## Trustees' Report (Including Directors' Report)

### For the year ended 31 December 2024

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The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2024.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

#### Objectives and activities

The charity's objectives are to promote the use of sport for social change.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

#### Achievements and performance

During the period the charity has successfully received funding from corporate and individual donors to fund projects undertaken in the same period. The charity wrote grants to 66 organisations in the period as detailed in note 6.

#### Financial review

The charity received £1,928,175 (2023 - £2,641,411 ) of funds in the period. It incurred charitable expenditure in the period of £1,132,510 (2023 - £1,705,554 ), and other costs of £791,565 (2023 - £769,531) The closing balance on unrestricted funds and total funds amounted to a deficit of £79,788 (2023 - a deficit of £83,888).

As at the Balance Sheet date the charity has net liabilities of £79,788. Benchmark Sport Holdings Limited, a company with directors that are also trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation, has agreed to provide financial support to the charity so that it can meet its liabilities as they fall due, for at least twelve months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Based on the above support the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

The trustees believe that the company should hold in reserves a sufficient cushion of funds to enable it to continue to exist through a period of reduced income, and should it be necessary to cease to operate and wind up in an orderly fashion. The trustees consider the desirable level of reserves for this purpose to be 6 months of operational expenditure. There is a deficit on unrestricted funds of £79,788 (2023 - a deficit of £83,888). The charity continues to seek funding and the trustees believe that the charity's affairs are uncomplicated and costs can be easily controlled. The trustees are committed toward building the reserves to the required level and based upon financial projections and continued support from related entities the charity will have adequate resources to meet its liabilities as they fall due.

#### Public benefit requirements

The trustees have referred to guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

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#### Plans for future periods

Beyond Sport focused its programmatic delivery in 2024, delivering to various partnerships and initiatives. Our Breaking Limits programme and work with the NFL Foundation continues as flagship programmes, and we continued our work supporting refugees and asylum seekers through sport with our Sport Together Fund.

We delivered our first-ever fundraising gala as part of our strategy to diversify income and increase individual giving to the Foundation with much success.

We also underwent a comprehensive brand identity refresh, including a logo, messaging and website, which has been very positively received. In line with this, we refreshed our measurement framework which contains comprehensive qualitative and quantitative inputs we are now tracking against. Our Theory of Change has guided this process and will form part of our holistic MEL framework.

In conjunction with this, we made some changes to the Board of Directors and intensified our efforts to utilise their expertise more constructively.

2024 represents a hugely successful year for Beyond Sport across multiple metrics through our UK foundation and US 501c3.

In 2025, we plan to continue our programmes from 2024. We hope to grow our work with the Sport Together Fund, as well as an ambition to find one new partnered programme by year-end. We also plan to secure a minimum of £25,000 via unrestricted donations.

#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum of Association dated 23 July 2008. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission in England and Wales.

## Independent Auditor's Report

### To the Trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation

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#### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Beyond Sport Foundation (the 'charity') for the year ended 31 December 2024 which comprise the statement of financial activities, the balance sheet, the statement of cash flows and notes to the financial statements, including significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 *The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland* (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's affairs as at 31 December 2024 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

#### Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements* section of our report. We are independent of the charity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

#### Material uncertainty relating to going concern

We draw attention to note 1.2 in the financial statements which indicates that while the trustees have a reasonable expectations that the charity will continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, there is a reliance on external funding from the Benchmark Group. The fact that this funding is not legally binding gives rise to a material uncertainty relating to going concern. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

#### Other information

The other information comprises the information included in the annual report other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The trustees are responsible for the other information contained within the annual report. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon. Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the course of the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

#### Matters on which we are required to report by exception

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 require us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- the information given in the financial statements is inconsistent in any material respect with the trustees' report; or
- sufficient accounting records have not been kept; or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records; or
- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

#### To the Trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation

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##### **Responsibilities of trustees**

As explained more fully in the statement of trustees' responsibilities, the trustees, who are also the directors of the charity for the purpose of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are responsible for assessing the charity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustees either intend to liquidate the charitable company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

##### **Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements**

We have been appointed as auditor under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 and report in accordance with the Act and relevant regulations made or having effect thereunder.

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

##### **Explanations as to what extent the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud**

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. However, the primary responsibility for the prevention and detection of fraud rests with both management and those charged with governance of the company. The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed in our approach below:

- We obtained an understanding of the legal and regulatory requirements applicable to the company and considered that the most significant are the Companies Act 2006, UK financial reporting standards as issued by the Financial Reporting Council and UK taxation legislation.
- We assessed the risk of material misstatement of the financial statements, including the risk of material misstatement due to fraud and how it might occur, by holding discussions with management and those charged with governance.
- We enquired of management and those charged with governance as to any known instances of non-compliance or suspected non-compliance with laws and regulations. There are inherent limitations in the audit procedures noted above, the further removed non-compliance with laws and regulations is from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, the less likely we would become aware of it.
- Based on this understanding, we designed specific appropriate audit procedures to identify instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. This included making enquiries of management and those charged with governance, miscellaneous receipt and payments testing, journal entry testing, analytical procedures and obtaining additional corroborative evidence as required. In doing so we evaluate whether there was evidence of bias by the directors that represented a risk of material misstatement due to fraud.
- We recognise that the risk of not detecting a material misstatement due to fraud is higher than the risk of not detecting one resulting from error, as fraud may involve deliberate concealment by, for example, forgery or intentional misrepresentations, or through collusion.
- We communicated relevant key laws and regulations and potential fraud risks to all engagement team members and remained alert to any indications of fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations throughout the audit.

We did not identify any key audit matters relating to irregularities, including fraud.

## Notes to the Financial Statements

### For the year ended 31 December 2024

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#### 1 Accounting policies

##### Charity information

Beyond Sport Foundation is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 110 High Holborn, 5th Floor, London, WC1V 6JS.

##### 1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

##### 1.2 Going concern

As at the Balance Sheet date the charity has net liabilities of £79,788. Benchmark Sport Holdings Limited, a company with directors that are also trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation, has agreed to provide financial support to the charity so that it can meet its liabilities as they fall due, for at least twelve months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Based on the above support the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Although this expectation is reasonable, the continued reliance on external funding does give rise to a level of uncertainty.

##### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

##### 1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

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### 1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

#### 1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

#### 1.6 Intangible fixed assets other than goodwill

Intangible assets acquired separately from a business are recognised at cost and are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

Intangible assets acquired on business combinations are recognised separately from goodwill at the acquisition date where it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the entity and the fair value of the asset can be measured reliably; the intangible asset arises from contractual or other legal rights; and the intangible asset is separable from the entity.

Amortisation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

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#### 1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

#### 1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks.

#### 1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 and Section 12 of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

##### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present fair value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

##### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, which include trade and other payables and bank loans, are initially measured at transaction price and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present fair value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

### **For the year ended 31 December 2023**

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The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **Objectives and activities**

The charity's objectives are to promote the use of sport for social change.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

#### **Achievements and performance**

During the period the charity has successfully received funding from corporate and individual donors to fund projects undertaken in the same period. The charity wrote grants to 38 organisations in the period as detailed in note 4.

#### **Financial review**

The charity received £2,641,411 (2022 - £1,230,985) of funds in the period. It incurred charitable expenditure in the period of £1,705,554 (2022 - £948,168), and other costs of £769,531 (2022 - £422,945). The closing balance on unrestricted funds and total funds amounted to a deficit of £83,888 (2022 - a deficit of £250,214).

As at the Balance Sheet date the charity has net liabilities of £83,888. Benchmark Sport Holdings Limited, a company with directors that are also trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation, has agreed to provide financial support to the charity so that it can meet its liabilities as they fall due, for at least twelve months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Based on the above support the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

The trustees believe that the company should hold in reserves a sufficient cushion of funds to enable it to continue to exist through a period of reduced income, and should it be necessary to cease to operate and wind up in an orderly fashion. The trustees consider the desirable level of reserves for this purpose to be 6 months of operational expenditure. There is a deficit on unrestricted funds of £83,888 (2022 - a deficit of £250,214). The charity continues to seek funding and the trustees believe that the charity's affairs are uncomplicated and costs can be easily controlled. The trustees are committed toward building the reserves to the required level and based upon financial projections and continued support from related entities the charity will have adequate resources to meet its liabilities as they fall due.

#### **Public benefit requirements**

The trustees have referred to guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

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#### Plans for future periods

2023 witnessed continued revenue growth for Beyond Sport in the majority of streams of fundraising secured. The team continued to deliver to its largest partnerships with huge success, while focussing efforts on increasing sourcing of funding that were more sustainable (i.e. multi-year) than previous.

We have continued to enhance our internal governance processes to ensure we are streamlined, transparent and compliant to great effect. We have also taken huge lengths to managing our cost base, ensuring we were able to pay off a large portion of the loan at year end.

As we look ahead, 2024 plans include another scale up in terms of fundraising growth with several new partnerships being secured. Our Board has stepped up its support of the team and we have several plans in place for 2024 that include a fundraising gala and other efforts to utilise the support they can bring.

#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum of Association dated 23 July 2008. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission in England and Wales.

We have been appointed as auditor under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 and report in accordance with the Act and relevant regulations made or having effect thereunder.

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#### 1 Accounting policies

##### Charity information

Beyond Sport Foundation is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 110 High Holborn, 5th Floor, London, WC1V 6JS.

##### 1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

##### 1.2 Going concern

As at the Balance Sheet date the charity has net liabilities of £83,888. Benchmark Sport Holdings Limited, a company with directors that are also trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation, has agreed to provide financial support to the charity so that it can meet its liabilities as they fall due, for at least twelve months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Based on the above support the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Although this expectation is reasonable, the continued reliance on external funding does give rise to a level of uncertainty.

##### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

##### 1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

#### 1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

#### 1.6 Intangible fixed assets other than goodwill

Intangible assets acquired separately from a business are recognised at cost and are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

Intangible assets acquired on business combinations are recognised separately from goodwill at the acquisition date where it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the entity and the fair value of the asset can be measured reliably; the intangible asset arises from contractual or other legal rights; and the intangible asset is separable from the entity.

Amortisation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

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#### 1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

#### 1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks.

#### 1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 and Section 12 of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

##### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present fair value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

##### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, which include trade and other payables and bank loans, are initially measured at transaction price and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present fair value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

#### 1.10 Taxation

The Charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within sections 472-489 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

#### 1.11 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the charity has a legal or constructive present obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that the charity will be required to settle that obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the reporting end date, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount expected to be required to settle the obligation is recognised at present value. When a provision is measured at present value, the unwinding of the discount is recognised as a finance cost in net income/(expenditure) in the period in which it arises.

#### 1.12 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

For the Benchmark Sport Limited service charge, this is based on the proportion of total unrestricted income for Beyond Sport Foundation UK and Beyond Sport Foundation US. In 2023, this represented an expense of £35,435.75.

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## Executive Summary

### Audit scope and approach

We have adopted a risk-based audit approach, focussing on the risks of the largest magnitude and with the greatest likelihood of material misstatement.

Our initial judgements in relation to planning and risk assessment have been updated to reflect the year end performance and the balance sheet position.

We have updated our materiality assessment to reflect the year end actual results. We have set overall materiality at £24k and we will report all errors above £1.2k.

### Use of digital and data technologies

Our work this year has been performed using Inflo's Digital Audit platform. Inflo provides a range of digital capabilities which facilitate a more collaborative and data-driven approach to auditing.

Our use of Inflo supports a high-quality audit, allowing us to analyse entire transaction populations through data analytics. We can also work more effectively and transparently with you through Inflo's digital collaboration, whether we are remote or on-site. And Inflo also allows us to extract additional insights to share with you as a value-adding perspective.



### Audit status

Our detailed work on the audit of the Entity is largely complete. There are no other significant matters outstanding that need to be brought to your attention.

## Significant audit and accounting matters

We approach our risk assessment using our knowledge of the Entity, the industry in which it operates, the extent to which controls meet their specific objectives, the relative materiality of individual balances and their impact on the financial statements.

This understanding helps us to form our point of view regarding audit risk, which drives our audit approach and forms the basis for planning and guiding all subsequent audit activities.

#### **Summary of work performed**

We reviewed the calculation for the foundation service charge. This was found to include the Benchmark Sport service charge in the total shared overheads. We have removed this and recalculated the foundation service charge so as to reflect the actual commercial substance of the transactions. The Benchmark sport service charge was split between both foundation entities using the percentage of unrestricted income. An audit adjustment was posted for the Benchmark service charge for £35k. There is no impact to profit for the audit adjustment. No further issues were noted.

#### **Conclusion**

After the audit adjustment has been posted there is no evidence that the support costs are materially misstated.

## **Trustees' Report (Including Directors' Report)**

### **For the year ended 31 December 2022**

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The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2022.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **Objectives and activities**

The charity's objectives are to promote the use of sport for social change.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

#### **Achievements and performance**

During the period the charity has successfully received funding from corporate and individual donors to fund projects undertaken in the same period. The charity wrote grants to 38 organisations in the period as detailed in note 4.

#### **Financial review**

The charity received £1,230,985 (2021 - £2,033,774) of funds in the period. It incurred charitable expenditure in the period of £948,168 (2021 - £1,814,217), and other costs of £422,945 (2021 - £347,678). The closing balance on unrestricted funds and total funds amounted to a deficit of £250,214 (2021 - a deficit of £110,086).

As at the Balance Sheet date the charity has net liabilities of £250,214. Benchmark Sport Holdings Limited, a company with directors that are also trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation, has agreed to provide financial support to the charity so that it can meet its liabilities as they fall due, for at least twelve months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Based on the above support the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

The trustees believe that the company should hold in reserves a sufficient cushion of funds to enable it to continue to exist through a period of reduced income, and should it be necessary to cease to operate and wind up in an orderly fashion. The trustees consider the desirable level of reserves for this purpose to be 6 months of operational expenditure. There is a deficit on unrestricted funds of £250,214 (2021 - a deficit of £110,086). The charity continues to seek funding and the trustees believe that the charity's affairs are uncomplicated and costs can be easily controlled. The trustees are committed toward building the reserves to the required level and based upon financial projections and continued support from related entities the charity will have adequate resources to meet its liabilities as they fall due.

#### **Public benefit requirements**

The trustees have referred to guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

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#### Plans for future periods

In late 2022, our team and trustees focused on business development. Due to that effort 2023 has already seen Beyond Sport raise record funds for the charity internationally with several multi-year partnerships secured. As a result, we are supporting over 100 charities in over 20 countries, with further growth predicted through the second half of the year as well as a diversification of approach and team.

With this growth the Beyond Sport team has worked tirelessly on updating many of its internal processes to streamline our activities, as well as building further governance with its Board of Directors and its policies and procedures.

As our work continues to diversify and our impact enhance, we anticipate growing contributions from the Board of Directors in the fields of development, partnerships and direct fundraising efforts.

#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum of Association dated 23 July 2008. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission in England and Wales.

## Notes to the Financial Statements

### For the year ended 31 December 2022

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#### 1 Accounting policies

##### Charity information

Beyond Sport Foundation is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 110 High Holborn, 5th Floor, London, WC1V 6JS.

##### 1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

##### 1.2 Going concern

As at the Balance Sheet date the charity has net liabilities of £250,214. Benchmark Sport Holdings Limited, a company with directors that are also trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation, has agreed to provide financial support to the charity so that it can meet its liabilities as they fall due, for at least twelve months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Based on the above support the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Although this expectation is reasonable, the continued reliance on external funding does give rise to a level of uncertainty.

##### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

##### 1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

#### 1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

#### 1.6 Intangible fixed assets other than goodwill

Intangible assets acquired separately from a business are recognised at cost and are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

Intangible assets acquired on business combinations are recognised separately from goodwill at the acquisition date where it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the entity and the fair value of the asset can be measured reliably; the intangible asset arises from contractual or other legal rights; and the intangible asset is separable from the entity.

Amortisation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

#### 1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

#### 1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks.

#### 1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 and Section 12 of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

##### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present fair value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

##### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, which include trade and other payables and bank loans, are initially measured at transaction price and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present fair value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

#### 1.10 Taxation

The Charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within sections 472-489 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

#### 1.11 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the charity has a legal or constructive present obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that the charity will be required to settle that obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the reporting end date, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount expected to be required to settle the obligation is recognised at present value. When a provision is measured at present value, the unwinding of the discount is recognised as a finance cost in net income/(expenditure) in the period in which it arises.

#### 1.12 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

### **For the Period ended 31 December 2021**

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The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the period ended 31 December 2021.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **Objectives and activities**

The charity's objectives are to promote the use of sport for social change.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

#### **Achievements and performance**

During the period the charity has successfully received funding from corporate and individual donors to fund projects undertaken in the same period. The charity wrote grants to 38 organisations in the period as detailed in note 4.

#### **Financial review**

The charity received £2,033,774 (2020 - £310,230) of funds in the period. It incurred charitable expenditure in the period of £1,844,093 (2020 - £277,288), and other costs of £317,802 (2020 - £45,128). The closing balance on unrestricted funds and total funds amounted to a deficit of £110,086 (2020 - a surplus of £18,035).

As at the Balance Sheet date the charity has net liabilities of £110,086. Benchmark Sport Holdings Limited, a company with directors that are also trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation, has agreed to provide financial support to the charity so that it can meet its liabilities as they fall due, for at least twelve months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Based on the above support the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

The trustees believe that the company should hold in reserves a sufficient cushion of funds to enable it to continue to exist through a period of reduced income, and should it be necessary to cease to operate and wind up in an orderly fashion. The trustees consider the desirable level of reserves for this purpose to be 6 months of operational expenditure. There is a deficit on unrestricted funds of £110,086 (2020 - a surplus of £18,035). The charity continues to seek funding and the trustees believe that the charity's affairs are uncomplicated and costs can be easily controlled. The trustees are committed toward building the reserves to the required level and based upon financial projections and continued support from related entities the charity will have adequate resources to meet its liabilities as they fall due.

#### **Public benefit requirements**

The trustees have referred to guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

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#### Plans for future periods

Beyond Sport is in a period of immense growth and diversification of activities.

Through a recent Theory of Change, we have outlined our revised strategic vision and mission, resulting in a cohesive path forward. Simultaneous to this, we have diversified our global funding through a range of partnerships that are providing programme focused funding (restricted) as well as unrestricted funding for Beyond Sport's efforts. This important growth is enabling greater sustainability, as well as the opportunity to be more innovative in our approach, and create greater holistic impact.

2022 was a record year of impact for Beyond Sport, and with multi-million pound, multi-year partnerships already confirmed for 2023, we are going to grow exponentially across the board, including our grant making and our unrestricted funding pool.

By enabling true partnership, we believe we can better support life-changing initiatives and, together, develop a roadmap to solve the critical issues of the moment - one Global Goal at a time.

Our work is continuing to evolve and mature, and our partnerships and funding streams are a true reflection of that shift and subsequent success.

#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum of Association dated 23 July 2008. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission in England and Wales.

In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are responsible for assessing the charity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustees either intend to liquidate the charitable company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

##### **Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements**

We have been appointed as auditor under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 and report in accordance with the Act and relevant regulations made or having effect thereunder.

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

##### **Explanations as to what extent the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud**

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. However, the primary responsibility for the prevention and detection of fraud rests with both management and those charged with governance of the company. 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#### 1 Accounting policies

##### Charity information

Beyond Sport Foundation is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 110 High Holborn, 5th Floor, London, WC1V 6JS.

##### 1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

##### 1.2 Going concern

As at the Balance Sheet date the charity has net liabilities of £110,086. Benchmark Sport Holdings Limited, a company with directors that are also trustees of Beyond Sport Foundation, has agreed to provide financial support to the charity so that it can meet its liabilities as they fall due, for at least twelve months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Based on the above support the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

##### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

##### 1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

#### 1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

#### 1.6 Intangible fixed assets other than goodwill

Intangible assets acquired separately from a business are recognised at cost and are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

Intangible assets acquired on business combinations are recognised separately from goodwill at the acquisition date where it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the entity and the fair value of the asset can be measured reliably; the intangible asset arises from contractual or other legal rights; and the intangible asset is separable from the entity.

Amortisation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

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#### 1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

#### 1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks.

#### 1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 and Section 12 of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

##### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present fair value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

##### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, which include trade and other payables and bank loans, are initially measured at transaction price and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present fair value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

#### 1.10 Taxation

The Charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within sections 472-489 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

#### 1.11 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

**Principal activities**

The principal activity of the charity was that of promoting the use of sport for social change.

**Structure, governance and management**

Beyond Sport Foundation is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum of Association dated 23 July 2008. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission in England and Wales.

**Appointment of Trustees**

Trustees are appointed or reappointed by the Board or at the AGM. New trustees are invited to familiarise themselves with the charity and the context within which it operates by attending a briefing session led by the chairman of the Board. No remuneration is paid to trustees for their services.

**Objectives and activities**

The charity's principal aim and objective is to identify and support those who use sport as a tool of positive social change. In order to achieve this, the charity provides the best sport for development projects across the world with the funding, business support, profile and network that will enable them to grow, develop and share the work they do and undertakes all such other things as are necessary to comply with its objectives.

**Achievements and performance**

During the period the charity has successfully received funding from corporate and individual donors to fund projects undertaken in the same period. The charity wrote grants to 9 organisations during the period as detailed in note 3.

**Financial review**

The charity received £310,230 of funds in the period. It incurred charitable expenditure in the period of £277,378 and other costs of £45,038. The closing balance on unrestricted funds and total funds amounted to £18,035.

**Reserves policy and going concern**

The trustees believe that the company should hold in reserves a sufficient cushion of funds to enable it to continue to exist through a period of reduced income, and should it be necessary to cease to operate wind up in an orderly fashion. The trustees consider the desirable level of reserves for this purpose to be 6 months of operational expenditure. There is a surplus on unrestricted funds of £18,035 (2019: £30,221). The charity continues to seek continued funding and the trustees believe that the charity's affairs are uncomplicated and costs can be easily controlled. The trustees are committed toward building the reserves to the required level and based upon financial projections the charity will have adequate resources to meet its liabilities as they fall due. The trustees believe that the targets set are achievable therefore the financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis which assumes that the charity will be able to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

**Public benefit requirements**

The trustees have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

**Future developments**

The Beyond Sport Foundation is continuing to innovate the way that we give out grants, not just by funding projects, but also by providing capacity-building tools to the selected organisations to help them grow and improve. In addition to the Collective Impact Awards and long standing Beyond Sport Global Awards, 2020 saw a new initiative launched; the Sport for Good Response Fund.

The Sport for Good Response Fund is a collaborative initiative created in May 2020 to support organisations during the COVID-19 pandemic that may have struggled to survive, adapt and continue to provide the much-needed programming or support that their communities rely on.

The Beyond Sport Foundation is proud to be among this coalition of organisations, working in partnership with Chivas, Comic Relief, the Z Zurich Foundation and Laureus Sport for Good. This fund will continue into 2021 and beyond to assist the grantees in achieving their long-term strategic goals.

The Collective Impact Awards continues to bring together the very best organizations from around the country that are using sport to address similar issues and facilitates year-round collaboration in order to drive greater impact around a single focus area.

The initiative uses the UN Sustainable Development Goals as a guide for organizing our Awards categories and focusing our impact. In addition to addressing Gender Equality in 2019, we have also focused on Reducing Racial Inequalities in 2020 and supported by WWE have introduced the Courageous Use of Sport Award for using sport to lead their communities to brighter futures.

By enabling true partnership, we believe we can better support life-changing initiatives and, together, develop a roadmap to solve the critical issues of the moment - one Global Goal at a time.

**Statement of trustees' responsibilities**

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**Key risks**

The Foundation relies on generating grants and donations from other charities to distribute grants to the recipients of the Beyond Sport Awards. The ability to raise income is deemed to be the key risk for the Foundation. The Foundation also relies on support from the management of Beyond Sport Limited.

**1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**a) Accounting convention**

**Basis of Preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), published on 16 July 2014. The Charitable Company is a public benefit entity for the purposes of FRS 102 and therefore the charity also prepared its financial statements in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (The FRS 102 Charities SORP), the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 2011.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest pound.

**b) Going Concern Basis**

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Having carried out a detailed review of the Charity's resources and the current economic challenges facing both the Charity and its members the Trustees are satisfied that the Charity has sufficient cash flows to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

**c) Accounting Estimates**

In the view of the trustees in applying the accounting policies adopted, no judgements were required that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements, nor do any estimates or assumptions made carry a significant risk of material adjustment in the next financial year.

**d) Incoming resources**

Donations are recognised when there is evidence of entitlement, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants, where entitlement is conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)**

**e) Expenditure and its basis of allocation**

All expenditure is dealt with on the accruals basis and includes value added tax where appropriate. Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services. It includes direct costs of activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support those activities, allocated between expenditure categories on an appropriate basis.

**f) Fund accounting**

The unrestricted funds are other income receivable or generated for the objectives of the charity without further specified purpose, and are available as general funds. All funds referred to in these financial statements relate to unrestricted activities.

**g) Taxation**

The Charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within sections 472-489 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

**h) Financial Instruments**

**Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents include cash at banks and in hand and short term deposits with a maturity date of three months or less.

**Basic Financial Instruments**

The charity only holds basic financial instruments as defined by FRS 102. Financial instruments receivable or payable within one year of the reporting date are carried at their at transaction price and subsequently at amortised cost.
