Storrington Community Partnership is a membership organisation of people working together to help improve and sustain Storrington and surrounding neighbourhoods for the benefit of local people.

All Trustees of the Partnership have signed the Charity Commission Trustee Eligibility Declaration confirming they adhere to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

The Partnership has the general aim of bringing together all who are interested in and committed to working to ensure a lively, lasting, and enriching future for our village and neighbouring communities.

Community Partnerships have the role of bringing together local individuals and groups in an inclusive way to develop and deliver community initiatives through an action plan.

Working alongside the statutory bodies and other local groups, Community Partnerships can:

- Bring together individuals and groups with a shared interest in their local area under a common action plan, planned and delivered together
- Deliver improvements to their local communities which may not happen in any other way
- Offer a community-based perspective in relation to local issues and concerns

Several Partnership volunteers provide administrative support to the Trustees. Partnership members work on the projects in furtherance of the objects of the Trust.

The Trustees have revised and approved relevant operational policies, including Health & Safety, First Aid, Safeguarding Vulnerable Adults for Projects, and Fire & Premises.

All administrative procedures are discussed with our volunteers. All may be inspected in the files in the Registered office, and are subjected to a regular compliance review by the Trustees.

**Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year****The Chairman's Report**

Storrington Community Website continues to be well used with 127,000 visits over the year, a growth of over 15% from the previous year. Website development is entirely carried out by Partnership volunteers under guidance of Andy Castle which allows us to be responsive and keep costs very low. The website is a victim of its own success as it takes up by far the greatest part of our available volunteer time. We now need to find additional non-technical help to deal with the at least 35 requests received each month with news posts, directory requests, new events and enquiries. The social media aspect has focussed on local Facebook groups with our own page steadily increasing to over 1,200 followers. The page focuses on news and events from local groups, along with posts that keep the community updated on key local issues.

The Parish Council and the Partnership are actively working to co-ordinate and integrate their individual websites. The primary goal is to reduce content duplication and establish seamless cross-linking between the two websites. This project has experienced significant delays due to recent staffing changes within the Parish Clerk's office, but it is coming back on track. A full review of the parish website and its current services is underway. This project remains a clear priority for both the Council and the Partnership and will be progressed as quickly as possible.

Our bank hosting service to help small and embryo groups within the village is currently being used by four groups: Speedwatch, STG, Community Fund (Wardens), High Street economy. We actively provide advice and support to the Storrington Business Network and the Storrington Traffic Group. Attending meetings and sending out relevant information to local businesses and the community.

In addition, the Storrington & Sullington Neighbourhood Wardens have initiated a number of social interactions for various groups in the village including summer fun days for children, regular meetings for older members of the community and are planning outings. To enable this we provide financial hosting, promote the events through the website and as a charity we help them apply for grants.

The delayed Storrington on Show event did go ahead in September 2024. A good cross section of the local organisations was represented, 23 in all, ranging from a youth group, conservation, environment, through to First Responders. 143 people were in attendance. Overwhelmingly the both the participants and visitors indicated that it was a worthwhile event and should be repeated. We believe 14 people signed up to various groups there and then with eleven groups collecting contact details. The Help Scheme as usual had a good response while the much-maligned Speedwatch gained a new member.

The one thing we have learnt is that we must ensure the organisations that wish to attend, help in the promotion by putting up posters, delivering flyers or sharing the event on social media.

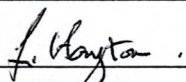

**Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year****The Chairman's Report**

The policy for providing a bank hosting service to small and embryo groups within the village is being reviewed because there is increasing demand for the service, and there is a requirement for on-going support in some cases. This facility is currently being used by two groups.

We provided advice and support to the newly formed Storrington Traffic Group.

Storrington Community Website continues to be well used with 127,000 visits over the year, a growth of over 15% from the previous year. Website development is entirely carried out by Partnership volunteers under guidance of Andy Castle which allows us to be responsive and keep costs very low. Following the major structural changes required last year to ensure that the website interfaced with the growing social media and communication systems we are now putting more attention into how we work with social media promoting local community driven news items and events. In addition, the residents page has been updated and now includes a number of the local issues such as the high volumes of traffic through the centre of Storrington and the subsequent pollution along with new housing developments and the Rampion 2 project.

The social media aspect has focussed on local Facebook groups with our own page dramatically increasing to over 1,000 followers. The page focuses on news and events from local groups, along with posts that keep the community updated on key local issues.

The vastly improved relationship between SCP and the Storrington and Sullington Parish Council has led to a request for Andy Castle to look at their website and provide recommendations with the intention of reducing duplication and the workload.

The SCP stand at the Storrington Queen's Platinum Jubilee event featured the Community Website, displaying screenshots and information. Invitations were distributed to local groups and businesses to encourage them to be included in the Website Directory. SCP are continuing to provide administrative support to the Storrington Business Network

Two newsletters were produced during the year providing updates on the activities of the Partnership and information relevant to our activities were sent to members and other interested parties. This could not have been done without Judy Palmer our editor.

Logistical issues meant that we were unable to hold a Storrington on Show, volunteer fair, in 2023 but did confirm the event, booking the venue, Chanctonbury Leisure Centre, for 21<sup>st</sup> September 2024.

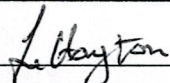

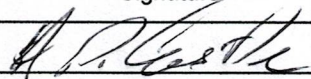

Two newsletters were produced during the year providing updates on the activities of the Partnership and information relevant to our activities were sent to members and other interested parties. This could not have been done without Judy Palmer our editor.

Storrington Community Website in 2022 received more than 110,000 visitors, a growth of over 50% from the previous year. Website development is entirely carried out by Partnership volunteers under guidance of Andy Castle which allows us to be responsive and keep costs very low. Navigation was improved, including a search facility on the News Pages. Contact Us is now a link on the top bar. There has been a major increase in news postings. The focus is now on events and news items that trigger FB involvement. FB followers is now around 950. The residents page has been reviewed, updated and additional information added.

The Partnership Policies and Procedures have all been reviewed, approved and reformatted.

Project Storrington, one of our Trustees, David Wright, a member of the action committee looking at local opportunities for young people to reduce anti-social behaviour, engage young people in positive activities and provide them with safe spaces. 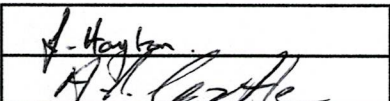

**Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year****The Chairman's Report**

The Community Partnership bank was HSBC but they introduced a £5 a month bank service charge which we simply could not afford. Urgent action was needed. Investigations showed that many of the newer more ethical banks did not offer banking services to community groups though the larger clearing banks still do. We wanted an ethical bank and after substantial research by our Treasurer we agreed that the best option would be to apply for a Community Directplus bank account with The Co-operative Bank. We have completed a lengthy online application form, and are dealing with various questions and requests from the Co-op for formal identification for several of the Trustees. We anticipate that we will complete the transfer early in the new financial year.

Three newsletters were produced during the year providing updates on the activities of the Partnership and information relevant to our activities were sent to members and other interested parties. This could not have been done without Judy Palmer our editor.

The Community Partnership helped and supported the summer 2021 launch of a new Sussex Wildlife Trust regional group covering Storrington and the Arun Valley region of the county. Supporting the aims and objectives of SWT will be core to the group's annual programme along with incorporating appropriate additional initiatives and priorities.

Storrington Community Website in 2021 received more than 73,000 visitors, a growth of over 20% from the previous year. Website development is entirely carried out by Partnership volunteers under guidance of Andy Castle which allows us to be responsive and keep costs very low. Last year it was identified that major structural changes were required in order to ensure that the website can interface with the growing social media and communication systems. There were about 20 separate steps in the rebuild. After months of preparation the major ones were implemented at the beginning of June 2021 and, except for 4 hours one morning when the major transition was done, the website has been up and available for use throughout. We are now putting more attention into how we work with social media promoting local community driven news items and events.

The Partnership are actively supporting Project Storrington, one of our Trustees, David Wright, is a member of the action committee who are looking at local opportunities for young people to reduce anti-social behaviour, engage young people in positive activities and provide them with safe spaces. An audit of all the current groups and activities has been compiled to provide a baseline, and to highlight what needs expanding or improving, and where there are gaps. We will be actively promoting opportunities through the Community website and the associated social media.

Storrington on Show 2021 took place in October at the Chanctonbury Leisure Centre. There were twenty-one exhibitors who were keen to recruit having lost volunteers over the previous 18 months. Our questionnaires to visitors and exhibitors showed that two thirds of the visitor felt encouraged to join organisations and also tell others about what they had learnt, along with 31 were new membership sign-ups at the event.

The Partnership continues to provide administrative support to the Storrington Business Owners Club and ensured that they were informed of all the assistance available from local government. We are heavily involved in the footfall monitoring project, reviewing the data produced along with the structural information used before providing reports to the local businesses.

For the financial year 2021/2022 Horsham District Council changed the way it offered ECD Grants to an initial £500 for operational funding to all the Community Partnerships within the district with a further £800 on application for specific activities or projects.

Our 2021 AGM was able to be held in person at the Storrington Village Hall with a good turnout. Our speaker was Jodie Davies from the Life Community Church who talked about the Development of the Storrington Village Hub that aims to provide a meeting place and activities for all parts of the community.

Finally, I would like to thank all my fellow trustees, and the other members of the Partnership, who have worked to sustain and develop the activities of the Partnership this past year.

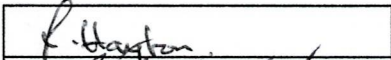

Storrington Community Partnership is a membership organisation of people working together to help improve and sustain Storrington and surrounding neighbourhoods for the benefit of local people.

All Trustees of the Partnership have signed the Charity Commission Trustee Eligibility Declaration confirming they adhere to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

The Partnership has the general aim of bringing together all who are interested in and committed to working to ensure a lively, lasting, and enriching future for our village and neighbouring communities.

Community Partnerships have the role of bringing together local individuals and groups in an inclusive way to develop and deliver community initiatives through an action plan.

Working alongside the statutory bodies and other local groups, Community Partnerships can:

- Bring together individuals and groups with a shared interest in their local area under a common action plan, planned and delivered together
- Deliver improvements to their local communities which may not happen in any other way
- Offer a community-based perspective in relation to local issues and concerns
- Raise funds for their local area from charitable and other sources unavailable to statutory bodies

The Trustees manage the affairs of the Charity and direct the work of the Partnership to address identified concerns and needs of those who live and work in the community. Several Partnership volunteers provide administrative support to the Trustees. Partnership members work on the projects in furtherance of the objects of the Trust.

The Trustees have revised and approved relevant operational policies, including Health & Safety, First Aid, Safeguarding Vulnerable Adults for Projects, and Fire & Premises.

All administrative procedures are discussed with our volunteers. All may be inspected in the files in the Registered office, and are subjected to a regular compliance review by the Trustees.

**Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year**

**The Chairman's Report**

The one thing we could not escape from was how the corona virus (SARS-CoV-2) and the disease Covid-19 affected every part of lives, primarily our social interactions. Even so, the Trustees have been busier than ever.

The Charity Commission confirmed our change of status from Limited Company to Charitable Incorporated Organisation on 7th April 2020 (almost 4 months after submitting the application). Although COVID-19 caused the application to be briefly put on hold, we are immensely grateful to the Charity Commission for helping to conclude the conversion at such a difficult time.

In late March, at the initiative of Horsham District Council, we facilitated the Neighbourhood Wardens in setting up the Community Support Hub to provide vulnerable people with a shopping and medication collection and delivery service, and regular friendly phone calls during the lockdown periods. We provided Community Partnership computer hardware, and set up computer software along with email accounts for communicating between the Hub and the volunteers with procedures to record calls and actions taking into account GDPR (General Data Protection Regulation) guidelines. We also co-ordinated with the Minibus Association and Horsham Matters to respond to specific requests and managed the Hub donations that, along with vouchers from Waitrose, were channelled to residents in need via Horsham Matters food bank.

The Partnership had a great response to requests for Scrubs Bags and provided several hundred scrubs bags to local hospital doctors and nursing staff.

We adapted the Storrington Community website and our use of social media quite significantly to show

- a) how to get help for those isolated with no other support network
- b) how to volunteer to help vulnerable people during the pandemic
- c) useful information for people in lock-down including local home delivery services
- d) general guidance from the government, NHS etc.

Restrictions meant that it was necessary to reschedule our third Storrington on Show volunteer fair originally advertised for May 2020 but ultimately delayed until 2021.

Three newsletters were produced during the year providing updates on the activities of the Partnership and information relevant to our activities were sent to members and other interested parties. This could not have been done without Judy Palmer our editor.

The "Heritage Trail" project under the umbrella of the Horsham Rural Towns' Partnership Forum, of which our partnership is one of six members, funded by The National Lottery achieved its primary objectives.

Two of our Trustees, Martin Breese and Bernie Iles, were actively involved in the project to discover and help promote the region's history and heritage by the refurbishment of ailing Blue Plaques and developing trails exploring its towns, villages and countryside. Trail Leaflets are available for distribution and online.

Technological development means that many websites have gradually

become outdated and inefficient. The Community website has now reached the point where it will benefit from an upgrade. Under the guidance of Andy Castle with assistance from Martin Breese and Louise Hayton, the major structural changes required in order to ensure that the website can interface with the growing social media and communication systems is underway.

The Community Partnership decided it was in Storrington's interest to look into the West Sussex County Council redesign of the Early Help Service and brought together a group of people from Storrington organisations and individuals interested in services for children and young people to provide a coordinated response.

The Partnership continues to provide administrative support to the Storrington Business Club and ensured that they were informed of all the assistance available from local government during the Covid-19 crises. We are heavily involved in the replacement footfall monitoring project, initially reviewing the data produced along with the structural information used, before providing reports to the local businesses.

For the financial year 2020/2021 Horsham District Council changed the way it offers ECD Grants of £1,000 for operational funding to all the Community Partnerships within the district and this meant SCP did receive the grant.

Finally, I would like to thank all my fellow trustees, and the other members of the Partnership, who have worked to sustain and develop the activities of the Partnership this past year.

For this reason, it is prudent to keep 5 years running costs in reserve.

In addition, there are potential costs for replacement or repair of equipment and unpredicted acquisition of new equipment. It is prudent to keep sufficient funds in reserve to be able to replace this equipment and acquire such equipment which may be necessary for its on-going activities in future.

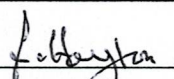

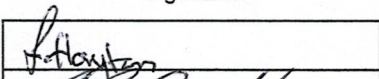
