Structure, Governance and Management

Missionary Ventures Europe Trust (sometimes known as Missionary Ventures, Missionary Ventures Great Britain, or by the acronyms MVE, MV or MVGB) is governed by a Declaration of Trust dated 7 November 1997.

The charity is part of Missionary Ventures International (MVI), an inter-denominational missionary organisation founded in 1983 in Florida, USA. MVI now has offices in Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Great Britain, and works with staff and indigenous partners in more than 50 countries.

The charity is managed by a board of trustees, which aims to meet quarterly. All board members are themselves actively involved in missionary activities and provide a wealth of experience and wisdom. The board is empowered to appoint new trustees and to recruit or dismiss the Director. At each meeting, the Director presents reports on activities, finances, risks, and future plans and actions.

During 2024, the charity was led by its part time Director, assisted by volunteers. At the end of the year, Darren Mitzi resigned as trustee but continues to serve as Director of Operations.

Objectives and Activities

- The charitable objects, as set out in the governing document, are:
- To advance the Christian faith throughout the world.
- To provide relief to persons in need, by reason of poverty, age, or sickness.
- To advance education, including through establishing or supporting educational institutions.
- To pursue any other charitable purpose at the discretion of the trustees.

In practice, the charity's primary role is to encourage personal involvement in overseas mission. This is achieved by promoting mission opportunities to UK churches, organisations, and individuals, and organising team trips, projects and programmes abroad. Each year dozens of volunteers give their time, fund their own participation, and contribute financially to support missionary work.

The trustees confirm that these objects are consistent with the Charity Commission's guidance on Public Benefit.

Achievements and Performance in 2024

Advancing the Christian Faith

- Facilitated short-term missions' teams (7-12 days, 2-15 volunteers) assisting indigenous churches in evangelism, church planting, prayer, and youth/children's ministry. Teams served in Greece, Spain, Latvia, Moldova, the USA, and Kenya.
- Recruited, prepared, and supported long-term missionaries in Germany, Sweden, India, Uganda, Spain, Latvia, Zambia, Kenya, and South Africa. These workers build relationships, mentor leaders, host teams, pioneer projects, and manage resources safely.
- Encouraged micro-business initiatives, enabling local families and churches to develop sustainable income alongside their ministry.
- Distributed children's Bibles to more than 500 children in over 30 schools in Moldova, equipping local churches and schools to share the Christian faith with the next generation.

Relief of Poverty and Need

- By attracting donors for child support programmes – sponsorship and feeding programmes - we have supported over 200 children in India, South Africa, Zambia, and Uganda.

Advancement of Education

- Assisted with school fees and uniforms for around 80 children in India, Zambia, and Uganda.
- Supported pre-schools in Uganda, South Africa, and Zambia.
- Equipped indigenous Christian leaders in India and Latvia.

Financial Review

- Income: **£70,296** (2023: £65,810)
- Expenditures: **£89,512** (2023: £90,142)
- Reserves on 31 December 2024: **£70,695** (2023: £89,911), including restricted funds of **£41,426** (2023: £57,626)

The trustees have reviewed the reserves policy in line with Charity Commission guidance. Unrestricted funds of **£29,269** (2023: £32,285) are considered sufficient to cover planned expenditure and contingencies.

Income sources

Most income was generated from voluntary donations from individuals, churches, and Christian organisations. Where possible, individual tax-paying donors were encouraged to use the UK 'Gift Aid' scheme. A high proportion of funds received were restricted for specific projects and the charity's accounting system kept such funds separate. These funds were not used for other purposes without the express permission of the donor.

Expenditure and administration

Core administrative costs were covered through a small percentage of project donations:

- Up to 10% from donations for general projects and programmes.
- Up to 5% from donations for personal support to Missionary Ventures staff abroad or in the UK.

The charity has no long-term loans. The office space currently occupied has been provided free of charge by New Life Community Church, Milnrow. Office furniture and equipment are either donated or purchased from administration funds.

Related party transactions

During the year, the charity made the following transactions with related parties:

- £7,059 was paid to S Mitzi, wife of director D Mitzi, as support for administration and financial support services for the charity.
- £3,741 was reimbursement to D Mitzi and S Mitzi for expenses incurred on behalf of the charity.

Trustees reviewed and approved this arrangement as being in the best interests of the charity.

Risk and commitments

The charity does not commit to long-term project funding, as support is dependent on donations. Funds awaiting transfer are held securely in a deposit account with Barclays PLC.

Reserves Policy

The trustee's policy is not to hold significant long-term reserves for overseas projects, as support is only guaranteed to the extent of incoming donations. Unrestricted reserves are maintained at a prudent level to cover core operational costs and to safeguard against unforeseen shortfalls in income.

Plans for the Future

In 2024 the Director moved into full-time service, opening opportunities to expand ministry impact. Looking ahead, the director and trustees plan to:

- Increase the number of mission teams.
- Train and equip disciple-making leaders.
- Expand education support programmes.
- Broaden the charity's donor base to ensure long-term sustainability.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations. Charity law requires trustees to prepare accounts that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity, and to ensure that funds are applied in line with its charitable purposes.

Conclusion

The trustees are satisfied that Missionary Ventures Europe Trust continues to meet its charitable objects, deliver tangible public benefit, and maintain financial integrity.

Missionary Ventures Europe Trust is a UK-registered charity (number 1067612) located at 3 Edmund Street, Milnrow, Rochdale, Lancashire, OL16 4HR.

The Charity is part of an international and inter-denominational missionary organisation called Missionary Ventures International (MVI) – see www.mvi.org. Founded in 1983 in Florida, USA, it now also has offices in Nicaragua, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Great Britain. MVI works through its staff and indigenous partners in over fifty countries.

The charity is sometimes known by the names Missionary Ventures or Missionary Ventures Great Britain and often by the acronyms MVE, MV or MVGB.

Governance is through a board of trustees which aims to meet quarterly. All board members are themselves actively involved in missionary activities and provide a wealth of experience and wisdom. Trustees acting for the whole of 2023 were Alan Bolton (chairman), Luther Meier (Vice President of MVI), Darren Mitzi (MVGB Director), John Orange, and MVI board member, Gary Hall. During the year Mike Philipson resigned from the board after many years of faithful service, support and encouragement.

The board of trustees are empowered to select and appoint new trustees and to recruit and dismiss the director of the charity. At each meeting the director presents a report of activities and strategic future plans together with the current financial status. Potential risks and problems are discussed and action plans agreed.

Missionary Ventures in Britain is overseen by a part-time unpaid director who manages a small but effective team of volunteers. The primary role of the charity is to facilitate personal involvement in team trips, projects and programmes in foreign countries by promoting overseas mission to UK churches, organisations and individuals. Each year dozens of volunteers are encouraged to give their time, pay for their own trips and donate money to support missionary endeavours.

The Objects of the charity are included in the 'Declaration of Trust 7 Nov 1997' and are listed below in an abbreviated form :-

- To advance the Christian faith throughout the world
- To provide relief to persons in need, aged or sick
- To advance education including by means of establishing or operating educational establishments
- Any other charitable purpose at the discretion of the trustees

The Trustees are satisfied that these objects are consistent with the Charity Commission's general guidance on 'Public Benefit'. The following summary of **the main activities** undertaken by the charity in 2023 demonstrates how each activity provides public benefit :-

- We advance the Christian faith by **Facilitating Short-Term Mission Teams** in assisting the indigenous Christian churches, where teams focus on one or more of the following activities – Evangelism and Church Planting, Construction, Medical Care, Prayer or ministry to Youth and Children. Typically, short-term team trips are between 7-12 days duration and teams would constitute from 2-15 volunteers depending on the purpose of the mission. During 2023 more than 6 teams ministered in Greece, Spain, the USA & Kenya.
- We have advanced the Christian faith by **Recruiting, Preparing and Supporting Long-Term Missionaries** called field coordinators for service in various countries. They form long-term relationships and mentor indigenous leaders, pioneer projects, host teams and strategically and safely channel resources from the UK. In the year field workers were resident in Germany, Sweden, India, Uganda, Spain, Latvia, Zambia, Kenya, and South Africa.
- We have provided relief to persons in need by **Attracting Donors for Children Support Programmes** in several countries. Throughout 2023, we have continued to help feed and care for over 200 children in India, South Africa, Zambia and Uganda.
- We have advanced education by **Assisting with School Fees and Uniforms** for approx. 80 children in India, Zambia and Uganda.
- In 2023 we have also advanced education through our **Support of Pre-Schools** in Uganda, South Africa and a **Christian School** in Lusaka, Zambia.
- In addition, we have advanced education by **Equipping Indigenous Christian Leaders** through ad-hoc online conferences in Andhra Pradesh, India and Kingston, Jamaica.

Finances

In 2023 total income was £65,810, a 38% decrease on the previous year, this was primarily due to the large donation received for the project in India in 2022 which is currently on with no further donations being received at the present time. At the end of the year the charity had funds of £89,911 including 'restricted' funds of £57,626. This amount remains similar to last year and relates to the aforementioned project currently on hold.

Most of the income of the charity was generated from voluntary donations from individuals, churches and other Christian organisations. Wherever possible the charity encouraged individual tax-payers to take advantage of the UK 'gift-aid' scheme. Donations were mostly restricted in nature for specific purposes and the charity's accounting system kept such funds separate and were not used for other purposes without the express permission of the donor.

Administration or 'core costs' were mainly funded by taking a percentage of donations for projects and children support programmes. Currently this is set at up to 15%, however

no deduction is currently taken from donations given to support Missionary Ventures staff abroad or in the UK.

Currently the charity has no long-term loans. The office space currently occupied has again this year been offered without charge by New Life Community Church Milnrow. Office furniture and equipment are either donated or purchased from administration funds.


No long-term guarantees of financing for projects or programmes in the mission field have been given. Help has been offered on the basis that it will continue only to the extent that we receive donations for it. For this reason, no specific reserves are held. However, if significant donations are received and there is a delay for whatever reason in channelling the money to the project, then it is held in a deposit account held with the charity's banker, Barclays PLC.

Summary

2023 continued to be a year of positive change for the trust. The board are satisfied that the charity continues to meet its charitable objectives and has maintained its reputation for financial integrity. We thank the LORD and give him all the glory for every life that has been changed through the work of Missionary Ventures throughout the world.

The primary role of the charity is to facilitate personal involvement in team trips, projects and programmes in foreign countries by promoting overseas mission to UK churches, organisations and individuals. Each year dozens of volunteers are encouraged to give their time, pay for their own trips and donate money to support missionary endeavours.

The Objects of the charity are included in the 'Declaration of Trust 7 Nov 1997' and are listed below in an abbreviated form :-

- To advance the Christian faith throughout the world
- To provide relief to persons in need, aged or sick
- To advance education including by means of establishing or operating educational establishments
- Any other charitable purpose at the discretion of the trustees

The Trustees are satisfied that these objects are consistent with the Charity Commission's general guidance on 'Public Benefit'. The following summary of **the main activities** undertaken by the charity in 2022 demonstrates how each activity provides public benefit :-

- We advance the Christian faith by **Facilitating Short-Term Mission Teams** in assisting the indigenous Christian churches, where teams focus on one or more of the

following activities – Evangelism and Church Planting, Construction, Medical Care, Prayer or ministry to Youth and Children. Typically, short-term team trips are between 7-12 days duration and teams would constitute from 2-15 volunteers depending on the purpose of the mission. After 2 years of restricted travel due to the COVID-19 pandemic, many of the travel restrictions throughout 2022 were lifted and small teams were able to facilitate ministry once again. Many of our volunteers and supporters continued connecting online and ministering as they did throughout the lockdown period in 2020/21, but connections in person were once again able to take place further strengthening relationships, with teams travelling to Greece, Spain, Italy, Ireland, Moldova the USA & Kenya.

- We have advanced the Christian faith by **Recruiting, Preparing and Supporting Long-Term Missionaries** called field coordinators for service in various countries. They form long-term relationships and mentor indigenous leaders, pioneer projects, host teams and strategically and safely channel resources from the UK. Many missionaries who were grounded in their home countries throughout the pandemic in 2020/21 returned to their field of ministry across Greece, India, Uganda, Spain, Latvia, Zambia, Kenya, and South Africa.
- We have provided relief to persons in need by **Attracting Donors for Children Support Programmes** in several countries. Throughout 2022, we have continued to help feed and care for over 200 children in India, South Africa, Zambia and Uganda.
- We also provided relief to persons in need by **Attracting Donors to provide relief and financial support to families, Pastors and Leaders** in India continuing to support families and leaders still struggling after the pandemic. We also raised and distributed support to families impacted by the crisis in the Ukraine in 2022, funds were distributed to people connected on the ground in neighbouring Romania, Latvia, Moldova and in partnership with other local mission organisations with connections in the area.
- We have advanced education by **Assisting with School Fees and Uniforms** for approx. 80 children in India, Zambia and Uganda.
- In 2022 we have also advanced education through our **Support of Pre-Schools** in Uganda, South Africa and a **Christian School** in Lusaka, Zambia.
- In addition, we have advanced education by **Equipping Indigenous Christian Leaders** through ad-hoc online conferences in Andhra Pradesh, India.

Finances

In 2022 total income was £106,753, a 5% increase on the previous year. At the end of the year the charity had funds of £90,142 including 'restricted' funds of £55,726. This amount has increased significantly from the previous year, as a number of large donations were received for a project in India which is currently on hold as legal advice is being sought regarding land purchase.

Most of the income of the charity was generated from voluntary donations from individuals, churches and other Christian organisations. Wherever possible the charity encouraged individual tax-payers to take advantage of the UK 'gift-aid' scheme. Donations were mostly restricted in nature for specific purposes and the charity's accounting system kept such funds separate and were not used for other purposes without the express permission of the donor.

Administration or 'core costs' were mainly funded by taking a percentage of donations for projects and children support programmes. Currently this is set at up to 15%, however no deduction is taken from donations given to support Missionary Ventures staff abroad or in the UK.

Currently the charity has no long-term loans. The office space currently occupied has again this year been offered without charge by New Life Community Church Milnrow. Office furniture and equipment are either donated or purchased from administration funds.

No long-term guarantees of financing for projects or programmes in the mission field have been given. Help has been offered on the basis that it will continue only to the extent that we receive donations for it. For this reason, no specific reserves are held. However, if significant donations are received and there is a delay for whatever reason in channelling the money to the project, then it is held in a deposit account held with the charity's banker, Barclays PLC.

Summary

2022 was a year of re-building and re-connecting following the COVID-19 pandemic. It was also a year where crisis, disaster and conflict continued to affect so many lives across the nations, significantly an escalation of the Russo-Ukrainian war in February. This directly affected some of the MVGB partners in the field, but we are thankful that all our teams and associates were, despite hardship at times, kept safe and in good health.

The board are satisfied that the charity continues to meet its charitable objectives and has maintained its reputation for financial integrity. We thank the LORD and give him all the glory for every life that has been changed through the work of Missionary Ventures throughout the world.



Donations were mostly restricted in nature for specific purposes and the charity's accounting system kept

such funds separate and were not used for other purposes without the express permission of the donor.

Administration or 'core costs' were mainly funded by taking a percentage of donations for projects and children support programmes. Currently this is set at 15% however no deduction is taken from donations given to support Missionary Ventures staff abroad or in the UK.

Currently the charity has no long-term loans. The office space currently occupied has again this year been offered without charge by New Life Community Church Milnrow. Office furniture and equipment are either donated or purchased from administration funds.

No long-term guarantees of financing for projects or programmes in the mission field have been given. Help has been offered on the basis that it will continue only to the extent that we receive donations for it. For this reason, no specific reserves are held. However, if significant donations are received and there is a delay for whatever reason in channelling the money to the project, then it is held in a deposit account held with the charity's banker, Barclays PLC.


Summary
