot water supply. Work with matron on the laundry project, theatre doors and building a store room.

Purchase of over 80 metres of material was purchased for theatre drapes and tray wraps. We are still in discussions on how to improve the nursing manpower which in turn would improve productivity and hence income. 3500 hearing aids were taken over and distributed to 3 main centres

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Mental health project; £1000 was handed to Limbe Rotarian President Reuben to contribute to their support of a pilot study into the mental health of students. They have seen a very significant increase in mental health problems including suicide rates.



Rotary Peace Fellows.

Sadly, the student allocated to us for 2024-25 from Nigeria was refused a visa. She apparently had had a rejection previously for reasons not known to us.

Ukraine

Tim Marsden continues to go with his driver Steve, to Ukraine. I think to date, he has done 22 trips since the start of the War.



We have been able to help collect equipment and disposables from the Yorkshire Clinic and some items from Bradford Royal Infirmary. There is just a small contribution compared to the 42-foot trailers that go over from Hull to Rotterdam. Personal donations have also been made, and these go to Adventurers Rotary.

Some members are on his WhatsApp group where he relays graphic details of the encounters they have had.

Tim also has a contact with refurbished NHS hearing aids, and I managed to take 3500 over to Malawi in our recent trip.

Brontë Birthplace Walk

The walk was organized on Easter Sunday, 20th April 2025, to commemorate the day the Brontë family moved from Thornton to Haworth with horses and cart. The event attracted hundreds of people both in Thornton and Haworth, as the horses and cart went by, carrying the Brontë children (from the local school) and accompanied by Patrick Brontë and Maria Brontë. Regency costumes were worn. Walkers who completed the whole route on foot received a Certificate of Completion. The event concluded with a talk by a representative of the Brontë Birthplace in The Old School Room in Haworth. Refreshments were donated by Rotary members.

A total of £2,250 was raised, the majority from a Just Giving fundraising campaign, and some from collections on the day. This could be increased by £560 if the Brontë Birthplace receives charitable status. Costs of hiring the horses and cart (£750) were defrayed by the Brontë Birthplace, whilst costs for the costumes (£248.39) and the donation for use of the School Room were borne by Bradford West Rotary Club. Net funds raised for donation to the Birthplace are £2,001.61(excluding gift aid)

Hedge Planting –

Friday 14th March – Thornton Primary School - 60 children

Saturday 15th March – General public and other schoolchildren

The idea was to make an environmentally friendly hedge, providing food for wildlife. This will also create a people-friendly space, with attractive landscaping interspersed with benches for social interaction.

Bradford West Rotary members helped to organise the planting. We planted a wide variety of hedging plants interspersed with a few trees. In all we planted 4 collections of plants, totalling 420 - equivalent to a 100m double row hedge:

1 Accounting policies

a Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the

b Fund accounting

The Club has two funds. The General Fund is the operating fund of the Club for which the Club Council is responsible. The Charity A/C which was registered as a Charity on 14th December 1993 is the responsibility of the Charity trustees.

The Club banks General and Charitable funds separately.

c Statement of Financial Activities

Incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the Club becomes entitled to the resources, and the amounts due are readily quantifiable. Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred, or a constructive obligation arises, that results in the payment being unavoidable. Income and expenditure is accounted for gross, according to the information received.

d Balance Sheet

No equipment is currently subject to depreciation. In the last five years no individual item has cost more than £1,000 so all such expenditure has been written off when incurred.

e Rounding up/down

All figures in the accounts have been rounded down/up to the nearest pound. No attempt has been made to ensure the totals printed are the sum of the printed figures. The column totals are also expressed to the nearest pound.

f. Gift Aid Income

In 2024-25 Gift Aid Income was **£4,794.55** and has been allocated to individual income headings

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4. Club Service Report

Kids Out to Hesketh Farm, July 18 2023:

As in previous years, students from Co-op Academy Southfield, who have a variety of needs, were treated to a day out at Hesketh Farm in July 23. There were 28 students, 22 carers and 9 of our members and partners.

The students and carers thoroughly enjoyed the day and we Rotarians enjoyed hosting this worthwhile event.

CART

In July 2023 we joined CART's celebration of 40 years charitable work in Africa. We met their founder, Guildford Tompkins, now in his 90's. And Bradford West featured in their slideshow with thanks to us for our support in loading containers bound for Africa.

We continue to help load their containers whenever possible and they kindly give us space to transport items to Malawi for our projects there.

RYLA, August 2023

Our RYLA student this year came from Immanuel College in Bradford. She enjoyed and really benefited from it and shared her experience with the club at a lunchtime meeting.

Rotary Peace Fellow Class XX11 2023-24

Our Peace fellow this year is from New Zealand, having graduated from Victoria University of Wellington with BA in Developmental Studies and Internal Relationships in 2012. Since then, she has worked internationally across the not-for-profit sector and for the immigration dept of the Government of NZ.

She is passionate about humanitarianism and poverty alleviation for the world's most vulnerable communities and believes local leaders need to be empowered to enact change within their own communities. She has been a real pleasure to meet and has taken part in our Rotary events whenever her studies allow.

At the end of this Rotary year, She is travelling for three months to gain practical experience in the field. She will return in September to continue her Masters degree in Bradford.

Gaza Appeal

In response to a message from our Bradford peace fellow from Ukraine asking our club if we could help her fellow peace fellow to get his family out of Gaza, we invited Mohammed to talk to us about his family's desperate situation. Their family house was bombed early on in October, and they fled south just with passport and ID. But since then they had been stuck in South Gaza, no longer safe. We were able to contribute towards their obtaining visa's and eventually, several months later, they finally crossed the border to safety.

E-Group 2023-24

We introduced a new project of rock painting and started a Facebook media 'Rotary Rocks Yorkshire and North Lincolnshire' group. Our members had fun painting their own rocks to get the project started and these were then used to decorate the tables at our annual conference dinner to show other clubs in D1040 how to join the project

Our Shoebox project saw us doing a few bucket collections at two of our local Tesco stores and this enabled us to fill and distribute 250 shoeboxes to children in need throughout the Bradford Community in December 2023. We currently have 175 boxes for the 24/25 project in stock

Our ongoing project at All Souls burial ground has been well attended throughout the year by our group and members of the local Boothtown Community - by the end of the summer good progress had been made and new community volunteers established. Litter picking has also been a big part of this project, and it is encouraging to see the bin bags we place being used and the level of discarded litter being reduced greatly. This project has been supported by the local ward councillor and Calderdale Council - we joined the council team doing a huge local area litter collection and they in turn have been doing grass cutting around the paths to help us

We have supported the Rotary Community corps on various project including face painting and fundraising for Mito Mission Wrapping Christmas presents in the local shopping centre to raise money for Bradford Nightstop, working a project with Yorkshire Wildlife trust, and attending many community events offering free face painting for children, origami crane making and Mehendi hands

Kitty's kits have been a great success, supplied by InnChurches in Bradford, we have now taken more than 500 kits to 6 schools to make with children and parents - we have also joined InnChurches at their school holiday cooking sessions with some vulnerable children from the Bradford area. This was also joined by a British Sign Language teacher who taught basic sign to these children and parents.

We are arranging British Sign Language in the community lessons to be taught at the Khidmat centre in Bradford along with the Kittys Kit project.

Overall we have volunteered more than 500 hours

Rotakids

Herb garden Planted July 2023, refurbished June 2024

On 6.7.23 we had such fun supervising the Rotakids as they planted herbs in the plot next to the school gates where purple for polio bulbs were planted earlier this year. Thanks are due to Woodbank Garden Centre for donation of soil, supplying herbs at discounted cost and releasing 2 members of staff to help prepare the plot on the day. Also to a recent member and now friend of Rotary who shared her knowledge with us and the children and to a local gardener for help planting and teaching the children. Rotakids subsequently watered the plants daily and the herbs will be used by the school. And we had just as much fun and learned a whole lot more when we refurbished the plot with the help of our local Woodbank Garden Centre in June 2024.

Rotakids have completed 3 other projects this year: Collecting good as new books to send to Malawi to start a library for the street children rescued from the streets of Blantyre by the Butterfly Foundation for Peace, a summer holiday collection of good as new shoes for the Butterfly children and learning to bake bread with Kitty's Kits, subsequently rolling it out to the whole school.

Continuing Vocational work in Malawi:

This Rotary year we have had two further visits to Malawi – Nov 2023 and April 2024.

Our global grant is eventually completed and has been a great success, our club having made a valuable difference to patient care and staff satisfaction.

There are now 3 comfortable, well equipped en-suite private rooms each with air conditioning, a well-used nurses' rest room, a laundry room and storeroom. They had been in use for twelve months, but the official signage was only put up in November 2023 when our three visiting club members were amazed and delighted to find the staff had named three rooms after them! They have proved popular with both patients and staff, improving morale of patients, guardians and staff, generating income used to keep the new rooms up to standard and to improve conditions on the general ward as shown by reports from senior nursing and medical staff, patient and staff questionnaires and review of the unit's financial accounts and by direct observation of our three club members plus our new honorary member.

At the very top end of the operations carried out by our members and their colleagues, the 17 cochlear implant patients were all reviewed in person and are thriving.

Teaching and training of the Clinical Officers and registrars continue. We put on a 4 day meeting in November with great international attendance but lack of funds meant a number of our clinical officers could not attend. The number of clinical officers and the areas they cover have both increased this year. We now have 58 ENT CO's and 9 audiologists, all equipped with personal tool kits from Bradford West Rotary, working in 23 locations throughout Malawi.

We also completed a huge project – obtaining and installing two autoclave machines in the ENT unit in QECH in Blantyre. They are making a tremendous difference to the running of the unit and we have to thank the Bradford based Malawi Relief Fund for their generosity in funding this.

The Butterfly Foundation for Peace in Malawi

WE have increased our involvement with this charity and its work “rescuing” children from the streets of Blantyre, reuniting them with their families and registering them in school and health services whilst providing a place of safety, giving them a good meal every day and supplementing the education they get at school in addition to teaching social responsibility, kindness, mindfulness, and much more.

We have taken them clothes, shoes, books and educational toys and equipment, sponsored school uniform (they must wear uniform if they are to attend school). We have seen for ourselves the difference in the children, in their wellbeing, behaviour and learning. The younger children are doing so well at school, one coming top in his class of 150!

During our last visit, we took a donation from our club and bought educational books (to supplement those sent by our Rotakids) and cushions to form a library for them. That Library is now in full use.

It was identified that the older children who had reached the age of 16 and 17 without ever having had any formal education were not benefiting in the same way as the younger children. So after talking to them it was concluded that they might benefit from attending a vocational training college. Our Club agreed to sponsor six and four of them are now learning carpentry, one plumbing and all loving it. Sadly one of the six dropped out. The college was dubious about taking on “street kids” but took a leap of faith and now is full of praise for these boys and their achievements.

We sponsored the Director to come to UK for 4 weeks to talk about his work at our District Conference in Scarborough – he made such a lasting impression on the Rotarians present that he was subsequently invited to talk to many clubs and has gained their ongoing support. One club has promised to sponsor another 3 older boys through vocational training. Another is looking at providing individual toolboxes when they qualify.

Whilst on stage in Scarborough, Andrew made Rotary history by being made an honorary member of District 1040 and our club subsequently made him an honorary member of Bradford West. He is now regularly attending meetings with Rotary Club of Limbe in Malawi.

Tree Planting in Malawi

We were successful in applying for a District Grant to plant trees with the Butterfly foundation. Due to delay in administering the grant this year, by the time we received the go-ahead we had missed two tree-planting seasons. But we can go ahead with this in Oct/Nov this year when our members will be visiting again. Meanwhile, we have introduced the Butterfly Foundation to Rotary Club of Limbe and other groups who have experience and will help.

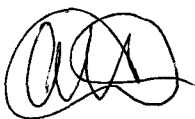

1 Accounting policies

b Fund accounting

d Balance Sheet
