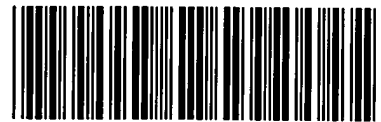

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 June 2024. The Charity is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 6 September 2006. It is registered as a charity with the charity commission.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charitable company's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

According to the Capability Code of Practice that TRIC adheres to, there should be a minimum of 3 trustees and a maximum of 12. The board and its sub committees meet on a regular basis.

The Community Manager is appointed by the trustees to manage day to day operations.

Objectives and activities

The principal objectives of Tranmere Rovers in the Community ("TRIC") are to further the health and education (on a social and physical basis) of children and adults within Wirral and surrounding areas, without reference to race, sex, creed or social background through the use of football and other ancillary activities as educational tools.

The charity is based at Tranmere Rovers Football Club and operate from the stadium, the Club's other community assets and further community locations in the Wirral.

The community work comprises of three strategic themes: Health and Wellbeing, Enhancing Lives and Citizenship and the charity has continued to serve the local Wirral community through these themes during this period.

TRIC has developed a particularly positive reputation across the local area for providing support and activities for those with a variety of physical and mental disabilities. Based in one of the most socially deprived areas in the country, the community work offers so much more than sporting activities and goes as far as providing a safe place and support for a variety of people.

Public benefit

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

The charity plays a major role in the lives of the local community by providing both activities and facilities for sport, recreation and education. Through the diverse all-inclusive nature of the programme people of all ages and abilities are able to enhance their health and wellbeing using the football club as a focal point. TRIC has developed partnerships with a variety of local organisations with the likes of the local NHS, playing a prominent role due to a sharing of the same philosophies and goals related to the health of the general public. TRIC also work very closely with the local education authority helping to educate the next generation through the power of football. TRIC has close working relationships with the local council, police and the county FA who all share the vision of providing for the local community.

Achievements and performance

During the year to 30 June 2024, TRIC continued its engagement with the Merseyside community, providing a range of activities covering all ages and abilities from toddlers to the elderly. The activities delivered covered our three core themes of Health and Wellbeing, Enhancing Lives and Citizenship and often using the unique power of football to engage with a wide range of people.

TRIC continues to work with groups of people who are amongst the most difficult in society to reach (such as people with mental health or substance abuse issues, those who are homeless or in need of rehabilitation from prison, and those with complex special needs and dementia), using the unique ability of football to engage with these hard-to-reach groups.

The following key projects formed the basis of another successful year of activities administered through TRIC:

Due to quality delivery TRIC continued to secure contractual work to deliver programme such as:

Edesntial - TRIC deliver an education programme designed to use the appeal of professional football clubs to inspire girls and boys aged 5-11 in the classroom, the playground and on the sports field. Learning with TRIC helps connect to the real world of sport to enthuse pupils when tackling challenging PSHE topics such as resilience, diversity, self-esteem and fair play.

Active Rovers (226 sessions, 3,400 engagements) - a wide range of activities with the aim to improve the health and well-being of local residents including walking football, dance, health-based sessions, support around addictions/recovery and sessions for adults with disabilities.

Achievements and performance (continued)

Premier League Kicks (229 sessions, 4,364 engagements) - enables TRIC's fully qualified football and dance coaches to deliver sessions to the local community. The sessions provide young people with the opportunity to take part in weekly football and dance sessions, using sports as a form of escapism from daily challenges and a fun and alternative way to keep fit in a safe and welcoming environment.

Premier League Primary Stars (231 sessions, 4,158 engagements) - Premier League Primary Stars uses the appeal of the Premier League and professional football clubs to inspire children to learn, be active and develop important life skills. Tranmere Rovers Football Club staff also work with teachers to deliver fun, educational sessions in a range of subjects within local partner schools.

Dementia Friendly Afternoons (49 sessions, 860 engagements) - providing a safe, welcoming space for elderly individuals to engage in stimulating activities. We offer gentle, enjoyable experiences that promote mental and social well-being, including music, games, and conversation, ensuring a supportive environment where participants can connect, have fun, and feel valued.

Disability Football (145 sessions, 2,000 engagements) - offering an inclusive, supportive environment for individuals of all abilities to enjoy football. We focus on skill development, teamwork, and physical activity, ensuring everyone can participate at their own pace. These sessions promote fitness, confidence, and social connection while fostering a sense of belonging and achievement for all players.

Mental Health Support Football (107 sessions, 1,675 engagements) - combining physical activity with peer support, helping participants build confidence, reduce stress, and improve mental health. We encourage connection, teamwork, and open conversations, promoting a positive environment for mental wellness and personal growth.

Police SOC (850 children and 41 schools engaged) - activity focuses on preventative work around targeted groups of young people and primary school children. The programme aims to:

- To provide fun, positive and engaging activities for targeted young people who are vulnerable and more likely to engage in cross-county lines criminal activity,
- Create pathways and positive progressions; to educate young people and raise awareness of the impact of engaging in criminal and gang activities,
- To provide consistent activities throughout the year to ensure stability and continuity in young peoples' lives in a friendly and welcoming environment,
- To create a sense of community identity through constructive means and interaction including positive relationships with the local police force,
- To improve young peoples' physical, mental and social health.

The programme is targeted through key geographical areas highlighted to us by Merseyside Police, as in addition to working with local primary and secondary schools, we will also be delivering in outreach community settings. These will provide diversionary sessions which will divert young people away from criminal behaviour and disrupt county lines activity in the targeted areas.

SWA2 Initiative - TRIC partners with the Club in raising funds to enable disadvantaged local young people to attend Tranmere Rovers matches at Prenton Park (23,500 tickets provided in 23/24). The initiative also involves the donation of shirts and fan experiences including mascots and training ground visits.

Super White Christmas Appeal - TRIC ran the Super White Christmas initiative which involved collections, parties and fun events to help underprivileged people on the Wirral enjoy their Christmas.

Food Parcels - The charity has continued to provide food hampers (500 in 23/24) to those who are underprivileged and isolated in the community. This included elderly, people in isolation due to being classed as vulnerable, families unable to afford food and those living alone with no network.

Financial Review

The Trustees are conscious of the fact that grant funding for activities is becoming increasingly scarce and have therefore been looking at ways of securing other revenues that are not reliant on grants or voluntary donations.

In 2024 financial year, total income was £386,620 (2023: £476,813) of which £228,000 related to restricted funds (2023: 366,666). Total monies expended on delivery of charitable activities was £412,993 (2023: £517,833) resulting in a deficit of £26,373 (2023: deficit of £41,020).

At the year end the charity had net assets of £145,364 (2023: £171,737).

The charity's trustees have considered and discussed TRIC's reserves policy. In view of the level of annual overhead, the trustees continue to believe that a reserve that covers three months anticipated overheads is reasonable. Based on the expenditure in 2023/24 the unrestricted reserves cover unrestricted expenditure for 7.86 months. The Club has confirmed to the Trustees that in the event that TRIC did not have sufficient funds to meet the payments due to the Club for the services provided by the Club, the payments would be waived. On that basis, the trustees were comfortable with the ability of the charity to continue its activities.

Plans for the future

The charity will continue to adhere to the following principles:

- Grow the brand and be a true community club embedded in the heart of the community.
- Be an effective delivery vehicle, with a reputation for quality provision.
- Develop a financially viable and sustainable business.
- Maximise current assets and obtain more – grow the footprint.
- Continue to develop strategic relationships for joint working and growth.
- Be fully inclusive.

The main pillars of delivery will be:


Health and Wellbeing – provide a range of activities to develop and maintain the physical fitness and mental stability of the community.

Enhancing Lives – to increase or improve the quality, value or extent of positive experiences by local residents.

Citizenship – to educate and develop the knowledge and skills of young people to be valuable members of the local community and reduce anti-social behaviour.

Income generation will continue to focus on contracted services, grants and a new fundraising strategy has been developed for implementation.

Responsibilities and basis of report



1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value (if applicable) and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards, the Companies Act 2006 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) – (Charity SORP (FRS 102)).

1.2 Incoming resources

Income represents receipts and grants from the company's activities. Grants are included in the period in which the related expenditure is incurred. Services income is accounted for when the supply is complete. Voluntary income is received by way of donations and is included in full in the statement of Financial Activities when receivable. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

1.3 Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, and include attributable VAT that cannot be recovered. Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration on each activity, comprising the salary and overheads costs of the central function, is apportioned on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Motor vehicles	25% straight line
Gym equipment	15% straight line

Items under £250 are not capitalised.
