FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2024

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2024.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note one to the financial statements and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)".

Objectives and activities

The objective of the charity is to provide support through media projects to disadvantaged children in Bolton and the surrounding areas. Each year the trustees review the objectives and activities of the charity to ensure that they continue to reflect our aims and to provide public benefit. In setting these our trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance.

The charity continues to provide support to disadvantaged young people through education/training, amateur sport and other various sessions that are provided to the young people.

Public benefit

The trustees have a duty to ensure that the activities of the charity continue to provide a public benefit. They are more than satisfied that by carrying out the above activities the charity continues to provide public benefit.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Achievements and performance

Significant activities and achievements against objectives

Harmony Youth Project has made significant strides this year, continuing to support young people and families facing challenges in Bolton. We successfully delivered multiple community-focused initiatives, including arts, music, and youth engagement projects, which fostered creativity, cultural integration, and racial harmony. Notable achievements included a climate change art exhibition and the launch of a housing rights programme to address youth homelessness. Our food bank and referral services expanded to meet the growing demand from families in hardship. We also strengthened partnerships with local organisations to tackle serious youth violence and provide support for disadvantaged children. Through these efforts, we reached a wider audience, empowering individuals and building stronger community ties.

The charity has three part time staff as well as the employment of session workers funded by the grants that are provided by local authorities and other institutions.

The charity has received income of £121,507 (2023: £142,357) and spent a total of £117,384 (2023: £137,789) resulting in a net surplus of £4,123 (2023: £4,568).

Financial review

The results of the charity's activities are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 4 of the accounts, showing net income of £4,123 across all funds. Unrestricted funds carried forward at year end totalled £24,244 and restricted funds were £21,599.

The charity has cash and bank account funds available of £27,039 an increase from £11,501 in the prior year.

The charity's reserve policy is detailed below and holds free reserves of £5,440 (2023: £11,501).

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to six month's operating expenditure. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. On occasions our reserves may be below the stated figure, where funding is pending into the Harmony accounts.

Major risks

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Plans for future periods

The charity will continue to be supported by the grant makers and donors who have funded the charity's activities thus far and will continue to work with disadvantaged young people across Bolton and Greater Manchester to help to improve the lives of those in need.

Structure, governance and management

Harmony Youth Project is a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The company was incorporated on the 16 January 2007. Declaration of trust dated 16 January 2007.

The charity is an incorporation association.

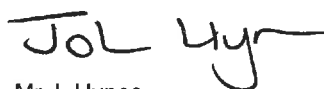

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Harmony Youth Project is a charity established under a trust deed. The registered office is 101b Bradshawgate, Bolton.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)". The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a statement of cash flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Grants are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and the receipt is expected.

1.5 Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised on an accruals basis.

Costs of raising funds relate to activities undertaken to generate income.

Expenditure on charitable activities is costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services to its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

Governance costs include all expenditure directly related to the administration of the charity including expenditure incurred in the management of the charity's assets, organisational; administration and compliance with charitable and statutory requirements.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Fixtures and fittings	10% Straight Line
Computers	10% Straight Line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.9 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

Looking Ahead

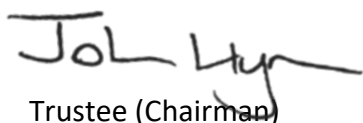
