FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of Blackburn Rovers Community Trust (the company) for the year ended 31 December 2020. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the Charity's Act, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Objectives and activities

a. Policies and objectives

Blackburn Rovers Community Trust has continued to develop its policies from a governance, financial, safeguarding and strategy viewpoint, which are in place to support the Trust's aims of meeting its pre-set objectives. These policies are intended to increase public and potential funding provider confidence in the Trust and its aims, missions, values and objectives. Policies have been reviewed and adapted to provide the Trust the ability to adjust to the pressures caused by operating in a pandemic and to progress from a position of being reactive in to one of being proactive.

Despite the pandemic, our primary objectives remain the same. These objectives are:

- Be a constantly evolving, sustainable, community leading, forward-thinking charity, at the heart of the community of Blackburn with Darwen and Lancashire

Using football and sport as the driving force, Blackburn Rovers Community Trust has a clear strategic document, which includes aims and outcomes developed in consultation with stakeholders, staff, volunteers, service users and key partners. It provides realistic targets and means to measure impact and a review to help manage the future developments and plans of the Trust. The plan further provides a narrative which discusses the previous year's aims and outcomes with an update on progression. The strategies implemented have been agreed by the board of trustees and the chief executive officer along with staff, participants and volunteers. c. Activities undertaken for achieving objectives and for public benefit

2021 has been an incredibly successful year for our charity with us recording our record turnover, yet it has also been another trying year for which we have all had to navigate our way through difficult periods which included lockdowns, the increase in inequality, economic difficulties, new variants of Covid-19 and the loss of loved ones. Blackburn with Darwen is one of the hardest hit areas by the pandemic which means that our work is needed now more than ever.

Our efforts have been recognised by others. We are in a privileged position to be named EFL Your Move Northwest Community Club of the Year 2021. This award celebrates the outstanding impact football club charities have throughout the year and is based on strong impact, on the needs of the local community; showing exceptional partnership working and collaborating and demonstrating the outstanding value and importance of the charity in their community. Our staff, partners, volunteers, participants, trustees, fans and parent football club have been instrumental in winning this award.

Despite the pandemic, there have been many highlights throughout the year. Some of our most rewarding impact created strong case studies that highlight the change that our charity had on communities, groups and individuals. Engagement has been encouraging despite reduced opportunities for face-to-face delivery. A record number of local schools, pupils and parents engaged with our Premier League Primary Stars programme partnered with another fantastic year for our Sport and Community colleges who again, had to show high levels of innovation to provide quality remote learning for our students. Our NCS team engaged with 285 young people who completed the programme, which included creating and delivering 15 social action projects. Our Neighbourhood Youth Offer outreach programme worked with nearly 1,500 unique children and young people. 2021 also saw the return of the 'Next Generation' supporter initiative and Ewood Express.

We are proud to have been working with Blackburn with Darwen Council for several years now and our partnership with our local authority has continued to go from strength to strength. Our partnership lends to each other's strengths and resources, which when combined, can produce outstanding offers and services for local people. 2021 saw our partnership focus on tackling the pandemic, integration, opportunities for young people, inequality and health and wellbeing. We achieved our aims by bringing new innovative pathways for change. Some of these examples can be seen when we agreed to establish and operate a fully functional high impacting Lateral Flow Testing Centre at Ewood Park; a comprehensive Neighbourhood Youth offer – bringing sport, activities and informal education to local children and young people's communities; inclusion and integration which included 60 young people from diverse communities becoming community ambassadors; a health programme that enticed physically inactive people in to leading healthier and more active lifestyles and a holiday hunger programme which fed hundreds of children who would have gone without a warm meal during the school holidays.

We are committed to offering the community the highest quality programmes and services that provide funding partners and key stakeholders value for money and a return on investment by delivering on agreed outcomes. We will continue to focus our efforts on projects and initiatives that will have a direct positive impact on local issues and those that meet one or more of our key themes.

2021 has been a difficult year for charities as the pandemic is affecting the economy and all areas of society. Our fundraising model based on generating income from grants and paid services therefore we have been successful in raising a record income of £2,012,988. Expenditure for the year was £1,801,251 which equated to 89.5% of income. Wages to turnover was a healthy 62.1%. Pleasingly, there has been growth in the number of full-time staff from 39 to 46.

Key notable statistics:

- 28 ex-Rovers players attended Remember The Rovers to support isolated elderly people.
- BRCT Staff administered 10,991 Covid-19 tests at our Ewood Park test centre and distributed 10,440 home testing kits.
- Provided 582 vulnerable children 5,168 meals alongside holiday activities
- 750 young people took part in social action activities (13,500 hours of volunteering).
- Engaged 1,500+ people via fundraising events such as Blackburn 10K Run.
- Took 400 YPs on residentials to develop skills, including 285 young adults on NCS.
- Supported over 200 refugee and asylum seekers.
- 350+ people participated in inclusion and integration specific content across multi-week projects.
- 2,000+ YPs engaged with covid myth-busting activities.
- 245kg lost through weight management initiatives, 325cm off participants waistlines.
- Saved 1,000KG+ CO2 entering the atmosphere (Planet Super League), whilst recycling 100% of material waste used by BRCT at Ewood Park.
- 177 people supported through mental health and reducing re-offending programmes.
- 4,558 children supported in primary schools. 128 teachers received bespoke mentoring.
- 60 veterans regularly attend socialisation opportunities.

The programmes we have delivered over the past year allow us to achieve the aims of our objectives and primarily comprise of:

Education, Skills and Training

Blackburn Rovers Sports College

BTEC in Sport: A full-time programme of sports and education for local young people of all academic and sporting abilities. Our Sports College has continued to establish itself as one of the premier providers of sports education in the county. Our Head of Community Programmes has personally continued to support the Sports College and they have 139 young people studying with the Community Trust during this academic year.

We are pleased that people with disabilities are accessing our education offer. One particular student has an educational healthcare plan and is in a wheelchair. It is testament to the work done by the team that a young person with such complex needs would choose to study with us.

Being the benefactor of subcontracting has become an issue due to an unannounced change in government policy related to subcontracting of education over distance therefore talks with more local colleges have commenced to ensure that we can continue to support local young people's education.

English and Maths Functional Skills and GCSE: Provided 72 young people the opportunity to improve their English and Maths grades via additional sessions and mentoring. There have been improvements with attendance and attainment for English and Maths so far, with attendance being over 80%.

Foundation Degree In Community Football Coaching and Development: Delivered in partnership with the EFL Trust and University of South Wales, we have 18 students on the degree programme over two different year groups. Students are provided with the opportunity to upgrade the two-year foundation qualification into a full honours degree if the student attains sufficient grades to study for a third year. 100% of students who have completed the course have gone on to gain employment in an industry of their choosing.

Blackburn Rovers Community College: Blackburn Rovers Community College delivers non-sport-centric skills, education and training which includes traineeships and other employability programmes. The aim for the Community College is to continue to grow and establish itself as a leading post-16 education provider in the borough.

Traineeship: As a part of our core strategy of providing education opportunities to help local people to improve their personal circumstances by increasing their knowledge and skill base with the aim of bring them closer to the employability market, we deliver a Level 1 Traineeship programme in partnership with the EFL Trust. 39 16-24-year-old local young people not in education or training (NEET) enrolled and completed the employability programme with the vast majority going on to gain employment or into further education,

Trust staff work with external agencies such as DWP, new Directions and Blackburn with Darwen Council's Care Services, who sign-post know people who are eligible for our programmes.

"I came to the Traineeship at Blackburn Rovers because I needed help to get onto a career path. I started a placement with the NHS at Royal Blackburn Hospital, then progressed onto a Kickstart and now I am full time. Working here is great and a life changing experience. Thank you both so much for all you have done." – Adam Ashton, former Traineeship participant.

Premier League Primary Stars / School Sports Partnership: We continue to be one of only two professional football club official charities in the country to have been designated as the local council's School Sports Partnership (SSP) deliverer and as such, Premier League Primary Stars plays a huge role within that concept. The programme provides primary schools with support in improving the provision of physical activity and sport, both during curriculum and extra-curriculum time, with high quality experiences for pupils, enabling positive teaching and learning particularly numeracy and literacy and PHSE, alongside increased participation opportunities and playing pathways.

This year, 20 primary schools have enrolled onto one of our Premier League Primary Stars programmes benefitting approximately 6,358 unique children who participate in the scheme.

Despite schools having to close for large parts of 2021, many remained open to provide support for key workers and their children. Due to a lockdown during the early part of 2021, our PLPS and SSP offer was adapted to provide in person and online learning opportunities. As a result, we have been able to have a significant positive impact on the local education offer by providing live lessons, home learning packs and pre-recorded lessons. Our Disability Officer has been working with full classes consisting of a mix of children including those with SEND.

Notable 2021 statistics include:

- 128 teachers supported in their PE lessons throughout a minimum of one half-term
- 450 children received targeted interventions in PSHE, Maths or English
- 180 children completed a social action project to raise awareness on a topic they were passionate about and inspire change
- 56 teachers engaged in CPD workshops
- During Covid-19 (Jan – March), on average we delivered (per week during curriculum time) - 9 live lessons, 40 home learning packs, 28 pre-recorded lessons and 16 face to face lessons
- 18 year-round partner schools
- 3,700 engaged with during curriculum time through our partner schools
- 1,170 pupils provided with extra-curricular club material during Covid-19 (Jan-March) – ranging from live lessons and pre-recorded lessons to home learning packs
- 858 pupils engaged with during in-school delivery of extra-curricular clubs

Premier League Inspires: We are one of 28 organisations of the 92 professional football club official charities (CCOs) to have been awarded funding to deliver a high-quality support and mentoring programme. The project's target audience is Year 7 children deemed as 'marginalised' who have transitioned into the identified partner secondary schools. Two of the target secondary schools are situated in the top 1% of the most deprived wards in the country, therefore presenting the opportunity for the project to have greater, longer-lasting impact on pupils who face additional challenges related to education, health, crime and employment in their neighbourhood.

Premier League Inspires has provided to be a real asset, especially during the pandemic, to the participating schools and pupils, with several young people showing improvement in the following areas:

- Mental wellbeing
- Physical wellbeing
- Confidence and self-esteem
- Feeling inspired and motivated

As a direct result of the coronavirus and under similar circumstances to what our Premier League Primary Stars/SSP has faced, our Premier League Inspires has still been able to deliver and support identified pupils both in person and virtually.

- Number of participants involved with the project in 2021: 40 (26 boys, 11 girls, 3 non-binary)
- Mentoring, wellbeing sessions for PLI participants: 765+ hours of sessions delivered
- 360+ identifiable risk factors for PLI participants
- 415 pupils (from four different BwD secondary-age schools) provided with mental health awareness lessons
- 2 Summer School and Transition programmes supported

Inclusion & Integration

Blackburn Rovers Citizenship programme: Working in partnership with other like-minded charities over the last five years to combat prejudice and hate in local primary schools, including guest appearances from players to reinforce the message.

Blackburn has been identified by the Ministry of Housing Communities and Local Government as one of the most racially segregated towns in England. The pandemic has only intensified myths and stereotypes of certain minority communities and our work in this subject area has never been more important.

We have safely been able to deliver this initiative for three quarters of 2021, when social distancing restrictions were lifted. Face to face anti-racism sessions were delivered to 400 local pupils at several schools who share the same set values and concerns regarding equality, diversity, inclusion and tackling racism in all shapes and forms.

We will continue to invest funds in to tackling racism and to provide equality opportunities for all.

Asylum Seekers and Refugees: 2021 has seen us continue our fantastic relationship with Darwen Asylum and Refugee Enterprise (DARE). DARE is a registered charity established to support refugees and asylum seekers in Darwen. Throughout the year we have worked with DARE officials to provide families with clothes with pre-used BRCT staff kit and uniforms, match tickets and Covid-19 vaccination support, which has been well received by the beneficiaries and the wider community.

Cultural Events: With Covid social distancing requirements still in place, albeit easing somewhat, we were able to deliver several high impacting social cultural event. These events included a Ramadan Street Fast, which saw one multi-cultural street in Darwen fast to support integration. 12 families took part who between them received 90 food hampers and 400 meals. In addition to the Street Fast initiative, we supported Eid In The Park (our 5th year of supporting this important event), an important Islamic event which celebrates Eid al-Fitr (breaking of the fast).

Youth Ambassador Project: In partnership with Blackburn with Darwen Council, we are helping to deliver the local strategic plan to engage with local young people and families from different cultural backgrounds with the aim of bringing them together to learn about the borough's diverse communities, promote British values, create stronger more resilient communities and to create social action and a legacy of integrated communities.

The purpose of the Youth Ambassador's programme is to teach the younger generation about their community, local issues, and societal problems such as racism. Additionally, the programme also gives young people the opportunity to meet people they may not get to meet in everyday life.

- 220 young people from different backgrounds and ethnicities participated in the programme

Community Ambassadors: This programme is aimed at adults, empowering them to take a leadership role on local integration issues. Delivered in conjunction by both Spring North Charity Consortium Lancashire and Blackburn Rovers Community Trust, it is a 12-week initiative that covers a variety of heritage, social and community topics as a unique way of encouraging individuals to make a difference within their local community.

- 180 young adults and adults completed the programme

Health & Wellbeing

Rovers Veterans Hub Programme

Established in the summer, Rovers Veterans Hub programme provides local ex-service personnel and their families with the opportunity to socialise and meet new like-minded people to share their experiences with to aid improving mental wellbeing.

During the latter part of the year we were delighted to be able to offer a Rovers Remembers Day for our home fixture versus Sheffield United, in partnership with our friends at Veterans Living History Museum, establish a regular breakfast club and a multitude of excursions to war museums and tourist hotspots across the region.

We have continued to see a very good attendance to our weekly Veterans Breakfast Club with 70 veterans registered. The Breakfast club which offers the space for veterans to come and have a chat, eat breakfast and have conversation.

Several veterans have gained a Mental Health First Aid Level 2 course, which they will be able to use the knowledge gained to support other Veterans who visit our Rovers Veterans Hub.

The group of ex-service personnel, via a series of fundraising initiatives, were able to raise £3,160 as well as helping our staff to secure a grant of £9,867 from The Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust to enable us to engage with even more Veterans across Blackburn with Darwen. This funding was used to employ two part-time former service personnel to deliver the new programmes.

Community Welfare Support

We continued to work with Creative Football Mental Health League – the only one of its kind in the North West. The League was established over 10 years ago with the aims of providing opportunity for local residents (16+) – and those further afield as part of the social inclusion football community – who are socially isolated to participate in competitive football – particularly those with a long-term condition. Football has been proven to be an effective tool in engaging people who would normally be reluctant to access services for support.

The League, which has over 100 register participants, helps to promote recovery, wellbeing and independence. It seeks to address the isolation, stigma and discrimination surrounding mental health and emotional well-being. It supports and addresses issues around substance misuse, homelessness and social isolation. The Community Trust provide supports the League in any way that we can. During 2021, we have provided kit, match tickets, equipment, coaching/staffing/mentoring and marketing support.

Holiday Hunger - Get Stuck In

Funded via the Department For Education, the project was designed to ensure families of children accessing free school meals (many of which were at risk of going hungry as school meals are their only main source of food) would continue to receive support during the Easter, summer and Autumn school holidays. The project had other targeted outcomes including tackling physical inactivity and stimulating educational opportunities.

We commissioned a team of 15 staff to deliver warm nutritional food and weekly activities.

- 180 children aged between four and 16 years, across all communities of Blackburn with Darwen, signed up to the offer
- 2,100 meals were provided at our Easter, Summer and Autumn Holiday Hunger camps.

Remember The Rovers: A session for over 50's, most of who are Blackburn Rovers supporters and of which, some of the participants suffer with dementia.

The project returned to on-site meetings which are held in the Legends' Lounge every Wednesday morning 10.30am – 12noon. The sessions are well attended with a core of 30 participants and two care homes who participate via Zoom, swelling participant numbers to over 60. Guest Speakers have included Tyrhys Dolan, David May, Wes Brown, Trevor Wilkin, Alex Brooks, Juliana Preugschat and Mark Patterson.

Men in Sheds: 'Men in Sheds' is a project delivered on a weekly basis that sees men with similar health concerns come together to grow their own fruit and vegetables whilst making new friends and participating in low level physical activity. Funded Blackburn with Darwen by Public Health, Men In Sheds positively impacts on mental health and wellbeing and is owned by the attendees and volunteers of the 'Shed'. It also supports and develops the volunteers within the project and makes relevant links with partner agencies who can also help to support the participants' health and wellbeing.

Men in Sheds project supports the local council's [Joint Health & Wellbeing Strategy](#), [Suicide and Self Harm Prevention Strategy](#) and a [Eat Well Move More Shape Up Strategy](#) and the [Local Authority Declaration on Healthy Weight](#). The project also supports the wider Pennine Lancashire aims of 'Living Happy Healthy and Well' using a place based approach to prevention described in the [Pennine Plan](#).

Men In Sheds was classified by Public Health as an essential support network for those participating in the programme and as such, we were able to continue to deliver this programme in person throughout the Covid-19 crisis.

Men In Sheds has been able to support 14 local men - with the youngest being 24 and the most senior being 85-years-old - as well as the strategic borough-wide plans to tackle mental and physical inefficiencies of men of a particular age group.

Engagement and Participation

National Citizen Service (NCS): The National Citizen Service (NCS) programme is an educational youth programme for young people aged 15 to 17-years-old. It aims to encourage physical activity/challenges, participation in social action; community awareness and cohesion and fundamental life-skills.

Due to the coronavirus, our summer NCS programme was unfortunately cancelled due to national lockdown restrictions. Due to the suppression of the virus during the later parts of the summer, we were able to deliver a face-to-face autumn NCS programme to 183 young people. These young people went on to complete a full programme which included taking part in team building and outbound activities at a nearby adventure centre, workshops with such themes as first aid, employability masterclasses, drug and alcohol awareness (presented by The Amy Winehouse Foundation).

For the young people's social action projects, they planned achievable and realistic projects for good causes or charities they are passionate about. Examples included young people pledged to prevent littering throughout Blackburn with Darwen, work with homeless charities by donating food and goods packages and put together care packages for refugees and asylum seekers.

Premier League Kicks/Neighbourhood Youth Offer/Covid-19 Detached Work: Neighbourhood based youth work that offers a unique opportunity for children and young people to access leisure activities and informal education support, advice and guidance from practitioners skilled in developing relationships with the borough's youth population. Across the borough there are a number of providers of youth work in all its various forms and this programme accesses resources across all sectors to ensure that provision is targeted according to evidenced need and delivered in wards at times that best support available leisure time of children and young people.

This project invites children and young adults to play football and multi-sports accompanied by the opportunity to participate in traditional youth club activities in order to reduce instances of anti-social behaviour, break down social barriers, encourage sustained participation in sport, to stimulate the benefits of volunteering and to help participants work towards gainful employment and education opportunities.

During the pandemic, we worked alongside other likeminded organisations to create teams of staff to provide additional engagement with local young people who were not following national and local law/guidance regarding keeping themselves safe and others from the virus.

Notable stats from our Premier League Kicks/Neighbourhood Youth Offer (NYO) includes:

- 10,036 total aggregate attendance across NYO

a. Key financial performance indicators

The board of trustees are pleased with the financial position of the Community Trust. We continue to operate as a sustainable and viable charitable operation for public benefit, complimented by managed growth.

b. Review of activities

Blackburn Rovers Community Trust has established a reputation, locally, nationally and internationally, for delivering quality programmes and we are proud of the strong partnerships that have been built and sustained during a pandemic.

2021 has seen us named EFL Your Move Community Club of the Year Northwest Region. To be named as the one of the most innovative and impactful community club organisations in the EFL is a testimony to the way that the Community Trust has worked hard to create a vision to deliver a high-quality, local needs-assessed projects, initiatives and campaigns. In addition to delivering BTEC in Sport, traineeships, Premier League Primary Stars, NCS, Premier League Kicks and our other general charitable work, we were delighted to be able to create new community-benefitting programmes which includes the Lateral Flow Covid-19 Testing Centre, Holiday Hunger and Operation Divert Youth.

We have built upon 2020 and have continued to support the club in achieving their strategies relating to four key areas within which they (and we) want to see particular growth – BAME, charity, community and juniors.

Once again, we have achieved all of our pre-agreed key performance indicators (KPIs) and have attained increased participation – this is due to the lifting of the majority of social distancing requirements.

We have again been able to increase the number of staff available to us despite the pandemic. In doing so, this has further improved the quality of delivery and the number of beneficiaries. Building on the standards that we have set in previous reports, we have continued our proud record of attaining the EFL and Premier League's Capability Code of Practice benchmark every year since its inception – proving our level of quality around governance, finance and business risk, safeguarding, law and constitution requirements and values that underpin strategy every year.

Impact of Activities

With the pandemic still causing disruption to life, 2021 has been a very successful year for engagement and the number of people enjoying the benefits of our work. Thousands of people from all sections of society can bear testament to the impact of our work and our ability to improve lives for the better, using the power of football and the brand of Blackburn Rovers.

Our range of projects covers concepts as diverse as sport and health sessions for children and adults, education courses for young adults, minority communities health and sports sessions, disability football/dance/social activities for the elderly, drug misuses awareness sessions, mental health recovery programmes, business engagement and estate-based projects to reduce anti-social behaviour.

The Community Trust delivered 50 different community projects and initiatives, working with a large number of primary schools within the BB1 to BB7 and PR post code areas and many of the secondary schools in Blackburn with Darwen and Lancashire.

Our 2021 in Numbers:

- Over 35,000 engagements via our inclusive programmes
- 50 different projects/initiatives
- Our turnover has increased 17.8% from £1,708,709 (2020) to £2,012,988.
- We employ 85 local people, including 46 full-time staff supported by 39 part-time and casual staff.

Financial review

a. Financial review

Income for the year has increased by 17.8% to £2,012,988 (2020 - £1,708,709), due to accessing new income streams and over performance on some programmes.

Expenditure decreased in the year, generally in line with the reduction in activity. A surplus of £211,737 (2020 – a surplus of £164,823) arose in the year.

The trustees are satisfied that the charity has sufficient reserves to support this and future expansion of the operations. The company's financial position at the year-end is satisfactory.

Total funds are £1,186,624 (2020 - £974,887) which comprises unrestricted funds.

b. Going concern

At the trustees meeting in January 2021, it was agreed that we would once again aim to control expenditure and prepare for the future through carefully considered investment plans that would provide Blackburn Rovers Community Trust with sustainability and growth. This was reviewed in light of the pandemic and adjusted accordingly. Each investment over the course of this reporting period has been successful, with an investment in staff (CPD, growth in staff numbers, salaries, benefits etc.), the retaining of all key staff and substantial investment in facilities and equipment. We have been able to invest in all of these areas with minimal financial risk to the Trust, and all of these infrastructure improvements have proven to be successful, generating notable positive results.

It is the policy of the Charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent of at least three month's expenditure. The Trustees considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the Charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

c. Principal funding

These documents are adhered to by all staff and have proved to be a sound platform for protecting our capital and ensure that we only invest in cost-effective and relevant materials that maintain or enhance the quality of our project delivery or facility provision. There are also appropriate sign-off levels within these policies to manage any investment on a sensible basis but not overly restrictive to staff looking to make sound investments for their projects.

The Trustees has assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The company is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 14 August 2006. The company is constituted under a Memorandum of Association dated 14 August 2006 and is a registered charity number 1117122. The principal object of the company is to provide, where possible, all members of the local community access to high quality services and facilities that can potentially better their personal circumstances and create opportunities for positive change, under the provision of our Mission Statement, which is:

"Blackburn Rovers Community Trust is fully committed to offering all members of the local community access to the highest quality programme of grassroots sports, education, inclusion and awareness projects to encourage off-field participation, success and enjoyment. At all times we are keen to use the profile and brand of Blackburn Rovers Football Club to greatest effect, committed to developing a comprehensive and diverse range of community initiatives and partnership working practices to open up new avenues of life chances and make a positive difference to the lives of the people of Blackburn with Darwen and Lancashire."

b. Method of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

c. Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

When the board of trustees appoint a new trustee, this person will undertake an induction and receive a Trustee Induction Pack which is provided as a guide, highlighting their role and responsibilities to conduct their duties in the best interests of the company.

d. Pay policy for senior staff

The board of trustees make senior staff pay a discussion point at one or more trustee meetings per year. Levels of pay vary based on the duties required within each job description. We do not operate a fixed pay scale and staff are fairly remunerated on merit, based on their levels of responsibility and performance.

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Blackburn Rovers Community Trust is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Blackburn Rovers Football & Athletic, Ewood Park, Blackburn, Lancashire, BB2 4JF. The members of the company are the Trustees previously named. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the Charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the company has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the company of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of the Friends is not recognised and refer to the Trustees' report for more information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the company which is the amount the company would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes.

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Fundraising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliances with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Cost of generating funds are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities and governance costs are costs incurred on the company's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the company apportioned to charitable activities.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Leasehold land and buildings	10% Straight line
Fixtures and fittings	15% Straight line
Computers	33% Straight line
Motor vehicles	25% Reducing balance

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the Charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Financial instruments

The Charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the Charity's balance sheet when the Charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are measured at transaction.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors are recognised at transaction price.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less.

1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the Charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

1.12 Leases

Rentals payable under operating leases, including any lease incentives received, are charged as an expense on a straight line basis over the term of the relevant lease.

1.13 Deferred incoming resources

Grant income is deferred on the basis of activities being undertaken in the following period as stipulated by the grant provider.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the Charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

The trustees do not believe there to be any significant estimates or assumptions.
