Vice Chairs' Report

Aims and Organisation

The Kalisher Trust is principally designed to offer aspiring barristers funding and other support and guidance as they seek and/or embark on pupillage; and, secondarily, for practitioners during the early stages of tenancy. This is an intensely demanding period - both financially and practically - for those seeking to establish practice at the Bar. The Trust aims to make awards and provide support and guidance to those graduates of exceptional promise but modest social and economic background, who might not otherwise be able to pursue a career path to the Bar.

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Events & Activities

Mock pupillage interviews

From 26th February 2024 to 20th March 2024, a programme of mock pupillage interviews took place over zoom. The team managed to offer all 39 persons who applied for a mock interview a time slot within the three week period. Each interviewee received 30 minutes of interview and feedback, usually with two interviewers (either practising pupils, barristers or members of the judiciary). All the interviewees who took part found the process useful as they prepared for their pupillage interviews in March and April 2024. Many have informed us that they received an offer of pupillage this year and wished to thank the Trust the opportunities offered to them.

Pre-loved Clothing Fair

The clothing fair went ahead on 25th March 2024 at Gray's Inn. It was a success and Gray's are willing to host another. In addition to the formalwear / suits that had been donated, we also had an unprecedented number (18) of wigs and gowns donated, which were dealt with by Gray's in the following way - Students were asked to complete an application form, similar to the one used in previous years. Each application was anonymised and a panel shortlisted the 86 applications received down to 30. After the initial sift, a further member of Gray's selected the final 18 recipients. Two collection days were organised and the individuals selected were invited to go into Gray's and try on the wigs and gowns available. Jasmine, from the Education Department at Gray's stated that it "*was a lovely opportunity to congratulate them again*". HHJ Richard Marks KC (the Common Sergeant) had also donated a wig and gown belonging to his late sister and was invited to personally select the recipient

Essay Prize 2025

The 2025 Kalisher Essay Competition, which carried a prize of £2,000 for the winner and £500 for the runner up, was open to all pupils undertaking a criminal pupillage and for the first time, those undertaking the Bar Training Course and those who had completing the Bar Training Course and were awaiting / applying for pupillage.

The competition was launched in January 2025, inviting submissions of up to 2,000 words in answer to the following question:

The backlog of Crown Court cases serves no one. You are advising the Government as to what measures would alleviate if not remove the problem once and for all. You are to assume this to be achieved within current funding constraints.

Is jury trial to be abolished in a particular class of case/s?

If so, would that require justices to be given greater sentencing powers?

Importantly you must advise whether any reforms would likely lead to challenge on human rights grounds.

Would removing legal aid to bring a challenge be an option or might that result in a challenge on its own right?

You should identify any other proposals and advise whether they would survive judicial scrutiny.

Entries were assessed by Peter Doyle KC and HHJ Judy Khan KC. At a time of financial pressure experienced by the youngest members of the criminal bar this Essay prize is aimed at supporting and inspiring the next generation of the profession. The prize was won by Joshua Clements of 23ES, with Anjelica Smerin of Mountford Chambers a close runner up. The judging panel commented on the winning entry as follows:

“A very well researched piece of work. Their analysis was excellent and well-reasoned. Importantly, this candidate met the ‘brief’, which was to provide advice to the government.”

Trust Composition

The trust composition did not change this year save for the addition (as volunteers rather than trustees) of Elspeth Windsor (who before becoming a tenant at her set of Chambers, was helped in her career by the Trust) and Dr Chris Whittaker who has worked in roles for many years across the charity and sports sectors with a track record in relationship management, strategic thinking and leadership.

The Trust wishes to record its sincere thanks to all those who have spent many years in position either as trustees or volunteers, and the hard work that they have all done in pursuit of the Trust's stated aims.

Internships, Scholarships

We work together with our prestigious partner organisations to appoint the brightest and the best to be interns and scholars. We value - and we have kept - the Trust's enduring eligibility criteria of '*exceptional promise and modest means*'.

- **JUSTICE** – Stephanie Needleman, Legal Director at JUSTICE, let us know (in October 2024) '*We had some really impressive applicants for the Kalisher scholarship*'. **Zahra Lahri**, the successful applicant who was appointed for this award, was on a strong trajectory to prepare for a career at the criminal Bar. In the preceding year, the Honourable Society of the Inner Temple had selected Zahra (one of 60 chosen scholars) to participate in the Inn's Pass Scholar Programme. Zahra thereby had benefited from this programme of advocacy skills development workshops, legal research workshops, and mini pupillage at a criminal law set.
- **CCRC** – In February 2024, the CCRC met with Leon Kazakos KC and Clare Wardell to consolidate arrangements for the Kalisher Trust to continue its support for the CCRC Intern programme. That month, **Emma Bean** started her internship. Lauren Sharkey, Senior Lawyer, CCRC, let us know (in May 2024), about this collaboration with the Trust, '*From our point of view, it continues to be a great success, and we're delighted with the calibre of candidates that we appoint.*' Representing the Kalisher Trust, Andrew Fisher KC, again, had been on the interview panel that convened to assess that Emma was the most suitable person to appoint.
- **AMICUS** – Two of our trustees, Max Hardy and Abigail Bright, together with Margot Ravenscroft, the Director of AMICUS, interviewed candidates. The pool of applicants was so strong that (in November 2024) that the Trust agreed, exceptionally, when AMICUS asked, to fund two internships rather than one. The Trust's relatively healthy financial situation permitted this. Making the case to do this to the trustee board, Max and Abigail wrote '*We encountered (not for the first time we appreciate) a real difficulty in deciding between the top two candidates both of whom had a great deal to recommend them and both of whom seem intent on the Criminal Bar.*' **Tayyaba Rafiq** and **William Lewis** were delighted to start their internships in the U.S.

Educational Outreach

- **19th March 2024** The Lady Chief Justice, The Right Honourable Baroness Carr of Walton-on-the-Hill DBE, gave the annual Kalisher Lecture at the Central Criminal Court. The title of the lecture was: "To Know The Law And Observe It Well – Magna Carta And Criminal Justice". This was a well selected tribute to our past and lamented President, Igor Judge, whose family were in attendance to hear a resolute defence of the justice system. Ann-Marie Pinkney a stalwart member of the Early Career Group gave a composed vote of thanks.

- **27th March 2024:** A successful Mock Trial was held at **Harris Academy South Norwood**. Max Hardy led a team of Abigail Bright; James Meredith; Keren Weekes; Brittany Buckell; Elspeth Windsor; and Nifemi Makinwa (attending and taking part during a week of work experience with Max Hardy). Over a hundred Year 10 students (age 14-15) attended from several Harris Academies. After the event, Dill Anstey, Vice-Principal, Harris Federation Sixth Forms, summed up her appreciation: *I can only add my thanks. I love those Kalisher events – nothing better to remind us all of the worth of what we do with these young people. We couldn't do it without Kalisher's generosity of time and expertise. Please thank everyone involved from me.*
- **19th April 2024:** Another Mock Trial was held at **Harris Academy St John's Wood**, who have hosted us before. Five Academies attended, bringing a total of around 65 Y10 students. The team assembled by Max Hardy consisted of Anarkali Musgrave; Annie Davis; Keren Weekes; Jessica Lee; Muhammad Udin. Once again, the students clearly relished the coaching and the way in which the team members involved them all in the task while making the experience both fun and – importantly – challenging.

Sir Dan Moynihan, Chief Executive of the Harris Federation, commented after Kalisher's Mock Trial in March: *Thank you. I cannot emphasise enough what a difference these kinds of activities make to our youngsters.*

- **St Francis Xavier Sixth Form College (SFX), Clapham. 2nd July 2024.** A half day mock trial was arranged for around twenty sixth form students, led by James Gwatkin, with "barrister input" from Ibe Amogbe, Selda Krasniqi and Ann-Marie Pinkney. Afterwards we received the following note from the college: *Thank you for facilitating Tuesday's event. I can honestly say that of all the events or outside speakers that I have been part of at SFX, this was the most engaged and enthused that I have ever seen our pupils – especially so given that this class is not one that is naturally enthusiastic! Many have said that based on this they would be interested in a future career in the law.*
- **Whitefield School, London, 5th September 2024.** Through a contact of Rabah Kherbane's, we received an invitation to give a school assembly on aspects of the life of a criminal barrister. Max Hardy kindly took this on and generated much interest from the pupils.
- **Kalisher in the UK.** With the assistance of Leon Kazakos KC, Leader of the South Eastern Circuit, we approached the Circuit Leaders of the Western and Wales & Chester Circuits to see if links can be established there through members of the respective circuits who may be enthusiastic to support similar educational initiatives.

Creative Education Trust

The Creative Education Trust (CET) is a network of seventeen academies across England. Kalisher was invited once again to contribute to the Trust's Public Speaking Competition. Individual barristers and pupil barristers (provided one-to-one online coaching to Year 12 students. Feedback was universally positive, the impact of the coaching evident in the early rounds held at individual schools and in the Finals Event held in the medieval Leicester Guildhall. Marc Jordan, CEO of the Trust, John Dunston and Ann-Marie Pinkney were the judges on that occasion. Ann-Marie gave an address on her route to a career at the Criminal Bar.

Manchester. Mike Brady KC and David Temkin KC have been promoting Kalisher in the Manchester area. David Temkin KC has already been involved with local schools and was able to use the Kalisher video *Crown v Goldilocks* on a visit to Armitage C of E Primary School.

Leeds University Leon Kazakos KC attended the first Pupillage Fair North, held at Leeds University and organised by the Bar Council on behalf of Kalisher – to address prospective applicants to the Bar about the opportunities available through the Trust.

Review of Financial Activities and Affairs Henrietta Paget KC, Treasurer.

The Trust was glad to build on its long-established relationships with partner institutions by funding internships at Justice, Amicus and the CCRC and making an MA funding award in partnership with the Criminology Department and Wadham College, Oxford.

Thanks to our dedicated volunteers, even with the marked expansion of our outreach programme, associated costs were kept to a minimum.

This year, the Trust's valued income from its regular benefactors (both corporate and individual) was enhanced by two substantial memorial funds.

In the Summer of 2024, the profession suffered the loss of two well-known and much loved figures: Mat Hardyman, who practised from Chambers at 15 New Bridge Street and was known to and admired by many of us and Paul Darling KC, OBE, who – although a specialist in Construction Law – was a special friend to the Trust and staunch supporter of the Criminal Bar. The trust is especially grateful to the families of both Mat and Paul, who chose to honour their memory by inviting donations to the Kalisher Trust. The money raised through these memorial funds will make an enormous difference to the Trust's work going forward and the Trustees record their thanks to all who so generously contributed.

Conclusion

The Trust continues to drive forward a fresh educational outreach approach in tandem with the Trust's traditional activities.

The Trust is very grateful to all our many donors. We would particularly like to thank those who regularly give by standing order. Regular donations, even in modest amounts, make an enormous difference and this continuing support of the Trust's work is deeply appreciated. A great deal of gratitude is owed to our larger benefactors, whose generosity and support makes the funding of our larger projects possible.

Plans for Future Development

The Trustees remain engaged in an ongoing review of the Trust's core activities, monitoring the effectiveness of the Trust's work and ensuring that the benefit of Kalisher support and funding continues to be focused on those aspiring to practice at the criminal bar.



Due to the Trustees' desire to spread the benefit of the charity widely as possible, the Awards Committee continues its work in generating Internships and other placements and selecting the recipients for such awards.

Kalisher Theatrical Evening. Caitríona Daly's *Duck Duck Goose* (directed by Jane Moriarty) is a powerful, nuanced and insightful look at the social impact of sexual violence. The play's protagonist becomes deeply entangled in a rape allegation after his best friend is accused of the attack. This is not a typical representation of the aftermath of sexual violence. Daly deftly demonstrates the concept of social complicity throughout this production, allowing the audience to peer behind the mirror at those caught in the centre of these events. We were fortunate enough to welcome Alison Oliver (later a star of the *Saltburn* film) to the production. The play was performed on 30 June 2023, staged in Middle Temple Hall, with the kind permission of Middle Temple. As the Trust's theatrical events had been interrupted by the pandemic, this was a welcome return, serving to raise money for the Trust and further its aims and objectives.

Mock Interview Programme. A programme of virtual mock pupillage interviews was organised for the last two weeks of February and the first two weeks of March, thanks to the efforts of Joanna Doherty, Emma Fielding & James Gwatkin, and all those who volunteered to deliver the interviews. 42 people were offered mock interviews and all those who applied received a mock interview slot.

Second-hand clothing fair. This was aimed at supporting pupils and aspiring pupils in need of appropriate clothing for interviews, mini-pupillages and other work placements. The fair received numerous donations of suitable court clothing and attendees were able to choose, take home and keep pre-loved clothing, completely free of charge. The fair took place on 10 February 2023, which also featured a pop-up store from tailors Ivy & Normanton, who manufacture clothing specifically for women at the Bar. Thanks in no small part to Grays Inn and Lord Justice Peter Coulson the next fair is planned for March 2023.

The Old Bailey Apprentice scheme returned after interruption due to the pandemic. The lead trustee is HHJ Angela Rafferty KC, working with Danielle Manson & HHJ Judy Khan KC. The 2023 Apprentices were Ceithryn Hamilton & Dorian Ravenscroft, both law undergraduates from London universities.

Danielle Manson organised a joint event between Kalisher and her then set, Garden Court Chambers, on 28th February 2023 to showcase an interactive film on knife crime and is now working with Derby Council and the University of Derby on a VR project looking at consent and sexual assault.

Advocacy Training: Rabah Kherbane (assisted by Chantel Gaber and Tommy Seagull) organised and ran an advocacy training course in June and July. Admission to the course proved to be highly competitive as the course remains popular. Candidates who were unable to find a place were promised a place on the course in the future. The course ran for seven sessions, including topics such as advocacy practice, case strategy, court presence, voice projection, values and witness handling. The final session saw an 'Action Clinic' held at the Central Criminal Court.

Essay Prize 2023

The 2023 Kalisher Essay Competition, which carried a prize of £2,000, was open to all pupils undertaking a criminal pupillage. The competition was launched in January 2023 as well as in a letter to all criminal sets, inviting submissions of up to 2,000 words in answer to the following question:

“The Online Safety Act 2023 is a welcome move in the battle to regulate access to and the exploitation of harmful sexual material. However, it is a step and not a leap. What do you recognise to be gaps in the regulation of such material and identify the “leap” that further law reform might achieve.”

Entries were assessed by Peter Doyle KC and HHJ Judy Khan KC. At a time of financial pressure experienced by the youngest members of the criminal bar this Essay prize is aimed at supporting and inspiring the next generation of the profession. The prize was won by Lily Hines. The judging panel commented on the winning entry as follows:

“A really powerful argument that post Encrochat lessons have not been learned. Exposes the failure to impose duties of preserving evidence. A clear fight mounted against the use of “self-destruct” messaging. What was really good is the way the author had thought about reforms and had drafted legislative-like proposals for reform. A challenge to the emphasis on children’s rights to privacy v the need to protect them from themselves. Written with an edgy, journalistic style”.

Trust Composition

Sir Ralph Waller's decision to step down as Chairman led the Trust to invite Dame Julie Maxton DBE to Chair the Board. We thank Sir Ralph for his inspirational leadership.

Sue Freestone OBE DL stepped down from her role as the Trust's Director of Education. The Trustees record their thanks to her for the many years of support and guidance that she has given. The Trust are delighted that John Dunston accepted an invitation to continue the Trust's work in education. John has been Chair of the Quaker Heads' Conference and the Association of Educational Guardians for International Students. He has been Chair of Governors of two GSA Schools and an HMC school, having in the past also been a Governor of IAPS and Society of Heads schools. He acts as Tutor for the Farmington Institute at Harris Manchester College, Oxford. John also serves as Mentor for new Heads in independent and maintained schools.

Dr Camilla Darling stepped down as Vice Chair and accepted the Trustees' invitation to become a member of the Senior Counsel Group. Leon Kazakos KC and Clare Wardell were invited to apply for the role of Vice Chair and, having considered their applications, the Trustees were pleased to appoint both applicants as joint Vice-Chairs.

The Trust wishes to record its sincere thanks to all those who have spent many years in position either as trustees or volunteers, and the hard work that they have all done in pursuit of the Trust's stated aims.

Internships, Scholarships

We work together with our prestigious partner organisations to appoint the brightest and the best to be interns and scholars. We value - and we have kept - the Trust's enduring eligibility criteria of 'exceptional promise and modest means'.

This year's awards featured:

JUSTICE: Kareema Motala was the Gray's Inn Monique Viner Scholar 2023, and founded the Sabina Project. She began her internship on 19th October 2023 as the Kalisher Trust & JUSTICE intern.

CCRC –Callum Tyrer started his Internship at the CCRC in early October 2022. He was delighted to be make the most of having been put into contact with a mentor at the Trust. His aspiration to start as a pupil at the Bar surely was enhanced by the Trust interns at the CCRC who had immediately preceded him. The CCRC let the Trust know, in May 2023, that the then current Kalisher intern, Megan, had accepted an offer of a pupillage in chambers at 1 High Pavement. The previous Kalisher intern, Jordan Warren (who finished his internship in December 2022), accepted an offer of a pupillage at St Ives.

AMICUS: Two of our trustees, Max Hardy and Abigail Bright, spent two evenings, together with the Director of AMICUS, interviewing the three most promising candidates. Meg Stevenson was chosen for this internship. The panel considered that Meg distinguished herself by giving the most thoughtful answers to the questions about the role and value of sending a UK-based lawyer to work with prisoners on death row in America. Meg had taken practical steps to prepare for her interview and to explain to the panel the skills she had acquired and the skills she recognised that she had yet to develop. The panel thought she was highly motivated whilst realistic.

UNIVERSITY OF BIRMINGHAM: Of the three top candidates, Lauren Thomas scored the highest against the four assessment criteria set by the Trust: intellectual ability, motivation to succeed at the criminal Bar, potential as an advocate, and financial need. The interviewing panel considered that Lauren's application best expressed motivation to succeed at the criminal bar, indicating excellent skills as an advocate. She clearly has strong intellectual ability and had taken many proactive steps in pursuit of a career at the Criminal Bar.

SENTENCING ACADEMY: Lewis Hazeldine was offered, and accepted, a pupillage last spring, meaning that all three of Kalisher interns in the previous immediate years have received offers of pupillage at the conclusion of their internship. Lewis worked as an intern for one working day (7.5 hours) a week for 30 weeks. The Deputy Director of the Sentencing Academy supervised this internship. Lewis successfully produced an original piece of research that the Sentencing Academy published before the year's pupillage interview season commenced.

Educational Outreach

- (i) **Sixth Form Public Speaking Competition.** Initial rounds were held in Creative Educational Trust ('CET') schools, after which, from 8 to 17 November, barristers recruited by Max Hardy spent time coaching the finalists in preparing their speeches. Each sixth former was able to spend twenty minutes remotely 1:1 with one of the barristers, working on both content and presentation. The Final took place in the Great Hall of St Mary's Guildhall in Coventry on 7 December, at which great appreciation was expressed by both students and organisers to the Kalisher barristers involved in the training. Kate Ward, Head of Programmes at CET, provided important data regarding the backgrounds of the students who took part, including the encouraging fact that no less than thirteen of the twenty-two who took part in the competition and benefited from the coaching had special educational needs or disabilities. In the future the Trust hopes again to partner with CET who are keen to explore the possibility of an event for Year 9 pupils (age 13-14); run the Sixth Form Debating Prize again in summer 2024; and to have a session with a barrister for those thinking of a career in the law.
- (ii) Mike Brady KC has independently and some time ago introduced a number of initiatives in the Manchester area which reflect strongly the sort of work in which Kalisher is engaged mostly in London and the south-east. Kalisher intends to form "hubs", starting with the north-west, extending the Trust's reach, and overcoming the natural geographical limitations (at least for in-person events) of the predominantly London base of our current Trustees. Mike Brady KC has been involved with a number of schools in the Manchester area such as Abraham Moss Community School in Crumpsall, John Henry Newman Catholic College and the Blue Coat Sixth Form in Oldham. Activities have included general chats about the law and courts, more specific discussions about careers in the law for those students who have an interest in becoming a lawyer and arranging mock trials.
- (iii) John Dunston and Leon Kazakos KC (as South East Circuit Leader) made contact with the other Circuit Leaders to begin the process of setting up Kalisher hubs outside of London and the South East.
- (iv) Three barristers represented the Kalisher Trust at the University of Westminster's first Social Justice Law Fair on 29 November 2023. It was attended by over a hundred students from around the country. William England and James Meredith (pupil barrister) clearly made a great impression on the young aspiring lawyers, many from disadvantaged backgrounds, encouraging them to consider a career at the Bar.
- (v) The Lady Chief Justice, The Right Honourable Baroness Carr of Walton-on-the-Hill DBE, will give the annual Kalisher Lecture on 19 March 2024.

Review of Financial Activities and Affairs **Henrietta Paget KC, Treasurer.**

The Trust has been successful in raising funds from a wide variety of sources including annual fundraising events, donations by individuals, sets of Barristers' Chambers, firms of Solicitors, and, often, joint funding of Kalisher Internships with partnership organisations in respect of particular awards.

The Trust achieved considerable success during the financial year to April 2024, raising funds from a number of private donors, both corporate and individual, through our theatrical event and our ongoing fundraising initiatives.

Income

The Trust's income for the financial year April 2022-2023 was £47,000 and can broadly be broken down as follows: -

• Donation from the Farmington Trust	£10,000

Expenditure

Spending was c.£41,000 and can broadly be broken down as follows: -

Conclusion

The Trust secured full recovery following the pandemic and, with new appointees, sought to drive forward a fresh educational outreach approach in tandem with the Trust's traditional activities.

The Trust is very grateful to all our many donors. We would particularly like to thank those who regularly give by standing order. Regular donations, even in modest amounts, make an enormous difference and this continuing support of the Trust's work is deeply appreciated. A great deal of gratitude is owed to our larger benefactors, whose generosity and support makes the funding of our larger projects possible.

Plans for Future Development

The Trustees remain engaged in an ongoing review of the Trust's core activities, monitoring the effectiveness of the Trust's work and ensuring that the benefit of Kalisher support and funding continues to be focused on those aspiring to practice at the criminal bar.





Vice Chairs' Report

Aims and Organisation

The Kalisher Trust is principally designed to offer aspiring barristers funding and other support and guidance as they seek and/or embark on pupillage; and, secondarily, for practitioners during the early stages of tenancy. This is an intensely demanding period - both financially and practically - for those seeking to establish practice at the Bar. The Trust aims to make awards and provide support and guidance to those graduates of exceptional promise but modest social and economic background, who might not otherwise be able to pursue a career path to the Bar.

The Trust is primarily organised and run by practising members of the Judiciary and Bar on a voluntary basis, as well as members of the higher education sector and performing arts professions, together with the assistance of its volunteers. The Trust expresses its thanks for the services and time donated by these individuals. There are no employees but, since February 2016, the Trust has from time to time used part-time administrative support when necessary.

Overview of Effectiveness and Achievements

The Trust provides training and other guidance opportunities for aspiring barristers and funds placements with partner organisations in the legal sphere. In addition, the Trust takes on educational and outreach activities – usually in secondary schools – which provide young people with an insight into the Law and its applicability to society and gives them training in advocacy skills useful in many walks of life.

Events & Activities

The 2022 Kalisher Theatrical Evening, held on Sunday 27 March 2022 was a production of Bill Kenwright's 'Love Letters' (a West End hit) which we were pleased to stage with the kind permission of Middle Temple. It starred Jenny Seagrove and Martin Shaw as they explored the nature of love despite physical separation. It was very well attended and raised over £24,000 for the Charity's wider purposes.

James Gwatkin led two virtual guidance sessions aimed at pupillage applicants: one for pupillage applications, on the 8 December 2022 which featured himself, Emma Fielding and Holly Thompson; and one for pupillage interviews on the 19 January 2023 which featured James Gwatkin, Ed Gross, Katrina Walcott and Sapna Devi. The numbers of attendees were 40 and 25 respectively.

On the 4 November 2022, the Trust launched its first ever second-hand clothing fair, with the kind permission of Middle Temple. This was aimed at supporting pupils and aspiring pupils with suitable clothing for interviews, mini-pupilages and other work placements. The Trust

received numerous donations of suitable court clothing and attendees were able to choose, take home and keep pre-loved clothing, completely free of charge. This was such a success that we held another on the 10 February 2023, which also featured a pop-up store from tailors Ivy & Normanton, who manufacture clothing specifically for women at the Bar.

Kalisher drove the production of a film to highlight the tragedies and difficulties associated with knife crime, produced by Colin Stone whose costs were sponsored by sets of chambers and The Farmington Trust. Contributors included: Andy Hall KC; Judy Khan KC; Danielle Manson; the Ben Kinsella Trust; Bruce Houlder KC; Martin Griffiths; Tom Cave; Kelly Brown; Farrhat Arshad; Kerim Fuad KC.

We have, under the leadership of Mike Brady KC (18 St John's Square), established links with four schools in Greater Manchester, in some of its most deprived areas. We are grateful to Ben Yallop and to Lorraine Worsley-Carter, the High Sherriff of Manchester, for their assistance with this project.

Kalisher assisted a fairly new organization – “Bridging The Bar” whose aims fall within Kalisher's general remit by

- Putting on a jointly funded advocacy training session and
- Helping BTB place twelve mini-pupils in criminal sets across England and Wales.

Essay Prize 2022

The 2022 Kalisher Essay Competition, which carried a prize of £2,000, was open to all pupils undertaking a criminal pupillage. The competition was launched via Twitter in January 2022 as well as in a letter to all criminal sets, inviting submissions of up to 2,000 words in answer to the following question:

“Penn and Mead, Ponting, Randle and Pottle and now the ‘Colston Four’.

Are such verdicts, as Lord Devlin praised, the right of a jury to act as a long-stop against oppression by the State or was Lord Auld correct in 2001 to describe the perverse verdict as “a blatant affront to the legal process” such as to call for the law to declare, by statute if necessary, that juries have no right to acquit in defiance of the law or in disregard of the evidence?”

Entries were assessed by Peter Doyle KC as a member of the Kalisher Senior Counsel Group. At a time of financial pressure experienced by the youngest members of the criminal bar this Essay prize is aimed at supporting and inspiring the next generation of the profession.

Trust Composition

Igor Judge's decision to step down as President after many years of support and dedicated service to the work of the trust led the Trust to invite its longest serving trustee Dame Anne Rafferty DBE PC to become President.

Dr Camilla Darling indicated her intention to step down as Vice Chair in the following year and the Trustees invited her then to become a member of the Senior Counsel Group.

Ed Gross indicated his intention to step down as a trustee.

Andrew Hall KC indicated that he wished to step down as a trustee, he handed over his role in the management of awards to Abigail Bright.

The Trust wishes to record its sincere thanks to all those who have spent many years in position either as trustees or volunteers, and the hard work that they have all done in pursuit of the Trust's stated aims.

Internships, Scholarships

We are proud of our continuing support and commitments with our partner associations, with whom we implement and fund a rolling programme of awards. Successful candidates are chosen in accordance with Kalisher's enduring eligibility criteria of 'exceptional promise and modest means'.

This year's awards included:

Justice - £5000

CCRC - £6000

Amicus - £6000

Wadham College - £6000

Birmingham University £6000

In addition, the Trust developed its partnership with the Sentencing Academy.

There was enthusiastic support for a continuance of this programme. The preference was to focus on an extension to the longer placement, which was implemented. Funding was provided by the Sentencing Association for a placement at the London Living Wage for 30 weeks. This was a great success for the successful candidate and also the Academy. The Trust is proud to know that the successful applicant secured pupillage and thereafter, tenancy at a criminal set of chambers.

Educational Outreach

In Autumn 2022 a pilot mentoring scheme, in partnership with the Young Barristers' Committee, was undertaken by Harris Federation students (year 12). They were offered six sessions, some including trips to court centres such as the Old Bailey & the Supreme Court.

Kalisher supported the Creative Education Trust's second advocacy challenge from Spring 22 through to a final in July 22, including our Early Career Group member Andre Nwadike-Jonathan who recorded a short introductory film for the students, eight Kalisher coaches to help the student teams; and booking Sir Robert Buckland, the former Lord Chancellor, to open the grand final. We expect to continue our support for the 2023 challenge. The CET has passed us this comment on the 2022 challenge:

"Debate coaching with the Kalisher Trust was incredibly valuable for our schools and one of the highlights of our debate competition. As well as getting the chance to have a unique professional encounter, the sessions really supported students to strengthen their arguments, consider possible counter-arguments, and improve their public speaking style. The coaching made a noticeable difference to the quality of the debates. Our schools shared how there was a real buzz from teams following the coaching, making the students really excited for their first debate. We can't imagine better role models to support the students".

The Old Bailey Apprentice resumed after a hiatus due to the pandemic. The lead trustee was HHJ Angela Rafferty KC, working with Danielle Manson & Judy Khan KC. Kalisher offered this to Law UG students across Greater London, which prompted far greater engagement with the scheme; 18 applicants were sifted to a shortlist of 6 who came to the Old Bailey on the 10th January; we are grateful to those named above and to Carr LJ, Tommy Seagull and Richard Osman, all of whom gave up their time to be panelists. 7 finalists spent a half day at the Old Bailey on the 11th January 2023; the 2023 Apprentices were Ceithryn Hamilton & Dorian Ravenscroft. All the finalists were invited to a judges' lunch at the Old Bailey, and to a private zoom with some tips for success.

Summary

During the financial year to April 2023, the Trust enjoyed its most successful year to date both in terms of fundraising and funding of its core and associated activities. It had the benefit of a further very substantial private donation. Total income received within the financial year to April 2023 was c.£165,500. Total expenditure was c.£82,000. The Trust continues to find and build on opportunities for expansion in terms of activities, projects and awards as well as developing its highly successful schools outreach programme, with a focus on fostering partnerships with schools across a wider geographical area.

As to particular elements of that funding:

- Funding of £10,500 was secured for the Knife Crime film project;
- Donations of £11,000 were made by Doughty Street Chambers, for particular elements of our internships and awards scheme;
- Funding of £2,781 was secured from "Bridging the Bar" for our joint advocacy session;
- Payments of £1,200 were made by Chambers to sponsor the entries of pupils entering the Kalisher Prize Essay Competition.

Expenditure

Conclusion

Thanks to the work done by the Trustees over the last two years, the Trust has secured a full recovery after the turmoil COVID-19 era. Since the end of the financial year to April 2022, the Trust's core activities have been fully re-established, and we now embark on a period of new growth and innovation across the whole range of Kalisher activities and extending in particular to the Trust's Education and Outreach Programme.

The Trust is very grateful to all our many donors. We would particularly like to thank those who regularly give by standing order. Regular donations, even in modest amounts, make an enormous difference and this continuing support of the Trust's work is deeply appreciated. A great deal of gratitude is owed to our larger benefactors, whose generosity and support makes the funding of our larger projects possible.

Plans for Future Development

The Trustees remain engaged in an ongoing review of the Trust's core activities, monitoring the effectiveness of the Trust's work and ensuring that the benefit of Kalisher support and funding continues to be focused on those aspiring to practice at the criminal bar.



Vice Chair's Report

Covid-19

The impact of Covid-19 continued to impact Trust activities for most of 2021. However, there was some evidence of a return to 'normality' as advocacy training was completed in person during September and October 21. The Trust worked on a hybrid offer during late 2021.

Aims and Organisation

The Kalisher Trust is principally designed to offer aspiring barristers funding and other support and guidance as they seek and/or embark on pupillage; and, secondarily, for practitioners during the early stages of tenancy. This is very often an extremely financially and practically demanding period for those seeking to establish practice at the Bar. The Trust aims to make awards and provide guidance to those graduates of exceptional promise but modest social and economic background, who might not otherwise be able to pursue a career path to the Bar.

The Trust is primarily organised and run by practising members of the Judiciary and Bar on a voluntary basis, as well as members of the higher education sector and performing arts professions, together with the assistance of its volunteers. The Trust expresses its thanks for the services and time donated by these individuals. There are no employees but, since February 2016, the Trust has from time to time used part-time administrative support when necessary.

Review of Effectiveness and Achievements

A review of effectiveness conducted over the last few years has seen a change in the channeling of the Trust's funding from the original major Scholarship model to the award of several funded placements with partner organisations in the legal sphere, and the provision of training and other guidance opportunities for aspiring barristers. The object of this change was to spread the charity's benefit more widely each year. In addition, the Trust now takes on educational activities – usually in secondary schools – which educates young people in a life in the Law, and gives them training in advocacy skills useful in any walk of life.

Events & Activities

At the beginning of 2021, it was not possible to do any in person events, however we hosted many successful virtual events during 2021, including:

- A virtual training session on pupillage applications on 28th January 2021 (chaired by Rabah Kherbane with Max Hardy, Danielle Manson, and Joanna Hardy) which had 126 attendees.
- A virtual training session on pupillage interviews on 23rd February (led by Garry Green, with Rhiannon Crimmins and Katrina Walcott).

- A virtual debating competition with Queen Mary, University of London Law Society on 6th February 2021 (led by Max Hardy, with Garry Green, Margaret Obi, and Nutan Fatania)
- A virtual training session on pupillage interviews on 23rd February (led by Garry Green, with Rhiannon Crimmins and Katrina Walcott).
- A virtual Life in the Law session with the Milton Keynes Academy (part of the Creative Education Trust), on the 2nd March, for Year 12 and 13 students, attended by Sue Freestone, Camilla Darling, Michael Polak, and Martin McCarthy.
- A virtual 'Conversation With' to mark International Women's Day on the 8th March (chaired by Danielle Manson, featuring Anne Rafferty, Alison Levitt KC and Judy Khan KC)
- Three sessions on trial preparation; exam in chief; and cross examination (led by Andy Hall KC) on the 8th, 15th, and 22nd March.
- A virtual welcome to the Senior Counsel group on the 16th March 2021.
- A virtual 'Life in the Law' session with Harris Federation on the 26th March attended by Mark Fenhalls, Sue Freestone and Merry Van Woodenberg.
- A two-hour session for the University of Sheffield's Discovery Programme for year 12 students, on the 6th April, attended by Camilla Darling, HHJ Rachael Harrison, Richard Thyne, Joe O'Brien, Sara Robinson, and Richard Keenan.
- A virtual celebration of our 2021 Essay Prize winner, Andrew Pickin, KBW Chambers, Leeds. He was awarded his prize by Rob Rinder (formerly of 2 Hare Court), on the 27th April.
- A virtual Life in the Law session with Lynn Grove Academy (part of the Creative Education Trust), for Year 10 students, on the 17th May, attended by Sue Freestone, Camilla Darling, Nate Toms and Ailsa McKeon.

In the latter half of 2021 and in early 2022, we held the following events in person:

- Advocacy training for 10 students held in the Royal Courts of Justice, Doughty Street Chambers and the Central Criminal Court. We are very grateful to trainers Richard Quine, Karen McLachlan, Rabah Kherbane, Abi Bright, Sapna Devi and Mark Fenhalls KC.
- A session for Year 13 students participating in the University of Sheffield's Discover Law programme, on the 7th October, with Dan Taylor and Nate Toms talking about their journey to the criminal Bar.
- The Kalisher Lecture, was held on the 17th January 2022 at the Old Bailey in partnership with the Criminal Bar Association. Sir Stephen Silber delivered the Lecture, on Judge Jeffreys.

NB: All online sessions were recorded; recordings are added to our growing cache of sessions on our site; and all were publicised on twitter.

Essay Prize 2021

The 2021 Kalisher Essay Competition, which carried a prize of £2,000, was open to all pupils undertaking a criminal pupillage. The competition was launched via Twitter in January 2021 as well as in a letter to all criminal sets, inviting submissions of up to 2,000 words in answer to the following question:

“Covid19 lockdown rules have been described by some as among the most onerous restrictions to personal liberty since Oliver Cromwell’s time. As a “government lawyer” advise your Minister as to the pros and cons of any submission that recent public health legislation is a disproportionate breach of human rights law.”

Entries were judged by Judy Khan KC and Peter Doyle KC with the assistance of James Gwatkin. One winner was selected at the end of March 2021, Andrew Pickin of KBW Chambers in Leeds.

Trust Composition

Garry Green, Danielle Manson and Rabah Kherbane were welcomed as new trustees in January 2021.

In line with the agreement that we gradually reduce the numbers of Trustees, we established the Senior Counsel group, enabling us to retain the expertise and networks of some trustees who will move to this group. Peter Doyle KC and Sir Brian Leveson resigned as Trustees, and as of January 2021, and moved to this group.

The Early Career Group (which will include those who are more than occasional volunteers but cannot take on trustee status) will be launched in early February 2021.

Other key goals for 2021-22 were to establish ‘lead’ trustees who can work on areas such as education, advocacy training, virtual events, and fundraising.

Ben Yallop (the Lord Chief Justice’s Private Secretary) agreed to act as a critical friend to the Trust. He provides connection and insight, ensuring that our close and constructive relationship with the Lord Chief Justice’s office continues.

Mark Fenhalls KC moves from Co-Vice Chair to trustee status from January 2022, coinciding with the start of his term as Chair of the Bar Council.

Ryan Evans stepped down as Secretary at the end of 2021 as he moved overseas and will commence a pupillage at 5 Paper Buildings in October 2022.

Internships, Scholarships

Andy Hall KC leads these two related programmes. We are maintaining existing commitments, as follows:

- £5000 QMUL scholarship (LLM) * on hold for 2020/2021 academic year.
- £6000 Wadham/Oxford scholarship (LLM)
- £4000 CCRC internship
- £5000 Justice internship
- £6000 Birmingham University scholarship (LLM) *on hold for 2020/21 year as no suitable candidates*

- £5000 Amicus internship
- £6000 Death Penalty Project (funded by Doughty Street Chambers)

Our partnership with the University of Birmingham has recently been renewed for 2021 onwards, thanks to the intervention of Andrew Fisher KC.

University Outreach

Our second event with the Access Project was held on 15th July 2021. This was a virtual debating workshop with the following topics:

(1) Once the vaccine has been rolled out in the UK, Coronavirus vaccine IDs should be required to access public transport, restaurants and certain workplaces.

(2) High profile criminal trials in England and Wales should be televised.

On the 23rd July 2021 we ran a virtual advocacy session as part of a two day event that Balliol College Oxford and the Sentencing Academy were running as part of their own outreach work. A big thank you to Elspeth Windsor who brought everyone together and continues to contribute greatly to Kalisher events.

Schools Outreach

We have revitalised our former partnership with Sheffield University which allowed us to host an event on 6th April 2021 on 'Life in the Law'. This was aimed at Year 12 and 13 students who are considering studying Law at university and was open to students nationally.

Our East Anglia outreach work with the Creative Education Trust culminated in our virtual contribution to a pilot advocacy challenge during the spring and summer of 2021. While the schools' participation in this was affected by Covid, overall, it was a success and was very well received by the CET itself.

CET are now planning a fuller, more in-person second advocacy challenge. The pilot challenge included a Kalisher representative at each of the three introductory sessions; Kalisher representatives giving virtual coaching to the small teams of students; and Kalisher representatives at the finals. The winning team was welcomed by local MP Peter Bone at the Houses of Commons recently.

We contributed to three sessions with the Harris Federation in the academic year 2020-21, and have further sessions planned for the year 2021-22.

Fundraising

In early 2021, Sir Ralph Waller (our Chair) kindly donated £5000 to the Trust, which contributed to our fund for our existing set of internships and scholarships. He donated

another £5000 in August 2021. 23 ES (a set of chambers) which sponsored the Autumn 2021 advocacy training, donated £5000; 2 Hare Court (a set of chambers) also donated £5000.

In September 2021, Sir Ralph confirmed a significant donation to the Trust from Mrs Mae Zhu, who wishes to support educational charitable endeavours, and has done so via the University of Oxford. The Development team at Oxford have carried out due diligence which is recorded via email. We are incredibly grateful to Sir Ralph and to Mrs Zhu. This donation of £100,000 means that we can have confidence in our internship programme for the next two years.

Review of Financial Activities and Affairs – Henrietta Paget, Treasurer

As has been the position since our inception, funds have been raised from a wide variety of sources including annual fundraising events, donations by individuals, sets of Barristers' Chambers, firms of Solicitors, and, often, joint funding of Kalisher Internships with the providers concerned.

Summary

1. During the financial year to April 2022, the Trust made good progress in re-establishing its work both in terms of fundraising and resumption of both core and associated activities. It also had the benefit of a very substantial private donation. Total income received within the financial year to April 2022 was c.£138,000. Total expenditure was c.£51,309. So with the final lifting of COVID-19 restrictions, the Trust was well placed quickly to resume its work and is in a position to continue to build on opportunities for significant expansion in terms of activities and awards.

Income

Thanks to the work done by the Trustees over the last two years to review and consolidate the Trust's organization, core activities and goals, the Trust was well placed to weather the turmoil of the COVID-19 era. Since the end of the financial year to April 2021, the Trust has been able to rebuild its core activities and embark on a period of new growth, including the re-establishment of several of our former initiatives and, crucially, beginning the reworking of the Trust's Education and Outreach Programme.

The Trustees remain engaged in an ongoing review of the Trust's core activities, monitoring the effectiveness of the Trust's work and ensuring that the benefit of Kalisher support and funding continues to be focused on those aspiring to practice at the criminal bar.

Due to the Trustees' desire to spread the benefit of the charity as widely as possible, an Awards Committee continues its work in generating Internships and other placements and selecting the recipients for such awards.
