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The Trustees present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of the charitable company (RCCG) for the year 1 January 2023 to 31 December 2023. This Annual Report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' Report and a Directors' Report under company law. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and Financial Statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019) as amended by Update Bulletin 1 (effective January 2019).

Since the charitable company qualifies as a small company under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the Strategic report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted.

**Structure, Governance and Management**

**1. CONSTITUTION**

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 27th October 2000, as revised on 5th of January 2001. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which stipulates the objects and powers of the charitable company and is also a registered charity with the charity number 1084767.

There have been no changes in the objects since the last Annual Report.

**2. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

The management of the charitable company is the responsibility of the Board of Trustees, who are appointed and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association. A full-time Continental Executive Director manages the Charitable company's day-to-day administration and reports the charitable company's affairs to the Trustees. The Trustees also meet regularly to meet their obligations and statutory duties.

**3. POLICIES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

No new trustees were appointed to the existing Board in the year under review. The existing Trustees are seeking to identify potential new trustees with skills and expertise to contribute to the growth of the charity. Potential trustees or newly appointed members of the Board of Trustees will be required to go through an induction process. The process comprises an initial meeting with the Chair and other Trustees, followed by a series of short sessions with the Continental Executive Director on the charity's objects and the Trustees' roles and duties. A Trustees' Induction Pack will be provided to the Trustee, which includes RCCG's governing document, the Trustees' Report, Charity Commission Guidelines such as Doc CC3 and C11, on the Essential Trustee: What You Need to Know and the Trustees Expenses and Payment. Periodically, RCCG organises training events, conferences and seminars to further enhance the trustees' governance skills.

**4. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING**

- Whilst the RCCG Worldwide is spearheaded by the inspirational visionary Pastor E. A. Adeboye, the Board of Trustees is the governing body of RCCG in the United Kingdom and is independent of any external influence within or outside the UK.
- RCCG's organisational structure has evolved due to its operations in Europe, and the charity is known as Continental Europe 9 for administrative purposes. The Continental Executive Director, along with other staff at the Central Office, works to deliver the Trustees' goals, vision, and mission.
- RCCG's governance is solely in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Association.

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Hence, RCCG is organised so that the Board of Trustees meets regularly to manage its affairs and meet its legal obligations. The day-to-day administration of RCCG is delegated to the Continental Executive Director, who reports the affairs of RCCG to the Trustees and the Chairman.

**5. THE ARRANGEMENTS FOR SETTING THE PAY AND REMUNERATION OF THE CHARITABLE COMPANY'S KEY MANAGEMENT PERSONNEL AND ANY BENCHMARKS, PARAMETERS OR CRITERIA USED IN SETTING THEIR PAY.**

In the Redeemed Christian Church of God, the remuneration of the charitable company's key management personnel is guided by the following:

- a. Define the Positions: The Charitable company creates job descriptions for all the necessary roles. Most roles will require a minimum educational requirement or desirable experience.
- b. Evaluate and Rank the Positions: The Charitable company will evaluate the different roles regarding difficulty and responsibility. Senior roles with more responsibility would attract higher pay.
- c. Monetary Value: To assign a monetary value on the job, RCCG looks at the market rates and what other charities might be offering before making a decision on salaries.
- d. Maintain the Plan: The salary of the RCCG's employees is incremented annually by inflation, though this was not implemented this year.

**6. RISK MANAGEMENT**

- a. The Board of Trustees has implemented an evaluation approach to identify and assess risks to which RCCG is exposed. After identifying and reviewing these risks, systems and strategies have been established to manage those risks. The evaluation approach is tailored after a SAS matrix model: Spotting, Assessing, and Solving the risks.
- b. The significant risks to which RCCG is exposed include those relating to governance, specific operational areas, safeguarding responsibilities, and the finances of the RCCG.
- c. RCCG is reliant on donations from Parishes and individual donors. The Trustees believe that setting and monitoring reserve levels will enable the RCCG to deliver on its objectives and ensure that the charity is protected from the risk of disruption to RCCG's operation.
- d. RCCG has internal controls over critical financial systems, which continue to monitor and examine the operational and business risks faced by RCCG; the Trustees have established effective systems to mitigate those risks.

**7. PERSONS WITH SIGNIFICANT CONTROL REGISTER**

Further to the provisions of Part 21A of the Companies Act 2006 relating to individuals with significant control over the company and relevant legal entities (RLEs), the charitable company is not aware of any registrable person or registrable legal entity with significant control over the charitable company.

**8. OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

**a. POLICIES AND OBJECTIVES**

The principal objects of the Redeemed Christian Church of God, as set out in the charitable company's memorandum of association, are the advancement of the Christian faith worldwide and the relief of poverty.

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**b. STRATEGIES FOR ACHIEVING OBJECTIVES**

The charitable company has adopted the following strategies for achieving the above objectives:

- i. Church planting within the United Kingdom and Continental Europe.
- ii. Recruitment, training and the deployment of ministers on the mission field.
- iii. Organising conferences, events, and training to guide, train and inspire ministers.
- iv. Assessment, selection and ordination of new ministers.
- v. Administrative support for affiliated Charities and Christian events; and
- vi. Financial support for affiliated Charities and Mission Agencies in the UK and Overseas.

**c. ACTIVITIES FOR ACHIEVING OBJECTIVES**

RCCG, as a Christian faith charity, can testify and give glory to God in all its activities throughout the year 2023. The activities for achieving the charity's objectives include funding to support charities, providing welfare support to members, and holding conferences, training, and events.

- i. FREGH** RCCG is using a strategic initiative called FREGH as a catalyst for church planting, church growth and church development. FREGH is an acronym for (Family Church, Reproducing Church, Emerging Leaders, Governing Church and Healthy Church).
- ii. Vision 2032** - RCCG charity is part of the global vision launched by Christian leaders in Amsterdam, Netherlands, to preach the gospel to everyone by 2032 to advance the Christian faith. The charity launched a Month of Explosive Growth Drive in July 2024 in the UK.
- iii. Let's Go-A-Fishing** – This is one of the long-standing missional and church-planting initiatives of RCCG. Let's Go-A-Fishing was introduced in the UK in December 2023 and continentally in 2024. New parishes have been planted through the Let's-Go-A-Fishing programme.
- iv. Chaplaincy** – RCCG continues to provide and support prison chaplains. The charity was recently appointed as an Endorsing Authority to the Ministry of Defence to provide military chaplains. This appointment will enable RCCG to demonstrate the love of God through the delivery of pastoral care and spiritual support to members of the armed forces, irrespective of their faith.
- v. Programmes** - During the year, RCCG organised a series of programmes such as the Continental Ordained Ministers Conference, UK & Europe Prayer Meetings, RCCG Ecumenism Week, Week Of Prayer For Christian Unity, Pastors Assembly, Safeguarding Training, Personal Assistants' And Church Administrators' Conference, Man Up Training Course, Europe Continent Leadership Conference, Teenagers' Teachers' Conference, Sunday School Conference, Strategic Training On Awareness Of Regulations (STAR) Webinar and Conference, Social Action Week, Christian Media And Communicators' Conference, Education Week (For Education Ministries in RCCG) and Workers' Rally.

All these programmes were designed in alignment with the charity's objects and in support of RCCG Parishes.

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The RCCG continues to receive contributions from its parishes, which were used to finance its Central Office, support parishes, and finance mission (evangelistic) work locally and worldwide.

**d. PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT**

The Board of Trustees has met its duties in complying with the provisions of sections 4 and 17 of the Charities Act 2011, having due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit. Consideration has been given to the Charity Commission's public advice on advancing religion for the public benefit. All activities enable RCCG to fulfil its objective of advancing the Christian faith.

**9. ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

- RCCG acquired a 35-acre Christian campground in the United Kingdom for the charity's purposes. It also contributed to the social transformation and economic development of the community and businesses in the area.
- The number of Parishes in the UK has grown to 903 as of July 2024.
- The Charity is grateful for the generous efforts of its volunteers involved in service provision; it is estimated that over 4,000 volunteer hours were provided during the year. If this is valued at £10.42 an hour, the volunteer effort exceeds £41,680.

**a. REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES**

RCCG serves as an administrative and resource hub for Churches and Charities operating with the RCCG name in the UK. In addition, it supports other local and global activities to advance the Christian Faith and relieve poverty worldwide.

In the year under review, the RCCG engaged in various activities to benefit the public.

**Some of such activities are summarised below:**

**i. RCCG Europe Continental, Regional Structure and new church plants**

- The charity continues to plant new churches both in the U.K. and oversees the planting, growth, revitalisation, reviving and equipping of RCCG Parishes in Europe.
- The RCCG continues to use the regional structures established in 2021 to embark on and support outreach projects. The projects include the Youth Strategy retreat and the Europe Continent Leadership Conference, focusing on raising outreach awareness and leadership training in the UK and the European mainland.

**ii. Mission to Israel - Festival of Life Israel, the Feast of Tabernacles and Light Up Tel Aviv Conference**

- In line with RCCG's objective of advancing the Christian faith worldwide, the charity held prayer meetings and evangelistic outreaches in Israel in 2023.
- The Mission outreach to Israel is significant and in line with the first Holy Ghost Service as recorded in the Bible in Acts of the Apostles Chapter 2:1-12.

**iii. Festival of Life, Slovakia**

- Festival of Life is a non-denominational event held by RCCG Parishes in partnership with Festival of Life in the United Kingdom.
- The RCCG financially supported the hosting of the Festival of Life (FOL) in Bratislava. The

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hosting of the FOL Bratislava is in line with RCCG's Ecumenical Statement of promoting Christian unity and advancing the Christian faith worldwide.

**iv. EUROCON 2024 - Spain**

- EUROCON is a bi-annual cross-cultural gathering of Christians across Europe with a united vision to advance the Christian faith and to bring people of different cultures together.
- EUROCON is a cooperation of The Redeemed Christian Church of God with other Christian denominations to train, equip, and commission Christians to go into their sphere of influence and spread the gospel effectively.

**v. RCCG Affiliated Churches**

- RCCG's partnership and support for RCCG-affiliated churches continues to drive our core objective of advancing the Christian faith worldwide by prioritising Evangelism within the RCCG Mission in the UK and RCCG Europe Continent.
- RCCG continues to advance the Christian faith by spearheading and organising prayer conferences, leadership retreats and workshops, evangelism training, and financial assistance to support the parishes in acquiring properties to further the Christian faith.
- The cost of living crisis also caused an increase in requests for financial assistance by RCCG Affiliated Parishes to support the acquisition of permanent places of worship due to inflation and the continued economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

**vi. Chaplaincies**

- RCCG continues to support our Pastors in the Prison Chaplaincy.
- RCCG was appointed as an Endorsing Authority to recruit chaplains into His Majesty's Armed Forces in the United Kingdom. The Army Chaplain will enable our Pastors to deliver pastoral care and spiritual support to our soldiers and their families.

**vii. Feast of Esther – Women Leadership Conference**

- The Feast of Esther is a strategic resource for the Christian woman in leadership in the Church. The Feast of Esther aims to empower female Leaders of Christian Ministries, their female assistants, and female heads of ministries, especially within the Evangelical Community.
- The Feast of Esther empowers female leaders to be better examples of believers.
- This initiative helps these women provide mentorship and support to other women in their ministries. This is done by coaching the women on developing excellent ministry skills that will impact the Church of God. RCCG continues to support this initiative financially for their annual events.

**viii. Christ the Redeemer College**

- RCCG continues to support educational establishments in advancing the Christian faith.
- Christ the Redeemer College (CRC) is an educational institution established to provide vocational and higher education to people who will become leaders who serve people with quality and distinction, whether within ministry, business or public service.
- RCCG continues to ensure that Ministers serve the public with high-quality and high-value education in leadership and Christian ministry.
- The training at the CRC enables RCCG Ministers to communicate the Christian faith in a contemporary environment and to be effective leaders and witnesses to the general public.

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**ix. Community Safety Education**

- The beliefs of RCCG stem from the scriptures, which state that Children are a gift from God, and as such, they should be protected from risks that may be detrimental to their well-being. This will create an environment where they can aspire to reach their full God-given potential.
- The CSE promotes the personal, social, health and economic well-being of young people throughout the UK.
- RCCG made a financial donation to CSE's 'Money Wise' financial literacy programme, which provided financial education for the youth in two schools in Stevenage.

**x. Pastors, Trustees & Key Staff Legal Compliance Resourcing**

- Further to the support given to RCCG-affiliated churches, these churches require ongoing governance training and resources to ensure robust compliance.
- RCCG has continued discharging various projects under its STAR (Strategic Training on Awareness of Regulations) initiative. This initiative includes a series of webinars, a STAR conference, and training toolkits to provide governance support and resources to the Pastors, Trustees and Key Staff of RCCG-affiliated churches.
- The STAR Conference in the year under review focused on Effective Governance, and training was given by the Chartered Governance and Compliance Professionals. The training centred on the Charity Governance Code to ensure the effectiveness of RCCG Board of Trustees.
- A Governance Improvement Plan was also given to the attendees to enable them to note areas of improvement and take proper action.
- This training has been beneficial to RCCG Parishes, and it continues to reduce governance risk, thereby ensuring that the resources of these charities are appropriately managed and used for the benefit of the public.

**xi. Safeguarding Training**

- The Trustees' duty of protecting people and safeguarding responsibilities is a governance priority. This duty is fundamental to the operations of the RCCG and RCCG Affiliated Churches.
- RCCG conducted in-person Safeguarding and Child Protection training session in the year under review.
- The Safeguarding training emphasises the need to promote good practice and ensure that everyone involved in providing support and activities to children and young people in RCCG understands their responsibility to protect the children/young people and those who use our services.
- Training was also given on taking appropriate and immediate action if there are suggestions that a child/young person is being abused.
- Attendees were also trained on how to respond in a supportive manner to any child/young person who alleges or discloses that abuse is happening and how to minimise opportunities for misunderstanding by following a code of conduct.

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**10. INVESTMENT POLICY AND PERFORMANCE**

- As far as possible, funds will be retained in interest-bearing accounts. The Board of Trustees continues to explore other safe investment strategies to ensure better returns. Previous dialogues with the charitable company Investment managers have not evolved to a stage where the trustees felt that the decision would be in the best interest of the charitable company.
- In addition, the Trustees are looking at investment options based on the requisite legal and financial advice/guidance, and an informed decision will be made in due course.

**11. FACTORS RELEVANT TO ACHIEVE OBJECTIVES**

Spiritual inspiration and financial responsibility are key factors in achieving our objectives. This is because supporting all the necessary activities needed to achieve our objectives can mostly be done by godly inspiration and sufficient finance and accountability.

**I. Review of Financial position at the end of the reporting period**

- RCCG continues to perform better than expected in the reporting year. RCCG is mainly funded by donations from churches that usually hold in-person and online services.
- RCCG continues to resource, enable and organise virtual trainings/conferences for the parishes on how to hold services online. The RCCG also assisted with information on the various methods of collecting donations online, which enabled the expected income to stabilise.

**II. Reserve Policy**

- The Board of Trustees have implemented a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the charitable company should be six (6) months of annual expenditure.
- These reserve levels would be able to continue the current activities of the charitable company in the event of a significant drop in funding. The free reserve for the year is £768,902.  
The free reserves was used in acquiring the campground which was purchased at £5m. The charity has a large amount in its reserves with the view of acquiring a camp which has been the vision for the past 20 years.  
In the year 2023, RCCG UK entered into negotiations with the Christian Trust (Ellel Ministries) to purchase its property located in Farnham. The property set in an area of approximately 35 acres of land in Farnham consisting of a mixture of listed and non-listed building, accommodation building, conference hall, classrooms, swimming pool, dining hall and other ancillary buildings.  
The charity is confident that the free reserves target would be met because of the increase in parishes which translates to increase in donations. Also, the charity continues to ensure it is prudent in its expenditures for the year.
- The Board of Trustees periodically reviews its reserves policy in light of the wider strategic plans. This is to ensure that the reserve level is appropriate to our current position and annual expenditure and to take into full cognisance the charitable company's future strategic plans.

**III. Principal Funding**

This is provided mainly through contributions and donations from RCCG-affiliated Churches.

**FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

- RCCG's strategy primarily hinges on the growth of the RCCG-affiliated Churches and establishing more churches in the UK and Continental Europe. Hence, the Charity's plans are still hinged on planting 1000 Parishes and RCCG Vision 2032.
- RCCG will continue to use FREGH to express its future development and growth.
- The rise in technological advancement has paved an opportunity to leverage virtual fellowships and movements that have the potential to become vibrant churches.
- Leadership development remains central to the vision of transforming our communities spiritually and socially in the United Kingdom. Well-trained leaders will make for a flourishing church organisation.
- Furthermore, RCCG will remain ready to provide financial and administrative support to like-minded initiatives, whether churches, non-governmental organisations, events, festivals or conferences from diverse groups from the UK and around the world, which are inspired by the ultimate vision of advancing the Christian Faith and its tenets around the world.

**MEMBER'S LIABILITY**

The Board of Trustees of the charitable company guarantees to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 to the assets of the church in the event of winding up.

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**Board of Trustees' Responsibilities Statement**

The Board of Trustees (who are also directors of Redeemed Christian Church of God for the purposes of Company law) are responsible for preparing the Board of Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (The United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Board of Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under Company law the Board of Trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP (FRS 102);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards (FRS 102) have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is appropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue operating.

The Board of Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

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**INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF REDEEMED CHRISTIAN CHURCH OF GOD**

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**Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of Redeemed Christian Church of God (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 December 2023 which comprise the Statement of financial activities, the Balance sheet, the Statement of cash flows and the related notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion the financial statements:

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**1. General information**

Redeemed Christian Church of God ('RCCG') is a charitable company registered with the Companies House and Charity Commission in England & Wales. The office address is Redemption House, Gunnels Wood Park, Gunnels Wood Road, Stevenage, Hertfordshire SG1 2TA.

**2. Accounting policies**

**2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Redeemed Christian Church of God meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

**2.2 Going concern**

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the cashflow forecast and the projected income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The level of free reserves and funds held is sufficient for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

**2.3 Income**

All income is recognised once the charitable company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

**2.4 Expenditure**

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the charitable company's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

**2.5 Government grants**

Government grants relating to tangible fixed assets are treated as deferred income and released to the Statement of financial activities over the expected useful lives of the assets concerned. Other grants are credited to the Statement of financial activities as the related expenditure is incurred.

**2.6 Interest receivable**

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charitable company; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the institution with whom the funds are deposited.

**2.7 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation**

Tangible fixed assets costing £500 or more are capitalised and recognised when future economic benefits are probable and the cost or value of the asset can be measured reliably.

Tangible fixed assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. All costs incurred to bring a tangible fixed asset into its intended working condition should be included in the measurement of cost.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of tangible fixed assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, .

Depreciation is provided on the following bases:

Freehold property	- 2% straight line
Long-term leasehold property	- 2% straight line
Motor vehicles	- 25% reducing balance
Fixtures and fittings	- 10% straight line
Office equipment	- 33.33% straight line

**2.8 Investments**

Fixed asset investments are a form of financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction cost and subsequently measured at fair value at the Balance sheet date, unless the value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment. Investment gains and losses, whether realised or unrealised, are combined and presented as 'Gains/(Losses) on investments' in the Statement of financial activities.

Investments in subsidiaries are valued at cost less provision for impairment.

**2.9 Stocks**

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for obsolete and slow-moving stocks. Cost includes all direct costs and an appropriate proportion of fixed and variable overheads.

**2.10 Debtors**

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

**2.11 Cash at bank and in hand**

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

**2.12 Liabilities and provisions**

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charitable company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised in the Statement of financial activities as a finance cost.

**2.13 Financial instruments**

The charitable company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

**2.14 Finance leases and hire purchase**

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts and finance leases are capitalised as tangible fixed assets. Assets acquired by finance lease are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives. Assets acquired by hire purchase are depreciated over their useful lives. Finance leases are those where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership are assumed by the charitable company. Obligations under such agreements are included in creditors, net of the finance charge allocated to future periods. The finance element of the rental payment is charged to the Statement of financial activities so as to produce a constant periodic rate of charge on the net obligation outstanding in each period.

**2.15 Pensions**

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charitable company to the fund in respect of the year.

**2.16 Fund accounting**

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charitable company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charitable company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

Part of the objective of the residential facility is to generate additional income for the charity whereby the accommodation will be available in the first instance to the United Kingdom delegates attending RCCG conferences in Nigeria.*

**Restricted funds**

This is in addition to the funds raised for the purchase maintenance and development of the Redemption Camp Pierrepont. With over 35 acres of green land and space, RCCG UK has monumental plans to transform, refurbish and maintain the estate's historic essence.
- Covenant Partners (Benevolence Offering) fund is the balance of donations received from individuals who have pledged to support the charitable company.
- The New Auditorium fund are donations received directly from individuals, specifically as personal contributions toward the completion of the Main Auditorium for Worship at the RCCG Camp Ground.
- The Lloyds Philippines Appeal Fund are donations received toward helping charitable organisations working in the Philippines.
- The Love Christmas Project Fund are donations received toward the Love Your Neighbour 'LoveChristmas' Initiative.
- The Health Village fund is donations received towards the purchase of an ECG Machine to Health Village in Nigeria.

The charitable company's resources are enough to finance these funds.
