TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the Oriental Fine Arts Academy of London's (OFAAL's) constitution [governing document], the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland

Objectives and activities

The Trustees have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Commission. The principal objectives of the charity are as follow:

To Advance education, but not exclusively amongst Asian people in Greater London by:

- Establishing and maintaining an academy to provide institution in the fine arts (including dance, vocal training and playing of musical instruments) and acting as an examination body in the same.
- Promoting their native languages and cultures.
- Promoting the education and training of those granted refugee status and their dependents in need to advance and assist them in life to adapt within the new community.
- Providing facilities for the daily care, recreation, and education of children during and out of school hours and school holidays.
- To provide facilities for recreation or other leisure-time occupation in the interests of social welfare for those in need due to their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances, with the objective of improving their conditions in life.

Public Benefit Statement

Public benefit is at the heart of what it means to be a Charity. The following two criteria would define the "Public Benefit".

1. There must be identifiable benefits.
2. The benefits must be to the public.

The trustees of Oriental Fine Arts Academy of London (OFAAL) have been extremely busy in fulfilling the objectives of the constitution and have also spent a large amount of time working with the service users in UK and Europe. As a result, the organisation is becoming very popular and is recognised as the household name within the Fine Arts Community. OFAAL is the first choice of South Asian Fine Arts examination in UK & Europe for teachers, their students and fine arts institutions. The feedback received from the Fine arts teachers, Fine Arts institution, South Asian community schools in UK, Mainland Europe and Scandinavia indicates the charity and its trustees are doing a great service to the community. The service users are extremely happy with the Charity and the service they are receiving from OFAAL.

OFAAL has several offerings to the community:

- South Asian Fine Arts examination is the largest offering
- followed by the OFAAL Tamil and Advanced Fine Arts school, workshops to the Fine Arts teachers, students
- networking the Fine Arts teachers, community schools and other institutions.

During 2019, the trustees of OFAAL had opened the following additional examination centres in Scotland, Wales and England. -Belfast, and Dublin in Ireland and Northern Ireland and Finland.

-In 2020, we examined students from USA, India, Dubai and Canada

OFAAL trustee, Mrs. Anne Primini Vimaladasa is instrumental in opening these centres. She is a highly qualified fine arts teacher and well respected by the entire fine arts organisations in UK, Europe and Scandinavia. OFAAL is proud to state this is the largest growth of examination centres over the period of three years. The increase in candidates and the demand to open new centres is a result of the popularity of OFAAL and the trust placed on OFAAL trustees who are ensuring a smooth and efficient conduct of the examination process.

By working closer with the community, trustees have now managed to register more than six hundred Fine Arts teachers and selected more than two hundred and seventy-five Fine Arts independent examiners. All new examiners undergo a thorough and stringent training programme prior to become examiners.

OFAAL had introduced a new subject of examination named Kuchipudi during 2017. This is another form of classical Indian Dance originated in South India. The trustees of OFAAL and our Music and Dance committee worked with the Telugu speaking and Kuchipudi dance teachers to formulate a syllabus, examination marking scheme and theory papers. It is pertinent to mention OFAAL trustee Mrs. Anne Primini Vimaladasa and OFAAL music committee member and the Head of Instruments Mrs. Thusyanthy Thiyagarah were the architects of the introduction of Kuchipudi dance to OFAAL. This process had taken two years to launch, however, we had ensured that this syllabus is to the equivalent standard as our other syllabuses. As a result of introducing Kuchipudi, we have attracted a wider spread of the South Asian community who are non-Tamil speaking students. Furthermore, OFAAL has seen the rise in non-Tamil speaking candidates within the last few years. OFAAL Trustees are glad to notice that many high grade Kuchipudi students were examined during 2019 & 2020.

It is extremely rewarding for the trustees to witness many the service users are now actively participating, volunteering and promoting OFAAL and its services to others. In addition to the above activities the charity usually undertakes the following activities; in any financial year, in furtherance of the purpose of the charity, but all these are activities have been hindered by the Covid 19 .

- 1) Navarathiri Festival: This festival is usually celebrated at the school, Wembley Eelapatheeswaran temple and Ealing Kanagathurkai Amman temple. The school children, parents and hundreds of people participate and contribute to this special important function. These programs give an additional opportunity for students to display and improve their talents. However, due to covid-19, sadly we could not participate this program.
- (2) Christmas Function: The Christmas function is usually attended by several hundred-people including the school children, parents, and the teachers. The trustees and other well-wishers help several under privileged children by providing with various costumes, clothes, and other support. The children and the parents thoroughly enjoy this event year on year. and the trustees & the School senior management team are congratulated and highly praised by the parents and the general public for delivering such entertaining cultural programmes. However, we could not celebrate this event to comply with to covid-19 guidelines.
- (3) Thiyagaraja Utsavam: Thiyagaraja Aradhana is an annual Carnatic music festival held in January and February. OFAAL school Senior teachers Mr & Mrs Nagaraju, one of the trustee Mr Niranjan usually take an active part in celebrating this special classical music programme. A number of teachers from OFAAL school usually participate in this event. This programme is usually televised in England, Europe and other parts of the world. However, covid 19 restrictions had prevented OFAAL to participate this popular program.
- (4) Harvest Festival (Thai Pongal): OFAAL usually celebrates the Harvest festival in a traditional manner in every January. This festival is normally celebrated in South India, Srilanka, Malaysia in a large scale. The school children were taught the significant of this festival and were given an opportunity to design posters to demonstrate their understanding of this festival. A number of students were trained to give a speech in Tamil language about the significance of the festival and some of the students have prepared poems about this festival. However, covid-19 restrictions had prevented OFAAL to participate this popular program.
- (5) Elocution Competition: A large number of children usually participate in this competition. Children are given various topics to prepare for this competition. The school teachers together with help from some able parents coach the students. External competent judges are brought in to judge the students. The judges praise the high standard of students. These are some of the transferable skills the students at the age of five to eighteen gain by attending the OFAAL school. However, covid-19 restrictions had prevented OFAAL to participate elocution competition.
- (6) Thirukural Competition: This is another important competition where children from the age of five to eighteen participated at the school. By participating this competition, students will learn a lot of moral values, cultural values, how to live in a society as a good citizen etc. A large number of parents also participate this competition. Participating Thirukural competition gives an opportunity for children, parents, teachers and trustees. It is pertinent to learn Tamil cultural ancient social and individual moral righteous values. Unfortunately, due to Covid 19 restrictions, OFAAL trustees were not be able to conduct this program.
- (7) School Sports week; Almost every student and the parents actively participate in school's sport week. The trustees and the school management team put a lot of effort to make this event a successful and joyous one. Trustees, parents, teachers take time off from work and train the students in various sports activities. On the final day of the week, OFAAL conducts the sports competition day or sports meet. Children are encouraged by providing with certificates for participating the games and trophies and medals for becoming the champion and runners up. This is another aims and objective of the charity which was fulfilled. However, due to covid-19, OFAAL trustees could not conduct this popular sports day.
- (8) The school annual prize day: This is the most important event of the academic year. Annual prize day usually take place at Alperton Community School and attended by more than five hundred people. Every student is trained to participate in at least one programme. The Programme includes various dramas, orchestras, dance programme, Speeches, Dance dramas, comedy programme etc. Prize giving is the most important part of the event and the students are encouraged by giving prizes for their school academic achievements. The trustees can see the progress of these children during the academic year by their performance. Once again, the trustees of OFAAL could not conduct this very important popular event.

(9) During 2019 and 2020, the Hon Vice Chairman took an initiative and coordinated with the music committee members and published very detailed syllabus books for each subject. This took several hundred hours and more than one year to complete. Trustees received a lot of positive feedback from the service users, teachers and community schools and other Fine Arts institution regarding this book. This will aid the Teachers and students to understand what to expect at the examination and able to learn the subject in more detail and in a timely manner.

(10) Impact of Covid 19

Following the sudden announcement by the UK Government about Covid-19 and its deadly impact at the latter part of March 2020, OFAAL trustees took the following brave decisions to safeguard our children, parents, teachers, examiners and other stakeholders, including the trustees:

- all face-to-face activities were put on hold, including running weekend OFAAL Tamil school, and OFAAL examinations
- to stop the administrative staff to come to the OFAAL office. Instead, the admin staff work was shared between trustees, who happily took the additional responsibility to complete these tasks from their home.
- OFAAL school activities were conducted using zoom facilities. Initially the students, parents and teachers struggled to adjust to the new technology "zoom". As time passed by, more students started attending the zoom classes. Since, the regular Tamil teachers were not available, these zoom classes were conducted by volunteer acting teachers.
- to cancel the busy and popular April OFAAL examinations in the UK and in the Europe.

The cancellation of April 2020 examination was duly informed to all affected parties, such as students, parents, teachers, examiners, institutions and others via email, telephone, texts, zoom meetings, and OFAAL web.

- the students and parents were given choices either to transfer the paid fee to the future examinations or to refund. This action was very positively received by the students and parents. However, the extra activities had put a lot of strain on trustees and had incurred fair amount of costs, since our OFAAL web needed additional feature to handle this extra demand.
- regarding the April OFAAL examinations, the trustees of OFAAL had eventually managed to offer online examination in September 2020 and October 2020, using the zoom facility. Initially, the online examination wasn't that easy for trustees, we were faced with a number of obstacles (unfamiliar technologies, controlling students, examiners weren't easy). However, this online examination has opened up new ways of doing things and given us the opportunity to explore new markets and new products which were not possible due to geographical barriers.
- the most difficult challenge was the OFAAL theory examination since it used to be a written examination. However, using the latest technology, OFAAL pioneered the online theory examination by having a pool of theory questions, and students are given random unique questions from the pool of questions.
- only about 1/3 of the students participated the September/ October 2020 online examination.
- the new way of conducting theory and practical examination was only possible due to the hard of our trustees Mr Niranjan, Mr Selvendran, Mr Sritharan and Mrs Vimaladasa.
- after witnessing the success of the online examination, the OFAAL trustees believe, this is a new way forward to expand OFAAL's market territories, such as Australia, Canada, USA, Malaysia, Singapore, India, Sri Lanka, and some Middle-East countries.

Lock down has disrupted the fine Arts activities in the UK and Europe and ground to a halt. OFAAL school could not continue to provide its language classes, Fine Arts practical and theory classes, providing work shop and other learning opportunities to the Fine Arts Teachers and Fine Arts Students. As a result of sudden government shut down OFAAL trustees had to postpone the practical and the theory examinations with short notice. OFAAL witnessed the entire Fine Arts community was collapsing without any support. Students attending Tamil Language and Fine Arts classes, Fine Arts and language Teachers looked upon OFAAL to find a solution to support them in their learning and teaching process fine Arts teachers. OFAAL trustees seen evidences a number of students completely stopped learning Fine Arts and their mother tongue.

Trustees and the Examination committee made use of the Lockdown period to review the examination processes and examination materials. It is pertinent to mention Hon Vice Chairman Mr Selvendren and the UK Coordinator Mr Niranjan conducted several online meetings with the Chief Examiner and the other Examination committee members and expanded the syllabus for ease of teaching and ease of learning. Several hundred hours of their personal time was spent in this project

Despite the Covid-19 severe disruption and government shut down, trustees developed new examination processes using online technology (Zoom) and video conferencing facility.

Two of the trustees namely Mr S Selvendren and Mr P Niranjana have spent thousands of hours and twenty three zoom meetings and they were able to develop a new process to conduct South Asian Fine Arts Practical and Theory examination.

Part of this process they had to develop theory examinations to conduct through the Zoom which takes any time from one hour to three hours. In addition, they had to develop marking schemes which have been scrutinized by independent subject matter expertise. The entire examination process was piloted several times and tried using different window operating systems and different computer hardware such as (Desktops, Laptops, Tablets and Mobile phones). Furthermore, the entire examination process was tested for bullet proof and no room for any cheating or other abuse.

Prior to conducting the examination, OFAAL carried out a survey from the students, teachers and other establishments. The feedback from the survey was overwhelming support for an online examination. A separate meeting was conducted online with the Examination Committee, Examiners, Examination centre coordinators and other stakeholders. This meeting was conducted several times to clear any doubt and the examiners to familiarise with the new online examination process. It was a pleasure to see a UK candidate was examined by UK and Norwegian examiners or UK and other European examiners. It was the first time a large number of Fine Arts teachers were able to meet each other during these meetings. This process was also permitted OFAAL to network the entire Fine Arts Community within Europe efficiently and effectively.

OFAAL is proud to announce this is the first time South Asian Fine Arts Examination was conducted for several thousand students using Video Conferencing Platform (Zoom).

This mammoth task was very cleverly process mapped and tried and tested using various pilot schemes. OFAAL trustees would like to thank the music committee and other examination centre coordinators in Europe for their tireless support to make it possible. Our service users were extremely overwhelmed by OFAAL offering such opportunity to continually learn and participate in the fine arts examination.

There are a number of Fine Arts teachers who were unable to continue their teaching due to government shut down and unable to maintain the necessary social distances. OFAAL trustees assisted a large number of Fine Arts Teachers to set upon-line teaching facility and coach them to teach through on-line.

OFAAL online examination was very quickly reached the entire world and several hundred students enquired about OFAAL examination and wanted to participate in the examination. Telephones never stopped; Several E-mails had been received every day. OFAAL is concerned this is another ground-breaking opportunity to provide its services to the wider community. Trustees and the members of OFAAL was excited the new examination process was extremely successful and able to conduct both Theory and Practical Examination at its highest quality.

Volunteers

The volunteers are heart of OFAAL's operations. They are mainly the parents, Tamil language teachers, and Fine Arts Teachers from OFAAL Tamil and Fine Arts school, or active young independent Fine Arts teachers. The volunteers are either paid a nominal fee or no payment at all.

Achievements and performance

Further Milestone Achievements during 2001:

1. Accreditation with RSL (Rock school)

OFAAL trustees are delighted to announce that OFAAL has collaborated with RSL to award candidates taking grade 3 to 8 OFAAL examination which now carry ofqual accredited certificates in addition to ucas points for grade 6 to 8 from September 2021 examination onward. We are hopeful that this partnership with RSL will benefit numerous candidates pursuing Fine Arts degree in any university. We will fully elaborate about this milestone achievement in our 2021 trustees' report.

2. Long dragged IPO (Intellectual Property Office) case with WLTS (West London Tamil School)

OFAAL trustees had spent several hundred hours since 2014 fighting to register the trademarks "OFAAL" and "Oriental Fine Arts Academy of London" rightfully in OFAAL name. However, WLTS trustees had objected, these two trademarks being registered in OFAAL names, instead WLTS trustees claimed these two trade names should be registered in WLTS name. The IPO have held a tribunal (cross examination by person) on 9th September 2021 to hear both parties' evidences. OFAAL trustees are delighted to make it public that the tribunal made a decision that the above mentioned two trademarks belong to OFAAL charity. The OFAAL trustees will make a full declaration in its 2021 trustees report. OFAAL members have congratulated the OFAAL trustees for their another success and able to protect the Intellectual property rights and the trade mark of Oriental Fine Arts Academy of London and OFAAL. OFAAL trademark solicitors have sent a letter to WLTS trustees and member of the teaching staff to not to use OFAAL or Oriental Fine Arts Academy of London in any of their correspondences.

Further evidence of fulfilling Public Benefits

OFAAL is now offering additional Fine Arts subjects and conducting graduation ceremonies to those who have completed teachers grade and Post Diploma Levels.

Graduation Ceremonies: OFAAL decided to conduct this event is to encourage Grade 8 (Diploma) candidates and honour them in front of parents, music teachers, and distinguished guests. These have been a huge success. Thousands of people attended the graduation ceremony and for the substantial number of students this was their first graduation ceremony. Graduation ceremony was conducted the same style as any reputable Universities in the United Kingdom. Students who attended the ceremonies were ecstatic and were proud to receive their awards and qualifications. Planning and the execution of these events consume a lot of time and energy of the trustees.

1. OFAAL's very first graduation was held in the UK in Jan 2016, where more than 200 Diploma and Post-Diploma students took part of it.
2. The second wave of graduation was held in Began, Norway in January 2017, where more than 50 Diploma and Post-Diploma students took part of it.
3. Followed by Bergen, Norway, OFAAL had its third graduation in Dortmund, Germany in March 2017, where more than 150 Diploma and Post-Diploma students took part of it.
4. The fourth graduation was held in Oslo, Norway in October 2017, where more than 60 Diploma and Post-Diploma students took part of it.
5. The fifth graduation was held in January 2018 at Hertfordshire University, where more than 120 Diploma and Post-Diploma students took part of it.
6. The sixth graduation was held in France in November 2018, where more than 80 students took part of it.
7. The seventh graduation was held in February 2020 in the UK at Watetersmeet Theatre.
8. Examination Growth – Number of students who have taken the fine arts examination are growing year by year. The OFAAL Trustees are overwhelmed by this growth and feel extremely satisfied that their non-remunerated efforts are being paid off.
9. During 2019, there were about 40 Tamil language speaking children took part of GCSE Tamil examination conducted by Cambridge University, almost all of them had passed with high grades. The credit should go to the hard-working Tamil language highly trained and committed teachers at OFAAL Tamil and fine arts school. The trustees would like to extend their congratulations to those children who worked tirelessly hard.
10. Through OFAAL Tamil & Fine Arts school, more than 30 children had obtained reputable University entrance for different courses.
11. Due to high achievements in the University entrance & GCSE Tamil language conducted by Cambridge University, more and more parents are enrolling their children at OFAAL Tamil and Fine Arts School held on every Saturday, at Alperton Community School. The trustees would like to extend their gratitude to the Head Master Mr MT Selvarajah, the Director of Education Mrs Nalayini Kuganathan and the Deputy Head Teacher Mrs Primine Vimaladasa.
12. Post Diploma Graduates: These students go beyond diploma or grade 8. The students who become passed out post diploma, consider Fine Arts seriously and they are the future generation of teachers who will take the ancient fine arts into the future generation. Passing post diploma needs lots of dedication, research, commitment and pure interest in fine arts. Upon passing this tough examination, they are honoured with the prestigious title of
 - Vocal & Instrument – Sangeetha Kala Ratnam
 - Bharathanatiam (Dance) – Natiya Kala Ratnam
 - Mirudangam (Percussion Instrument) – Mirudanga Kala Ratnam

The requirements for sitting for post diploma are

- the candidate should have passed Grade 8 or Diploma
- they should submit a dissertation in their chosen topic for less than 5000 words
- they should be prepared to present this dissertation in front of highly qualified examiners, and public audience
- they should be prepared for the practical examination for more than 60 minutes.

OFAAL trustees are so proud to report that there is an increase interest among grade 8 passed out students would like to do post-diploma

Location & Area of Operation

The OFAAL Trustees are extremely pleased to report that the long-term dream of having a permanent building is secured now. The trustees made this decision to make use of the cash reserve which was being accumulated, and the trustees felt to buy a free-hold property is the best financial decision for the trust. In addition to this, that the trustees felt, having a permanent office is needed to support the OFAAL operation. The trustees' dream came true in July 2018, OFAAL had bought a free-hold property in Sudbury, a most popular place where all commuting and other facilities are in abundance. The architecture to secure the property was OFAAL's Hon. Chairman Mr Suresh. The trustees would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr Suresh for his extra ordinary contribution.

The Charity operates throughout UK, Germany, France, Norway, Holland and Denmark.

Fundraising Activities

The fund-raising activities comprises the followings:

1. Independent OFAAL Examination – The examination comprises 9 grades, namely from Grade 1 to Grade 8 (Diploma) and Post-Diploma. Each grade is charged at a different price, the higher the grade, the higher the price. However, these prices are charged at a very nominal fee. OFAAL generates most of its income from examination fee.
2. Graduation Ceremony – The participating students are charged a nominal fee to take part in the graduation ceremony.
3. OFAAL Tamil & Fine Arts School – The students pay a nominal fee for each subject they enrol.
4. General Public – OFAAL does carry out any fund raising activity with a view to collect from the general public.

Covid-19

During 2020, OFAAL's most of the annual activities were very badly affected, still the school's Director, Head Master and the Deputy Head Teacher are doing an excellent job in managing the school and promoting Tamil language, Fine Arts and conducting various cultural programmes & competitions. They conduct the OFAAL Tamil and Advanced Fine Arts School on every Saturday without any fail through the new technology "zoom".

Due to the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, trustees have now reduced the class sizes and increased the number of classes for each fine arts subject by using the zoom facility. Teachers are now able to spend more time with the students and provide a high level of coaching. Whilst this approach put a lot of administrative strain on the charity, the trustees and the school can see a considerable improvement on the students' performances.

The Trustees are very pleased to announce, that OFAAL has over forty examination centres in UK and Europe. Each examination demands hundreds of hours of the trustees and other volunteers' time.

Hon Treasurer and the German Coordinator has been doing a sterling job in the control of finance. Once again due to our Hon Treasurer's commitment, we are able to file the audited accounts and the trustees report within the timescale.

The trustees are faced with unusual challenge time in conducting OFAAL school, UK & Overseas examination, and conducting seminars to the examiners due to Covid 19 pandemic threat.

Financial review

The results for the year are shown in the financial statements. The statement of the financial activities shows the incoming resources and the resources expended by the different activities concluded by the charity. In order to provide a better understanding of the activities undertaken, a summary of the activities is included.

The statement of Financial Activities and related notes show how the charity's funds have been applied during the year. The gross receipts of the charity were £146,640(2019: £384,502). The charity has achieved a net surplus for the year of £16,007(2019:£35,295), after accounting for foreign exchange gains/loss of £23,427 (2019: £32,496). Total income fund balances of £608,325 (2019: £584,898) will be carried forward to the next accounting period.

Relationship with Other Charity

The Trust does not have any direct or indirect relationship with any other Charity operating in the UK or other parts of the world.

Reserves Policy

The trustees consider that the charity's reserves are adequate to meet its day to day expenditure and in the event of a shortfall they have access to sufficient resources to meet any deficit. For this reason, the Trustees do not believe a minimum level of reserve should be maintained.

Investment Policy

The assets of the charity are held in the names of the holding Trustees. The constitution authorises the trustees to make capital investments in furtherance of the Charity's objectives.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the OFAAL is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Risk Management

The Trustees recognise that effective risk management is essential in achieving the Charity's objectives. Risk management is considered as an integral element of all decision making and identifying appropriate procedures to ensure that risk levels are acceptable in each case. The Trustees believe that it is important to develop and enhance the approach in risk management to ensure it remains fit for the purpose. The Charity will formalise the risk management and create a risk register which will be reviewed on a regular basis.

Since the Charity operates in the mainland Europe, it receives fair amount of Euro money as students' fee income. However, almost all the operational expenses are incurred and paid out in Sterling Pounds. Therefore, the excess Euro money is left is exposed for currency gain or loss.

During 2019, the exposure to the foreign exchange loss was very minimal.

Plans for future periods

Plans- Short Term

The trustees consider two to three years as short term, and intend to carry out the following tasks.

1. Continue to manage the Charity as efficient as possible by improving the community and social activities.
2. Enhance the structure of the Charity by involving more youths who have completed either Diploma grade or Post Diploma grade in their chosen subject/s.
3. Develop plan for future of the Charity considering/ nominating additional second-generation Trustees with due care.
4. Develop a financial plan and strategy for the purchase of a free-hold property which will meet the Charity's administration and logistical need.
5. Continue with current charitable activities considering the social impact on the community in the UK as well as other countries where OFAAL has vested interest.
6. Develop comprehensive training program for newly Diploma or Post-Diploma passed out young musicians to become properly trained examiners, since the Trustees firmly believe, that they are future of OFAAL.
7. Aim to have less than 20 students in every Tamil classes conducted by OFAAL Tamil and Fine Arts School.
8. Aim to have at least four fine art teachers for every fine art subjects (Vocal, Violin, Veena, Flute, keyboard, and percussion instrument)
9. Makes the OFAAL Tamil & Fine Arts School operation to be the number one Tamil & Fine arts school in the UK.
10. To recruit a permanent staff during 2021 who has the knowledge of fine arts music subjects and the relevant market. The trustees believe that this appointment will create and promote the awareness of the extra benefits attached with the collaboration with RSL and to deal with the possible extra demand that ofqual accredited certificates and ucas points will bring to OFAAL.

Plans - Medium Term

The trustees consider three to six years as medium term, and intend to carry out the following tasks.

1. Continue to manage the charity as efficient as possible and improve community and social activities.
2. Continue to improve the Charity's youth organisation and promote youth activities.
3. Devise a plan to work with external UK educational system whereby OFAAL's Diploma or Post-Diploma qualifications are recognised for UCAS (Universities and Colleges Administration Service) points.
4. Expand the other geographical area within UK and mainland European countries, where OFAAL does not conduct examination.
5. Open another OFAAL Tamil and Fine Arts school operation into Greenford & Southall area where Tamils and South Asian people live predominantly

Plans - Long Term

The trustees consider beyond six years as long term and intend to carry out the following tasks.

1. Purchase a free-hold land where OFAAL could build a performance hall to conduct music programs and graduation ceremony.
2. Continue to manage the Charity as efficient as possible.
3. Maintain a high standard by which OFAAL will be well known in the world.
4. Active youths are trained through whom OFAAL activities (independent examination as well Tamil & Fine arts School) are run.
5. Identify fully trained, efficient and trust worthy youths to whom the OFAAL operations can be handed over.

Structure, governance and management

Oriental Fine Arts Academy of London is a charity established in England. The principal address is 183 Burnt Oak Broadway,



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Oriental Fine Arts Academy of London is a charity established in the UK. The principal address is 183 Burnt Oak Broadway, Edgware, HA8 5EH.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the OFAAL's [governing document], the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The OFAAL is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The OFAAL has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the OFAAL. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the OFAAL has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the OFAAL.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the OFAAL is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the OFAAL has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the OFAAL has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

1 Accounting policies

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Costs of charitable activities comprise all costs incurred in the pursuit of the charitable objects of the charity and are allocated to the respective activities. Support costs are apportioned between charitable activities in proportion to the charitable income received.

1.6 Intangible fixed assets other than goodwill

Intangible assets acquired separately from a business are recognised at cost and are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

Intangible assets acquired on business combinations are recognised separately from goodwill at the acquisition date where it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the entity and the fair value of the asset can be measured reliably; the intangible asset arises from contractual or other legal rights; and the intangible asset is separable from the entity.

Amortisation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

1.7 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.8 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the OFAAL reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1 Accounting policies

1.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.10 Financial instruments

The OFAAL has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the OFAAL's balance sheet when the OFAAL becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the OFAAL's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.11 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the OFAAL is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.12 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the OFAAL's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
