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Trustees' Annual Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

The Trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year 1 April 2024 to 31 March 2025. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) as amended by Update bulletin (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the charitable company qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The charity is controlled by its governing document, memorandum and articles of association, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

b. Method of appointment or election of Trustees

The Board of Trustees carries out regular reviews to identify any gaps in the knowledge and experience of our Board needs to further Cambridge Online work. Potential new trustees are required to submit an application form, and if taken forward they are then invited to attend a Board meeting, following which they attend an interview, and if both parties are happy and willing to continue, their application is submitted to the next scheduled trustees meeting for confirmation of appointment. Induction involves a tour of the premises, attending meetings with beneficiaries, staff and other key stakeholders. New trustees are provided with access to relevant policy and procedure documents that are appropriate to the role they undertake as trustees.

c. Organisational structure

The charity has a board of trustees who meet monthly and are responsible for its strategic direction and policy. A chief executive is appointed by the trustees to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity.

d. Risk management

The trustees are conducting their own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and as part of this process, they are implementing a risk management strategy comprising:

- (i) an annual review of the risks which the charity may face;
- (ii) the establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate risks identified in the plan;
- (iii) the implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the charity should any of those risks materialise.

e. Leadership & Governance

This year saw a smooth leadership handover as Madeleine Cassidy succeeded Rose Charlton-Peel as our interim Chief Executive Officer in July 2024. Under Madeleine's leadership, the charity improved systems, strengthened partnerships, and stabilised finances after a challenging start to the year. Following the end of Madeleine Cassidy's tenure in November 2024, Marcus Whewell took over as Chief Executive Officer in December 2024, providing further stability and an enthusiastic energy for renewal of the charity's operating principles.

Governance and management improvements included:

- Introduction of QuickBooks for real-time financial reporting.
- Creation of a Risk Register integrated into trustee monitoring.
- Streamlined processes for bank and Companies House compliance.

These steps have enhanced transparency, accountability, and organisational resilience.

Objectives and Activities

a. Policies and objectives

Cambridge Online is an educational charity working across Cambridgeshire and the East of England helping disadvantaged (including disabled) people use computers and digital devices by providing education, training and advice to individuals and groups. Our aim is to broaden digital awareness and to raise levels of digital inclusion.

b. Public benefit

Cambridge Online will continue to take its responsibilities of ensuring that its charitable activities contribute a great deal to the lives of those within Cambridge and the overall area of benefit. With reference to the Charities Act 2006 all our charitable activities are directed towards having a lifelong impact on the local area and these activities are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit. The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting policy for the year.

Achievements and performance

a. Financial review

At the start of the year, the charity faced low reserves and cash-flow pressures. By December 2024, concerted fundraising and grant success had turned this around, restoring financial stability and laying a stronger foundation for the year ahead. The period to the end of the financial year April 2025 saw sustained financial wins through highly successful grant applications.

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- **Online Fundraising Appeal:** Launched July 2024 via *JustGiving*, raising **£2,182 (with Gift Aid)** by November and continuing into 2025.
- **Corporate & Community Support:** New collaborations with **Studio 24, Barclays, St. Johns College Cambridge**, and **Sustainable Tech 4 Good** provided both funding and in-kind contributions.

b. Reserves policy

Cambridge Online recognises that it has a duty to ensure that sufficient reserves are maintained to cover its commitments. The commitments and reserves are reviewed annually with trustees agreeing an estimate of reserves needed to cover long term sick pay, redundancy, and items not covered by insurance. We ended the year with a surplus of £4,131 on unrestricted reserves.

The trustees have spent considerable effort analysing the appropriate use of restricted and unrestricted funds and are applying changes to the reserves policy as well as future funding strategies in order to address the imbalance. We anticipate future income streams to restore unrestricted reserves and remain satisfied that the charity's finances are healthy and the charity continues to be a going concern

c. Current year overview and plans for the future

The financial year 2024-2025 has been one of the toughest we've experienced, beginning with a move from our long-standing office in the Hester Adrian Centre to our new base in the Allia Future Business Centre. At the same time, we underwent a recruitment process to replace Rose Charlton-Peel as CEO after 2 years in the position. We were very fortunate to place Madeleine Cassidy as our interim CEO before recruiting Marcus Whewell in December 2024. The relocation and recruitment process both impacted continuity and revenue generation, and the trustees and team both worked incredibly hard to ensure our continued provision of services throughout the year.

We ended the year better located, with improved finances, with more resilient processes, strengthened governance, and with renewed optimism for the charity and the services it provides.

On the service side -through collaboration, innovation, and dedication, Cambridge Online continued to bridge the digital divide for thousands of residents across Cambridgeshire, empowering individuals to access essential services, connect with others, and develop vital online skills.

d. Community Impact & Service Delivery

Cambridge Online's mission to combat digital exclusion remained at the heart of its work. The charity expanded its community learning hubs, deepened its reach across Cambridgeshire, and adapted delivery models to meet local needs.

Programme Highlights

- **Donated over 180 devices** including 137 laptops and 19 mobile phones to the needy - including the unemployed, elderly, refugees, people fleeing domestic violence, and students.
- **Older Adults Digital Inclusion Project** (Cambridge City Council) – weekly drop-ins across six city locations.
- **Older Adults Social Isolation Project** (Cambridgeshire County Council / Hope CIC) – new partnerships in South Cambridgeshire.
- **Digital Badges Initiative** – launched in autumn 2024, offering accredited digital learning pathways.
- **Device Loan & Donation Schemes** – refurbished laptops and mobile devices distributed to those most in need.

Across these projects, **over 150 individuals each month** accessed free digital support, demonstrating the ongoing need and impact of Cambridge Online's work.

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Our outreach work covers a wide variety of needs, but some of the main areas where we provided assistance were as follows:

- IT and equipment issues / 917 people (Figures include 'online safety' count until Jan 2025).
- Health / wellbeing / 694 people
- Looking for employment / 123 people
- Signposting to other partners / charities/ 488 people

e. Partnerships & Collaboration

Partnership working continued to be a defining strength of the organisation:

- **Local Government:** Close collaboration with Cambridge City and County Councils ensured delivery aligned with local inclusion strategies.
- **Corporate Engagement:** Barclays led two *Fraud and Online Safety* workshops during *Get Online Week 2024*, while Studio 24 supported fundraising initiatives.
- **Sector Networks:** Active involvement in the *Cambridgeshire Digital Partnership*, *Connecting Cambridgeshire*, and *Cambridge CVS* broadened the charity's reach and influence.

These relationships have positioned Cambridge Online as the trusted and essential digital inclusion partner in the region.

f. Communications & Public Profile

A focus on digital marketing and storytelling across social media significantly improved engagement:

- Consistent posting across social media platforms, led to a 15% increase in online followers.
- *Cambridge Independent* featured the charity following a visit from Daniel Zeichner MP in September 2024.

g. People & Volunteers

Cambridge Online's success is built on its dedicated team and volunteers.

The charity also benefited from the commitment of 8 regular volunteers, who supported outreach sessions, laptop refurbishment, and community training.

We also welcome a new trustee, **Xiao Rong Li-Yan-Hui** who has extensive accountancy experience and strengthens our financial insight.

h. Looking Ahead to 2025–26 and beyond

We have further strengthened the knowledge and experience of our board of trustees with the appointment of **Hilary Cooper** in August 2025 and **Hannah Dagleish** in October 2025.

We also welcome a new patron; **Dr David Cleavelly** CBE FREng FIET is a serial technology entrepreneur, investor, and one of the founding figures of the Cambridge Cluster. He has founded or co-founded more than a dozen organisations, including Cambridge Angels, Cambridge Network, Cambridge Wireless, Cambridge Ahead, and the Cambridge Science Centre. As a long-standing advocate for innovation, education, and digital inclusion, David has advised Government on technology policy for over two decades and chairs Chemify and Focal Point Positioning. He was appointed CBE in 2013 for services to technology and innovation.

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i. Mitigating the Risks – Local government reorganisation

Ever since its inception in June 1995, Cambridge Online has been generously supported by Cambridge City Council's Community Support funding. This has given it much-needed financial stability and core funding and enabled the charity to respond to the community needs. From the start we focussed our core activities in Cambridge City but our services have also been provided outside the city, in Huntingdon and other parts of the county. We have also had support with smaller short-term grants from other District Councils and the County Council.

Throughout 2024/25 the Government has announced the reorganisation of local government, abolishing the District and County Councils and forming instead 2 or more Unitary Authorities, covering the County area. Although the boundaries of these new unitary authorities are not yet determined it raises a question about the continuation of our major source of public sector funding. We are in contact with council representatives during this reorganisation period and while the council authority itself will change we believe we still present a strong case for council funding into the future. Under the direction of our new CEO, it is also the intention of the charity to mitigate these risks by expanding our geographic coverage and our ability to attract funding from the new Local Government Structures. We also intend to establish ourselves as a trusted provider to the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority, which is the one area of Local Government which will continue to exist beyond May 2028.

The coming year will focus on:

- Consolidation of outreach programmes and extension of our services into Peterborough, Huntingdon, rural South Cambridgeshire and Fenland.
- Launch of a redesigned, accessible website.
- Installation of Beacon, our new CRM system
- An expansion of our volunteer programme, including the Community Wealth Building Strategy ('Train The Trainer')
- Continued diversification of income, including corporate sponsorship and paid digital skills services.

Cambridge Online's mission remains simple yet powerful — to ensure that everyone, regardless of age, income or background, can access the digital world confidently and safely.

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also the directors of the charity for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under company law, the Trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP (FRS 102);
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards (FRS 102) have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Cambridge Online

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Notes to the Unaudited Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

1. Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principle accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The charity is a public benefit entity and these financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) – ‘Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared using the historic cost convention except that as disclosed in the accounting policies certain items are shown at fair value.

Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably. The following policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the Balance Sheet. Where income is received in advance of entitlement of receipt, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

Office equipment

Expenditure on office equipment is written off in the year in which it is incurred. The trustees are of the opinion that such expenditure has no commercial resale value and that in view of this and the nature of the organisation, such costs should not be capitalised.

Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor, are charged against income as incurred.

Tax

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

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Notes to the Unaudited Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are recognised at their settlement amount.

Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular purposes within the objectives of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Defined contribution pension obligation

A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which fixed contributions are paid into a pension fund and the company has no legal or constructive obligation to pay further contributions even if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employees the benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods.

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as employee benefit expense when they are due. If contribution payments exceed the contribution due for service, the excess is recognised as a prepayment.
