The trustees confirm they have referred to and had regard to the guidance contained in the charity commission's general guidance with regard to public benefit when reviewing the trusts aims and objectives and in planning activities, including grants.

With due regard to the guidance issued by the charity commission on public benefit we continue to support a church, offering regular Christian services of worship and teaching.

We also support a residential school for poor children who would otherwise be unable to receive an education. Education is currently provided from reception through to Standard 5 and children are supported to attend years 6-12 (up to GCSE A level equivalent) at local schools and colleges. No school or accommodation fees are charged.

Children who are late starters to school are provided with classes to achieve basic numeracy and literacy initially and further education is supported to meet needs.

Young people who want to continue their education further than A level are funded giving opportunity to attend local colleges and universities throughout India on achieving entrance requirements. All reasonable expenses are funded.

We relieve sickness and preserve health by facilitating health care from professional doctors, nurses and other health care specialists at hospitals in India and by organising healthcare camps.

We relieve financial hardship by providing grants to destitute families and those socially disadvantaged, through a local welfare society and by direct payment to those known to trustees.

We provide small grants to enable young people who have been educated with our support to begin independent living.

We have paid for children to be issued with documentation: birth certificates and identity cards. This allows them to register for school, national exams and to prove their age empowering them to access help to refuse underage and forced marriage.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Church services on church premises are well attended and many visitors attended celebration services at Christmas. The church is continues to be financially independent.

Church services are also held at Morning Star School with children parents staff and visitors encouraged to attend.

We fund hostel accommodation on two sites for children attending Morning Star School and for children and young people supported by us to attend other educational institutions.

We are funding and providing support to build a boys' hostel for a residential school where current hired premises no longer meet the needs. This building project is being monitored by an architect and structural engineer to comply with Government planning and safety standards in India. During this year strengthening was agreed to meet a higher standard of resilience. Internal walls are going in.

Morning Star School has been provided with a replacement generator as the existing one needed frequent repairs leaving the school without a reliable electricity supply.

Four volunteers visited projects in 23/24 and were a great encouragement to staff and students. They were also able to provide verification of works being undertaken. Several friends from the U.K also visited and gave positive reports.

Funding has been provided to buy Laptops and mobile phones for young people on university courses as required.

We support 50 residential school students at Morning Star School.

9 new students were admitted to Morning Star Residential School in October 2024 and have settled in well. 2 Further students joined in December and another two, having been orphaned in March 2025.

All children taking internal school exams passed and have been able to progress in their studies. High school students achieved excellent grades and have been placed in schools suiting there needs to continue their education starting GCSE equivalent courses.

Three Children took GCSE equivalent exams and have started 'A' levels at local colleges. A further 3 passed their first year 'A' level exams and have started the second year. All have been funded with additional tuition as required.

Funding was provided for trips to a Science Park, Wonderland, and for meals out giving children and young people a broader experience.

We are funding 11 children in Further/Higher Education and post graduate courses. 1 student gained a degree in Physical Ed and has enrolled to do a post grad teaching qualification. 2 students doing BSC in Physical Education, 2 doing Social Work, 1 having completed a degree has begun a masters course in Social Work. 1 doing BSC in Animation, 2 doing a BSC Nursing, and 1 doing a BSC

Airlines, Tourism and Hotel Management, 2 doing General Nursing Diploma. Mentoring is provided to all students on request.

We have given some small independent living grants to young people who have finished studies and started working. We are delighted to see students we have funded to gain qualifications, working in the motor industry, teaching, nursing, Occupational Therapy, rehabilitation and more.

We have facilitated a number of hospital admissions, treatments and investigations for: fractures, dengue fever, heart conditions, diabetes management, and conditions such as, kidney stones, malaria, dengue fever, chicken pox and stomach infections.

We continue to run immunisation programs, health checks and dental checks and treatment for all the children in our care and others brought to us who are unable to afford healthcare. We have funded treatment as needed following check-ups.

We teach about good nutrition, hygiene and healthy lifestyle to improve the health and wellbeing of children and families attending Morning Star School and church and their communities.

Trustees have undertaken training in safeguarding and working internationally using material provide by the charity commission and other organisations.





Morning Star School has been refurbished with the outside and interior repainted and small maintenance jobs completed. New furniture was provided for the dining room.

Two volunteers visited projects in 2023 and were a great encouragement to staff and students. They were also able to provide verification of works being undertaken. Several friends from the U.K also visited and were impressed by what they saw.

Funding has been provided to buy Laptops and mobile phones for young people on university courses as required. Three donated laptops were updated and taken to India and four desk top computers were donated by a volunteer visiting Morning Star School. These have been used to set up a computer lab with WiFi connection.

We support 50 residential school students at Morning Star School.

An auto rickshaw has been purchased to take residential students to neighbouring high schools and to bring day students to and from Morning Star School from a local slum.

All children taking internal school exams passed and have been able to progress in their studies. Some high school students won prizes this year in sports and science.

Three Children took GCSE equivalent exams and have started 'A' levels at local colleges while awaiting results. A further 3 passed their first year 'A' level exams and have started the second year. All have been funded with additional tuition as required. 3 who passed 'A' Levels have begun further education courses.

Funding was provided for trips to a Science Park, Wonderland, and for meals out giving children and young people a broader experience.

We funded three children completing 'A' Level equivalent studies at various institutions allowing them to follow a wide range of subjects, two in Arts subjects, one in commerce subjects. They all passed in June 2023 and have continued into further education.

We are funding 9 children in Further/Higher Education courses. 3 students doing BSC in Physical Education, 2 doing Social Work, 1

doing BSC in Animation, 1 doing a BSC Nursing, and 1 doing a BSC Airlines, Tourism and Hotel Management, 1 doing General Nursing Diploma. Mentoring is provided to all students on request.




The church services resumed on church premises following the end of Covid 19 restrictions and services and meetings have been well attended.

We fund hostel accommodation on two sites for children attending Morning Star School and for children and young people supported by us to attend other educational institutions.

Additional funding has been provided to buy laptops and mobile phones for young people on university courses as required.

We have a total of 52 residential school students.

All children taking internal school exams passed and have been able to progress in their studies.

Three Children took GCSE equivalent exams have started 'A' levels at local colleges while awaiting results.

We funded four children completing 'A' Level equivalent studies at various institutions allowing them to follow a wide range of subjects, two in medical subjects, one in commerce subjects and one in arts subjects. Despite some disruption to their courses, they all passed in June 22 and have continued into further education, all at degree level.




We teach about good nutrition, hygiene and healthy lifestyle to improve the health and wellbeing of children and families attending Morning Star School and church and their communities. This has been especially important in keeping Covid-19 infections to a minimum in hostels we fund.



The trustees confirm they have referred to and had regard to the guidance contained in the charity commission's general guidance with regard to public benefit when reviewing the Trusts aims and objectives and in planning activities, including grants.

With due regard to the guidance issued by the charity commission on public benefit we continue to support a church, offering regular Christian services of worship and teaching.

We also support a residential school for poor children who would otherwise be unable to receive an education. Education is currently provided from reception through to Standard 10+2 (GCSE 'A' Level equivalent) and young people who want to continue their education are given opportunity to do so at local colleges and at Universities. No school or accommodation fees are charged.

We relieve sickness and preserve health by facilitating health care from professional doctors, nurses and other health care specialists at hospitals in India and by organising healthcare camps. We have provided a small grant (£1000) towards building a rehabilitation centre in an area where no other centre exists and the need is great.

We relieve financial hardship by providing grants to destitute families and those socially disadvantaged through a local welfare society.

We have paid for children to be issued with their birth certificates and Adar cards allowing them to register for national exams and to prove their age empowering them to access help to refuse underage and forced marriage.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

The church services have seen disruption in a large part of the year due to the Covid-19 Pandemic leading to restrictions in public meetings. Meetings in the surrounding area at church members' homes have been held when permitted to do so. When the church has been able to meet, it has been well attended.

We fund hostel accommodation on two sites for children attending Morning Star School and for children and young people supported by us to attend other local educational institutions.

A bore hole has been funded on land bought for a boys hostel to be built to enable more boys to access education in their senior years. An architect has been engaged, plans agreed, and work is expected to start as soon as Covid 19 restrictions permit.

We have had only one volunteer this year to support residential and teaching staff, giving advice and guidance in a difficult year. This helped morale and the implementation of Covid risk assessments/ safety measures to good effect.

Additional funding has been provided to improve technology within the school allowing for on-line classes and tutoring. Phones have been provided for older students, to access studies, who had to come back to Morning Star School when their schools/colleges/universities shut to in person teaching and put classes on-line during the year. We have a total of 42 residential school students. New admissions have been on hold during the Covid 19 Pandemic but will resume as soon as possible with approximately 20 awaiting admission.

We are funding five children studying 'A' Level equivalent studies at four institutions allowing them to follow a wide range of subjects.

All children who were awaiting results delayed by the pandemic in 2019/20 received their results and were able to progress to further studies.

We continue to fund Higher education. We fund 1 student who on completing a BSC in Physical Education at University has continued into a masters level teaching qualification, 2 doing Nursing Diplomas, 1 doing an Occupational Therapy degree and one doing a Teaching Diploma.

One student who completed a Diploma in Car Mechanics and had begun working for a large firm initially in a probationary capacity has now secured a permanent position with another large firm.

One student registered in nursing and midwifery and has begun work in a large hospital.

We have funded a number of hospital admissions for stomach infections and conditions such as malaria and dengue fever and also funded kidney dialysis for a young paraplegic man.

We continue to run immunisation programs, health checks and dental checks for all the children in our care and others brought to us who are unable to afford healthcare. We fund treatment as needed following check-ups.

We teach about good nutrition, hygiene and healthy lifestyle to improve the health and wellbeing of children and families attending Morning Star School and church and their communities.

During the coronavirus pandemic we have liaised carefully with those we work with to ensure government guidance and regulations are implemented and followed. There have been 2 cases of coronavirus reported amongst those we work with to date both went into isolation and made a good recovery.


