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# BROMSGROVE AND REDDITCH NETWORK

## CHAIR'S REPORT

**FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025**

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2024-2025 has been another successful year of operation for BARN, albeit one somewhat dominated by the search for new premises. Both the Community Workers Lunch, held in partnership with the Community Workers Network and Redditch District Collaborative, and the Bromsgrove Community Workers Group meeting, have continued running successfully. This gives frontline workers in both towns an opportunity to come together and share experiences. Network and board meetings continue using a hybrid model. Our training programme has continued over the year and been very successful. Most sessions have been bought in, but we developed and delivered three sessions in-house - social media, fundraising and bid writing.

Because of problems with the Do-it website (national volunteering website), it was necessary to bring the Volunteer website service in house and for BARN staff to build a new section of the website and transfer over existing opportunities manually. It was also necessary to export all volunteer records. The new website has proved popular with the public. A new monthly Volunteer Centre newsletter has also been launched, promoting the new opportunities which have come up.

The BURT (Bromsgrove Urban and Rural Transport) service is now operating 5 days a week and customer numbers are back to pre-pandemic levels. BARN has formed a consortium with BluWave and Redditch Dial a Ride to deliver a combined offer across Bromsgrove and Redditch. BARN continues to deliver the ABCD (Asset Based Community Development) initiative in Redditch, where communities' strengths are built on, rather than being defined by their deficits. We now employ only one community builder post, providing some support for Abbeydale and Woodrow and minority communities.


BARN is also the fundholder for the Reimagine Redditch – Creative People and Places project, which started in April 22 and goes on until March 2026. The workload remains significant, but manageable. BARN is now registered for Gift Aid, where tax can be reclaimed on some donations from the public. In March 2026, Severn Arts will take over as fundholder for Reimagine Redditch.

The task of finding new premises has taken up a lot of time over the year. There are now two main contenders – Market Walk (by the Canopies) and St Stephen's Court. Both have different problems to sort out and temporary options for moving out of Community House are being considered.

The financial position of the charity is more secure for the next few years, because of the large projects described above. Fundraising efforts are continuing though to ensure that we stay in a good position. We are grateful to a range of organisations, companies and foundations that have provided funding over the years. We continue to work closely with Redditch BC and Bromsgrove DC and their support and funding for parts of our work continues to be welcome.

I would like to thank all our members, volunteers, trustees and staff for their support, hard work and commitment over the last 12 months. This year we have said goodbye to our vice-chair, Ben Costello and special thanks go to him for his hard work over the years. As part of our governance arrangements, we regularly review the skills base of our trustees to ensure effective experience and knowledge exists within our trustee body and those skills have been extremely valuable to help us through the year. We maintain an up to date risk management register and review our financial position at each meeting. As Trustees leave the organisation from time to time, we do welcome anyone suitable wishing to join the Board.

In conclusion, we look forward to how BARN can continue its role in supporting volunteers, voluntary organisations and communities in 2025/26.

## TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

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The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2025.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's memorandum and articles of association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as effective from 1 January 2019).

### Objectives and activities

To promote any charitable purposes for the benefit of the communities in the areas of Bromsgrove and Redditch local authority areas, in particular the advancement of education, protection of health, relief of poverty, distress and sickness.

### Significant Activities

Bromsgrove and Redditch Network (BARN) is a network supporting volunteers, voluntary organisations and communities across Bromsgrove and Redditch. BARN is the local Council for Voluntary Service. We run the Volunteer Centre for Bromsgrove and Redditch and a range of local community projects. We represent the local voluntary sector, support local communities, and help with networking, information, funding and volunteering. Where we see a gap in provision we try to help through delivery or partnerships. BARN has been supporting local communities for over 25 years.

### Network support activities

BARN has a broad range of Bromsgrove, Redditch and countywide groups as members, more than 90 across the area. Network meetings have remained a popular way to support the sector by providing an opportunity for VCS colleagues to meet each other and share information. We continue using a hybrid model, allowing for both face to face and virtual participation. Introduced during the pandemic, this allows organisations that struggle to get to meetings to participate fully. BARN continues to run the **Community Workers' Lunch** in Redditch, a partnership with the Community Workers' Network, which provides an opportunity for frontline workers to meet and talk. BARN also runs **Community Workers Bromsgrove**, which continues to grow in popularity.

The **Funding Newsletter** continues to be extremely helpful to our members, and we provide a funding portal that is free for all local VCS. We were once again successful with funding applications that allowed us to offer a comprehensive range of training, tailored to the needs of voluntary and community groups across the area. We work in partnership with Bromsgrove and Redditch Councils to maintain the **Knowledge Bank**, a public directory of local VCS and statutory services. With Local Government reform directly impacting all the local councils, BARN has been key to ensuring the local VCS has a voice in the debate.

During the year BARN continued to work closely with other Councils for Voluntary Service and Volunteer Centres across Worcestershire to strengthen the voice of the grassroots VCS through Worcestershire Community Action Network (WeCAN) and share best practice. As Redditch is a non-constituent authority in the West Midlands Combined Authority we also talk to other CVs in the region representing the local voluntary sector to the Authority. We are also a key member of the new Worcestershire VCSE Alliance, a countywide network with a health and wellbeing focus.

### Volunteer Centre

We are the only accredited Volunteer Centre in Worcestershire, and were one of the first in the country to achieve the new standard. We continue to promote volunteering and help match volunteers with appropriate opportunities, and regularly attend community events to promote our work. Our Volunteer Managers' Forum offers a chance for volunteer managers to come together to share their experience and best practice.

We continued to develop projects to build on the experience of the Volunteer Centre. Our **Skills for Work** volunteering programme helps residents across Bromsgrove and Redditch use volunteering as a stepping stone into employment, boosting confidence, gaining experience, and learning new skills. We work closely with the Job Centres in both areas to help their clients use volunteering to improve their employability. Our **Live.Grow.Succeed.** project is designed to encourage more young people to volunteer, and its dedicated website [livegrowsucceed.org](http://livegrowsucceed.org) hosts young people's volunteering stories.

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### Community Activities

BURT (Bromsgrove Urban and Rural Transport) is a community transport minibus in Bromsgrove for those who can't get about on their own. Numbers continued to grow after the pandemic, with numbers approaching pre-COVID levels. The service remains popular, and a vital lifeline to our passengers.

BARN continued to deliver **Asset Based Community Development** in Redditch. The project employs community builders to support people to initiate and take ownership of activities in their communities, focused around the neighbourhoods of Abbeydale and Woodrow, and also supporting minority communities. The results of this programme are often unexpected, but hugely rewarding as the community takes control of its own projects.

**Reimagine Redditch**, a four year Arts Council England funded project in Redditch, began in April 2022. BARN is the fund holder for the project until March 2026. We employ the staff team, working closely with other members of the Consortium that run the project. In Bromsgrove we still host resources developed as part of the **Support Bromsgrove** partnership that came together as a result of COVID, and we offer a signposting and referral service for people in Bromsgrove and Redditch struggling because of cost of living pressures or other reasons. BARN also runs a number of grant schemes on behalf of funders, and from time to time holds money on behalf of VCS organisations that have no suitable account

This year was our last at Community House, our home for thirteen years. Previously a lively community hall and building, Redditch Borough Council is selling the site which meant BARN, like the other charities and community groups based there, had to search for a new home. In April 2025 we relocated to our temporary home at The REDI Centre, before a more permanent move later in the year. We're proud to say that, despite this, we maintained all our services without interruption.

The continued support from our dedicated partners and funders, including Redditch Borough Council, Bromsgrove District Council, and our local strategic partnerships, continued to be indispensable. BARN's core purposes remain advocating for and strengthening the voluntary and community sector across Bromsgrove and Redditch, and serving its communities. The successes of the past year, even amidst the significant challenge of relocating from Community House, are a testament to the hard work and dedication of our members, trustees, staff, and volunteers. We remain proud supporters of the essential difference our communities and VCS organisations make every day across Bromsgrove and Redditch.

### **Public benefit**

In setting the objectives, the trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular to its supplementary public benefit guidance on advancing education.

### **Achievements and performance**

#### **Financial review**

During the year the charity made a net deficit of £146,453 (2024 - net surplus of £121,182).

At the year end the charity had net assets of £303,350 (2024 - net assets of £449,803).

#### **Reserves policy**

The trustees consider that unrestricted reserves be held at a level approximately equal to between 1 and 3 months expenditure in order to be able to cover day to day running costs in the unlikely event that future incoming resources are either delayed or unduly cease.

### **Structure, governance and management**

#### **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document, its Memorandum and Articles of Association, and constitutes a private company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.



### TO THE TRUSTEES OF BROMSGROVE AND REDDITCH NETWORK

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I report to the Trustees on my examination of the financial statements of Bromsgrove And Redditch Network (the charity) for the year ended 31 March 2025.

#### Responsibilities and basis of report

As the Trustees of the charity (and also its directors for the purposes of company law), you are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

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

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

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### 1 Accounting policies

#### Charity information

Bromsgrove And Redditch Network is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is C/O Redi Centre, 54 South Street, Redditch, Worcestershire, B98 7DQ.

#### 1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as effective from 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

#### 1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

#### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### 1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

#### 1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### 1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Motor vehicles	25% reducing balance
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The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

### 1 Accounting policies

#### 1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

#### 1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

#### 1.9 Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### 1.10 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

### 2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

### 6 Other material income

During the year, the charity received funds of £1,691 on behalf of RCNT, £1,500 from MediServices Health on behalf of Headway and £300 from the Mental Health Action Group for Woodrow Community Corner. These funds are classed as managed funds by the charity and are held by Bromsgrove and Redditch Network, the balance in the remaining funds account at the year end is £22,857.

In the prior year the charity received funds of £13,465 from Worcestershire County Council, Worcestershire County Council's divisional funds and other donors, for running the Community Stories Scheme and for the activities of Bromsgrove Pride. The balance in the funds account at the year end was £22,192.

Both the income and the corresponding expenditure relating to managed grants has been excluded from the statement of financial activities.
