OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The objects of the charity are the advancement of education, the relief of sickness, the protection of health and the relief of poverty of the people of Africa.

In planning our activities for the year, we keep in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit at our Trustees' meetings.

The focus of our activities remains the awarding of grants in order to support various projects in Africa. This benefits the people of Africa through the prevention or relief of poverty, the advancement of education and the advancement of health and social care.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Projects Supported

Projects in Yala, Kenya

Urafiki has been supporting projects in Kenya for many years by awarding grants (gifts) to our partner organisation in Kenya, which is known as Urafiki Community Linkage NGO (NGO). The NGO is a formally registered Kenyan legal entity with similar status and objects to a UK charity. The NGO works with the very deprived local community in Yala, to identify needs and provide support and solutions by setting up and managing various projects.

Although Urafiki and the NGO are separate organisations with different roles and a different geography, they work in very close collaboration. The ways of working together are based on a common purpose and shared values. Both organisations believe in the importance of education and employment to alleviate poverty. The organisations work in partnership, have built very close and trusting relationships over the years and value each other's ideas and thoughts. Above all there is total trust and with that comes the ability to challenge and listen deeply to each other's perspectives.

Accountability to funders is of course crucial. The trustees make regular visits to Kenya and make weekly WhatsApp or Teams calls to liaise with the NGO directors. The NGO finds vulnerable children and adults who require support. The number of adults and children who are to be supported by each project is agreed each year. The directors of the NGO then produce detailed budgets setting out the expected cost of supporting these people. Urafiki then raises money from sponsors and donors in the UK and other countries to fund the work carried out by the NGO. We attempt to match individuals in need in Kenya to specific donors in the UK and elsewhere. In addition, the team in Yala identifies community priorities such as housing or the training of young people and liaises with the UK charity about the possibility of funding these activities on a project basis.

In 2024 £200,043 was sent to Kenya in cash to finance and assist the schemes described below. A further sum was spent in the UK on computer equipment and sundry essential items not easily obtainable in Kenya. These items were transported to Yala thus incurring additional freight costs. The combined cost of the goods and freight charges was £16,769.

Education Sponsorship Scheme Yala, Kenya

This scheme has seen considerable expansion since it was established. At the end of 2023 / beginning of 2024, it had over 221 sponsored secondary school and youth polytechnic students. 71 students completed their secondary education in 2023. 34 post - secondary students then moved onto voluntary work in the Yala community whilst awaiting places at university, colleges and polytechnics. Other students sought employment. The scheme's success reflects the hard work of the students; the support provided by the Yala NGO team and the continuing generosity of sponsors. We anticipate that the success of these students will continue to have a positive impact on the whole community in Yala by raising the aspirations of other young people who are growing up in poverty.

Feeding Scheme, Yala, Kenya

This scheme continued to support 85 people who were in need of support due to their advanced age and/or their HIV/Aids status. There was a monthly gathering of the people on this scheme who were given a communal meal. At the conclusion of the meeting, they were provided with a bag of staple foods to take home.

Home Rebuilding Scheme, Yala, Kenya

The home rebuilding programme continued and saw the rebuilding or reroofing of 4 homes. Much of the building work was completed by NGO students who, having completed school, volunteered to assist the qualified masons and the community through this rebuilding work.

Orphans and Vulnerable Children Scheme

Numbers on the scheme remain stable with around 60 sponsored children including those at junior secondary school. 19 children went on to polytechnic or secondary schools. Eve Muliango and the team continue to provide excellent support to the children.

Children with Disabilities scheme

5 children are on the scheme and are benefitting hugely from educational opportunities. The Yala team have succeeded in obtaining places in suitable schools for the children. There are also 26 deaf children being educated at a local school for the deaf. It is hoped that by educating children with disabilities, the community's attitudes towards disadvantaged children may change.

Hair and Beauty Scheme.

This scheme was established to provide some less academic former primary and secondary student leavers and women without skills in the community with the opportunity to obtain marketable skills. The hair and beauty programme is thriving with the 2025 course full already. The programme currently has 45 students and 2 teachers.

Agriculture

The Urafiki NGO in Kenya has long been looking for ways of making the community more sustainable. The year 2024 saw the sixth cycle of a programme to improve agriculture practices and outputs with the aim of making small farmers independent. Led by Simon, Mercy and Collins, the project is going very well with the scale increasing gradually. It started with 10 farmers, expanded to 25, then 65 and is now up to 400. Farmers are provided with a mix of grants and loans with the aim of repayments coming from increased harvests. Trustees are optimistic that one day, an expanded agriculture scheme could cover a large proportion of Yala households transforming the lives of those families and of the whole community. There has been increased emphasis on evaluation and the data shows that, on average, farmers saw harvests which were 102% bigger than the year before.

INCOME

The overwhelming majority of Urafiki's work is supported by donations, including the hundreds of people who make regular contributions to support named individuals. Huge thanks to everyone for their generosity and loyalty over such a long period of time.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Charity's Policy on Reserves

As at 31 December 2024 we held cash at the bank totalling £156,465. All of these funds are unrestricted. At the beginning of 2024 the £17,985 balance on the former restricted funds were transferred to the unrestricted funds following the death of the original donor. In addition to the cash at bank, we expected to receive around £70,000 from gift aid claims, which were available, but not claimed at the year end. Total unrestricted reserves at the year-end were £226,465.

Our policy is to keep unrestricted funds to a minimum but we recognise that the charity needs to have a contingency to cover possible unexpected costs arising from: unexpected exchange rate movements; demands for emergency additional funding caused by poor rains or food price increases and the financial impact of election related violence. We also need to maintain reserves to cover students who are partway through their education when sponsors have contributed the full cost of their education in advance. Due to the success of the secondary scheme there are increasing numbers of students going to university and colleges. With a potential total of 37 students starting university or college in 2025 or later, this represents a significant financial commitment for which reserves will be necessary.

Urafiki has received generous donations from sponsors who have expressed a wish to support particular areas of activity. These include facilities for hair and beauty training, an initiative to improve small scale agriculture and projects to improve local water supply and quality. Whilst the funds to support these projects were donated during 2024 and earlier years, some of the expenditure will take place in 2025 and later years.

Together with the Yala NGO team, we have identified a number of needs and opportunities which, over the next few years, will be likely to give rise to additional capital expenditure.

Given the continuing expenditure, additional capital projects and other issues noted the trustees have reviewed the level of reserves and believe that they are in accordance with the policy set.

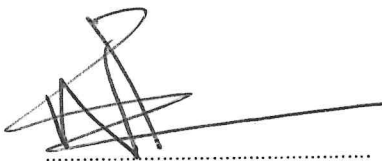

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Projects Supported

Projects in Yala, Kenya

Urafiki has been supporting projects in Kenya for many years by awarding grants (gifts) to our partner organisation in Kenya, which is known as Urafiki Community Linkage NGO (NGO). The NGO is a formally registered Kenyan legal entity with similar status and objects to a UK charity. The NGO works with the very deprived local community in Yala, to identify needs and provide support and solutions by setting up and managing various projects.

Although Urafiki and the NGO are separate organisations with different roles and a different geography, they work in very close collaboration. The ways of working together are based on a common purpose and shared values. Both organisations believe in the importance of education and employment to alleviate poverty. The organisations work in partnership, have built very close and trusting relationships over the years and value each other's ideas and thoughts. Above all there is total trust and with that comes the ability to challenge and listen deeply to each other's perspectives.

Accountability to funders is of course crucial. The trustees make regular visits to Kenya and make weekly Skype calls to liaise with the NGO directors. The NGO finds vulnerable children and adults who require support. The number of adults and children who are to be supported by each project is agreed each year. The directors of the NGO then produce detailed budgets setting out the expected cost of supporting these people. Urafiki then raises money from sponsors and donors in the UK and other countries to fund the work carried out by the NGO. We attempt to match individuals in need in Kenya to specific donors in the UK and elsewhere. In addition the team in Yala identifies community priorities such as housing or the training of young people and liaises with the UK charity about the possibility of funding these activities on a project basis.

In 2022 £200,043 was sent to Kenya in cash and/or goods to finance the schemes described below.

Education Sponsorship Scheme Yala, Kenya

This scheme has seen considerable expansion since it was established. At the end of 2022/ beginning of 2023, it had over 223 sponsored secondary school students. 80 students completed their secondary education in 2022. 34 post- secondary students then moved onto voluntary work in the Yala community whilst awaiting places at university. Other students sought employment. The scheme's success reflects the hard work of the students; the support provided by the Yala NGO team and the continuing generosity of sponsors. We anticipate that the success of these students will continue to have a positive impact on the whole community in Yala by raising the aspirations of other young people who are growing up in poverty.

Feeding Scheme, Yala, Kenya

This scheme continues to support 135 people who are in need of support due to their advanced age and/or their HIV/Aids status. There is a monthly gathering of the people on this scheme who are given a communal meal. At the conclusion of the meeting, they are provided with a bag of staple foods to take home.

Home Rebuilding Scheme, Yala, Kenya

The home rebuilding programme continued and saw the rebuilding or reroofing of 15 homes. Much of the building work was completed by NGO students who, having completed school, volunteered to assist the qualified masons and the community through this rebuilding work.

Orphans and Vulnerable Children Scheme

Numbers on the scheme remain stable with around 120 sponsored children. Eve Muliango and the team continue to provide excellent support to the children.

Children with Disabilities scheme

8 children are on the scheme and are benefitting hugely from educational opportunities. The Yala team have succeeded in obtaining places in suitable schools for the children and have also managed to arrange transport for them. It is hoped that by educating children with disabilities, the community's attitudes towards disadvantaged children may change.

Hair and Beauty Scheme.

This scheme was established to provide some less academic former primary and secondary student leavers and women without skills in the community with the opportunity to obtain marketable skills. The hair and beauty programme is thriving with the 2022 course full already.

Agriculture

The Urafiki NGO in Kenya has long been looking for ways of making the community more sustainable. The year 2022 saw the fourth cycle of a programme to improve agriculture practices and outputs with the aim of making small farmers independent. Led by Urafiki graduates Simon and Mercy, the project is going very well with the scale increasing gradually. It started with 10 farmers, expanded to 25, then 65 and is now up to 300. Farmers are provided with a mix of grants and loans with the aim of repayments coming from increased harvests. Trustees are optimistic that one day, an expanded agriculture scheme could cover a large proportion of Yala households transforming the lives of those families and of the whole community. There has been increased emphasis on evaluation and the data shows that, on average, farmers saw harvests which were 102% bigger than the year before.

Water Improvement project

Access to clean water is a daily challenge for most of the people in Yala. Obtaining their supplies often involves arduous journeys and the water sources are often erratic and contaminated. A major project is under way to improve this dreadful situation. Starting with a survey, it was possible to identify multiple sites across the area where springs were used. Unfortunately, most of the springs were difficult to use and the water was sullied by people and animals. A total of 42 sites were improved by the project using local labour and volunteers and with the work being led by a Urafiki graduate. Detailed assessment of each site has been carried out, revealing that 29 of the sites offer both excellent flow and good water quality. Other sites, though less successful, still provide a better water supply than was available earlier. The evaluation report also identified that at least 250,000 hours per year are saved by families being able to obtain their water nearer to home. The results are palpable with far fewer women and girls (they tend to do most of the water carrying in Yala) visible at the roadside. Hours released in this way can be used for other purposes such as education, paid work and caring for family members.

INCOME

Donations

The overwhelming majority of Urafiki's work is supported by donations, including the hundreds of people who make regular contributions to support named individuals. Huge thanks to everyone for their generosity over such a long period of time. 2022 was a difficult year to have social gatherings as we all recovered from Covid 19 restrictions. We thank everyone for their loyalty during this time.

Legacies

During the 2022 year legacies totalling £9,050 were received from the estates of 2 deceased persons. We are very grateful that Urafiki was included as a beneficiary. These gifts will do so much good work for the people in Yala.

Fundraising and awareness raising events

During the year we held a number of events including coffee mornings, books and mince pie sales and a chess afternoon. Many thanks to everyone who worked on and contributed to the success of these events.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Charity's Policy on Reserves

As at 31 December 2022 we held cash at the bank totalling £125,922. Of this, £17,774 was in restricted funds with £108,148 in general unrestricted funds. In addition, we expected to receive around £90,000 from gift aid claims, which were available, but not claimed at the year end. Total unrestricted reserves at the year-end were £198,148.

Our policy is to keep unrestricted funds to a minimum but we recognise that the charity needs to have a contingency to cover possible unexpected costs arising from: unexpected exchange rate movements; demands for emergency additional funding caused by poor rains or food price increases and the financial impact of election related violence. We also need to maintain reserves to cover students who are partway through their education when sponsors have contributed the full cost of their education in advance. Due to the success of the secondary scheme there are increasing numbers of students going to university. With a potential total of 34 students starting university or college later in 2023, this represents a significant financial commitment for which reserves will be necessary.

Urafiki has received generous donations from sponsors who have expressed a wish to support particular areas of activity. These include facilities for hair and beauty training, an initiative to improve small scale agriculture and projects to improve local water supply and quality. Whilst the funds to support these projects were donated during 2022 and earlier years, some of the expenditure will take place in 2023 and later years.

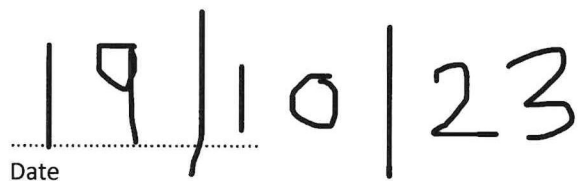
Together with the Yala NGO team, we have identified a number of needs and opportunities which, over the next few years, will be likely to give rise to additional capital expenditure.

Trustees are optimistic that one day, an expanded agriculture scheme could cover a large proportion of Yala households transforming the lives of those families and of the whole community.

Solar Lamps

Many people in Yala still use kerosene lamps. This form of lighting is dirty, potentially carcinogenic, sometimes burns users and is expensive. By contrast, solar lamps are environmentally friendly, cheap to run and encourage students to spend more time completing their homework. During the year, lamps were provided to all the new secondary students and to the final year students on the OVC scheme.

Water Improvement project

Access to clean water is a daily challenge for most of the people in Yala. Obtaining their supplies often involves arduous journeys and the water sources are often erratic and contaminated. A major project is under way to improve this dreadful situation. Starting with a survey, it was possible to identify multiple sites across the area where springs were used. Unfortunately, most of the springs were difficult to use and the water was sullied by people and animals. 20 of the sites were improved during the year, using local labour and volunteers and with the work being led by a Urafiki graduate. Each site, when improved, is left in the care of a local committee which has been fully engaged in the process. We believe that around 3000 people each day have access to improved water supplies as a result of this scheme.

INCOME

Donations

The overwhelming majority of Urafiki's work is supported by donations, including the hundreds of people who make regular contributions to support named individuals. Huge thanks to everyone for their generosity over such a long period of time. 2021 was a difficult year to have social gatherings due to Covid 19 restrictions. We thank everyone for their loyalty during this time.

Legacies

During the 2021 year legacies totalling £37,052 were received from the estates of 3 deceased persons. We are very grateful that Urafiki was included as a beneficiary. These gifts will do so much good work for the people in Yala.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Charity's Policy on Reserves

As at 31 December 2021 we held cash at the bank totalling £117,688. Of this, £17,739 was in restricted funds with £99,949 in general unrestricted funds. In addition, we expected to receive around £90,000 from gift aid claims, which were available, but not claimed at the year end. Total unrestricted reserves at the year-end were £189,949.

Our policy is to keep unrestricted funds to a minimum but we recognise that the charity needs to have a contingency to cover possible unexpected costs arising from: unexpected exchange rate movements; demands for emergency additional funding caused by poor rains or food price increases and the financial impact of election related violence. We also need to maintain reserves to cover students who are partway through their education when sponsors have contributed the full cost of their education in advance. Due to the success of the secondary scheme there are increasing numbers of students going to university. With a potential total of 30 students starting university or college later in 2022, this represents a significant financial commitment for which reserves will be necessary.

Urafiki has received generous donations from sponsors who have expressed a wish to support particular areas of activity. These include facilities for hair and beauty training, an initiative to improve small scale agriculture and projects to improve local water supply and quality. Whilst the funds to support these projects were donated during 2021 and earlier years, some of the expenditure will take place in 2022 and later years.

We are mindful that the coronavirus pandemic is still a very significant problem for the local community and that higher than normal transfers of funds may need to be sent to Yala to provide additional assistance.

Together with the Yala NGO team, we have identified a number of needs and opportunities which, over the next few years, will be likely to give rise to additional capital expenditure.

Given the continuing expenditure, additional capital projects and uncertainty surrounding our response to Covid-19 issues, the trustees have reviewed the level of reserves and believe that they are in accordance with the policy set.

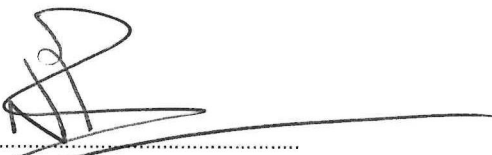

Projects Supported

Projects in Yala, Kenya

Urafiki has been supporting projects in Kenya for many years by awarding grants (gifts) to our partner organisation in Kenya, which is known as Urafiki Community Linkage NGO (NGO). The NGO is a formally registered Kenyan legal entity with similar status and objects to a UK charity. The NGO works with the very deprived local community in Yala, to identify needs and provide support and solutions by setting up and managing various projects.

Although Urafiki and the NGO are separate organisations with different roles and a different geography, they work in very close collaboration. The ways of working together are based on a common purpose and shared values. Both organisations believe in the importance of education and employment to alleviate poverty. The organisations work in partnership, have built very close and trusting relationships over the years and value each other's ideas and thoughts. Above all there is total trust and with that comes the ability to challenge and listen deeply to each other's perspectives.

Accountability to funders is of course crucial. The trustees make regular visits to Kenya and make weekly Skype calls to liaise with the NGO directors. The NGO finds vulnerable children and adults who require support. The number of adults and children who are to be supported by each project is agreed each year. The directors of the NGO then produce detailed budgets setting out the expected cost of supporting these people. Urafiki then raises money from sponsors and donors in the UK and other countries to fund the work carried out by the NGO. We attempt to match individuals in need in Kenya to specific donors in the UK and elsewhere. In addition the team in Yala identifies community priorities such as housing or the training of young people and liaises with the UK charity about the possibility of funding these activities on a project basis.

In 2020 £310,128 was sent to Kenya to support over 750 people on the following schemes.

Education Sponsorship Scheme Yala, Kenya

This scheme has seen considerable expansion since it was established. At the end of 2020, it had over 275 sponsored secondary school students. 52 students are due to complete their secondary education in March 2021. The delay in completing their final school year was due to the Covid lockdown in Kenya. Some post-secondary students will then move onto doing voluntary work in the Yala community whilst they are awaiting places at university. Other students will look for employment. The scheme's success reflects the hard work of the students; the support provided by the Yala NGO team and the continuing generosity of sponsors. We anticipate that the success of these students will continue to have a positive impact on the whole community in Yala by raising the aspirations of other young people who are growing up in poverty.

Feeding Scheme, Yala, Kenya

This scheme continues to support 150 people who are in need of support due to their advanced age and/or their HIV/Aids status. There is a monthly gathering of the people on this scheme who are given a communal meal. At the conclusion of the meeting, they are provided with a bag of staple foods to take home.

Home Rebuilding Scheme, Yala, Kenya

The home rebuilding programme continued and saw the rebuilding or reroofing of 42 homes. Much of the building work was completed by NGO students who, having completed school, volunteered to assist the qualified masons and the community through this rebuilding work.

Orphans and Vulnerable Children Scheme

Having increased numbers of children on this scheme, it now remains stable with up to 250 sponsored children. Eve Muliango and the team continue to provide excellent support to the children.

Children with Disabilities scheme

12 children are on the scheme and are benefitting hugely from educational opportunities. The Yala team have succeeded in obtaining places in suitable schools for the children and have also managed to arrange transport for them. 3 younger children are also receiving monthly transport so they can travel for physiotherapy support. It is hoped that by educating children with disabilities, the community's attitudes towards disadvantaged children may change.

Children who are Deaf

Urafiki obtained initial funding for a small school for deaf children. Two classrooms were built and 3 excellent teachers recruited. 24 deaf children were supported during 2020.

Tailoring, Hair and Beauty Schemes.

These schemes were established to provide some less academic former primary, secondary student leavers and women without skills in the community with the opportunity to obtain marketable skills. Teachers have been recruited, sewing machines and other equipment were sent to Yala in the first container. The hair and beauty programme is thriving with the 2021 course full already. 10 tailoring students are waiting to take their exams in the later part of 2021 and also to make uniforms for the children at primary school.

Agriculture

The Urafiki NGO in Kenya has long been looking for ways of making the community more sustainable. The year 2020 saw the second and third cycles of a programme to improve agriculture practices and outputs with the aim of making small farmers independent. Led by Urafiki graduates Selene and Mercy, the project is going very well with the scale increasing gradually. It started with 10 farmers, expanded to 25 and is now up to 60. Farmers are provided with a mix of grants and loans with the aim of repayments coming from increased harvests. Trustees are optimistic that one day, an expanded agriculture scheme could cover a large proportion of Yala households transforming the lives of those families and of the whole community.

Emergency feeding appeal

Initially the community in Yala was not affected by the Coronavirus. Kenya had very low numbers of cases and none in the region where Yala is located. The immediate 8 month school lockdown and other restrictions imposed by the Kenyan Government were a different matter. The local economy closed down and many people faced starvation. Nancy and the NGO leadership team led a response and provided emergency feeding to the old people already on the feeding scheme and the families of the secondary students and orphans and vulnerable children. This expenditure was funded by a one-off appeal. Urafiki supporters are thanked for their generosity – the target of £30,000 was reached within a week.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Charity's Policy on Reserves

As at 31 December 2020 we held cash at the bank totalling £157,189. Of this, £17,730 was in restricted funds with £139,459 in general unrestricted funds. In addition, we expected to receive around £65,000 from gift aid claims, which were available, but not claimed at the year end. Total unrestricted reserves at the year-end were £204,459.

The total of unrestricted reserves including gift aid receivable shows a decrease of £58,645 over the previous year. One of the reasons for this decrease is that trustees would usually transfer to the Kenya NGO around £80,000 in late December to ensure that funds are in place in January for the payment of substantial school fees and other significant early year payments. However, the December 2019 payment was not made until January 2020 which made the reserve balance appear higher than usual at the 31 December 2019 year end. With the normal large payments resuming at the end of 2020 the unusual increase in funds at 31 December 2019 has reversed to some extent.

Our policy is to keep unrestricted funds to a minimum but we recognise that the charity needs to have a contingency to cover possible unexpected costs arising from: unexpected exchange rate movements; demands for emergency additional funding caused by poor rains or food price increases and the financial impact of election related violence. We also need to maintain reserves to cover students who are partway through their education when sponsors have contributed the full cost of their education in advance. Due to the success of the secondary scheme there are increasing numbers of students going to university. With a potential total of 22 students starting university or college later in 2021, this represents a significant financial commitment for which reserves will be necessary.

Urafiki has received generous donations from sponsors who have expressed a wish to support particular areas of activity. No remuneration directly or indirectly out of funds of the charity was paid or payable for the year to any Trustee or to any person or persons known to be connected with any of them.

The only expenses reimbursed are for purchases made on behalf of the charity.

3. RESTRICTED FUNDS

The balance of restricted funds on hand at the beginning and end of the year arose from a major donation in 2011. Receipts and payments in the year are detailed in the Trustees' Report.

The balance of the fund will be used when further suitable projects have been identified with the original donor.
