Objectives and Activities

Fat Fluffs is a rabbit rescue and sanctuary based in Hampton in Arden in the West Midlands. We take in all sorts of rabbits and as far as possible we find them loving forever homes. For those with more challenging personalities or continuing health problems we provide sanctuary for them here and they stay as part of the family and are affectionately known as 'the Fluffs'.

Public Benefit

The Animal Welfare Act 2006 and the additional Good Practice Code for Rabbit Welfare, updated March 2024, makes owners & keepers responsible for the welfare needs of animals (place to live, suitable diet, normal behaviour, and protection from pain, injury, suffering & disease) as well as making cruelty unlawful. With an ever increasing number of rabbits currently in rescue throughout UK, estimates stand at 67,000+ to date, we see the public benefit of the work of Fat Fluffs as follows:-

- Providing rescue places for unwanted, abandoned & abused rabbits surrendered by the public
- Providing long-term foster care & vet treatment for rabbits with on-going health or behaviour issues surrendered by the public unable to meet the cost of continual treatment
- Give the opportunity of rehome for rabbits to those wishing to provide a permanent, loving home
- Give the opportunity of companionship to individuals or families
- Promoting Rabbit Welfare to the public to educate & raise awareness of their responsibility to meet the needs of rabbits in their care
- Providing advice & support to adopters and the general public on all rabbit welfare matters
- Reducing the number of unwanted rabbits by neutering all incomers to help reduce abandonment and illtreatment in future
- Ensuring every rabbit who comes through our rescue is protected against diseases with yearly vaccinations.

Review of Year – Achievements and Performance

Financial Review

This year we have continued with our energies revamping the rescue. We have noticed, since HS2 has been developing the land at the bottom of our garden that drainage has increasingly become an issue. We applied for a grant with HS2 to assist with the work needed to resolve the issue but we were refused. Despite this, we felt the work had to be done to ensure the ongoing welfare of the animals so went ahead and additional land drainage has been laid all round the rescue. We have also added additional fencing to aid security. We set up a go fund me page to help raise finances to support this and were blessed to be supported by many of our regular and new supporters.

Charitable Activities – Rescue, Rehome & Sanctuary

During 2024/25 we took in 117 rabbits. This is a drop of around 25% from the previous few years and due in part to a six week period of not taking rabbits in whilst the major drainage works were carried out on site. Twelve of the rabbits taken in had been rehomed from Fat Fluffs previously but were returned as the adopters' circumstances had changed and they no longer felt able to continue caring for the rabbit(s). We took in 22 pairs, three trios and one mother with four young kittens, the rest of the surrenders being single rabbits. Seventeen of the 117 surrendered rabbits passed away before they were offered for adoption.

Our sanctuary group started the year with 19 members but, with a steady decline in numbers, ended the year with 11 rabbits. Due to the groundwork on site, there was no addition of new rabbits to the sanctuary group although some rabbits on site and six of the new surrenders were identified as needing to be kept long term and were bonded into smaller groups for addition to the main group at a later date.

We successfully rehomed 93 rabbits this year, again a figure that is down on previous years. Over 60% of the rabbits were rehomed as singles and were bonded with one or more rabbits already owned by the adopters. Requests for adoption of pairs/groups were higher than last year but we did not see an increase in the numbers of families looking to take on rabbit ownership for the first time. Three single rabbits who went out to new homes were returned because the bond with their partner broke down and have subsequently been rehomed with another rabbit. One pair was returned due to health issues which were resolved but they remain on site looking for a new home.

We have seen a significant drop in the numbers of rabbits being added to our surrender waiting list throughout the year which has reduced from over one hundred entries to below fifty. The main reason for wanting to surrender rabbits appears to be moving home to new accommodation that cannot support the continued care of rabbits by the families. Requests for Fat Fluffs to offer these rabbits space are often last minute and therefore the rabbits are not being added to the waiting list.

All our rabbits are neutered and vaccinated and receive any necessary required vet treatment. We continue to have a good relationship with Vets4Pets in Shirley and we have the invaluable support of Rebecca at Oaks Vets in Cotteridge, who excels at bunny tooth care and continues to be unimpressed with some of the states of the new rabbits coming in. We operate with a “quality of life” ethic and all our rabbits are cared for and treated as long as we, and their vet, feel they have this. We will not let a rabbit suffer unnecessarily and have sadly had to let a few of our long term, and very special, rabbits go this year.

This year our trustee team has remained at 3 trustees although changes have happened. Martin Johnson stepped down and Sarah Baker has taken up the role of trustee. She brings with her a wealth of people management experience being one of the managers of a major chain store and has given us extensive advice on updating our policies, safeguarding and risk assessments as well as managing our staff reviews and follow ups.

Since our Foster Co-ordinator, Martin, stepped down from supporting the rescue, our foster numbers have declined. Two of our foster families ended up adopting the rabbits in their temporary care and no longer have the space for additional rabbits. Changes in the priorities of other foster families has seen them without the time and resources to give any rabbits in their care. Currently there are five active foster families but we are reviewing our ongoing use of fosterers to ensure the system works and benefits the rabbits who go out to temporary homes.

This year we have seen a slight increase in the number of regular and new volunteers, as well as student placements, and as always our core team of volunteers have excelled themselves; we have some who have been with us for many years now and, with our volunteer co-ordinator always encouraging them to give their best, we have appreciated the hard work and effort each and every one of them puts in. We are indebted to everyone, our employees & our volunteers alike, for their on-going commitment, continued hard work and support they give to Fat Fluffs. Everyone involved is key to the existence and growth of Fat Fluffs, and we could not have achieved the things we have this year without their help.

Activities for generating funds – Fundraising events & initiatives and Trading

With a lot of volunteer time being allocated to site improvements and a general decline in the number of volunteers coming forward, there have been limited opportunities for undertaking internal fundraising activities. Our Sponsor-a-bun programme continues to deliver a healthy proportion of our annual income and we have teamed up with a group of animal rescue charities to create events of a larger and more productive scale. It remains that those we have attended still provide limited financial returns or opportunities to educate in the area of animal welfare and rescue. We continue to look for other opportunities and will be spending more time in this area now that the majority of the site improvement work has been completed.

Reserves Policy

We still have our reserve set to the equivalent to 6 months operating costs, including allowing for the staffing costs, at £60,000 to cover periods of difficulty encountered. This amount will be reviewed periodically at trustees’ meetings. As a team we still agree that, with the housing costs and mortgage rises, moving site is not a viable option so remain invested in using the site we currently have to the best of its potential.

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





Review of Year – Achievements and Performance

Financial Review

This year, as we look ahead to our ten year anniversary on site at the beginning of 2025, we have spent time and energy making improvements to the rescue set up we have in place, revamping and giving new life to it to try and ensure we get as much use as possible out of our runs, enclosures and equipment as we can. We have had the drive redone as it was liable to flooding, the paths along the side of the Fluffs' garden and outside the barns have been taken up and replaced with envirogrid and pea gravel to aid drainage as well as look more aesthetically pleasing. The outside rescue runs have been replaced with more secure and attractive gates and enclosures, the hay barn has been rejigged and the permanent Fluffs sanctuary enclosure has been kitted out to maximise space and enrichment and allow them access to even more hay on a permanent basis.

We have made better use of our office area and our rabbit health carer now has her own space to ensure the health and welfare of the rabbits can be maintained amongst the busyness of the rescue. We have new secure fencing around the perimeter of the rescue, low enough to maintain the open feel but high enough that any enthusiastic escapees cannot get too far. We have been delighted with the response of visitors both frequent and new as they have commented on how improved the site looks and have appreciated the hard work that has gone into it. Much of the work has been done by volunteers and we are so appreciative of the time and commitment they have shown us.

Charitable Activities – Rescue, Rehome & Sanctuary

During 2023/24 we took in 153 rabbits. Twenty-two of these had been rehomed from Fat Fluffs previously but were returned as the adopters' circumstances had changed and they no longer felt able to continue caring for the rabbit(s). In most cases the rabbits' partner had passed away and the adopters wanted a break from rabbit ownership. In February 2024, the Hopper Haven Sanctuary Garden in Redditch was closed down and we took in eight of their sanctuary rabbits who were unable to find homes elsewhere. We also took in 15 eight day old kittens from two litters where the mothers had passed away. The hand rearing of such young kittens is rarely successful and sadly we lost all the young. Twenty -nine of the 153 surrendered rabbits passed away before they were offered for adoption. We have maintained our waiting list for the surrender of rabbits throughout the year and there has been little change in the numbers of people looking to find their rabbits an alternative home.

Seven of the surrendered rabbits joined the sanctuary group as they had ongoing health issues and a further five are waiting to be bonded into the group. Our sanctuary group started the year with 11 members and this increased to a maximum of 26 in February. The numbers now stand at 19.

We successfully rehomed 108 rabbits this year, a figure that is down on previous years. Over 80% of the rabbits were rehomed as singles and were bonded with one or more rabbits already owned by the adopters. Requests for adoption of pairs/groups were very low and families looking to take on rabbit ownership for the first time were much scarcer than in previous years. Eleven rabbits who went out to new homes were returned usually because the bond with their partner broke down. Of the returned rabbits, five went on to find a new home, one passed away, one joined the sanctuary group and four are still up for adoption.

All our rabbits are neutered and vaccinated and receive any necessary required vet treatment. We continue to have a good relationship with Vets4Pets in Shirley and we have the invaluable support of Rebecca at Oaks Vets in Cotteridge, who excels at bunny tooth care and continues to be unimpressed with some of the states of the new rabbits coming in. We operate with a "quality of life" ethic and all our rabbits are cared for and treated as long as we, and their vet, feel they have this. We will not let a rabbit suffer unnecessarily and have sadly had to let a few of our long term, and very special, rabbits go this year.

This year our trustee team has increased to 3 trustees and 6 core team committee members, after Joyce agreed to join our team, who continue to work hard to keep the running of all the areas of the rescue efficient and safe. We have found a new site manager who has fitted into the team with ease and has hit the ground running. We are delighted to be in a position where we are now running the rescue with 3 full time staff members and one part time. They are a great team and a credit to the rescue.

Our foster co-ordinator, Martin, has continued to support our foster team of volunteers who provide invaluable care to our rabbits not only by giving us additional capacity but also by offering more frequent interaction and socialisation with rabbits who benefit from this before moving on to forever homes. We looked after 43 rabbits

across 10 foster homes during the year. 33 of these have gone on to be successfully rehomed. Of the rest, 3 will remain in long term foster homes, 2 are back in the rescue, 1 passed away and the remaining 4 are still in temporary foster homes.

This year we have seen a decrease in the number of regular and new volunteers, as well as student placements, but as always our core team of volunteers have excelled themselves; we have some who have been with us for many years now and, with our volunteer co-ordinator always encouraging them to give their best, we have appreciated the hard work and effort each and every one of them puts in. We are indebted to everyone, our employees & our volunteers alike, for their on-going commitment, continued hard work and support they give to Fat Fluffs. Everyone involved is key to the existence and growth of Fat Fluffs and we could not have achieved the things we have this year without their help.

Activities for generating funds – Fundraising events & initiatives and Trading

With a lot of volunteer time being allocated to site improvements and a general decline in the number of volunteers coming forward, there have been limited opportunities for undertaking internal fundraising activities. Our Sponsor-a-bun programme continues to deliver a healthy proportion of our annual income and we have been fortunate enough to receive a couple of substantial donations, one from fundraising activities supported by one of our former Trustees and the other from support by a local school. We have undertaken a review of the value of external fundraising activities. Since Covid we have seen a large decline in the number of local and/or animal related events we would normally attend to raise funds and the profile of the rescue. Those we have attended have provided limited financial returns and have not always been aimed at an audience interested in rabbits and the rescue. We continue to look for other opportunities and will be spending more time in this area now that the majority of the site improvement work has been completed.

Reserves Policy

We still have our reserve set to the equivalent to 6 months operating costs, allowing for the additional staffing costs, at £60,000 to cover periods of difficulty encountered. This amount will be reviewed periodically at trustees' meetings. As a team we have agreed that with the housing costs and mortgage rises moving site is not a viable option so we have agreed a five year plan with the owner of the site we currently occupy and, as discussed earlier, have invested some of the funds in developing the site, dealing with drainage issues and making better use of the space we have.







- Providing long-term foster care & vet treatment for rabbits with on-going health or behaviour issues surrendered by the public unable to meet the cost of continual treatment
- Give the opportunity of rehome for rabbits to those wishing to provide a permanent, loving home
- Give the opportunity of companionship to individuals or families
- Promoting Rabbit Welfare to the public to educate & raise awareness of their responsibility to meet the needs of rabbits in their care
- Providing advice & support to adopters and the general public on all rabbit welfare matters
- Reducing the number of unwanted rabbits by neutering all incomers to help reduce abandonment and ill-treatment in future

Review of Year – Achievements and Performance

Financial Review

This year we have seen a steady requirement for rehoming and a sharp rise in boarding requests as people continue to take advantage of being able to take holidays. Our regular supporters continue to remain faithful to us financially and we have kept our finances steady. We continue to work hard to ensure we maintain a positive relationship with Solihull Council, continuing to meet their expectations and those of our new neighbours. We have found relationships with the local community have again improved this last year and we continue to strive to maintain this.

We continue to work hard to control the day to day running costs of the rescue which we have achieved with the help of our ever faithful volunteers as we see the number of rabbits coming into our rescue increase. We have seen a positive advance in animal welfare and general overall health of our rabbits with the assistance of our medical staff member and our permanent resident number of rabbits has remained steady due to additions and some losses.

Charitable Activities – Rescue, Rehome & Sanctuary

Our sanctuary rabbit group of Fat Fluffs, as mentioned above, has increased and decreased again in number and currently stands at 11, each with ongoing health and behavioural issues. Our rehoming figures have stayed steady this last year and we remain in a good position to manage our ever increasing number of rabbits on our waiting list. We have kept it open for the entirety of the year but have seen a rise in the number of requests to be added and the list currently stands at 85 applicants with varying numbers of rabbit to surrender.

All our rabbits are neutered and vaccinated and receive any necessary required vet treatment. We continue to have a good relationship with Vets4Pets in Shirley and we have the invaluable support of Rebecca at Oaks Vets in Cotteridge, who excels at bunny tooth care and continues to be unimpressed with some of the states of the new rabbits coming in. We operate with a “quality of life” ethic and all our rabbits are cared for and treated as long as we, and their vet, feel they have this. We will not let a rabbit suffer unnecessarily and have sadly had to let a few of our long term, and very special, rabbits go this year.

This year our trustee team has increased to 3 trustees and 5 core team committee members who continue to work hard to keep the running of all the areas of the rescue efficient and safe. We have found a new site manager who has fitted into the team with ease and has hit the ground running. We are delighted to be in a position where we are now running the rescue with 3 full time staff members. They are a great team and a credit to the rescue.

Our foster co-ordinator, has really taken the role to a new level this year and we have been able to expand and accommodate more rabbits due to the growing team of foster volunteers taking our rabbits into their homes.

Again this year our team of volunteers have excelled themselves; we have many who have been with us for several years now and with our volunteer co-ordinator always encouraging them to give their best we have appreciated the hard work and effort each and every one of them puts in. It has been challenging post pandemic to encourage new volunteers through the gates and as a result some activities have slowed or been put on hold. We are, as always, indebted to everyone, our employees & our volunteers alike, for their on-going commitment, continued hard work and support they give to Fat Fluffs. Everyone involved is key to the existence and growth of Fat Fluffs and we could not have achieved the things we have so far without their help.

Activities for generating funds – Fundraising events & initiatives and Trading

This year again the opportunities to raise income from fundraising have been limited due to a slow return from restrictions, dramatically increased attendance costs and the unprecedented heat of the summer. We have been working alongside other charities trying to look at ways to take this forward next year and how we can generate additional funds. There has been a delay in the new online venture of opening a shop for the rescue, which we had hoped to launch this year, but we have made progress and are optimistic this is something we can launch in the coming financial year.

Reserves Policy

We still have our reserve set to the equivalent to 6 months operating costs, allowing for the additional staffing costs, at £45,000 to cover periods of difficulty encountered. This amount will be reviewed periodically at trustees' meetings. As a team we have agreed that with the housing costs and mortgage rises moving site is not a viable option so we have agreed a five year plan with the owner of the site we currently occupy and have invested some of the funds in developing the site, dealing with drainage issues and making better use of the space we have. Consideration of the reserve amount will continue to be taken into account with regards to this allocation whether it be returned funds or saleable assets should it be required.





We have found relationships with the local community have improved this last year and we continue to strive to maintain this.

We continue to work hard to control the day to day running costs of the rescue which we have achieved with the help of our ever faithful volunteers as we see the number of rabbits coming into our rescue increase with their vet requirements. We have seen a positive advance in animal welfare and general overall health of our rabbits with the assistance of our medical staff member although our permanent resident number has only increased slightly due to additions and some losses.

Charitable Activities – Rescue, Rehome & Sanctuary

Our sanctuary rabbit group of Fat Fluffs, as mentioned above, has increased slightly in number and currently stands at 12, each with ongoing health and behavioural issues. We sadly lost our permanent foster rabbit this year. Our rehoming figures have increased slightly this last year and we remain in a good position to manage our ever increasing number of rabbits on our waiting list. We have, for the sixth year running now, been able to ensure we keep it open for the entirety of the year by keeping the number of rabbits waiting to below 65 with the hope that, despite people continuing to return to the office working environment, we won't see an exponential rise in the number of unwanted pets follow.

All our rabbits are neutered and vaccinated and receive any necessary required vet treatment. We continue to have a good relationship with Vets4Pets in Shirley and Damson House vets who support us with our more difficult cases. We also have the invaluable support of Rebecca at Oaks Vets in Cotteridge, who excels at bunny tooth care and continues to be unimpressed with some of the states of the new rabbits coming in. We operate with a "quality of life" ethic and all our rabbits are cared for and treated as long as we, and their vet, feel they have this. We will not let a rabbit suffer unnecessarily and have sadly had to let a few of our long term, and very special, rabbits go this year.

This year our trustee team remains at 3 trustees and 3 core team committee members who continue to work hard to keep the running of all the areas of the rescue efficient and safe. We are delighted to be in a position where we are now running the rescue with 2 full time staff members and one part time. They are a great team and we hope to be able to build this team to three full time with one part time in the not too distant future.

Our on site team has changed this year. Our committee team member continues to run and oversee the rescue while we endeavour to find the right person to replace her. We found and hired a replacement but he found the emotional toll of rescue too much and resigned after a short while. We do now have Donna working full time with the medical needs of the rabbits and she is settling well into the role and Martin working part time to look after the volunteers and the site. Martin has volunteered with us for three years and so knows the ins and outs of the rescue and has taken to the position like he has always been here.

Again this year our team of volunteers have excelled themselves; we have seen fewer as a whole as many who were on furlough or reduced hours have now returned to the office. Those who volunteered weekly continue to support us and we have some really great work experience placements this year.

As always this year we are indebted to everyone, employees & volunteers alike, for their on-going commitment, continued hard work and support they give to Fat Fluffs. Everyone involved is key to the existence and growth of Fat Fluffs and we could not have achieved the things we have so far without their help.

Activities for generating funds – Fundraising events & initiatives and Trading

This year we have again had little income from fundraising, due to ongoing restrictions, but we have been working alongside other charities trying to look at ways to take this forward next year and how we can generate additional funds. We have also been looking at a new online venture opening a shop for the rescue. This is something we hope to launch in the next financial year.

Reserves Policy

We still have our reserve set to the equivalent to 6 months operating costs, allowing for the additional staffing costs, at £25,000 to cover periods of difficulty encountered. This amount will be reviewed periodically at trustees' meetings. As a team, the year before last, we agreed we needed to look at the possibility of moving site again with the allocated £60,000 which, for now, remains in a restricted fund to facilitate this. However, due to the change in the economy this last year or so, we are reconsidering our options and looking the ways to best use the income and reflect the welfare standards we support for our rabbits. Consideration of the reserve amount will continue to be taken into account with regards to this allocation whether it be returned funds or saleable assets should it be required.





Despite the difficulties we have continued to work hard to control the day to day running costs of the rescue which we have achieved with the help of our ever faithful volunteers and we continue to see the number of rabbits coming into our rescue and be rehomed remain steady. We have seen a positive advance in animal welfare and general overall health of our rabbits with the assistance of our medical staff member although our permanent resident number has stayed the same due to additions and some losses.

Charitable Activities – Rescue, Rehome & Sanctuary

Our sanctuary rabbit group of Fat Fluffs, as mentioned above, has remained steady in number and currently stands at 10, each with ongoing health and behavioural issues. We still have just the 1 permanent foster rabbit bringing the total number of permanent residents under our care to 11. Our rehoming figures have remained steady this last year and we remain in a good position to manage our ever increasing number of rabbits on our waiting list. We have, for the sixth year running now, been able to ensure we keep it open for the entirety of the year by keeping the number of rabbits waiting to below 55 with the hope that, despite people starting to slowly go back to work, we won't see an exponential rise in the number of unwanted pets follow.

All our rabbits are neutered and vaccinated and receive any necessary required vet treatment. We continue to have a good relationship with Vets4Pets in Shirley and Damson House vets who support us with our more difficult cases. We also have the invaluable support of Rebecca at Oaks Vets in Cotteridge, who excels at bunny tooth care and continues to be unimpressed with some of the states of the new rabbits coming in. We operate with a "quality of life" ethic and all our rabbits are cared for and treated as long as we, and their vet, feel they have this. We will not let a rabbit suffer unnecessarily and have sadly had to let a few of our long term, and very special, rabbits go this year.

This year our trustee team remains at 3 trustees and 3 core team committee members who continue to work hard to keep the running of all the areas of the rescue efficient and safe. We are now currently running the rescue with 1 full time staff members on furlough and a team of volunteers.

Our team has changed somewhat with Sophie being on furlough for much of the year and Lucy finding another job elsewhere so leaving us in July. Jo found herself unable to travel home when the lockdown restrictions were brought in, and as a self employed member of staff, we agreed to terminate her employment so we could find someone who could take over the position on a permanent basis.

Due to the ongoing restrictions and lack of boarding income, we have yet to find the right people to replace these positions and one of our trustees has been covering the health care position on a voluntary basis being able to do so due to their own personal reduced hours at work and one of our committee team members, who is retired, has been supporting the managing of the rescue.

Again this year our team of volunteers have excelled themselves and many who were on furlough or reduced hours or who volunteered weekly anyway gave up their time to ensure the care of the animals was maintained. We changed our visitation policies and, as restrictions at the vets started to lift we not only continued to take in any serious cases to ensure we did our bit to ensure as many animals as possible didn't suffer for the lockdown but we also able to open up for animals that had been on our list a while.

This year more than ever we are indebted to everyone, employees & volunteers alike, for their on-going commitment, continued hard work and support they give to Fat Fluffs. Everyone involved is key to the existence and growth of Fat Fluffs and we could not have achieved the things we have so far without their help.

Activities for generating funds – Fundraising events & initiatives and Trading

This year we have had no income from fundraising due to ongoing restrictions. It has made little difference to our net finance as the current situation has also meant we have been restricted on the amount of vets visits we can have and our expenditure, as a result, has remained lower meaning our overall accounts reflect little change.

Reserves Policy




