TRUSTEES' REPORT for the year ended 31 December 2024

The Trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES & ACTIVITIES

The Objects of the Trust are to raise and receive monetary and non-monetary donations to help high risk children, with particular focus to support the work of Children's Vision International Incorporated in Bogota, Colombia, South America.

The aims of the trust are to provide support in furthering the following objects ("the objects") for the benefit of children, in particular but not exclusively those residing temporarily or permanently in Bogota, Colombia:

- (a) The relief of sickness and the preservation and protection of health of children and/or their families, including by assisting in the provision of medicines, clinics and healthcare workers;
- (b) The relief of financial hardship by making grants of money for providing or paying for items, services or facilities such as food, clothing and bedding;
- (c) The advancement of the education, including by providing and assisting in the provision of facilities, equipment and teachers;
- (d) To help homeless and orphaned children by providing funding for accommodation, carers and running orphanages;
- (e) To provide for the relief of children who are sick or disadvantaged by reason of their social or economic circumstances by the provision of holidays, outings and other recreational and leisure activities provided in the interests of social welfare and designed to improve their conditions of life.

During the year under review, donations amounting to £199,981 (2023 - £153,747), were made to Children's Vision International Inc., (CVII) in Bogota, Colombia and a further £9,600, (2023 - £9,600), was paid in support fees to the Richard D. Sanderson in his role as General Director in Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland

Public benefit

The Charity Commission has set out general principles to be used in assessing the public benefit of UK charities. To ensure it meets these principles, the Trust must be able to demonstrate that its work benefits the public or a section of the public, that people on low incomes are able to benefit, and that any private benefit is incidental. In exercising their powers and duties, the trustees have given due consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Review of Charitable Activities

The Trustees consider that the performance of the trust in its testimony within Colombia and beyond to have been satisfactory again this year as the impact of the work amongst children and their families has been maintained and further enhanced. The trustees wish to place on record their grateful thanks to all who have so faithfully supported the work of the charity throughout the year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Position

The accounts for the year ended 31st December 2024 are presented to comply, as far as possible, with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Total expenditure including donations amounted to **£215,576** compared to **£170,956** in 2023 which meant that the net deficit for the year amounted to **£35,025** compared to a net surplus of **£12,531** in 2023.

At 31st December 2024, the reserves of the charity amounted to **£12,820** (2023 - **£47,845**)

Principal Funding Sources

New Hope for Children's principal sources of funds are from many and varied churches, groups, and individuals and during the year amounted to **£180,551** (with applicable tax refunds from recoverable gift aid) (2023 - **£183,487**)

New Hope for Children achieved its objectives in terms of supporting to the maximum level possible the work of Children's Vision in Bogota, Colombia.

Total costs incurred accounted for **3.32%** of our income.

The Main Activities for the Year

During 2024 New Hope for Children has been able to support Children's Vision, Bogota through grants to support the following aspects which were of public benefit to the children and adults in Colombia supported by the foundation. In undertaking these activities, the trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit:

1. **The relief of poverty and the provision of a home** – Supporting the provision of four established children's homes for children in high-risk situations. To break the immediate effects of poverty through helping provide (and develop) a home, food and caring staff, clothing, protection and support. (Approx. 110 children helped constantly throughout the year). Richard Sanderson was provided with support fees both for his work as General Director in Bogota, and also within the UK and Ireland as principal ambassador in raising awareness and financial support for the charity by giving talks and reports of the activities and impact of the work in Colombia.

2. **Providing an Education.** Supporting the provision of a school in Colombia. Helping make a provision for teaching staff, and therefore an education to break the cycle of poverty that has been seen in generations of the families of each child (Approx. 160 children helped continuously.) Education from nursery through to the end of High School. Specific grants were given towards further and higher education, benefitting four young adults in accordance with the donor's instructions.

Deuteronomy House Project. Funds were granted towards the purchase in August 2024, and remodelling of the fifth Children's Vision home called Deuteronomy House which will be completed during 2025. The house will provide a loving and caring home for approx. 25 boys between the ages of 7 to 12 years old. All will come from situations of extreme poverty.

Funds granted for sections 1 and 2: £186,571 (please note that this includes a provision for wages, utility bills and food that is shared between the homes and the school and also contributed towards caring for those who are sick through the provision of nurses). The total includes £9,087 in specific funds for Higher and Further Education Scholarships, in accordance with the donors wishes. £68,566 was granted for the purchase and remodelling of the new Deuteronomy House for boys. Also included, there was £70.00 granted to provide gifts for the students from 10th and 11th grade who completed the "Skills for the Workplace", and "Advanced Skills for the Workplace" courses. There was also a specific grant given towards art activities for £167.00 in accordance with the donors wish. In addition, support fees provided to Richard Sanderson were £9,600.

3. **The relief of poverty.** New Hope for Children gave grants for the purchase of food for the homes and school (noted in 1 & 2 above). This will have included food packs for the families of the children helped in Colombia, in addition to many other persons from situations of extreme poverty. Provision of transport through specific grants to help with petrol and diesel and vehicle maintenance costs. Transport was of benefit in providing logistical help for recreational, health and support activities. Also, for humanitarian aid brigades helping thousands of people. And the transport of building materials for the project reported in (1 & 2) above.

Funds granted for transport: £5,500

4. **The relief of poverty.** Specific grants were given for gifts for the children in accordance with donor instructions.

Funds granted: £450 for gifts for the children.

5. **Caring for those who are sick.** Helping to provide the nursing and Professional Support staff for the children (approx. 160 children intermittently throughout the year).

6. **IT Support.** Two specific grants were awarded in accordance with the donors wishes that helped several different areas of Children's Vision and indirectly is of public benefit. Good IT systems allow for the efficient use of staff time and is a vital support

for all the foundations administrative and educational procedures, also providing for the security of information.

Funds Granted: £6,500.00 total. Of this, £3,500.00 was for the purchase of a 1 year subscription to obligatory medical reporting software for the new medical unit, and the purchase of 4 new laptop computers on which the software was installed, also the purchase of a UPS power supply module and voltage protector for the school computer suite. *Please note that of this £1,175.00 of the funds relating to the laptop computers were redistributed with the donor's agreement to categories 1 and 2 as a different donor (not through New Hope for Children) had also given for the purchase of the same computers.* A second grant of £3,000.00 was given for improvements to the school, homes and Blessings Building internet systems, allowing for the purchase of cloud gateway control units, faster internet switches, and the rewiring of the internet system between properties. This allowed for the reduction in internet service provider bills and the improvement of cybersecurity.

- 7. UK Volunteers.** Two teams of volunteers visited from the UK to Children's Vision in Bogota. The first was to guide and teach the "Skills for the Workplace" and "Advanced Skills for the Workplace" courses. The second was a volunteer electrical team who rewired the new Deuteronomy House for boys. In accordance with the donors wishes, funds were granted for the food and lodging costs for these volunteers.
Funds Granted: £960,00

The total of funds granted for the public benefit from New Hope for Children to Children's Vision in Bogota during 2024 was £199,981.

Strategies of the Trust

All grants were given in accordance to the instructions of the donors and within the aims and objectives set out in the governing document.

New Hope for Children raises through its donors 100% of the funds for the grants it gives and does not receive funds from any type of social investment programme.

We would like to thank all of the volunteers who have helped raise support and awareness in many areas of the UK – mainly in Southern and Northeastern England, Northern Ireland, the Midlands and Scotland, including organising and/or publicising fundraising events, opening opportunities and invitations for presentations and in general raising awareness of the work in Colombia. As these people are groups and individuals from other organisations, it is not possible to provide an accurate calculation of the time and resources invested by each person/group.

To thank those who have supported our work as volunteers in the UK, in terms of offering help with activities such as printing information, copying of promotional videos, promoting the work on social media platforms, IT support, organising speaking opportunities and for the

work of the trustees in running New Hope for Children. The number of hours invested would be approximately 65 hours per month.

In addition, to recognise the help of all those who volunteered at Children's Vision International Inc. in Bogota through New Hope for Children. During 2024 this totalled 4 people who visited for 5 days and 4 people who visited for 14 days.

New Hope for Children's principal sources of funds are from many and varied churches, groups, and individuals. New Hope has maintained its digital options for those who wish to obtain updates of the charities work in that way.

Significance of Achievements

During 2024 New Hope for Children has been able to support Children's Vision, Bogota through grants to support the following aspects which were of public benefit mainly to the children and in some part to adults in Colombia supported by the foundation:

1. Children's Homes. Providing grants for wages towards well trained care staff working in the homes. To provide a caring Christian family environment where children have stability, love and professional support. They are helped to overcome their family difficulties and receive healing to both physical and emotional hurts. To develop into stable adults who know that they have the support of a family.
2. Humanitarian Aid - Support also for the humanitarian aid programme where thousands of needy families are helped with donations of clothes, shoes, baby packs, blankets and many other articles. Approximately 1,800 families helped during 2024.
3. Education. Providing grants towards wages for well trained teachers working in the school. To help each child develop the knowledge and skills that will help break the cycle of poverty in generations of their families. To enable each child to have a stable future and prepare them for life as a responsible adult. Specific grants were given towards higher education, benefitting four young adults in accordance with the donor's instructions.
4. Hunger Relief. Helping provide 900 meals and snacks a day to children that were suffering from malnutrition. To provide good nutrition which is reflected in the growth of each child, good healthy defences against illness and the best possibility to function well and optimise their learning. In addition, the provision of food to give hunger relief to needy mountain communities.
5. Medical Care. Provision of a nurse for the medical care of the Children's Vision children, and the obligatory approved software needed for the new medical unit.
6. Deuteronomy House. Funds granted towards the construction and remodeling of Children's Vision's 5th children's home. A special house for boys between the ages

of 7 to 12. They will have the opportunity to grow up in a safe, caring and loving home where all their basic needs and much more will be provided for.

7. Utilities. Gas, Water, Electric, Telephone. Helping provide the basic needs for four children's homes and a school.
8. Transport and Vehicles. Grants for transportation costs. The vehicles are used for the transportation of the children for medical appointments, outings and educational purposes. Also, used for the transportation of donations that helped over 1,800 families around the city and beyond within the territory of Colombia. In addition, for the transportation of building materials purchased for the building project mentioned in (6).
9. IT improvements. Two grants for the significant improvement of the internet and IT infrastructure in the school, five children's homes and Blessings Building.
10. Gifts. Individual gifts made by sponsors for their sponsored children.

Investment policy and performance

The trustees choose to retain all surplus funds in liquid form as cash at bank and to not make any longer-term investments to facilitate the easy transfer of needed funds to Bogota.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees recognise the need to establish and maintain a level of reserves that enables financial stability, that meets the requirements of working capital and cushions against fluctuations of income levels and in the financial performance of the Trust. At 31st December 2024, the reserves of the charity amounted to **£12,820** (2023 - **£47845**), although this reserve includes specific grants awaiting allocation. The charity was unable to maintain the same reserve levels of 2023 due to the increased pressure to provide for the needs of the Children's Vision population, and the building purchase and remodeling. The trustees hope that some amount of reserves can be recovered in 2025. The trustees have no uncertainties in regard to the charity not continuing as a going concern.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Charity was formed under a Trust Deed dated 2nd April 2008 and is governed by that Trust Deed. The charity is constituted as an unincorporated charity.

Recruitment & Appointment of Trustees

Mr Richard D Sanderson and Miss Margaret R. Swift were founder trustees and the remainder of trustees were appointed by resolution of the trustees. Any future trustees will be appointed by resolution of the trustees.

Induction and Training of Trustees

The process of induction and training of any new Trustees would be under the personal guidance and supervision of the existing Trustees. At the time of induction, each trustee accepts and adopts the relevant trustee protocols

Organisational Structure and How Decisions are Made

The governance of the charity is by regular trustee meetings of which a minimum of two are held each year. The day to day administration within the UK is undertaken by Mrs Christine M. Hodgson who acts as the charity Co-ordinator and Mr. David Hodgson who acts as Treasurer. Mr Richard D Sanderson, in addition to his role as trustee, acts as the General Director in Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland.

Related Parties

The administration of the Trust is undertaken autonomously, although it works in support of the activities of Children's Vision International Inc, (CVII) which owns children's homes and a school in Bogota, Colombia.

Risk Assessment

The Trustees recognise their responsibilities and are committed to minimise all the risks that the Trust may face. The major risks to which the charity is exposed are identified by the Trustees in terms of both probability and potential risk and are reviewed regularly together with systems and procedures to manage those risks.

The major risk of the Trust is that of ensuring that there is a continued flow of incoming funds to continue to support the commitments of the charity in providing finance to help high risk children with particular focus on the work of CVII in Colombia.


- 1) select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;



NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

Note 1. – ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) “Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) effective 1 January 2015”, Financial Reporting Standard 102 “The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland” and the Charities Act 2011 and 2022. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

(b) Income recognition

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received, and the income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations are recognised when the charity has received the donation, or the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statements of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and applicable UK Accounting Standards and the Charities Act 2011 and 2022.

(c) Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings and aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributable to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

(d) Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities

(e) Realised gains and losses

There has been no realised gains or losses on investments during the year.

During the year under review, donations amounting to **£153,747** (2022 - *£141,981*), were made to Children's Vision International Inc., (CVII) in Bogota, Colombia and a further **£9,600**, (2022 - *£9,600*), was paid in support fees to the Richard D. Sanderson in his role as General Director in Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland

Public benefit

The Charity Commission has set out general principles to be used in assessing the public benefit of UK charities. To ensure it meets these principles, the Trust must be able to demonstrate that its work benefits the public or a section of the public, that people on low incomes are able to benefit, and that any private benefit is incidental. ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Review of Charitable Activities

The Trustees consider that the performance of the trust in its testimony within Colombia and beyond to have been satisfactory again this year as the impact of the work amongst children and their families has been maintained and further enhanced. The trustees wish to place on record their grateful thanks to all who have so faithfully supported the work of the charity throughout the year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Position

The accounts for the year ended 31st December 2023 are presented to comply, as far as possible, with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Total expenditure including donations amounted to **£170,956** compared to **£157,285** in 2022 which meant that the net surplus for the year amounted to **£12,531** compared to a net deficit of **£21,588** in 2022.

At 31st December 2023, the reserves of the charity amounted to **£47,845** (2022 - **£35,314**)

Principal Funding Sources

New Hope for Children's principal sources of funds are from many and varied churches, groups, and individuals and during the year amounted to **£183,487** (with applicable tax refunds from recoverable gift aid) (2022 - **£135,696**)

New Hope for Children achieved its objectives in terms of supporting to the maximum level possible the work of Children's Vision in Bogota, Colombia.

Total costs incurred accounted for **4.15%** of our income.

The Main Activities for the Year

During 2023 New Hope for Children has been able to support Children's Vision, Bogota through grants to support the following aspects which were of public benefit to the children and adults in Colombia supported by the foundation. In undertaking these activities the trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit:

1. **The relief of poverty and the provision of a home** – Supporting the provision of four established children's homes for children in high-risk situations. To break the immediate effects of poverty through helping provide (and develop) a home, food and caring staff, clothing, protection and support. (Approx. 111 children helped constantly throughout the year). Richard Sanderson was provided with support fees both for his work as General Director in Bogota, and also within the UK and Ireland as principal ambassador in raising awareness and financial support for the charity by giving talks and reports of the activities and impact of the work in Colombia.

2. **Providing an Education.** Supporting the provision of a school in Colombia. Helping make a provision for teaching staff, and therefore an education to break the cycle of poverty that has been seen in generations of the families of each child (Approx. 185 children helped continuously.) Education from nursery through to the end of High School. Specific grants were given towards further and higher education, benefitting three young adults in accordance with the donor's instructions. Please note that these three mentioned changed during the year as some graduated.

Special Educational Project. Funds were granted for the extension of the upstairs of the Children's Vision Garage/Maintenance building. This allowed for the space needed to relocate the Electrical and Carpentry workshops. This is of great value to the young adults who will be able to continue their formation with these important life skills.

Funds granted for sections 1 and 2: £146,490 (please note that this includes a provision for wages, utility bills and food that is shared between the homes and the school, and also contributed towards caring for those who are sick through the provision of nurses). The total includes £3,756 specific funds for Higher and Further Education Scholarships, in accordance with the donors wishes. £12,650 was granted for the building extension and relocation of the Electrical and Carpentry workshops. Also included, there was £2,359 granted to provide for a teacher/translator to teach an educational course for the 10th and 11th grade high school classes entitled "Skills for the Workplace", and "Advanced Skills for the Workplace." From these funds the students were awarded relevant gifts in relation to their achievements on the course. In addition, support fees provided to Richard Sanderson were £9,600.

3. **The relief of poverty.** New Hope for Children gave grants for the purchase of food for the homes and school (noted in 1 & 2 above). This will have included food packs for the families of the children helped in Colombia, in addition to many other persons from situations of extreme poverty. Provision of transport through specific grants to help with petrol and diesel and vehicle maintenance costs. Transport was of benefit in providing logistical help for recreational, health and support activities. Also, for humanitarian aid brigades helping thousands of people. And the transport of building materials for the project reported in (1 & 2) above.

Funds granted for transport: £6,000

4. **The relief of poverty.** Specific grants were given for gifts for the children in accordance to donor instructions.

Funds granted: £395 for gifts for the children.

5. **Caring for those who are sick.** Helping to provide the nursing and Professional Support staff for the children (approx. 185 children intermittently throughout the year).

Funds granted: Please read "Funds granted" sections for 1 and 2 above.

6. **UK Volunteers.** A team of volunteers visited from the UK to Children's Vision in Bogota to guide and teach the "Skills for the Workplace" and "Advanced Skills for the Workplace" courses. In accordance with the donors wishes, funds were granted for the food and lodging costs for these volunteers.

Funds Granted: £862,00

The total of funds granted for the public benefit from New Hope for Children to Children's Vision in Bogota during 2023 was £153,747.

Special Building Project. During 2023, New Hope for Children has received funds to the total of **£41,905** which will be granted to Children's Vision in Bogota, Colombia during 2024 for the purchase of the "Deuteronomy House." This will be Children's Vision's 5th children's home in Bogota. The home will provide a safe and loving place to live from Monday to Friday for approx. 25 boys between the ages of 5 to 13 years old. These children come from very poor and vulnerable families. The initial property purchase will take place during the first 6 months of 2024 with a further 6-month period for remodelling. This will be the culmination of the original vision of the founder of Children's Vision to have 5 homes, a school and a medical unit. These funds are reflected in the accounts as "Restricted Funds" in addition to funds for the Higher Education Grants that will also be transferred to Bogota during 2024. Part of these funds were raised due to the incentive given by a specific UK donor who offered a Matching Grant.

Strategies of the Trust

All grants were given in accordance to the instructions of the donors and within the aims and objectives set out in the governing document.

New Hope for Children raises through its donors 100% of the funds for the grants it gives and does not receive funds from any type of social investment programme.

We would like to thank all of the volunteers who have helped raise support and awareness in many areas of the UK – mainly in Southern and North Eastern England, Northern Ireland, the Midlands and Scotland, including organising and/or publicising fundraising events, opening opportunities and invitations for presentations and in general raising awareness of the work in Colombia. As these people are groups and individuals from other organisations, it is not possible to provide an accurate calculation of the time and resources invested by each person/group.

To thank those who have supported our work as volunteers in the UK, in terms of offering help with activities such as printing information, copying of promotional videos, promoting the work on social media platforms, organising speaking opportunities and for the work of the trustees in running New Hope for Children. The number of hours invested would be approximately 65 hours per month.

In addition, to recognise the help of all those who volunteered at Children's Vision International Inc. in Bogota through New Hope for Children. During 2023 this totalled 3 people who visited for 7 days.

New Hope for Children's principal sources of funds are from many and varied churches, groups, and individuals. New Hope has maintained its digital options for those who wish to obtain updates of the charities work in that way.

Significance of Achievements

During 2023 New Hope for Children has been able to support Children's Vision, Bogota through grants to support the following aspects which were of public benefit mainly to the children and in some part to adults in Colombia supported by the foundation:

1. Children's Homes. Providing grants for wages towards well trained care staff working in the homes. To provide a caring Christian family environment where children have stability, love and professional support. They are helped to overcome their family difficulties and receive healing to both physical and emotional hurts. To develop into stable adults who know that they have the support of a family.
2. Humanitarian Aid - Support also for the humanitarian aid programme where thousands of needy families are helped with donations of clothes, shoes, baby packs, blankets and many other articles. Approximately 2,500 families helped during 2023.
3. Education. Providing grants towards wages for well trained teachers working in the school. To help each child develop the knowledge and skills that will help break the cycle of poverty in generations of their families. To enable each child to have a stable future and prepare them for life as a responsible adult. Specific grants were given towards higher education, benefitting three young adults in accordance with the donor's instructions.
4. Hunger Relief. Helping provide 1000 meals and snacks a day to children that were suffering from malnutrition. To provide good nutrition which is reflected in the growth of each child, good healthy defences against illness and the best possibility to function well and optimise their learning. In addition, the provision of food to give hunger relief to needy mountain communities.
5. Medical Care. Provision of a nurse for the medical care of the Children's Vision children.
6. Maintenance/Construction. Funds granted for the extension of the upstairs of the Children's Vision Garage/Maintenance building. This allowed for the space needed to relocate the Electrical and Carpentry workshops. In addition, other important maintenance projects.

7. Utilities. Gas, Water, Electric, Telephone. Helping provide the basic needs for four children's homes and a school.
8. Transport and Vehicles. Grants for transportation costs. The vehicles are used for the transportation of the children for Medical appointments, outings and educational purposes. Also, used for the transportation of donations that helped over 2,500 families around the city and beyond within the territory of Colombia. In addition, for the transportation of building materials purchased for the building project mentioned in (6).
9. Gifts. Individual gifts made by sponsors for their sponsored children.

Investment policy and performance

The trustees choose to retain all surplus funds in liquid form as cash at bank and do not make any longer term investments to facilitate the easy transfer of needed funds to Bogota.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees recognise the need to establish and maintain a level of reserves that enables financial stability, that meets the requirements of working capital and cushions against fluctuations of income levels and in the financial performance of the Trust. At 31st December 2023, the reserves of the charity amounted to **£47,845** (2022 - £35,314), although this reserve includes specific grants awaiting allocation. The charity has made effort to maintain its reserve levels, safeguarding in terms of continuance. The trustees have no uncertainties in regard to the charity not continuing as a going concern.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Charity was formed under a Trust Deed dated 2nd April 2008 and is governed by that Trust Deed. The charity is constituted as an unincorporated charity.

Recruitment & Appointment of Trustees

Mr Richard D Sanderson and Miss Margaret R. Swift were founder trustees and the remainder of trustees were appointed by resolution of the trustees. Any future trustees will be appointed by resolution of the trustees.

Induction and Training of Trustees

The process of induction and training of any new Trustees would be under the personal guidance and supervision of the existing Trustees. At the time of induction, each trustee accepts and adopts the relevant trustee protocols

Organisational Structure and How Decisions are Made

The governance of the charity is by regular trustee meetings of which a minimum of two are held each year. The day to day administration within the UK is undertaken by Mrs Christine M. Hodgson who acts as the charity Co-ordinator and Mr. David Hodgson who acts as Treasurer. Mr Richard D Sanderson, in addition to his role as trustee, acts as the General Director in

Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland.

Related Parties

The administration of the Trust is undertaken autonomously, although it works in support of the activities of Children's Vision International Inc, (CVII) which owns children's homes and a school in Bogota, Colombia.

Risk Assessment

The Trustees recognise their responsibilities and are committed to minimise all the risks that the Trust may face. The major risks to which the charity is exposed are identified by the Trustees in terms of both probability and potential risk and are reviewed regularly together with systems and procedures to manage those risks.

The major risk of the Trust is that of ensuring that there is a continued flow of incoming funds to continue to support the commitments of the charity in providing finance to help high risk children with particular focus on the work of CVII in Colombia.





New Hope for Children achieved its objectives in terms of supporting to the maximum level possible the work of Children's Vision in Bogota, Colombia.

Total costs incurred accounted for **4.20%** of our income.

The Main Activities for the Year

During 2022 New Hope for Children has been able to support Children's Vision, Bogota through grants to support the following aspects which were of public benefit to the children and adults in Colombia supported by the foundation. In undertaking these activities the trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit:

1. **The relief of poverty and the provision of a home** – Supporting the provision of four established children's homes for children in High Risk situations. To break the immediate effects of poverty through helping provide (and develop) a home, food and caring staff, clothing, protection and support. (Approx. 90 children helped constantly throughout the year). Richard Sanderson was provided with support fees both for his work as General Director in Bogota, and also within the UK and Ireland as principal ambassador in raising awareness and financial support for the charity by giving talks and reports of the activities and impact of the work in Colombia.

2. **Providing an Education.** Supporting the provision of a school in Colombia. Helping make a provision for teaching staff, and therefore an education to break the cycle of poverty that has been seen in generations of the families of each child (Approx. 160 children helped continuously.) Education from nursery through to the end of High School. Specific grants were given towards further and higher education, benefitting five young adults in accordance to the donor's instructions. Please note that these five mentioned changed during the year as some graduated and others began to benefit from the funds.

Funds granted for sections 1 and 2: £129,214 (please note that this includes a provision for wages, utility bills and food that is shared between the homes and the school, and also contributed towards caring for those who are sick through the provision of nurses). The total includes £4,293.00 specific funds for Higher and Further Education Scholarships, in accordance to the donors wishes. Also included, there was £20,000,00 granted to provide for electrical and communications installations in the new "Blessings Building," the purchase and installation of a new security camera system in the school, the labour, purchase and installation of a new front face for the Exodus House, the netting for the new synthetic sports area and other important maintenance projects. In addition, support fees provided to Richard Sanderson were £9,600.

3. **The relief of poverty.** New Hope for Children gave grants for the purchase of food for the homes and school (noted in 1 & 2 above). This will have included food packs for the families of the children helped in Colombia, in addition to many other persons from situations of extreme poverty. Provision of transport through specific grants to help with petrol and diesel and vehicle maintenance costs. Transport was of benefit in providing logistical help for recreational, health and support activities. Also, for humanitarian aid brigades helping thousands of people. And the transport of building materials for the project reported in (1 & 2) above.

Funds granted for transport: £6,000

4. **The relief of poverty.** Specific grants were given for gifts for the children in accordance to donor instructions.

Funds granted: £767 for gifts for the children.

5. **Caring for those who are sick.** Helping to provide the nursing and Technical Team staff for the children (approx. 160 children intermittently throughout the year).

Funds granted:

Please read "Funds granted" sections for 1 and 2 above.

6. **I.T Equipment.** A specific grant was given for I.T equipment for the purchase of a NAS memory system. This was to provide an information back-up of the children's and foundation's most important documentation.

Funds Granted: £5,000,00

7. **Container:** A contribution towards the nationalisation costs of a Literature donation container.

Funds Granted: £1.000,00

The total of funds granted for the public benefit from New Hope for Children to Children's Vision in Bogota during 2022 was £141,981.

Strategies of the Trust

All grants were given in accordance to the instructions of the donors and within the aims and objectives set out in the governing document.

New Hope for Children raises through its donors 100% of the funds for the grants it gives and does not receive funds from any type of social investment programme.

We would like to thank all of the volunteers who have helped raise support and awareness in many areas of the UK – mainly in Southern and North Eastern England, Northern Ireland, the Midlands and Scotland, including organising and/or publicising fundraising events, opening opportunities and invitations for presentations and in general raising awareness of the work in Colombia. As these people are groups and individuals from other organisations, it is not possible to provide an accurate calculation of the time and resources invested by each person/group.

To thank those who have supported our work in terms of offering help with activities such as printing information, copying of promotional DVDs, and for the work of the trustees in running New Hope for Children. The number of hours invested would be approximately 60 hours per month.

In addition, to recognise the help of all those who learned of Children's Vision International Inc. in Bogota through New Hope for Children. During 2022 this totalled 3 people who visited for 10 days.

New Hope for Children's principal sources of funds are from many and varied churches, groups, and individuals. It was good to return to in-person presentations which are gradually and steadily recovering towards pre-pandemic levels. New Hope has maintained its digital options for those who wish to obtain updates of the charities work in that way.

Significance of Achievements

During 2022 New Hope for Children has been able to support Children's Vision, Bogota through grants to support the following aspects which were of public benefit mainly to the children and in some part to adults in Colombia supported by the foundation:

1. Children's Homes. Providing grants for wages towards well trained care staff working in the homes. To provide a caring Christian family environment where children have stability, love and professional support. They are helped to overcome their family difficulties and receive healing to both physical and emotional hurts. To develop into stable adults who know that they have the support of a family.

2. Humanitarian Aid - Support also for the humanitarian aid programme where thousands of needy families are helped with donations of clothes, shoes, baby packs, blankets and many other articles. Approximately 5,000 families helped during 2022.
3. Education. Providing grants towards wages for well trained teachers working in the school. To help each child develop the knowledge and skills that will help break the cycle of poverty in generations of their families. To enable each child to have a stable future and prepare them for life as a responsible adult. Specific grants were given towards higher education, benefitting five young adults in accordance to the donor's instructions.
4. Hunger Relief. Helping provide 600 meals a day and also snacks to children that were suffering from malnutrition. To provide good nutrition which is reflected in the growth of each child, good healthy defences against illness and the best possibility to function well and optimise their learning. In addition, the provision of food to give hunger relief to needy mountain communities.
5. Medical Care. Provision of a nurse for the medical care of the Children's Vision children.
6. Maintenance/Construction. Grants for electrical and communications installations in the new "Blessings Building," the purchase and installation of a new security camera system in the school, the labour, purchase and installation of a new front face for the Exodus House, the netting for the new synthetic sports area and other important maintenance projects.
7. Utilities. Gas, Water, Electric, Telephone. Helping provide the basic needs for four children's homes and a school.
8. Transport and Vehicles. Grants for transportation costs. The vehicles are used for the transportation of the children for Medical appointments, outings and educational purposes. Also, used for the transportation of donations that helped over 5,000 families around the city and beyond within the territory of Colombia. In addition, for the transportation of building materials purchased for the building project mentioned in (6).
9. Gifts. Individual gifts made by sponsors for their sponsored children.

Investment policy and performance

The trustees choose to retain all surplus funds in liquid form as cash at bank and do not make any longer term investments to facilitate the easy transfer of needed funds to Bogota.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees recognise the need to establish and maintain a level of reserves that enables financial stability, that meets the requirements of working capital and cushions against fluctuations of income levels and in the financial performance of the Trust. At 31st December 2022, the reserves of the charity amounted to **£35,314** (2021 - **£56,902**), although this reserve

includes some specific grants awaiting allocation. The charity has made effort to maintain its reserve levels, safeguarding in terms of continuance. The trustees have no uncertainties in regard to the charity not continuing as a going concern.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Charity was formed under a Trust Deed dated 2nd April 2008 and is governed by that Trust Deed. The charity is constituted as an unincorporated charity

Recruitment & Appointment of Trustees

Mr Richard D Sanderson and Miss Margaret R. Swift were founder trustees and the remainder of trustees were appointed by resolution of the trustees. Any future trustees will be appointed by resolution of the trustees.

Induction and Training of Trustees

The process of induction and training of any new Trustees would be under the personal guidance and supervision of the existing Trustees. At the time of induction, each trustee accepts and adopts the relevant trustee protocols

Organisational Structure and How Decisions are Made

The governance of the charity is by regular trustee meetings of which a minimum of two are held each year. The day to day administration within the UK is undertaken by Mrs Christine M. Hodgson who acts as the charity Co-ordinator and Mr. David Hodgson who acts as Treasurer. Mr Richard D Sanderson, in addition to his role as trustee, acts as the General Director in Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland.

Related Parties

The administration of the Trust is undertaken autonomously, although it works in support of the activities of Children's Vision International Inc, (CVII) which owns children's homes and a school in Bogota, Colombia.

Risk Assessment

The Trustees recognise their responsibilities and are committed to minimise all the risks that the Trust may face. The major risks to which the charity is exposed are identified by the Trustees in terms of both probability and potential risk and are reviewed regularly together with systems and procedures to manage those risks.

The major risk of the Trust is that of ensuring that there is a continued flow of incoming funds to continue to support the commitments of the charity in providing finance to help high risk children with particular focus on the work of CVII in Colombia.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

Note 1. – ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) “Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015”, Financial Reporting Standard 102 “The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland” and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

(b) Income recognition

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations are recognised when the charity has received the donation or the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statements of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and applicable UK Accounting Standards and the Charities Act 2011.

(c) Expenditure

TRUSTEES' REPORT for the year ended 31 December 2021

The Trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES & ACTIVITIES

The Objects of the Trust are to raise and receive monetary and non-monetary donations to help high risk children, with particular focus to support the work of Children's Vision International Incorporated in Bogota, Colombia, South America.

The aims of the trust are to provide support in furthering the following objects ("the objects") for the benefit of children, in particular but not exclusively those residing temporarily or permanently in Bogota, Colombia:

- (a) The relief of sickness and the preservation and protection of health of children and/or their families, including by assisting in the provision of medicines, clinics and healthcare workers;
- (b) The relief of financial hardship by making grants of money for providing or paying for items, services or facilities such as food, clothing and bedding;
- (c) The advancement of the education, including by providing and assisting in the provision of facilities, equipment and teachers;
- (d) To help homeless and orphaned children by providing funding for accommodation, carers and running orphanages;
- (e) To provide for the relief of children who are sick or disadvantaged by reason of their social or economic circumstances by the provision of holidays, outings and other recreational and leisure activities provided in the interests of social welfare and designed to improve their conditions of life.

During the year under review, donations amounting to £93,060, (2020 - £149,450), were made to Children's Vision International Inc., (CVII) in Bogota, Colombia and a further £9,600, (2020 - £9,600), was paid in support fees to the Richard D. Sanderson in his role as General Director in Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland

Public benefit

The Charity Commission has set out general principles to be used in assessing the public benefit of UK charities. To ensure it meets these principles, the Trust must be able to demonstrate that its work benefits the public or a section of the public, that people on low incomes are able to benefit, and that any private benefit is incidental. In exercising their powers and duties, the trustees have given due consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Review of Charitable Activities

The Trustees consider that the performance of the trust in its testimony within the Colombia and beyond to have been satisfactory again this year as the impact of the work amongst children and their families has been maintained and further enhanced. The trustee wishes to place on record his grateful thanks to all who have so faithfully supported the work of New Hope for Children throughout the year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Position

The accounts for the year ended 31st December 2021 are presented to comply, as far as possible, with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Total expenditure including donations amounted to **£106,920** compared to **£162,237** in 2020 which meant that the net surplus for the year amounted to **£51,511** compared to a net deficit of **£14,084** in 2020.

At 31st December 2021, the reserves of the charity amounted to **£56,902** (2020 - **£5,351**)

Principal Funding Sources

New Hope for Children's principal sources of funds are from many and varied churches, groups, and individuals and during the year amounted to **£158,471** (with applicable tax refunds from recoverable gift aid) (2020 - **£148,154**)

New Hope for Children achieved its objectives in terms of supporting to the maximum level possible the work of Children's Vision in Bogota, Colombia.

Total costs incurred accounted for **2.69%** of our income.

The Main Activities for the Year

During 2021, New Hope for Children has been able to support Children's Vision, Bogota through grants to support the following aspects which were of public benefit to the children and adults in Colombia supported by the foundation. In undertaking these activities, the trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on Public Benefit:

1. The relief or poverty and the provision of a home. Supporting the provision of four established children's homes for children in high-risk situations. To break the immediate effects of poverty through helping provide (and develop) a home, food and caring staff, clothing, protection and support. (Approx. 75 children helped constantly throughout the year). Due to the Covid-19 pandemic the homes were required to remain closed for the first part of 2021, in accordance with Colombian government instructions, later opening in July 2021. The school operated normally from February of 2021. The children continued to live with their families in poverty situations for the first part of 2021. New Hope for children partially provided many of their basic food needs through grants for the purchase of family food packs. In addition, support was provided through Psychology and Social Work via telephone contact as much as

possible. Overall, during the time of the Covid-19 pandemic 2020 to 2021, New Hope for Children helped to provide some of the 10,000 total food bags that were donated to needy families. Richard Sanderson was provided with support fees both for his work as General Director in Bogota, and also within the UK and Ireland as principal ambassador in raising awareness and financial support for the charity by giving talks and reports of the activities and impact of the work in Colombia.

Funds Granted: £66,638.00 (please note that this includes a provision for wages, utility bills and food that is shared between the homes and the school also helping to provide and education, and also contributed towards caring for those who are sick through the provision of nurses.) In addition, support fees provided to Richard Sanderson were £9,600.

2. The relief of poverty. For the construction of the new “Thicke Founders Building – Blessings.” A 2,000m² construction project, helping to provide Humanitarian Aid storerooms to bless the neediest of Colombia, a new dining room and installations for 200 children for hunger relief, new offices for Psychology, Social Work, Nurse and Nutritionist, a medical unit to help children in crisis, also a new administration office. In addition, bakery and sewing workshops for children to have fun and learn and a children’s sports area for beneficial exercise and recreation. **Funds granted:** £15,000.00.
3. Caring for those who are sick. Helping to provide the nursing staff for the children (Approx. 160 children constantly throughout the year). **Funds Granted:** Please read Funds granted for section 1. above also that helped provide medical care through the provision of a nurse and the provision of other medical attention.
4. Providing an Education. Supporting the provision of a school in Colombia. Helping make a provision for teaching staff, and therefore an education to break the cycle of poverty that has been seen in generations of the families of each child (Approx. 160 children helped continuously.) Education from nursery through to the end of High School. Specific grants were given towards further and higher education, benefitting five young adults in accordance to the donor’s instructions. Please note that these five mentioned changed during the year as some graduated and others began to benefit from the funds. **Funds Granted:** Specific funds were granted for: £5,294.00 for Higher and Further Education Scholarships. Please also read funds granted for section 1. Above that helped provide education through the provision of staff wages, utility services and food for the students at Children’s Vision in Bogota. A specific grant was made for the purchase of Art materials of £213.00.
5. Specific grants were given for gifts for the children in accordance with donor instructions. **Funds granted:** £365.00 for gifts for the children.
6. Provision of transport through specific grants to help with petrol and diesel and vehicle maintenance costs. Transport was of benefit in providing logistical help for recreational, health and support activities. **Funds granted:** £2,250.00.

7. There was one further grant made for public benefit for IT equipment. **Funds granted:** £3,300.00.

The total of funds granted for the public benefit from New Hope for Children to Children's Vision, Bogota, Colombia during 2021 was £93,060.00

Strategies of the Trust

During all of 2020 and the initial part of 2021 the trust was unable to visit supporting organisations and people in the normal face to face manner due to the Covid-19 pandemic. To overcome this difficulty, the trust used new modes of communication with its donors. Principally these were digitally recorded presentations that were shown in many supporting organisations such as churches. These were further distributed on a personal basis to individual supporters. In addition, the trust continued to make use of its internet page and social media platforms such as are Instagram, Twitter, and Facebook.

During 2021 because of the Covid-19 travel restrictions there were no visits by UK volunteers to the work in Colombia, with the exception of Richard Sanderson who continued with his normal duties there.

Significance of Achievements

During 2021 New Hope for Children has been able to support Children's Vision, Bogota through grants to support the following aspects which were of public benefit mainly to the children and in some part to adults in Colombia supported by the foundation:

1. **Children's Homes.** Providing grants for wages towards well trained care staff working in the homes. To provide a caring Christian family environment where children have stability, love and professional support. They are helped to overcome their family difficulties and receive healing to both physical and emotional hurts. To develop into stable adults who know that they have the help of a family. The homes could only operate from mid-2021 onwards due to government Covid-19 restrictions. For the first part of 2021, the children lived full time in their poor family homes attending school daily or when able. The children were supported as best the foundation was able with food, school homework guides, basic household items and constant support especially by Psychology and Social work professionals.
2. **Humanitarian Aid.** Support also for the Humanitarian Aid programme where thousands of needy families are helped with donations of clothes, shoes, baby packs, blankets, and many other articles. Approximately 6,000 families helped during 2021. The number of food bags distributed during the 2020-2021 due to the Covid-19 pandemic was approx. 10,000, with 4,000 of those being given during 2021.
3. **Education.** Providing grants towards wages for well trained teachers working in the school. To help each child develop the knowledge and skills that will help break the cycle of poverty in generations of their families. To enable each child to have a stable future and prepare them for life as a responsible adult. Throughout the whole of 2021 the school was able to operate normally because of the quick, efficient, and strict compliance of the bio-security guidelines resulting from the Covid-19 pandemic. Specific grants were given towards further and higher education, benefitting five young adults in accordance with the donors' instructions.
4. **Hunger Relief.** Helping to provide 500 meals a day and snacks to children some of whom had been suffering from malnutrition. To provide good nutrition which is

reflected in the growth of each child, good healthy defences against illness and the best possibility to function well and optimise their learning. During the first part of 2021 help was given through the distribution of 4000 food bags to help Children's Vision families and many other needy people badly affected by Covid-19 pandemic crisis.

5. **Medical Care.** Provision of a nurse for the medical care of the Children's Vision children.
6. **Maintenance/Construction.** Grants to help towards the construction of the 2000m² Thicke Founders Building – Blessings: a purpose-built centre for distribution of humanitarian aid, large daily use dining/events room with industrial kitchen for hunger relief, new technical team areas such as psychology, social work, nurses area and nutrition, in addition to a new medical unit for healthcare and administration offices, also bakery and sewing workshops for learning and fun, audio visual office, and a sports area for the benefit of all our children. This project was able to continue during the Covid-19 Pandemic (lockdown allowing) and was 98% finished by the end of 2021 with just the electricity substation awaiting final approval and connection.
7. **Utilities.** Gas, Water, Electric, Telephone. Helping provide the basic needs for four children's homes and a school. This requirement reduced during the first part of 2021 as the children's homes were not operating due to the Covid-19 Pandemic.
8. **Transport and Vehicles.** Grants for transportation costs. The vehicles are used for the transportation of the children for medical appointments, outings and educational purposes. Also, used for the transportation of donations that helped over 6,000 families around the city and beyond within the territory of Colombia. In addition, for the transportation of building materials purchased for the building project mentioned in (6). This requirement reduced during the first part of 2021 due to the effects of the Covid-19 Pandemic.
9. **Gifts.** Individual gifts made by sponsors for their sponsored children.

Investment policy and performance

The trustees choose to retain all surplus funds in liquid form as cash at bank and do not make any longer term investments to facilitate the easy transfer of needed funds to Bogota.

Reserves Policy

The Trustee recognises the need to establish and maintain a level of reserves that enables financial stability, that meets the requirements of working capital and cushions against fluctuations of income levels and in the financial performance of the Trust. As at the 31st December 2021 the amount held in reserves for New Hope for Children was **£56,902**, although this reserve includes some specific grants awaiting allocation. During 2021, and even taking into account the financial pressure for finishing the building project, the charity was able to maintain its reserve levels, safeguarding the trust in terms of continuance. The trustees have no uncertainties in regard to the charity not continuing as a going concern

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Charity was formed under a Trust Deed dated 2nd April 2008 and is governed by that Trust Deed. The charity is constituted as an unincorporated charity

Recruitment & Appointment of Trustees

Mr Richard D Sanderson and Miss Margaret R. Swift were founder trustees and the remainder of trustees were appointed by resolution of the trustees. Any future trustees will be appointed by resolution of the trustees.

Induction and Training of Trustees

The process of induction and training of any new Trustees would be under the personal guidance and supervision of the existing Trustees. At the time of induction, each trustee accepts and adopts the relevant trustee protocols

Organisational Structure and How Decisions are Made

The governance of the charity is by regular trustee meetings of which a minimum of two are held each year. The day to day administration within the UK is undertaken by Mrs Christine M. Hodgson who acts as the charity Co-ordinator and Mr. David Hodgson who acts as Treasurer. Mr Richard D Sanderson, in addition to his role as trustee, acts as the General Director in Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland.

Related Parties

The administration of the Trust is undertaken autonomously, although it works in support of the activities of Children's Vision International Inc, (CVII) which owns children's homes and a school in Bogota, Colombia.

Risk Assessment

The Trustees recognise their responsibilities and are committed to minimise all the risks that the Trust may face. The major risks to which the charity is exposed are identified by the Trustees in terms of both probability and potential risk and are reviewed regularly together with systems and procedures to manage those risks.

The major risk of the Trust is that of ensuring that there is a continued flow of incoming funds to continue to support the commitments of the charity in providing finance to help high risk children with particular focus on the work of CVII in Colombia.







NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

Note 1. – ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) “Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015”, Financial Reporting Standard 102 “The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland” and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

TRUSTEES' REPORT for the year ended 31 December 2020

The Trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES & ACTIVITIES

The Objects of the Trust are to raise and receive monetary and non-monetary donations to help high risk children, with particular focus to support the work of Children's Vision International Incorporated in Bogota, Colombia, South America.

The aims of the trust are to provide support in furthering the following objects ("the objects") for the benefit of children, in particular but not exclusively those residing temporarily or permanently in Bogota, Colombia:

- (a) The relief of sickness and the preservation and protection of health of children and/or their families, including by assisting in the provision of medicines, clinics and healthcare workers;
- (b) The relief of financial hardship by making grants of money for providing or paying for items, services or facilities such as food, clothing and bedding;
- (c) The advancement of the education, including by providing and assisting in the provision of facilities, equipment and teachers;
- (d) To help homeless and orphaned children by providing funding for accommodation, carers and running orphanages;
- (e) To provide for the relief of children who are sick or disadvantaged by reason of their social or economic circumstances by the provision of holidays, outings and other recreational and leisure activities provided in the interests of social welfare and designed to improve their conditions of life.

During the year under review, donations amounting to £149,450 (2019 - £132,995), were made to Children's Vision International Inc., (CVII) in Bogota, Colombia and a further £9,600, (2019 - £9,150), was paid in support fees to the Richard D. Sanderson in his role as General Director in Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland

Public benefit

The Charity Commission has set out general principles to be used in assessing the public benefit of UK charities. To ensure it meets these principles, the Trust must be able to demonstrate that its work benefits the public or a section of the public, that people on low incomes are able to benefit, and that any private benefit is incidental. In exercising their powers and duties, the trustees have given due consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Review of Charitable Activities

The Trustees consider that the performance of the trust in its testimony within Colombia and beyond to have been satisfactory again this year as the impact of the work amongst children and their families has been maintained and further enhanced. The trustee wishes to place on record his grateful thanks to all who have so faithfully supported the work of the charity throughout the year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Position

The accounts for the year ended 31st December 2020 are presented to comply, as far as possible, with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Total expenditure including donations amounted to **£162,237** compared to **£147,837** in 2019 which meant that the net deficit for the year amounted to **£14,083** compared to a net deficit of **£2,381** in 2019.

At 31st December 2020, the reserves of the charity amounted to **£5,351** (2019 - **£19,435**)

Principal Funding Sources

New Hope for Children's principal sources of funds are from many and varied churches, groups, and individuals and during the year amounted to **£148,154** (with applicable tax refunds from recoverable gift aid) (2019 - **£145,456**)

New Hope for Children achieved its objectives in terms of supporting to the maximum level possible the work of Children's Vision in Bogota, Colombia.

Total costs incurred accounted for **2.15%** of our income.

The Main Activities for the Year

During 2020 New Hope for Children has been able to support Children's Vision, Bogota through grants to support the following aspects which were of public benefit to the children and adults in Colombia supported by the foundation. In undertaking these activities the trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit:

1. **The relief of poverty and the provision of a home** – Supporting the provision of four established children's homes for children in High Risk situations. To break the immediate effects of poverty through helping provide (and develop) a home, food and caring staff, clothing, protection and support. (Approx. 90 children helped). Due to the Covid-19 pandemic the homes were required to close along with the school in March in accordance with Colombian government instructions, and for the remainder of the year. The children returned to living with their families in poverty situations. New Hope for children partially provided many of their basic food needs through grants for the purchase of family food packs as related in (3) below. In addition

support was provided through Psychology and Social Work via telephone contact as much as possible.

2. **Providing an education.** Supporting the provision of a school in Colombia. Helping make a provision for teaching staff, and therefore an education to break the cycle of poverty that has been seen in generations of the families of each child (Approx. 150 children helped continuously). Education from nursery through to the end of High School. In addition to High School diploma also providing technical classes. In accordance with Colombian government regulations due to the Covid 19 Pandemic, the school building closed in March 2020. However, the education of the children continued for the remainder of the year, for all the children through the distribution of thousands of printed school guides which were written by each teacher who worked from their family homes. These were distributed to each student and received back every two weeks throughout the remainder of the year. It is worth noting that despite the pandemic conditions, good High School grades were achieved by the graduating students and one student was among 10 chosen from the whole of the city of Bogota (9 million inhabitants) for a top university scholarship based on his excellent results. In addition, specific grants were given towards higher education, benefitting five young adults in accordance with the donor's instructions. Richard Sanderson is provided with support fees both for his work as General Director in Bogota, and within the UK and Ireland as principal ambassador in raising awareness and financial support for the charity by giving talks and reports on the activities and impact of the work in Colombia.

Funds granted for sections 1 and 2: £74,735 (please note that this includes a provision for wages, utility bills and food that is shared between the homes and the school, and also contributed towards caring for those who are sick through the provision of nurses). The total includes £5,400.00 specific funds for Higher and Further Education Scholarships, in accordance to the donors wishes. It is important to note that although some of the staff were unable to work due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, there was a legal requirement to continue fulfilling contractual obligations to all until December 2020. In addition, support fees provided to Richard Sanderson were £9,600.

3. **The relief of poverty** – New Hope gave grants for the purchase of food packs for the families of the children helped in Colombia, in addition to many other extreme poverty people who were unable to work due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Helping provide 6,000 food bags that were distributed throughout the year.

Funds granted: £7,400

4. **The relief of poverty** – For the construction of the new “Thicke Founders Building – Blessings.” A 2000m2 construction project, helping to provide Humanitarian Aid storerooms to bless the neediest areas of Colombia, a new dining room and installations for 180 children for hunger relief, new offices for Psychology, Social Work, Nurses and Nutritionist, and a medical unit to help children in crisis, also a new administration office. In addition, bakery and sewing workshops for children to have fun and learn and a children’s sports area for beneficial exercise and fun. It is important to note that by the end of 2020 this project was 85% finished.

Funds granted: £65,200

5. **Caring for those who are sick.** Helping to provide the nursing staff for the children during presential moments (approx. 150 children intermittently throughout the year).

Funds granted: Please read “Funds granted sections for 1 and 2” above.

6. **The relief of poverty.** Specific grants were given for gifts for the children in accordance with donor instructions.

Funds granted: £615 for gifts for the children.

7. **The relief of poverty.** Provision of transport through specific grants to help with petrol and diesel and vehicle maintenance costs. Transport was of benefit in providing logistical help for recreational, health and support activities. Also, for humanitarian aid brigades helping thousands of people. And the transport of building materials for the project reported in (4) above.

Funds granted: £1,500

The total of funds granted for the public benefit from New Hope for Children to Children’s Vision in Bogota during 2020 was £149,450.

Strategies of the Trust

All grants were given in accordance with the instructions of the donors and within the aims and objectives set out in the governing document.

New Hope for Children raises through its donors 100% of the funds for the grants it gives and does not receive funds from any type of social investment programme.

We would like to thank all of the volunteers who have helped raise support and awareness in many areas of the UK – mainly in Southern and North Eastern England, Northern Ireland, the Midlands and Scotland, including organising and/or publicising fundraising events, opening opportunities and invitations for presentations and in general raising awareness of the work in Colombia. As these people are groups and individuals from other organisations, it is not possible to provide an accurate calculation of the time and resources invested by each person/group.

To thank those who have supported our work in terms of offering help with activities such as printing information, copying of promotional DVDs, and for the work of the trustees in

running New Hope for Children. The number of hours invested would be approximately 60 hours per month.

Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic it was impossible to do the normal in-person presentations and therefore these were recorded digitally and forwarded electronically for the use of each organisation, group or individual as required.

7. Utilities. Gas, Water, Electric, Telephone. Helping provide the basic needs for four children's homes and a school. This requirement reduced during the time that the children's homes were not operating due to the Covid-19 Pandemic.
8. Transport and Vehicles. Grants for transportation costs. The vehicles are used for the transportation of the children for Medical appointments, outings and educational purposes. Also, used for the transportation of donations that helped over 4,000 families around the city and beyond within the territory of Colombia. In addition for the transportation of building materials purchased for the building project mentioned in (6). This requirement reduced during the period march to December 2020 due to the effects of the Covid-19 Pandemic.
9. Gifts. Individual gifts made by sponsors for their sponsored children.
10. It should be noted that to amplify contact possibilities with donors, New Hope for Children achieved the rebuilding and modernising of its web page and opened pages on social media platforms Instagram, Facebook and Twitter.

Investment policy and performance

The trustees choose to retain all surplus funds in liquid form as cash at bank and do not make any longer term investments to facilitate the easy transfer of needed funds to Bogota.

Reserves Policy

The Trustee recognises the need to establish and maintain a level of reserves that enables financial stability, that meets the requirements of working capital and cushions against fluctuations of income levels and in the financial performance of the Trust. At 31st December 2020, the reserves of the charity amounted to **£5,351** (2019 - **£19,435**). During 2020, taking into account the added financial pressures due to the Covid-19 Pandemic and the construction project, the charity has made effort to maintain its reserve levels, safeguarding in terms of continuance. The trustees have no uncertainties in regard to the charity not continuing as a going concern.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Charity was formed under a Trust Deed dated 2nd April 2008 and is governed by that Trust Deed. The charity is constituted as an unincorporated charity

Recruitment & Appointment of Trustees

Mr Richard D Sanderson and Miss Margaret R. Swift were founder trustees and the remainder of trustees were appointed by resolution of the trustees. Any future trustees will be appointed by resolution of the trustees.

Induction and Training of Trustees

The process of induction and training of any new Trustees would be under the personal guidance and supervision of the existing Trustees. At the time of induction, each trustee accepts and adopts the relevant trustee protocols

Organisational Structure and How Decisions are Made

The governance of the charity is by regular trustee meetings of which a minimum of two are held each year. The day to day administration within the UK is undertaken by Mrs Christine M. Hodgson who acts as the charity Co-ordinator and Mr. David Hodgson who acts as Treasurer. Mr Richard D Sanderson, in addition to his role as trustee, acts as the General Director in Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland.

Related Parties

The administration of the Trust is undertaken autonomously, although it works in support of the activities of Children's Vision International Inc, (CVII) which owns children's homes and a school in Bogota, Colombia.

The Charity completed repayment of a short-term interest free personal loan of £8,000 from Richard Sanderson which had been given to assist with a donation for the building project. £6,000 of this loan was repaid during the year and the remaining £2,000 became a donation as instructed by Richard.

Risk Assessment

The Trustees recognise their responsibilities and are committed to minimise all the risks that the Trust may face. The major risks to which the charity is exposed are identified by the Trustees in terms of both probability and potential risk and are reviewed regularly together with systems and procedures to manage those risks.

The major risk of the Trust is that of ensuring that there is a continued flow of incoming funds to continue to support the commitments of the charity in providing finance to help high risk children with particular focus on the work of CVII in Colombia.

To help mitigate this risk, New Hope for Children has modernised its web page during 2020 and opened pages on the social media platforms Instagram, Facebook and Twitter. Additionally, due to the effects of the Covid-19 Pandemic communication with donor organisations and individuals has been maintained through the digital recording and electronic communication of the usually presential presentations.





NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

Note 1. – ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) “Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015”, Financial Reporting Standard 102 “The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland” and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

(b) Income recognition

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations are recognised when the charity has received the donation or the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statements of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and applicable UK Accounting Standards and the Charities Act 2011.

(c) Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings and aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributable to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

(d) Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities

(e) Realised gains and losses

There has been no realised gains or losses on investments during the year.

Note 2 – REMUNERATION

No remuneration has been paid to any of the trustees in their capacity as trustees. However the sum of £9,150 has been paid as a support fee to Richard D. Sanderson in his role as the General Director in Colombia and Principal Ambassador in reporting back to the charity sponsors in the UK and Ireland.
