The trustees present their report with the Financial Statements of Harrow Central Mosque & Masood Islamic Centre ('the charity') for the year ended 5 April 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives, aims and Strategies

The objects of the charity are set out in the charity's trust deed and are summarised as follows:

The advancement of the religion of Islam according to Qur'an, Sunnah and Hadith.

Harrow Central Mosque was established to advance the spiritual and social welfare of people through the religion of Islam. Its prime objectives are to serve the Muslim Community of Harrow and surrounding areas and to make the mosque accessible and welcoming to people of all faiths and backgrounds.

Our Aim

To become the UK's leading Mosque and Educational Institute renowned as a centre of excellence offering spiritual and personal advancement.

Our Mission

To meet the needs of the community by providing excellent prayer facilities, establishing a high quality educational institute and developing services to meet the social, physical and intellectual needs of all ages and backgrounds, working in partnership with local public, private and third sector organisations.

Our Objectives

- To establish an efficient and effective governance structure with clear policies and procedures
- To improve the educational services offered by establishing a high quality centre of learning for both religious and secular teachings meeting the broad needs of the community
- To ensure women are provided with the highest standard of prayer facilities, educational services and social support
- To maintain and strengthen our partnerships with local and central government, interfaith forums, the Metropolitan Police and many other groups including local mosques
- To effectively manage the operations and expenditure of the Mosque with clarity and transparency
- To promote and encourage the participation from youth and women
- To reject and condemn extremism and terrorism in all its forms
- To make the Mosque a vibrant, welcoming and active focal point for the whole community, Muslim and non-Muslim

Our objectives are set to reflect our faith and community aims. Each year our trustees review our objectives and activities to ensure they continue to reflect our aims. In carrying out this review the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular its supplementary public guidance on the advancement of religion for the public benefit.

Strategies

- To ensure that we have a robust management structure, operational team and team of volunteers to deliver our objectives
- To engage with the community to ensure our objectives are aligned with their needs and expectations and secular teachings meeting the broad needs of the community
- To engage with the non-Muslim community, local authority and local charities to strengthen relationships with the wider community and deliver support and services for all
- To ensure that the Mosque supports those in need through the effective and robust collection and distribution of Zakat and Sadaqah payments.
- To continually review the educational needs of the community and identify how the offering can be strengthened.

Significant activities

New Building Project

Outstanding works that now remain include:

- Roofing: A new roofing system is required on top of the existing roof to eradicate water ingress problems in several locations due to poor design and workmanship dating back to work undertaken pre 2012. Patch repairs have been completed with partial success.
- External Landscaping: Planning condition required external landscaping.
- Basement works: Finishing works are outstanding and there are water ingress issues below ground level due to inadequate water proof tanking. Many areas are letting water in.
- Sliding partition to Function Hall to create division/segregation (the track built as part of original build)
- External calligraphy
- Chandelier or lighting for the dome hall

Commercial Units

The Charity originally had three commercial units:

Retail Units Both retail units are currently occupied by commercial tenants at full market rent.

Bereavement Room This area, originally earmarked for a commercial gym, has been converted into a bereavement room for our funeral services. At present, use of the room on the day of the funeral is free but use on other days will chargeable.

Old Mosque Redevelopment

This continues to be a core focus and HCM remains in close discussion with the council, having independently sought professional advice and assistance to ensure the best interests of the Mosque are achieved within the parameters of the planning conditions. The intention is to make HCM self-sufficient for the running and management cost of both buildings and not to be reliant solely on the charitable donations of the local Muslim community.

HCM had submitted the final planning application to the Harrow Council Planners for converting the existing building into 6 apartments of 3 bedrooms, 2 bedrooms and one studio. Following several meetings and consultations between HCM, its professional advisors and Harrow Council, we were quite optimistic about getting the final planning approval for this conversion. However, recently Harrow Council has refused our planning application on some minor grounds. We lost our appeal against this refusal. We are now looking into submitting a revised planning application.

Education

The foundation of the religion of Islam is knowledge. Allah Almighty said to the Messenger (Peace Be Upon Him) when he supplicates to say 'oh Allah increase me in Knowledge', and the prophet (Peace Be Upon Him) said that 'seeking knowledge is compulsory for every Muslim', man and woman.

1. Our Vision

The Prophet (Peace Be Upon Him) transformed the Companions (May Allah Be Pleased With Them) to be a different people. Our main objective at the Education department is to transform knowledge of information to characteristics and actions. To achieve this we offer a wide variety of courses designed to meet the range (all levels and all ages) of needs of the community which will facilitate classical Islamic sciences taught by qualified teachers.

2. Head of Education and his team

We are honoured to have Imam Hamzah Hassan as our Head of Education and Imam at Harrow Central Mosque. Imam Hamzah is a charismatic and engaging scholar who brings a rare approach of fusing contemporary challenges with classical sacred knowledge. His expertise in co-ordinating, leading and managing children's education as well as setting up established Madrasas serves as an asset to the Harrow Central Mosque.

Imam Hamzah began studying the Sacred Sciences at a young age under the tutelage of his uncle, esteemed Mawlana Abdur-Rahman, covering the various subjects of the traditional Darse-Nizami syllabus including Arabic, Tafsir, Hadith, Usul, Fiqh, Aqida, Logic, Islamic Philosophy, Sira and Shama'il. He graduated with a degree of Baccalaureus in Islamic Law and Traditional Studies (Darse Nizami) in 2016 from al-Markaz al-Islami, Bradford.

2. Head of Education and his team (...continued)

Imam Hamzah then completed a BA in Arabic and Islamic Studies from Leeds. During this time he spent a year studying Arabic in Fes, Morocco and also studied privately with leading scholars from the world-renowned University of Qarawiyyin. After graduating with a First Class Honours Degree and a prize of excellence in 2017, he completed his Masters in Islamic Studies and History at the University of Oxford (2018). He is currently working on working on specialist PhD doctoral research at the University of Leeds in Theology and Religious Studies.

Imam Hamzah has led a number of institutes, served as an Imam in Bradford, Central Oxford Mosque and Manchester Central Mosque. We give thanks to respected Imam Hamzah Hassan and his entire team for their relentless efforts, dedication and energy that they devote in re-shaping our entire education system.

3. Harrow Central Mosque Madrasa

Upon the arrival of the new head of education, the current madrasa system was overhauled to make way for a better education provision to be delivered to the children of the residents of Harrow and surrounding areas. The classes were renovated to create an atmosphere of warmth, learning and positivity.

The aim of the Madrasa is to ensure that students aged 5-15 are receiving the best of Islamic education alongside learning of the Qur'an using modern, tailored and systematic methods. The Madrasa also envisages to provide students with learning experiences that will guide them in becoming exemplary citizens of the communities they represent. To achieve this, we have done the following:

- **Revised Curriculum:** As part of the re-opening of the madrasa after the pandemic, Imam Hamzah has introduced a new curriculum based on year by year progression tailor made with age rated content. This consists of a textbook alongside a fun and interactive workbook to monitor progression and level of understanding.
- **Class Structure:** We have divided the classes into different levels depending on student age groups, ability and gender.
- **Recruit motivated teachers:** In order to provide the best of Islamic education to our children, we have recruited Madrasa teachers from distinctively different ethnicities.
- **Hold Regular Madrasa Assemblies/Gatherings:** The Madrasa students participated in the annual Harrow Central Mosque procession in celebration of the birth of the Best of Creation (peace and blessings be upon him). Parents were also invited to attend and the event was a great success.
- **Extracurricular activities:** We have started a fully structured summer camp, winter camp, not limited to only madrasa students but to the wider community. These camps include educational workshops alongside recreational, fun and sport activities which aids the promotion of learning, healthy eating and keeping fit.
- **Hifdh:** Currently around 30 boys sit on our intensive hifdh course, memorising the Qur'an.

4. Management and Administration

- We currently have a total of twelve Qur'an and Islamic Studies teachers at the Madrasa.
- Three administrators who report to the Head of Education.
- A database system has been designed and introduced for effective management of student data, complying with related legislation.
- The Madrasa now accommodates for over 500 students with 60 students waiting to be enrolled.
- Regular meetings take place with Madrasa Staff/Teachers to provide training and share information.

5. Teacher training

Training has been provided to teachers on a regular basis to ensure there is a continuous improvement in the teaching standards. Training has been provided on:

- Presenting the syllabus (specific topics and how to handle questions)
- Class control techniques and strategies
- Class management and lesson planning
- Strategies of teaching Qur'an
- Safeguarding

6. Establishment of a Library

As the mosque, its community and its services expand, the library is befitting of a community that is serious about establishing a seat of community, learning, and becoming a beacon of light. The intention of building the library was that of some of the pious of the community, with the intention of creating a space where the entire community, even those who may not share our religion, may come, learn, explore and study.

The resources of the library will include that of any higher institution of learning, including books (related to all subjects), periodicals, computing, audio/visual, a children's corner, and the creation of a space that facilitates reading and learning.

The Library is meant to be more than a repository of books, it is resource for the community and a place of continual learning. As such, in addition to facilitating library and community services, the library will host reading and study circles to unlock the light that lines its shelves.

7. Harrow Central Mosque Adult Education Classes

The opportunity for adults to study traditional knowledge disseminated from respected scholars and teachers has continued with the following workshops/courses being made available:

Foundation Diploma in Islamic Studies

This course covered the obligatory knowledge needed to practice faith with confidence and complete understanding. The course aimed to develop the student's belief, understanding of the legal maxims of worship and improve their practice of spirituality through a modern approach using integrated modules and with the assistance of the technological aids to improve the delivery and facilitate most successful learning.

Other courses included:

- All about Prophet Muhammad (pbuh)-Sirah
- Imam Hussain Seminar
- Educating Children Seminar
- Adult Refresher Course
- Ladies Tajweed Intensive
- Pre-Ramadan Seminar

HCM Tots - Mother & Toddler Group

We are catering for a weekly mother and toddlers group allowing young toddlers to come and enjoy themselves in a warm, fun atmosphere whilst also facilitating for mothers to meet each other and improve their well being.

Ramadan & Religious Festivals

HCM celebrates many religious festivals including:

- Milad-un-Nabi (Peace Be Upon Him)
- Lailatul-Barat
- Miraj-un-Nabi (Peace Be Upon Him)
- Lailatul Qadr/ Khatam ul Quran
- Yaum-e-Shohadah / Yaum-e-Ashura
- Monthly Mehfil-e-Ziker and many more

Free Funeral Services

Since its launch in May 2017, HCM has been providing a donation based free funeral service for the Muslim community within our pre-determined catchment area. At the beginning of the pandemic, it was quite challenging to run the service. However, to cope up with the situation, we partnered with a commercial funeral director that assisted us to maintain the increased demand on our services.

We have been providing a comprehensive service to include the pick-up of the deceased from hospital or home, storage in our cold room, full Islamic ghusal, Janazah Salah and finally transportation to the families chosen cemeteries. The deceased's family have also been given the facility of our bereavement room where the families may grieve and pray for their deceased.

As the funeral service is donation based, we have been relying on the continuous support of our community to maintain our service level and to date, we have seen great generosity from our community and the users of our funeral service.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Communication

An ever increasing number of forms of communication are being adopted to ensure that our diverse community is kept informed of HCM news, activities and events. These include:

- Jumaah announcements
- Newsletters
- Emailshots
- Social media (Facebook and Twitter)
- Website
- Events guide booklets
- Plasma screens

School Visits

HCM regularly organises tours and lectures for local schools. In past years an average 30 tours a year would take place and excellent feedback would be received from teachers and pupils on their experience. However, due to COVID-19, no school visits took place during the year.

Interfaith

HCM is part of the Harrow Interfaith Council and Harrow Interfaith Dialogue and actively takes part in inter-community activities and dialogue. We also invite interfaith members, Councillors and other community-members to the Mosque during the month of Ramadan for Iftar (breaking the fast) and for other special events. However, due to COVID-19, none of these took place during the year.

Fitness Activities

In the past years, Cricket and Kickboxing classes were very successfully run for brothers and children respectively. However, due to Covid-19 these classes remained suspended during the year. We are looking into re-launching these and further new classes for brothers, sisters and children.

Future plans include:

- Broadening the range of activities and services offered to the Afghan, Somali, Bengali and other communities.
- Continuing to increase the range of activities offered to sisters with a special focus on health and well-being,
- Establishing more partnerships with local organisations to deliver services to the local Muslim and wider community.
- Expand our library resources and make use of these to provide a platform for learning about Islam and qur'an by people of all faiths and backgrounds.
- Carrying out research to identify the Islamic educational needs of the community and organise the provision of courses accordingly.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

COVID-19 and the challenges we faced.

Due to the spread of the pandemic, the mosque remained closed for a substantial period on and off as per the government directives and guidelines. During these unprecedented times, we faced many challenges that affected our day-to-day operations:

1. Health and Safety

In order to ensure we covered all aspects of public health and safety whilst trying to allow some form of normality and relief to the public during the first lockdown, a comprehensive risk assessment was carried out by HCM and Faith Associates (Beacon Mosque Working Group) in line with the Public Health regulations and guidelines. As a result, many measures and procedures were implemented to minimize the risk of the spread of Coronavirus within the Masjid environment. This included social distancing, one way system, bespoke booking-in system for Friday and Taraweeh prayers.

The volunteering team was briefed and trained with the new rules, and with the support of the people attending the masjid we were able to carry out all tasks in a safe manner.

2. Helping Hands

We were very quick to react to the developing pandemic and launched our Helping Hands service immediately after lockdown. Helping Hands was a multipurpose service designed to cater for the needs of the wider community of Harrow. Working closely with Harrow Council our team of volunteers worked relentlessly to support the local community with shopping, collection/delivery of prescriptions, hot meals, food parcels and Iftar, all delivered direct to the homes of those most in need.

3. HCM funeral services

The most unfortunate and sad aspect of the pandemic was the unprecedented demand for the HCM funeral services. In order to fully function in such demanding times the funeral service faced many challenges in the initial stages. The strict guidelines and the nature of the operation required a lot of co ordination and planning especially with the overwhelming issues around the sourcing of personal protective equipment.

Once all pre requisites were covered HCM were able to fully cover the funerals within the Harrow area dealing with Covid and non-Covid related deaths. Due to the increased demand for the service HCM partnered with an independent funeral director to try best serve the community.

4. Joining hands with others

During the lockdown we were a part of a multi masjid initiative to get **Oximeters** out to the community of Harrow to help monitor body oxygen levels which was a vital indicator for anyone suffering from Covid.

Grant making

Those attending our Mosque have given generously to disaster appeals arising from natural calamities affecting various countries around the world. The Mosque has given these funds to internationally recognised UK charities in working in those countries towards relieving the pain and sufferings of the people affected by such calamities.

We continue to administer the receipt and distribution of Zakat, which is collected and distributed in accordance with the teachings of Islam for the relief of those in poverty and the destitute. We work with partner organisations to identify who we can help.

Volunteers

Volunteers are an important resource in both our faith and community work. Volunteers are involved in most of our faith and community activities and we have **over 100 people** regularly giving their time. All our trustees also give of their time freely. We encourage all members of our Mosque to be involved in voluntary activities and to share their skills with others. All those volunteers working with projects involving children or other vulnerable groups are DBS checked (formerly called **CRB**).

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

How our activities deliver public benefit

The charity carries out a wide range of activities in pursuance of its charitable aims. The trustees consider that these activities, summarised below, provide benefit both to those who worship at our Mosque and the wider community of Harrow.

(A) Religious activities

HCM provides a centre for our prayers and worship and for the activities associated with Islam. During the year under review, HCM offered a range of religious services and activities including:

- Prayers:** HCM is open for daily prayers, Friday prayers and special Taraweeh prayers during Ramadan
- Festivals:** HCM provides food during Ramadan for visitors to break their fasts. Eid and the birth of the Holy Prophet Muhammad (Peace Be Upon Him) are also celebrated.
- Nikah:** HCM provides Muslim couples with an appropriate location for their Islamic marriage (Nikah). HCM strongly encourages all couples to register their marriages in accordance with English law to ensure legally enforceable rights are secured for both parties as well as the marriage being recognised in the UK.
- Hifz:** Memorisation of the holy Quran (Hifz) is considered an important element of religious education and training. Hifz teaching continues to be provided in a structured format.
- Education:** HCM has put in place a series of programmes for all the community educating in different aspects of Islam. These are being heavily publicised through public announcements, social media and on-line and are delivered by highly reputed and respected teachers/scholars.
- Inter-faith dialogue:** HCM is an active member of the Faith Communities Forum for the Harrow area. HCM use this platform to promote inter-faith dialogue and social cohesion.
- Zakat:** One of the fundamentals of Islam is that all who have suitable means should offer Zakat. Zakat does not need to be distributed through a Mosque but HCM does offer the community the opportunity to contribute to a Zakat fund. All of the Zakat collected is treated as a restricted fund and distributed in a carefully controlled manner to registered charities. The Mosque makes no charge for the collection and distribution of Zakat and measures are taken to ensure there are no conflicts of interest.

(B) Community activities

HCM's community hall, rooms and other facilities in the new Mosque provide a valuable educational and recreational resource to all in the local community. A wide variety of activities are organised and take place in the community centre.

- Hall & rooms:** Hall and meeting rooms are available for use by local groups and organisations. Local charities are encouraged to make use of our meeting rooms, and HCM are planning to host surgeries with the local MP for Harrow. When facilities are not required for community use they are available for hire on commercial terms.
- Community Partnerships:** HCM intend to maintain and develop existing range of community activities working in partnership with the community, the local authority, the police, other faith groups and community interest groups. We continue to place great importance on sharing a good understanding of our faith with our non-Muslim neighbours and vice-versa.
- Funeral facilities:** HCM provides a complete funeral service in line with the teachings of Islam with the intention of relieving the deceased's bereaved relatives of the burden of organising burials. HCM plan to continue initiatives already in place in arranging special classes to teach people how to proceed with Islamic burial procedures including how to give ghusl (cleaning the deceased's body before burial).

Fundraising activities

The main efforts for fundraising tend to be during Ramadhan when guest speakers are invited throughout the holy month to help fundraising.. Further activities are planned for 2023 including a fundraising dinner and the launch of a fundraising campaign focusing on businesses as well as individuals.

Fairtrade

Alhamdulillah, in October 2013 Harrow Central Mosque was awarded Fairtrade status reflecting the mosque's keenness to purchase products which display the Fairtrade mark.

The Fairtrade mark is an independent consumer label which appears on UK products as a guarantee that they have been certified against internationally agreed Fairtrade standards. It shares internationally recognised Fairtrade standards with initiatives in 20 other countries, working together globally with producer networks as Fairtrade Labelling Organisations International (FLO).

What is Fairtrade: Fairtrade is about better prices, decent working conditions, local sustainability, and fair terms of trade for farmers and workers in the developing world. By requiring companies to pay sustainable prices (which must never fall lower than the market price), Fairtrade addresses the injustices of conventional trade, which traditionally discriminates against the poorest, weakest producers. It enables them to improve their position and have more control over their lives.

We hope to invite the Fairtrade foundation to our Mosque to provide further information to the community on their work and how we as a community can help. We fully support the London Borough of Harrow's aim to becoming a Fairtrade Borough.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

The source of funding of the Mosque is by way of donation from the community. The donations collected are in the Mosque on Fridays and other days, by regular standing orders and other online methods including gift aid tax recovery of £9,600 (2021: £5,600). The incoming resources from generated funds including gift aid tax recovered was £596,318 (2021: £460,818) and from charitable activities £91,234 (2021: £87,540). A more detailed analysis of these is included in notes 2, 3 and 4 to the financial statements.

Included in the incoming resources from generated funds were Job Retention Scheme grant of £13760 (2021:£52,017) , Harrow Giving grant of £Nil (2021: £20,000) and London Community Funding grant of £Nil (2021:£33,936). As the mosque remained closed for a significant part of the year, there was a sharp decline in donations received compared to prior years. These grants helped the us to remain operational and offer additional community services such as Helping Hands during these very challenging times..

Reserves policy

The trustees have reviewed the reserve of the Charity. The reserve policy is that HCM holds enough funds to cover the operating costs for at least three months, excluding collection and distribution of Zakat and other restricted funds. The trustees recognise that in recent years, it has proved difficult to always maintain this level of reserves due to the huge cost of the new mosque building project. As this project is now edging to completion, the trustees will endeavour to increase the free reserves to reflect our policy.

FUTURE PLANS

Finances / Fundraising: With the aforementioned works coming to a close and the Qardh e Hasanah debt, HCM is planning further fundraising events.

Old Mosque redevelopment: With the advice of our retained professional advisors, and in compliance with the section 106 planning conditions, HCM are hoping to secure planning approvals in this respect.

Expansion of the Madrassa and supplementary schooling services: HCM hope to continue in their expansion of these services to enable more children to benefit both in terms of their religious education as well as their general academic progress and core skills.

Community Engagement: Efforts are underway and HCM are encouraging wider community engagement and contribution from its congregation at a local level addressing local issues and needs. HCM also are seeking to support social welfare initiatives working alongside other local charities, as well as supporting and delivering on community health as well as environmental initiatives.

Youth - Sisters - Seniors: With more recreational as well as educational activities planned for all members of the congregation, increasing the participation and engagement of 'all' is fundamental to the success of HCM. This remains a priority area for work. The specific sub groups are planning their activities which will be rolled out and widely publicised.

Services for the Disabled: Again another area which requires priority attention and reminding of the importance of inclusivity, is the development of HCM's services to the disabled members of our community. Plans are underway, as a start, in delivering classes to the deaf with trained staff.

Funeral service

Having gained vital experience over the years our Volunteers are now well versed in all the procedural requirements to be able to deliver an effective service to the public. With this in mind, there are several goals that we set ourselves for the near future.

- Potential to expand the service to a wider catchment area allowing more of the local community access to our donation based service.
- Have the ability to offer repatriation service for any family wishing to take the deceased mayit abroad.
- Employ a Funeral director to work alongside management team to achieve the above.
- Purchase a second vehicle (fit for purpose)

- Initiate the process to acquire land to be converted into a Muslim only Cemetery.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

Charity constitution

Harrow Central Mosque ('HCM'), also known as Harrow Central Mosque and Masood Islamic Centre, is constituted as a charitable trust registered with the Charity Commission on 16th August, 1998 under charity number 1071261. It is governed by a deed of trust last updated on 27 March 2022.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Trust Deed governs the appointment of the Trustees.

Organisational structure

The charity trustees are responsible for the general control and management of the charity. The trustees give their time freely and receive no remuneration or other financial benefits.

The trustees meet together on a regular basis to discuss and review and make decisions in relation to the running of the mosque and other activities provided by the charity to assist the smooth running of the charity.

Induction and training of new trustees

Following appointment, new trustees are introduced to their new role and given copies of the trust deed, a Code of Conduct and a guide to the policies and procedures adopted by the charity. A number of publications from the Charity Commission are also provided including the guidance on charities and public benefit and on the advancement of religion for the public benefit. This ensures that new trustees are aware of the scope of their responsibilities under the Charities Act. Initially, new trustees work with an existing trustee assisting on particular activities and projects run by the charity. After satisfactory feedback from existing trustees, they are then given the task of leading a particular activity or project, reporting progress at trustees' meetings.

Risk management

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the Charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The Trustees have assessed the risks the Charity faces and indeed operate a health and safety policy which is strictly monitored and updated regularly. The Trustees are satisfied that the system is in place to manage the risks that have been identified. In particular, sufficient insurance cover is in place and the finances of the mosque are kept under review.

Appropriate DBS checks are made for all those who work with children or other vulnerable groups within the community.

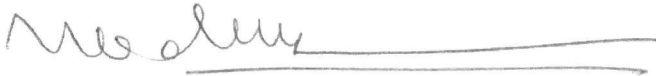

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Raising funds

Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, or incurred in trading activities undertaken to raise funds.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both the direct pay and non-pay costs and support costs relating to those activities.

Governance costs

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity, and include its audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity including trustee expenses.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs include administrative office functions and premises costs. These have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources: allocating premises costs on floor areas, staff costs by the time spent and other costs on a measure of usage. The only exception is that no allocation of cost is made against Zakat, instead the relevant share is met from general funds of the Mosque.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. The freehold properties are valued at historic cost and not depreciated, as these are considered to have a useful life of greater than 50 years and so any depreciation charge is considered immaterial.

Depreciation is charged on fixtures and fittings and office equipment over their estimated useful lives at the following rates:

Investment property

Investment property is shown at most recent valuation carried out by the trustees. Any aggregate surplus or deficit arising from changes in market value is directly transferred to the general fund.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

**Report of the Trustees
for the Year Ended 5 April 2021**

The trustees present their report with the Financial Statements of Harrow Central Mosque & Masood Islamic Centre ('the charity') for the year ended 5 April 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives, aims and Strategies

The objects of the charity are set out in the charity's trust deed and are summarised as follows:

The advancement of the religion of Islam according to Qur'an, Sunnah and Hadith.

Harrow Central Mosque was established to advance the spiritual and social welfare of people through the religion of Islam. Its prime objectives are to serve the Muslim Community of Harrow and surrounding areas and to make the mosque accessible and welcoming to people of all faiths and backgrounds.

Our Aim

To become the UK's leading Mosque and Educational Institute renowned as a centre of excellence offering spiritual and personal advancement.

Our Mission

To meet the needs of the community by providing excellent prayer facilities, establishing a high quality educational institute and developing services to meet the social, physical and intellectual needs of all ages and backgrounds, working in partnership with local public, private and third sector organisations.

Our Objectives

- To establish an efficient and effective governance structure with clear policies and procedures
- To improve the educational services offered by establishing a high quality centre of learning for both religious and secular teachings meeting the broad needs of the community
- To ensure women are provided with the highest standard of prayer facilities, educational services and social support
- To maintain and strengthen our partnerships with local and central government, interfaith forums, the Metropolitan Police and many other groups including local mosques
- To effectively manage the operations and expenditure of the Mosque with clarity and transparency
- To promote and encourage the participation from youth and women
- To reject and condemn extremism and terrorism in all its forms
- To make the Mosque a vibrant, welcoming and active focal point for the whole community, Muslim and non-Muslim

Our objectives are set to reflect our faith and community aims. Each year our trustees review our objectives and activities to ensure they continue to reflect our aims. In carrying out this review the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular its supplementary public guidance on the advancement of religion for the public benefit.

- To engage with the community to ensure our objectives are aligned with their needs and expectations and secular teachings meeting the broad needs of the community
- To engage with the non-Muslim community, local authority and local charities to strengthen relationships with the wider community and deliver support and services for all
- To ensure that the Mosque supports those in need through the effective and robust collection and distribution of Zakat and Sadaqah payments.
- To continually review the educational needs of the community and identify how the offering can be strengthened.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Significant activities

New Building Project

Outstanding works that now remain include:

- Roofing: A new roofing system is required on top of the existing roof to eradicate water ingress problems in several locations due to poor design and workmanship dating back to work undertaken pre 2012. Patch repairs have been completed with partial success.
- External Landscaping: Planning condition required external landscaping.
- Basement works: Finishing works are outstanding and there are water ingress issues below ground level due to inadequate water proof tanking. Many areas are letting water in.
- Sliding partition to Function Hall to create division/segregation (the track built as part of original build)
- External calligraphy
- Chandelier or lighting for the dome hall

Commercial Units

The Charity has three commercial units:

Retail Unit The retail unit has been occupied by commercial tenants since 2012.

Café unit Negotiations are currently in progress with a prospective tenant to commence a lease of this unit.

Bereavement Room This area, originally earmarked for a commercial gym, has been converted into a bereavement room for our free funeral services. At present, use of the room on the day of the funeral is free but use on other days will chargeable.

The intention is for the Mosque to work in partnership with both commercial tenants to ensure they meet the needs of our diverse community.

Mortuary

A donation based free funeral service for the residents of Harrow has been in operation since 14 May 2017. During the year, due to Covid19 pandemic, we did not do as many funeral arrangements ourselves. Instead, we joined hands with a commercially run funeral service company who offered their service using our facilities. Following our health and safety review, we did not allow any funeral (Janza) prayers onsite. Instead funeral (Janza) Prayers took place at the burial grounds strictly complying with the Government guidelines on the number of attendees.

Old Mosque Redevelopment

This continues to be a core focus and HCM remains in close discussion with the council, having independently sought professional advice and assistance to ensure the best interests of the Mosque are achieved within the parameters of the planning conditions. The intention is to make HCM self-sufficient for the running & management cost of both buildings and not to be reliant solely on the charitable donations of the local Muslim community.

HCM had submitted final planning application to the Harrow Council Planners for converting the existing building into 6 apartments of 3 bedrooms, 2 bedrooms and one studio. Following several meetings and consultations between HCM, its professional advisors and Harrow Council, we were quite optimistic about getting the final planning approval for this conversion. However, recently Harrow Council has refused our planning application on some minor grounds. We lost our appeal against this refusal. We are now looking into submitting a revised planning application.

EDUCATION

The foundation of the religion of Islam is knowledge. Allah Almighty said to the Messenger (Peace Be Upon Him) when he supplicates to say 'oh Allah increase me in Knowledge', and the prophet (Peace Be Upon Him) said that 'seeking knowledge is compulsory for every Muslim', man and woman.

To achieve this, we offer a wide variety of courses designed to meet the range (all levels and all ages) of needs of the community which will facilitate classical Islamic sciences taught by qualified teachers.

2. Head of Education and his team

We give thanks to respected Ustadh Mohammed Amar and his entire team for their relentless efforts, dedication and energy that they devote in re-shaping our entire education system, especially for rising up to challenge thrown upon us by the pandemic.

3. Harrow Central Mosque Madrassa

In recent years, the current madrassa system was overhauled to make way for a better education provision to be delivered to the children of the residents of Harrow and surrounding areas. The classes were renovated to create an atmosphere of warmth, learning and positivity. At the beginning of the pandemic all physical classes were switched to online platform. This has caused some students to leave as they were not comfortable with online method of learning, but the vast majority have continued.

The aim of the Madrassa is to ensure that students aged 5-15 are receiving the best of Islamic education alongside learning of the Qur'an using modern, tailored and systematic methods. The Madrassa also envisages to provide students with learning experiences that will guide them in becoming exemplary citizens of the communities they represent. We have endeavoured to:

- **Revised Curriculum:** As part of the recent overhaul of the madrassa, Ustadh Mohammed Amar has introduced a new curriculum designed to supplement the teachings of the Qur'an and Qaidah classes with Islamic Studies.
- **New Classes:** We have divided the classes into different levels depending on student age groups, ability and gender.
- **Recruit motivated teachers:** In order to provide the best of Islamic education to our children, we have recruited four new Madrassa teachers from distinctively different ethnicities.
- **Hold Regular Madrassa Assemblies/Gatherings:** These were suspended due to the pandemic
- **Extracurricular activities:** These were suspended due to the pandemic .
- **Hifdh:** 8 boys currently sit on our intensive hifdh course, memorising the Qur'an, and they are given the opportunity to lead taraweeh for the month of Ramadhan.

4. Management and Administration

- We currently have a total of twelve Qur'an and Islamic Studies teachers at the Madrassa.
- One administrator who reports to the Head of Education.
- A database system has been designed and introduced for effective management of student data, complying with related legislation.
- The Madrassa now accommodates for 482 (2019: 480) students with 55 students waiting to be enrolled
- Regular meetings take place with Madrassah Staff/Teachers to provide training and share information.

5. Teacher training

Training has been provided to teachers on a regular basis to ensure there is a continuous improvement in the teaching standards. Training has been provided internally and externally by reputable institutions on:

- Presenting the syllabus (specific topics and how to handle questions)
- Class control techniques and strategies
- Class management and lesson planning
- Strategies of teaching Quran
- Safeguarding

6. Establishment of a Library

As the mosque, its community and its services expand, the library is befitting of a community that is serious about establishing a seat of community, learning, and becoming a beacon of light. The intention of building the library was that of some of the pious of the community, with the intention of creating a space where the entire community, even those who may not share our religion, may come, learn, explore and study.

The resources of the library will include that of any higher institution of learning, including books (related to all subjects), periodicals, computing, audio/visual, a children's corner, and the creation of a space that facilitates reading and learning.

The Library is meant to be more than a repository of books, it is resource for the community and a place of continual learning. As such, in addition to facilitating library and community services, the library will host reading and study circles to unlock the light that lines its shelves.

7. Harrow Central Mosque Adult Education Classes

Free Funeral Services

Since its launch in May 2017, HCM's donation based funeral service has been providing a free funeral service for the Muslim community within our pre-determined catchment area. At the beginning of the pandemic it was quite challenging to run the service. However, to cope up with the situation, we formed partnership with a commercial funeral director that assisted us to maintain the increased demand on our services during the year.

We have been providing a comprehensive service to include the pick-up of the deceased from Hospital or home, storage in our cold room, full Islamic ghusal, Janazah Salah and finally transportation to the families chosen Cemeteries. The deceased's family have also been given the facility of our bereavement room where the families may grieve and pray for their deceased.

As the funeral service is donating based, we have been relying on the continuous support of our community to maintain our service level and to date, we have seen great generosity from our community and the users of our funeral service

Communication

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

School Visits

HCM regularly organises tours and lectures for local schools. In past years an average 30 tours a year would take place and excellent feedback would be received from teachers and pupils on their experience. However, due Covid 19 no school visits took place during the year.

Interfaith

HCM is part of the Harrow Interfaith Council and Harrow Interfaith Dialogue and actively takes part in inter-community activities and dialogue. We also invite interfaith members, Councillors and other community-members Mosque during the month of Ramadan for Iftar (breaking the fast) and for other special events. However, due Covid 19 none of these took place during the year.

Fitness Activities

In the past years, Cricket and Kickboxing classes were very successfully run for brothers and children respectively. However, due Covid 19 these classes remained suspended during the year. We are looking into re-launching these and further new classes for brothers, sisters and children.

Future plans include:

- Broadening the range of activities and services offered to the Afghan, Somali, Bengali and other communities
- Continuing to increase the range of activities offered to sisters with a special focus on health and well being
- Establishing more partnerships with local organisations to deliver services to the local Muslim and wider community
- Expand our library resources and make use of these to provide a platform for learning about Islam and Qur'an by people of all faiths and backgrounds.
- Carrying out research to identify the Islamic educational needs of the community and organise the provision of courses accordingly.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

COVID19 and the challenges we faced.

Due to the spread of the pandemic, the mosque remained closed for a substantial period on and off as per the government directives and guidelines. During these unprecedented times, we faced many challenge that affected our day-to-day operations:

1. Health and Safety

To ensure we covered all aspects of public health and safety whilst trying to allow some form of normality and relief to the public during the first lockdown, a comprehensive risk assessment was carried out by HCM and Faith Associates (Beacon Mosque Working Group) in line with the Public Health regulations and guidelines. As a result, many measures and procedures were implemented to minimize the risk of the spread of Coronavirus within the Masjid environment. This included social distancing, one way system, bespoke booking-in system for Friday and Taraweeh prayers.

The volunteering team was briefed and trained with the new rules and with the support of the people attending the masjid we were able to carry out all tasks in a safe manner.

2.Helping Hands

We were very quick to react to the developing pandemic and launched our **Helping Hands** service immediately after lockdown. Helping Hands was a multipurpose service designed to cater for the needs of the wider community of Harrow. Working closely with Harrow Council our team of volunteers worked relentlessly to support the local community with shopping, collection/delivery of prescriptions, hot meals, food parcels and Iftar, all delivered direct to the homes of those most in need.

As a result of the early success of Helping Hands we were able to secure grant funding of £20,000 from Harrow Giving and £33,936 from London Community Funding to further our support. With the grant money we were able to continue the food parcels service for a longer period as well as introducing additional services like the bereavement and befriending service.

3.HCM funeral services

The most unfortunate and sad aspect of the pandemic was the unprecedented demand for the HCM funeral services. In order to fully function in such demanding times, the funeral service faced many challenges in the initial stages. The strict guidelines and the nature of the operation required a lot of co-ordination and planning especially with the overwhelming issues around the sourcing of personal protective equipment.

Once all prerequisites were covered HCM were able to fully cover the funerals within the Harrow area dealing with Covid and non-Covid related deaths. Due to the increased demand for the service HCM partnered with an independent funeral director to try best serve the community.

4.Joining Hands with Others

During the lockdown we were a part of a multi masjid initiative to **get Oximeters** out to the community of Harrow to help monitor body oxygen levels which was a vital indicator for anyone suffering from covid.

Grant making

Those attending our Mosque have given generously to disaster appeals arising from natural calamities affecting various countries around the world. The Mosque has given these funds to internationally recognised UK charities in working in those countries towards relieving the pain and sufferings of the people affected by such calamities.

This year, as we did last year, we administered the receipt and distribution of Zakat, which is collected and distributed in accordance with the teachings of Islam for the relief of those in poverty and the destitute. We work with partner organisations, usually the local Mosque, to identify who we can help through our Zakat Committee.

Volunteers

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

How our activities deliver public benefit

The charity carries out a wide range of activities in pursuance of its charitable aims. The trustees consider that these activities, summarised below, provide benefit both to those who worship at our Mosque and the wider community of Harrow.

(A) Religious activities

HCM provides a centre for our prayers and worship and for the activities associated with Islam. During the year under review, HCM offered a range of religious services and activities including:

- Prayers:** HCM is open for daily prayers, Friday prayers and special Taraweeh prayers during Ramadan
- Festivals:** HCM provides food during Ramadan for visitors to break their fasts. Eid and the birth of the Holy Prophet Muhammed (Peace Be Upon Him) are also celebrated.
- Nikah:** HCM provides Muslim couples with an appropriate location for their Islamic marriage (Nikah). HCM strongly encourages all couples to register their marriages in accordance with English law to ensure legally enforceable rights are secured for both parties as well as the marriage being recognised in the UK.
- Hifz:** Memorisation of the holy Quran (Hifz) is considered an important element of religious education and training. Hifz teaching continues to be provided in a structured format and to date we have eight Hifz graduates.
- Education:** Since April 2012 HCM has put in place a series of programmes for all the community educating in different aspects of Islam. These are being heavily publicised through public announcements, social media and on-line and are delivered by highly reputed and respected teachers/scholars.
- Inter-faith dialogue:** HCM is an active member of the Faith Communities Forum for the Harrow area. HCM use this platform to promote inter-faith dialogue and social cohesion.
- Zakat:** One of the fundamentals of Islam is that all who have suitable means should offer Zakat. Zakat does not need to be distributed through a Mosque but HCM does offer the community the opportunity to contribute to a Zakat fund. All of the Zakat collected is treated as a restricted fund and distributed in a carefully controlled manner to registered charities. The Mosque makes no charge for the collection and distribution of Zakat and measures are taken to ensure there are no conflicts of interest.

(B) Community activities

HCM's community hall, rooms and other facilities in the new Mosque provide a valuable educational and recreational resource to all in the local community. A wide variety of activities are organised and take place in the community centre.

- Hall & rooms:** Hall and meeting rooms are available for use by local groups and organisations. Local charities are encouraged to make use of our meeting rooms, and HCM are planning to host surgeries with the local MP for Harrow. When facilities are not required for community use they are available for hire on commercial terms.
- Community Partnerships:** HCM intend to maintain and develop existing range of community activities working in partnership with the community, the local authority, the police, other faith groups and community interest groups. We continue to place great importance on sharing a good understanding of our faith with our non-Muslim neighbours and vice-versa.
- Funeral facilities:** HCM provides a complete funeral service in line with the teachings of Islam with the intention of relieving the deceased's bereaved relatives of the burden of organising burials. HCM plan to continue initiatives already in place in arranging special classes to teach people how to proceed with Islamic burial procedures including how to give ghusl (cleaning the deceased's body before burial).

Fundraising activities

The main efforts for fundraising tend to be during Ramadhan when guest speakers are invited throughout the holy month to help fundraising for the new Mosque project and to repay the Qard e Hasanah. Further activities are planned for 2020 including a fundraising dinner and the launch of a fundraising campaign focusing on businesses as well as individuals.

Fairtrade

Alhamdulillah, Harrow Central Mosque in October 2013 was awarded Fairtrade status reflecting the mosque's keenness to purchase products which display the Fairtrade mark.

The Fairtrade mark is an independent consumer label which appears on UK products as a guarantee that they have been certified against internationally agreed Fairtrade standards. It shares internationally recognised Fairtrade standards with initiatives in 20 other countries, working together globally with producer networks as Fairtrade Labelling Organisations International (FLO).

What is Fairtrade: Fairtrade is about better prices, decent working conditions, local sustainability, and fair terms of trade for farmers and workers in the developing world. By requiring companies to pay sustainable prices (which must never fall lower than the market price), Fairtrade addresses the injustices of conventional trade, which traditionally discriminates against the poorest, weakest producers. It enables them to improve their position and have more control over their lives.

We hope to invite the Fairtrade foundation to our Mosque to provide further information to the community on their work and how we as a community can help. We fully support the London Borough of Harrow's aim to becoming a Fairtrade Borough.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

The source of funding of the Mosque is by way of donation from the community. The donations collected are in the Mosque on Fridays and other days, by regular standing orders and other online methods including gift aid tax recovery of £5,600 (2020: £20,545). The incoming resources from generated funds including gift aid tax recovered was £460,818 (2020:£582,559) and from charitable activities £87,540 (2020: £105,867). A more detailed analysis of these is included in notes 2, 3 and 4 to the financial statements.

Included in the incoming resources from generated funds were Job Retention Scheme grant of £52,017, Harrow Giving grant of £20,000 and London Community Funding grant of £33,936. As the mosque remained closed for a significant part of the year, there was a sharp decline in donations received. These grants helped the charity to remain operational and offer additional community services such as Helping Hands during these very challenging times..

Reserves policy

The trustees have reviewed the reserve of the Charity. The reserve policy is that HCM holds enough funds to cover the operating costs for at least three months, excluding collection and distribution of Zakat and other restricted funds. The trustees recognise that in recent years, it has proved difficult to always maintain this level of reserves due to the huge cost of the new mosque building project. As this project is now edging to completion, the trustees will endeavour to increase the free reserves to reflect our policy.

FUTURE PLANS

Finances / Fundraising: With the aforementioned works coming to a close and the Qardh e Hasanah debt, HCM is planning further fundraising events.

Old Mosque redevelopment: With the advice of our retained professional advisors, and in compliance with the section 106 planning conditions, HCM are hoping to secure planning approvals in this respect.

Expansion of the Madrassa and supplementary schooling services: HCM hope to continue in their expansion of these services to enable more children to benefit both in terms of their religious education as well as their general academic progress and core skills.

Community Engagement: Efforts are underway and HCM are encouraging wider community engagement and contribution from its congregation at a local level addressing local issues and needs. HCM also are seeking to support social welfare initiatives working alongside other local charities, as well as supporting and delivering on community health as well as environmental initiatives.

Youth - Sisters - Seniors: With more recreational as well as educational activities planned for all members of the congregation, increasing the participation and engagement of 'all' is fundamental to the success of HCM. This remains a priority area for work. The specific subgroups are planning their activities which will be rolled out and widely publicised.

Services for the Disabled: Again, another area which requires priority attention and reminding of the importance of inclusivity, is the development of HCM's services to the disabled members of our community. Plans are underway, as a start, in delivering classes to the deaf with trained staff.

Cafe Units: The Executive Committee is currently considering a proposal by a prospective tenant and hopes now to finalise the leases on the cafe unit.

Funeral service

Short term plan:

Having gained vital experience over the years our Volunteers are now well versed in all the procedural requirements to be able to deliver an effective service to the public. With this in mind, there are several goals that we set ourselves for the near future.

- Potential to expand the service to a wider catchment area allowing more of the local community access to our donation-based service.
- Have the ability to offer repatriation service for any family wishing to take the deceased mayit abroad.
- Employ a Funeral director to work alongside management team to achieve the above.
- Purchase a second vehicle (fit for purpose)

Long term plan:

- Expand current Cold storage capacity to hold 6 mayits at any given time doubling up from the current 3 spaces.
- Initiate the process to acquire land to be converted into a Muslim only Cemetery.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

Charity constitution

Harrow Central Mosque ('HCM'), also known as Harrow Central Mosque and Masood Islamic Centre, is constituted as a charitable trust registered with the Charity Commission on 16th August, 1998 under charity number 1071261. It is governed by a deed of trust last updated in **November 2018**.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Trust Deed governs the appointment of the Trustees. Usually every three years, an election takes place (normally on the day of the AGM) where the prospective trustees contest in an open ballot and an executive committee is elected to govern the charity for a period of 3 years.

An existing board of Trustees is also authorised to appoint new Trustees to fill in vacancies arising through resignation or death of an existing trustee. In doing so, they consider, amongst other things, the skills sets required and time availability of the potential trustees. The general approach is that new Trustees should also be respected members of the faith and local communities. This serves to ensure that good relations are fostered between the Mosque and the people of the local community that they serve. In selecting new Trustees, the Trustees would seek to identify people who regularly attend events and functions organised by the Charity and are willing to volunteer to help in the broader community work. Potential Trustees are invited to attend Trustees' meetings as observers and are given more details of the Charity's aims and activities and, if all agree, they are then proposed as new Trustees at the subsequent Trustees' meeting. This process allows due consideration of the person's eligibility, personal competence, specialist knowledge and skills.

Organisational structure

The charity trustees are responsible for the general control and management of the charity. The trustees give their time freely and receive no remuneration or other financial benefits.

The trustees meet together on a regular basis to discuss and review and make decisions in relation to the running of the mosque and other activities provided by the charity. To assist the smooth running of the charity, the trustees have set up a number of sub committees, such as fund raising, education, mosque building project, financial management, building maintenance committees. A Sisters' Committee" has also been encouraged and established, to assist the Trustees and to address the specific needs of the women and girls.

The sub committees report back to the full meeting of the trustees for information and approval on a pre-set Agenda.

Induction and training of new trustees

Following appointment, new trustees are introduced to their new role and given copies of the trust deed, a Code of Conduct and a guide to the policies and procedures adopted by the charity. A number of publications from the Charity Commission are also provided including the guidance on charities and public benefit and on the advancement of religion for the public benefit. This ensures that new trustees are aware of the scope of their responsibilities under the Charities Act. Initially, new trustees work with an existing trustee assisting on particular activities and projects run by the charity. After satisfactory feedback from existing trustees, they are then given the task of leading a particular activity or project, reporting progress at trustees' meetings.

Risk management

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the Charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The Trustees have assessed the risks the Charity faces and indeed operate a health and safety policy which is strictly monitored and updated regularly. The Trustees are satisfied that the system is in place to manage the risks that have been identified. In particular, sufficient insurance cover is in place and the finances of the mosque are kept under review.

Appropriate DBS checks are made for all those who work with children or other vulnerable groups within the community.

Opinion

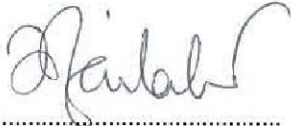

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Raising funds

Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, or incurred in trading activities undertaken to raise funds.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both the direct pay and non-pay costs and support costs relating to those activities.

Governance costs

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity, and include its audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity including trustee expenses.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs include administrative office functions and premises costs. These have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources: allocating premises costs on floor areas, staff costs by the time spent and other costs on a measure of usage. The only exception is that no allocation of cost is made against Zakat, instead the relevant share is met from general funds of the Mosque.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. The freehold properties are valued at historic cost and not depreciated, as these are considered to have a useful life of greater than 50 years and so any depreciation charge is considered immaterial.

Depreciation is charged on fixtures and fittings and office equipment over their estimated useful lives at the following rates:

Investment property

Investment property is shown at most recent valuation carried out by the trustees. Any aggregate surplus or deficit arising from changes in market value is directly transferred to the general fund.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
