Report of the Trustees
for the year ended 30 June 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and activities

Community Lions Foundation (CLF) aim to improve opportunities for young people from disadvantaged backgrounds, using physical activities and education workshops to address various health, wellbeing, and social inclusion imperatives. Our work is guided by the following objectives:

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Educating young people through workshops about the pros and cons of their lifestyle choices, and the benefits of making positive decisions. Through physical activity sessions, we enable young people to learn and develop personal and social life skills. For example, communicating and working as a team; becoming more physically active and making healthier lifestyle choices; and becoming resilient and understanding the benefits of hard work.

Empowering young people to become future role models for others in their local neighbourhoods and communities, by developing their educational and career aspirations. Through a pro-active approach to including young people in a range of decision-making situations through the educational and physical activity sessions, young people are given a voice to raise and explore their individual needs and wishes as well as support others through peer mentoring and other voluntary work.

Connecting young people to positive networks of care to offset feelings of loneliness. By expanding their social connections and wider links to other community organisations, the young people have access to on-going forms of social, physical, and mental health support facilities as well as inspiring their future educational, employment, and lifestyle choices.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Achievements and key performance indicators

Our Key objectives for the work we have done in this financial year, has led to the following outcomes:

1. Prevented at-risk young people (between the ages of 10 to 18 years old) engaging in crime and anti-social behaviour, ensuring all project participants are transferred to one or more of our programme exit pathways (to ensure long-term prevention).
2. Increased the number of marginalised groups - particularly those from Black, African, and British Asian backgrounds (at higher-risk of obesity-related health conditions) - engaging in a variety of physical activity to enhance their health and fitness levels.
3. Developed the personal attributes of young people by not only raising their educational/ employability skills and competences but, also, improving their social skills and abilities to engage with a range of people.
4. Provided much needed forms of community and care whilst many other private, public, and third-sector services were closed and/or unable to recruit and sustain the long-term engagement of at-risk young people.

How did we meet our objectives?

We know that many young people are in-need of additional support to address their different and complex social, physical, and mental health needs, to improve their life chances, and become responsible members of the local community. During this financial year, the challenges of Covid19 heightened the needs of many young people, missing long-periods away from the structures of school support and care especially during periods of lockdown and/or self-isolation. The sudden and serious threat of Covid, made us diversify how we work so we could continue to meet the complex needs of those most vulnerable in society. That is, to off-set the impacts of Covid upon the health and well-being of already vulnerable groups.

Despite the challenges of working during the height of the Covid epidemic in the UK, and especially as it developed in the Bradford and Keighley areas, Community Lions Foundation are pleased to report that we did not have to access the government furlough scheme (to maintain our provision to those who most needed it). Indeed, we were able to adapt and expand our services (to include also a greater number of not in education at-risk young people) by working with community partners (e.g. secondary schools, Keighley Council, and local parents, carers, and youth services) to ensure mutual financial sustainability. During this financial year, our income from public sector grants has increased and, despite the additional cost of ensuring we followed strict national and local Covid restrictions and safety guidelines, we were able to maintain a £59,343 (2021: £52,068) reserve amount.

Project Summaries:

Inspiring Others

Has been developed and delivered over the last two years (previously supported by West Yorkshire Police and the UK Home Office). We use a combination of after-school sport and physical activity training sessions and educational workshops to not only help young people better understand the nature and impact of serious organised crime but, also, to provide knowledge and support mechanisms that will enable at-risks students to stay safe (and avoid being groomed into a life of crime).

As a recipient of the Emergency Covid19 fund - via the National Lottery - we were able to continue working with some of the most at-risk pupils. Indeed, Community Lions Foundation were one of a few external organisations in the Bradford and Keighley districts, who were allowed onto school grounds (following health and safety risk evaluations and government guidelines) to support those most vulnerable to becoming involved in criminal activity. This experience has prepared us to be able to deliver our programme using online technology, our facilities at Keighley Civic Centre, and on-going school-based provision. We can therefore continue to deliver our programme if the government further sets Covid restrictions. This project will continue working with our school partners (5 secondary schools and a primary schools in schools' catchment areas), for five years, addressing the following project aims: To prevent engagement in serious and organised crime with at-risk young people. We will do so through the following objectives:

1. Address the lack of engagement in regular physical activity that may have detrimentally effected pupils' fitness levels (being housebound and perhaps not exercising during lockdown), exacerbating risk of health conditions prevalent particularly amongst South Asian communities.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

2. Address the personal and social needs of at-risk young pupils by using team games and leadership exercises within physical activity sessions to developing their communication, co-operation and teamwork skills. For many, after a long period of social distancing and potentially self-isolating during COVID-19, re-connecting with their peers at school through fun and interactive activities that boost their "feel-good" hormones is crucial to improving their well-being and morale.

3. Address the mental health needs of at-risk young pupils especially as those who may have been exposed and/or harmed through forms of serious organised crime. CLF provision aims to build pupils' self-esteem (by setting and achieving physical activity goals), confidence (in using their voices, expressing opinions, and being heard in debates) and developing positive mindsets including being resilient and bouncing back from defeats in team-games as well as inspiring them to achieve by using inspiring role models, becoming peer mentors, and linking to CLF exit-pathways, such as undertaking accredited leadership awards (e.g. Duke of Edinburgh).

Love Sport, Hate Crime

Funded by Safer Communities. This project arose from knowledge shared with CLF networks and partners about the challenging behaviours demonstrated by many young people following long periods away from school during the first UK lockdown, and subsequent regional and individual periods of isolation. Thus, this project used games and physical activity to work on the social, emotional, and mental health of young people to address their engagement in (and sometimes as victims of) hate crime such as racist discrimination, bullying, and fighting. Through the development of pro-social behaviours, learning about respect, and working with one another, we also supported young people develop personal skills and attributes relevant to the workplace.

Tackling Violence through Sport

Funded by West Yorkshire Violent Crime Reduction Unit July 2021 to June 2022 divert young people from engaging in violent crime and reducing re-offending rates. The work especially focused upon addressing knife crimes, gang fights (related to drug-trading), and hate crime, by using sport and educational workshops to teach young people about the risks and consequences of such activities as well as how to make decisions to keep themselves safe (and away from risky people and places). The provision was delivered at the Keighley Civic Centre, mainly delivering to at-risk young people not in education.

Doorstep Sports Project

This is based on the philosophy of using after-school provision to engage young people who may not be able to afford to play sport in the local community. Significantly, we base our provision at local schools, encouraging young people to join us in a space that is familiar and feels safe to them. The timings also suit most of our young people (of BAME heritage) who are often required to be home in time to attend the Mosque (Monday-Friday) between 5-7pm. Thus, we have come to develop strong relationships of trust with many local parents, who also prefer the school-setting as a safe space, resulting in our ability to recruit and retain large numbers of participants through our provision. The activities we provide are free in-cost, mixing different exercises and training drills, using new and different equipment. Significantly, we focus on learning to get along through various teamwork games and tasks, which at the same time promotes cohesion amongst the different racial and ethnic young people who participate in the project (i.e. tackling race-based gang cultures and violent rivalries).

Inspiring BAME Girls

This project was funded by Start Academy, delivered between August 2021 - February 2022. We worked specifically with BAME young girls and boys to address their physical and mental health needs. By delivering a range of taster activities, to promote long term engagement in physical activity, the young girls were connected to other (free or relatively cheap) community providers of the sport and physical activities they enjoyed the most.

Achievement and Key Performance Indicators:

- Number of School Partnerships - Six - (unable to fund engagement with all schools on our waiting list, so we have targeted the most vulnerable communities) where we know crime-related activities to be high.

- Number of young people we have directly worked with 995

- Percent of in-need young people whose understanding of Serious Organised Crime Projects (SOC) and how to stay safe, improved from the start-to-end of programme intervention 95%

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

- Percentage of in-need young people who progressed from Community Lions Foundation Inspiring Others to our after-school provision 100%
- Percentage of young people who join local amateur clubs (where they can access on-going positive networks of support and care) 32%
- Percentage of young people who go on to play for a semi-professional or professional rugby league club 10%
- Percentage who go onto access Community Lions Foundation Leadership and Mentor Programme 80% (through this one-year qualification -accredited through the Duke of Edinburgh leadership award - young people support the delivery of our workshop (and after-school sport provision) to develop their leadership capacities and, become role models to younger secondary school-aged pupils.

CLF Leadership and Mentor Scheme

58% of pupils who attend our Community Lions Foundation after-school provision, took up the opportunity to access our Community Lions Foundation leadership programme by undertaking an annual learning programme (aiming to meet the criteria for the Duke of Edinburgh Award).

Social Return on investments

- Empowerment of young people especially those disadvantaged in some way, enabling them to play a more active role and access opportunities open to them (sporting or otherwise). This would support them in making informed positive choices in their everyday lives and routines to overcome the challenges they face.
- Have ensure that 'sport' is used as effective tool in community regeneration, social exclusion, health inequalities, community safety, education and lifelong learning and bringing communities together.
- Raised aspirations and motivation leading to greater community involvement and seeking out social, educational and employment opportunities.
- Improved physical, mental and emotional health and well-being including physiological changes, raised levels of self-esteem and self-confidence, and a sense of trust in themselves and others. Also improvements in more specific ways relating to physical health and healthier lifestyles.
- More informed and better life choices in relation to health, well-being and participating in sports and physical activity.
- Increased opportunities, encouragement & support for young people who may not normally participate in sporting/outdoor education/physical activities particularly those who may experience barriers to involvement.
- Increased skills levels in specific sports.
- Outdoor activities which they can use in the future to promote their health & well-being through recreation or in a professional sense by accessing employment in these fields.
- Young people seeking positive alternatives to drug, alcohol misuse and criminal activity.
- Young people achieving formal qualifications which for many of the young women we work with will be the first time they have done so especially if they have missed out in more traditional educational settings.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial review

During the year the charity made a surplus of £7,275 (2021: £2,447). Reserves at the end of the year were £59,343 (2021; £52,068) of which £43,054 (2021; £43,082) are freely available. The trustees are keen to see the reserves increase to provide a fall back should the funding relied upon for the continuation of it's activities be withdrawn.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

FUTURE PLANS

Having been awarded a National Lottery Reaching Communities 5-year fund, we start delivery of our "Inspiring Others" programme. In the second year of delivery, we will work with six secondary schools to specifically engage vulnerable young people (from across Year 7, 8 and 9). We will also be working with younger aged primary school pupils by delivering taster sessions across each secondary school partners' feeder primary school

We wish to showcase our past and on-going work through public dissemination activity including press reports, events, and media outputs.

We will continue to expand our organisational resilience in the post-Covid environment, to ensure we have the skills, facilitates, and staff team, to further build our out-of-school deliver with a range of young people (including those not in education).

We will also be aiming to improve the quality of our provision by applying for small-scale funding bids to focus upon working with neuro-diverse learners, one-to-one mentoring, and using new and different technologies to develop our educational resources.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, memorandum and articles of association dated 18 April 2007 as amended by special resolution dated 9 July 2007.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

New trustees are selected and appointed from the local and regional area, they are selected from areas of business, public service or third sector organisation into roles that fit the pillars of the trust and therefore play a part in the driving forward of activities.

CHANGE OF NAME

The charitable company passed a special resolution on 1 November 2022 changing its name from Community Cougars Foundation to Community Lions Foundation.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Charitable activities

Includes expenditure associated with the costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

Include those activities incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Donated assets

Donated assets are included in incoming resources when the benefit is reasonably quantifiable and measurable. These assets are valued by the trustees at their current value.
