Summary of our main activities for the purpose of Public Benefit

Food Bank, Recycling - Charity Shop, Café - A Social arena to relieve the impact of isolation and loneliness. Memory Lane Café, Time to Talk sessions Chatter Box Group with a main focus on health and wellbeing. A Heritage Centre, which is open to the public.

Provide access to Computers for Community use, WI-FI access, Advisory services including benefits and debt. Opportunities for Education and Training

(subject to funding) as well as training through Volunteering and Work experience opportunities. We also facilitate a Food Bank (now a Food Hub), Community Lunch Days, daily affordable lunches, Genealogy Club, History Group and community Room Hire. However these activities through 22/23 have been subject to 'recovery' having seriously been impacted due to the residual challenges of the COVID Pandemic.

Public Benefit

As Board and a Charity we recognise and follow the Charity Commissions Guidance on public benefit. We ensure our services reflect our Charitable Objectives and are predominately for Public Benefit especially with regard to the relief and prevention of poverty, unemployment as well as providing opportunities for education and training.

We also acknowledge, recognise and thank all those staff and volunteers who have continued to be committed and active through the residual challenges/impact of the pandemic enabling us to continue to meet the needs of those most vulnerable in our communities. Without our dedicated staff and volunteers we would not have been able to implement a Pandemic Recovery response to ensure that we could deliver essential services. They have been crucial to the Charities ability to deliver its core relief of poverty namely a Food Bank and delivering food and lunches to those most in need, provide affordable breakfasts and lunches alongside running our 'Recycle' Charity Shop.

Our Achievements 2022/2023

Our greatest achievement must be that Limestone House, Staff, Volunteers and Trustees have ensured the continuance of delivering relief in Creswell throughout 22/23 with our services having returned to full capacity by the end of 2021 despite the on-going challenges. Throughout 22/23 we saw the footfall and numbers of service users slowly increase however by March 2023 we were still not seeing the footfall or numbers of service users experienced pre-Covid. Despite the challenges we continued to provide a Food Bank supporting on average 50 families each week. Numbers accessing our low cost lunches grew as the year progressed and footfall to our Re-Cycle Charity shop gradually increased. We continued with the support of volunteers to deliver both food parcels and lunches to those most vulnerable and isolated in our community and with a grant we were able to re-open our 'Chatter Box' Group addressing issues of isolation and loneliness. We continued to recognise that significant challenges remained for those most vulnerable not least the worsening financial 'landscape'. Therefore we looked to be able to continue those services already supporting those most in need but also looked to how we might respond to the growing need for information advice

and support. We have therefore continued to facilitate weekly Derbyshire Unemployed Workers (Your Voice Your Rights) sessions enabling 222 face to face enquiries during 2022 and already 138 face to face enquiries during the first half of this year 2023 which demonstrates a growing need and that this is an invaluable service provision. With funding for the Food Bank coming to an end we researched alternatives so that we could continue into 22/23 to provide this essential service and looked to other sources of grant funding so that we could continue to employ a Manager to oversee our recovery and ensure we continue to deliver much needed services. We were successful with both these initiatives. (See financial report) In partnership with Release a Charity supporting people to better manage their finances we started to explore providing a service that would compliment our Food Bank working to ensure that those most vulnerable had better access to financial management and debt advice. During 2022/23 we run this service alongside our Food Bank however due to lack of funding this service ceased in March 2023 although we continue to look for possible funding streams for this initiative as we believe there continues to be a need within our community.

We have during this financial year seen our volunteer numbers grow with some young people wanting to be part of 'what happens' at Limestone House. We have also recruited two new Trustees but sadly a longstanding Trustee Ruth Widdowson stood down at our Annual General Meeting for personal reasons but we are pleased that she continues to support the work of Limestone House by volunteering when her health allows. Our team of 24 volunteers are essential to our ability to continue to provide services as well as offering opportunities to up-skill, build confidence and self esteem. These opportunities include roles within our Café, Charity Shop, Food Bank and more recently with the re-opening of our E-bay Shop.

During this financial year we have undertaken much needed maintenance work on our building and reorganisation of our rooms and storage. The greatest outlay was the replacement of our fire escape to ensure that it met the required 'Fire' standards.

During the build up to Christmas we had a day of celebration, singing carols alongside Mulled Wine (non alcoholic) and mince pies. We also held a 'Christmas Market', which was very successful. In February with the support of a 'Mini' Mental Health grant through Erewash Voluntary we held a 'Time To Talk' Day providing an opportunity for the community to come and explore their understanding of 'mental health' talk freely on the subject giving us also the opportunity to identify the kind of support local people would benefit from. The footfall to the centre on this day was 90 with 29 people as actively engaging with our facilitators and the resources provided. Through this initiative and additional funding we have now initiated regular weekly 'Making Time to Talk' Sessions.

I think our achievements are for those for whom we make a considerable difference from those benefiting for the Food Bank to those just choosing to pop in for a chat and a cuppa. "I don't know what I would do without Limestone House, I would just sit at home doing nothing and meeting no one" (villager) and "This place is just so good for my mental health" (a volunteer)

Finances and Fundraising

The residual challenges of the pandemic continued throughout this financial year and continued to compromise our ability to generate income from our 'trading activities' with 'footfall' still below that of pre-COVID numbers.

There continued to be additional 'fall out' from Trustees being unable to access both Bank Accounts until January 2022 with the administration documents including bank cards, with electronic banking taking significantly longer. It took to September 2022 for all aspects of our banking processes to be in place and thereby supporting our charitable works. During this period we also signed up for Quick Books and withdrew from VAT as our trading income was below the threshold.

We have in this financial year had some successful funding bids:

Foundation Derbyshire April - Support of Food Bank - £4,000
Coldfields Regeneration Trust May - Contribution towards the salary of Limestone House Manager - £10,000
Erewash Voluntary Action, EVA Mini Grant December - Supporting Good Mental Health - £500
Erewash Voluntary Action, EVA Small Grant January- Supporting Good Mental Health - £4820
Derbyshire County Council COVID Recovery Grant February - Supporting Recovery - £1990
J H Rausing Trust February - Supporting Food Bank - £2963.

These grants have enabled us to continue to support those most vulnerable in our community with the Coldfields Regeneration Trust funding ensuring that we could continue to employ a Manager to co-ordinate all of our activities.

Having recognised that by reviewing how we were using and allocating space within Limestone House we could create internal space to better meet our needs as well as being able to generate income from the hire of our rooms. We created a dedicated space for Food Bank storage and moved our Managers office downstairs. Storage was also created to facilitate the re-starting of an E-Bay 'Store' to maximise income for 'high-end' donations. However this re-organisation is a work in progress and has not enabled the increase in income we would have hoped for.

In this financial year we have shown a deficit against income due mainly to us not generating the income to ensure independent sustainability making us

dependent on grant funding. Increased establishment costs including utilities have also had an impact and will continue to do so going forwards. This deficit is expected to be borne by our cash reserves as we continue to plan the steps for recovery recognising that this is not an insignificant challenge.

Challenges going forward

The principal risks facing Limestone going forward continues as stated last year to be that despite 'trading' improving, is our ability to generate sufficient income to sustain our charitable works. This year grants have bridged the gap and we will again in 23/24 seek more grant funding to support our charitable works. We recognise the current challenges relating to the Economy and its impact on the most vulnerable and we are therefore committed to delivering services, which will focus on the prevention and relief of poverty. Having done considerable research into how we can make our Food Bank sustainable due to dwindling grant funding we have adopted a Food Hub model which generates sufficient income to 'buy in food' to support food donations. Our 'Making Time to Talk' project is also an important part of contributing to the Health and Wellbeing of those in our community. We continue to recognise that Limestone House represents income generation and by rationalising how we are using space we can create an opportunity to maximise our assets.

Structure, Governance and Management

We are Charity governed by our Articles of association and Memorandum of Association and a Company Ltd by Guarantee with no share capital.

Trustees are recruited locally and where possible have 'lived experiences' that reflect our Charitable Objectives. We hold an Annual General Meeting and Trustees have to be ratified each year by the Members. No body or organisation can appoint Directors or Trustees only the Board and this is done once a Year by the Members. We provide a rigorous training and support to ensure Trustees and Directors are compliant including an induction. The Board of Trustees continues to meet monthly holding additional meetings when necessary to business.

The Board recognising an over reliance on the role of Chair and Treasurer with regard to structure, governance and management there are now 4 signatories to the bank accounts, a Trustee responsible for staff relations and development, a Chair and Vice Chair to ensure continuity and both a Secretary and Treasurer to ensure good management.

The Charity predominately works to support Creswell and those who live in the surrounding areas but covers Derbyshire in providing training support. We are involved in all parts of the District and County, the Community and Voluntary Sector supporting and informing on its development. We have good

relationships with the Community and Voluntary Sector and are linked with organisations locally.

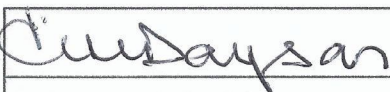
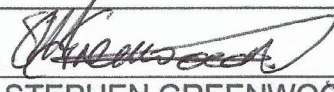

Independent Examiners Report to the Trustees of Limestone House (Elmton and Creswell Village Company) Ltd

We report on the accounts of the charitable company for the year ended 31st March 2023, which are set out on pages 12 to 17.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Trustees (who are also the Directors of the Company for the purpose of Company Law) are responsible for the preparation of the Accounts. 1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with FRS 102, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (as applied to small entities by section 1A of the standard).

Turnover

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of discounts and value added taxes. Turnover includes revenue earned from the sale of goods and from the rendering of services. Turnover from the sale of goods is recognised when the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods have transferred to the buyer. Turnover from the rendering of services is recognised by reference to the stage of completion of the contract. The stage of completion of a contract is measured by comparing the costs incurred for work performed to date to the total estimated contract costs.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:

Freehold buildings	over 50 years
Leasehold land and buildings	over the lease term
Plant and machinery	over 5 years
Fixtures, fittings, tools and equipment	over 5 years

Stocks

Stocks are measured at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost is determined using the first in first out method. The carrying amount of stock sold is recognised as an expense in the period in which the related revenue is recognised.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price (which is usually the invoice price), less any impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts. Loans and other financial assets are initially recognised at transaction price including any transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost determined using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts.

Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at transaction price (which is usually the invoice price). Loans and other financial liabilities are initially recognised at transaction price net of any transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost determined using the effective interest method.

Taxation

A current tax liability is recognised for the tax payable on the taxable profit of the current and past periods. A current tax asset is recognised in respect of a tax loss that can be carried back to recover tax paid in a previous period. Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences between the recognition of income and expenses in the financial statements and their inclusion in tax assessments. Unrelieved tax losses and other deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits. Deferred tax is measured using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date and that are expected to apply to the reversal of the timing difference, except for revalued land and investment property where the tax rate that applies to the sale of the asset is used. Current and deferred tax assets and liabilities are not discounted.

Provisions

Provisions (ie liabilities of uncertain timing or amount) are recognised when there is an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event, it is probable that economic benefit will be transferred to settle the obligation and the amount of the obligation can be estimated reliably.
