### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The governing document of the trust is the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee.

The charity registration number is 1089668. The company registration number is 03605584.

The method of appointment or election of trustees to this charity is as follows: A prospective trustee is invited to serve in recognition of their ability to contribute to the success and development of the trust, being proposed by an existing trustee. Their curriculum vitae is then considered by a meeting of the trustees. The new trustee is then formally invited to serve by the Chairman of Trustees. Upon acceptance, the trustee is duly appointed against signature, in accordance with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, 3(b).

The principal office and registered office of the company is: Dimmer Lane, Castle Cary, Somerset, BA7 7NR.

The charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association were approved by the charity commission at the time of registration and incorporate any and all restrictions called for by that body prior to registration.

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A summary of specific investment powers and their authority is contained within the Memorandum and Articles of Association, 10 (1).

The trustees have been authorised by the charity commission to take advantage of dispensation from disclosure of the description 'Limited' in the company name.

The charity's objects are to promote the protection, preservation and improvement of the natural environment for the benefit of the public and to advance the education of the public in all environmental and ecological matters by the provision of an educational centre in Dimmer and in particular:

a) to establish, or secure the establishment of, for the benefit of the public (which term shall include individuals, commercial concerns, public bodies and every other type of entity or organisation) a centre in Dimmer to be known as Carymoor Environmental Trust ("Centre") to advance, foster and increase public knowledge, education and awareness of and interest in all matters concerning environmental and ecological issues ("Environmental Issues") and to arrange or provide for or join in arranging and providing for:

- i) research facilities;
- ii) educational and information resources, facilities and displays;
- iii) exhibitions, conferences, training courses, attractions, meetings, lectures, classes and seminars in each case connected with Environmental Issues; and
- iv) to provide a public forum or meeting place for those visiting or making use of the Centre together with ancillary recreational and refreshment facilities.

b) to maintain and promote the Centre and its objectives and facilities whether alone or in conjunction with others for the benefit of the public.

c) to promote, support, encourage and facilitate projects and developments which will produce benefits for the public through their approach to Environmental Issues; and

d) to advance public education in all aspects of sustainability including, without limitation, resource and energy use, waste, ecology, health, technology, agriculture and biodiversity.

The trustees have an organisational risk assessment and the trustees and Chief Executive are actively managing the high risk areas.

An induction programme is carried out for new trustees to allow them to meet staff members and discuss their work, and understand their roles and responsibilities as members of the Board of Trustees.

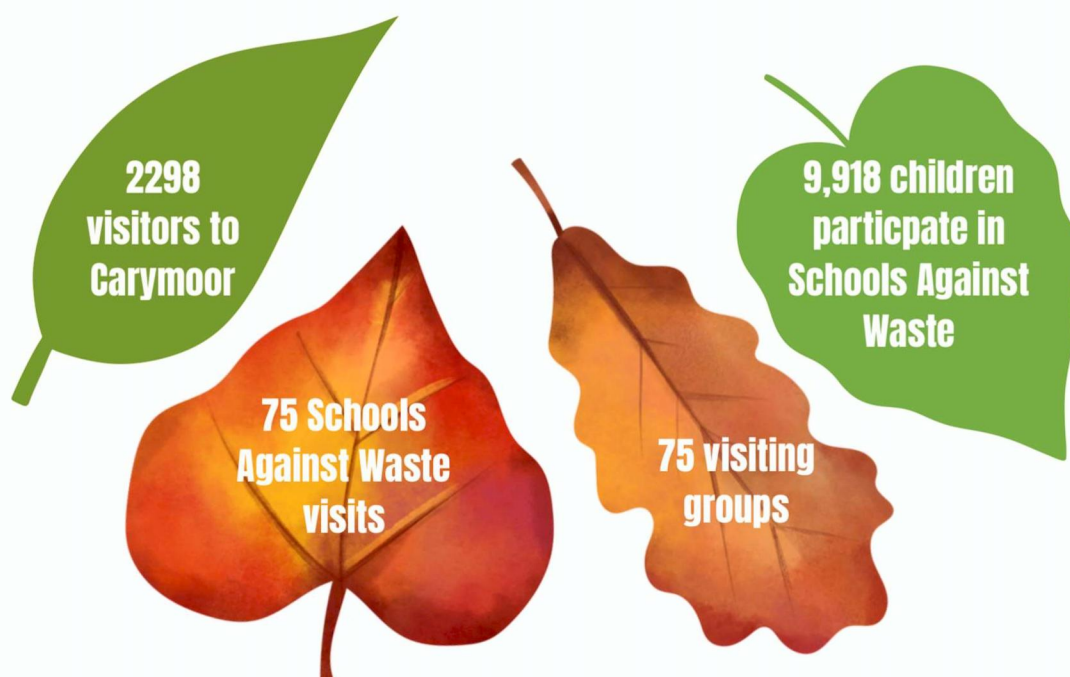


## EDUCATION



The Carymoor education team continued to provide outstanding learning experiences for schools, families, and individuals. Through our exciting range of environmental school trips, we inspired visiting children to protect and engage with the natural world, to live more sustainably, and to boost their health and wellbeing through spending time in nature. We were particularly pleased to engage with schools again following the 2021 lockdown, with schools returning on 8th March.

We saw an increase in education numbers as we began to emerge from the Covid pandemic. 2298 children (75 groups) visited during 2021-22, up from just 337 children (13 groups) during 2020-21 during the height of the pandemic.

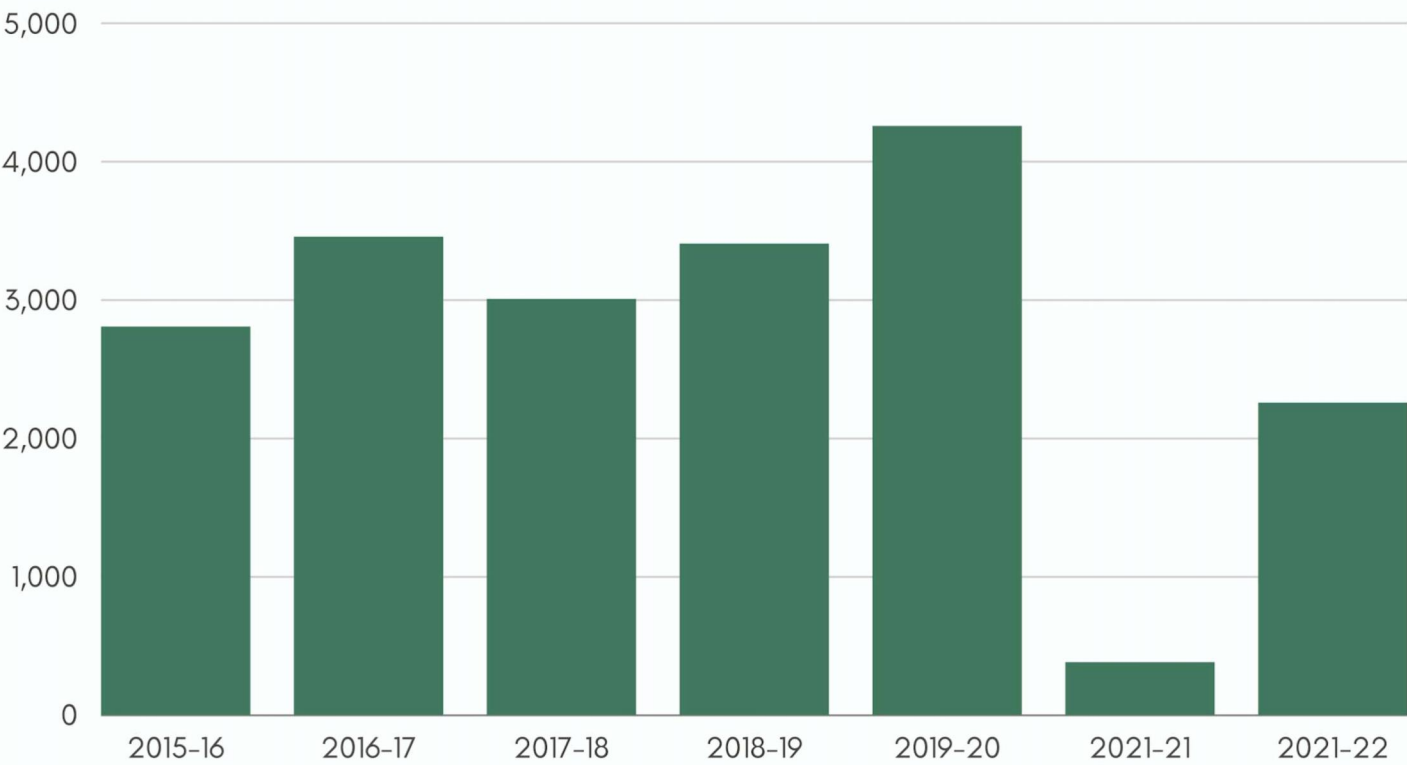
We began a year-long project project with Ditchheat Primary to provide environmental education to all classes of the school each Friday throughout the academic year.

Each class will in turn come to Carymoor for a one day a week for a half term, taking part in regular outdoor learning sessions as part of their weekly learning.

We have provided outdoor learning to help the children connect with nature, boost their empathy and team work skills, and to generally help their wellbeing.

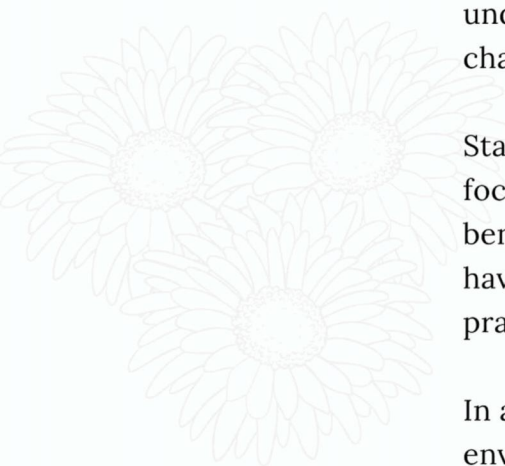
The Willow class is working on their John Muir Discovery award, which has provided a great framework for their sessions.

## EDUCATION IN A TIME OF EMERGENCY

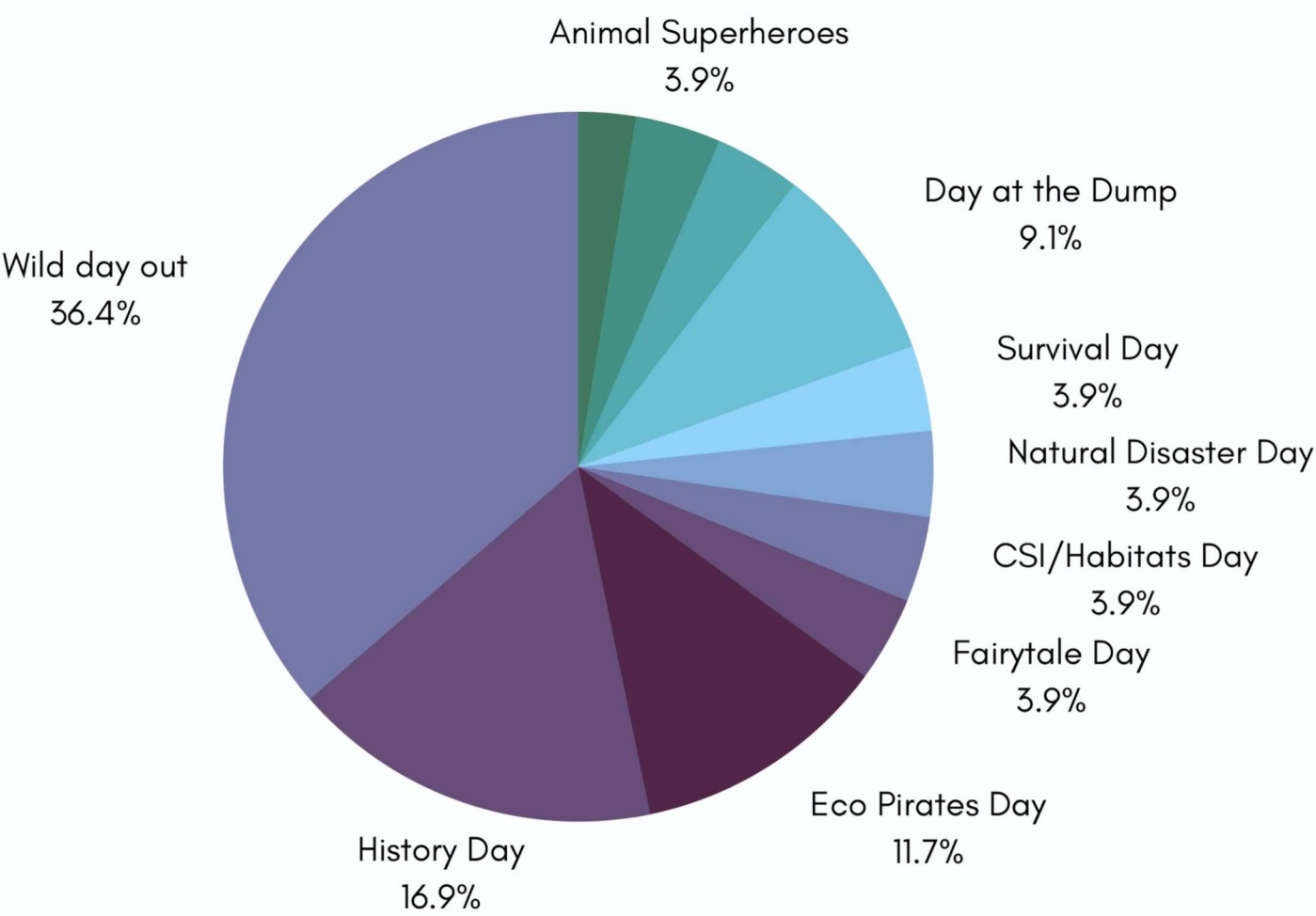


Another dimension to this project has been Carymoor’s involvement with the Education at a Time of Emergency project.

The project is being run by researchers from Exeter University who are working with environmental education practitioners to build a robust understanding of how to apply principles of pro-environmental behaviour change in practice.

Staff from Exeter University have shadowed sessions with Ditchheat and our focus has been on how we can ensure our sessions have a lasting impact and benefit. We want visiting children to adopt pro-environmental behaviours and having the input from the ETE team has been highly beneficial to adapting our practice.

In addition to this, there have been networking sessions with other environmental education organisations, giving us the opportunity to share good practice.

## SCHOOLS AGAINST WASTE

Carymoor continued its close partnership with Somerset Waste Partnership to deliver the 'Schools Against Waste' outreach education programme. The aims of this project are to encourage waste reduction, reuse, and recycling, and to encourage good waste behaviours.

Due to Covid restrictions these sessions continued to be run virtually by Zoom and Teams, with just 3 of the 75 sessions run being in person. The Carymoor education team developed great interactive sessions that managed to be energetic and impactful. The other advantage of virtual sessions is the saving of fuel and carbon. Despite this, we hope there will be a return to some physical visits in 2022-23 as clearly there are advantages to working in person.

During the year the team continued to follow the rollout of the new Recycle More service which saw plastic pots, tubs and trays, food cartons and small electricals added to the kerbside collection service. The team focused on schools in South Somerset, Somerset West and Taunton, and Sedgemoor. An amazing 9,918 children participated in the project during the year.

We expect to pass the milestone of 50,000 children having taken part in the project during 2022-23.

## SOMERSET SKILLS AND LEARNING



Thanks to funding support from Somerset Skills and Learning we were again able to offer a range of courses for adult learners and families that helped to boost health and wellbeing, and teach new skills.

Courses included rural crafts such as willow weaving, traditional conservation skills, like hedgelaying and scything, and wellbeing focused courses Unwind in the Woods and Yoga and Wellbeing. We again ran our popular Wild Tots courses, helping parents and carers to have confidence in using the outdoors as part of their child's development.

121 learners took part in courses during the year.

## COMMUNITY

Carymoor provides a range of learning opportunities to our community, including family events, adult learning, and a wide range of volunteering tasks. Our work with the community focuses on connecting families and individuals to nature, learning new skills, and improving physical and mental wellbeing.

Volunteers play a key role in all Carymoor's activities from marketing and education to practical conservation and wildlife recording. 4688 hours of volunteer time were given during the year, up from 960 hours in 2020-21. The level of community engagement has risen significantly thanks to the Nightingale Project (see Conservation section).

Carymoor took on a dedicated Marketing and Administration Officer in September 2021. This has helped to extend our reach on social media and to raise Carymoor's profile.

### VOLUNTEERING IN NUMBERS



### YOUNG CARERS

Thanks to a grant from Somerset Community Foundation we were able to were finally able to arrange actual visits to Carymoor on 20th Nov 2021 for 14 young carers and for 13 young people (5 of whom came on the first session) on 30th May 2022.

Led by Gary from our education team and supported by 2 of our excellent volunteers, the team led 2 active and hands on activity days. We ran days with a 'survival' theme with shelter building, fire lighting, cooking bread, and finishing the day around the fire for time for reflection.

YMCA staff arranged transport and brought the groups out to Carymoor, helping to supervise and support the young carers on the days.



## LEARNING FROM THE LAND



Thanks to a grant from the Petroc Community Fund, via the European Social Fund, we ran a series of 4 courses called 'Learning from the Land'.

These courses were aimed at people who were unemployed and looking to learn new skills to help them return to the workplace. The participants learnt a range of traditional conservation skills including scything, green woodworking, coppicing, as well as an introduction to ecology and environmental education.

16 people took part in a course.

CONSERVATION



Despite being a brownfield site, the Carymoor nature reserve supports a wide array of species and is the base for our education and community programmes. Our mosaic of habitats includes lowland woodland, neutral grassland, lowland calcareous grassland, hedgerows, and wetland. The reserve is a Local Wildlife Site and in 2016 won the Biodiversity Benchmark award in recognition of its benefits to wildlife. We were re-awarded the Benchmark award in 2021 following a successful audit.

In April 2021 Viridor commissioned a site survey by ecologists Lockhart Garratt to support the development of a new 5-year Biodiversity Action Plan. This plan maps out the next steps for nature at the site.

27 species of butterfly were recorded during 2021, including for the first-time a Marsh Fritillary (pictured below). It remains to be seen whether this is a one-off sighting or whether a small colony has established itself at Carymoor.



## THE NIGHTINGALE PROJECT

We were delighted to receive support from the National Lottery's Heritage Fund for our Nightingale Project. The aim of the project is to develop suitable habitat on the nature reserve to encourage this threatened bird to breed. This project delivers across all of Carymoor's principle areas of work, helping to support wildlife conservation, encouraging volunteering to help people's wellbeing, and providing education to local schools to learn more about wildlife.

The project enabled us to expand the Carymoor team, with a new dedicated Volunteer Co-Ordinator to in post to bring in new volunteers and to make contacts in our local community. Jackie Gage started with the team in December 2021. We were also able to take on a Conservation Apprentice, with Spencer Sanderson joining us in January 2022.

Over the winter 230m of ancient hedge along the reserve boundary was layed by our volunteer groups and small stretches of new hedges were planted in Upper Dauncey field and on the bank behind the visitor centre. The hedges are important features of the Carymoor reserve, providing nest sites, food and shelter for birds, invertebrates and small mammals.



During the winter and early spring, our volunteers also helped with coppicing willow and reestablishing an 8 year coppice rotation in one of the willow plots and also layering hazel in some of the woodland copses to encourage their growth.

Ron's Pond is tucked away in the south west corner of the Carymoor reserve and had become very overgrown with scrub and reeds.

The pond was excavated and reprofiled using a contractor in the early spring. Nightingales like to nest close to areas of open water and it is hoped that this pond, along with the creation of additional nesting habitat will help to entice this rare bird into breeding on the reserve.

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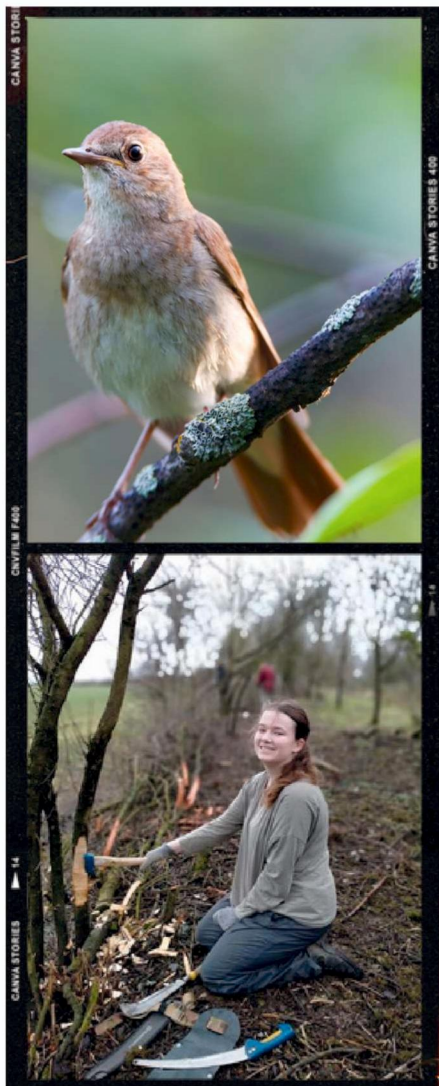

## THE NIGHTINGALE PROJECT



Within a few years the marginal and deeper water vegetation will develop, providing additional habitat for great crested and smooth newts, kingfishers, grass snakes, toads and the many species of aquatic invertebrates already found in Long Pond. We are also growing some wetland plants such as purple loosestrife and yellow flag iris from seed and these will be planted on the banks of the ponds.

This coming winter, over 8000 trees (mostly blackthorn and hawthorn but also crab apple, spindle, field maple, birch and alder) will be planted to create an area of 10.9ha of nesting habitat for the Nightingale.

A significant part of the project is connecting people with nature. To this end we ran three volunteer groups each week on a Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday.

The groups gave people a chance to connect with nature and to undertake practical conservation work on our nature reserve that both support wildlife and boost health and wellbeing.

It has been clear that individuals were struggling with a range of issues, ranging from poor physical health, anxiety and stress, depression, and social isolation. Some of these were pre-existing conditions but many have struggled with the challenges of lockdown over the past 18 months.

We have seen the improvement volunteering at Carymoor has made to individuals and have enjoyed reading their feedback about how it had made a difference to them.

## THE NIGHTINGALE PROJECT

As part of the project, we will be offering free visits to 30 primary schools, to help them engage with nature at Carymoor. These visits will be focused on schools where there is some level of disadvantage or from schools that are less likely to have the opportunity to visit green spaces. 4 visits have taken place so far with more booked for the summer.

This project is funded by the Government's Green Recovery Challenge Fund. The fund was developed by Defra and its Arm's-Length Bodies. It is being delivered by The National Lottery Heritage Fund in partnership with Natural England, the Environment Agency and Forestry Commission.



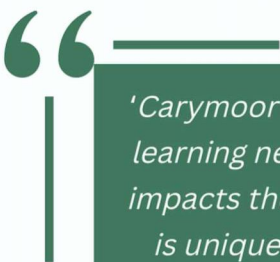
## ABLE TO ACHIEVE

## THE NIGHTINGALE PROJECT

We provided weekly sessions for a group from Able2Achieve which is for adults with learning disabilities, mental health issues, and other associated disabilities.

Many individuals within this group had particular mental health challenges during lockdown and a weekly session at Carymoor has provided an opportunity to socialise, learn new skills and to build their confidence and independence.

The group has made a living willow dome, collected wildflower seed, and planted the seed in our polytunnel, and helped with the management of our meadows to help boost biodiversity.

## FUTURE PLANS

Carymoor will be developing a new 5 year strategy document in 2022-23. It remains a challenging time for the Charity, following the Covid pandemic and cost of living crisis. There is more need for Carymoor's work than ever but securing funding and keeping services inclusive and affordable to those that most need them remains a challenge.

A significant change took place on 1st April 2022 with Viridor selling the Dimmer landfill site to Valencia Waste Management. Carymoor will look to develop a new relationship with Valencia and will aim to build a long term future for the site. We have asked to extend our current lease and license for the site until 2038 as a first step to that longer term future. Valencia has committed to continuing the annual land management fee and we are grateful for their support.

During 2022-23 we will be without Viridor's sponsorship for the first time since 2007. We would like to express our gratitude to Viridor for their support over the years and our partnership has achieved a great deal. Viridor will continue to run the Waste Transfer Site at Dimmer and we will continue to take visiting school groups to the facility to explain what happens to residual waste in Somerset.



A priority for the coming year will be to build new corporate relationships and to find new ways to support our core costs. Carymoor can offer great returns to business partners with volunteering opportunities for staff, PR benefit and delivery against Corporate Social Responsibility. We are also interested to develop more adult course opportunities and experiences.

During 2022-23 we will continue our delivery of our Nightingale Project and Volunteering for Wellbeing projects. The mix of nature engagement, education for schools and habitat creation provides so many benefits for our community and nature.



## FINANCIAL REVIEW



Our income for the financial year was £188,439 and expenditure was £238,439 resulting in a deficit of £49,923. This deficit is in part due to grants received in 2021 being treated as income of £27,660 but costs attributable to these grants are accounted for in the current figures reported herein. To overcome these issues going forward we have treated the grants received in the year ended March 2022, that are for projects in future accounting periods, as deferred income. These amount to £59,581.

Our reserves policy remains at an average quarter of budgeted annual expenditure and at the end of March 2022 we had unrestricted funds of £69,321.

## THANK YOU TO OUR SUPPORTERS

We would like to extend our thanks to the charitable trusts and foundations who have supported us during 2021-22, including the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the Garfield Weston Foundation, the Leathersellers' Company, Open Mental Health, the Co-Op Local Community Fund and the Petroc Community Fund.



We are very grateful to the Leathersellers Company who are supporting Carymoor with a grant of £7500 over a 4-year period to support our volunteering and education work. This year was the third year of support.



Garfield Weston Foundation supported us with a grant of £10k in 2021-22 and a further £10k in 2022-23.



The SC and ME Morland Trust gave us a grant of £1000 to support core costs. This is the third instalment of 3 years of support.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. The trustees considered that an audit was not required for the year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 and that an independent review was required.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and the integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

I report on the accounts of Carymoor Environmental Trust for the year ended 31 March 2022, which are set out on pages 23 - 29.

**Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner**

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.



**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below and have been consistently applied within the same accounts.

**a) Accounting convention**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

**b) Cash flow statement**

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS1 available for small companies from the requirement to prepare a cash flow statement.

**c) Depreciation**

Depreciation has been computed to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets less residual value over their expected useful lives using the following rates:-

Leasehold building	Over 25 years
Plant and equipment	15 - 20% reducing balance method
Office and computer equipment	Over 3 to 5 years

Fixed assets costing less than £250 are not capitalised.

**d) Accounting for income****School visits, tours and courses**

School visits, tours and courses are accounted for on a receivable basis.

**Projects overheads charges**

The funding for certain projects may include provision for an overheads charge. The charges are recognised in the accounts as unrestricted income on an accruals basis.

**Restored land management fee**

Restored land management fee is accounted for on an accruals basis.

**Grants and donations**

Grants and donations are accounted for when they are received unless they relate to an activity being undertaken in a future accounting period, in which case the income is deferred and recognised in the period in which the activities are undertaken.

**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)****e) Resources expended**

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings appropriate to the organisation. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the Charity. Management and governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the Charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements. Support costs are allocated to the charity's activities either based on staff numbers or actual usage where this can be reliably determined.

**D) Funds structure****Unrestricted funds**

Income within this fund has been generated by the Charity and the use of such income has not been restricted to a particular purpose. In addition to meeting the costs of activities in furtherance of the charity's objects, the unrestricted fund has to pay for the general administration of the Trust.

**Restricted funds**

These are funds restricted to a particular purpose. During the period the Trust had ten restricted funds.

The Projects fund represents funds generated from the landfill tax credit scheme which can be spent on approved projects and then reclaimed.

The restricted funds listed in note 11 'Movement in funds' represent funds received for specific projects.
