HCAP understand the importance of having free activities available for vulnerable families in the holidays, we have continued to identify new HCAP partners that work with targeted families in the Huntingdon North to ensure we capture the neediest in our programmes.

During the summer months we run Snack Shack and Picnic in the Park, February and October half term when its colder we organise a coach and picnics and take families to local farms and wildlife parks, this year we took 14 families to Shepreth Wildlife Centre ,and 14 families to Sacrewell Farm

100% of families strongly agreed that all these activities had

- Supported their Wellbeing
- Made them feel less isolated in the holidays
- Helped them financially by providing food .

Godmanchester Food Bank, Rotary and Fusion had helped with funding these successful activities.

Residential Grafham Water Centre

Having received support through the HCAP projects several adults want to give back and help others, so we are always encouraging them to volunteer and having signed up to Time Credits, it meant each time they volunteered they would receive vouchers to spend on local family activities for free. Working in partnership with the time credit team we were able to build up the vouchers for a one-off community spend so we could take them and their families away for an Easter camping trip to Grafham Water Centre.

“This truly was a wonderful experience for myself and my family. My two children have additional needs as well as mental health difficulties and I also have a mental health illness. We would not have been able to take on new and exciting activities such as we did without the support, kindness and opportunities that this trip has provided us with. We were all looked after, reassured at every point if worries arose and provided clear instructions on how to participate in all the activities, planned and unplanned. Financially this wouldn’t have been viable exercise for us, the activities are too costly and managing a camping trip away from home by myself with my youngest would have been near impossible. He struggles with change, unknown activities, structure and being outside of the home. I anticipated that we would have to go home on the first day, but the staff and other participants were so supportive and inclusive of our diverse needs that we were able to fully enjoy the trip. We took part in raft building then sailing! I managed to get both my children out in the water with me, we subsequently took part in a mixture of paddle boarding, canoeing and

kayaking. My youngest refused outright, he was adamant that he would not get in the boat but ended up spending 30 minutes in a solo kayak. These are not activities we have been able to experience prior to this trip and it has built up a level of resilience and confidence in our family that I didn't expect. This was a truly fantastic trip and we are all so very grateful that we were able to spend time during our holidays at Grafham with the wonderful team that organised it ."

This trip was funded by Police and Crime Commissioner Fund ,Godmanchester Food Bank ,Rotary and Godmanchester Food Bank .

Moody Mondays /Grow/Family Fun/Arts and Craft with Creche

The Wellbeing groups that we run have continued to develop and show how partnerships working together with the same goal can have such an impact on a community. Listening to the clients that use these services, help us as a charity develop these services further and identify new projects.

Huntingdon Freeman's Trust have funded Grow and the Arts and Craft sessions.

Community Engagement Support Worker (CESW)

Part of this role is to focus on parents to give them the skills to support their child's learning at their pace to improve children's academic achievement, there is now an established rolling programme of informal learning sessions that lead at the learners pace to the more structured Maths, English and Teaching Assistant courses.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Tutor's comments

“The benefit and the progress of the parents has been immense, they are more confident in their own abilities and knowledge, they have learned to work together and made firm friendships. All the learners have progressed to the next course, two have joined a functional skills maths course and one has gained employment as a learning support assistant.”

As part of this programme to support the children's learning the CESW applied for funding to put on a Theatre Show, Town Mouse and County Mouse, linked to the transition from Nursery to School.

Children from Huntingdon and Thongsley Nursery ,130 in total enjoyed the show and received the book Town Mouse and Country Mouse + crafts that they could take home to continue their learning with their parents.

Huntingdon Freemens Trust have funded this role.

Hampers

As well as our 100 Christmas Hampers project, where families are referred by the HCAP partners, we also found funding to prepare 33 Young Adult Well-being Hampers for those that live at the Salvation Army Hostel.

This project led to Cambridge Skills going in to follow up an idea from a couple of the residents that it would be nice to have a little Welcome Pack for those arriving new to the Hostel.

Each Project that comes under the HCAP umbrella is reviewed at the regular meetings to ensure its objectives are being met, this meeting is also used as the platform for identifying and prioritising new projects that have been suggested by the community.

Snack Shack

HCAP have continued to develop their holiday provision, 8 sessions took place this year, 40 families on average attended each one. Running alongside the Fusion HAF programme, meant we were able to encourage more families to sign their older children to HAF activities.

Godmanchester Food Bank supported us with family large family food parcels for those families that had been identified in financial need through the holidays

As well as having the opportunity to access sports through the One Leisure team, we worked with Cricket East for the first time as this is a sport that many of our local children don't have the chance to try, these sessions worked well and 3 of the children joined Huntingdon Cricket Club.

Other partners were also invited in the sessions

Parent Feedback

"Attending Snack Shack has given us the confidence to go out and feel safe, the girls have enjoyed the activities. I got a health MOT done; it was good to have someone to talk to. The Raptor Foundation was amazing, the girls have talked about the different birds a lot. It was nice to have so much open space, my youngest was very clingy before we started coming here each week, now we get here and she just runs off and plays, it helped her socialise, since coming she has eaten better, loves the excitement of the picnic bags."

"Snack Shack has given me something that I'm confident to bring my family to, something regular with activities, Jack enjoys talking about these summer sessions, when he goes back to school. If these weren't on, we wouldn't be going out. It has also supported my mum's mental health as she knows we are being looked after in the long summer holidays."

Picnic in the Park

For the first time HCAP partners offered holiday provision at Hinchbrooke Park, to support local vulnerable families 5 sessions in total took place and we had on average 12 families attend. Picnic in the Park

Parent Feedback

"It has given us something to look forward to each week, I have a large family and have just been made homeless, so money is very tight, we have been given food and toiletries and been made to feel so welcome, the girls have loved the activities, the older ones at first didn't want to come as they felt it would be boring, but have enjoyed every session there have always been activities provided for all age groups, they have especially enjoyed the ranger sessions."

“A lot has happened recently, and I have been struggling to get the boys out, but I knew a few of the people running it and I’m so glad I went, we haven’t got a garden, and this was such a big open space, the boys had so much fun and enjoyed socialising with the other children, I met up with a friend that I had lost contact with, it was nice talking to other adults. Lots of activities for the boys to try.”

Moody Mondays /Grow/Tepee of Hope

The Wellbeing groups that we run have continued to develop and show how partnerships working together with the same goal can have such an impact on a community. Listening to the clients that use these services, help us as a charity develop these services further and identify new projects.

Community Engagement Support Worker (CESW)

Through this process it was identified that an experienced family worker, without a caseload was needed to work preventatively with our families. Our application was successful which meant we were able to employ a CESW linked to a Local Authority Nursery in the heart of the Oxmoor, to support parents/carers to strengthen their capacity to manage difficulties and enabling families to effectively utilise available support within their family and community networks. The role also allows time to work with parents to give them the skills to support their child’s learning at their pace to improve children’s academic achievement

Monthly Arts and Craft Group with Creche

Over the last few months, we have had an increase of mums with young children attending Moody Mondays, unfortunately as these are mums often fleeing from Domestic Violence, they have no childcare available, and therefore can’t be signposted to services that they need for themselves and get the support they need.

The priority therefore was to start up a monthly Grow equivalent project with a creche provision.

The project is based around the learners needs in a safe and familiar environment. Confidence and self-esteem are developed through a range of purposeful activities that further develop social engagement. Strong links exist for progression to more formal adult learning classes, locally on completion of the sessions

“First day out of Huntingdon since Covid, a lot of the children’s friends were on the trip, so it worked out really, they were so happy and my youngest wants to go back even though he has walked 1000 miles apparently.”


