Trustees' annual report for the year ended 31 March 2025

The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2025.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity in accordance with the Trust Deed established in 2008 are: “The promotion of such exclusively charitable purposes as the Trustees shall from time to time determine”.

The Trustees have defined a particular interest in Education, more specifically:

- Education of girls and women
- Education for sustainability (e.g. with regards to Climate Change)
- Education and research in the field of economics

The Trustees meet their objectives through making donations to UK registered charities that deliver programmes in the above areas. The Trust is not in a position to review unsolicited funding applications.

Trustees have agreed that the Mark Anthony Trust will restrict its activities to supporting a small number of charities, with a view to developing a close involvement with each and with the aim that funding will be on a three year cycle (subject to ongoing due diligence and review).

This approach is highlighted in recent activities as follows:

The Mark Anthony Trust

Street Child has been a beneficiary of the Trust since 2015. Thanks to a strong understanding of the work of the charity, trustees have been able to support pilot programmes as well as emergency appeals (including during COVID, and for Afghanistan and subsequently Ukraine and Syria). The Trust was a matched funder for Street Child's highly successful Christmas Appeal in 2023 and continued to support Street Child this FY (see below).

In 2017, the Trust identified CHASE Africa as a small but ambitious charity with a highly effective approach to extending the reach of family planning education and provision in hard-to-reach areas of Kenya. Since then the Trust has supported CHASE to grow the number of partners that it works with in Kenya, but also to extend into neighbouring Uganda and Tanzania. The Trust has supported many aspects of CHASE's organisational development including through funding increased fundraising resources, greater monitoring and evaluation capability, and also the appointment of a salaried CEO and transition to a Charitable Incorporation Organisation (CIO). Last year CHASE undertook a successful rebranding and website upgrade, and the Trust supported the charity's Christmas appeal. The Trust continued to support CHASE Africa this FY (see below)

In 2022 the Trust started to support AMREF on account of its Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights programming and its Africa-led model. The nature of AMREF's work, how it is delivered, and whom it targets overlaps considerably with the Trust's other beneficiaries and trustees determined that working more closely with AMREF offered opportunities to share experience and ideas and to connect organisations and people. This came to life in 2023 when AMREF participated in CHASE's annual conference in Kenya, a year in which the Trust continued to support AMREF and its One Health approach. The Trust continued to support AMREF this FY (see below)

Also in 2022, Trustees identified Tackle as an organisation that is aligned with the Trust's objectives and proceeded to undertake detailed due diligence before supporting a programme in Burkina Faso in 2023. Tackle has developed a detailed programme aimed at providing Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights education during football training, through a network of coaches that it trains and supports. This focuses on hard-to-reach youth, and engages with girls as much as boys. The trust has committed to continue its support for Tackle in this FY (see below)

During FY 2024-2025 the Trust made donations to Street Child, CHASE Africa, AMREF and Tackle, four organisations that had benefitted from prior donations. In addition, the Trust made donations to two new organisations: Code Brave and War Child.

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees report the success of each key activity and the benefits the charity has brought to those groups of people that it is set up to help. The review also helps the trustees ensure the charity's aims, objectives and activities remained focused on its stated purposes.

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

Achievements and performance

The charity's main activities, undertaken to further the Mark Anthony Trust's charitable purposes, involved unrestricted funding to the following organisations this year:

Street Child: Trustees continued to engage with the Street Child CEO and senior management team as the organisation celebrated its 15th anniversary. The charity is successfully attracting institutional funding (e.g. United Nations) to grow the scale and reach of its programmes while also continuing to advocate for situations that are often overlooked such as that in South Sudan. A current flagship programme that exemplifies the SC approach is EFECT (Education for Every Child Today) which aims to enable 96,000 vulnerable primary school aged children to access education in Sierra Leone, Liberia and Nigeria.

CHASE Africa: The past year has seen many milestones at CHASE Africa, including the appointment of an experienced new Chair of the Board of trustees, and a Kenya based regional programmes manager. The charity continues to be highly effective in supporting the capacity development of local partners in Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania and is developing innovative partnerships with conservation organisations to deliver health services to last mile communities in rural environments. CHASE Africa met its Christmas Appeal target and its small team continues to deliver in line with its strategy.

AMREF: Trustees have continued to engage with AMREF' UK team, meeting the new Head of Programmes and Strategic Partnerships as well as both the new Programmes and Philanthropy managers. AMREF's One Health approach and focus on pragmatic grassroots initiatives delivered by local partners aligns with the Trust's focus on women and girls especially with regards to child and maternal health.

Tackle: This year the Trust was able to build upon previous work in Burkina Faso by supporting a pilot programme focusing more specifically on menstrual health using the Tackle sports for development through football approach. Trustees received regular updates on this including through calls with the local team. The opportunity for Tackle to deepen its relationship with its Burkina partner has been of great value and the use of football-based drills to demystify menstrual health found to be highly effective.

Code Brave: Trustees started to research the Code Brave Foundation in the prior financial year, and, following extensive meetings with the senior team and calls with referees, determined that the Trust would support the charity this year. Code Brave offers coding classes to under-privileged children across Lebanon, including many who are refugees whose educational prospects are otherwise very poor. Its model is to train (and subsequently support) teachers to deliver classes, while seeking donations for laptops and running incredibly frugally.

War Child: Trustees contacted War Child to better understand the work of the charity in the current context of multiple conflicts. War Child's detailed and subtle understanding of the challenges of different environments was impressive, as was its impact in helping to address the trauma of children. Trustees spent time with the senior team as well as speaking to referees and determined to support War Child for the combination of its work on the ground and for its advocacy.

Financial review

The Trust's investment income is derived from a gift in 2009 of 100 Shares in Ruffer Investment Management Limited, a private, unquoted fund management firm. The shares are not quoted or readily transferable and have not been valued in the Trust's accounts. The Trustees anticipate that these shares may produce a dividend of £100,000 to £200,000 a year.

The Trust's only other sources of income are likely to be bank interest, dividend income on liquid investments and gifts from benefactors. The Trust is registered for Gift Aid.

In the FY ended 31 March 2025, the Mark Anthony Trust received dividend income from Ruffer Investment Management Limited of £120,000 down from £160,769 the prior year.

The Trust does not employ any members of staff and nor does it make any financial commitments to beneficiaries.

The Trust nonetheless aims to hold sufficient funds in reserve to fund beneficiaries at a similar level over a 3 year cycle.

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a charitable trust, formed in 2008 and registered as a charity on 25th March 2009.

The charity was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charity and is governed under its articles of association.

The trust received its first distributable cash income in January 2010, and as of March 2012 the Trust had accumulated enough funds to consider grants.

The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

Related parties and relationships with other organisations

Henry Maxey, a Mark Anthony Trust trustee, is a partner of Ruffer LLP. Ruffer LLP holds and administers Mark Anthony Trust funds on an entirely pro-bono basis. Trustees are satisfied that this does not present a conflict.

Claire Maxey, a Mark Anthony Trust trustee, is also a trustee of CHASE Africa, a beneficiary of the Trust. Trustees are satisfied that the Trust manages this appropriately.

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees' annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements

- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the accounting standards. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent examiner's report to the trustees for the year ended 31 March 2025

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2025 set out on pages 7 to 14.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 ("the Charities Act") and that an independent examination is needed.

Basis of independent examiner's statement



1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Mark Anthony Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £ sterling.

b Judgments and estimates

The trustees have made no key judgments which have a significant effect on the accounts.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

c Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

d Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. The investment management is provided on a pro bono basis by Ruffer LLP of 80 Victoria St London, however it is not possible to determine the value so is not recognised as income in the accounts.

e Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

f Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

g Fixed asset investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. The statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposals throughout the year.

The Charity does not acquire put options, derivatives or other complex financial instruments.

The main form of financial risk faced by the charity is that of volatility in equity markets and investment markets due to wider economic conditions, the attitude of investors to investment risk, and changes in sentiment concerning equities and within particular sectors or sub sectors.

h Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

i Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

j Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a charitable trust and has no share capital. The registered office address is disclosed on page 1.



Trustees' annual report for the year ended 31 March 2024

The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2024. Included within the trustees' report is the directors' report as required by company law.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity in accordance with the Trust Deed established in 2008 are: "The promotion of such exclusively charitable purposes as the Trustees shall from time to time determine".

The Trustees have defined a particular interest in Education, more specifically:

- Education of girls and women
- Education for sustainability (e.g. with regards to Climate Change)
- Education and research in the field of economics

The Trustees meet their objectives through making donations to registered charities that deliver programmes in the above areas. The Trust is not in a position to review unsolicited funding applications.

Trustees have agreed that the Mark Anthony Trust will restrict its activities to supporting a small number of charities, with a view to developing a close involvement with each and with the aim that funding will be on a three year cycle (subject to ongoing due diligence and review).

This approach is highlighted in recent activities as follows:

Street Child has been a beneficiary of the Trust since 2015, and trustees have built a close relationship with the senior leadership team and supported the growth of the organisation as well as fast developing programmatic work. Thanks to a deep understanding of the work of the charity, trustees have also been able to support pilot programmes including in the area of family planning education and signposting. Trustees were also able to support Street Child's COVID emergency appeal in FY 2020-2021, and Street Child's emergency appeals for Afghanistan in March 2022, and subsequently Syria in 2023, a testament of the flexibility of the Trust. The Trust continued to support Street Child this FY (see below).

In 2017, the Trust identified CHASE Africa as a small but ambitious charity with a highly effective approach to extending the reach of family planning education and provision in hard to reach areas of Kenya. Since then the Trust has supported CHASE to grow the number of partners that it works with in Kenya, but also to extend into neighbouring Uganda. CHASE provides another example of the Trust supporting organisational development since funding was specifically made available to bolster fundraising resources and to support capacity building of local partners in FY 2020-2021, and separate funding was made available to develop monitoring and evaluation capabilities in FY 2021-2022. The Trust further supported the organisational development of CHASE in FY 2022-2023, including the appointment of a salaried CEO and a transition to a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) structure. The Trust continued to support CHASE Africa this FY (see below)

In 2020 trustees agreed to support a new charity called Medical Aid Films that aims to use innovative media to transform the health and wellbeing of women and children around the world. The Mark Anthony Trust funding was directed specifically to incorporating video-based material related to the sharing of family planning information and signposting within an existing programme in Zambia (named SCREEN). A further donation was made in FY 2022-2023 to support the dissemination of the film.

During the course of FY 2023-2024, Trustees identified Tackle as an organisation that is aligned with the Trust's objectives and proceeded to undertake detailed due diligence including meeting the CEO, calls with referees and the Chair, and an interview of the local West Africa team. Tackle has developed a detailed programme aimed at providing Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights education and signposting during football training. This focuses on often hard to reach youth, and engages with girls as

much as boys. It trains football coaches in its methodology and has a system of close supervision of those coaches when they deliver weekly sessions to target groups. Trustees agreed to support a programme in Burkina-Faso that has trained 20 coaches and reached 400 out of school children. The trust has committed to continue its support for Tackle in the next FY.

In addition FY 2023-2024 saw the trust start to support AMREF on account of its Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights programming and its unusual structure as an Africa-led organisation based in Nairobi. The nature of AMREF's work, how it is delivered, and whom it targets overlaps considerably with the Trust's other beneficiaries and trustees determined that working more closely with AMREF offered opportunities to share experience and ideas and to connect organisations and people. The Trust continued to support AMREF this FY (see below)

During FY 2023-2024 the Trust made donations to Street Child, CHASE Africa and AMREF, three organisations that had benefited from prior donations. In addition, the Trust made a donation to a new organisation called Family Empowerment Media.

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees report the success of each key activity and the benefits the charity has brought to those groups of people that it is set up to help. The review also helps the trustees ensure the charity's aims, objectives and activities remained focused on its stated purposes.

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

Achievements and performance

The charity's main activities and organisations it supports are described below. All its charitable activities are in some way related to Education and are undertaken to further The Mark Anthony Trust's charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Mark Anthony Trust's beneficiaries in FY 2023-2024 were as follows:

Street Child: Street Child has continued to impress trustees through its willingness to work in the most challenging environments (including Afghanistan and Ukraine) and the deep networks that it creates within the hardest to reach communities. Street Child also continues to lead the way in bringing to the fore humanitarian crises that are under-reported, for example speaking up about the situation in South Sudan. Following meetings with the CEO and several discussions with members of the senior management team, the trust determined to support the Street Child Christmas appeal through the provision of matched funding this year.

CHASE Africa: Trustees remained highly engaged with the work of CHASE throughout the FY, including exploring the possibility of joint work with Wildlife Works (which trustees decided against), supporting the CHASE Christmas matched funding appeal and regular meetings with the CEO. CHASE undertook a successful re-branding and website upgrade programme and started to advertise for a new chair (currently now in place after a successful recruitment after the end of the FY). CHASE continues to work innovatively and effectively with a dozen partners in Kenya, is consolidating its relationships in Uganda and has successfully piloted working with an organisation in Tanzania. CHASE Africa remains diligent in its partner due diligence and support, working as it does through local community organisations, and is successfully raising the profile of sexual and reproductive health as central to supporting women and girls in hard-to-reach communities. Trustees determined to continue to support CHASE this year.

AMREF: The trust continued to engage with AMREF throughout the year, including meeting Dr Ahmed, AMREF UK's new Head of Programmes and Strategic partnerships, and attending a number of online events and an in-person update from global CEO Dr Gitahi. AMREF's one health approach continues to dovetail with the trust's objectives of targeting women and girls, including in the broader context of climate change, and AMREF's contribution to CHASE Africa's annual conference in March 2024 following a Mark Anthony Trust introduction, was a good example of the trust's value in bringing together parties working in the same field. Trustees determined to continue to support AMREF this year.

Family Empowerment Media (FEM): During the course of the FY, Trustees identified Family Empowerment Media as an organisation that is aligned with the Trust's objectives and proceeded to undertake detailed due diligence including meeting the CEO and undertaking calls with referees and Charity Entrepreneurship, the charity incubator that supported its launch. FEM uses mass media (currently mainly in Nigeria) to disseminate sexual and reproductive health messages and to signpost services. It is a young, data driven charity run by a highly motivated CEO. The trust agreed to support FEM's endeavour to run a large randomised controlled trial (RCT) in Nigeria aimed at supporting evidence provided by smaller pilots that radio messaging is an effective tool to support women in their reproductive health choices.

Financial review

The Trust's investment income is derived from a gift in 2009 of 100 Shares in Ruffer Investment Management Limited, a private, unquoted fund management firm. The shares are not quoted or readily transferable and have not been valued in the Trust's accounts. The Trustees anticipate that these shares may produce a dividend of £100,000 to £200,000 a year.

The Trust's only other sources of income are likely to be bank interest, dividend income on liquid investments and gifts from benefactors. The Trust is registered for Gift Aid.

In the FY ended 31 March 2024, the Mark Anthony Trust received dividend income from Ruffer Investment Management Limited of £160,769.

The Trust does not employ any members of staff and nor does it make any financial commitments to beneficiaries.

The Trust nonetheless aims to hold sufficient funds in reserve to fund beneficiaries at a similar level over a 3 year cycle.

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a charitable trust, formed in 2008 and registered as a charity on 25th March 2009.

The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association.

The trust received its first distributable cash income in January 2010, and as of March 2012 the Trust had accumulated enough funds to consider grants.

The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

Related parties and relationships with other organisations

Henry Maxey, a Mark Anthony Trust trustee, is a partner of Ruffer LLP. Ruffer LLP holds and administers Mark Anthony Trust funds on an entirely pro-bono basis. Trustees are satisfied that this does not present a conflict.

Claire Maxey, a Mark Anthony Trust trustee, is also a trustee of CHASE Africa, a beneficiary of the Trust. Trustees are satisfied that the Trust manages this appropriately.

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees' annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the UK accounting standards. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.



1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Mark Anthony Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £ sterling.

b Judgments and estimates

The trustees have made no key judgments which have a significant effect on the accounts.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

c Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

d Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. The investment management is provided on a pro bono basis by Ruffer LLP of 80 Victoria St London, however it is not possible to determine the value so is not recognised as income in the accounts.

e Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

f Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

g Fixed asset investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. The statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposals throughout the year.

The Charity does not acquire put options, derivatives or other complex financial instruments.

The main form of financial risk faced by the charity is that of volatility in equity markets and investment markets due to wider economic conditions, the attitude of investors to investment risk, and changes in sentiment concerning equities and within particular sectors or sub sectors.

h Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

i Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

j Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a charitable trust and has no share capital. The registered office address is disclosed on page 1.



Trustees' annual report for the year ended 31 March 2023

The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements ended 31 March 2023.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity in accordance with the Trust Deed established in 2008 are: "The promotion of such exclusively charitable purposes as the Trustees shall from time to time determine".

The Trustees have defined a particular interest in Education, more specifically:

- Education of girls and women
- Education for sustainability (e.g. with regards to Climate Change)
- Education and research in the field of economics

The Trustees meet their objectives through making donations to registered charities that deliver programmes in the above areas. The Trust is not in a position to review unsolicited funding applications.

Trustees have agreed that the Mark Anthony Trust will restrict its activities to supporting a small number of charities, with a view to developing a close involvement with each and with the aim that funding will be on a three year cycle (subject to ongoing due diligence and review).

This approach is highlighted in activities to date as follows:

Between 2012 and 2018, the Mark Anthony Trust made regular donations to Opportunity International in support of its work to bring financial literacy and services to those who could not access a bank account, primarily in sub-Saharan Africa. In addition, the Mark Anthony Trust made 3 donations over 3 years to Farm Africa between 2017 and 2019, focused on supporting the transformation of Farm Africa into an organisation helping farmers access markets and a fair price while benefiting from up to date information and support.

Street Child has been a beneficiary of the Trust since 2015, and trustees have built a close relationship with the senior leadership team and supported the growth of the organisation as well as fast developing programmatic work. Thanks to a deep understanding of the work of the charity, trustees have also been able to support pilot programmes including in the area of family planning education and signposting. Trustees were also able to support Street Child's COVID emergency appeal in FY 2020-2021, and Street Child's emergency appeal for Afghanistan in March 2022, a testament of the flexibility of the Trust. The Trust continued to support Street Child this FY (see below).

In 2017, the Trust identified CHASE Africa as a small (income c. £100k at the time) but ambitious charity with a highly effective approach to extending the reach of family planning education and provision in hard to reach areas of Kenya. Since then the Trust has supported CHASE to grow the number of partners that it works with in Kenya, but also to extend into neighbouring Uganda. CHASE provides another example of the Trust supporting organisational development since funding was specifically made available to bolster fundraising resources and to support capacity building of local partners in FY 2020-2021, and separate funding was made available to develop monitoring and evaluation capabilities in FY 2021-2022. The Trust continued to support CHASE Africa this FY (see below)

In 2020 trustees agreed to support a new charity called Medical Aid Films that aims to use innovative media to transform the health and wellbeing of women and children around the world. The Mark Anthony Trust funding was directed specifically to incorporating video-based material related to the dissemination of family planning information and signposting within an existing programme in Zambia (named SCREEN). Delays in the approval and dissemination of the Medical Aid Film funded by the Trust meant that no further funding was made available in FY 2021-2022, but the Trust supported the promotion of the film this FY (see below).

During FY 2022-2023 the Trust made donations to Street Child, CHASE Africa and Medical Aid Films, three organisations that had benefited from prior donations. In addition, the Trust made donations to two new charities namely Tackle and AMREF Health Africa.

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees report the success of each key activity and the benefits the charity has brought to those groups of people that it is set up to help. The review also helps the trustees ensure the charity's aims, objectives and activities remained focused on its stated purposes.

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

Achievements and performance

The charity's main activities and organisations it supports are described below. All its charitable activities are in some way related to Education and are undertaken to further The Mark Anthony Trust's charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Mark Anthony Trust's beneficiaries in FY 2022-2023 were as follows:

Street Child: Trustees remained highly engaged with the work of Street Child during the FY, through a combination of attending programme update events (July 2022 and January 2023), meetings with the senior leadership (Chief Operating Officer, May 2022, Head of Africa programmes, June 2022, Head of Fundraising, March 2023) and attendance at the Street Child fundraising gala in April 2022. Street Child has continued to grow its capacity in emergency contexts, where it is able to respond rapidly and flexibly thanks to a growing network of local partner organisation and a very nimble management structure. In February 2023, there was a catastrophic earthquake in Turkey and Syria, and trustees noted that Street Child's response was able to reach areas (in Syria particularly) that other organisations had not been able to get to in light of considerable political obstacles. Trustees determined that unrestricted funding would be the most helpful way to leverage the restricted funds that Street Child is able to raise through its emergency appeals, and agreed to donate £25,000 in the current FY.

CHASE Africa: The current FY was a year of great change at CHASE Africa, with the successful appointment of CEO Harriet Gordon Brown on 1 June 2022 as part of a much prepared founder-transition, and an associated office move. The Charity also became a Charity Incorporated Organisation, deemed a more appropriate structure given the nature of its work, on 1 January 2023, which took considerable effort. While the degree of change led to a small dip in fundraising, CHASE Africa continued to support its existing network of partners (including through a much-praised partner conference) and grew its footprint through expanding work with conservation organisations. Trustees held regular update meetings with Harriet Gordon-Brown, and had the opportunity to review partner reports and 3 year plans, which show a growing ambition to focus on Adolescents and Youth where there is the greatest need. Trustees discussed the extent to which CHASE Africa finds itself at a point of inflexion (CEO transition, income growth enabling it to access larger grants, new strategic direction aimed at leveraging relationships with conservation organisations), and determined that the Trust would make the most of availability of funds to make a larger donation in the FY of £50,000.

Medical Aid Films: Following delays in completing the short film that the Trust funded in FY 2020-2021 (focused on providing information and signposting with regards to contraception as part of a broader Medical Aid Films programme in Zambia), this FY saw its successful launch and dissemination across multiple settings in Zambia via a well-established local partner. Trustees met

the project manager three times over the course of the year and agreed to provide £15,000 of extension funding to Medical Aid Films in November 2022 to fund the development of a short clip highlighting the power of film when it comes to information and education in the field of Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights, and to explore how material could be used on other digital platforms including social media.

Tackle: During the course of the FY, Trustees identified Tackle as an organisation that is aligned with the Trust's objectives and proceeded to undertake detailed due diligence including meeting the CEO, calls with referees and the Chair, and an interview of the local West Africa team. Tackle has developed a detailed programme aimed at providing Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights education and signposting during football training. This focuses on often hard to reach youth, and engages with girls as much as boys. It trains football coaches in its methodology and has a system of close supervision of those coaches when they delivery weekly sessions to target groups. Trustees agreed a donation of £27,048 to support a programme in Burkina-Faso that will aim to train 20 coaches and reach 400 out of school children.

AMREF: Trustees researched AMREF on account of its Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights programming and its unusual structure as an Africa-led organisation based in Nairobi. During the course of the FY, trustees met the Head of Fundraising and separately the CEO and her team, spoke to several referees, and attended an event describing piloting mobile clinics for non-communicable diseases in Kenya and East Africa more broadly. Trustees also met the group CEO Dr Gitahi in July 2022, when he was visiting London. The nature of AMREF's work, how it is delivered, and whom it targets overlaps considerably with the Trust's other beneficiaries and trustees determined to donate £30,000 to AMREF and that working more closely with AMREF offered opportunities to share experience and ideas and to connect organisations and people.

Financial review

The Trust's investment income is derived from a gift in 2009 of 100 Shares in Ruffer Investment Management Limited, a private, unquoted fund management firm. The shares are not quoted or readily transferable and have not been valued in the Trust's accounts. The Trustees anticipate that these shares may produce a dividend of £60,000 £125,000 per year.

The Trust's only other sources of income are likely to be bank interest, dividend income on liquid investments and gifts from benefactors. The Trust is registered for Gift Aid.

In the FY ended 31 March 2023, the Mark Anthony Trust received dividend income from Ruffer Investment Management Limited of £123,000.

The Trust does not employ any members of staff and nor does it make any financial commitments to beneficiaries.

The Trust nonetheless aims to hold sufficient funds in reserve to fund beneficiaries at a similar level over a 3 year cycle.

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a charitable trust, formed in 2008 and registered as a charity on 25th March 2009.

The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association.

The trust received its first distributable cash income in January 2010, and as of March 2012 the Trust had accumulated enough funds to consider grants.

The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

Related parties and relationships with other organisations

Henry Maxey, a Mark Anthony Trust trustee, is a partner of Ruffer LLP. Ruffer LLP holds and administers Mark Anthony Trust funds on an entirely pro-bono basis. Trustees are satisfied that this does not present a conflict.

Claire Maxey, a Mark Anthony Trust trustee, is also a trustee of CHASE Africa, a beneficiary of the Trust. Trustees are satisfied that the Trust manages this appropriately.

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees' annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period. 

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Mark Anthony Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £ sterling.

b Judgments and estimates

The trustees have made no key judgments which have a significant effect on the accounts.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

c Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

d Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. The investment management is provided on a pro bono basis by Ruffer LLP of 80 Victoria St London, however it is not possible to determine the value so is not recognised as income in the accounts.

e Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

f Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

g Fixed asset investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. The statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposals throughout the year.

The Charity does not acquire put options, derivatives or other complex financial instruments.

The main form of financial risk faced by the charity is that of volatility in equity markets and investment markets due to wider economic conditions, the attitude of investors to investment risk, and changes in sentiment concerning equities and within particular sectors or sub sectors.

h Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

i Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

j Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a charitable trust and has no share capital. The registered office address is disclosed on page 1.



Trustees' annual report for the year ended 31 March 2022

The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements ended 31 March 2022.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity in accordance with the Trust Deed established in 2008 are: "The promotion of such exclusively charitable purposes as the Trustees shall from time to time determine".

The Trustees have defined a particular interest in Education, more specifically:

- Education of girls and women
- Education for sustainability (e.g. with regards to Climate Change)
- Education and research in the field of economics

The Trustees meet their objectives through making donations to registered charities that deliver programmes in the above areas. The Trust is not in a position to review unsolicited funding applications.

Trustees have agreed that the Mark Anthony Trust will restrict its activities to supporting a small number of charities (at most three to four per annum), with a view to developing a close involvement with each and with the aim that funding will be on a three year cycle (subject to ongoing due diligence and review).

This approach is highlighted in activities to date as follows:

Between 2012 and 2018, the Mark Anthony Trust made regular donations to Opportunity International in support of its work to bring financial literacy and services to those who could not access a bank account, primarily in sub-Saharan Africa. Trustees held regular meetings and brainstorming sessions with the UK CEO and other members of the senior team throughout that period, and later made a one-off donation to the education finance arm of Opportunity International when this was still in the early stages of development and in order to support its launch.

The Mark Anthony Trust made 3 donations over 3 years to Farm Africa between 2017 and 2019, focused on supporting the transformation of Farm Africa into an organisation seeking to help farmers access markets and a fair price for their produce while benefitting from up to date and cutting edge information and support.

Street Child has been a beneficiary of the Trust since 2015, and trustees have built a close relationship with the senior leadership team and supported the growth of the organisation as well as fast developing programmatic work. Thanks to a deep understanding of the work of the charity, trustees have also been able to support pilot programmes including in the area of family planning education and signposting. Trustees were also able to support Street Child's COVID emergency appeal in FY 2020-2021, a testament of the flexibility of the Trust. The Trust continued to support Street Child this FY (see below).

In 2017, the Trust identified CHASE Africa as a small (income c. £100k at the time) but ambitious charity with a highly effective approach to extending the reach of family planning education and provision in hard to reach areas of Kenya. Since then, and continuing this FY, the Trust has supported CHASE to grow the number of partners that it works with in Kenya, but also to extend into neighbouring Uganda. CHASE provides another example of the Trust supporting the development of an organisation since funding was specifically made available to bolster fundraising resources and to support capacity building of local partners last year, and separate funding was made available to develop monitoring and evaluation capabilities in the current year (see below).

In 2020 trustees agreed to support a new charity called Medical Aid Films that aims to use innovative media to transform the health and wellbeing of women and children around the world. The Mark Anthony Trust funding was directed specifically to

incorporating video based material related to the dissemination of family planning information and signposting within an existing programme in Zambia (named SCREEN). The video content developed is also intended for broader dissemination across multiple channels including film, you tube and other social media channels.

During FY 2021-2022, the Trust made donations to Street Child and CHASE Africa, two organisations that had benefited from prior donations.

Performance details for each are provided below under section 'Achievements and Performance'.

Delays in the approval and dissemination of the Medical Aid Film funded by the Trust meant that further funding to Medical Aid Films will be considered in the next FY.

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees report the success of each key activity and the benefits the charity has brought to those groups of people that it is set up to help. The review also helps the trustees ensure the charity's aims, objectives and activities remained focused on its stated purposes.

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

Achievements and performance

The charity's main activities and organisations it supports are described below. All its charitable activities are in some way related to Education and are undertaken to further The Mark Anthony Trust's charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Mark Anthony Trust's beneficiaries in FY 2021-2022 were as follows:

Street Child: The Trust was in a position to make two donations to Street Child in the course of the FY. The first for £50,000 followed a meeting with Street Child's Global Head of Fundraising and a review of Street Child's strategy and programmes. Trustees determined that Street Child remains effective, agile in its operations, creative and outcomes focused. It also attracts and retains talented leaders, who are given significant autonomy within their areas of operation. A second donation, also for £50,000, was made to Street Child's emergency appeal for Afghanistan in March 2022. Trustees recognised the degree to which funding that might otherwise have contributed to alleviating suffering in Afghanistan was being diverted to the war in Ukraine, and noted the unique position of Street Child in Afghanistan given its longstanding presence in the country. An in-depth meeting with Tom Dannatt CEO in January 2022 was immensely helpful in answering trustee questions and explaining the practicalities of operating in as challenging a context as Afghanistan.

CHASE Africa: The Trust made three separate donations to CHASE Africa in December 2021. The first was a donation for £7,000 in support of the Big Give fundraising campaign run by the charity. The second was a donation of £18,000 in unrestricted funding to support both programmes and investment in CHASE as an organisation. Trustees felt comfortable with these donations in light of strong CHASE financial performance and financial management, and a well-articulated strategy of growing through partnership with other organisations, including whose primary focus might be in a related and overlapping but distinct field (e.g. Wildlife Conservation). In addition to the above, trustees also approved a £15,000 restricted donation to support CHASE to develop its approach to Monitoring and Evaluation. This donation allowed an external consultant to be hired, which proved very helpful in articulating a clearer Theory of Change as well as deciding upon the most appropriate performance management metrics.

Financial review

The Trust's investment income is derived from a gift in 2009 of 100 Shares in Ruffer Investment Management Limited, a private, unquoted fund management firm. The shares are not quoted or readily transferable and have not been valued in the Trust's accounts. The Trustees anticipate that these shares may produce a dividend of £60,000 £125,000 per year.

The Trust's only other sources of income are likely to be bank interest, dividend income on liquid investments and gifts from benefactors. The Trust is registered for Gift Aid.

In the FY ended 31 March 2022, the Mark Anthony Trust received dividend income from Ruffer Investment Management Limited of £110,000.

The Trust does not employ any members of staff and nor does it make any financial commitments to beneficiaries.

The Trust nonetheless aims to hold sufficient funds in reserve to fund beneficiaries at a similar level over a 3 year cycle.

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a charitable trust, formed in 2008 and registered as a charity on 25th March 2009.

The trust received its first distributable cash income in January 2010, and as of March 2012 the Trust had accumulated enough funds to consider grants.

The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

Related parties and relationships with other organisations

Henry Maxey, a Mark Anthony Trust trustee, is a partner of Ruffer LLP. Ruffer LLP holds and administers Mark Anthony Trust funds on an entirely pro-bono basis. Trustees are satisfied that this does not present a conflict.

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Mark Anthony Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £ sterling.

b Judgments and estimates

The trustees have made no key judgments which have a significant effect on the accounts.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

c Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

d Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. The investment management is provided on a pro bono basis by Ruffer LLP of 80 Victoria St London, however it is not possible to determine the value so is not recognised as income in the accounts.

e Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

f Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

g Fixed asset investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. The statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposals throughout the year.

The Charity does not acquire put options, derivatives or other complex financial instruments.

The main form of financial risk faced by the charity is that of volatility in equity markets and investment markets due to wider economic conditions, the attitude of investors to investment risk, and changes in sentiment concerning equities and within particular sectors or sub sectors.

h Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

i Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

j Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The charity is a charitable trust and has no share capital. The registered office address is disclosed on page 1.

The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2021.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity in accordance with the Trust Deed established in 2008 are: "The promotion of such exclusively charitable purposes as the Trustees shall from time to time determine".

The Trustees have defined a particular interest in Education, more specifically:

- Education of girls and women
- Education for sustainability (e.g. with regards to Climate Change)
- Education and research in the field of economics

The Trustees meet their objectives through making donations to registered charities that deliver programmes in the above areas. The Trust is not in a position to review unsolicited funding applications.

Trustees have agreed that the Mark Anthony Trust will restrict its activities to supporting a small number of charities (at most three to four per annum), with a view to developing a close involvement with each and with the aim that funding will be on a three year cycle (subject to ongoing due diligence and review).

This approach is highlighted in activities to date as follows:

Between 2012 and 2018, the Mark Anthony Trust made regular donations to Opportunity International in support of its work to bring financial literacy and services to those who could not access a bank account, primarily in sub-Saharan Africa. Trustees held regular meetings and brainstorming sessions with the UK CEO and other members of the senior team throughout that period, and later made a one-off donation to the education finance arm of Opportunity International when this was still in the early stages of development and in order to support its launch.

The Mark Anthony Trust made 3 donations over 3 years to Farm Africa between 2017 and 2019, focused on supporting the transformation of Farm Africa into an organisation seeking to help farmers access markets and a fair price for their produce while benefitting from up to date and cutting edge information and support.

Street Child has been a beneficiary of the Trust since 2015, and trustees have built a close relationship with the senior leadership team and supported the growth of the organisation as well as fast developing programmatic work. Thanks to a deep understanding of the work of the charity, trustees have also been able to support pilot programmes including in the area of family planning education and signposting. The Trust continued to support Street Child this FY (see below).

In 2017, the Trust identified CHASE Africa as a small (income c. £100k at the time) but ambitious charity with a highly effective approach to extending the reach of family planning education and provision in hard to reach areas of Kenya. Since then, and continuing this FY, the Trust has supported CHASE to grow the number of partners that it works with in Kenya, but also to extend into neighbouring Uganda. CHASE provides another example of the Trust supporting the development of an organisation since in the last financial year, funding was specifically made available to bolster fundraising resources and to support capacity building of local partners.

Performance details for each are provided below under section 'Achievements and Performance'.

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees report the success of each key activity and the benefits the charity has brought to those groups of people that it is set up to help. The review also helps the trustees ensure the charity's aims, objectives and activities remained focused on its stated purposes.

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

Achievements and performance

The charity's main activities and organisations it supports are described below. All its charitable activities are in some way related to Education and are undertaken to further The Mark Anthony Trust's charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Mark Anthony Trust's beneficiaries in FY 2020-2021 were as follows:

Street Child: The Trust was in a position to make two donations to Street Child in the course of the FY. The first for £25,000 was in direct response to Street Child's COVID emergency appeal, and followed trustees attending an online webinar on this, as well as discussing Street Child's approach with members of the leadership team. The second donation, also for £25,000 was made in February 2021 following an update meeting with the Global Head of Fundraising and was made unrestricted in order that the charity could deploy funds to priority areas within ongoing education programmes, especially in light of the risk of cannibalisation of programme funding on account of the COVID emergency.

CHASE Africa: The Trust made a donation of £25,000 to CHASE Africa in December 2020. Trustees determined that the charity had made effective use of prior funding, in particular successfully growing income to over £500,000, and that it was successfully deploying its mobile family planning model. The donation was made to allow further funding of existing partners, as well as continuing work to identify new ones.

Medical Aid Films: Following work in the prior FY, trustees determined to donate £25,000 to Medical Aid Films, a charity that aims to use innovative media to transform the health and wellbeing of women and

children around the world. Mark Anthony Trust funding was directed specifically to incorporating video based material related to the dissemination of family planning information and signposting within an existing programme in Zambia (named SCREEN). The video content developed is also intended for broader dissemination across multiple channels including film, you tube and other social media channels.

Financial review

The Trust's investment income is derived from a gift in 2009 of 100 Shares in Ruffer Investment Management Limited, a private, unquoted fund management firm. The shares are not quoted or readily transferable and have not been valued in the Trust's accounts. The Trustees anticipate that these shares may produce a dividend of £60,000 - £125,000 per year.

The Trust's only other sources of income are likely to be bank interest, dividend income on liquid investments and gifts from benefactors. The Trust is registered for Gift Aid.

In the FY ended 31 March 2021, the Mark Anthony Trust received dividend income from Ruffer Investment Management Limited of £93,000.

The Trust does not employ any members of staff and nor does it make any financial commitments to beneficiaries.

The Trust nonetheless aims to hold sufficient funds in reserve to fund beneficiaries at a similar level over a 3 year cycle.

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a charitable trust, formed in 2008 and registered as a charity on 25th March 2009.

The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association.

The trust received its first distributable cash income in January 2010, and as of March 2012 the Trust had accumulated enough funds to consider grants.

The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

Related parties and relationships with other organisations

Henry Maxey, a Mark Anthony Trust trustee, is a partner of Ruffer LLP. Ruffer LLP holds and administers Mark Anthony Trust funds on an entirely pro-bono basis. Trustees are satisfied that this does not present a conflict.

Claire Maxey, Mark Anthony Trust trustee and Chair, was also a trustee of the charity Street Child (until 23 June 2020) during the period under review. Street Child has benefitted from Mark Anthony Trust donations in the financial year. Trustees are satisfied that this does not present a conflict.

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees (who are also directors of The Mark Anthony Trust for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the trustees' annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.



1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The Mark Anthony Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £ sterling.

b Judgments and estimates

The trustees have made no key judgments which have a significant effect on the accounts.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

c Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

d Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. The investment management is provided on a pro bono basis by Ruffer LLP of 80 Victoria St London, however it is not possible to determine the value so is not recognised as income in the accounts.

e Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

f Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

g Fixed asset investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. The statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposals throughout the year.

The Charity does not acquire put options, derivatives or other complex financial instruments.

The main form of financial risk faced by the charity is that of volatility in equity markets and investment markets due to wider economic conditions, the attitude of investors to investment risk, and changes in sentiment concerning equities and within particular sectors or sub sectors.

h Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

i Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

j Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a charitable trust and has no share capital. The registered office address is disclosed on page 1.
