DIRECTORS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

The Directors present their consolidated report and financial statements for Trinity Homeless Projects and Trinity Activities for the year ended 31 March 2025.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charitable company's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2019.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Trinity Homeless Projects is a charitable company limited by guarantee. It was incorporated on 10 January 2007. Its main objects are to end homelessness by providing housing and homeless services for people at risk of or suffering homelessness, with coaching and support.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

In accordance with the above objectives for this year, and with due regard to the published Charity Commission guidance on the operation of the Public Benefit requirement of the Charities Act 2011, the Directors have undertaken appropriate activities in furtherance of those aims for the public benefit. This year's activities, achievements and future plans are summarised below.

VOLUNTEERS

During the financial year there were 35 volunteers who contributed to the operations of Trinity Homeless Projects (THP) and Trinity Activities (TA).

Volunteers at TA were mainly THP residents. They volunteered at either the Hayes or Uxbridge furniture shop where they provided customer services support, assembled and built furniture and acted as support to drivers who delivered goods to customers. Total volunteers' hours were approximately 5,128. Volunteers' travel and lunch were reimbursed at a cost of c£7.3k.

Volunteers at THP were a mixture of pro bono corporate people and THP residents. Their activities included supporting the maintenance team in gardening, repairs, and painting. Total volunteers' hours were 3,180. THP reimbursed volunteers' travel and lunch at a cost of c£4.2k.

Resilience

This past year has tested every part of our housing and support pathway. Applications are down due to the instability in our local councils, landlords are leaving the sector, local rents continue to soar, and the wider housing crisis has left many people trapped in supported accommodation far longer than planned. And yet, despite all of this, we are moving forward.

Stabilising the Foundations

Early in the year, our waiting lists and bottlenecks made it feel like we were standing still. People were staying longer, rent arrears were rising, and the lack of move-on options risked draining morale. So we acted. Through tighter referral management, relentless rent arrears work, and patient engagement, we began to turn the corner. By the end of the financial year, void levels were on budget, arrears stabilised, and all our key performance indicators were back within tolerance. This has only been possible through recognising that all our separate teams are really one team, and through teamwork, which requires trust and authenticity, we can achieve our one objective...end homelessness.

Lives Changed, Step by Step

An end to homelessness sounds like 'pie in the sky', yet not so long ago rough sleeping was eradicated within a few days. And yet even without the resources to effect total system change, Trinity holds this belief for every person that walks through our door.

- Throughout this year our community numbered 1,124 people.
- We housed 526 people this year, with 166 moving on positively to independent lives.
- At Olympic House, our 33-bed hostel for people who were sleeping rough, 75 people were housed and 44 successfully moved on despite losing vital mental health support from Central and North West London NHS Foundation Trust (CNWL). We have negotiated a new lease and a 12-month contract with the London Borough of Hillingdon, ensuring this life-saving work continues.

- At Riverside, despite rent arrears and high maintenance costs, the small community is stable and providing a wonderful living environment for 40 residents.
- We helped 42 families escaping war to settle in Hillingdon.

Every one of these numbers represents a person who now has a door they can lock, a bed they can sleep in, and hope for tomorrow.

Growing New Pathways

We are not standing still.

- In Slough, we have joined the local delivery partnership group overseen by Homeless Link and proposed a second neighbourhood to house 30 more people. We have already secured two new six-bed homes, with more in negotiation.
- Our work with asylum seekers and refugees has expanded through the London Borough of Hillingdon 'Test for Change' programme. 42% of our new residents in the last quarter of this financial year were people recently evicted from the National Asylum Seeker Service accommodation. Through community events with Refugees in Effective and Active Partnership (REAP) and our Families Team, we helped to make people feel welcome, supported, and safe. Plans are underway to open a dedicated house for refugees.

These initiatives don't just create homes — they build hope!

Investing in Our People

Our strength is our people.

- 80% of our team took part in our wellbeing programme in France, and feedback received was overwhelmingly positive.
- We have reviewed our 1:1 support and introduced role evaluations and are openly discussing pay and value—helping everyone see their worth clearly.
- Training is thriving, having completed our first NLP Practitioner courses, ensuring our Coaches are empowered to achieve their own outcomes and help others achieve theirs.

We thrive when we are free to be ourselves – authentic, when we know our strengths that make us resilient and when we trust.

Financial Stability, Future Confidence

Our financial position has strengthened dramatically. At the end of Q4, performance showed a £ 301k surplus, the reserves policy was exceeded by 21%, and we've seen a £182k increase in cash from the start of the year. This financial stability is the platform for everything else we do.

Trinity Activities

Rising Through the Challenges

This year has not been easy.

Persistent gaps in the team, and the daily pressures have been felt in every part of our operations. At times, performance dipped and energy felt thin on the ground. Despite the operational strain, our team have shown extraordinary dedication, our spirit has not wavered and our results show it.

Holding the Line

We operate a triple bottom line; environmental, social and financial.

- We have recycled 378 tons of furniture this year; reducing emissions through saving 1,021 tons of CO2 – equivalent to heating 378 houses for a year.
- We provide low cost furniture for local people and furnishings for Trinity Homeless Projects 100 properties.
- 20% financial contribution towards Trinity Homeless Projects charitable overheads.

While income was down, careful budgeting meant we stayed on target overall. We acted swiftly to address issues with Gift Aid, van checks, and communications, and they are now firmly back on track. Even while focusing on recruitment, we have kept our gross surplus and contribution to charity overheads rising. This is what resilience looks like, adapting and believing in our ability to succeed, even when the odds are stacked against us.

Investing in Our People

We know that the biggest challenge this year has been balancing the wellbeing of the individual with the wellbeing of the team. When individual members are supported and healthy, the team becomes more resilient and productive, and that collective success creates a better environment for every person to excel – a virtuous circle. However, where sabbaticals, annual leave and secondments create gaps, these put pressure on the team to continue to achieve results. Maybe part of the balancing act is to factor in a reduction in expectation that reflects the reduction of the team; thereby reducing pressure on the team as a whole. This would then be the true cost of wellbeing.

A Financial Foundation for Growth

Operational turbulence has not stopped us building financial strength: Cash balance at 31 March 2025 was 2.4 times higher than last year. The reserves policy was unmet by 4%, helped by the strategic cancellation of long-term debt from THP and even after offsetting an early deficit, Trinity Activities closed the year with a surplus of £123k. Our current cash remains buoyant, giving us space to recruit, recover, and renew. This solid footing gives us room to focus what matters most: our people.

FUTURE PLANS

Looking Ahead with Courage

The housing crisis continues, move-on options remain scarce, and demand still outstrips supply. But we are proving that even in the hardest circumstances, progress is possible: people are moving on, properties are being secured, partnerships are strengthening and most importantly, lives are changing. This is what resilience looks like: not ignoring the storm but building stronger shelters within it.

Together, as the Trinity community, we are not just surviving—we are creating hope, home, and new beginnings.

Trinity Activities

Looking Forward

Through every challenge, one truth remains: what we do changes lives. Every ton of furniture recycled, every item sold, every donation received supports the mission of Trinity – ending homelessness.

We continue to develop and learn - customer feedback shows parking issues affect visits to the Uxbridge Store, and Gift Aid is still below target - but we are listening, innovating, and adapting. Our people are our strength, and with new recruits joining, renewed energy in our teams, and a stable financial base behind us, we are ready to rise higher. Because of the unwavering commitment of our people, we are not just weathering this storm - we are building something stronger beyond it.

FINANCIAL ACTIVITY

The consolidated financial statements show a surplus of £301,058 (2024: £18,554 deficit). The Statement of Financial Activities for Trinity Homeless Projects shows a surplus for the year of £177,844 (2024: £93,850) and those of Trinity Activities show a surplus of £123,214 (2024: £112,404 deficit) for the year ended 31 March 2025.

At 31 March 2025, total consolidated funds were £2,076,191 (2024: £1,775,133).

RESERVES POLICY

The directors have reviewed the charitable company's needs for reserves in line with the guidance issued by the Charity Commission. They have established a policy whereby the free reserves (that is those reserves not invested in fixed assets or designated and restricted funds) held by the charitable company should be equal to 12 weeks general operating costs. This equates to approximately £1.4m in general funds. This target has been achieved. Our total free reserves are in excess of £2m and the trustees consider this level of free reserves to be prudent in the light of our impending direct investment in affordable housing next year.

GOING CONCERN

The Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

RISK REVIEW

The Senior Management Team reviews the Risk Mitigation Plan monthly and reports to the Board on this quarterly. The key risk is an increase in rent arrears from tenants getting work and a decrease in social housing from cuts in local council funding. These are mitigated by allowing a provision for tenants and encouraging them to move into affordable housing after they find work and increasing fundraising events in order to be less reliant on council funds.

Other major risks identified are set out in the table below together with the mitigating actions taken:

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

All the directors must be members of the company and are the only members of the company.

Each member of the charitable company is required to contribute a maximum amount of £1 in the event of the charitable company being liquidated whilst they are a member or within one year of them ceasing to be a member.

The directors have confirmed that they have an awareness and understanding of their legal responsibilities as summarised in the NCVO publication, "The 12 Essential Board Responsibilities" and their training needs are kept under review accordingly.

The arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of the Chief Executive are agreed by the trustees and made on an independent pay review basis.

At times, Trinity finds it beneficial to have relationships with related parties and other charitable organisations to cooperate for the pursuit of its charitable objectives. When these relationships exist, it is the policy of Trinity to have a suitable and appropriate Service Level Agreement in place.

APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

Under the Articles of Association, the serving directors may appoint additional directors at any time with a maximum number of twelve and a minimum of three.

Trinity usually has eight or nine Trustees. Each year two Trustees retire by rotation. The recruitment process is run by the Chair of Trustees and overseen by the Chief Executive. The Board identifies the skills which it needs within it, and then actively seeks people with these skills to apply to become a Trustee of the charity. Candidates are required to complete an application form setting out details about themselves and their suitability for Trusteeship.

These applications are treated on a confidential basis, reviewed by the Chair of Trustees and the Chief Executive, and matched against the skills criteria established by the Board. Prospective Trustees are invited to attend a number of Board Meetings as an observer. The appointment of a Trustee does not take effect until they have signed the prescribed Companies House form, and the appointment of any prospective Trustee who has not done so within one month will lapse unless the Board resolves that there is good cause for the delay.

The Company must have a Chair and a Vice-Chair. Both are to be elected by the Board. The Board must decide the period during which they are each to hold office and the precise point at which their term of office ends. Both the Chair and the Vice-Chair may be re-elected. The Chair and the Vice-Chair may resign from their positions at any time although they may remain as Trustees.

DIRECTORS' TRAINING

Because poor governance costs more than learning to govern well, the board invests in its governance capacity. Training and re-training is used to orient new members as well as increase existing member skills and understanding. Both Chair and Vice-Chair receive specific training regarding chairing meetings and the board attend an annual day away. Outside monitoring assistance is also arranged so that the Board can exercise confident control over organisational performance, including but not limited to fiscal audit. Mechanisms are used to ensure the board's ability to listen to the beneficiaries' viewpoints and values. Governance costs are prudent though not at the expense of endangering the development and maintenance of superior capability of the board.

The directors have delegated the day-to-day management of the charitable company to Steve Hedley, who provides a written report to each meeting of the directors (held approximately quarterly) and is also in regular contact with directors between meetings. Steve Hedley is supported by a team of senior directors that comprises the Director of Services and the Finance Director.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DIRECTORS

The Directors are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charitable company for that year.

In preparing these financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the accounts; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITOR

Each of the Directors has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditor is aware of such information.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Trinity Homeless Projects for the year-ended 31 March 2025 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, the Consolidated and Charitable Company Balance Sheets and the Consolidated Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 *The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland* (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the group's and of the parent charitable company's affairs as at 31 March 2025 and of the group's and parent charitable company's net movement in funds, including the income and expenditure, for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the group in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Conclusions relating to going concern

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the group's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

Our responsibilities and the responsibilities of the directors with respect to going concern are described in the relevant sections of this report.

Other Information

The other information comprises the information included in the annual report, other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The directors are responsible for the other information. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon. In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether there is a material misstatement in the financial statements or a material misstatement of the other information. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Opinions on other matters prescribed by the Companies Act 2006

In our opinion, based on the work undertaken in the course of the audit:

- the information given in the directors' report for the financial year for which the financial statements are prepared is consistent with the financial statements; and
- the directors' report has been prepared in accordance with applicable legal requirements.

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

In the light of the knowledge and understanding of the group and the parent charitable company and its environment obtained in the course of the audit, we have not identified material misstatements in the directors' report.

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the Companies Act 2006 requires us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- adequate accounting records have not been kept by the parent charitable company; or
- the parent charitable company financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or
- certain disclosures of directors' remuneration specified by law are not made; or
- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit; or
- the directors were not entitled to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the small companies' regime and take advantage of the small companies' exemptions in preparing the directors' report and from the requirement to prepare a strategic report.

Responsibilities of directors

As explained more fully in the directors' responsibilities statement set out on page 6, the directors are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the directors are responsible for assessing the group's and the parent charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below:

Based on our understanding of the group and the environment in which it operates, we identified that the principal risks of non-compliance with laws and regulations related to social housing, safeguarding, employment and health and safety regulations and charity law, and we considered the extent to which non-compliance might have a material effect on the financial statements. We also considered those laws and regulations that have a direct impact on the preparation of the financial statements such as include the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 2011, and considered other factors such as income tax, payroll tax and sales tax.

We evaluated management's incentives and opportunities for fraudulent manipulation of the financial statements (including the risk of override of controls). Audit procedures performed by the engagement team included:

- Inspecting correspondence with regulators and tax authorities;
- Discussions with management including consideration of known or suspected instances of non-compliance with laws and regulation and fraud;
- Evaluating management's controls designed to prevent and detect irregularities;
- Identifying and testing journals; and
- Challenging assumptions and judgements made by management in their accounting estimates
- Assessment of identified fraud risk factors;
- Performing analytical procedures to identify any unusual or unexpected relationships, including related party transactions, that may indicate risks of material misstatement due to fraud;
- Confirmation of related parties with management, and review of transactions throughout the period to identify any previously undisclosed transactions with related parties outside the normal course of business; and
- Reading minutes of meetings of those charged with governance.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, there is a risk that we will not detect all irregularities, including those leading to a material misstatement in the financial statements or non-compliance with regulation. This risk increases the more that compliance with a law or regulation is removed from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, as we will be less likely to become aware of instances of non-compliance. The risk is also greater regarding irregularities occurring due to fraud rather than error, as fraud involves intentional concealment, forgery, collusion, omission or misrepresentation.

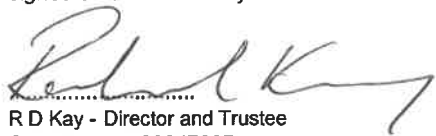

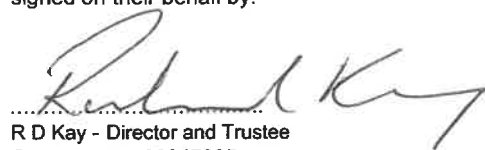

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Charity information

Trinity Homeless Projects is a charitable company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is given on the legal and administrative information page. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are to end homelessness by providing housing and homeless services for people at risk of or suffering homelessness, vocational and skills training, coaching and support.

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charitable company's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2019). The charitable company is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

b) Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Directors have a reasonable expectation that the charitable company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. There are no fundamental uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. Thus, the Directors continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

c) Income

Income is recognised in the period in which the charitable company is legally entitled to the income, is more likely than not to be received and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Grants from government and other agencies have been included as incoming resources from charitable activities where these amount to a contract for services. Donations are the amount where the money is given in response to an appeal or with greater freedom of use.

Rent and Housing Benefits have been included as income from charitable activities and income is recognised when the group is legally entitled to it.

Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold. No amounts are included in the consolidated financial statements for services donated by volunteers. Other gifts in kind are included at their estimated value to the group at the time of receipt.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business.

d) Expenditure

Expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis, including VAT, where this cannot be recovered. Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been allocated to those cost categories. Where these costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned to the individual activities on the basis of the time spent by staff on matters relating to those activities. Central support costs have been allocated on the basis of resources used and have been apportioned to the cost centres of fundraising and publicity, individual projects within charitable expenditure and governance costs in accordance with the requirements of the SORP. Governance costs included within charitable activities comprise all costs relating to the public accountability of the group and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs relating to the statutory audit.

e) Tangible Fixed Assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Land	- Nil depreciation
Building	- 50 years straight line
Computer equipment	- 25% straight line
Motor vehicles	- 25% straight line
Furniture & fittings	- evenly over 8 years
Leasehold improvements	- evenly over the remaining term of the lease

Items of equipment are only capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £1,000.

f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments and original maturities of three months or less.

g) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

h) Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date of a past event. It is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount the Charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation.

i) Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases, where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor, are charged against income on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

j) Pensions

The charitable company contributes to the personal pensions of certain employees. The charitable company also operates a defined contribution pension scheme for all members of staff. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the charitable company in independently administered funds. The annual contributions paid to both schemes are charged against income, in the year to which they relate.

k) Development loan

Trinity Homeless Projects received a development loan of £3.2m from Social and Sustainable Capital (SASC) in November 2021 for the refurbishment of a hotel (Riverside) that was converted to 41 affordable studio flats. The loan was refinanced in November 2023, and the interest rate was 6.1% fixed for five years. The loan value at 31 March 2025 was £3,296,610. The loan is on a repayment basis. Starting from financial year 2022-23, the building is depreciated over 50 years on a straight-line basis.

l) Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employees' service is received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charitable company is demonstrably committed to terminating the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

m) Tax status

The charitable company is a registered charity within the definitions of section 506(1) Income and Corporation Taxes Act 1988 and therefore it is not assessable to corporation tax on any surplus charitable funds.

n) Funds accounting

Funds held by the group are:

Unrestricted general funds - these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the directors.

Designated funds - these are funds set aside by the directors out of unrestricted general funds for specific future purposes or projects.

The directors make transfers between funds when expenditure of a restricted nature is to be met from more than one type of fund. The maximum level of these transfers is agreed by the directors prior to the expenditure.

The nature and purpose of each fund is explained further in the notes to the consolidated financial statements.

o) Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. There are no significant estimates and judgements used in the preparation of these financial statements.

11. MOVEMENT OF FUNDS

Ashley Copse -The Department of Health made a capital grant of £193,152 in 1987 under section 64 of the Public Health Act 1968 to the Coke Hole Trust, a registered , a registered charity which merged in 1998 with Bridges International Limited which, in turn, was taken over by Yeldall Christian Centres in 2004. The designated fund comprises of 50% the grant assigned to Trinity Homeless Projects upon de-merger from Yeldall Christian Centres. The purpose of the grant was to extend the residential rehabilitation centre for drug misusers. Whilst the grant is potentially repayable, the trustees are of the opinion that this is unlikely given the effluxion of time and on the basis of previous correspondence with the relevant Government department.

Capital Fund -This fund represents the net book value of the fixed assets owned by the parent company, net of the value of any fixed assets provided from restricted funds.

Homeless Fundraising- Money allocated specifically for the fundraising activities of the charitable company.

Sinking Fund - Money to put aside to cover future repairs and maintenance costs. This is to reduce the impact of future one--off significant expenses.

14. PENSION SCHEME

The Charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme on behalf of its employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the group. At 31 March 2025 there were outstanding contributions for the group of £8,842 (2024: £23,051).

15. CAPITAL COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

There were no contingent liabilities at 31st March 2025 (2024: £Nil).

16. COMPANY LIMITED BY GUARANTEE

The charitable company is a company limited by guarantee and without a share capital.

There were 6 members at 31 March 2025 (2024: 6 members). If the company is wound up, the members are required to contribute a maximum of £1 towards the costs of winding up the company and liabilities incurred whilst the contributor was a company member and for one year after ceasing to be a member.

17. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

At 31 March 2025, Trinity Homeless Projects had a balance of £294,741 (2024: £194,856) receivable from Trinity Activities due to an excess in cash transferred for transactions, expenses incurred, management charge and donations which had arisen in the year. On 24 March 2025, the Board of Trustees authorised writing off a long-term loan valued at £164,240.

Trinity Activities is a wholly controlled subsidiary of Trinity Homeless Projects and part of the Trinity Homeless Projects Group. The two organisations have common trustees. Trinity Homeless Projects raised a management charge of £135,600 (2024: £265,044) to cover the cost of running Trinity Activities in the year.

This amount is shown within administrative expenditure in the charitable expenditure note of the Trinity Activities financial statements and included in other trading activities in the statement of financial activities of the Trinity Homeless Projects financial statements.

At the year-end a total of £97,273 (2024: £133,210) was due to Trinity Homeless Projects from Slough Homeless - Our Concern, a charity which shares common directors.

This primarily relates to expenses paid by Trinity Homeless Projects on behalf of Slough Homeless - Our Concern.

SHOC, Slough Homeless Our Concern is an independent charity and the charity has common trustees with Trinity Homeless Projects. Trinity Homeless Projects raised a management charge of £7,152 (2024: £7,152) to cover the cost of running SHOC, Slough Homeless Our Concern in the year.
