Annual Report of the Directors and Trustees

The Directors and Trustees have pleasure in presenting their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2025.

Patrons, Directors and Trustees

The Patrons, Directors and Trustees are listed on page 2.

As planned and mentioned in last year's Report, the chairman of the Board, Squire Gerard de Lisle, stepped down shortly after our year began, on 10 September 2024, after almost 20 years of service. He has been succeeded as Chairman by Gordon Arthur, one of our longest serving Directors and Trustees.

Structure, Governance and Management

Leicestershire Victoria County History Trust is a company limited by guarantee and was incorporated on 28 August 2008, company number 6683052. It was registered as a charity on 16 March 2009, charity number 1128575. It is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, approved by the Directors on 11 February 2009.

The Directors and Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Articles of Association. Additional Directors may be appointed by ordinary resolution of the board.

The board of Directors and Trustees has ultimate legal responsibility for our organisation and works to ensure good governance, with the help of its committees. The board agrees the overall strategic direction and is our highest decision-making body. Its members are volunteers. They work alongside the executive committee, who are responsible for the implementation of policy and for the management of the day-to-day running of the organisation.

The board is committed to ensuring that governance arrangements are effective and relevant, as well as ensuring that the board members reflect the breadth of the services we provide. The board are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities. The board's responsibilities also extend to the ongoing integrity of the financial statements.

Public Benefit

In exercising their powers and duties, the Directors and Trustees have complied with their duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission.

Leicestershire Victoria County History Trust aims to provide (when funds allow) a volunteer programme which is open to anyone in Leicestershire with an interest in the county's history. It provides free training in historical research methods, including skills that the volunteers will be able to use in employment or in other voluntary activities. Sections are being published online as research is completed and are published within books to provide local people and the public more generally with a definitive and accurate history of the towns and villages within the county. The Trust works with schools when funds permit, to provide educational packs that meet the needs of local teachers and the curriculum, and to enthuse and inform pupils about the history of their communities.

Activities, Research and Publications

Research on Loughborough continues, and we are pleased to advise that we have now received sufficient grant funding to be able to publish the first of three books with a focus on Loughborough. *Loughborough Since 1750: A Social and Cultural History* is on course to be published in Spring 2026. The second paperback will cover the working life of Loughborough and its people since 1750, including related topics such as the completion of canals and railways and the introduction of gas, electricity and clean water. Work is in progress on this book, with the date of publication currently uncertain and dependent upon further fundraising, which is underway. These two paperbacks will be published by HobNob Press, a growing local history publisher based in Gloucester who have impressed us with the standard of their other publications. The third book will be one of the iconic VCH 'big red books' and will be a history of Loughborough and some neighbouring villages from the earliest records to the present day. Some work towards this volume, for example on medieval Loughborough, has been completed through specific grants, but much more work will be required.

During the year we also began and completed a piece of research on the history of Nanpantan. This small village on the southern fringe of Loughborough is gradually becoming a suburb to the town through ribbon development along Forest Road and housing development on former Nanpantan farmland. Nanpantan's history was largely unexplored. Almost all that was known was that between 1794 and 1803 coal and minerals from west Leicestershire were transferred at Nanpantan from barges on the Charnwood Forest canal to wagons on a railroad for the final stage of their journey to Loughborough (with some travelling on to Leicester by another canal). We were very grateful to be awarded a grant from Charnwood Forest Geopark, funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund to enable us to recruit a group of local volunteers to help us to dig deeper into Nanpantan's past.

This was a 4-month project with volunteers looking at online sources, including historic census returns and newspapers, to build a picture of the village, along with information collected from the Record Office for Leicestershire, Leicester and Rutland at Wigston and The National Archives in Kew, west London. We discovered that Nanpantan, with no more than a dozen or so houses in 1883, had by then become a popular destination for days out, and on a single sunny summer day could receive many hundreds of visitors seeking refreshment. Our project concluded with a public event at Nanpantan Hall in March 2025 attended by 100 people. Since the year-end we have received a second grant from Charnwood Forest Geopark and the National Lottery Heritage Fund for a project to research and write a brief historical ‘Digest’ for twenty places in the Charnwood Forest Geopark area, outlining their history. These will go online on the Geopark website. The project began in December 2025 and will end in December 2026. We have recruited a professional historian to help us with this work and will recruit volunteers to assist with the research from February 2026.

We remain members of the Loughborough Heritage Forum, which meets twice each year and helps to keep us in touch with Charnwood Borough Council and organisations and individuals with an interest in researching and promoting Loughborough’s history and heritage. We attended the annual Heritage Hub event held at the University of Leicester and also had a stall at Leicestershire Archaeological and Historical Society’s local history fair, held at Oakham. During the year we have delivered talks about our work to the Friends of Charnwood Forest at Woodhouse Eaves in January 2025, to the Rotary Club of Leicester in April and, also in April, to Rugby Archaeological Society. Our annual Newsletter issued each Autumn now reaches a mailing list of over 250 people, with the Autumn 2024 issue including articles on Housing Loughborough’s workers, Loughborough’s two workhouses and Chartists in Loughborough in 1839. The Autumn 2025 issue features Nanpantan, Loughborough’s charities and Charnwood Forest enclosure.

Fund raising and future prospects

Not all the Trust’s applications and negotiations for funding are successful, but during the year the Trust continued to benefit from the bequest received by the University of Leicester that was mentioned in our 2023 Report. That source of income has now been exhausted. Grants of £2,500 were received during the year from the Leicestershire Archaeological and Historical Society and the Green Bean Trust. As a result of discussions with the National Forest and its initiatives in developing the heritage of north-west Leicestershire, a grant of £2,998 was secured for a volunteer project on the history of Nanpantan. It is pleasing to report the award of a further grant of £45,000 since the end of the financial year from Charnwood Forest Geopark, funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, to produce a series of ‘Digests’ introducing the history of 20 places within the Geopark. The Trust continues to receive a steady revenue stream from its Friends and 200 Club.

Financial Review

The financial position of Leicestershire Victoria County History Trust is set out in the financial statements on pages 9 to 12. These show total incoming resources of £39,114 and expenditure of £30,700 resulting in a net surplus for the year of £8,414.

The financial position is sound. Total net assets at 31 August 2025 were £33,679, which included £7,451 of restricted funds. A balance of £24,548 was held in the Trust’s bank accounts.

The Directors and Trustees consider the financial position of the charity to be satisfactory. The activities of the charity are carefully tailored to match available resources. Budgets are drawn up and monitored closely and costs kept to a minimum through many hours of donated time given freely by several highly skilled people. The Directors and Trustees aim to ensure that the Trust’s reserves do not fall below six months’ anticipated expenditure and believe that this policy is appropriate and will be met throughout the next year to 31st August 2026, when it will be reviewed again.



The Trust continues to refresh its membership. During the year the chairman of the Board, Squire Gerald de Lisle, announced his intention to stand down after almost 20 years of service. After consultations in the autumn of 2024, it was decided to invite Gordon Arthur, an existing Trustee, to succeed him. He agreed to take on the role.

A new candidate to join the Trustees was Dr David Wykes, the former Director of Dr William's Library in London, who has many historical publications to his credit. His nationwide links with other historians of nonconformity will be of benefit to the Trust, and he also lives in Leicester and has many connections with local heritage bodies.

Public Benefit

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Leicestershire Victoria County History Trust aims to provide (when funds allow) a volunteer programme which is open to anyone in Leicestershire with an interest in the county's history. Sections are being published online as research is completed and are published within books to provide local people and the public more generally with a definitive and accurate history of the towns and villages within the county. The Trust works with schools when funds permit, to provide educational packs that meet the needs of local teachers and the curriculum, and to enthuse and inform pupils about the history of their communities.

Activities, Research and Publications

A book on Ibstock, after a delay caused by Covid, was launched with much local enthusiasm in the autumn of 2023.

Our research into Loughborough's history has continued, and with the help of the grants mentioned in the next section we have been able to increase the pace. Excellent progress was made towards our first of two Loughborough paperbacks, a social and cultural history of the town since 1750. The sections on religious life and on the town's educational providers were completed, and substantial progress was made on other social history topics, including Loughborough's two workhouses and the town's sports grounds and teams. We also began to publicise some of our findings online through websites provided by others as we aim to reach the widest possible audience. Leicestershire Archaeological and Historical Society published a blogpost written by Dr Pamela Fisher on 'Loughborough's First Workhouse', available online at <https://lahs.org.uk/blog/loughboroughs-first-workhouse> and an article on 'Loughborough's Second Workhouse' was written for the Lynne-About-Loughborough site, at <https://lynneaboutloughborough.blogspot.com/2024/08/loughboroughs-second-workhouse.html>.

During 2024 the central office of the VCH indicated that counties should make their own publishing arrangements, though with continued quality assurance from the London staff. The Leicestershire VCH Trust has made a provisional arrangement with a reputable publisher for future volumes.

Work is also underway on our second Loughborough paperback, which will focus on Loughborough's farms and industries since 1750. Meanwhile, Dr Andrew Watkins has continued to make progress on the rural history of the parish in the medieval period, looking at the demesne (manorial) farm and the lives of the peasant farmers. Volunteers are also continuing to transcribe probate records from the early modern period.

Once again, we attended both meetings of the Loughborough Heritage Forum, in October 2023 and April 2024. Convened by Loughborough Local Studies Library volunteers, sponsored by Loughborough Building Society and supported by Charnwood Borough Council, all organisations and individuals with an interest in researching and promoting the history and heritage of the town attend these meetings to share information about their activities. We are finding these meetings very useful for hearing about other projects, making contacts, supporting the work of others and publicising our own work.

We have taken several opportunities to share our research with the public by delivering talks and attending events arranged by others. We joined other heritage organisations from Leicestershire and across the East Midlands counties at the second Heritage Hub event organised by the University of Leicester, where we were able to discuss our research with members of the public.

We were delighted to be invited to deliver a brief talk for the Friends of the Centre for Regional and Local History at the University of Leicester as part of their annual Hoskins Day. Interest in local history continues to be strong across the country, and 50 members of Cosby Heritage Society attended a talk we were asked to give on the history of Lutterworth, where we also sold some of our published history of this town. We were also made very welcome when we returned to Castle Donington as part of the national Festival of Archaeology, where Dr Pamela Fisher led a tour of the church and talked about its interesting history and its three prominent monuments in stone, brass and alabaster.

Since the year end, we have started a new volunteer project on the history of Nanpantan, which will feed into our Loughborough paperbacks. Over 20 volunteers are meeting at Home Farm in Nanpantan to help with this research. We are very grateful to Charnwood Forest Geopark and the Heritage Fund for their financial support for this work.

Fund raising and future prospects

Not all the Trust's applications and negotiations for funding are successful, but during the year the funds contained in the Bequest which featured in last year's report at last became available to spend. We were also successful in an application for £5000 to the Aurelius Charitable Trust, and a further separate grant of £500 was made by the Aurelius Trust. Eventually an earlier application for £5000 to the Leicestershire Archaeological and Historical Society was approved. The VCH Trust maintains its relationship with this society. Trustees have also been in discussion with the National Forest which is taking initiatives in developing the heritage of north-west Leicestershire. The Trust continues to receive a steady revenue stream from its Friends and 200 Club.

Financial Review

The financial position of Leicestershire Victoria County History Trust is set out in the financial statements on pages 9 to 12. These show total incoming resources of £33,260 and expenditure of £24,884 resulting in a net surplus for the year of £8,376.

The financial position is sound. Total net assets at 31 August 2024 were £25,264, which included £9,826 of restricted funds. A balance of £23,945 was held in the Trust's bank accounts.

The Directors and Trustees consider the financial position of the charity to be satisfactory. The activities of the charity are carefully tailored to match available resources. Budgets are drawn up and monitored closely and costs kept to a minimum through many hours of donated time given freely by several highly skilled people. The Directors and Trustees aim to ensure that the Trust's reserves do not fall below six months' anticipated expenditure and believe that this policy is appropriate and will be met throughout the next year to 31st August 2025, when it will be reviewed again.

Responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

The Directors and Trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and the financial statements in accordance with Charities Act and Companies Act requirements.

For the year ending 31st August 2024, the company was entitled to exemption from audit under section 477 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

Directors' responsibilities:

- The members have not required the company to obtain an audit of its accounts for the year in question in accordance with section 476,

The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit of the charity for that period. In preparing these statements the Directors and Trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- Comply with applicable accounting regulations and standards and statements of recommended practice, with any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare financial statements on the “going concern” basis, unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The Directors and Trustees confirm that these financial statements comply with the above requirements, including the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 2011, the Statement of Recommended Practice FRS 102 and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities.

The Directors and Trustees are responsible for ensuring that proper accounting records are kept, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 2011. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.
