

The charity's principal sources of funds (including any fundraising)	Para 1.47	<p>The Senior Band perform circa 15 concerts per year, raising money for the group via ticket sales and CD sales. We also have a Patrons scheme. Patrons renewal is £5 minimum with extra donations possible & they receive 2 free tickets to the Patron's Concert. Other fundraising is organised by the various sections in order to bolster funds for any activities they wish to undertake, which may normally be considered expensive for the group to offer. A good example of this is the trip to London, August 2023.</p>

<p>A description of the principal risks facing the charity</p>	<p>Para 1.46</p>	<p>Risk and Internal Control</p> <p>The Group Executive Committee has identified the major risks to which they believe the Group is exposed, these have been reviewed and systems have been established to mitigate against them. The main areas of concern that have been identified are:</p> <p>Damage to the building, property and equipment. The Group would request the use of buildings, property and equipment from neighbouring organisations such as the church, community centre and other Scout Groups. Similar reciprocal arrangements exist with these organisations. The Group has sufficient buildings and contents insurance in place to mitigate against permanent loss.</p> <p>Injury to leaders, helpers, supporters and members. The Group through the capitation fees contributes to the Scout Associations national accident insurance policy. Risk Assessments are undertaken before all activities.</p> <p>Reduced income from fund raising. The Group is primarily reliant upon income from subscriptions and fundraising. The group does hold a reserve to ensure the continuity of activities should there be a major reduction in income.
