20234 / 2025 has seen consistent fund raising and regular giving has remained stable. The bulk of our donations in this financial year continue to come from the Folkestone School/Church alliance and the focus of our expenditure reflected this with the bulk of our work being with the Koden school project and its ongoing support costs.

<http://kodenischool.org.uk/> In addition designated funds were allocated to help with the Boys project, pigs were purchased to help feed the girls and boys of the Dorcas project, a well was dug for the village of Ngorola and the well that supplied the Bana dispensary was repaired. Church planting and pastor support continue to be sponsored by one donor through designated funds.

Additionally the dispensary in Bana has now had its well repaired (previously the solar powered pump had stopped working)and is expected to open in the very near future staff permitting.

Our key worker has now been given the role of National Director for Home Missions in Burkina Faso by his employers, Assembly of God Burkina Faso, and donors have risen to the challenge of helping resource both church building and well-digging along with pastor support.

Burkina Faso remains at the top of the world terrorism list <https://www.visionofhumanity.org/maps/global-terrorism-index/#/>. The political climate in Burkina Faso has continued to be changeable throughout this year with terrorist attacks in the North of the country creating much uncertainty about the safety of travel to the country. This appears to be changing as West African countries elect to increasingly distance themselves from ex-colonial French influence. Unfortunately local reports suggest that there is continuing struggle between China and Russia to woo various governments across West Africa. Advice from the UK Government suggesting that all but essential travel should be avoided because of the threat of terrorism continues to prevent us from visiting, although photographs of completed projects are sent to us by our local representative. Despite this, projects have continued, and most can be managed without personal supervision from the UK as systems have been put in place to reliably facilitate this.

We are pleased to report that despite the political challenges and questionable travel safety issues, Aid to Burkina continues to supply funding for the basic needs of the Burkinabe living in the South West of the country through clean water initiatives, free healthcare and educational projects and it is hoped that this will continue into future years.

The bulk of our donations in this financial year continue to come from the Folkestone School/Church alliance and the focus of our expenditure reflected this with the bulk of our work being with the Koden school project and its ongoing support costs. <http://kodenischool.org.uk/> In addition money from a legacy was given to Aid to Burkina for some specific projects Some designated funds were allocated to help with famine relief experienced by displaced people in the North of Burkina Faso through terrorism; Microfinance projects; Dorcas girls project; water projects.

Both income and expenditure are recovering following the dip post COVID19 pandemic and we are optimistic that fundraising will continue to build in the next few years while maintaining the projects we are currently supporting. Additionally the dispensary in Bana that was built some years ago and which has had to close because of administrative and staffing issues is scheduled to reopen now that the newly implemented appropriate documentation has been completed and the nurse practitioner has sufficiently recovered following his motorbike injury to restart work.

2022 – 2023 has again been a relatively quiet year as far as fund raising but regular giving has remained constant throughout. The bulk of our donations in this financial year continue to come from the Folkestone School/Church alliance and the focus of our expenditure reflected this with the bulk of our work being with the Koden school project and its ongoing support costs. <http://kodenischool.org.uk/> In addition money was given to a school being developed in Hounde, a town that has grown rapidly because of the discovery of gold deposits, but has not had any additional infrastructure to support the huge influx of population. Some designated funds were allocated to support Bible college students subsistence and additional donations were sent to Idrissa, a Fulani minister working with the nomadic community across Burkina Faso.

Both income and expenditure remained low following the COVID19 pandemic with fundraising largely restricted because of initial unwillingness to consider group activities and the rising cost of living making disposable income much less. Nonetheless we are optimistic that fundraising will continue to build in the next few years while maintaining the projects we are currently supporting.

The political climate in Burkina Faso has continued to be changeable throughout this year terrorist attacks in the North of the country creating much uncertainty about the safety of travel to the country. This appears to be changing as West African countries elect to increasingly distance themselves from ex-colonial French influence. Advice from the UK Government suggesting that all but essential travel should be avoided because of the threat of terrorism continues to prevent us from visiting, although photographs of completed projects are sent to us by our local representative. Despite this, projects have continued, and most can be managed without personal supervision from the UK as systems have been put in place to reliably facilitate this.

We are pleased to report that despite the political challenges and questionable travel safety issues, Aid to Burkina continues to supply funding for the basic needs of the Burkinabe living in the South West of the country through clean water initiatives, free healthcare and educational projects and it is hoped that this will continue into future years.

The bulk of our donations in this financial year once again continue to come from the Folkestone School/Church alliance and the focus of our expenditure reflected this with the bulk of our work being with the Koden school project and its ongoing support costs following the completion of Phase 3. <http://kodenischool.org.uk/>

The Covid Pandemic, while sparing the people of Burkina Faso, reduced the amount of physical contact donors could have with our projects, and in turn limited the availability of some raw materials in the country while increasing their acquisition cost so most of our projects were put into a period of maintenance rather than development.

The Boys' Project continues to grow numerically and as part of their training they learn about agriculture. The produce that is grown there is used to supply food for the Dorcas Girls project as well as their own needs with the surplus being sold in the market to raise funds for the projects. As part of the development of this the Charity provided funds to enable an effective irrigation system to be installed ensuring optimal growing conditions for the varied crops that were being grown.


Aid to Burkina have enjoyed working in partnership with other charities who have an interest in Burkina Faso and have formed an informal group with charities in the UK, mainly church-based, called the Leegere Partnership. "Leegere" is a word used in Burkina Faso when a farmer has to harvest his crops. His crops, which must supply the needs of his family until the following harvest, have to be harvested rapidly to prevent loss. When other villagers hear this word being called out they leave their own work to help the farmer gather in the crops, knowing that when they have need, they too will call for help and their cry will be heard and responded to. The Leegere Partnership mimics this in that when we hear of a need that is greater than our individual ability to contribute, we know that collectively we can give in such a way that the work will be completed quickly. In 2021 we heard of the need for a church building, pastors house and well in a small village called Ouere and together with churches in Watford, Tunbridge Wells and Folkestone were able to finish the construction of the buildings before the start of the rainy season in June.

Both income and expenditure have decreased with the onset of the COVID19 pandemic, with fundraising largely restricted because of lockdown requirements and it is to be hoped that this will change soon.

The political climate in Burkina Faso has continued to be changeable throughout the year with much uncertainty about the safety of travel to the country as a result of COVID 19 and advice from the UK Government suggesting that all but essential travel should be avoided because of the threat of terrorism. Despite this, projects have continued and most can be managed without personal supervision from the UK as systems have been put in place to reliably facilitate this.

We are pleased to report that despite the political challenges and questionable travel safety issues, Aid to Burkina continues to supply funding for the basic needs of the Burkinabe living in the South West of the country through clean water initiatives, free healthcare and educational projects and it is hoped that this will continue into future years.
