

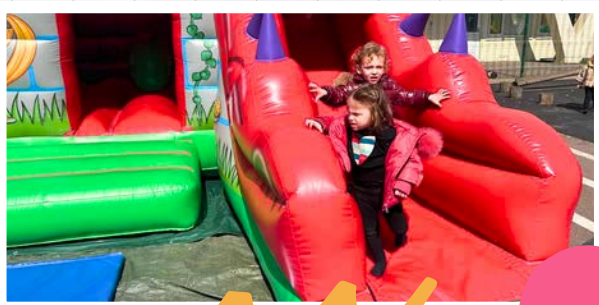
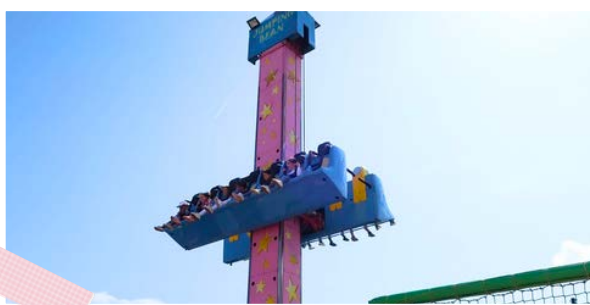

The past year has marked another significant chapter in the journey of Kids N' Action. Since our establishment in 2003, we have supported over 3,000 children and young people, primarily from low-income and disadvantaged backgrounds.

In 2025, we continued to expand our reach and deepen our impact across Hackney and Haringey—delivering inclusive, engaging, and developmental programmes for children aged 3–14, including those facing overcrowded living conditions, disabilities, trauma, and social exclusion.

Our work remains rooted in the belief that every child deserves access to safe spaces, opportunities, and support to thrive. Through our dedicated staff, volunteers, and supporters, we continue to provide not only activities, but pathways toward confidence, wellbeing, and future success.

- Children with **SEND**, physical **disabilities**, and **learning difficulties**
- Young people facing **mental health challenges** and **trauma**
- Refugees and families with **No Recourse to Public Funds (NRPF)**
- Children from **low-income** and **socially excluded** communities

Delivered safe, structured holiday activities for children experiencing challenging home environments, including overcrowding and financial hardship.

Case Study 1

Building Confidence Through Inclusion

Participant Profile

"Amir" (name changed), aged 10, joined Kids N' Action through our holiday programme. He comes from a low-income household and lives in overcrowded accommodation. Amir has mild learning difficulties and initially struggled with confidence and communication.

Challenges

- Limited social interaction and low self-esteem
- Difficulty engaging in group activities
- Struggles with structured learning environments

Intervention

Amir participated in:

- Holiday Programme
- After-School Homework Club
- Music Sessions
- Netball Activities

Staff provided tailored, one-to-one support to help him integrate at his own pace.

Outcomes

- Improved confidence and social interaction
- Developed friendships and communication skills
- Increased participation in group and learning activities

Impact

Amir's progress highlights how a supportive and inclusive environment can help children overcome barriers and build confidence.

Case Study 2

Supporting a Child with SEND

Participant Profile

"Layla" (name changed), aged 8, has Special Educational Needs and a physical disability. She joined Kids N' Action through our inclusive after-school provision.

Challenges

- Required additional physical and learning support
- Experienced exclusion in mainstream activity settings
- Limited opportunities to engage in structured recreational programmes

Intervention

Layla received:

- One-to-one support during sessions
- Adapted activities within music, IT, and arts programmes
- Inclusive participation in group activities alongside peers

Our staff ensured all activities were accessible and tailored to her needs.

Outcomes

- Increased participation in group sessions
- Improved confidence and independence
- Developed friendships and sense of belonging

Impact

Layla's experience demonstrates Kids N' Action's commitment to inclusion, ensuring children with SEND can fully participate and thrive alongside their peers.

Case Study 3

Supporting a Refugee Child Towards Integration

Participant Profile

"Yusuf" (name changed), aged 12, is a refugee who recently arrived in the UK with his family. He joined Kids N' Action through our community outreach programmes.

Challenges

- Language barriers and difficulty integrating
- Social isolation and lack of peer connections
- Adjustment to a new environment and education system

Intervention

Yusuf engaged in:

- After-School Clubs (IT, homework support, and library access)
- Sports activities, including netball
- Group-based activities promoting social interaction

Staff provided a welcoming, supportive environment and encouraged peer engagement.

Outcomes

- Improved English communication skills
- Built friendships and increased social confidence
- Became actively engaged in group activities

Impact

Yusuf's journey reflects how Kids N' Action supports social integration and inclusion, helping refugee children rebuild confidence and feel part of their community.

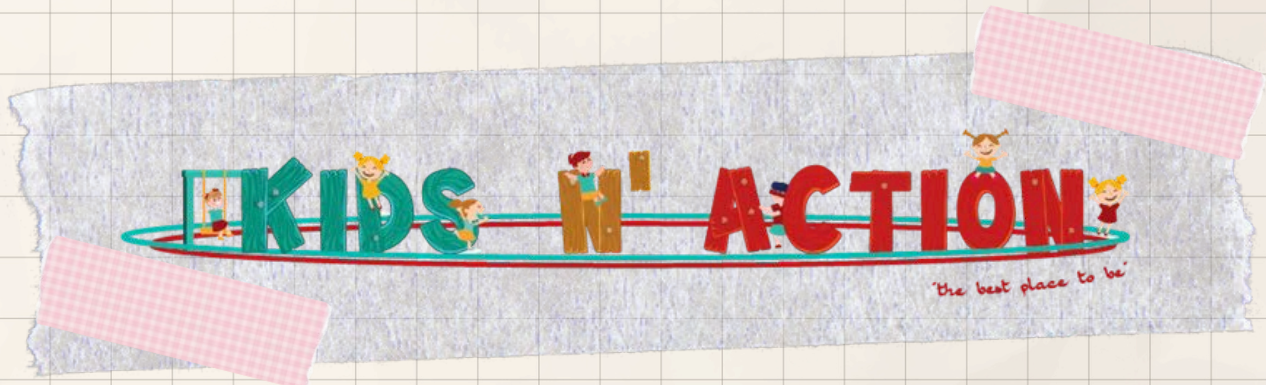

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2025. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' 2019, and applicable UK Accounting Standards and the Charities Act of 2011.

Structure and Objectives

The charity is a Charitable Trust and controlled by its governing document. The trust was registered as a charity with the Charity Commission on 24 February 2003.

The above trustees served throughout the period. The Board has the power to appoint additional trustees, as it considers fit based on personal competence, specialist skills and experience. None of the trustees have any beneficial interest in the charity and did not receive any remuneration. The trustees are involved with in the running of the charity.

The objects of the charity are: -

1. To promote and advance the education of children and young people of the orthodox Jewish faith.
2. To provide facilities and programmes for children and young people for their recreation and other leisure-time occupation and so as to develop their skills, to enhance their employment prospects and to assist them in growing to full maturity as individuals and as members of society and so that their conditions of life may improve.

Developments and Activities

The trustees consider that the performance of the charity this period has been most satisfactory. The trustees have identified the risks to which the charity may be exposed and systems have been established to mitigate these risks. The trustees have had due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission, including public benefit guidance.

The developments and activities of this period are stated in the extended Trustee's Report attached.

During the year, the charity received donations of £142,908 (2024 – £148,906) and expensed £180,848 (2024 – £155,454) through charitable expenditure and support costs.

Reserves

Reserves of £12,318 (2024 – £50,258) represent the available funds at the year end. The present level of funding is adequate to support the continuation of the charity's activities.

Responsibilities of the Trustees

Charity Law requires the trustees to prepare a report and financial statements for each financial period which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity at the end of the year. These must be in accordance with applicable law and regulations and in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (UK GAAP).

The trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its surplus or deficit for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to select suitable accounting policies, and then apply them on a consistent basis, making judgements and estimates that are prudent and reasonable. The trustees must also prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue its activities.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose, with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with Charity Law. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets and activities of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Basis of Independent Examiners' report

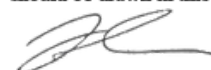

1. General Information

Kids N' Action is a charitable trust governed by its trust deed and is a registered charity in England. The registered office is located at 24 Lynmouth Road London N16 6XL.

2. Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Charities Act and applicable accounting standards including the SORP (FRS 102) subject to the revaluation of certain fixed assets and the non-provision of depreciation thereon.

The presentation currency is sterling.

Going Concern

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis as there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Incoming Resources

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds. It is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably.

Resources Expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Tangible Assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over the useful economic life of the asset, as follows;
