To relieve poverty, advance education, improve access and to provide facilities in the interest of social welfare, recreation, leisure and support with the object of improving the conditions of life for the people of Tanzania and their environment by the provision of such financial or material support and assistance as the trustees shall from time to time determine.

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)

Orphans in the Wild supports Non Government Organisations (Ngo) in Tanzania, East Africa. The specific nature of the support is financial, increasing awareness of the plight of the children and families who are victims of AIDS, coordinating and shipping donated equipment and goods for schools, hospitals and orphanages.

The activities supported by Orphans in the Wild have been deemed to be of public benefit to the communities of Tanzania and the trustees have paid due regard to the guidance on public benefit as given by the Charities Commission of England and Wales. The communities are hard struck by the economic and social impact of HIV/AIDS.

Infection rates in this region of Tanzania (Mufindi District) are around 40% which is one of the highest in the country. The impact on the communities is evident in every walk of life. Anti-retro viral drugs are free but the administration is cumbersome and expensive. The disease impacts the working age group leaving the elderly and very young with no support. The children are often kept away from school to help support the family, especially the girls. The social structure of relatives taking in orphaned children from family is overwhelmed and breaking down leaving children very vulnerable.

In the Mufindi District, current projects include:

Providing direct orphan and foster care at the Children's Village

Implementing kindergarten classrooms in local villages

Sponsoring vulnerable youth to attend school

Training community health workers

Supporting HIV/AIDS clinics

Protecting rainforest flora and fauna through conservation initiatives

We take an integrated, holistic, and long-term approach. Our programmes not only provide immediate support, but are designed to help communities recover and grow sustainably.

Orphans in the Wild trustees have begun to build up an investment sum with the objective that the annual yield will create a sustainable income to pay for the care of those children in the Childrens Village. This decision was made in light of the pandemic and the vulnerability of such a project to the fluctuating nature of donations. Unlike other projects which can be scaled down or up depending on the value of donations, once children are in the Childrens Village they have nowhere else to go and therefore it is fundamental to secure a regular income for their care.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

In line with the investment policy, a substantial investment has been made with the aim to create a sustainable income to protect the children under the care of Foxes Community and Wildlife Conservation in Tanzania.

Orphans in the Wild supports the NGO Foxes Community and Wildlife Conservation Trust (FCWCT) in Mufindi, Tanzania. This has one of the highest infection rates of HIV/AIDS in the whole country.

At the **Igoda Children's Village (ICV)**, we continued to care for orphaned and vulnerable children, ensuring their health, safety, and well-being. Due to government regulations, no child over 18 is permitted to remain in an orphanage. Some children previously fostered by FCWC have now returned to live with relatives in nearby villages. For those who have left but are still in school, we provide continued support in the form of food hampers, assistance with accommodation and the payment of school fees, uniforms and books. Their welfare is regularly monitored.

There are currently **36 children** living at ICV: **18 girls and 18 boys**. All are attending school except *Halima* and *Hezron*, whose medical challenges prevent them from doing so. In addition to this, there are 16 children and young adults who are being supported whilst living in nearby villages. The ages of these 16 are from 7 through to 24.

The Baby House is cared for by our two dedicated house mamas, **Christina Mvinge** and **Mary Kamendu**, who lovingly looked after 7 infants this year 4 girls and 3 boys. The youngest arrived at only 10 days old following the unfortunate death of her mother. All are under 1 year old. 4 of these infants have care plans in place whereby a known relative, father or other close family will resume care of the child after an agreed length of time when they are able to do so.

In 2024, a total of **60 children** attended the **kindergarten**, where they continued to learn and play. In addition, **5 children** were cared for in the **Nursery**. Many of the children come from nearby villages. On 6th December 2024, **19 children graduated** from kindergarten. The kindergarten is also open to ICV children and the children of staff members. This early learning experience ensures they are well-prepared when they start primary school.

Children from the ICV continue to attend local primary and secondary schools.

The Vocational Training Centre ran its **YAM training courses** throughout 2024, providing skills development opportunities for local youth in: Carpentry, tailoring, mechanics, entrepreneurship and agricultural practices.

These courses are a key component of our efforts to improve youth employability and self-sufficiency.

The Milk Powder Programme is sponsored by **St. Pius X Church in Bristol, via Orphans in the Wild, UK**, this programme is made possible through volunteer fundraising efforts. It has become a **lifeline for infants** whose mothers have died or are unable to nurse. Without this support, many families would resort to feeding babies thick porridge (uji), which is

nutritionally inadequate for infants.

Babies are referred by the outreach team, following consultation with local **village children's committees**, ensuring that no other relatives can support the baby. 18 babies have been cared for by this programme in 2024.

13 Village Home-Based Care (HBC) volunteers continue to provide essential care in **Ihanu, Mdabulo, and Luhunga wards**. They are trained in **first aid**, and assist community members, particularly those with HIV/AIDS, by: Encouraging clinic visits for testing and treatment; assessing needs for home visits from doctors and reporting to HBC leaders for case tracking, consolidating information and reporting back to the NGO. In total 2906 patients were visited during the year.

Significant progress was made in 2024 on the construction of the **Nyamalongolo Mini Hydropower Plant**, an exciting new project intended to support ICV's long-term sustainability and energy independence. The **weir has been completed, Penstocks have been successfully installed**, and Construction of the **canal is advancing well**. The primary goal of the project is to generate 20 – 70 kW (depending on the season) **reliable and stable electricity** for the **Igoda Children's Village, Kindergarten** and **Vocational Training Centre**. It has been made possible by a generous donation from the **Merck Family Foundation**.

Under the leadership of **Chris Fox** and his team, FCWCT has made major contributions to protecting the rainforests of Mufindi—a region crucial to the **watersheds of surrounding savannah habitats**.

The Youth Agency of Mufindi supported by the Finnish government continues to run extensive trainings and workshops doing invaluable work to support disabled and disadvantaged youth in the district. These projects are quite unique in Tanzania and are highlighting a huge gap in support offered to such groups. This project is managed by Bruce Fox and his support team in Mufindi.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

In line with the investment policy, a substantial investment has been made with the aim to create a sustainable income to protect the children under the care of Foxes Community and Wildlife Conservation in Tanzania.

Orphans in the Wild supports the NGO Foxes Community and Wildlife Conservation Trust (FCWCT) in Mufindi, Tanzania. This has one of the highest infection rates of HIV/AIDS in the whole country.

At the Igoda Children's Village (ICV) we have continued to look after and care for the orphaned and vulnerable children in our care, ensuring the health and safety of them and all our staff. Tanzania's Government stipulates no children over 18 can remain in an orphanage. Also, some children fostered by the FCWCT have left the ICV to live with their relatives. Those who left, but are continuing their education, living in the nearby villages with families, have been monitored regularly and we continue to support them with food hampers, procuring accommodation and/or paying their school fees, uniforms and books.

There are currently 38 children at the ICV, 19 girls and 19 boys, all except 2 attend school. 2 are unable to attend due to disability.

There are currently 9 babies being cared for by 2 house mothers. According to directives from the District Social Welfare Mufindi DC there is a plan in place to transition care responsibilities over time back to known relatives of babies.

The Milk Powder programme is still generously sponsored by St Pius X Church in Bristol, UK - funds are all from volunteers' fundraising. Without this programme, many babies would not survive. Families of babies whose mothers have passed away or are unable to feed them, cannot afford milk powder and come to FCWCT for help. Until this programme started, babies were fed on a thick porridge-like drink known as uji, which is unsuitable to nourish such young infants. 21 babies are currently supported by this project.

The preschool programme has 53 children enrolled establishing key skills at an early age.

A mini hydropower plant has been established on the Nyamalongolo river aimed at supplying consistent and stable electricity to the ICV, Preschool and Vocational training centre. Construction began in November. Any surplus energy may be sold to provide an additional income stream.

13 Village Home Based Care volunteers continue to visit villagers in the Ihanu, Mdabulo and Luhunga wards in the district. The volunteers receive regular training in first aid and keep up with advising villagers to continue their hospital visits for HIV/Aids testing and treatment. They also assess who may need a visit by a visiting doctor if they are unable to reach the local hospital, which for them might be a long way to go with the limited transport facilities. During the year there were 3378 home visits made.

Over the past 16 years, FCWCT has been at the forefront of combating the HIV epidemic, but acknowledges that many vulnerable young children have been left traumatized, disadvantaged and in need of ongoing support. Therefore, we were thrilled to announce a new partnership between the Helsinki Deaconess Foundation Institute (HDI) in Finland and FCWCT in Tanzania, facilitating the launch of the Youth Agency Mufindi (YAM) project at the beginning of 2021, with funding committed by the Finnish Ministry for Foreign Affairs (MFA) for a period of four years. The YAM project is specifically tailored to empower young people and children with disabilities to address life challenges and lead dignified lives, while also empowering vulnerable young people to take charge of their lives through enhanced motivation, skills, and opportunities. FCWCT initiated this pilot project in 16 neighbouring villages, conducting various activities such as outreaches, needs assessments, treatment and rehabilitation efforts, caregiver training, provision of psychosocial support, as well as agricultural and forestry training. Additionally, entrepreneurship training is provided, with a focus on promoting gender equality whenever feasible. We work closely with local government entities to advocate for equal development and opportunities for vulnerable children and young people. To ensure effective implementation, we have established a Youth Projection Team and Village Child Protection Committees (VCPCs) to identify and deliver project support and training, addressing the challenges faced by disabled children and vulnerable youth. Collaborating with the University of Iringa (UoI) and the Tanzanian Association for Professional Counsellors and Psychotherapists (TAPCAP) enables us to leverage expertise in needs assessment, psychosocial support, and trainer training. INUKA (Southern Highlands Rehabilitation Centre) supports our efforts in addressing the rehabilitation needs of the disabled. Additionally, UoI provides entrepreneurship training to compliment the skills training provided and enhance the project's impact. The YAM Project is overseen by Bruce Fox (FCWCT trustee) and Laura Jarvilehto (Deaconess coordinator), with the

Tanzanian team comprising the coordinator (Mr. Patuka), project manager (Zilipa Mgeni), accountant (Barick Chelulye), and project officers Danford Mkumba and Ushindi Lunyali.

The Sewing School has received a new curriculum and guidelines, slated to commence in 2024, following consultations involving instructors, the Project Team, Helmi Neuvonen (Finnish volunteer), the students and trustees. Ushindi Lunyali has been appointed to lead the sewing school. The newly equipped Carpentry School has been furnished with new workbenches, carpentry machines, and hand tools to welcome its first intake of young beneficiaries by the end of 2023.

Christopher Fox and his team have continued to make progress in protection the rainforests in Mufindi, an area very important to the watersheds of the savannah wildlife habitats, east and west of us. Christopher's team supports the environment with daily forest patrols over a forested area of 80 sq. km, considerably reducing the levels of wildlife poaching, whilst alerting the relevant authorities to other environmental abuses. This project has been selected as one of the 10 Prestigious Finalists in a Global shortlist of Conservation projects (Category: Track 1 - Community led Conservation Projects) recognized by the Co-hosts Esri and the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) for their achievements. Orphans in the Wild supports Non Government Organisations (Ngo) in Tanzania, East Africa. The specific nature of the support is financial, increasing awareness of the plight of the children and families who are victims of AIDS, coordinating and shipping donated equipment and goods for schools, hospitals and orphanages.

The activities supported by Orphans in the Wild have been deemed to be of public benefit to the communities of Tanzania and the trustees have paid due regard to the guidance on public benefit as given by the Charities Commission of England and Wales. The communities are hard struck by the economic and social impact of HIV/AIDS. Infection rates in this region of Tanzania (Mufindi District) are around 40% which is one of the highest in the country. The impact on the communities is evident in every walk of life. Anti-retro viral drugs are free but the administration is cumbersome and expensive. The disease impacts the working age group leaving the elderly and very young with no support. The children are often kept away from school to help support the family, especially the girls. The social structure of relatives taking in orphaned children from family is overwhelmed and breaking down leaving children very vulnerable.

Orphans in the Wild trustees are aiming to invest a lump sum with the objective that the annual yield will create a sustainable income to pay for the care of those children in the Childrens Village. This decision was made in light of the pandemic and the vulnerability of such a project to the fluctuating nature of donations. Unlike other projects which can be scaled down or up depending on the value of donations, once children are in the Childrens Village they have nowhere else to go and therefore it is fundamental to secure a regular income for their care.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Orphans in the Wild supports the NGO Foxes Community and Wildlife Conservation Trust (FCWCT) in Mufindi, Tanzania. This has one of the highest infection rates of HIV/AIDS in the whole country.

At the Igoda Children's Village (ICV) we have continued to look after and care for the orphaned and vulnerable children in our care, ensuring the health and safety of them and all our staff.

Tanzania's Government stipulates no children over 18 can remain in an orphanage. Also, some children fostered by the FCWCT have left the ICV to live with their relatives. Those who left, but are continuing their education, living in the nearby villages with families, have been monitored regularly and we continue to support them with food hampers, procuring accommodation and/or paying their school fees, uniforms and books.

There are currently 33 children at the ICV, 17 girls and 16 boys, all except 2 attend school. 2 are unable to attend due to disability.

There are currently 7 babies being cared for by 2 house mothers, with 2 babies joining this year, both of whose mothers have passed away and fathers' remain unknown.

The Milk Powder programme is kindly sponsored by St Pius X Church in Bristol, UK - funds are all from volunteers' fundraising. Without this programme, many babies would not survive. Families of babies whose mothers have passed away or are unable to feed them, cannot afford milk powder and come to FCWCT for help. Until this programme started, babies were fed on a thick porridge-like drink known as uji, which is unsuitable to nourish such young infants.

13 Village Home Based Care volunteers continue to visit villagers in the Ihanu, Mdadulo and Luhunga wards in the district. The volunteers receive regular training in first aid and keep up with advising villagers to continue their hospital visits for HIV/Aids testing and treatment. They also assess who may need a visit by a visiting doctor if they are unable to reach the local hospital, which for them might be a long way to go with the limited transport facilities

Igoda Village Clinic extension has been completed, sponsored by Yvo Vanderlinden from Belgium. This will provide valuable resources to the much wider community.

FCWCT led the way in tackling the HIV epidemic over the last 15 years but recognises that it has left behind many traumatised vulnerable young children who continue to need our help. So, we are delighted with a new partnership between the Helsinki Deaconess Foundation Institute (HDI) in Finland and FCWCT in Tanzania enabling us to launch YAM (Youth Agency Mufindi) at the start of 2021 with funding committed for 4 years. The YAM project is designed to help disabled children solve life issues enabling them to lead dignified lives and help vulnerable young people to take control of their lives through improved motivation, skills, and opportunities.

FCWCT implemented this pilot project in our neighbouring 16 villages, conducting needs assessments, rehabilitation, carer training, psychosocial support, agricultural and forestry training, entrepreneurship training, and wherever possible also helping address gender equality. We are working closely with local government wherever possible in advocating equal development and opportunity for vulnerable children and young people.

To achieve this, we have established a Youth Projection Team and Village Child Protection Committees (VCPCs), helping us to identify and deliver this project support and training and help solve the problems faced by disabled children and vulnerable young people.

We are working with the University of Iringa (UoI) and the Tanzanian Association for Professional Counsellors and Psychotherapists (TAPCAP) who help FCWCT by providing expertise in assessing needs, psychosocial support, and the training of trainers. INUKA (Southern Highlands Rehabilitation Centre) assists us with addressing the rehabilitation needs of the disabled. UoI also enhances our project with Entrepreneurship training.

The YAM Project is directed by Bruce Fox (FCWC trustee) and Laura Jarvilehto (Deaconess co-ordinator)



Orphans in the Wild supports the NGO Foxes Community and Wildlife Trust in Mufindi, Tanzania. This has one of the highest infection rates of HIV/AIDS in the whole country.

The Childrens Village continues to offer care and security to the most vulnerable children as identified by the Village protection Committee. Currently there are 39 children living at the Igoda Children's Village. As per Tanzanian law once a child reaches 18 they must leave any residential care.

The foster facility for babies who will go back to their mother's once their health has stabilised, is slowing down so this might be an indicator that the Igoda health clinic is providing a much needed boost to the maternity care offered to mothers in the district.

The Kindergarten school operating at the Children's Village is going from strength to strength offering a fabulous pre school programme for children both from the village and from the staff and helpers associated with the NGO. Currently 33 children attend regularly.

13 Village home based care volunteers continue to manage regular visits to 3 village where they train first aid and ensure that patients attend their HIV/Aids testing and treatment appointments. They also assess patients for any visting doctor/specialist. The programme is managed through the Home Based Care leader and report back to the NGO.

A team of conservationists are active in the forests of Mufindi protecting the wildlife from snares and traps used to poach as well as planting 30,000 indigenous forest trees.

Together with the Helsinki Deaconess Foundation a new project has been running to identify, train and support disabled and vulnerable youth in the 16 villages in Mufindi District. The project conducts assessments, rehabilitation, carer training, psychosocial support, agricultural and entrepreneurship training and wherever possible addressing gender inequalities.

There is a Youth Project Team who are working together with the Village Child Protection Committes to identify and implement these programmes.

Other partners are University of Iringa and Tanzania Association of Counsellors and Psychotherapiests. Further support is given by Southern Highland Rehab Centre INUKA.

Orphans in the Wild supports Non Government Organisations (Ngo) in Tanzania, East Africa. The specific nature of the support is financial, increasing awareness of the plight of the children and families who are victims of AIDS, coordinating and shipping donated equipment and goods for schools, hospitals and orphanages.

The activities supported by Orphans in the Wild have been deemed to be of public benefit to the communities of Tanzania and the trustees have paid due regard to the guidance on public benefit as given by the Charities Commission of England and Wales. The communities are hard struck but the economic and social impact of HIV/AIDS. Infection rates in this region of Tanzania (Mufindi District) are around 40% which is one of the highest in the country. The impact on the communities is evident in every walk of life. Anti-retro viral drugs are free but the administration is cumbersome and expensive. The disease impacts the working age group leaving the elderly and very young with no support. The children are often kept away from school to help support the family, especially the girls. The social structure of relatives taking in orphaned kids from family is overwhelmed and breaking down leaving children very vulnerable.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Orphans in the Wild supports the NGO Foxes Community and Wildlife Trust in Mufindi, Tanzania. This has one of the highest infection rates of HIV/AIDS in the whole country.

The Igoda Children's Village continued to thrive throughout 2020 even with the necessary precautions to protect all habitants from Corona Virus. All staff stayed on site and the children were home schooled until June. There are 49 children currently living at the ICV.

The Nursery and Kindergarten taught 36 children using the Montessori based teaching programme. The children are from the local surrounding communities.

The children from the ICV attend primary and secondary schools and graduating with good grades. Some of these children did not attend school prior to their arrival at the ICV, so their achievements are even more impressive.

Orphans in the Wild continue to be the sole sponsor of the Milk Powder Programme and special thanks should go to St Pius Church who fund raise for this programme. This is a vital support to mothers who are unable to breast feed their babies and who would previously have fed them a maize based porridge which is entirely unsuitable for babies.

The NGO has 17 Home Based Care Volunteers who are trained in first aid and are able to advise villagers on hospital treatments and testing providing an invaluable service. They also assess who should be visited by a visiting doctor.

Orphans in the Wild donors funded 102 mixed breed chickens, producing eggs, a much needed source of protein, as well as manure for the vegetables, and some meat.

Wildlife conservation continues in the vicinity with the removal of snares, planting of indigenous forest trees and the facilitation of ongoing ecological monitoring, deploying locally trained anti-poaching units. Ongoing monitoring provides a strong baseline for appropriate law enforcement and forest management practises, safeguarding the ecological and economic values that these forests yield to local communities and stakeholders.
