AUGUST 2024 – JULY 2025**


This year Pastor Pamela, our Chairman and Teresa Giles, our Treasurer were able to make a mission trip to Uganda to visit both Children's Homes and to support those who take care of all our children. We were also able to briefly meet up with Doctor Karl and his wife Birgit, who have always continued to support us financially from Germany. The trip was very beneficial, and we were able to have a good overview of everything that was going on.

We have managed to sustain the work in both Buikwe and Nalulya Village and we are endeavouring to upkeep the properties. We were very pleased with the upkeep and repairs to the home in Nalulya Village, with repairs to the windows and doors and to painting both inside and externally. The results were very satisfying as although photos had been sent it was good to see for ourselves the improvements. Following some repairs to the borehole at Buikwe we were advised to replace the pipes with stainless steel pipes and Mary has overseen the work. Continuous checking and regular maintenance is of great importance to ensure the children always have clean water.

We have continued to support the children at Lweru Children's Home and the children at Nalulya Children's Home, as well as needy local elderly people. Some have moved on to higher education leaving space for the younger children to come. At the beginning of 2025 five new children came to live at Buikwe, 3 girls and two boys making a total of seven boys and seven girls. We were able to meet up with 5 of the older boys who had come to take part in the Crusade, which everyone was very happy with.

At Buikwe home they have continued to produce food crops having planted maize, beans, matooke, cassava and sweet potatoes. This has often been sadly hindered by lack of rainfall which is an ongoing problem for growing crops in Africa. They have been able keep the garden weed free with the help of local workers and enables the crops to grow better. In Nakiseeke the land is very poor for growing but the gardening work is still being managed with the help of the children who have been planting Cassava.

During our trip we were invited to accompany Mary and Max with their first crop of coffee beans which was a very interesting experience. The funds were to be used for things which were needed in the Home. Following the sale of the beans we were able to meet up with Martin Jingo at the home, and also with Dr Karl and Birgit. We took a tour of the coffee plantation and were advised of what needed to be done with the coffee plants. The guards were there to be taught how to improve and maintain the plants. We continue to be very grateful to Martin for his input at Lweru. The aim towards maize, beans, matooke, cassava self-sufficiency is making progress and they are on their way to becoming more self-sufficient.



The LMNI ministry team in Bulawayo has been able to continue visiting the prisons and the spiritual work continues to be done with many requests for Bibles and spiritual resources have been satisfied, alongside practical needs for both the male and female prisoners. We have been requested to support the prison football team and sent funds to provide them with an LMNI football kit, some with shoes and a few footballs. The prison guards are commenting on the changes for the better in the lives of some of the inmates. We have continued to ship drums to Bulawayo being filled with much spiritual materials and essential things, like soap, plates and slippers which were requested.

The work in South Africa with the homeless and drug addicts continues and we have been able to give them food and drink on a monthly basis which has been upgraded to provision of hot food. Spiritual help has been given and in one particular case, a lady who was rescued from begging on the streets and helped with regular food packages and with much needed medical help continues to receive help with her rent. She has recently been able to work with some children by teaching them. Where medical help is needed, we are able to help those who suffer with conditions because they are unable to pay for medical help. We continue to extend help wherever it is needed.

We have been able to send help to a missionary couple who work in North East Kenya with the indigenous peoples; they have been able to visit us with updates on their work. We work with Pastor George in India is ongoing. He works with the widows, orphans and the destitute, people who are in desperate need. We have helped with blankets, towels, water bottles and food for those who were caught in floods in Sept'24. Always with food, blankets, water bottles and educational materials for the children. Continuing to send help to India when requested.

The work in Lahore, Pakistan at the Crown Help Centre has prospered greatly where the women continue to go out into the community and villages to help poor families with food and teaching. They are constantly visiting new villages engaging them in teaching and prayer meetings, we continue to support them with funds on a monthly basis.

The work in both Buikwe and Nalulya Village has been sustained and we have managed to upkeep the properties following a request made by Winnie for financial assistance to repair the windows and doors and to paint both inside and externally. This has successfully been completed and the results were very satisfying. Following some repairs to the borehole at Buikwe we were advised to replace the pipes with stainless steel pipes and Mary is in the process of obtaining a quote. Continuous checking and regular maintenance is of great importance.

We have continued to support the children at Lweru Children's Home and the children at Nalulya Children's Home, as well as needy local elderly people. Some of the children have moved on to higher education leaving space for more younger children to come.

Both homes have continued to produce food crops although this has often been sadly hindered by lack of rainfall which is an ongoing problem for growing crops in Africa. In Nakiseeke the land is very poor for growing but the gardening work is carried out by those that live on the land with the help of the children.

We continue to be very grateful to Martin for his input at Lweru. The aim towards self-sufficiency is making progress and they are on their way to becoming more self-sufficient.

The coffee plantation has continued to be quite successful as the plants have flourished despite challenges but are still progressing well, having flowered and this year have produced a crop of beans. We have enabled them to purchase fertiliser for the trees. We have sent funds to help with regular weeding and this has helped with pest and disease control. Weeding, always being a challenge, especially when there is much rain but the guards for the Home have been able to help with the weeding. Fertilisers and mulching have proved to be very important. Intercropping has helped to add to the food supply by planting maize, beans, sweet potatoes and cassava; although some there have been some failures again through lack of rain.

The coffee was harvested in April and produced an initial harvest of 30g of coffee beans. The children were able to help with the harvesting. The funds from this were used to purchase a goat to help with keeping the grass down. The next step is still to plant fruit trees along the perimeter fencing.

Wilson, who was appointed for the task of overseeing the work on the land has been very helpful in keeping us updated with the progress, keeping a check on the growing successes and failures. He receives our support as the Youth Pastor of the local Church which the children attend and continues to be especially helpful encouraging the children. We were able to send funds for 2 boxes of Bibles; one box of English

and 1 box of Luganda Bibles. Half of these went into Buikwe Prison and half were for the Church.

Sadly, again this year we have been unable to hold any fundraising events, but we have continued to receive regular monthly donations and the some funds from the mission boxes. However we are planning to remedy this in the future and to have some fund-raising.

We have also been able to continue helping the prisoners in Buikwe Prison; by sending them soap, oil and salt and providing more Bibles which were requested. Pastor Wilson has been allowed access to the prison to preach to these young offenders.

Another success story is Aaron who was accepted to start a University course and was fortunate to receive a grant for this. As the children are growing older there is the challenge of increasing school fees alongside other needs for trips, etc in their school lives.

After successfully receiving NGO re-registration we received the new permit dated from 23rd August 2023 for 5 years.

There was a planned visit earlier this year from our supporters in Germany, but unfortunately this trip had to be cancelled because the relevant visas were not received in time. A trip hopefully will take place next year to visit the children in both homes.

As trustees of Lazarus Ministries, we feel, again, that we have been able to maintain the work at both children's homes during this year. We are always very concerned for the health and safety of these young children and youth and every effort is made to always make this our priority.

The works established in Zimbabwe, South Africa, Nigeria, Kenya, India and also in Lahore in Pakistan are all ongoing and have continued to progress.

Wonderful changes have been wrought with the blind and disabled who had been forced to beg on the street to provide food for themselves. With regular monthly support with the food packages they have flourished and their lives have changed for the better. In their monthly meetings they hold a service and have fellowship with each other which is very encouraging for all of them. A blind member plays the guitar for them and they all sing. When his guitar was broken we were able to send him a replacement and his work now continues. The work in the Care Home has also encouraged the elderly and the monthly food packages have helped them enormously as they have now become dependent on the food they receive from LMNI. Recently we have been able to increase these supplies a little.

LMNI has been granted access into the prisons where a spiritual work continues to be done with many requests for Bibles and spiritual materials have been satisfied. The prison guards are commenting on the changes for the better in the lives of some of the inmates. We have continued to ship drums to Bulawayo being filled with much spiritual materials and essential things requested.

The work in South Africa with the homeless and drug addicts continues and we have been able to give them food and drink on a monthly basis. Spiritual help has been given and in one particular case, a lady who was rescued from begging on the streets and helped with regular food packages and with much needed medical help and now receives help with her rent.; Where medical help is needed, we are able to help those who suffer with conditions because they are unable to pay for medical help. We continue to extend help wherever it is needed This work has extended into Nigeria where much needed Bibles are distributed among the poor and in the villages.

We received a grant from Souter Trust to those in Kenya and this enabled them to start some agricultural farming to provide food. We also continue to send help to India where there is much work amongst the poor and with the children. LMNI has been able to send help when requested.

The work in Lahore, Pakistan at the Crown Help Centre has prospered greatly where the women go out into the community and villages to help poor families with food and teaching. We continue to support them with funds on a monthly basis.

TRUSTEES REPORT
AUGUST 2022 – JULY 2023**

Work has been sustained at both Lweru and Nakiseeke Children's Homes. The importance of the upkeep of the properties and continuing with the upkeep of the perimeter fencing at Lweru has continued to be a priority and the importance of regular checking and maintenance has been maintained. We have continued to support seventeen children at Lweru Children's Home and fifteen children at Nalulya Children's Home, as well as needy local elderly people.

Both homes have continued to produce food crops although this has often been sadly hindered by lack of rainfall which is an ongoing problem for growing crops in Africa. In Nakiseeke the land is very poor for growing but the gardening work is carried out by those that live on the land with the help of the children.

This year has continued to see a change in farming the land at Lweru. Martin Jingo, the brother of our Secretary, has continued to offer his help in advising on growing coffee on the land. We continue to be very grateful to him for his input at Lweru. The aim towards self-sufficiency is making progress and they are on their way to becoming more self-sufficient.

Coffee trees have been planted on an acre of the land and with encouragement the growing has been quite successful. The plants have flourished despite challenges but are still progressing well, having flowered and produced beans. They were encouraged with initial watering but the rains came to give the plantation proper growth. They were encouraged to fertilise the trees and to use mulching material, some of which they obtained from other crops (like maize) when it was harvested. Regular weeding has helped with pest and disease control; weeding being a challenge especially when there is much rain. Fertilisers and mulching have proved to be very important. The progress of the coffee has been an encouragement to many in the community who have developed admiration and were encouraged to set up their own coffee plantations. Intercropping has helped to add to the food supply by planting maize, beans, sweet potatoes and cassava; although some failures through lack of rain.

Following the establishment of the coffee (which could be sold commercially), the next step is to plant fruit trees along the perimeter fencing. This makes it necessary to continue with any repairs needed and this has been done during the year.

Wilson, who was appointed for the task of overseeing the work on the land has been very helpful in every situation where help has been needed and has continued to keep a check on progress; he has especially been helpful with encouraging the children.

Sadly, again this year we have been unable to hold any fundraising events, but we have continued to receive regular monthly donations and the funds from the mission

boxes. We have successfully continued to support our work in Uganda and have been able to help the prisoners at Buikwe Prison.

Some successes were recorded with some of the children we have been supporting. Vicky graduated from her course in catering and hotel management. Molly graduated in her teaching course and some of the older boys passed their O levels and have progressed to an A level course this year. Toko Emmanuel has completed his certificate in Electrical Work. These were very encouraging results from children who would not have been able to succeed with the help needed for their schooling. As the children are growing older there is the challenge of increasing school fees alongside other needs for trips, etc in their school lives.

Despite the passing of Grandma Gertrude the work has continued with others continuing to do their best for the children although she is still sadly missed by all those children she served and cared for and those elderly in the local community. Sadly Angela Nanziri passed away as she was being taken to hospital, she was the youngest of our original orphans at Nanulya Village.

We successfully received re-registration this year of our NGO status after submitting all our details for approval. Despite this there have been very many challenges which have come for NGO's working in Uganda with many requirements coming in to play by the Government.

There was a visit earlier this year from one of our trustees and other supporters of Lazarus Ministries. During this visit the children from both children's homes were able to meet for the first time. They met up at a beach resort near Entebbe and were treated to a boat ride, lunch and other entertainment. Everyone was very excited by this trip as they are very rare. This was followed up by a visit to Lweru Children's Home by a group of the followers.

As trustees of Lazarus Ministries, we feel, again, that we have been able to maintain the work at both children's homes during this year. We are always very concerned for the health and safety of these young children and youth and every effort is made to always make this our priority.

New works have also begun in Zimbabwe, South Africa, Nigeria, Kenya, India and also in Lahore in Pakistan.


Work began in Bulawayo, Zimbabwe with the blind and disabled who were forced to beg on the street to provide food for themselves. We have been able to send them monthly support in the form of a monthly food package and this has been sustained and still continues. This work then was extended to help people in Care Homes and monthly food packages have helped them enormously as they previously were solely dependent on 'out-of-date' food which was delivered to them. Access has been gained into the prisons where a spiritual work has begun and many requests for Bibles have been satisfied. The door was opened for us to ship drums to Bulawayo being filled with essential things like clothes, shoes, Vaseline, cd players, dvd players and much spiritual material which they were desperate for. NGO status was applied for and this was granted last year.

The work was extended to the team in South Africa where a work began with the homeless and drug addicts being able to give them food and drink on a monthly basis. Spiritual help has been given and in one particular case, a lady has been taken from begging on the streets and helped with regular food packages and with much needed medical help. Extended help has been given where it has been needed as many suffer with conditions because they are unable to pay for medical help. Help was also extended to students in university who were struggling with mental issues. The work was then extended into Nigeria where much needed Bibles are distributed among the poor and in the villages.

We have been helping when we have been able a Children's Centre in Kenya where children who belong to very poor families are fed and educated; those who are unable to pay school fees. Also in India where there is much work amongst the poor and with the children we have been able to send help when requested.

A new regular work has begun in Lahore, Pakistan; A group of young women have been there to help and go out into the community and villages to help poor families with food and teaching. We have been able to support them with funds on a monthly basis.
