Structure, governance and management

The governing document of OJ's Sensory Interaction Trust is a Trust Deed dated 12 May 2006.

Trustees are appointed for a 12-month term. Trustees meet at least twice per year. New Trustees are appointed by a resolution of the trustees passed at a special meeting.

Objectives and Activities for the Public Benefit

To advance the education of and provide facilities in the interests of recreation and leisure time occupation for children and adults with special learning needs primarily, but not exclusively through the provision of sensory interaction centres throughout England and Wales with the object of improving their conditions of life by whatever charitable means the trustees think fit.

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy for the period.

Review of Activities and Achievements

Summary of OJ's

For the past 17 years, OJ's charity has been committed to delivering specialised sessions tailored to meet the unique needs of children with autism, learning difficulties and additional needs, alongside their families. We have exclusive hire of a setting in Longridge, Lancashire, meticulously tailored to meet the unique needs of our children and families. Our specialist sessions are strategically scheduled on Saturdays and midweek during school holidays. This deliberate timing allows us to create a serene and supportive environment, free from the challenges posed by busy public places, which can be overwhelming for our children and their families due to the extent of their disabilities. Our commitment to providing a calm and accommodating space reflects our dedication to ensuring every child and family feels comfortable and supported during our sessions.

With our own lived experience, we deeply empathise with the challenges our families face. Beyond our specialist sessions, we extend both emotional and practical support, recognising the diverse needs of our families. When required, we guide families to additional resources through signposting and foster connections through facilitated family-to-family support. This personal touch ensures that our families not only receive specialised sessions but also benefit from a comprehensive network of understanding and assistance tailored to their unique circumstances.

Objects and activities



Caring for a child with autism, learning difficulties or additional needs, indeed places substantial strain on all family members. The demanding nature of seeking necessary help and support often requires parents and caregivers to engage in what can be described as a constant 'fight'. This ongoing battle not only leaves them feeling stressed and exhausted but also consumes much of their time, leaving very little room for siblings and overall family experiences. Consequently, family relationships inevitably suffer, highlighting the urgent need for comprehensive support structures and understanding. At OJ's, we recognise these challenges and strive to provide not only specialised assistance for the child but also a supportive environment that addresses the well-being of the entire family unit.

OJ's is dedicated to fostering an understanding environment that caters to the emotional needs of our families. Recognising the value of shared experiences, we actively encourage and facilitate peer-to-peer support. In creating a safe and supportive community, OJ's provides a space where families feel comfortable discussing their struggles and worries. We believe in the power of shared understanding and empathy, building connections that contribute to the well-being of each member in our community.

Achievements and performance

At OJ's, our mission is to alleviate family isolation by actively encouraging increased attendance. We have seen several positive outcomes resulting from our support, including the reduction of family isolation, enhanced peer-to-peer connections, improved mental health for family members and strengthened parental resilience in navigating challenges associated with severe autism, learning difficulties and additional needs. Additionally, our efforts aim to boost the confidence of isolated families to socialise beyond their homes, create more positive experiences for families outside their homes, and provide increased training and support for children and families utilising Makaton.

We have created a central hub for our families, fostering positive experiences for both parents and children. Our objective is to offer understanding and support, as we share our knowledge and experience, creating a supportive community for families.



We regularly receive communication from new families and caregivers who are desperately seeking a place where they can feel accepted. Our commitment is to provide that welcoming space where everyone can find acceptance and support.

Recognising the breadth of characteristics associated with severe autism and learning difficulties is essential for providing personalised and effective support. OJ's remains committed to understanding and addressing the unique needs of each child and family, fostering an environment of inclusivity, empathy, and support.

We partner with Ribble Valley Health and Wellbeing Partnership and The Department for Education to deliver the Ribble Valley Holiday Activities and Food Programme (HAF), for children with Special Educational Needs. The programme provides free holiday provision, including healthy food and enriching activities, for primary and secondary age children in receipt of benefits-related free-school meals (FSM) and/or who have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

Since 2018, the HAF programme has provided support throughout the Easter, Summer, and Christmas school holidays. Local authorities have discretion to use up to 15% of their funding to provide free or subsidised holiday club places for children who are not in receipt of benefits-related FSM



but who the local authority believe could benefit from HAF. OJ's provides specialist, inclusive sessions for the Ribble Valley HAF Programme for children who would find it challenging to access mainstream sessions.

Our team brings a wealth of experience and expertise to our work at OJ's. With 17 years of dedicated service, we have honed our skills in supporting children and young adults with autism, learning difficulties, and additional needs, as well as their families. Our founder, Lisa, a mother of four children, including one with profound autism and severe learning difficulties, intimately understands the challenges faced by families in accessing appropriate support and services.

Throughout our year we have seen attendance levels surpass pre-pandemic levels with a higher number of new families visiting OJ's. Our family sessions are without a doubt an extremely popular service.

Monitoring and evaluation comments we have received from parents/carers;

Local to where we live. Friendly staff – safe environment so can come with just one adult so allowing rest of family to do other things. Somewhere to go – reasonably priced and as activities are indoors and out it is ok in all weathers

As a family we have used OJ's at weekends and school holidays. Our youngest child has adhd & autism loves the space and freedom to run and play, and I'm happy and confident that he's in a safe space where he can't get hurt

Our child has quite bad social anxiety but since visiting OJ's she has come out of her shell. She struggles to go outside but she always wants to go to OJ's. It's also helped build her confidence and self esteem being able to play independently without us following her around

There simply isn't enough services like OJ's. They provide a safe non-judgemental space which encourages children who maybe struggling with complex needs. We need OJ's to be here! There is no other service like it!

Financial review

There was a deficit in the year of £31,882 with the prior year being a surplus of 10,970.

Income has decreased mainly in the area of grants where we received £42,970 less than the previous year.

Expenditure for the year increased slightly to meet the additional needs of our beneficiaries.

Therefore, at the end of the financial year total charitable funds were £45,663 of which £39,820 was restricted funds.

Reserves Policy

The reserves policy is to build up 3 months of expenditure in unrestricted funds with a view to working towards a policy of holding 6 months of expenditure reserves.

The amounts will be reviewed annually and amended if necessary in line with the growth and changes of the charity.

For the financial year ending 30 June 2023, 3 months of expenditure (including restricted funds) is £25,829 with 6 months of expenditure being £51,657. The current unrestricted, free reserves of the charity are £9,843.

Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

To advance the education of and provide facilities in the interests of recreation and leisure time occupation for children and adults with special learning needs primarily but not exclusively through the provision of sensory interaction centres throughout England and Wales with the object of improving their conditions of life by whatever charitable means the trustees think fit.

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy for the period.

Review of Activities and Achievements

This was obviously a very difficult year for OJ's as we navigated COVID-19 restrictions and lockdowns. At the times we were unable to offer our face to face services we offered training sessions in Intensive Interaction and Understanding Sensory Diets and Sensory Circuits, via Zoom, for parents and carers. We worked with specialist trainers and also offered free 1:1 support for any family who required further help after the group training.

When our Saturday Family Club and Mid-week Holiday Club sessions were open, we limited numbers to keep our vulnerable children and young people as safe as possible. Sessions were well attended and run in a safe manner.

We opened 2 mid-week sessions, one for adults with autism and additional needs and another for home-schooled children with Special Educational Needs. Due to families still being very careful with COVID throughout the year, the sessions for home-schooled children were not well attended and we began to offer two sessions for adults. Again, participant numbers were low to keep everyone safe and we offered general activities such as New Age Kurling, Sound Boccia and dance.

Throughout the year two staff members were trained as Sleep Practitioners with a view to offering support to families who are experiencing sleep difficulties. Two other staff members went through Exercise To Music training and began to deliver sessions to our adults as trained instructors.

Future Plans

We plan to offer more mid-week family sessions during each holiday and increase the activities we offer during these sessions. Numbers will still be limited to ensure those who attend have the best experience they possibly can in a safe environment that isn't too busy.

We will be working on improving our adult mid-week sessions as people feel more confident to attend group sessions. We will work with carers to develop what we offer and engage as many participants as we can.

Financial review

There was a surplus in the year of £24,550 with the prior year being a surplus of £30,974. Income increased as a result of an increase in restricted grants of 118% over the prior year. However general donations were down.

Expenditure for the year increased to meet the additional increase in funding. This is particularly evident when looking at restricted funds expenditure.

Therefore, at the end of the financial year total charitable funds were £66,524 of which £60,255 was restricted funds.

Reserves Policy

The reserves policy is to build up 3 months of expenditure in unrestricted funds with a view to working towards a policy of holding 6 months of expenditure reserves.

The amounts will be reviewed annually and amended if necessary in line with the growth and changes of the charity.

For the financial year ending 30 June 2021, 3 months of expenditure (including restricted funds) is £23,420 with 6 months of expenditure being £46,839. The current unrestricted, free reserves of the charity are £6,269 which equates to 0.8 months. However excluding restricted funds the number of months is 23.8 months,

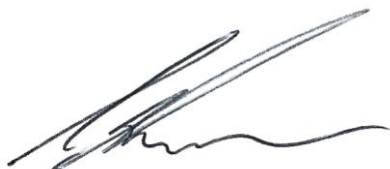

Notes to the Accounts

1) Accounting Policies

a) Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the Ireland Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS1 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

OJ's Sensory Interaction constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

Having considered projections for income and expenditure in the next 12 months the Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties to allow the Charity to continue as a going concern.

b) Fund accounting

The Charity maintains various types of funds as follows:

Unrestricted Funds: The general funds represent unrestricted income which is expendable at the discretion of the Trustees in the furtherance of the objectives of the Charity.

Restricted Funds: Funds which the donor has specified are solely to be used for particular activities.

c) Incoming Resources

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the Charity has entitlements to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

d) Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal and constructive obligation committing the Charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All expenditure directly relates to the object of the Charity and is shown inclusive of VAT.

f) Allocation of support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include back office costs, finance, personnel, payroll and governance costs. Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

g) Tangible Fixed Assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment - 25% straight line

h) Debtors

Debtors (including trade debtors and loans receivable) are measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts or amount advanced by the charity. Subsequently, they are measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

i) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provision are normally recognised at their settle net amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

j) Corporation Tax

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

k) Key estimates and accounting judgements

In applying the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions in determining the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities. The Trustees' judgements, estimates and assumptions are based on the best and most reliable evidence available at the time when the decisions are made, and are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be applicable. Due to the inherent subjectivity involved in making such judgements, estimates and assumptions, the actual results and outcomes may differ.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to the accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised, if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of revision and future periods, if the revision affects both current and future periods.
