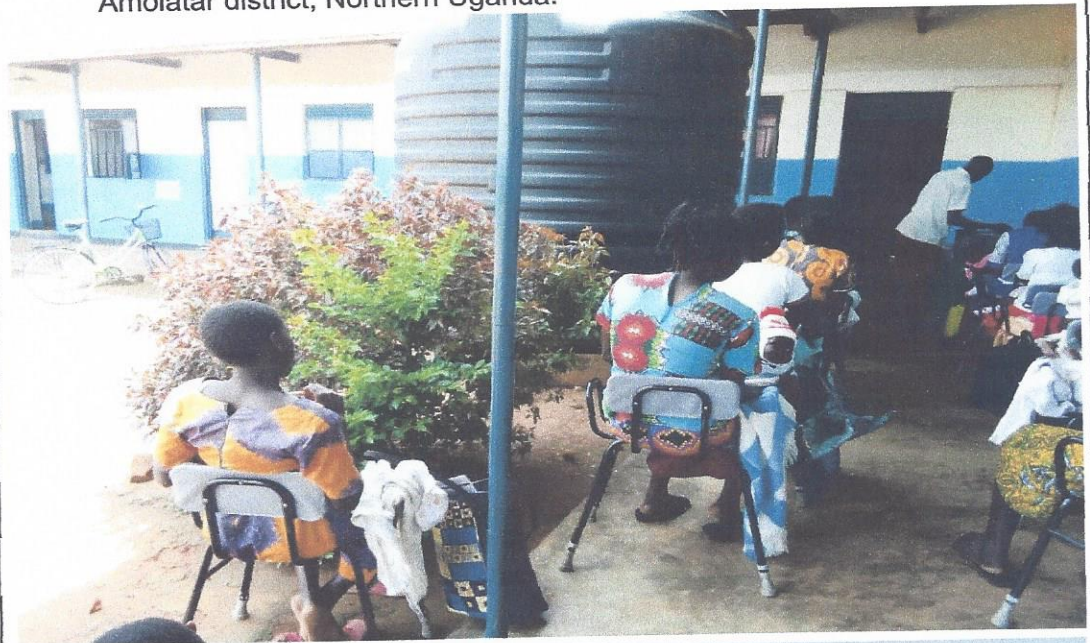

This has been possible because of the donation we receive from our supporters. The ultrasound machine supports timely diagnosis and identification of complications in pregnancy, colposcope and Gynoclar Mobile Colposcope machines helps in cervical cancer screening and treatment.</p> <p>7: Today 50 children were immunised and given mosquito nets at Alemere Medical Aid Uganda Community Health Centre. The Trustees OF Medaid United Kingdom charity present their annual report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2024.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY The advancement of health and saving lives, education and training. The prevention or relief of poverty, climate change mitigation, hospital farming, tree planting, feeding program disability, emergency relief, religious activities, conservation and heritage.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES AND MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE'S RESPONSIBILITIES: Statement of trustees on achievement of the current year and vision for the future is contained in a separate documentation .

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2024

1: Accounting Policies

1.1: The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and follow the recommendations in Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting By Charities.

1.2: Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable.

1.3: Grants are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities on the earlier date of receipt or when receivable, unless they relate to a specified future period, in which case they are deferred.

1.4: Restricted funds are to be used for specified purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund, together with a fair apportionment of support and management and administration costs. Grants for the purchase of fixed assets are initially charged against the fund then transferred to the fixed asset fund.

1.5: Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for charitable purposes.

1.6: Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Management Committee for particular purposes.
