Governing document

The organisation is an unincorporated registered charity since 1986. The charity was established under its own constitution and governed by its Trust Deed.

Recruitment and appointment of Management Committee

The members of the management committee are elected to serve for a period of three years after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting.

Organisation structure

The Lambeth Elderly Association from Vietnam has a Management Committee of up to 8 members who meet quarterly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present Committee has 8 members from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the provision of the services rest with the Project Manager. The Project Manager is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that the key performance indicators are met.

Achievements and performance

Advice work

Our organisation tackles these inequalities by offering culturally and linguistically appropriate services that enable our clients to effectively tackle these challenges.

In frail health and unable to understand English language information in the media or on the internet, they were too anxious and confused to venture out, with many confined to their homes for many months after the start of the pandemic.

Clients have also faced difficulties with practical activities such as acquiring food, getting medical attention and communicating with mainstream providers, many of whom are offering scaled down services. With their trusted community centre (LEAV) also having closed its doors (in terms of not meeting clients physically), many were at crisis point.

We have delivered advice in Cantonese and Vietnamese on debt, benefits and housing to 90 older Vietnamese and Chinese-Vietnamese people over the last year.

These 90 people have made 191 visits to our advice service over the reporting period, with many coming between two and four times each. Three clients we have to help over 10 times. In addition, we ran two Cantonese-language workshops attended by a total of 113 people. The first, held in September 2024, covered the topic of state pension and pension credit and had 35 participants. The second, held in February 2025, offered guidance to 78 people on how best to survive the cost-of-living crisis. Our clients face additional barriers and challenges in terms of overcoming poverty, accessing services, gaining information and advice and maintaining their health and wellbeing.

Tea Dancing/Traditional exercise

The exercise sessions have been a major success so far with up to 35-42 people joining for each session. They are extremely fun and has helped our members with some problems they've been facing due to the pandemic, also enable our members to stay fit and healthy. The great thing about these sessions is that anyone can join and interact with other community members and develop friendship and change their lifestyle.

Table Tennis sessions

The table tennis sessions for Vietnamese and Chinese Elderly have been very successful with 15-28 people attended each session twice a week. It's actually one of the most beneficial things our user can do to develop friendship and stay fit and healthy.

The funding has greatly impacted what we do in our organisation by both enabling our organisation to continuously deliver successful activities to our beneficiaries, which has made a positive impact thus far. It has enabled us to focus our resources on securing more funding, which has gone well with Yapp Charitable Trust providing funding for our running cost for 3 years.

The grant has enabled us to build our reputation among the Vietnamese and Vietnamese-Chinese population in Lambeth and we were able to provide popular and much needed activities. We have gained 8 new new members from the table tennis and tradition dance beginner classes. Some of our new table tennis service users have become loyal supporters of the organisation and have been promoting us to friends and family.

Volunteers

The trust would not be able to provide such a wide service to our beneficiaries without the continued support of a large number of volunteers who give their services voluntarily, to assist the staff.

Financial review

A great deal of time and thought was spent during the year on organising activities for the Lambeth Vietnamese elderly. This includes outings, lunches and other activities held in the association.

The management committee has also focused its attention on the difficulties that elderly Vietnamese people experience, such as language problems and in the case of disabled elderly, they also have mobility problems.

The policy of the Lambeth Elderly Association continues to be to seek additional finance to support the activities of the association. There has been no change in policy since the last trustees' report.

Risk management

The Trustees actively review the major risk which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining reserves at current levels, combined with an annual review of the controls over key financial systems, will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The Trustees have also examined other operational and business risks faced by the charity and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

Reserve policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds at a level which equate to approximately one month unrestricted expenditure. This provides sufficient funds to cover management and administration and support costs. Unrestricted funds are maintained for at least this level throughout the year.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities



**REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT EXAMINERS TO THE MEMBERS

We have examined the financial statement of Lambeth Elderly Association From Vietnam for the year ended 31 March 2025 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Statement of Financial Position, the Statement of Cash Flows and the related notes. 

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)(effective 1 January 2015)-(Charities SORP(FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102).

Lambeth Elderly Association From Vietnam meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees' continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income and donations are included in incoming resources when they are receivable, except when the donors specify that they must be used in future accounting periods or donors conditions have not been fulfilled, then the income is deferred. The income for fundraising ventures is shown gross, with the associated costs included in fundraising costs.

Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent include cash in hand, deposit held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investment with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdraft. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowing in current liabilities.

The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future period.

Clients have also faced difficulties with practical activities such as acquiring food, getting medical attention and communicating with mainstream providers, many of whom are offering scaled down services. With their trusted community centre (LEAV) also having closed its doors (in terms of meeting clients physically), many were at crisis point.

Our clients face additional barriers and challenges in terms of overcoming poverty, accessing services, gaining information and advice and maintaining their health and wellbeing.

In addition, the success of our activities spread by word of mouth and we saw an increase in attendance/ participation in the activities we've deliver with more regular attendees proven in our records. Our community volunteers have been at the core of these deliveries and supported the beneficiaries throughout.

A challenge that we faced there were some people who faced isolation and it was difficult for them to integrate in new environments with new individual. Positively we manage to get them out of doors to meet new people at the Center, make friends as well as share experiences with each other.

Improved confidence among elderly Vietnamese people in the locality that their incomes are being maximised. Outcome Indicators - Questionnaire put to all recipients of advice.

Tea/Dancing exercise

The exercise sessions have been a major success fo far with up to 40-48 people joining us for each session. They are extremely fun and has helped our members with some problems they've been facing due to the pandemic, also enable our members to stay fit and healthy. The great thing about these sessions it that anyone can join and interact with othe community members and develop friendship and change their lifestyle.

Table Tennis sessions

The table tennis sessions for Vietnamese and Chinese Elderly have been very successful with 20-28 people attended each sessions three sessions a week. It's actually one of the most beneficial things our user can do to develop friendship and stay fit and healthy.

The funding has greatly impacted what we do in our organisation by both enabling our organisation to continously deliver successful activities to our beneficiaries, which has made a positive impact thus far. More people have benefited from these activities which is proven in the increase number of attendee and regulars during the project.

Volunteers

The trust would not be able to provide such a wide service to our beneficiaries without the continued support of a large number of volunteers who give their services voluntarily, to assist the staff.

Financial review

A great deal of time and thought was spent during the year on organising activities for the Lambeth Vietnamese elderly. This includes outings, lunches and other activities held in the association.

The management committee has also focused its attention on the difficulties that elderly Vietnamese people experience, such as language problems and in the case of disabled elderly, they also have mobility problems.

The policy of the Lambeth Elderly Association continues to be to seek additional finance to support the activities of the association. There has been no change in policy since the last trustees' report.

Risk management

The Trustees actively review the major risk which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining reserves at current levels, combined with an annual review of the controls over key financial systems, will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. 

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)(effective 1 January 2015)-(Charities SORP(FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102).

With their trusted community centre (LEAV) also having closed its doors (in terms of meeting clients physically), many were at crisis point.

We have delivered advice in Cantonese and Vietnamese on debt, benefits and housing to 70 older Vietnamese and Chinese-Vietnamese people over the last 18 months. In the first half of the project we supported 60 people with our advice service, meaning we have assisted 130 people in total.

These 70 people have made 164 visits to our advice service over the reporting period, with many coming between two and four times each.

In addition, we ran two Cantonese-language workshops attended by a total of 113 people. The first, held in September 2022, covered the topic of state pensions and pension credit and had 35 participants. The second, held in February 2023, offered guidance to 78 people on how best to survive the cost-of-living crisis.

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Accounting convention

Organisation structure

The Lambeth Elderly Association from Vietnam has a Management Committee of up to 8 members who meet quarterly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present Committee has 8 members from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the provision of the services rest with the Project Manager. The Project Manager is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that the key performance indicators are met.

Achievements and performance

Advice work

We have provided both Chinese and Vietnamese advice work to our clients online advice and also in our centre. We would speak to the clients individually to understand their needs and help advise them during the pandemic. This activity has helped enabled our service user to understand their benefit entitlement as the pandemic has affected people's financial situation and things to such nature.

Telephone Befriending

With lockdown in place mental health is severely affected due to the members feeling isolated at home. In the past we still had the centre open to mitigate this, however with lockdown in place it has completely cut off that interaction.

We have been having telephone befriending sessions to help reduce our service user's isolations and help improve their wellbeing. These sessions have been fantastic, and it enables those who are feeling isolated and depressed to pick up the phone and talk to someone and this activity has helped relieve stress, anxiety, depression and really boost our service user's self-esteem and morale. We have 7 volunteers to call up to 50 elderly members for this activity which will thoroughly improve the service.

Exercise Sessions online

The exercises sessions have been a major success so far with up to 27-35 people joining each session. They are extremely fun and has helped our members with some problems they've been facing due to the pandemic. Lockdown has prevented freedom of movement, leaving our members isolated at home due to the fear of contracting COVID and with no physical exercise our members physical health has hindered in the process.

Our exercise sessions has helped alleviate this problem. These sessions are fun and enables our members to stay fit and healthy in the comfort of their homes. Many have felt less fatigue and a lot more energetic throughout the day in the process. The great thing about these sessions is that anyone can join, and everyone can participate in them interact with other community members and develop friendships and change their lifestyle.

These sessions cater for all our members and they have been extremely well received, helping members stay active and provide a great platform for our members to socialise with their friends and have fun whilst improving their physical health.

Healthy Cooking Sessions online

Our sessions adds a fun twist to something that many of our members do on a daily basis which is cooking. This platform has thoroughly helped our members with their physical and mental health. Physical health from the perspective that they can cook great delicious but healthy food at home that fuels the body. Regarding mental health this is an extremely fun activity that focuses on socialising with each other and has been greatly received by our members. These sessions has really helped boost our members self-esteem and morale in a productive way during the lockdown.

Volunteers

The trust would not be able to provide such a wide service to our beneficiaries without the continued support of a large number of volunteers who give their services voluntarily, to assist the staff.

Financial review

A great deal of time and thought was spent during the year on organising activities for the Lambeth Vietnamese elderly. This includes outings, lunches and other activities held in the association.

The management committee has also focused its attention on the difficulties that elderly Vietnamese people experience, such as language problems and in the case of disabled elderly, they also have mobility problems.

The policy of the Lambeth Elderly Association continues to be to seek additional finance to support the activities of the association. There has been no change in policy since the last trustees' report.

Risk management

The Trustees actively review the major risk which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining reserves at current levels, combined with an annual review of the controls over key financial systems, will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. 

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic lives as follows:

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent include cash in hand, deposit held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investment with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdraft. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowing in current liabilities.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future period.
