CHARITY OVERVIEW

The charity, founded in 1994 and run with a Christian ethos, provides essential funding and operational guidance for partner charities providing caring homes for children whose lives have been severely disadvantaged by bereavement, poverty, or disease, meeting not only their essential needs but also giving a good standard of educational support and medical care. The charity also provides other disadvantaged children with educational funding and occasional support, as opportunity allows, for families and communities lacking in life essentials such as heating and food. The charity's primary focus, though not exclusively, is on projects in Southern India and Romania.

STATED OBJECTIVES

The stated and published objectives of the Charity which operates in India and Romania, are as follows: -

1. The provision of residential care for severely disadvantaged children in Christian homes in India, including medical care and educational support/funding.
2. The provision of educational funding for children living in needy communities.
3. The occasional provision of short-term aid to communities in need of essential support as identified by our partner charities, primarily, but not exclusively, in Romania and India.

An update about the projects supported by the charity is given below:

INDIA

Inter-arc provides financial support and operational guidance for an indigenous children's home in India, Blessing Home, based in Bangalore. The children, whose parents have either died or are not able to adequately care for them, are provided with a high standard of residential care from whatever age they are admitted through to adulthood, including education at good local schools and further education colleges, as well as taking care of medical needs as and when they arise. The project has continued to work through significant challenges, including changes in governmental regulations, which have required extensive changes to the operational structure. The professional trustee board members in India are dedicated volunteers who ensure continued adherence to the governmental regulations.

The children at Blessing Home continue to do well, and their care and education are maintaining good standards. Howard Wallace, the director of Inter-arc, visited India in April 2024 for four weeks. The purpose of this visit was to encourage the workers and helpers of the teams supported by Inter-arc, meet the children and parents who are being supported, ensure both the quality and efficiency of the food and distribution, and verify that correct administrative and financial processes are in place and are being followed. Blessing home is looking to move to more suitable premises and a new purpose built house is currently being constructed to satisfy this need.

ROMANIA & UKRAINE

The restructuring of the Romanian board is now complete, which has enabled the charity to engage in providing funding to meet specific needs concerning children and their families. Romania has also been used as a springboard to reach out to Ukraine, where opportunities arose to purchase supplies and bring relief to families. Howard Wallace visited Romania on Tuesday, 19th March 2024, for 10 days to facilitate the ongoing work.

UK UPDATE

On September 14th, 2024, Inter-Arc marked its 30th anniversary at Bethel Church in Coventry. The event was attended by over 100 people, including supporters and VIP guests who included Pastor Barry Killick speaker and the head of Blessing Home, who travelled from India for the occasion. Following the main programme, refreshments were served. The event recognised the charity's work, especially its activities in Romania and India.

Charity Officers: Mr Chris Whitell, Chairman, Joy Wallace and Howard Wallace, Secretary and Director respectively, Mr Ian Watkin, Data Protection Officer. Mr Gordon Sprouse and Mr Andrew Bullock, trustees.

Finance: The charity continues to maintain one of its founding policies of not organising any fundraising events or specific requests for income to meet its needs, preferring instead to emulate the practice of George Muller of trusting God to meet its needs through prayer. It is pleasing to be able to report a good year for income with significant investment in charitable activity also supported by a robust bank balance at the commencement of the financial year which has enabled the charity to continue to meet its obligations. The practice of submitting quarterly accounts to the charity's independent examiner was maintained to reflect an increased robustness in accounting practice resulting in a simplification of the annual examination which received its usual clean bill of health.



An update about the projects supported by the charity is given below:

INDIA

Inter-arc provides financial support and operational guidance for an indigenous children's home in India, Blessing Home based in Bangalore. The children, whose parents have either died or are not able to adequately care for them, are provided with a high standard of residential care from whatever age they are admitted through to adulthood, including education at good local schools and further education colleges as well as taking care of medical needs as and when they arise.

The project has continued to work through significant challenges including changes in governmental regulations which have required extensive changes to the operational structure. There have been several retirements from the trustee board in India with members being replaced by other professional and dedicated volunteers to ensure continued adherence with the governmental regulations.

It is good to be able to report that despite these challenges the children continue to do well, and their care has not been compromised. Howard Wallace, the director of Inter-arc visited India from the 4th to the 31st of October 2023.

ROMANIA, UKRAINE & TURKEY

The restructuring of the Romanian board is now complete which has enabled the charity to engage in providing funding to meet specific needs concerning children and their families. Romania has also been used as a springboard to reach out to Ukraine where opportunities have arisen to purchase supplies and bring relief to families. Howard Wallace visited Romania on Tuesday, 19th March for 10 days to facilitate the ongoing work.

Following the powerful earthquake in February 2023, which devastated vast areas of the Republic of Türkiye, Inter-arc, through its associates, contributed a significant amount of money to rebuilding facilities in Hatay, a southern Turkish province on the Mediterranean coast, bordered by Syria to the south and the east.

UK UPDATE

Charity Officers: At the A.G.M. held on 14th July 2023 Mr Chris Whitell was reappointed as Chairman for one year, Joy Wallace and Howard Wallace were also re-elected as Secretary and Director respectively. Mr Ian Watkin was reappointed as Data Protection Officer. Mr Gordon Sprouse and Mr Andrew Bullock were reappointed as trustees.

Finance: The charity continues to maintain one of its founding policies of not organising any fundraising events or specific requests for income to meet its needs, preferring instead to emulate the practice of George Muller of trusting God to meet its needs through prayer. It is pleasing to be able to report a good year for income with significant investment in charitable activity also supported by a robust bank balance at the commencement of the financial year which has enabled the charity to continue to meet its obligations. The practice of submitting quarterly accounts to the charity's independent examiner was maintained to reflect an increased robustness in accounting practice resulting in a simplification of the annual examination which received its usual clean bill of health.

ROMANIA, UKRAINE & TURKEY

The restructuring of the Romanian board is now complete which has enabled the charity to engage in providing funding to meet specific needs with respect to children and their families. Romania has also been used as a springboard to reach out to Ukraine where opportunities have arisen to purchase supplies and bring relief to families. This was facilitated by two field trips from Romania to Ukraine by the Director.

Following the powerful earthquake in February 2023, which devastated vast areas of the Republic of Türkiye, Inter-arc, through its associates, contributed a significant amount of money to rebuilding facilities in Hatay, a southern Turkish province on the Mediterranean coast, bordered by Syria to the south and the east.



The project has continued to face significant challenges over the last year, not only from the consequences of the Covid pandemic with an extended period of school closures and other restrictions, but also due to changes in governmental regulations which have required extensive changes to the operational structure. These challenges have necessitated regular on-line meetings and dialogue between the UK Director, supported by the Trustees, and the Indian board members to ensure continued adherence with the governmental regulations. At the time of writing this report implementation of these changes is an on-going process and will be further covered in next year's report.

It is good to be able to report that despite these issues the children continue to do well, and their care has not been compromised.

ROMANIA

Progress is underway with making some important changes to the charity's Romanian board structure which it is hoped when complete will enable the charity to start to engage again with providing funding to meet specific needs. The process is slow and not helped by the Covid pandemic, but it is hoped that there will be active participation again by the time next year's report becomes due.

UK UPDATE

Charity Officers: At the A.G.M. held on 16th July 2021 Mr. Gordon Sprouse offered his resignation after 15 years' service and this was accepted. He was thanked for his time as Chairman. After some discussion it was unanimously agreed that Mr. Chris Whitell would take over as Chairman for a trial period of one year. At the meeting Joy Wallace and Howard Wallace were also re-elected as Secretary and Director respectively. Mr Ian Watkin was reappointed as Data Protection Officer. It was proposed and seconded that Mr. Andrew Bullock also be appointed a Trustee, and this was unanimously agreed. The Trustee meetings also continue to benefit from the advisory input of Bob Telford.

Finance: The charity continues to maintain one of its founding policies of not organising any fundraising events or specific requests for income to meet its needs, preferring instead to emulate the practice of George Muller of trusting God to meet its needs through prayer. Despite the widespread effects of the Covid pandemic it is pleasing to be able to report an excellent year for income which has enabled the charity to continue to meet its obligations. The practice of submitting quarterly accounts to the charity's independent examiner was maintained to reflect an increased robustness in accounting practice and resulting in a simplification of the annual examination which received its usual clean bill of health.

CHARITY OVERVIEW

The charity, founded in 1994, and run with Christian ethos, provides essential funding and operational guidance for partner charities providing caring homes for children whose lives have been severely disadvantaged by bereavement, poverty or disease meeting not only their essential needs but also giving a good standard of educational support and medical care. The charity also provides other disadvantaged children with their educational funding as well as occasional support, as opportunity allows, for families and communities lacking in some of the basic essentials for life such as heating and food. The charity's primary focus, though not exclusively so, is on projects in Southern India and Romania.

STATED OBJECTIVES

The stated and published objectives of the charity which operates in India and Romania are as follows;

1. The provision of residential care for severely disadvantaged children in Christian homes in Bangalore and Nellore including medical care and educational support / funding.
2. The provision of educational funding for children living in needy communities.
3. The occasional provision of short-term aid to communities in need of essential support as identified by our partner charities primarily, but not exclusively, in Romania and India.

An update about the projects supported by the charity is given below:

INDIA

Inter-arc provides financial support and operational guidance for two indigenous children's homes in India. The primary one, in terms of size, is Blessing Home in Bangalore and the other is Krupa Gruham in Nellore. The children, whose parents have either died or are not able to adequately care for them, are provided with a high standard of residential care from whatever age they are admitted through to adulthood, including education at good local schools and further education colleges as well as taking care of medical needs as and when they arise.

Both projects have faced significant challenges over the last year, not only from the consequences of the Covid pandemic with an extended period of school closures and other restrictions, but also due to changes in governmental regulations which have required extensive changes to the operational structure. These challenges have necessitated regular on-line meetings and dialogue between the UK Director, supported by the Trustees, and the Indian board members to ensure continued adherence with the governmental regulations. At the time of writing this report implementation of these changes is an on-going process and will be further covered in next year's report.

It is good to be able to report that despite these issues the children continue to do well and their care has not been compromised.

ROMANIA

Progress is underway with making some important changes to the charity's Romanian board structure which it is hoped when complete will enable the charity to start to engage again with providing funding to meet specific needs. The process is slow and not helped by the Covid pandemic, but it is hoped that there will be active participation again by the time next year's report becomes due.

UK UPDATE

Charity Officers: At the A.G.M. held on 6th July 2019 the undersigned was re-elected as chairman for a further and final year. At the meeting Joy Wallace and Howard Wallace were also re-elected as Secretary and Director respectively. In addition, the charity now has two additional trustees with Ian Watkin, who has also been appointed Data Protection Officer, and Chris Whitell. However, after more than 25 years of loyal and valued service, the charity received the resignation of Don Goddard as trustee due to failing health. The Trustee meetings also benefit from the advisory input of Bob Telford.

Basis of Independent Examiner's statement


