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Trustees' Report

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements and auditors' report of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2025.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objects

The charity's purposes, as set out in the objects contained in the company's Memorandum of Association, are to promote any charitable purpose for the benefit of the community in the north of East Cheshire and surrounding areas, by the advancement of education, the protection and preservation of health and the relief of poverty, sickness and distress.

The charity's objectives are defined as above. Our aims are focused on:

- Providing the advice people need for the problems they face, and
- Improving the policies and practices that affect people's lives.

Our service provides free, independent, confidential and impartial advice to everyone on their rights and responsibilities. We value diversity, promote equality and challenge discrimination.

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Ensuring our work delivers our aims

Cheshire East Citizens Advice Bureau North, trading as Citizens Advice Cheshire North, (otherwise referred to as CACN in these accounts), aims to provide free, confidential, impartial and independent advice, information and advocacy for the benefit of the local community, to exercise a responsible influence on the development of social policies by research and campaigning to ensure individuals do not suffer through a lack of knowledge or an inability to express their needs effectively.

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year. The annual review seeks to examine our achievements and outcome. Together with the success of individual key projects and the benefits that have been born from them. In carrying out the review we are ensuring that that our aims, objectives and activities are in line with our stated purpose.

Our main objectives for the year have been developing our service so that it really meets the needs of the clients we are trying to support. Key activities have included:

- Gaining funding to continue our family focussed advice service, aimed at alleviating financial hardship for the benefit of local families.
- Expanding our service to include Handforth. We now provide advice face to face in all the towns in our locality, as well as providing telephone and email advice.
- Providing a benefits service for cancer patients at Macclesfield Hospital under a Macmillan funding.
- Continually reviewing, and improving where necessary, the quality of the advice we deliver to all our clients.
- Revising our training model to allow more new advisers to be trained to replace the net loss of experienced advisers throughout the covid pandemic.

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Public benefit

Our main activities and who we try to help are described below. All our charitable activities focus on providing the advice people need for the problems they face and are undertaken specifically to provide public benefit. The board of trustees have had due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2011.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Advice and information services

The main areas of charitable activity are:

1) The provision of general advice and information services.

2) The provision of specialist advice and casework services.

- Specialist debt advice funded by the Money and Pensions Service.
- Specialist welfare benefits advice funded through Macmillan with the aim of maximising income for those affected by cancer.
- Advice aimed at those suffering mental ill-health, provided by caseworkers experienced at dealing with clients struggling with complex health issues.
- Provision of advice centred around the Cheshire East Council Family Service with sessions held within Family Centre Hubs, with 4 years of funding gained from The National Lottery Community Fund in January 2025, allowing continuation of the service.

3) Acting as a Hate Crime Reporting Centre.

Throughout the year we have continued to offer Advice and Information in the following ways:

- Face to face - during the year we have offered face to face advice across our locality 5 days a week.
- Telephone - we offer a Cheshire East local area code number on Advice Line - participation is continuing as part of a county-wide telephone service. The line is covered on a rota basis between the hours of 9.30am and 4.00pm from Monday to Thursday, and 9.30 and 1pm on Friday. Outside of these times there is an automated advice service 24 hours a day.
- General and specialist advice through our team of trained advisers and paid staff.

During the year CACN provided high quality and free advice to clients, with over 9,500 client related activities during the year. These were generated from over 3,000 unique clients bringing over 9,500 different issues during the year. (2023/2024 2,800+ unique clients bringing 8,800+ different issues over the year.)

Enquiries continue to consist of several complex issues.

- Debt 11% (2023/2024 13%)
- Welfare benefits 53% (2023/2024 51%)

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- Employment 4% (2023/2024 4%)
- Housing 10% (2023/2024 9%)
- Relationships 6% (2023/2024 6%)

In total CACN's service generated a total of over £3,000,000 (2023/2024: over £2,000,000) in additional income for its clients.

Clients continue to present with multiple problems and on average clients are presenting with 3 issues each. This reflects the fact that easy queries can be solved through the many on-line information guides, and so our clients needing assistance to resolve their issues generally have either a complex issue or are themselves struggling.

Contribution of volunteers and paid staff

The charity success could not have been achieved without the hard work and dedication of volunteers and staff. The trustee board and senior management team recognise the tremendous contribution made by the charity's volunteers in advising the public and administering the service without which the service could not operate. Throughout 2024/25 the service employed 22 paid workers (10 FTEs) (2023/24 17 paid workers, 10 FTEs), and 39 volunteers (2023/24: 36 volunteers).

The volunteers contributed approximately 12,600 hours of work to the service during the year. We estimate the value of this help at £199,700 in respect of the year. (2023/24 £164,600 for 10,300 hours).

The trustees are also volunteers and provide another 1,200 hours a year, at an additional value of £32,900 (2023/24 £31,600).

This gives a total of volunteer manpower valued at £232,600

Factors affecting the achievement of objectives

Maintaining sufficient funding to continue delivering the service remains a continual challenge. During 24/25 we increased our investment in fundraising, and this has meant that we ran some additional projects. However many projects are only funded for 1 year, so funding remains challenging.

The complexity of the issues that clients are facing, together with the additional challenges that many clients are experiencing, places additional demands on the service. The support networks that were previously in place for people are changing and we are asked to offer support that falls outside the remit of direct advice. Where people are vulnerable, it is essential that we offer support in a person-centred way and whilst necessary this can be resource intensive.

The major factor affecting the achievement of objectives remains funding. Our core Universal Information and Advice contract with Cheshire East Council was reissued until 31 March 2027, with a potential 2 year extension.

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The quality of our advice is key to our success and, to ensure CACN is maintaining high standards, it regularly seeks external accreditation. Our Customer Service and Advice Quality are audited under national Citizens Advice standards, and for 2024/25 we have again achieved the highest level of compliance.

The ongoing cost of living crisis continued to increase demand for our service, often for clients with multiple issues to address. This increasing demand has necessitated the need to find more efficient methods of delivering support and alternative sources of additional funding.

The Trustee Board extends their gratitude to Will McKellar, Liz Heathcote, Jenny Archard, and Jenny Owen in promoting an environment where staff and volunteers feel they are a key resource and are fully motivated.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The availability of funding in the charity sector remains difficult in a period of austerity. The charity is focused on providing added value to its funders from a base of sound financial management and ensuring that our services remain relevant to the strategic objectives of stakeholders at a local and national level.

Incoming resources in the year were £425,615 (2023/24 £431,988). Of this £79,624 (2023/24 £67,915) related to restricted project activities.

A surplus of £30,148 made in the year (2023/24 £26,333), after offsetting £12,031 (2023/24 £11,127) against restricted funds.

At 31 March 2025 total funds were £397,528 (31 March 2024 £367,380) of which £0 was in restricted funds (2023/24 £458), £142,000 was in designated funds (2023/24 £125,000) and £255,528 was in unrestricted funds (2023/24 £241,922).

Principal funding sources

The Trustees extend their gratitude to Cheshire East Council who continued to support the core universal generalist advice service of the charity. Wilmslow, Macclesfield, Knutsford and Poynton Town Councils are also funding advice services in their localities. Additionally, service specific funding was received via contracts from Cheshire East Council, The National Lottery Community Fund, Integrated Care Partnership, the Money and Pensions Service, Macmillan and National Citizens Advice.

The charity did not have any borrowings from any providers of funding or other sources at the balance sheet date.

Investment policy and objectives

As required in its Memorandum paragraph 4.11, furtherance of its objects, and for no other purposes, CACN has the power to invest its monies, not immediately required for its purposes, in or upon such investments, securities or property as may be thought fit, subject nevertheless to such conditions and such consents as may for the time being be imposed or required by law.

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Reserves policy

CACN is required to ensure that free monies are available in each financial year to meet any reasonably foreseeable contingency. The charity will maintain a projection of income for at least 2 years ahead and will ensure that this continues to be derived from as wide a variety of sources as possible. It will take all necessary steps to ensure that at no time within this period would it be possible for the cessation of one or more funding streams to present so serious a challenge to the future of the organisation that it could not be managed so as to continue to provide a best value advice service.

In reviewing the potential costs that could arise should a significant reduction in income be incurred the Trustees have determined that 'free' reserves should be equivalent to six months normal operating expenditure, as recommended by Citizens Advice. This year CACN has achieved this position.

The reasons for holding particular reserves are outlined in note 10.

Going concern

After making further appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

FUTURE PLANS

Developing a sustainable service that meets the needs of our clients remains a priority of the trustee board for 2025/26. The charity will build on the work completed in the previous financial year to develop diversified funding streams to increase our sustainability and enable us to build a diverse service that is responsive to client needs.

The charity will continue to work to ensure that it delivers a cost-effective service, meaning that we are not only offering value for money to our existing funders but that we have a viable offer, whilst never compromising on the high quality service that our clients expect and deserve.

Having reviewed the risks the charity is facing, the trustees have extended the funding for the services of a part-time bid writer into 25/26 to enable us to continue increasing the number of funding bids submitted and to build our capacity in this area.

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STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Cheshire East Citizens Advice Bureau North (CACN) was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on 11th February 2009. The charity commenced operations on 1st April 2009 at which date the assets and liabilities of the unincorporated Macclesfield Wilmslow and District Citizens Advice Bureau were acquired. This charity was formed on 7th October 1997 as a merger of the Wilmslow and Macclesfield Bureaux, which were originally constituted in 1940 and 1966 respectively. The maximum liability of each member is limited to £10 and on 31 March 2025 the company had 11 members (2024: 8).

Cheshire East Citizens Advice Bureau North is a registered charity. Following a re-branding exercise by the national Citizens Advice service in 2015 the company is now known as Citizens Advice Cheshire North (otherwise referred to as CACN in these accounts). Outreaches are sometimes referred to as Citizens Advice Wilmslow, Citizens Advice Knutsford or Citizens Advice Poynton.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association, as amended on 24 February 2009, 12 September 2016, 11 September 2017 and May 2023 are the governing documents of the charity.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The charity is governed through a trustee board. Trustees who have held office during the year are listed on page 11. The Articles of Association provide for a minimum of four and a maximum of fifteen trustees. The trustees meet 6 times per year with additional quarterly meetings for the sub-committees listed below.

Trustees are elected to the Board for a three-year period and are appointed by a resolution of its members at an AGM. The board has powers to co-opt members who shall retire at the following AGM and may offer themselves for re-election.

The board is supported by a network of sub-committees, covering Finance; Governance; Executive; Health and Safety; Human Resources; Operations and Risk; and Technology.

The trustees who have served during the year can be seen on page 13. None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £10 in the event of a winding up.

The organisation is co-ordinated from its office in Macclesfield.

Trustee induction and training

New trustees are briefed on their legal obligations under charity and company law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the committee and decision-making processes, the business plan and recent financial performance of the charity. They also meet key employees and other trustees. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate the understanding of their role.

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Organisation structure

CACN is a member of Citizens Advice, the operating name of the National Association of Citizens Advice Bureaux, which provides a framework for standards of advice and casework management as well as monitoring progress against these standards. Operating policies are independently determined by the Board of Directors in order to fulfil its charitable objects and comply with the national membership requirements.

The Chief Officer of the organisation has been appointed by the trustees to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity. In addition, there is an experienced team of paid staff and volunteers who are key to the service offered by the charity. Decisions are made by the trustee board in line with the Business Development Plan and are reviewed at least annually.

The Senior Management Team meets to review progress against targets and the Charity's financial position and to discuss issues referred to them by the trustee board. Reports and recommendations are then taken to the full board for approval, and their implementation is organised by the Chief Officer and the staff team. There are regular staff, volunteer and senior management team meetings which ensure that progress is being made against targets.

Pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The trustees consider that the board of trustees and the senior management team (SMT) comprise the key management personnel of the charity. The trustee board review staff pay rises annually for all staff.

Key risks and uncertainties

CACN performs an annual Risk Management exercise. A risk management strategy and risk register were agreed by the Trustee Board. The Trustees recognise that any major risks to which the charity is exposed need to be reviewed and systems put in place to mitigate those risks. To that end CACN is continually monitoring and managing its risk, reviewing the risk register and ensuring action plans are in place to mitigate its key risks.

Included in external risks is that of the loss of funding. The effects of this are minimised by the procedures in place, which result in funding being secured from a variety of sources. The charity continues to seek to diversify its funding sources. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects and to ensure consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charitable bureau. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet the needs of the charity.

Cheshire East Council remains our largest single funder and should they continue to pass on its own restrictions in funding to organisations like ours, the consequences will only cause further hardship and a reduction in our capacity to maintain current delivery. Due to this we are consistently looking to diversify our income streams, and have made significant strides to maintain the funding support from the Money and Pensions Service (MAPS), Town Councils in Wilmslow, Poynton, Knutsford and Macclesfield. In addition, we have had grants from the NHS Cheshire and Wirral Integrated Care Board, Macmillan, and funding via Citizens Advice, prior to gaining funding from The National Lottery Community Fund, for our Family Advice.

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The trustees, having had consideration to and mindful of the risk factors for the charity, identify the following:

A. Securing funding remains a serious challenge not just to maintain but also to develop our service. We understand that the next few years are critical for us in terms of our sustainability and ultimately our long term survival, the Trustees are taking this risk very seriously and are responding accordingly

B. The funding climate is not getting any easier, nor do we expect it to improve any time soon - coupled with this demand for our service is increasing meaning that we risk being unable to carry on meeting our clients' needs and experience reputational risk as a result.

C. In order that we can continue to deliver it is essential that we maintain our volunteer base. We, along with many other Local Citizens Advice, are finding it harder to attract suitable volunteers.

Trustees plans and strategies for managing these risks.

A. A fundraising strategy was developed for the 24/25 financial year that broadens our approach to income generation, and this will continue to be developed in 25/26 as we are working towards building our unrestricted income to allow us to create a cushion should we face further reductions in our funding levels.

B. A bid writer is now employed to ensure the charity has sufficient capacity to submit funding applications and increase our chances of success, and during 24/25 produced a return on investment of over 300%

C. The training plan for new advisers has been reviewed and updated to enable us to increase the volunteer pool. This has been working successfully, with new volunteers having been increased from 8 to 12 per year.

Factors that are likely to affect the financial performance or position in 2025/26 and further years:

- Core funding is currently received from Cheshire East Council in the form of a contract currently in place until 31st March 2027, with a potential extension of 2 years.

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- The political environment remains uncertain, the impact of key national developments is still very much an 'unknown quantity' but has the potential to impact on our position.
- A possible increased competition in an ever-changing voluntary sector marketplace - we know that the voluntary sector is becoming a much more competitive sector, particularly as funding becomes ever harder to access, as a result we are seeing organisations diversifying their service offer and moving further towards our 'core market'

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- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

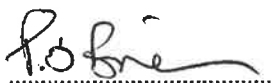

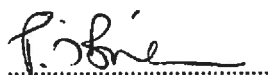

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)) (issued in October 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Basis of preparation

Cheshire East Citizens Advice Bureau North meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Grant receivable

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably.

Gifts and intangible income

In addition to the above, the charity also receives help and support in the form of voluntary assistance in advising the public. This help and support is not included in the financial statements. However, its value to the charity has been estimated and disclosed in the trustees' report.

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Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

Bank interest

Bank interest is included in the Statement of Financial Activities on receipt.

Deferred income

Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charitable company earns the right to the consideration by its performance. Where income is received in advance of performance it is treated as deferred income and included within creditors.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Raising funds

These are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, the management of investments and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

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Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are allocated out of unrestricted funds by the trustees for specific purposes. The use of such funds is at the trustees' discretion.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Cash flow

Citizens Advice Cheshire North has taken advantage of the exemptions in FRS1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small company.

Fund Descriptions

General Funds

These are the accumulated unrestricted funds of the charity.

Designated Funds

Cash Flow Buffer

Many projects are paid quarterly in arrears after statistics have been submitted and analysed by the funder. The result is that CACN has to find the operational costs of these projects for up to 5 months before receiving funding and the trustees allocate these reserves to cover these periods.

Redundancy Provision

As projects terminate it is not always possible to redeploy the staff and redundancy payments are needed. The trustees have allocated these reserves to cover this contingency.

Premises Reserve

There are contractual obligations on the current lease, and there may be a need to move elsewhere, with all the associated costs. The trustees have allocated these reserves to cover this contingency.

IT Reserve

IT is critical to CACN's operation and much of the current equipment is ageing, with replacement looming. The trustees have allocated these reserves for this development over the next two to three years.

Restricted Funds

HESF - Fuel vouchers

Money originally given by Cheshire East Council to be distributed on their behalf to help clients having difficulty paying their fuel bills. This was a fund which we also opened to public donations. This was increased this year primarily by a donation from Wilmslow Town Council.

The National Lottery Community Fund

Money from the National Lottery Community Fund to provide an advice service for families of children aged from 0-19 (or up to 25 for young people with special educational needs and disabilities)

CCF - SDM

Money from the Cheshire Community Foundation for a joint advocacy project with Stockport and District MIND.

Debt Advice - MaPs

Money from a national Citizens Advice agreement with the Money and Pension Service to provide the wider debt and money advice casework.

Debt Advice - Homelessness

Money from CRISIS to support our work in preventing homelessness through debt.

Macmillan Benefits Advice

Money from a national Citizens Advice agreement with Macmillan to provide benefits advice casework for people affected by cancer.

Funds received as Custodian Agent

CACN acts as custodian of some funds for other local charities to enable rapid distribution to clients when needed. At the year end these were:

£392 on behalf of Wilmslow Aid Trust, a charity that gives grants to people in need within the Wilmslow area. The monies have been used for travel expenses where clients have had to visit the Macclesfield office.

£1,471 on behalf of Knutsford and District Lions Club - a Wenceslas project which collects donated Winter Fuel monies to help the less fortunate avoid fuel debt (£1,325) within the Knutsford area, and a Knutsford hardship fund. (£146)

£2,490 on behalf of Rina's fund which CACN administer to fund Debt Relief Orders for money advice clients who cannot afford the £90 fee. Since the abolishment of DRO fees, the funder has agreed to be flexible with the fund to direct help to those in financial hardship.
