Objectives and activities

Objectives

The objective of the charity is to promote the physical health of babies and children born with congenital heart disease throughout the poorest parts of the world through the provisions of heart procedures, surgery, aftercare, financial assistance, practical and training of staff in the country concerned. The charity's aim is to address the gross inequality of health care in the poorer parts of the world with particular regard to babies and children with congenital heart disorders.

Since 2007 when the charity identified the significant health issue in respect of CHD, significant progress has been made in extending the medical reach to Bangladesh, Cameroon, India, Kenya, Latvia, Malaysia, Mauritius, Nigeria, Pakistan, Palestine, Romania and Tanzania.

Long-term objectives are:

To raise awareness of the disparities in healthcare with respect to treatment of CHD in the developing world.

To send teams of healthcare professionals to the developing world to provide free heart intervention procedures and surgery for children.

To promote the physical wellbeing of children with CHD and to provide them with the best possible chance of survival.

To provide teaching and mentoring links from the University Hospitals Leicester NHS Trust, together with other UK institutions, with participating hospitals around the poorer parts of the world in order that expertise can be developed locally to improve their medical and nursing capabilities in diagnosing and treating these complex conditions to benefit a greater number of sick children.

To facilitate the provision of units with ability to treat CHD in Asia, Africa and beyond. This would involve working in partnership with committed hospitals to help and empower them in setting up centres with the ability to treat CHD over a period of 3 to 5 years.

To collaborate with other NGOs who share our vision regarding the treatment of children with CHD.

Since the first camp in 2007 at Holy Family Hospital in Mumbai, there has been a continued growth in the number of Healing Little Hearts camps and procedures undertaken, with an increasing number of underprivileged children benefitting from the free health care provided by the charity.

The main activities were undertaken to further the charity's purposes for public benefit and the Trustees have regard to Charity Commission guidance concerning public benefit.

Achievements and performance

The year ended 31st March 2021 the activities of the charity came to a halt due to the COVID pandemic, resulting in lockdowns and cessation of air travel as well as travel bans.

Congenital Heart Disease (CHD) is still one of the world's most common birth defects affecting 1 in 100 children. Throughout the developing world, 1 million children are born with CHD each year and the higher birth rates in the poorest countries mean that a disproportionate number of children is in the poorest parts of the world where facilities and personnel to treat CHD in these children are virtually non-existent.

To compound this problem, the greatest problem facing children born with CHD is that 80% to 90% of them are born to the poorest families; furthermore, the huge inequality in health care provision for children with CHD is demonstrated by the fact that 90% of the facilities and personnel who can treat CHD effectively live in the developed world. This means that there are hundreds of thousands of children born each year with CHD to the poorest families with no ability to treat them. Many of these children languish with conditions, dying prematurely whilst their families are helplessly unable to obtain and/or organise the urgently needed life-saving treatments needed for them.

This huge inequality in public health is reinforced by the statistic that 80% of children with CHD are born with 5 common defects can be treated definitively by a simple heart operation. For example, in India approximately 78,000 children in India die from CHD each year, many living in remote rural areas without access to medical and diagnostic expertise is seriously limited and many of them are untreated and fail to survive. The majority of children with CHD are referred late to specialist centres and frequently their families are unable to afford the interventions that may be required.

We believe that in these days of comparatively inexpensive travel and the use of technology, a strong and concerted effort must be made to address with global health problem.

At the end of March 2020, Healing Little Hearts had treated more than 2000 children in total with 154 camps over the world where need was greatest.

The Trustees consider that achievements throughout the year have continued to meet the objectives of the charity.

The Trustees are discussing, following the fund-raising success of this financial year, to invest in further training of overseas staff and in encouraging centres of excellence in countries where there are staff prepared to take on the Healing Little Hearts mantle and progress its work. In spite of the devastating effect of the global pandemic, children will continue to be born with CHD and will continue to need our help and assistance.

Financial review

The level of income for the year has been sufficient to enable the Trust to support the expenditure to satisfy an appropriate level of charitable objectives. The remaining unrestricted funds available to the Trust are sufficient to permit it to continue in operation, at current levels of income and expenditure, for the foreseeable future. All funds held are unrestricted.

Income has decreased this year from £231,101 to £100,802 due to decreased donations. During the year there has been no fundraising activities.

Net income after expenditure has increased from £89,962 to £90,064.

Total unrestricted funds held by the charity have increased from £407,885 to £497,948.

Plans for future periods

The charity continues to operate within the terms of its Trust Deed.

To extend the reach of HLH to other low income countries and continue capacity building.

To continue with collaborations with Mukal Madhav Foundation who supports our camps in India by organising the teams' internal flights to our partner hospitals and with Spem Qua Fili UK based Nigerian Foundation that coordinates HLH camps to National Hospital Abuja Nigeria.



1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is HLH House, 21 Chestnut Drive, Stretton Hall, Oadby, Leicester, LE2 4QX.

2. Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.
