
Basis of the independent examiner's report

Trustees Report for the year ended 31 December 2022

CARAT continues to support small groups or individuals in Greece who rescue or care for abused or abandoned animals.

As our newsletters never fail to report, overpopulation of stray dogs and cats is still a huge problem in Greece and the cause of much needless suffering which has worsened as abandonment of unwanted animals has proliferated in the wake of the economic crisis and the Coronavirus outbreaks. Attempts to control the problem are therefore of paramount importance and CARAT continues to allocate a large percentage of its income to neutering campaigns for stray dogs and cats. CARAT now has a good working relationship with a number of Greek vets who are prepared to offer lower fees for sterilising strays.

CARAT has continued to support the smaller shelters, rescuers and individuals in Greece who are at the real grass roots of rescue and are often overlooked because they have no time for self-publicity. This year, due to increased support we have been able to offer help to a few new individuals and societies in their tireless work for the strays on the street. Sadly, poisoning is still seen by some as the solution to the stray problem although it is illegal, intensely cruel and ineffective.

This year we had fewer pleas for help from tourists who have found a suffering animal or who want to adopt the stray dog they have fallen in love with while on holiday, however we are happy to report that we have managed to find help for several animals who have now been adopted in the UK. Much clearer guidance on what to do when tourists find an abused animal in Greece and an increasingly proactive attitude from some police forces towards animal cruelty means that many tourists can take action personally without needing to burden local animal welfare volunteers.

CARAT's literature (in Greek), particularly that relating to neutering, is still in demand and in setting out simply the benefits both for the animals and society, has often helped to change a deep-seated belief that the procedure is unnatural and harmful to the animal.

The donkey sanctuary on Crete, Agia Marina Donkey Rescue, which receives regular support from CARAT has continued to rescue abandoned or ill-treated donkeys and has never turned down a donkey in desperate need. CARAT continues to cover the transport costs of bringing these donkeys to the safety of the sanctuary.

CARAT continues to maintain its status as a "no overheads" society, so that all income received directly benefits the animals. It is still a very small organisation but has a loyal following thanks to whose generosity much suffering has been alleviated and many animals have found new caring owners. Thankfully, clear instructions have now been given by the Greek Government to Greek State Vets regarding the issuance of the documents required for animals to leave Greece to find adoptions abroad, and many rescuers who were previously unable to send animals abroad are now able to obtain the necessary papers.
