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CHARITY OVERVIEW

The charity, founded in 1994, and run with a Christian ethos, provides essential funding and operational guidance for partner charities providing caring homes for children whose lives have been severely disadvantaged by bereavement, poverty, or disease meeting not only their essential needs but also giving a good standard of educational support and medical care. The charity also provides other disadvantaged children with educational funding as well as occasional support, as opportunity allows, for families and communities lacking in some of the essentials for life such as heating and food. The charity's primary focus, though not exclusively so, is on projects in Southern India and Romania.

STATED OBJECTIVES

The stated and published objectives of the charity which operates in India and Romania are as follows: -

1. The provision of residential care for severely disadvantaged children in Christian homes in Bangalore and Nellore including medical care and educational support/funding.
2. The provision of educational funding for children living in needy communities.
3. The occasional provision of short-term aid to communities in need of essential support as identified by our partner charities primarily, but not exclusively, in Romania and India.

An update about the projects supported by the charity is given below:

INDIA

Inter-arc provides financial support and operational guidance for an indigenous children's home in India, Blessing Home based in Bangalore. The children, whose parents have either died or are not able to adequately care for them, are provided with a high standard of residential care from whatever age they are admitted through to adulthood, including education at good local schools and further education colleges as well as taking care of medical needs as and when they arise.

The project has continued to face significant challenges over the last year, including changes in governmental regulations which have required extensive changes to the operational structure. These challenges have necessitated regular online meetings and dialogue between the UK Director, supported by the Trustees, and the Indian board members to ensure continued adherence with the governmental regulations. At the time of writing this report implementation of these changes is an ongoing process and will be further covered in next year's report.

It is good to be able to report that despite these issues the children continue to do well, and their care has not been compromised.

ROMANIA, UKRAINE & TURKEY

The restructuring of the Romanian board is now complete which has enabled the charity to engage in providing funding to meet specific needs with respect to children and their families. Romania has also been used as a springboard to reach out to Ukraine where opportunities have arisen to purchase supplies and bring relief to families. This was facilitated by two field trips from Romania to Ukraine by the Director.

Following the powerful earthquake in February 2023, which devastated vast areas of the Republic of Türkiye, Inter-arc, through its associates, contributed a significant amount of money to rebuilding facilities in Hatay, a southern Turkish province on the Mediterranean coast, bordered by Syria to the south and the east.

UK UPDATE

Charity Officers: At the A.G.M. held on 13th August 2022 Mr Chris Whitell was reappointed as Chairman for one year, Joy Wallace and Howard Wallace were also re-elected as Secretary and Director respectively. Mr Ian Watkin was reappointed as Data Protection Officer. Mr Gordon Sprouse and Mr Andrew Bullock were reappointed as trustees.

Finance: The charity continues to maintain one of its founding policies of not organising any fundraising events or specific requests for income to meet its needs, preferring instead to emulate the practice of George Muller of trusting God to meet its needs through prayer. Despite the widespread effects of the Covid pandemic it is pleasing to be able to report a record year for income which has enabled the charity to continue to meet its obligations. The practice of submitting quarterly accounts to the charity's independent examiner was maintained to reflect an increased robustness in accounting practice resulting in a simplification of the annual examination which received its usual clean bill of health.

Basis of Independent Examiner's statement


