Para 1.17 and 1.19	<p>The Trustees of the JTYAF have enabled numerous local young people to pursue their aspirations and develop as individuals. As a Board of Trustees, we have diligently provided financial assistance, particularly for leisure activities and pursuits, to help selected young people enhance their skills and capabilities.</p> <p>The charity has enabled students to attend educational courses, supported talented athletes who have gone on to compete at national and international levels, made it possible for young people to participate in life-changing expeditions and encouraged creative talents.</p> <p>We have achieved this by awarding scholarships and bursaries to deserving young individuals, chosen by the organisations we support, thereby encouraging personal growth and achievement. Additionally, we have granted Discretionary Awards to young people not affiliated with any of our supported organisations and have also funded various school and group projects.</p> <p>In 2025, we provided almost £62,000 in awards to support young people, funding 115 individuals and 18 whole school and group projects.</p> <p>The charity allocated funding for support to young people from 18 youth organisations including, Ferndown Upper School, Dorset & Wilts Air Cadets, Beaucroft Foundation School, Ferndown</p>

		<p>Middle School, St Michael's Middle School, West Moors Middle School, Ferndown First School, Parley First School, Hampreston First School, the Boscombe Youth Fiddle Orchestra, the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme, Bournemouth, Christchurch and Poole and the Shires, Dorset. Dorset Scouts and Christchurch Division Scouts. Dorset Guides, the Bournemouth Sea Cadets & Royal Marine Cadets, Swim Bournemouth and Child in the Wild Forest School.</p> <p>The Discretionary Fund was used to provide opportunities for young people who are not members of the JTYAF's supported organisations. During 2025 a total of £9,364 was awarded to support 9 individuals and 5 group projects.</p> <p>The charity also continues to fund the lease for a 16-seater minibus, serving 7 local schools plus numerous local youth organisations.</p>

<p>Contribution made by volunteers</p>	<p>Para 1.38</p>	<p>Throughout 2025, the JTYAF was busy with various fundraising events, all of which were greatly supported by our dedicated volunteers and supporters.</p> <p>The '40 for JT' Challenge which was created in honour of John Thornton's 40th birthday truly inspired our supporters and saw literally hundreds of participants raise an incredible £42,000.</p> <p>JTYAF volunteers organised several events including the popular Curry Night, Trout Fishing Day, and also the Bingo Night, which was a tremendous success.</p> <p>Our Afternoon Tea event truly showcased the power of volunteer support. More than 15 volunteers ensured everything ran smoothly, from welcoming guests and making sandwiches to serving and washing up.</p> <p>We were also honoured to be chosen by the Mayor of Ferndown as his Charity of the Year for 2024/25. The Mayors Quiz Night was a hugely popular event and in total the mayor raised £5000 for the JTYAF.</p>

A 13-year-old athlete who was selected to represent Great Britain in trampolining at the Scalabis Cup in Portugal, received a bursary to cover the cost of her competition fees.

A student in her second year of an A Level Photography course received a bursary towards a DSLR Camera. This conscientious student is aiming to achieve an A grade at A level but has been borrowing cameras throughout her course. She will now be able to access a camera which will enable her to produce the high-quality imagery required at A level.

Dorset & Wilts Wing Air Cadets

In 2025, the JTYAF provided more than £6,000 in funding to assist cadets. This support covered travel expenses for 42 cadets attending a Remembrance Camp in Northern France and helped a 15-year-old cadet take part in a school volunteering trip to Costa Rica.

Boscombe Youth Fiddle Orchestra

A £4,000 award provided scholarships for 12 exceptionally talented young violinists, giving them the chance to enhance their musical abilities through 1:1 tuition. The John Thornton Music Scholars ranged from beginners to those studying at Grade 8. This community music project targets children and young people in Boscombe, particularly those from disadvantaged families, who otherwise would not have access to such musical opportunities.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award Schemes, Dorset, Bournemouth Christchurch & Poole

The JTYAF supported 39 young people in participating in the DofE, which builds confidence and self-esteem. Our support covered registration fees, expedition costs, and essential equipment such as walking boots.

Additionally, the charity provided funding for the DofE Programme at Wey Valley Academy Cornerstone Academy, and Gillingham School, to help with the purchase of tents and essential equipment for expeditions.

West Moors Middle School

The JTYAF provided essential support to two students from West Moors Middle School, enabling them to participate in a residential school trip that would have otherwise been inaccessible.

Additionally, the charity provided funding to enhance the library resources at West Moors Middle School. A selection of new, high-quality and diverse books, will complement the Accelerated Reader programme—ensuring every

<p>Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.</p>	<p>Para 1.20</p>	<p>The JTYAF has marked its 17th year with notable success, reaching a total of over £1,100,000 awarded since 2008. These awards have significantly impacted the lives of more than 2,650 young people, and supported over 200 projects in school communities, and a wide range of youth groups.</p> <p>During 2025 almost £62,000 was awarded to individuals and groups. The charity also continues to fund the lease for a 17-seater minibus, serving 7 local schools plus numerous local youth organisations. The charity provided funding to support young people from 18 youth organisations.</p> <p>Examples of this support includes: -</p> <p>Ferndown Upper School £15,000 was awarded in scholarships and bursaries to 30 individuals and also supported the refurbishment of the school library. Funding was awarded for activities ranging from a Synchronised Swimming Course to Trampolining Competitions, World Challenge Expeditions, Athletics Competitions, golf, music and photography.</p> <p>One of the scholarships provided funding for a talented 13-year-old student to purchase a Ceili and Solo Costume for the Irish Dancing World Championships in Dublin. The costume required for competition at this level is quite expensive, but with the support of JTYAF, she was able to take part in the World Championships with an elegant costume that will serve her for many years.</p>

		<p>This is not an exhaustive list, but it illustrates the diversity that the JTYAF encourages, and the significant benefits provided to young people in our community. Despite the numerous challenges that young people and their families continue to face, the JTYAF is privileged to offer support during these difficult times. Many young individuals have been able to participate in activities they otherwise wouldn't have had access to, and school projects funded by the JTYAF have made a real difference in the lives of those who have benefited from them.</p> <p>The JTYAF has continued to develop links with other organisations and has had several business partners during the year, including Ferndown & Parley Rotary Club, Wimborne Rotary Club, , Custom Creations, Hudsons and Asda.</p>

This initiative will make a wide range of high-quality audiobooks accessible to those who find independent reading more challenging, helping every child to experience the joy of reading in a way that works for them.</p> <p>Dorset Guides and Scouts The JTYAF supported 13 Guides and Scouts which included funding for equipment for an Inter-railing Trip, a Powerboat Level 1 and Dinghy Sailing courses for 9 Scouts, a contribution towards a volunteering trip to India with the Guides, and a Guiding trip to Paris.</p> <p>Discretionary Fund The Discretionary Fund supported five group projects and nine individuals with almost £10,000. Awards included: -</p> <p>A University Student from Wimborne received a bursary which contributed towards a self-propelling wheelchair. This will make a huge difference to her everyday life, allowing her to get around campus and continue her studies at university, despite the challenges she faces with her mobility.</p> <p>Funding enabled Cattistock Cricket Club to purchase a mobile net and an artificial wicket, significantly improving their training and coaching facilities. Junior players now have better opportunities to practice their batting and bowling techniques, helping them to build skills and progress in the sport.</p> <p>One of our young achievers was able to join his teammates from the GBG Saracens Powerchair Football Team at the National Championships in Nottingham thanks to the JTYAF funding his accommodation costs</p> <p>The Bournemouth Youth Handbell Team received funding to help with the travel costs for a concert tour in Barcelona where they performed at three distinguished venues, including the magnificent Basilica de la Sagrada Familia.</p> <p>Swim Bournemouth The JTYAF provides a scholarship that covers 50% of swimming and competition fees, enabling a talented young man to continue his training in his chosen sport.</p>





Dorset & Wilts Wing Air Cadets

In 2024, the JTYAF awarded nearly £2,500 in funding to support two Air Cadets' adventure with the Tall Ships Trust, provide equipment for Adventure Training, and replace the ensign for 2358 (Ferndown) Squadron.

Air Cadet Junior Leaders Course

JTYAF funding of £18,000 enabled a team of 10 Qualified Air Cadet Junior Leaders to travel to Washington, further enhancing their leadership skills developed during the Junior Leaders Course. This was truly a life-changing experience for these outstanding young leaders.

Boscombe Youth Fiddle Orchestra

A £4,000 award provided scholarships for 12 exceptionally talented young violinists, giving them the chance to enhance their musical abilities through 1:1 tuition. The John Thornton Music Scholars ranged from beginners to those studying at Grade 8. This community music project targets children and young people in Boscombe, particularly those from disadvantaged families, who otherwise would not have access to such musical opportunities.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award Schemes, Dorset, Bournemouth Christchurch & Poole

The JTYAF supported 20 young people in participating in the DofE, which builds confidence and self-esteem. Our support covered registration fees, expedition costs, and essential equipment such as walking boots.

Additionally, the charity provided funding for the DofE Programme at Gryphon School, ensuring that essential equipment like jet boils and tent poles was available for expeditions.

West Moors Middle School

The JTYAF provided essential support to students from West Moors Middle School, enabling them to participate in a residential school trip that would have otherwise been inaccessible.

Additionally, four students received funding to continue their music and swimming lessons, which would have been cancelled without JTYAF support, due to the financial pressures faced by their families.

Bournemouth Sea Cadets & Royal Marine Cadets

The Bournemouth Sea Cadets utilized their award allocation to fund Offshore Voyages for two Sea Cadets and to purchase an MTA Leadership kit.

Discretionary and Accessibility Funds

The Discretionary Fund supported two group projects and ten individuals.

Four young athletes received funding for travel costs, enabling them to participate in competitions with Team GB in their respective sports.

A young lady with exceptional talent in aerial arts was funded for her fees and travel costs, allowing her to attend a specialist one-week intensive training course at Ecole Nationale de Cirque in Montreal.

Two students, aged 16 and 17, were supported to join volunteering expeditions in Zanzibar and Borneo, while a talented 16-year-old musician attended a Music Course with the National Youth Brass Band.

Funding was awarded to two group projects, including the Compass Learning Centre, where support for essential expedition clothing has enabled six students to participate in the Army 10 Tors Challenge in 2025.

The Accessible Fund contributed towards an off-road buggy for a 7-year-old who loves the outdoors. This new buggy will allow him to explore his favourite places, such as the woods and the beach, with his friends.

Swim Bournemouth

The JTYAF provides a scholarship that covers 50% of swimming and competition fees, enabling a talented young man to continue his training in his chosen sport.

This is not an exhaustive list, but it illustrates the diversity that the JTYAF encourages, and the significant benefits provided to young people in our community. Despite the numerous challenges that young people and their families continue to face, the JTYAF is privileged to offer support during these difficult times. Many young individuals have been able to participate in activities they otherwise wouldn't have had access to, and school projects funded by the JTYAF have made a real difference in the lives of those who have benefited from them.

The charity also provided funding to help with the setup of the DofE Programme at Atlantic Academy on the Isle of Portland. The Isle of Portland is the third most deprived area in the UK and young people have a limited number of opportunities available to them. The benefits of taking part in the DofE are huge and we are delighted to support the setup of the scheme, with tents, stoves and equipment kits.

Tall Ships Trust

The administration at the Tall Ships Trust has recently undergone a change of personnel and unfortunately the criteria for the JTYAF awards could no longer be met.

West Moors Middle School

The JTYAF supported 4 students from West Moors Middle School, enabling them to take part in residential school trips which would otherwise have not been accessible to these students.

The school also received an additional award of £6000 which will fund match the amount raised by their parents to cover the cost of an outdoor Amphitheatre.

Time spent in an outdoor space has been shown to have a positive impact on children's mental health and wellbeing. This outdoor learning environment will bring the school community together and provide a platform for the children to express their feelings and emotions in addition to showcasing their performing skills in front of an audience.

Bournemouth Sea Cadets & Royal Marine Cadets

Used their award allocation to pay for 8 Sea Cadets to take part in an Offshore Power Courses, Sailing Courses and voyages.

Discretionary and Accessibility Funds

The Discretionary Fund supported several group projects including cricket development for Ferndown Wayfarers Youth Cricket Teams by funding the purchase of mats for their indoor training.

A Middle School performing in the Young Voices competition at the O2 Arena in 2024 received a JTYAF award which made the trip accessible for the whole choir by covering the cost of the coach.

The JTYAF funded hall rental to help with the setup of a junior table tennis club in Cattistock.

Awards were made to 13 individuals. These included funding for travel and accommodation

	<p>costs to support a young athlete to compete in Power-chair football in Nottingham.</p> <p>Similarly, a young man travelling to the World Snooker Federation Junior Champs in Albania received support for accommodation costs. 

The charity has again received a substantial personal donation and funds have been raised by many individuals and groups. The charity has also been supported by a range of businesses through 'charity of the year' status. These funds have secured the continued success of the charity and will support awards for 2023.</p> <p>During 2022 over £88,500 was awarded to individuals and groups. The charity also continues to fund the lease for a 17-seater minibus, serving 7 local schools plus numerous local youth organisations.</p> <p>The charity provided funding to support young people from 20 youth organisations. Examples of this support includes:-</p> <p>Ferndown Upper School Almost £17,500 was awarded as a music scholarship and 49 bursaries for individuals. Funding supported students of photography, music, media, and several different sports together with support for volunteering expeditions in Borneo, Thailand and Ghana. As an example, an award was made to a 15 year old to pay for travel expenses and equipment for her to take part in the Irish Dancing Championships in Dublin.</p> <p>JTYAF funding reduced the cost of a Design and Technology trip to Paris making it accessible for 15 Pupil Premium students. 19 Pupil Premium students also received financial support for their Year 9 Residential Trip.</p> <p>The JTYAF supported several whole school projects. Dorset & Wilts Wing Air Cadets

The JTYAF funded an Air Cadet's attendance at Easter Cadet Camp, an Organist's Summer School for a talented musician, together with the Nijmegen Marches for an individual Air Cadet. The JTYAF also paid for an MTA Leadership Training kit for 874 (Sherbourne) Squadron.

Air Cadet Junior Leaders Course

The Air Cadet Junior Leaders Course resumed in 2022 and JTYAF funding paid for a team of 15 Qualified Air Cadet Junior Leaders to take part in an Outward Bound Course further developing and improving the leadership skills acquired during the Junior Leaders Course.

A flying scholarship was proposed but this did not go ahead. Funding was allocated but not used.

The John Thornton Music Scholars ranged in ability from the youngest beginners to those studying at Grade 7.

This community music project is specifically aimed at children and young people in Boscombe who would not otherwise have access to music opportunities of this type, particularly from disadvantaged families.

The JTYAF was delighted to hear that a former John Thornton Music Scholar has recently taken a place at Cardiff University to study music.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award Schemes, Dorset, Bournemouth Christchurch & Poole

The JTYAF supported 19 young people to take part in the D of E which builds confidence and develops self-esteem. It requires persistence, commitment and has a lasting impact on the attitudes and outlook of all young people who take part. JTYAF support helped with registration fees, expedition costs and essential equipment such as walking boots.

Dorset & Wilts Fire and Rescue Service Cadets Scheme

The JTYAF funded 6 sessions of cricket coaching to support a young Fire Cadet's ambition to achieve a place in the Dorset County Squad. Funding to pay for essential equipment and walking boots also enabled a Fire Cadet to take part in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme and complete her Bronze Expedition.

Tall Ships Trust

20 Year 8 pupils from St Michael's Middle School were able to experience a 4-day residential voyage with the Tall Ships Trust due to £900 of JTYAF funding.

West Moors Middle School

The JTYAF supported 3 students from West Moors Middle School, enabling them:-

- to continue with Scouts by providing funding for fees, activity days and uniform,
- to continue with piano lessons and
- to take part in a residential school trip.

Bournemouth Sea Cadets & Royal Marine Cadets

Used their award allocation to purchase DofE and meteorology equipment for the unit and also to pay for 3 Sea Cadets to take part in an Offshore Power Course.

The Jubilee Fund

£34,000 was awarded to 6 local schools in celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The Jubilee Funding was made available for special enrichment projects aimed at supporting the mental health and wellbeing of the children.

Ferndown Upper School used their award to fully fund a wall art project which will provide visual mental health support for all the students. The funding also contributed towards the development of the student area in the Inclusion Hub for higher need SEND students.

Ferndown Middle School created a Tranquillity Garden and their award contributed towards the ground works and planting. The new garden provides a quiet, peaceful space for children to reflect at break and lunchtimes. The space is also used for counselling and well-being activities to support children's mental health.

Beaucroft Foundation School used their funding to help to provide a performance space for students. The outside stage offers many benefits for the whole school community, being used informally at playtime, and more formally for the legendary Beaucroft talent shows.

	<p>At Ferndown First School the School Council put together their bid for funding for a Play Trail and used their award to pay for the centre piece climbing frame. The importance of outside play in early years can't be underestimated and is invaluable for a child's development.</p> <p>Parley First School have installed a Mongolian Yurt in the Forest School Area, paid for by their JTYAF funding. This will be used throughout the year to provide both shelter and a calming space for children to receive teaching and a range of therapies including Mindfulness and Yoga.</p> <p>At Hampreston First School an IT Suite will be converted to a Reading Room with help from the JTYAF. 




