Performance and Achievements

From the Chairperson

During the year ended 31 March 2025, The Nagajuna Trust continued its core purpose of supporting the education, welfare and wellbeing of vulnerable children in Nepal. The commitment of the Nagajuna Modern school's staff, and the optimism and resilience shown by the children themselves, remain deeply inspiring to the trustees.

Nepal continues to face significant economic challenges. Rising inflation, increased fuel and food costs, and ongoing political instability have placed additional strain on families and educational institutions alike. These pressures disproportionately affect vulnerable children, making the stability offered by Nagajuna Modern School ever more vital. Despite these conditions, the school has continued to provide a safe, structured and nurturing environment for its students.

Throughout the year, trustees maintained regular oversight of finances and governance. Funds were transferred in a timely manner to support the school's running costs, and expenditure was monitored closely to ensure charitable funds were applied fully in line with our objectives. This year we sadly lost one of a long term and most generous sponsors. His support alone has provided a tertiary education to over 30 kids. It has proved difficult to replace this money so meanwhile, we have committed to support those children already in tertiary training to complete their courses. However, unless we can find a replacement sponsor specifically for this funding, the Trustees have concluded that our first priority is to the Nagajuna Modern School itself.

We are extremely grateful to our regular sponsors, grant-making trusts and individual donors whose generosity enables the school to continue operating effectively. Their continued support provides children not only with education, but with security, nourishment and hope for the future.

The Year in Nepal: April 2024 – March 2025

During the reporting period, Nagajuna School delivered a broad programme of academic learning, cultural celebration and pastoral care.

Children worked diligently toward their annual examinations, demonstrating determination and perseverance throughout the academic year. Achievement and effort were recognised through annual examinations and prize distribution, reinforcing the value of consistent study and resilience.

Cultural and community celebrations played an important role in school life. Tibetan New Year (Losar) was marked with traditional dress, food, music and dance, strengthening cultural identity and intergenerational learning among the children. Teachers' Day provided an opportunity for students to express gratitude and appreciation for staff dedication, further reinforcing positive relationships within the school community.

Children's Day was celebrated with games, performances and shared activities, fostering joy, confidence and inclusion. Events such as spelling contests and quiz competitions encouraged academic development alongside teamwork and self-belief, promoting healthy competition and engagement across age groups.

An annual school picnic provided a valuable opportunity for relaxation and social bonding outside the classroom. Recreational activities and shared meals allowed children and staff to enjoy time together in a less structured environment, contributing positively to wellbeing and emotional health.

Visits from supporters including Jodie and Tom during the year enabled practical improvements to school infrastructure and provision. It also allows an independent examination of the school provision and conditions. Investments that have been made in maintenance, equipment and nutrition have directly benefited the children's daily lives and reinforced the trustees' commitment to ensuring funds are used effectively and responsibly.

The Nagajuna learners in India and China in University education have continued to amaze with their resilience, hard work and fortitude. The global work place will be lucky to have these inspiring young adults.

Despite a challenging geopolitical and economic context in Nepal, Nagajuna Modern School remained a place of continuity, safety and care. The school continues to protect children from educational exclusion and social vulnerability, offering them opportunity, stability and dignity.

Dennis Crommentuijn-Marsh, one of our Trustees was able to visit during this financial year. This gave another opportunity to ensure that our funds are being used appropriately, and that good governance prevails. A thorough audit was conducted of both accounts and spending, matching these back with our UK charity fund distribution. The trip bought renewed motivation to continue to support these fine young people and their carers.

We continued to enjoy support from our kind and generous regular sponsors who have been the steady income we have need. We remain grateful to them all.

The Year in Nepal: April 2023 – March 2024

April

During this time of year, the children are work harder than usual as it can determine their grade for the whole year. The excitement to move to the next grade comes with lots of hard work and determination. The children are up early around 4:00 AM and some of the seniors stay up quite late studying for their exams.

The perseverance and hard work of everyone finally tallies in numbers. Most of the students worked very hard and did not leave any stone unturned. The prize distribution was on 7th April and everyone enjoyed it.

May

Tsering Yangchen it's from a remote village in Manang and she joined Nagajuna when she was just five years old. She started at Nagajuna from kindergarten, working all away up to her degree. She graduated from Baldwin Methodist College in Bangalore with a degree in Business Administration. She has decided to volunteer at the school for a few years before she joins the workforce. Tsering is teaching English from kindergarten to grade 5. She has been implementing different strategies she had learned from her stay in Bangalore. Her her gentle persona makes her extremely careful and polite towards the children.

June

Ever since the establishment of Nagajuna, Yeshe has made all the attempts he could for the children to have everything a regular school would have. Despite all this, we were still in need of more resources and experts to build a library that was age appropriate and that could enhance the existing knowledge. All dreams came true when Haileybury school Australia, decided to sponsor us with a library. We did not have a library prior to this project, the new library not only accommodates books but also a computer room, a staff room and storage. Yeshe did the best he could to buy children books when he came to India or Kathmandu but since the rest were mostly donated, the old books were all genres and it lacked resources. This new library project promised to not only bring books that were age appropriate but to accommodate the children's level of knowledge and understanding. It came with a container with furnishings that houses all the books.

July

Dance competition 6th of July. With the completion of the annual exam, the school environment is a bit more relaxed and there is ample time to focus on extra curriculum activities like dance. The children, under the guidance

of the teachers, chose to a song to compete with other children from of the other houses. We invited a choreographer as a judge in the inter house dance competition.

Mr Srogtsen La and Mr Yangzom Gyalzur have been consistently supporting Nagajuna for quite a few years through their charity. Everything they have been providing was based on the pictures sent by Yeshi and they had never visited the school. After the pandemic they finally decided to visit Nagajuna and meet the children they had been supporting. They got to know more about the current situation of the school and the backgrounds of the children.

August

Nagajuna has been receiving Haileybury volunteers since 2000. There has always been so much to learn for the children here at Nagajuna each time they visit. This time the highlight of their visit was setting up the library that the students of Haileybury had worked so hard for and fundraised. Their hard work to make this library the best they could was visible and the children along with Yeshi appreciate all their efforts. During their visit they interacted with the children of Nagajuna and shared about each other's lifestyles. They also taught the children Australian songs, games and briefed them about where in the world Australia was located. None of the children in Nagajuna have been out of the country and it is always fascinating for them to find out about people living in other countries that they can only see in their atlas. On the last day of their visit Yeshi gave all the volunteers a token of love and the children performed a few dances and songs to entertain them, which was a reflection of the culture of the children here at Nagajuna.

Every year, the children practice cultural dances and songs which is also a part of their physical activity. These dances keep them active and more focused when they go back to studying after their practices. As a consequence of the pandemic and social distancing protocols, we could not engage the children in these activities. As soon as the restrictions were removed, we started these activities again. It would not make sense to just practice them so to make it more fruitful and in order for the kids to gain stage confidence, we perform the Annual cultural shows in various settlement camps. These shows teach the children to manage time, face the audience and overall gain confidence and have faith in their performances. The spectators enjoy watching these shows and some people even donated money to show support for the school and to appreciate the children's hard work.

September

Usually we have the annual school picnic after these cultural shows, as these shows take up a huge amount of energy from the children. They have to change their costumes as fast as they can for the next performances. Hence a school picnic after these events is a perfect getaway. This year, Yeshi took the children to a swimming pool that was

located a few kilometres out of the city. It had scenic views. While Yeshi and Tenzin were cooking meals for the children that day, the children enjoyed swimming and eating all the snacks that were being served. From breakfast to their late evening snacks, Yeshi cooked everything himself so the kids would enjoy the best of the best. There were few children who stayed in the water for almost 4-5 hours. There was also a little park with toys for children which the others could enjoy. Around 4 pm in the evening, Tenzin, the staffs and the children gathered around and started dancing. More and more children joined until it was dark and time to go back to school.

October

Every year school organize a quiz competition, this year also we organized quiz competition among 2 houses Trisong and Songtsen with 8 students from each house. The quiz competition was cover a wide range of topic like science history, literature and many more. Finally, Songtsen house won the trophy for this year.

November

Completion of Pemba Chodon's Nursing School [Rajarajeswari Medical College, Bangalore]. It has been almost 25 years since Nagajuna was first established with the intentions to help the needy of the Himalayan region of Nepal. Our first graduate was Anup who graduated in 2020 with a degree in Pharmaceuticals. Each time a child graduates, it gives us immense pleasure and pride as it is the hard work of all the sponsors, well-wishers and Yeshi. This year too, Pemba Chodon who was studying nursing in Bangalore, India graduated and was able to secure herself a job in a hospital in Bangalore. Like her sister Yangchen, she also joined Nagajuna at a very young age, when she was 8. She started Kindergarten as well. Eventually she worked extremely hard, as she only started learning English when she was 8, when most of her classmates were much younger than her. All her hard work paid off and once again a moment of victory for everyone who supported her education. She came from a family that could not afford her proper food or education but now she is able to live off her degree and education.

December

We were blessed with a visit from Dennis, our Dutch Trustee from the UK and his daughter and friends. The visit was filled with acts of kindness and support that made a lasting impact on both the school and its students. The key contributions was the donation of a bread maker, which will help provide fresh bread to the children, ensuring they have a nutritious meal. They also took on the task of fixing the fence between the kitchen, improving safety and security the school's food preparation area. In addition, they led the effort to repaint the school, purchasing the necessary paints and working to refresh the walls around the entire school. The hard work transformed the space, making it brighter and welcoming to the children. They also made a significant contribution to Karma Dechen's health, for the eye surgery, which helped improve her vision and overall well-being. They also ensured the school's lifter was fixed, making it easier for staff to transport heavy items. Moreover, Dennis committed to providing weekly

fruit deliveries for the children, ensuring they have access to healthy snacks. The visit wasn't just about fixing things it was a heartfelt demonstration of care and dedication to improve the children's lives in every possible way. Their generosity and hard work left a lasting impact on the school both in terms of infrastructure and the well-being of the students.

February

Celebrating Tibetan new year at Nagajuna school is an eagerly awaited event for the children, filled with joy and anticipation. On the morning of Losar, students wake up early, the excitement palpable as they prepare for the day of celebration. The air is filled with energy as they get dressed in their new clothes and traditional Tibetan outfits, a special occasion that marks the beginning of the new year. The children, full of enthusiasm, help with the preparations for the day's festivities. Traditional foods, such as momos (dumplings) and sweet treats, are prepared with care, and this whole school buses with the delicious smell of the Losar feast. The students are eager to assist, feeling a strong sense of pride in contributing to the celebration. Throughout the day, the school comes alive with music, dance, and laughter. Traditional Tibetan songs fill the air and the children take part in dances, clapping and spinning in joyful celebration. It's a day where the younger students learn about their cultural traditions from their older peers, everyone, including the teachers and the staff, join in the fun

On April 3rd, the Annual examinations were conducted and the students were all prepared. After the examinations, on April 20 the prize distribution for annual examination was organized. Most students performed well whereas there were few who had slightly deteriorated in their academics because of the lockdown. After the results, the students were given a short holiday for a week. During the short holiday, the classes were being renovated. For many years, the classes had concrete floors. The friction from the desks made the floors dusty and there were many holes. New tiles were being installed to make the classes look clean and make a better learning environment.

May

This was the first year of our students in Mt Kailash and they made us feel very proud with their excellent academic performance. They had to study a new subject but nevertheless they excelled in all the subjects amongst all the students. Yeshe attended their prize distribution and witnessed their achievements.

June

This month was filled with much learning and trying to learn new activities. However, the highlight this month was the vaccination program for cholera and covid for children under 14. This was a huge relief as now all of our staff, senior students and even the juniors would be fully vaccinated. Some health personnel were sent by the local health office and the inoculation of 2nd dose was successfully carried out. The students had been preparing for the inter class poem contest even before their examinations. Finally, on the 29th of June, the competition took place and it was thrilling to see our extra curricular activities being carried out after the pandemic yet again.

July

If you have followed the school for a long time, you may know Anil Nepali. He has been studying in Nagajuna since he was 4 years old and has now completed his SLC. Both of his parents committed suicide and he has been under the care of Nagajuna School, since he was six years old. Yeshe was very concerned that he would indulge in activities that would destroy his life due to his family history. But from a very young age, he was gifted. His skills in art made him stand out and finally after his completion of SLC, he was admitted in Norbulingka School of Arts in Dharamsala, India. In the month of July, Yeshe and Tenzin had taken a trip to Dharamsala to drop him to his new school where he is now learning Thanka, a traditional Tibetan art.

August

3 years back Anita Gurung from Dolpa was brought to school. She was differently abled and couldn't walk straight. For two years that she was in school, Yeshe was consulting doctors from various hospitals in Nepal and India for her treatment. There weren't any hospitals in Pokhara that would treat her condition. A doctor from India said that they could treat her but the chances of her limbs being straight were only 20 percent and it was very expensive too. Luckily, Tenzin met an English man, Mr Bob in her shop and they had the opportunity to talk about her limbs. He was aware of a hospital in Kathmandu that could treat her condition. We hurried and took her to Kathmandu where she started her treatment in the month of May. After thorough treatment she was brought back to school in August after four months. She has to go for routine appointment every once in a month until she is fully recovered. Once she is fully recovered, she will be able to lead a normal life and can perform all the activities a normal child does.

September

Five students who had passed their SLC started their first day of school with their uniform on the 2nd of this month. They were joining a new high school and out of the five, one student has taken up science whereas the rest four has chosen Management as their core subject.

The First Term Examinations were conducted in early September and the results were distributed on the 24th of September. Every two year the children are sent to their villages so, after the result the children were sent to their respective villages. In this examination the students performed much better than the final term because they had been in school for a long period of time and there weren't any breaks or long holidays that kept them from studying. Even though we tried to send all the students, there were few who were unable to go home and we had to keep them back in school.

October

It was festival season and there were only few students left. The flood in summer had washed off half of the lane next to the school gate. The students who stayed back in school with the help of Yeshe and other staff worked few hours in the morning and evening to widen the roads next to the school gate. This was a good activity as it kept them busy in the mornings and evenings of their holiday.

November

For the students who were staying back, Tenzin met a wonderful lady from Canada who was a puppet artist . She was in the school for a few days and taught the students how to make puppets using papier mache. The paintings

and learning from this new method of making puppets, made the children very intrigued and looked forward to teaching it to their other friends once they come back from their villages.

January

Every lunar calendar starts with the celebration of the Tibetan New Year in hopes that the coming year will bring us success and great luck. Like every year this year too we celebrated. The children rise up early in the morning, excited to wear their cultural attire and new clothes. Unlike other days, breakfast is something we all look forward to; sweet rice with nuts and butter, buttery salt tea and fermented rice drink which we can only feast on this particular day. The younger ones are most excited about a package Yeshe and Tenzin prepare each year. The packages contain anything from snacks that are usually not available at the school to daily supplies like new stationery or toothbrushes. Their guesses about what will be in the package sort of marks the start of festive season for children here in Nagajuna. On the day of Losar, everyone comes together to make offerings and hope for a prosperous year ahead for all the sentient beings.

March

During this time of the year, the children are particularly working harder than usual as it can determine their grade of the whole year. The excitement to move to next grade comes with lots of hard work and determination. The children are up early around 4 am and some of the seniors stay up quite late studying for their exams.

Performance and Achievements

From the Chairperson

This period has been slightly easier than its predecessor but has still had many hardships. Lockdowns have continued off and on in Nepal. The children that we support in India have been in hardship as the schools and universities have continued to run remotely throughout 2021. Our trainee medic in China has not been allowed to return and is also learning remotely, which gives problems for practical application of his studies.

The Nepali Government did however allow hostels to reopen in March 2021 so those children who were staying with foster families can finally return to the Nagajuna School. They were also so pleased to be reunited with their friends and teachers. Of course, they all threw themselves into studies have throughout 2021 have been catching up well.

In September 2021 the monsoon in Nepal was terrible and the school suffered a disaster as the river burst its banks. A landslide then caused the water to divert, and it flooded the school, causing damage to the walls, wrecking all the food supplies (which had just been stocked for 3 months) and destroying all the bedding. We launched an appeal and received some generous donations to repair the damage and replace the ruined things.

The economy of Nepal is heavily reliant on tourism which completely stopped and as of March 22 was still a fraction of what it needs to be to support the population. This means that there has been little on the ground support and funds have mostly been from the Nagajuna Trust.

In September 2021, the Nepali Government changed the rules governing non state schools. All 'hostels' like the Nagajuna School had to register as an NGO to receive fees from overseas. This bureaucracy is supposed to protect funds but has the downside to cost the charities involved.

In our financial year we have had little opportunity to run many sponsored events, but we did manage to attend a Christmas fair in Dec 2021. We sold homemade samosa, Christmas sweets, personalised baubles and Christmas cards made by the children. We raised over £600 so were very happy.

We continued to enjoy support from our kind and generous regular sponsors who have been the steady income we have needed throughout the pandemic. We are all extremely grateful to them all.

We hope and pray for better things for the world and our children in the coming year.

When new lockdowns happened, students were allowed to study for 2 hours in the morning and 2 hours in the evening only. The rest of the time they played indoor games and cleaned the school.

In July 2021 the USA donated Covid vaccines to Nepal and the staff at the school were vaccinated.

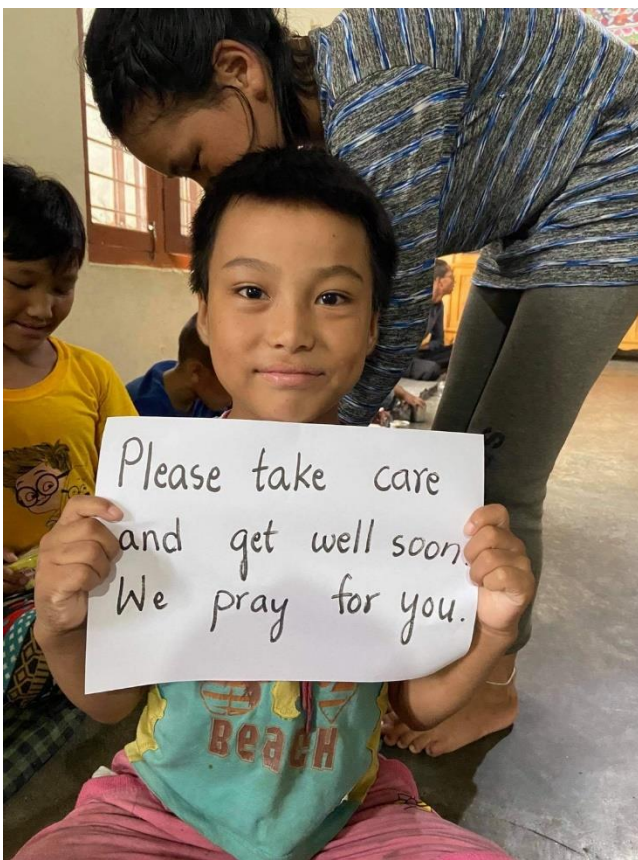
Only the staff that live at the school have been allowed to teach but with the vaccines starting, other staff will return. The kids who go to class outside the school are working online. We use the tablets and phones donated.

In Sep 2021 monsoon we had to witness something unpleasant. There was landslide in our area which flooded the school. It even broke down the walls of the back of the school. One casualty was reported from the area but luckily everyone from the school was safe and the very next day we started the cleaning of the flooded area. The dining and the room with food supplies was flooded so we had to get rid of almost all the food supplies that got contaminated. There were no roads, and the school bus couldn't operate for few days too. However we revived ourselves from the incident soon and got back on track. The students along with the staff started working on making road for the bus and could continue school the next day.





The new year marked the beginning of a new era, living with covid was implemented in all areas and school, offices were commencing again. A group of students who joined Mt Kailash School were also excited as they were about to learn Tibetan and wear their new uniforms. The uniforms that were their cultural outfit made them overwhelmed. The students at Nagajuna were also looking forward to seeing their day scholar teachers after the on and off lockdown that was taking place nationwide. The classes at their hostel were being run by the few teachers who were staying in school which is why they were happy to see their day teachers.



One of our dear sponsors was ill so we did special prayers and sent her wishes for swift recovery.

February is a month of great joy for the children as they celebrate the Tibetan New Year of the lunar calendar. Their classes were running in full swing and so was the festivities approaching. On the day of Losar the students wake up rather early and wear their best attire to bring good luck and prosperity throughout the whole year. On this day they do not have self-study or classes and they have a feast at the school. There was also vaccination program for the senior students who were above 15 and under 18 during this month. We had to go to various places and get the documentation done before vaccinating them. However, the greater portion of the school who were below 15 and over 5 were still left to be vaccinated and we had to still be careful to keep the children safe.

Before the school commenced in January there were classes being held and the first term and midterm had already been conducted. As per the rules of the government the schools were asked to conduct the final examinations in April which is why in the month of March the students were busy with revisions and preparations for examinations. The teachers were also caught up with making question papers. It was difficult for the teachers because since the pandemic we couldn't organize any extracurricular. The students were becoming a little distant from the activities. So along with the examinations the teachers were also preparing them for inter class poem competition and some sports such as table tennis and badminton.





Even though there has been a pandemic, our most recent additions have thrived.

This period has been very hard. The pandemic has meant the school and hostel were closed for most of this accounting period. Children remained in their mountain villages and for those with no homes to go to, they were housed in local homes. The children in India were in lockdown for all of the accounting period though worked remotely where possible. IT equipment was procured to allow this to happen. The damage of this disruption remains to be seen but with over a year out of school and no new recruits, we know that this will have a hard effect on the children we current care for and those that we have been unable to help.

Only in mid March 2021, did the Government of Nepal allow schools and hostels to reopen. The children are so delighted to be back in their classrooms with their friends.

The long term effects on the economy of Nepal will undoubtedly be difficult. Nepal lacks the IT infrastructure of developed countries so online learning has not been the obvious solution. Similarly, the tourist industry which drives a large part of Nepal's GDP has all but vanished and may take years to recover. This in turn has a knock on for the career prospects of our children that we support.

The developed world has largely been concerned with its own populous, but as we have seen, the pandemic does not care for borders or nationality. We have mostly been unable to raise specific funds through sponsored events as we might usually do but our regular sponsors have been true to their belief in our cause and have continued to support and donate, despite their own circumstances and for this we are truly grateful.

We hope and pray for better things for the world and our children in the coming year.
