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LEGAL STATUS

The Faith to Share Trust (also known as Faith2Share) is registered under English law as an unincorporated trust governed by a 'Declaration of Trust' dated 1 October 2009. The Trust was registered as a UK Charity on 13 November 2009 with Registration No. 1132707

The Objectives of the Trust are

(a) to advance the Christian faith, in the United Kingdom and elsewhere, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of the facilitation of collaborative work between existing mission agencies and movements.

(b) to advance the Christian faith, in any country, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of supporting and resourcing new charitable movements and agencies of Christian mission.

The Faith to Share Trust has been established for the primary purpose of supporting and facilitating the work of the international Faith2Share Network of mission agencies.

The Faith2Share Network traces its origin to a meeting of six mission agencies in London in May 2000. The network was more formally constituted in 2004 when it gained the name Faith2Share and adopted a draft statement of Purpose, Ethos, Principles and Values.

VISION

Our **vision** is to see faith changing lives all over the world.

MISSION

Our **mission** is to enable effective collaborations between mission movements and leaders – working together globally to share faith and change lives.

PRIORITIES

We prioritise working together with *mission movements* from the global north and south who particularly demonstrate an intention of working together.

We focus our support to *mission leaders*, creating new opportunities for them to connect, learn and grow in leadership.

We enable *effective collaborations* between organisations, focusing on key mission issues and opportunities, and demonstrating what working together can achieve.

We impact the lives of people across many different cultures, developing *global Christian discipleship*, leadership and faith for a changing world.

VALUES

Our core values are **relational** and based on **sharing faith together**.

PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT

Faith2Share member agencies, and the network itself, seek to bring benefit to the public in all the regions and countries in which we work by equipping individuals and whole communities to live in a way that reflects the Christian faith and its focus on generous love. We seek to work in a positive way alongside and with communities of different faiths and philosophies whilst sharing openly the faith in God which guides our work. We believe our work transforms communities in ways that enhance human life (through education, medical care, development, etc.), protect the natural environment and build societies of respect, tolerance, peace and spiritual health.

Faith2Share was registered as a charity within the UK on 13 November 2009 and functions under the rules of the Charity Commission, England and Wales.

Trustees met on four occasions during 2024-2025 by Zoom.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for ensuring the trustees' report and the financial statements are prepared for each financial year, in accordance with English law and regulations, and UK accounting standards. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies, as described in the Statement of Accounts and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with relevant law and regulations. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. During the year trustees have reviewed all Faith2Share policies including Safeguarding, Risk Management, all Financial Management policies and employment policies.

The corporate activities of *Faith2Share* are managed by a small staff team based in Oxford, UK, Bangalore, India and led by the International Director based in The Netherlands.

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES 2024-25

IMPACT STATEMENT

In 2024-2025 Faith2Share worked with over 220 church and mission leaders and organised prayer meetings, consultations and training events held online, but also in person. The highlight of the year was holding a Whole-Life Discipleship consultation in Rawalpindi, Pakistan for over 60 people (and another meeting in Lahore for over 30 people). Faith2Share was also as represented (both staff and Trustees) at the Lausanne IV Congress in Seoul, South Korea where 5,400 Evangelicals from all over the world gathered together to set up the mission agenda for years ahead. Another important development was re-engaging with our Kenyan members by travelling to Nairobi and starting a process of identifying our new Africa Regional Coordinator.



Leadership

The core activities of Faith2Share focus on growing and supporting effective indigenous leaders for mission movements around the world. The year 2024-25 has highlighted how important it is to stay relevant as a network by equipping, resourcing and encouraging mission leaders. Our flagship resource is a **Leadership Briefing** which is received by over 850 leaders in around 55 different countries. This regular bulletin points leaders to a wide range of resources appropriate to their work and challenges them to build collaborations for effective mission. On a daily basis, and at our major events, our small staff team works with leaders in four different ways as outlined below.

Accompany

The methodology of choice for Jesus as he prepared leaders for the church was to 'walk with them', to accompany them on their way through life and ministry. Faith2Share, as a network (not just staff) spends a lot of time 'walking with' leaders, sometimes offering advice or acting as a sounding board, and sometimes just being there to listen, appreciate and encourage.

In 2024-25 we put a lot of work into making sure that mission and church leaders have this opportunity to stay connected with each other, and continued to offer regular online meeting opportunities, especially for our members in India.

Mentor

The mentoring relationship is a more formal aspect of accompaniment. During the year staff and senior leaders within the network have been involved in mentoring a number of leaders, mostly from emerging mission movements.

Consult

The consultation we offer to leaders happens at many levels and is designed to help them respond to the changing mission context in which they find themselves.

We have resumed our programme of international in-person consultations which had been postponed due to Covid. We held a Whole-Life Discipleship consultation in Pakistan in October, as well as a fellowship and prayer gathering for our Kenyan members and partners in Nairobi in November.

Resource

Faith2Share continues to offer over 800 mission leaders its expertise in identifying and generating appropriate and contextualised resources to equip them to take forward their mission work. The regular Faith2Share Leadership Briefing provides access to a wide range of new resources and others are researched on a bespoke basis. A major challenge continues to be the under-resourcing of Global South mission made worse by the cost of living crisis.

Discipleship



A focus on Christian discipleship continues to be the defining characteristic which brings our member movements together and each has been active in making disciples of Jesus Christ in their own context. For some, like Friends Missionary Prayer Band working mostly in rural India, this has involved tens to hundreds of new disciples being brought into the church and equipped for Christian living during the past year, whereas for others, like PMI (working in North Africa) or Church Mission Society (in their Pioneer Ministry work in Britain or establishing mission hubs elsewhere) the work is much slower and involves costly witness.

Whole-life Discipleship

Faith2Share has continued its focus this year on “Whole-Life” discipleship – training our member



movements to equip those who choose to follow Jesus, to do so in every area of their life, in family relations, in their employment and as they seek to transform the communities in which they live. In October 2024 we partnered with Pakistani Evangelical Alliance to organise and run an in-person Whole-

Life Discipleship consultation in Rawalpindi, Pakistan. Compared to the 2022 consultation in Lahore, we saw more women and younger leaders attending and making a vital contribution, but we also had to face a bigger bill because of the high inflation. We also held a follow-up meeting in Lahore for 35 people. Local participants are already asking for a follow-up event in 2026 in Karachi.

Collaboration

No mission movement is invited to join the Faith2Share network unless there is a clear commitment to active collaboration in mission. We have therefore been pleased to see, over the past three years, a closer collaboration between our member agencies in many areas of the world. In 2024 the main challenge of fostering collaboration was still the limit on meeting people physically, but we



continued to foster the spirit of sharing and mission collaboration through a series of regular Zoom events, as well as participating in the online meetings organised by other networks and organisations.

Wider Networks

One of the services which Faith2Share provides for its members is regular collaboration with wider mission networks. Our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, is an Associate of IPA (International Partnering Associates) and represents us at Vision Synergy. The International Director Jan Wessels has continued his new part-time role with the European Evangelical Alliance (EEA) as General Secretary which has brought many contacts, especially with the European Ecumenical Missions Council (EEMC) and the European Evangelical Mission Association (EEMA) in Europe. Regular contact has also been maintained with IMA (India) and MANI (Africa), and with WEA Mission Commission where our International Director is a member of the (Executive Committee of the) Global Leadership Council and attended the Global Lausanne IV Congress in September 2024 in Seoul, South Korea.

CMS Mission Network

In the course of the year *Faith2Share* continued to facilitate the CMS Mission Network which now has seven member movements and has seen an increased level of intentional working together. The highlight of the year was an in-person meeting in Cairo, Egypt which *Faith2Share* facilitated.

Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative

Although Faith2Share handed over the facilitation of the Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative in 2016 the Associate International Director continues to serve on its board. He has attended a number of LOI Board meetings and events delivered online as well as in person.

Consultants

Faith2Share has continued to provide financial administration for two consultants with whom we have a long-standing relationship. During the year they have undertaken consultancy work for Mahabba International (one of our members), Oxford Centre for Mission Studies, Oxford Centre for Christian Muslim Studies and several other mission agencies.

Emerging Mission Movements



As a network Faith2Share retains a strong commitment to supporting the emergence and development of new mission movements around the world. We provided advice during the emergence of a new missional networking entity in Kenya and provided a small number of mission grants, for example supporting educational ministry in West Bengal, India and offering assistance to a local trainer in Kenya.

Building organizational sustainability and resilience

Faith2Share continues to operate supported by a small staff team with decreased capacity. Our International Director, Jan Wessels, has been working for Faith2Share only part-time (50%), and has continued in a new position with European Evangelical Alliance. Our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, continues to be seconded to another Oxford-based charity for one day a week on a paid basis. We are really pleased to have Sonja Woodman join our team in spring 2025 as a Communications Volunteer and are planning to recruit an Africa Coordinator soon (to be based in East Africa).

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The policy is to hold enough funds to meet three months' operating costs of the charity. At year end the unrestricted cash and investments balance was £76,451. The trustees deem £25,000 to be the minimum cash balance to meet three months operating costs. The reserves policy is reviewed on an annual basis.

Principal funding sources

The charity's main source of income are membership fees, donations, trusts and foundations and consultancy. The charity's total income was £85,391 (2023/24: £85,535) which is almost the same compared to the previous year. This moderate decrease is offset by a decrease in annual expenditure and provides firm basis for continuing the work of the charity in the coming months.

Income from member movements decreased sharply to £8,100 (2023/24: £13,993) – mostly due to the fact that many of our members are suffering themselves from the cost of living crisis and increased costs of international travel. Tax effective individual donations saw a slight increase to £17,481 (2023/24: £16,135) and non-tax effective individual donations decreased slightly to £6,934 (2023/24: £8,769). Income from trusts increased to £18,479 (2023/24: £14,095). Except for the funds raised specifically for the work of two consultants the level of restricted funds received by Faith2Share remains healthily low which ensures that we have maximum flexibility in applying funds where they are most needed within the network.

Investment policy and objectives

The trustees have approved the use of the COIF Charities Investment Fund, whose investments are mainly in equities and follows an ethical investment policy. Other cash reserves are held in bank current accounts. In a challenging investment market, our COIF investment has seen a capital gain of £5,589 during the year (2023-24: gain of £4,432).

Ongoing Concern

The Trustees have considered the financial strength of the charity, bearing in mind the exceptional pandemic circumstances which have affected its operations during the past few years. Significant cost reductions have already been achieved, and the Trustees have confidence that a satisfactory level of income will continue to arrive. Comparing now with the financial situation that the charity was facing in 2020, the Trustees deem the financial position of the charity as stable, although this needs careful monitoring once we have re-started our programmes, international travel and re-building our organisational capacity by employing an Africa Regional Coordinator.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIOD

Strategic Direction

The Trustees together with the International Director and other major stakeholders have been given an opportunity to review and revise the strategic direction of Faith2Share but as a network of participating agencies the broad direction will continue to be determined by the vision, needs and aspirations of network members. This is likely to ensure a continued focus on the current vision (see 'Clear Vision' below).

Programmatic Plans

Faith2Share has made a commitment to continue working on Leadership and Discipleship development. For 2025 we are committed to organize and run a Leadership training in Nepal and continue the follow-up work in Pakistan. Faith2Share is also committed to continuing with the Emerging Mission Programme, focusing especially on under-resourced areas of the world and providing support to our partners there, especially focusing on leadership development.



CLEAR VISION

Through regular meetings with trustees, and dedicated staff 'away days' we continue to clarify the core commitments and areas of work for *Faith2Share* as a network. In communication terms we now regularly use the four simple 'words' (which have provided the structure for this report) to describe our mission. They are:

LEADERSHIP

Accompanying, Mentoring, Consulting and Resourcing
(The core activity of the network)

DISCIPLESHIP

Following Jesus in every aspect of our lives
(The core objective of all our members)

COLLABORATION

Doing mission together whenever and however we can
(The core ethos of the network)

EMERGING MISSION

Encouraging and supporting new movements of God's mission
(The core vision for our life together)

Notes

1. Income Churches

This includes the support for Phil Simpson (restricted) and the personal support through the Christian Reformed Bethelkerk for the honorarium of the International Director (unrestricted). The support for the ID was higher than budgeted due to a donation from a Trust fund.

2. Income Consultancy Fees

Our Associate International Director is seconded to the Centre for Muslim Christian Studies in Oxford (0.2 Fte) as a consultant for which we invoice CMCS.

3. Income Membership Fees

Membership Fees are significantly lower than budgeted. Invoices and reminders have been sent out in March, October and December.

We know that it is difficult for many of our members to continue to pay their fees, especially getting funds out of India.

4. Individual donors

In general, there is a decrease of income from individual donors. This has been a trend already for some years. Our regular donors are aging and it is difficult and labour-intensive to engage a younger generation. We have been able to restore that capacity in terms of communications, but it takes time. Giving is also changing in the UK, where most of our individual donors live. The latest high rates of inflation and the steep rise of cost of living have also had its impact.

5. Income Trusts

We have received two grants from Trusts: Stichting Urco (Netherlands) and the Evangelical Church of Württemberg (Germany). Because of this funding, we were able to proceed with the training consultation in Pakistan.

6. Investment Gain / Loss

Our investment with COIF Charities Investment Fund has gained £5,589 in this financial year. With an overall performance of +8.5% our investment fund has done very well. Much better than the year before.

7. Costs of Activities: Consultancy

These are solely activities by our consultants Mark Oxbrow and Phil Simpson and paid from their respective restricted funds.

8. Consultation Core Costs

These are the costs of the Whole-Life Discipleship consultation in Pakistan and a members' meeting in Kenya.

9. Cost of Activities: Mission Grants

We have supported one of our network mission partners in Asia and a local trainer in Kenya.

10. Costs of Activities: Staff International Travel

Faith2Share has covered staff travel to South Korea, Pakistan and Kenya as we have resumed our in-person international activities/

11. Administrative Costs: Staff salaries and pensions

Faith2Share has only 2 paid staff members: Mr. Anton Ponomarev (1.0 Fte) and Rev. Jan Wessels (0.5Fte). It is to be noted that Mr. Ponomarev is seconded for 0.2Fte to the Centre for Muslim Christian Studies in Oxford as finance administrator.

13. Operating Profit/Loss

Our Operating Loss is £13,433.

Financial Year and accounting base

Our financial year starts on February 1 and ends on January 31. We are using an accrual accounting base

1. Current account

We have one current account with the Co-op Bank of the United Kingdom. This account is connected to our Xero online bookkeeping system

2. Investments

Our investments with COIF Charities Investment Fund was valued on January 31 and saw a good increase. The overall performance for this year was a gain of £5,589, i.e. +8.5%, despite market volatility.

3. Receivable

The outstanding membership fees for last year were paid in March. New outstanding membership fees on January 31, 2025, were paid in February

4. Restricted Funds

Restricted funds are funds we manage for third parties.

- At this moment we have a small fund for Mark Oxbrow
 - Furthermore there is an Emerging Missions Fund that we use for small grants to partners in the global south. The income for this fund is from donors in the UK who want to send the money to partners with Gift Aid.
 - The fund for Phil Simpson is slowly growing as he didn't claim a lot of money.
- In all instances we charge a small administrative fee, i.e. 5%, for handling this. (This is booked as unrestricted income from churches or individual donors in the P&L Statement, on the same line)

5. UK Staff Support

During the pandemic we ran a campaign to raise funds to support US staff salary. During the year 2024 the Trustees decided to close this campaign and the funds were released into General fund.


6. Continuity Reserve

This is a 'designated fund' that was created to have a threshold of three months for our operations. This threshold has been set by the Board in 2023

7. Effective Balance

This is the money we 'own' and can use, i.e. our 'Total Capital and Reserves' minus the 'Total Restricted Funds' (money we owe to third parties).

General Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ending 31 January 2025

1. Principal accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are carried at current market value where available. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015).

The accounting policies which have been consistently applied throughout the year are set out below:

(b) Funds structure

All funds raised by Faith2Share are used in furtherance of its charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are raised on the basis of an agreement or understanding with the donors that their use will be restricted to certain specific projects or activities within the scope of the stated charitable purposes of Faith2Share. These restricted funds are accounted for separately.

Designated funds are reservations for continuity and UK Staff Support during the pandemic.

Unrestricted funds are spent at the discretion of Faith2Share's trustees for use on any of the charity's general charitable purposes. With the consent of the relevant donors, tax recovered through Gift Aid is generally treated as unrestricted.

(c) Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction.

(d) Incoming resources

Donations and gift aid are recognised in the financial statements when Faith2Share believes it is entitled to them, the income is judged virtually certain of receipt and the amount can be reliably quantified.

Incoming resources from grants, where there are performance or service deliverables required by the terms of grant, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to payment through its performance.

(e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis.

Cost of Sales comprise those activities outlined under 'Purpose' and 'Objectives' at the beginning of the Annual Report.

Fundraising activities are the costs of generating donations and the transactional costs incurred.

Administrative costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. The costs included in this category relate to organizational administration and compliance.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it is incurred.

(f) Investments and investment income

Investments in equity funds are included at their open market value at the balance sheet date. All gains and losses on investments are taken to the Income and Expenditure Statement.



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LEGAL STATUS

The Faith to Share Trust (also known as Faith2Share) is registered under English law as an unincorporated trust governed by a 'Declaration of Trust' dated 1 October 2009. The Trust was registered as a UK Charity on 13 November 2009 with Registration No. 1132707

The Objectives of the Trust are

(a) to advance the Christian faith, in the United Kingdom and elsewhere, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of the facilitation of collaborative work between existing mission agencies and movements.

(b) to advance the Christian faith, in any country, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of supporting and resourcing new charitable movements and agencies of Christian mission.

The Faith to Share Trust has been established for the primary purpose of supporting and facilitating the work of the international Faith2Share Network of mission agencies.

The Faith2Share Network traces its origin to a meeting of six mission agencies in London in May 2000. The network was more formally constituted in 2004 when it gained the name Faith2Share and adopted a draft statement of Purpose, Ethos, Principles and Values.

VISION

Our **vision** is to see faith changing lives all over the world.

MISSION

Our **mission** is to enable effective collaborations between mission movements and leaders – working together globally to share faith and change lives.

PRIORITIES

We prioritise working together with *mission movements* from the global north and south who particularly demonstrate an intention of working together.

We focus our support to *mission leaders*, creating new opportunities for them to connect, learn and grow in leadership.

We enable *effective collaborations* between organisations, focusing on key mission issues and opportunities, and demonstrating what working together can achieve.

We impact the lives of people across many different cultures, developing *global Christian discipleship*, leadership and faith for a changing world.

VALUES

Our core values are **relational** and based on **sharing faith together**.

PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT

Faith2Share member agencies, and the network itself, seek to bring benefit to the public in all the regions and countries in which we work by equipping individuals and whole communities to live in a way that reflects the Christian faith and its focus on generous love. We seek to work in a positive way alongside and with communities of different faiths and philosophies whilst sharing openly the faith in God which guides our work. We believe our work transforms communities in ways that enhance human life (through education, medical care, development, etc.), protect the natural environment and build societies of respect, tolerance, peace and spiritual health.

- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable

accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with relevant law and regulations. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. During the year trustees have reviewed all Faith2Share policies including Safeguarding, Risk Management, all Financial Management policies and employment policies.

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES 2023-24

IMPACT STATEMENT

In 2023-2024 Faith2Share worked with over 150 church and mission leaders and organised prayer meetings, consultations and training events held mostly online, and also took part in planning and running a major conference for church and mission leaders in the UK. Although international travel has become possible again after the Covid pandemic, we have continued with the majority of our activities online whenever possible and have made a decision to postpone large scale international events until 2025-26, as the cost of living crisis and increased costs of international travel are a major hindrance for a large number of mission leaders, especially in the Global South.



Leadership

The core activities of Faith2Share focus on growing and supporting effective indigenous leaders for mission movements around the world. The year 2023-24 has shown us once again how important it is to stay relevant as a network by equipping, resourcing and encouraging mission leaders as well as sharing our limited resources. Our flagship resource is a **Leadership Briefing** which is received by over 850 leaders in around 55 different countries. This regular production points leaders to a wide range of resources appropriate to their work and challenges them to build collaborations for effective mission. On a daily basis, and at our major events, our small staff team works with leaders in four different ways as outlined below.

Accompany

The methodology of choice for Jesus as he prepared leaders for the church was to 'walk with them', to accompany them on their way through life and ministry. Faith2Share, as a network (not just staff) spends a lot of time 'walking with' leaders, sometimes offering advice or acting as a sounding board, and sometimes just being there to listen, appreciate and encourage.

In 2023-24 we put a lot of work into making sure that mission and church leaders have this opportunity to stay connected with each other, and we organised a number of video calls with our members, especially in India and East Africa.

Mentor

The mentoring relationship is a more formal aspect of accompaniment. During the year staff and senior leaders within the network have been involved in mentoring a number of leaders, mostly from emerging mission movements. Several of our leaders give a priority to mentoring younger leaders within their own movements and, with the encouragement of Faith2Share, this is now happening across the network. Faith2Share has an ambition to develop a more formal mentoring process when we are in a position to resource this.

Consult

The consultation we offer to leaders happens at many levels and is designed to help them respond to the changing mission context in which they find themselves.

We have made a conscious decision to postpone a major international consultation to 2024-25 and use this time to re-assess our model, collect feedback from our members and also to learn from other mission networks.

Faith2Share staff were a key partner helping to plan, organise and run a Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative (LOI) consultation on diaspora churches in Swanwick, UK in June 2023.

Resource

Faith2Share continues to offer over 800 mission leaders its expertise in identifying and generating appropriate and contextualised resources to equip them to take forward their mission work. The regular Faith2Share Leadership Briefing provides access to a wide range of new resources and others are researched on a bespoke basis. A major challenge continues to be the under-resourcing of Global South mission made worse by the cost of living crisis.

Discipleship



A focus on Christian discipleship continues to be the defining characteristic which brings our member movements together and each has been active in making disciples of Jesus Christ in their own context. For some, like Friends Missionary Prayer Band working mostly in rural India, this has involved tens to hundreds of new disciples being brought into the church and equipped for Christian living during the past year, whereas for others, like PMI (working in North Africa) or Church Mission Society (in their Pioneer Ministry work in Britain or establishing mission hubs elsewhere) the work is much slower and involves costly witness.

Whole-life Discipleship

Faith2Share has continued its focus this year on “whole-life” discipleship – training our member movements to equip those who choose to follow Jesus, to do so in every area of their life, in family relations, in their employment and use of money, and as they seek to transform the communities in which they live. Following an in-person Whole Life Discipleship consultation in Lahore, Pakistan in 2022 we have continued to work with our partners in Pakistan planning for a follow-up consultation in the country in autumn 2024.

Collaboration



No mission movement is invited to join the Faith2Share network unless there is a clear commitment to active collaboration in mission. We have therefore been pleased to see, over the past three years, a closer collaboration between our member agencies in many areas of the world. In 2023 the main challenge of fostering collaboration was still the limit on meeting people physically, but we continued to foster the spirit of sharing and mission collaboration through a series of regular Zoom events, as well as participating in the online meetings organised by other networks and organisations.

Wider Networks

One of the services which Faith2Share provides for its members is regular collaboration with wider mission networks. Our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, is an Associate of IPA (International Partnering Associates) and represents us at Vision Synergy. The International Director Jan Wessels has now started a new part-time role with the European Evangelical Alliance (EEA) as General Secretary which has brought many contacts, especially with the European Ecumenical Missions Council (EEMC) and EEA in Europe. Regular contact has also been maintained with IMA (India) and MANI (Africa) as well as with our sister network Micah Global, and with WEA Mission



Commission where our International Director is a member of the (Executive Committee of the) Global Leadership Council and attended the Global Consultation in Chiang Mai, Thailand in February 2023.

CMS Mission Network

In the course of the year *Faith2Share* continued to facilitate the CMS Mission Network which now has seven member movements and has seen an increased level of intentional working together. The highlight of the year was an in-person meeting in Kathmandu, Nepal in October 2023 which *Faith2Share* facilitated.

Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative

Although Faith2Share handed over the facilitation of the Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative in 2016 the Associate International Director continues to serve on its board. He was involved in the planning and running of the LOI consultation in the UK in June 2023 and attended a number of LOI Board meetings and events delivered online as well as in person.

Consultants

Faith2Share has continued to provide financial administration for two consultants with whom we have a long-standing relationship. During the year they have undertaken consultancy work for SAT-

7, Mahabba International (one of our members), Anglican Communion Office, Oxford Centre for Mission Studies, Oxford Centre for Christian Muslim Studies and several other mission agencies.

Emerging Mission Movements



As a network Faith2Share retains a strong commitment to supporting the emergence and development of new mission movements around the world. We provided advice during the emergence of a new missional networking entity in Kenya and provided a small number of mission grants, for example enabling a mission leader from Myanmar to travel to Singapore and attend a conference there which was of real significance to him as the country is still dealing with civil war.

Building organizational sustainability and resilience

Faith2Share continues to operate supported by a small staff team with decreased capacity. Our International Director, Jan Wessels, has been working for Faith2Share only part-time (50%), and has continued in a new position with European Evangelical Alliance. Our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, continues to be seconded to another Oxford-based charity for one day a week on a paid basis. We are planning to recruit a new person to act as our Communication Officer and are hoping to find an Africa Coordinator soon (to be based in Africa).

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The policy is to hold enough funds to meet three months' operating costs of the charity. At year end the unrestricted cash and investments balance was £84,883. The trustees deem £25,000 to be the minimum cash balance to meet three months operating costs. The reserves policy is reviewed on an annual basis.

Principal funding sources

The charity's main source of income are membership fees, donations, trusts and foundations and consultancy. The charity's total income decreased by 16% to £85,535 (2022/23: £101,783) compared to the previous year. This moderate decrease is offset by a decrease in annual expenditure and provides firm basis for continuing the work of the charity in the coming months.

Income from member movements increased slightly to £13,933 (2022/23: £12,815). Tax effective individual donations decreased by 19% to £16,135 (2022/23: £19,806) and non-tax effective individual donations increased slightly to £8,769 (2022/23: £7,796). Income from trusts decreased significantly to £14,095 (2022/23: £17,323) – mostly due to the fact that we did not run any stand-alone events during the year. Except for the funds raised specifically for the work of two consultants the level of restricted funds received by Faith2Share remains healthily low which ensures that we have maximum flexibility in applying funds where they are most needed within the network.

Investment policy and objectives

The trustees have approved the use of the COIF Charities Investment Fund, whose investments are mainly in equities and follows an ethical investment policy. Other cash reserves are held in bank current and deposit accounts. In a challenging investment market our COIF investment has seen a capital gain of £4,432 during the year (2022-23: deficit of £422).

Ongoing Concern

The Trustees have considered the financial strength of the charity, bearing in mind the exceptional pandemic circumstances which have affected its operations during the past few years. Significant cost reductions have already been achieved, and the Trustees have confidence that a satisfactory level of income will continue to arrive. Comparing with the financial situation that the charity was facing in 2020, the Trustees deem the financial position of the charity as stable, although this needs careful monitoring once we can re-start our programmes, international travel and re-building our organisational capacity by employing a Communications person.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIOD

Strategic Direction

The Trustees together with the International Director and other major stakeholders have been given an opportunity to review and revise the strategic direction of Faith2Share but as a network of participating agencies the broad direction will continue to be determined by the vision, needs and aspirations of network members. This is likely to ensure a continued focus on the current vision (see 'Clear Vision' below).

Programmatic Plans

Faith2Share has made a commitment to continue working on Whole-Life Discipleship with its member agencies and in collaboration with the other churches where possible. For 2024 we are committed to organize and run a Whole Life Discipleship consultation in Pakistan.

Faith2Share is also committed to continue with the Emerging Mission Programme, focusing especially on under-resourced areas of the world and providing support to our partners there, especially focusing on post-pandemic relief and leadership development.

CLEAR VISION

Through regular meetings with trustees, and dedicated staff 'away days' we continue to clarify the core commitments and areas of work for *Faith2Share* as a network. In communication terms we now regularly use the four simple 'words' (which have provided the structure for this report) to describe our mission. They are:

LEADERSHIP

Accompanying, Mentoring, Consulting and Resourcing
(The core activity of the network)

DISCIPLESHIP

Notes

1. Income Churches

This includes the support for Phil Simpson (restricted) and the personal support through the Christian Reformed Bethelkerk for the honorarium of the International Director (unrestricted). The support for the ID was higher than budgeted due to a donation from a Trust fund.

2. Income Consultancy Fees

Our Associate International Director is seconded to the Centre for Muslim Christian Studies in Oxford (0.2 Fte) as a consultant for which we invoice CMCS.

3. Income Membership Fees

Membership Fees is somewhat lower than budgeted. Invoices and reminders have been sent out in March, October and December.

We know that it is difficult for our Indian members to send money to the UK and contribute. A way to deal with that is that they will support FMPB for the secondment of Rev. Vijay Isaacs to Faith2Share as field network coordinator.

This has however not yet materialized.

4. Individual donors

In general there is a decrease of income from individual donors. This has been a trend already for some years. Our regular donors are aging and it is difficult and labour-intensive to engage a younger generation. We lost our communications officer at the beginning of the pandemic and have not been able to restore that capacity. Giving is also changing in the UK, where most of our individual donors live. The latest high rates of inflation and the steep rise of cost of living have also had its impact. We received however an unexpected donation of £3,000 from a regular donor outside the UK (hence not gift-Aided) that passed away during the financial year.

5. Income Trusts

We have received two grants from Trusts: Stichting Urco (Netherlands) and the Evangelical Church of Württemberg (Germany). As we didn't have a lot of activities due to capacity, we haven't been actively raising funds for activities. Hence we only received two grants.

6. Investment Gain / Loss

Our investment with COIF Charities Investment Fund has gained £4,432 in this financial year. Especially in the beginning and in the end of the year the market was strong. With an overall performance of +8.5% our investment fund has done very well. Much better than the year before.

7. Transfers

The Board of Trustees decided in September 2023 to increase the Continuity Reserve from £15k to £25k to reflect the policy that the minimum reserve should suffice 3 months of operational costs. This money was designated from our unrestricted funds

8. Costs of Activities: Consultancy

These are solely activities by our partners Mark Oxbrow and Phil Simpson and paid from their respective restricted funds.

9. Consultation Core Costs

As we were not able to do a leadership consultation in this financial year due to our limited capacity, adjusting to post-pandemic working and due to uncertainty about travel restrictions, we didn't incur any costs. For next year we have planned a Whole Life Discipleship Consultation in an Asian country and a leadership consultation in Kenya.

10. Cost of Activities: Mission Grants

We have supported one of our emerging mission partners in Asia to attend a church planters conference in Singapore

11. Costs of Activities: Travel Fund

Faith2Share has sponsored a mission partner in Pakistan to partake in the WEA Mission Commission Global Consultation in Chiang Mai together with our International Director.

12. Administrative Costs: Office Consultancy

We hired a communications officer in the person of Mr. Adam May, but ended the contract in September as there were no results. We are therefore still searching for a comms officer

13. Administrative Costs: Staff salaries and pensions

Faith2Share has only 2 paid staff members: Mr. Anton Ponomarev (1.0 Fte) and Rev. Jan Wessels (0.5Fte). It is to be noted that Mr. Ponomarev is seconded for 0.2Fte to the Centre for Muslim Christian Studies in Oxford as administrator.

14. Operating Profit

Our gross Operating Profit is £4,196 (Budget showed a Loss of £7,080).

Our Current Year Unrestricted Earnings show a loss of £5,434. This was also caused by the designation of £10k from the Unrestricted Funds to the Continuity Reserve, one of the Designated Funds.

Nett (Unrestricted) Operating Profit is therefore actually £4,566!

Financial Year and accounting base

Our financial year starts on February 1 and ends on January 31. We are using a cash accounting base.

1. Current account

We have one current account with the Co-op Bank of the United Kingdom. This account is connected to our bookkeeping system

2. Investments

Our investments with COIF Charities Investment Fund was valued on January 31 and saw a good increase. The overall performance for this year was a gain of £4,432 or more than 8.5%

3. Receivable

We are expecting the membership fee of one of our larger members. They have promised to send us the money in February (after the closing of the financial year). We have in the meantime received this money.

4. Restricted Funds

Restricted funds are funds we manage for third parties. At this moment we have a small fund for Mark Oxbrow and our Emerging Missions Fund that we use for small grants to partners in the global south. Sometimes donors in the UK want to send money to partners with Gift Aid. We can help them. The fund for Phil Simpson is slowly growing as he didn't claim a lot of money. In all instances we charge a small administrative fee, i.e. 5%, for handling this.

5. Continuity Reserve

The board of Trustees decided in its meeting on 7 September 2023 to increase the continuity reserve with £10k to be in line with the policy of having at least 3 months of operating costs in reserve. We have taken this money out of the unrestricted funds. This is an internal transfer and doesn't change anything in our effective balance. The £25k is however a threshold for our operations.

6. Current Year Earnings

Our Current Year Unrestricted Earnings are influenced by the designation of £10k from our unrestricted funds to the Continuity Reserve. (Nett Operating Profit - £10k)

7. Effective Balance

This is the money we 'own' and can use, i.e. our Total Capital and Reserves minus the Total Restricted Funds (money we owe to third parties).

General Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ending 31 January 2024

1. Principal accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are carried at current market value where available. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015).

The accounting policies which have been consistently applied throughout the year are set out below:

(b) Funds structure

All funds raised by Faith2Share are used in furtherance of its charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are raised on the basis of an agreement or understanding with the donors that their use will be restricted to certain specific projects or activities within the scope of the stated charitable purposes of Faith2Share. These restricted funds are accounted for separately.

Designated funds are reservations for continuity and UK Staff Support during the pandemic.

Unrestricted funds are spent at the discretion of Faith2Share's trustees for use on any of the charity's general charitable purposes. With the consent of the relevant donors, tax recovered through Gift Aid is generally treated as unrestricted.

(c) Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction.

(d) Incoming resources

Donations and gift aid are recognised in the financial statements when Faith2Share believes it is entitled to them, the income is judged virtually certain of receipt and the amount can be reliably quantified.

Incoming resources from grants, where there are performance or service deliverables required by the terms of grant, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to payment through its performance.

(e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis.

Cost of Sales comprise those activities outlined under 'Purpose' and 'Objectives' at the beginning of the Annual Report.

Fundraising activities are the costs of generating donations and the transactional costs incurred.

Administrative costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. The costs included in this category relate to organisational administration and compliance.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it is incurred.

(f) Investments and investment income

Investments in equity funds are included at their open market value at the balance sheet date. All gains and losses on investments are taken to the Income and Expenditure Statement.



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LEGAL STATUS

The Faith to Share Trust (also known as Faith2Share) is registered under English law as an unincorporated trust governed by a 'Declaration of Trust' dated 1 October 2009. The Trust was registered as a UK Charity on 13 November 2009 with Registration No. 1132707

The Objectives of the Trust are

(a) to advance the Christian faith, in the United Kingdom and elsewhere, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of the facilitation of collaborative work between existing mission agencies and movements.

(b) to advance the Christian faith, in any country, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of supporting and resourcing new charitable movements and agencies of Christian mission.

The Faith to Share Trust has been established for the primary purpose of supporting and facilitating the work of the international Faith2Share Network of mission agencies.

The Faith2Share Network traces its origin to a meeting of six mission agencies in London in May 2000. The network was more formally constituted in 2004 when it gained the name Faith2Share and adopted a draft statement of Purpose, Ethos, Principles and Values.

VISION

Our **vision** is to see faith changing lives all over the world.

MISSION

Our **mission** is to enable effective collaborations between mission movements and leaders – working together globally to share faith and change lives.

PRIORITIES

We prioritise working together with *mission movements* from the global north and south who particularly demonstrate an intention of working together.

We focus our support to *mission leaders*, creating new opportunities for them to connect, learn and grow in leadership.

We enable *effective collaborations* between organisations, focusing on key mission issues and opportunities, and demonstrating what working together can achieve.

We impact the lives of people across many different cultures, developing *global Christian discipleship*, leadership and faith for a changing world.

VALUES

Our core values are **relational** and based on **sharing faith together**.

PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT

Faith2Share member agencies, and the network itself, seek to bring benefit to the public in all the regions and countries in which we work by equipping individuals and whole communities to live in a way that reflects the Christian faith and its focus on generous love. We seek to work in a positive way alongside and with communities of different faiths and philosophies whilst sharing openly the faith in God which guides our work. 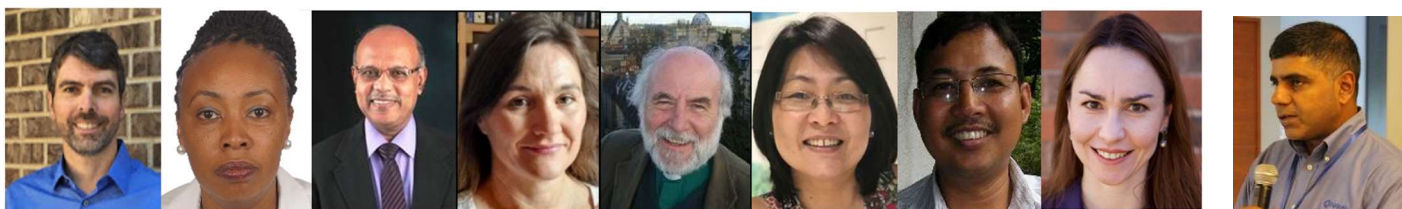

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES 2022-23

IMPACT STATEMENT

In 2022 Faith2Share has worked with over 130 church and mission leaders and organised prayer meetings, consultations and training events online and taking place in-person in Austria, Uganda and Pakistan. Although international travel has become possible again after Covid restrictions have been mostly lifted, we have continued with the majority of our activities online whenever possible and have made a decision to postpone large scale international events until 2023-24, as the cost of living crisis and increased costs of international travel are a major hindrance for a large number of mission leaders, especially in the Global South.



Leadership

The core activities of Faith2Share focus on growing and supporting effective indigenous leaders for mission movements around the world. The year 2022 has shown us once again how important it is to stay relevant as a network by equipping, resourcing and encouraging mission leaders as well as discussing together what the future of mission could look like in the post-pandemic world. In particular we seek to encourage women and younger mission leaders. Our flagship resource is a **Leadership Briefing** which is now received by over 850 leaders in around 55 different countries. This monthly production points leaders to a wide range of resources appropriate to their work and challenges them to build collaborations for effective mission. On a daily basis, and at our major events, our small staff team works with leaders in four different ways as outlined below.

Accompany

The methodology of choice for Jesus as he prepared leaders for the church was to ‘walk with them’, to accompany them on their way through life and ministry. Faith2Share, as a network (not just staff) spends a lot of time ‘walking with’ leaders, sometimes offering advice or acting as a sounding board, and sometimes just being there to listen, appreciate and encourage.



In 2022 we put a lot of work into making sure that mission and church leaders have this opportunity to stay connected with each other, to learn from the best practices around the world.

This work is not only carried out by staff when we can travel and visit people but also by senior leaders within the network. Much more regularly this accompaniment takes place by phone, email, Microsoft Teams, Zoom, WhatsApp, etc. and can

involve anything from an urgent request for prayer, to advice regarding a personnel issue or help with locating a specific tool for mission.

Mentor

The mentoring relationship is a more formal aspect of accompaniment. During the year staff and senior leaders within the network have been involved in mentoring a number of leaders, mostly from emerging mission movements. Several of our leaders give a priority to mentoring younger leaders within their own movements and, with the encouragement of Faith2Share, this is now happening across the network. Faith2Share has an ambition to develop a more formal mentoring process when we are in a position to resource this.

Consult



The consultation we offer to leaders happens at many levels and is designed to help them respond to the changing mission context in which they find themselves.

Following a Discipleship vision-casting consultation in November 2021 in Pakistan we were able to plan, organise and hold a full 3-day Whole-Life Discipleship consultation in

Lahore 15 – 17 November 2022 with over 60 church and mission leaders attending this event.

Faith2Share staff was also key in helping to plan, organise and run a Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative (LOI) consultation on Scripture engagement in Salzburg, Austria in June 2022.

Resource

Faith2Share continues to offer to over 800 mission leaders its expertise in identifying and generating appropriate and contextualised resources to equip them to take forward their mission work. During 2022-23 we made a limited number of small grants to emerging mission movements, especially to those who were particularly affected by the cost of living crisis but, not being a grant making trust, our normal mode of assistance is through researching sources of resourcing – not just financial. The regular Faith2Share Leadership Briefing provides access to a wide range of new resources and others are researched on a bespoke basis. A major challenge continues to be the under-resourcing of Global South mission made worse by the cost of living crisis.

Discipleship



A focus on Christian discipleship continues to be the defining characteristic which brings our member movements together and each has been active in making disciples of Jesus Christ in their own context. For some, like Friends Missionary Prayer Band working mostly in rural India, this has involved tens to hundreds of new disciples being brought into the church and equipped for Christian living during the past year, whereas for others, like PMI (working in North Africa) or Church Mission Society (in their Pioneer Ministry work in Britain or establishing mission hubs elsewhere) the work is much slower and involves costly witness.

Whole-life Discipleship

Faith2Share has continued its focus this year on “whole-life” discipleship – training our member movements to equip those who choose to follow Jesus, to do so in every area of their life, in family relations, in their employment and use of money, and as they seek to transform the communities in which they live. Following a hybrid “tester” Discipleship vision-casting consultation in Pakistan in November 2021 we were able to organize and hold a full in-person Whole-Life Discipleship consultation in Pakistan 15 – 17 November 2022 (please see above) where also other Asian leaders of Faith2Share members were able to attend.



Our Whole-Life Discipleship curriculum was also used as part of a training in Cote d'Ivoire where a local pastor has trained 24 students and approached Faith2Share to have access to our discipleship materials in French. We were particularly excited about this development as we have never had any work in that part of West Africa and there is a significant lack of training materials available in French for local church leaders and even theological colleges.

Collaboration



No mission movement is invited to join the Faith2Share network unless there is a clear commitment to active collaboration in mission. We have therefore been pleased to see, over the past three years, a closer collaboration between our member agencies in many areas of the world. In 2022 the main challenge of fostering collaboration was still the limit on meeting people physically but we continued to foster the spirit of sharing and mission collaboration through a series of regular Zoom events, as well as participating in the online meetings organised by other networks and organisations.

Wider Networks



One of the services which Faith2Share provides for its members is regular collaboration with wider mission networks. Our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, is an Associate of IPA (International Partnering Associates) and represents us at Vision Synergy. The International Director Jan Wessels has now started a new role with the European Evangelical Alliance (EEA) as General Secretary (since October 2022) which has brought a large number of contacts, especially with the European Ecumenical Missions Council (EEMC) and EEA in Europe. Regular contact has also been maintained with IMA (India) and MANI (Africa) as well as with our sister network Micah Global, and also with WEA Mission

Commission where our International Director is a member of the Global Leadership Council.

CMS Mission Network

In the course of the year *Faith2Share* continued to facilitate the CMS Mission Network which now has seven member movements and has seen an increased level of intentional working together. The highlight of the year was a mostly in-person meeting in Kampala, Uganda in October 2022 which *Faith2Share* facilitated.

Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative

Although Faith2Share handed over the facilitation of the Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative in 2016 the Associate International Director continues to serve on its board. He was involved in the planning and running of the LOI consultation in Austria in June 2022, focussed on Scripture engagement, and attended a number of LOI Board meetings and events delivered online as well as in person.

Consultants

Faith2Share has continued to provide financial administration for two consultants with whom we have a long-standing relationship. During the year they have undertaken consultancy work for SAT-7, Mahabba International (one of our members), Anglican Communion Office, Oxford Centre for Mission Studies, Oxford Centre for Christian Muslim Studies and several other mission agencies.



As a network Faith2Share retains a strong commitment to supporting the emergence and development of new mission movements around the world. We supported the emergence of a new missional entity in Latin America and also provided a small number of mission grants, in Kenya and Pakistan.

Building organizational sustainability and resilience

Faith2Share continues to operate supported by a small staff team with decreased capacity. Our International Director, Jan Wessels, has been working for Faith2Share only part-time (50%), and has started a new position with European Evangelical Alliance since October 2022. Our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, continues to be seconded to another Oxford-based charity for one day a week on a paid basis. We are planning to recruit a new person to act as our Africa Coordinator in the near future (to be based in Africa).

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The trustees have in 2020 reviewed the reserves of the charity. Their policy is to hold enough funds to meet four months' operating costs of the charity. At year end the unrestricted cash and investments balance was £79,211. The trustees deem £15,000 to be the minimum cash balance to meet four months operating costs, after the International Director has been working part-time (0.5Fte since July 1, 2021) and the Associate International Director is seconded to the Centre for Muslim Christian Studies in Oxford (effectively working 0.8Fte for Faith2Share). The reserves policy is reviewed on an annual basis.

Principal funding sources

The charity's main source of income are membership fees, donations, trusts and foundations and consultancy. The charity's total income decreased by 11% to £101,783 (2021/22: £112,879) compared to the previous year. This moderate decrease provides firm basis for continuing the work of the charity in the coming months.

Income from member movements decreased slightly to £12,815 (2021/22: £13,543). Tax effective individual donations decreased by 25% to £19,806 (2021/22: £26,373) and non-tax effective individual donations decreased significantly to £7,796 (2021/22: £11,907). Income from trusts increased significantly to £17,323 (2021/22: £12,430) – mostly due to the timing issue of donations received. Except for the funds raised specifically for the work of two consultants the level of restricted funds received by Faith2Share remains healthily low which ensures that we have maximum flexibility in applying funds where they are most needed within the network.

Investment policy and objectives

The trustees have approved the use of the COIF Charities Investment Fund, whose investments are mainly in equities and follows an ethical investment policy. Other cash reserves are held in bank current and deposit accounts. In a challenging investment market our COIF investment has seen a capital deficit of £422 during the year (2021-22: gain of £1,869)

Ongoing Concern

The Trustees have considered the financial strength of the charity, bearing in mind the exceptional pandemic circumstances which have affected its operations during the past two years. Significant cost reductions have already been achieved, and the Trustees have confidence that a satisfactory level of income will continue to arrive. Comparing with the financial situation that the charity was facing in 2020, the Trustees deem the financial position of the charity as stable, although this needs careful monitoring once we can re-start our programmes, international travel and re-building our organisational capacity by employing a Communications person.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIOD

Strategic Direction

The Trustees together with the International Director and other major stakeholders have been given an opportunity to review and revise the strategic direction of Faith2Share but as a network of participating agencies the broad direction will continue to be determined by the vision, needs and



aspirations of network members. This is likely to ensure a continued focus on the current vision (see 'Clear Vision' below).

Programmatic Plans

Faith2Share has made a commitment to continue working on Whole-Life Discipleship with its member agencies and in collaboration with the other churches where possible. For 2023 we are committed to do the evaluation of the 2022 Pakistan Whole-Life consultation together with local

leaders and explore ways to do the follow-up to this training in the near future.

Faith2Share is also committed to continue with the Emerging Mission Programme, focusing especially on under-resourced areas of the world and providing support to our partners there, especially focusing on post-pandemic relief and leadership development.

CLEAR VISION

Through regular meetings with trustees, and dedicated staff 'away days' we continue to clarify the core commitments and areas of work for *Faith2Share* as a network. In communication terms we now regularly use the four simple 'words' (which have provided the structure for this report) to describe our mission. They are:

LEADERSHIP

Accompanying, Mentoring, Consulting and Resourcing
(The core activity of the network)

DISCIPLESHIP

Following Jesus in every aspect of our lives
(The core objective of all our members)

COLLABORATION

Doing mission together whenever and however we can
(The core ethos of the network)

EMERGING MISSION

Encouraging and supporting new movements of God's mission
(The core vision for our life together)

We give thanks to God for his faithfulness and the opportunities afforded to us during 2020-21 to participate in His mission.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ending 31 January 2023

1. Principal accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are carried at current market value where available. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015).

The accounting policies which have been consistently applied throughout the year are set out below:

(b) Funds structure

All funds raised by Faith2Share are used in furtherance of its charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are raised on the basis of an agreement or understanding with the donors that their use will be restricted to certain specific projects or activities within the scope of the stated charitable purposes of Faith2Share. These restricted funds are accounted for separately.

Designated funds are reservations for continuity and UK Staff Support during the pandemic.

Unrestricted funds are spent at the discretion of Faith2Share's trustees for use on any of the charity's general charitable purposes. With the consent of the relevant donors, tax recovered through Gift Aid is generally treated as unrestricted.

(c) Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction.

(d) Incoming resources

Donations and gift aid are recognised in the financial statements when Faith2Share believes it is entitled to them, the income is judged virtually certain of receipt and the amount can be reliably quantified.

Incoming resources from grants, where there are performance or service deliverables required by the terms of grant, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to payment through its performance.

(e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis.

Cost of Sales comprise those activities outlined under 'Purpose' and 'Objectives' at the beginning of the Annual Report.

Fundraising activities are the costs of generating donations and the transactional costs incurred.

Administrative costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. The costs included in this category relate to organisational administration and compliance.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it is incurred.

(f) Investments and investment income

Investments in equity funds are included at their open market value at the balance sheet date. All gains and losses on investments are taken to the Income and Expenditure Statement.



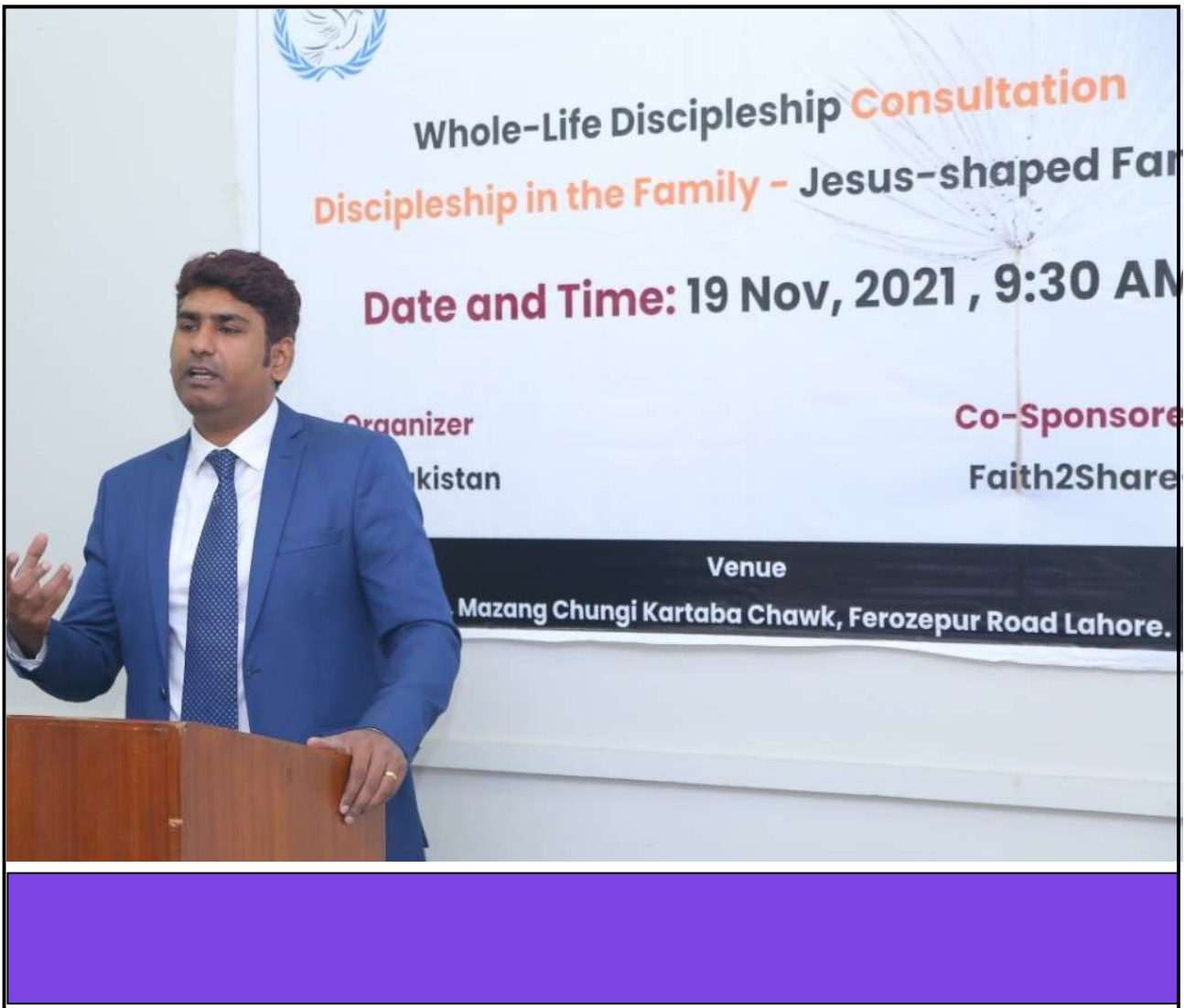

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LEGAL STATUS

The Faith to Share Trust (also known as Faith2Share) is registered under English law as an unincorporated trust governed by a 'Declaration of Trust' dated 1 October 2009. The Trust was registered as a UK Charity on 13 November 2009 with Registration No. 1132707

The Objectives of the Trust are

(a) to advance the Christian faith, in the United Kingdom and elsewhere, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of the facilitation of collaborative work between existing mission agencies and movements.

(b) to advance the Christian faith, in any country, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of supporting and resourcing new charitable movements and agencies of Christian mission.

The Faith to Share Trust has been established for the primary purpose of supporting and facilitating the work of the international Faith2Share Network of mission agencies.

The Faith2Share Network traces its origin to a meeting of six mission agencies in London in May 2000. The network was more formally constituted in 2004 when it gained the name Faith2Share and adopted a draft statement of Purpose, Ethos, Principles and Values.

VISION

Our **vision** is to see faith changing lives all over the world.

MISSION

Our **mission** is to enable effective collaborations between mission movements and leaders – working together globally to share faith and change lives.

PRIORITIES

We prioritise working together with *mission movements* from the global north and south who particularly demonstrate an intention of working together.

We focus our support to *mission leaders*, creating new opportunities for them to connect, learn and grow in leadership.

We enable *effective collaborations* between organisations, focusing on key mission issues and opportunities, and demonstrating what working together can achieve.

We impact the lives of people across many different cultures, developing *global Christian discipleship*, leadership and faith for a changing world.

VALUES

Our core values are **relational** and based on **sharing faith together**.

PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT

Faith2Share member agencies, and the network itself, seek to bring benefit to the public in all the regions and countries in which we work by equipping individuals and whole communities to live in a way that reflects the Christian faith and its focus on generous love. We seek to work in a positive way alongside and with communities of different faiths and philosophies whilst sharing openly the faith in God which guides our work. We believe our work transforms communities in ways that enhance human life (through

education, medical care, development, etc.), protect the natural environment and build societies of respect, tolerance, peace and spiritual health.

GOVERNANCE

The governance of Faith2Share is provided by the Faith2Share trustees appointed in accordance with the Declaration of Trust. During 2021-22 the following persons served as trustees of Faith2Share.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for ensuring the trustees' report and the financial statements are prepared for each financial year, in accordance with English law and regulations, and UK accounting standards. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies, as described in the Statement of Accounts and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with relevant law and regulations. The trustees are also responsible for

safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. During the year trustees have reviewed all Faith2Share policies including Safeguarding, Risk Management, all Financial Management policies and employment policies.

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES 2021-22

IMPACT STATEMENT

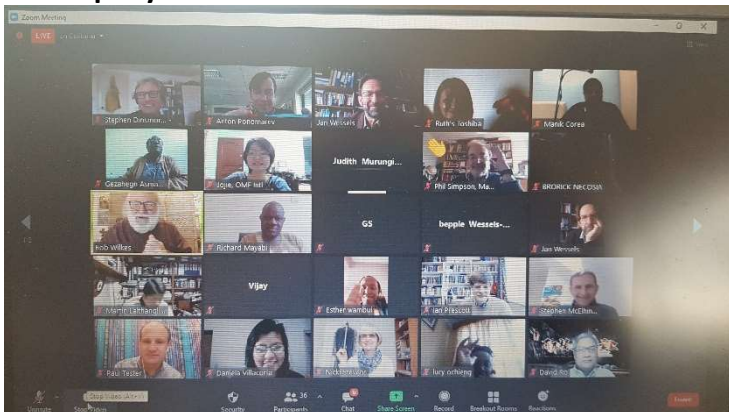
In 2021 Faith2Share has worked with over 180 church and mission leaders and organised prayer meetings, consultations and training events online and taking place physically in Pakistan (with Faith2Share staff joining online). Due to ongoing global Covid-related travel restrictions the majority of our networking activities had to move to online format which was a challenge to some of our members and partners, especially those who are based in rural locations where Internet connectivity presents an issue. Also meeting purely online hindered relationship building activities and real opportunities for follow-up and mission collaboration. However, online networking has also meant new opportunities for connecting and equipping those mission leaders, whom otherwise we would struggle to get to a face-to-face meeting.



Leadership

The core activities of Faith2Share focus on growing and supporting effective indigenous leaders for mission movements around the world. The year 2021 has shown us once again how important it is to stay relevant as a network by equipping, resourcing and encouraging mission leaders as well as discussing together what the future of mission could look like in the post-pandemic world. In particular we seek to encourage women and younger mission leaders. Our flagship resource is a **Leadership Briefing** which is now received by over 850 leaders in around 55 different countries. This monthly production points leaders to a wide range of resources appropriate to their work and challenges them to build collaborations for effective mission. On a daily basis, and at our major events, our small staff team works with leaders in four different ways as outlined below.

Accompany



The methodology of choice for Jesus as he prepared leaders for the church was to 'walk with them', to accompany them on their way through life and ministry. Faith2Share, as a network (not just staff) spends a lot of time 'walking with' leaders, sometimes offering advice or acting as a sounding board, and sometimes just being there to listen, appreciate and encourage.

In 2021 we have put a lot of work into making sure that mission and church leaders have this opportunity to stay connected with each other, to learn from the best practices around the world how to deal with a brand-new scenario of

living through a new situation when neither church meetings nor physical travel were possible or severely limited. We particularly focussed on supporting leaders through having an online International Leadership consultation in March 2021 held over 3 days.

This work is not only carried out by staff but also by senior leaders within the network. Much more regularly this accompaniment takes place by phone, email, Skype, Zoom, WhatsApp, etc. and can involve anything from an urgent request for prayer, to advice regarding a personnel issue or help with locating a specific tool for mission.

Mentor

The mentoring relationship is a more formal aspect of accompaniment. During the year staff and senior leaders within the network have been involved in mentoring a number of leaders, mostly from emerging mission movements. Several of our leaders give a priority to mentoring younger leaders within their own movements and, with the encouragement of Faith2Share, this is now happening across the network. For example, our Africa Coordinator took a lead in a Discipleship course for young professionals online with participants from seven East African countries. Faith2Share has an ambition to develop a more formal mentoring process when we are in a position to resource this.

Consult

The consultation we offer to leaders happens at many levels and is designed to help them respond to the changing mission context in which they find themselves. Because of the Covid restrictions we were not able to organise a physical consultation in 2021 but we had an online consultation (mission



retreat, 3 pre-consultation regional meetings followed by the main consultation in March 2021. Following up on the contacts made at this event, we have been working with Pakistani partners towards having a Discipleship vision-casting consultation in Pakistan which after months of preparations we were able to have in Lahore on 19 November 2021 with about 30 church and mission leaders meeting in person and Faith2Share staff joining online.

Resource

Faith2Share continues to offer to over 800 mission leaders its expertise in identifying and generating appropriate and contextualised resources to equip them to take forward their mission work. During 2021-22 we made a limited number of small grants to emerging mission movements, especially to those who were particularly affected by Covid restrictions and the loss of livelihood but, not being a grant making trust, our normal mode of assistance is through researching sources of resourcing – not just financial. Each month the Faith2Share Leadership Briefing provides access to a wide range of new resources and others are researched on a bespoke basis. A major challenge continues to be the under-resourcing of Global South mission made worse by the cost of living crisis.

Discipleship



A focus on Christian discipleship continues to be the defining characteristic which brings our member movements together and each has been active in making disciples of Jesus Christ in their own context. For some, like Friends Missionary Prayer Band working mostly in rural India, this has involved tens of hundreds of new disciples being brought into the church and equipped for Christian living during the past year, whereas for others, like PMI (working in North Africa) or Church Mission Society (in their Pioneer Ministry work in Britain or establishing mission hubs elsewhere) the work is much slower and involves costly witness.

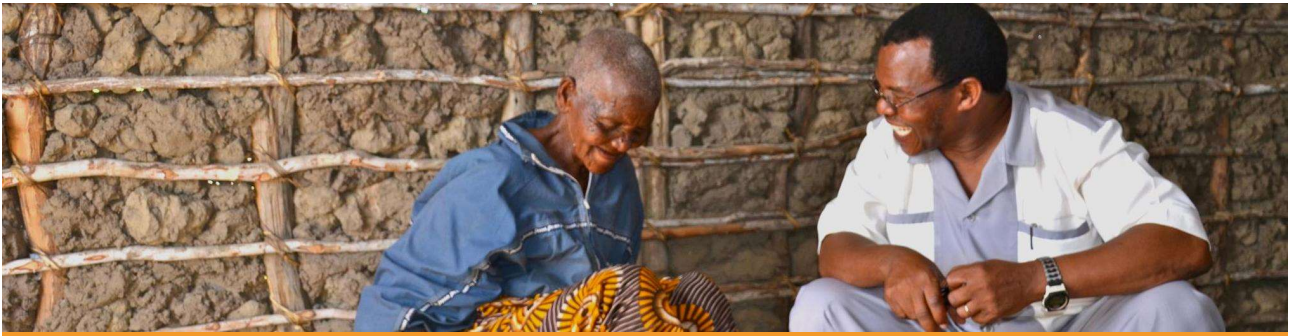
Whole-life Discipleship

Faith2Share has continued its focus this year on “whole-life” discipleship – training our member movements to equip those who choose to follow Jesus, to do so in every area of their life, in family relations, in their employment and use of money, and as they seek to transform the communities in which they live. At the beginning of the year we were unsure whether any actual consultations would take place as this particular training with its use of breakout discussion groups, focus on prayer support and building personal relationships does not lend itself easily to an online delivery. However, we were able to have a hybrid “tester” Discipleship vision-casting consultation in Pakistan in November 2021 (please see above) which was really well received and has led to a firm plan to have a full Whole Life Discipleship consultation in 2022.

A major development in this area of work was the translation of our Discipleship manual to Urdu which we hope to be a valuable resource for Pakistani churches in the future.

Discipleship and the Anglican Communion

Following the adoption by the Anglican Communion, in April 2016, of a commitment to a nine year “Season of Intentional Discipleship and Disciple Making” Faith2Share was open to continue to resource the Anglican Church in this area of its work. However, with the Mission Desk of Anglican Communion Office ceasing to exist by mid-2020, we are yet to see what future opportunities for collaboration are possible in the future.



Collaboration

No mission movement is invited to join the Faith2Share network unless there is a clear commitment to active collaboration in mission. We have therefore been pleased to see, over the past two years, a closer collaboration between our member agencies in many areas of the world. In 2021 the main challenge of fostering collaboration was the limit on meeting people physically but we continued to foster the spirit of sharing and mission collaboration through a series of regular Zoom events, as well as participating in the online meetings organised by other networks and organisations.

Wider Networks



One of the services which Faith2Share provides for its members is regular collaboration with wider mission networks. Our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, is an Associate of IPA (International Partnering Associates) and represents us at Vision Synergy. The International Director Jan Wessels has brought with him a new number of contacts, especially with EEMC and EEA in Europe. Regular contact has also been maintained with IMA (India) and MANI (Africa) as well as with our sister network Micah Global, and also with WEA Mission Commission where our International Director is a member of the Global Leadership Council.

CMS Mission Network

In the course of the year *Faith2Share* continued to facilitate the CMS Mission Network which now has seven member movements and has seen an increased level of intentional working together. The highlight of the year was a virtual “residential” network meeting done over several days in October 2021 which *Faith2Share* facilitated.

Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative

Although Faith2Share handed over the facilitation of the Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative in 2016 the Associate International Director continues to serve on its board. He was involved in the planning of the LOI consultation in Austria 2022, focussed on Scripture engagement, and attended a number of LOI Board meetings and events delivered online.

Consultants

Faith2Share has continued to provide financial administration for two consultants with whom we have a long-standing relationship. During the year they have undertaken consultancy work for SAT-

7, Mahabba International (one of our members), Anglican Communion Office, Oxford Centre for Mission Studies, Oxford Centre for Christian Muslim Studies and several other mission agencies.

Emerging Mission Movements



As a network Faith2Share retains a strong commitment to supporting the emergence and development of new mission movements around the world. We supported the emergence of a new missional entity in Latin America and also provided a small number of mission grants, in Kenya and Russia.

East Africa and Francophone Africa

Our Africa Coordinator continued to work on a regular basis with a number of movements that are not yet strong enough to be considered for membership of the network with a particular focus on Francophone countries in Central Africa. However, since he made decision to leave Kenya in September 2021 and seek residency status in the USA, our work in Africa could not continue as we had planned and at the moment we are looking to identify and mentor a new person to act as our Regional Coordinator and build on our network of contacts across Africa.

Building organizational sustainability and resilience

In order for Faith2Share to continue with its ministry, and considering the major financial challenge that 2020 had brought, a number of organizational changes were put into place that have had a major impact on our organizational capacity. Our International Director, Jan Wessels, has been working as a volunteer for Faith2Share only part-time (50%), with personal support. Since September 2020 our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, has been seconded to another Oxford-based charity for one day a week on a paid basis.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The trustees have in 2020 reviewed the reserves of the charity. Their policy is to hold enough funds to meet four months' operating costs of the charity. At year end the unrestricted cash and investments balance was £76,019. The trustees deem £15,000 to be the minimum cash balance to meet four months operating costs, after the International Director has been working part-time (0.5Fte since July 1, 2021) as a volunteer on personal support and the Associate International Director was seconded to the Centre for Muslim Christian Studies in Oxford (effectively working 0.8Fte for Faith2Share). In February £5,000 was added to the Continuity Reserve so now the charity holds the full amount agreed as Continuity Reserve.

Principal funding sources

The charity's main source of income are membership fees, donations, trusts and foundations and consultancy. The charity's total income decreased by 10% to £112,879 (2020/21: £125,072) compared to the previous year. This moderate decrease provides firm basis for continuing the work of the charity in the coming months.

Income from member movements decreased slightly to £13,543 (2020/201: £17,510). Tax effective individual donations decreased by 22% to £26,373 (2020/21: £33,860) and non-tax effective individual donations decreased very slightly to £11,907 (2020/21: £12,118). Income from trusts decreased significantly to £12,430 (2020/21: £36,554) – mostly due to the timing issue of donations received. Except for the funds raised specifically for the work of two consultants the level of restricted funds received by Faith2Share remains healthily low which ensures that we have maximum flexibility in applying funds where they are most needed within the network.

In the middle of the year Faith2Share trustees set a budget which included a profit of £8,880 which was largely achieved therefore providing a basis to achieve a neutral balance in the long term.

Investment policy and objectives

The trustees have approved the use of the COIF Charities Investment Fund, whose investments are mainly in equities and follows an ethical investment policy. Other cash reserves are held in bank current and deposit accounts. In a challenging investment market our COIF investment has achieved a capital gain of £1,869 during the year (2020-21: deficit of £2,803)

Ongoing Concern

The Trustees have considered the financial strength of the charity, bearing in mind the exceptional pandemic circumstances which have affected its operations during the past two years. Significant cost reductions have already been achieved, and the Trustees have confidence that a satisfactory level of income will continue to arrive. Comparing with the financial situation that the charity was facing in 2020, the Trustees deem the financial position of the charity as stable, although this needs careful monitoring once we can re-start our programmes, international travel and re-building our organisational capacity by employing a Communications person.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIOD

Strategic Direction

The Trustees together with the International Director and other major stakeholders have been given an opportunity to review and revise the strategic direction of Faith2Share but as a network of participating agencies the broad direction will continue to be determined by the vision, needs and aspirations of network members. This is likely to ensure a continued focus on the current vision (see 'Clear Vision' below).



Programmatic Plans

Faith2Share has made a commitment to continue working on Whole-Life Discipleship with its member agencies and in collaboration with the other churches where possible. Increasingly the focus is on training the trainers so that others are enabled to do the training and multiply the impact. Faith2Share is also committed to continue with the Emerging Mission Programme, focusing especially on

under-resourced areas of the world and providing support to our partners there, especially focusing on some of the post-pandemic relief and leadership development.

CLEAR VISION

Through regular meetings with trustees, and dedicated staff 'away days' we continue to clarify the core commitments and areas of work for *Faith2Share* as a network. In communication terms we now regularly use the four simple 'words' (which have provided the structure for this report) to describe our mission. They are:

LEADERSHIP

Accompanying, Mentoring, Consulting and Resourcing
(The core activity of the network)

DISCIPLESHIP

Following Jesus in every aspect of our lives
(The core objective of all our members)

COLLABORATION

Doing mission together whenever and however we can
(The core ethos of the network)

EMERGING MISSION

Encouraging and supporting new movements of God's mission
(The core vision for our life together)

We give thanks to God for his faithfulness and the opportunities afforded to us during 2020-21 to participate in His mission.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ending 31 January 2022

1. Principal accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are carried at current market value where available. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015).

The accounting policies which have been consistently applied throughout the year are set out below:

(b) Funds structure

All funds raised by Faith2Share are used in furtherance of its charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are raised on the basis of an agreement or understanding with the donors that their use will be restricted to certain specific projects or activities within the scope of the stated charitable purposes of Faith2Share. These restricted funds are accounted for separately.

Unrestricted funds are spent at the discretion of Faith2Share's trustees for use on any of the charity's general charitable purposes. With the consent of the relevant donors, tax recovered through Gift Aid is generally treated as unrestricted.

(c) Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction.

(d) Incoming resources

Donations and gift aid are recognised in the financial statements when Faith2Share believes it is entitled to them, the income is judged virtually certain of receipt and the amount can be reliably quantified.

Incoming resources from grants, where there are performance or service deliverables required by the terms of grant, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to payment through its performance.

(e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis.

Cost of Sales comprise those activities outlined under 'Purpose' and 'Objectives' at the beginning of the Annual Report.

Fundraising activities are the costs of generating donations and the transactional costs incurred.

Administrative costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. The costs included in this category relate to organisational administration and compliance.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it is incurred.

(f) Investments and investment income

Investments in equity funds are included at their open market value at the balance sheet date. All gains and losses on investments are taken to the Income and Expenditure Statement.



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LEGAL STATUS

The Faith to Share Trust (also known as Faith2Share) is registered under English law as an unincorporated trust governed by a 'Declaration of Trust' dated 1 October 2009. The Trust was registered as a UK Charity on 13 November 2009 with Registration No. 1132707

The Objectives of the Trust are

(a) to advance the Christian faith, in the United Kingdom and elsewhere, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of the facilitation of collaborative work between existing mission agencies and movements.

(b) to advance the Christian faith, in any country, for the public good, primarily but not exclusively, by means of supporting and resourcing new charitable movements and agencies of Christian mission.

The Faith to Share Trust has been established for the primary purpose of supporting and facilitating the work of the international Faith2Share Network of mission agencies.

The Faith2Share Network traces its origin to a meeting of six mission agencies in London in May 2000. The network was more formally constituted in 2004 when it gained the name Faith2Share and adopted a draft statement of Purpose, Ethos, Principles and Values.

VISION

Our **vision** is to see faith changing lives all over the world.

MISSION

Our **mission** is to enable effective collaborations between mission movements and leaders – working together globally to share faith and change lives.

PRIORITIES

We prioritise working together with *mission movements* from the global north and south who particularly demonstrate an intention of working together.

We focus our support to *mission leaders*, creating new opportunities for them to connect, learn and grow in leadership.

We enable *effective collaborations* between organisations, focusing on key mission issues and opportunities, and demonstrating what working together can achieve.

We impact the lives of people across many different cultures, developing *global Christian discipleship*, leadership and faith for a changing world.

VALUES

Our core values are **relational** and based on **sharing faith together**.

PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT

Faith2Share member agencies, and the network itself, seek to bring benefit to the public in all the regions and countries in which we work by equipping individuals and whole communities to live in a way that reflects the Christian faith and its focus on generous love. We seek to work in a positive way alongside and with communities of different faiths and philosophies whilst sharing openly the faith in God which guides our work. We believe our work transforms communities in ways that enhance human life (through

education, medical care, development, etc.), protect the natural environment and build societies of respect, tolerance, peace and spiritual health.

Trustees met on four occasions during 2020-2021 by Zoom as well as held the Re-imagining Faith2Share (vision casting) meeting with major partners and stakeholders in May 2020.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for ensuring the trustees' report and the financial statements are prepared for each financial year, in accordance with English law and regulations, and UK accounting standards. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies, as described in the Statement of Accounts and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with relevant law and regulations. The trustees are also responsible for

safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. During the year trustees have reviewed all Faith2Share policies including Safeguarding, Risk Management, all Financial Management policies and employment policies.

The corporate activities of *Faith2Share* are managed by a small staff team based in Oxford, UK, Nairobi, Kenya and Chennai, India and led by the International Director based in The Netherlands.

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES 2020-21

IMPACT STATEMENT

In 2020 Faith2Share has worked with over 150 church and mission leaders and organised prayer meetings, consultations and training events online and taking place physically in Burundi. Due to Covid-related travel restrictions globally the majority of our networking activities had to move to online format which was a challenge to some of our members and partners, especially those who are based in rural locations where Internet connectivity presents an issue. However, online networking has also meant new opportunities for connecting and equipping those mission leaders, whom otherwise we would struggle to get to a face-to-face meeting, as well as reaching out a younger generation of Christian leaders who were more familiar with new technologies.



The core activities of Faith2Share focus on growing and supporting effective indigenous leaders for mission movements around the world. The year 2020 has shown us once again how important it is to network with and equip mission and church leadership as globally everyone has been affected by the Covid-19 pandemic and subsequent national lockdowns and economic fallout from the pandemic. Mission leaders are often on the frontline of the mission work and sadly, we have lost a number of our long-standing partners due to Covid-19 during the year. In particular we seek to encourage women and younger leaders. Our flagship resource is a **Leadership Briefing** which is now received by over 850 leaders in around 55 different countries. This monthly production points leaders to a wide range of resources appropriate to their work and challenges them to build effective collaborations for effective mission. On a daily basis, and at our major events, our small staff team works with leaders in four different ways as outlined below.

Accompany



The methodology of choice for Jesus as he prepared leaders for the church was to 'walk with them', to accompany them on their way through life and ministry. Faith2Share, as a network (not just staff) spends a lot of time 'walking with' leaders, sometimes offering advice or acting as a sounding board, sometimes praying with or for them and sometimes to listen, appreciate and encourage. In 2020 we have put a lot of work into making sure that mission and church leaders have this opportunity to stay connected with each

other, to learn from the best practices around the world how to deal with a brand-new scenario of living through a lockdown situation when neither church meetings nor physical travel were possible. We particularly focussed on supporting leaders through information sharing and prayer, starting with a Global Prayer online meeting in mid-March 2020, just before many parts of the world were about to go into hard lockdown.

This work is not only carried out by staff but also by senior leaders within the network. Much more regularly this accompaniment takes place by phone, email, Skype, Zoom, WhatsApp, etc. and can involve anything from an urgent request for prayer, to advice regarding a personnel issue or help with locating a specific tool for mission.

Mentor

The mentoring relationship is a more formal aspect of accompaniment. During the year staff and senior leaders within the network have been involved in mentoring a number of leaders, mostly from emerging mission movements. Several of our leaders give a priority to mentoring younger leaders within their own movements and, with the encouragement of Faith2Share, this is now happening across the network. For example, our Africa Coordinator started a Discipleship course for young professionals online with participants from seven East African countries. Faith2Share has an ambition to develop a more formal mentoring process when we are in a position to resource this.

Consult

The consultation we offer to leaders happens at many levels and is designed to help them respond to the changing mission context in which they find themselves. Because of the Covid restrictions we were not able to organise a physical consultation in 2020 but we started planning for a virtual consultation in early 2021. In December



2020 we resourced a Whole-Life Discipleship consultation in Bujumbura, Burundi where a number of local leaders were either able to meet in small groups or follow the event live through Facebook feed and a local TV station.

Resource

Faith2Share continues to offer to over 700 mission leaders its expertise in identifying and generating appropriate and contextualised resources to equip them to take forward their mission work. During 2020-21 we made a limited number of small grants to emerging mission movements, especially to those who were particularly affected by Covid restrictions and also floods in East Africa but, not being a grant making trust, our normal mode of assistance is through researching sources of resourcing – not just financial. Each month the Faith2Share Leadership Briefing provides access to a wide range of new resources and others are researched on a bespoke basis. A major challenge continues to be the under-resourcing of Global South mission. Two recent examples of resourcing were providing a small grant to help a farming community in Western Kenya to deal with the aftermath of a devastating flood and to facilitate ministry support to a theological educator in Central Russia.

Discipleship



A focus on Christian discipleship continues to be the defining characteristic which brings our member movements together and each has been active in making disciples of Jesus Christ in their own context. For some, like Friends Missionary Prayer Band working mostly in rural India, this has involved tens of hundreds of new disciples being brought into the church and equipped for Christian living during the past year, whereas for others, like PMI (working in North Africa) or Church Mission Society (in their Pioneer Ministry work in Britain) the work is much slower and involves costly witness.

Whole-life Discipleship

Faith2Share has continued its focus this year on “whole-life” discipleship – training our member movements to equip those who choose to follow Jesus, to do so in every area of their life, in family relations, in their employment and use of money, and as they seek to transform the communities in which they live. At the beginning of the year we were unsure whether any actual consultations would take place as this particular training with its use of breakout discussion groups, focus on prayer support and building personal relationships does not lend itself easily to an online delivery. However, with local restrictions easing in some countries, we were able to resource and facilitate “at a distance” an actual meeting in Bujumbura, Burundi where local leaders were able to meet in small cohorts or follow the training through Facebook live streaming. A major challenge of the delivery of the training was weak Internet connectivity so we could not facilitate the process as we are used to.

A major development in this area of work was further developing a follow-up process several months after the Whole-Life Discipleship training had taken place: for example, encouraging participants to set up Whatsapp groups and share their learning and best practice of doing discipleship work in their localities.

Discipleship and the Anglican Communion

Following the adoption by the Anglican Communion, in April 2016, of a commitment to a nine year “Season of Intentional Discipleship and Disciple Making” Faith2Share was open to continue to resource the Anglican Church in this area of its work. However, with the Mission Desk of Anglican Communion Office ceasing to exist by mid-2020, we are yet to see what future opportunities for collaboration are possible in the future.



Collaboration

No mission movement is invited to join the Faith2Share network unless there is a clear commitment to active collaboration in mission. We have therefore been pleased to see, over the past two years, a closer collaboration between our member agencies in many areas of the world. In 2020 the main challenge of fostering collaboration was the limit on meeting people physically but we continued to foster the spirit of sharing and mission collaboration through a series of Zoom events, starting with a global online meeting in March 2020 but also organising regional meetings via Zoom throughout the year.

Wider Networks



One of the services which Faith2Share provides for its members is regular collaboration with wider mission networks. Our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, is an Associate of IPA (International Partnering Associates) and represents us at Vision Synergy. The new International Director Jan Wessels has brought with him a new number of contacts, especially with EEMC and EEA in Europe. Regular contact has also been maintained with IMA (India) and MANI (Africa) as well as with our sister network Micah Global, as they were going through a leadership change.

World Evangelical Alliance Mission Commission

Faith2Share is recognised within the global mission community as a body with expertise in partnership (or collaboration) and focus on discipleship and as such contributes to the larger community of the World Evangelical Alliance Mission Commission (WEA MC). Our International Director has become a member of the Global Leadership Council of the Mission Commission.

CMS Mission Network

In the course of the year *Faith2Share* continued to facilitate the CMS Mission Network which now has seven member movements and has seen an increased level of intentional working together. The highlight of the year was a virtual “residential” network meeting done over several days in October 2020 which *Faith2Share* facilitated.

Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative

Although Faith2Share handed over the facilitation of the Lausanne-Orthodox Initiative in 2016 the Associate International Director continues to serve on its board. He was involved in the planning of

the LOI consultation in Austria 2021 (now postponed to 2022), focussed on Scripture engagement and attended a number of LOI Board meetings done online.

Consultants

Faith2Share has continued to provide financial administration for two consultants with whom we have a long-standing relationship. During the year they have undertaken consultancy work for SAT-7, Mahabba International (two of our members), and several other mission agencies. Since retiring from Faith2Share, Mark Oxbrow has started offering consultancy services under the umbrella of Faith2Share to Anglican Communion Office, Oxford Centre for Mission Studies and Oxford Centre for Christian Muslim Studies.

Emerging Mission Movements



As a network Faith2Share retains a strong commitment to supporting the emergence and development of new mission movements around the world.

East Africa and Francophone Africa

Our Africa Coordinator, whose time with us was increased during 2019 to two days a week, works on a regular basis with a number of movements that are not yet strong enough to be considered for membership of the network with a particular focus on Francophone countries in Central Africa.

Although 2020 meant a lot of disruption to planned activities with prolonged periods when both of our Regional Coordinators endured periods of hard lockdown and stayed at home for weeks on end, a lot of new initiatives have taken place online reaching out to a new generation of younger Christian leaders who were trained and discipled in the course of the year.

Building organizational sustainability and resilience

In order for Faith2Share to continue with its ministry, and considering the major financial challenge that 2020 with its restrictions has brought, a number of organizational changes were made through the year that have had a major impact on our organizational capacity. During the first national lockdown in the UK, we had to part ways with our Communications and Fundraising Consultant, Mike Hill, and we hope to engage a new person to help us with this role in the coming months. Since July 2020 our International Director, Jan Wessels, is working as a volunteer for Faith2Share only part-time (50%), with personal support. Since September 2020 our Associate International Director, Anton Ponomarev, has been seconded to another Oxford-based charity for one day a week on a paid basis.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The trustees have in 2020 reviewed the reserves of the charity. Their policy is to hold enough funds to meet four months' operating costs of the charity. At year end the unrestricted cash and investments balance was £51,928. The trustees deem £15,000 to be the minimum cash balance to meet four months operating costs, after the International Director started working parttime (0.5Fte since July 1, 2021) as a volunteer on personal support and the Associate International Director was seconded to the Centre for Muslim Christian Studies in Oxford (effectively working 0.8Fte for Faith2Share). In December £10k was set aside already in a Continuity Reserve. It was decided to monitor the fundraising activities closely in the 1st quarter of the new financial year, before adjusting the amount of continuity reserve.

Principal funding sources

The charity's main source of income are membership fees, donations, trusts and foundations and consultancy. The charity's total income increased by 26% to £125,072 (2019/20: £99,308) compared to the previous year. This moderate increase reflects the change of the business operating model halfway through the year and provides firm basis for continuing the work of the charity in the coming months.

Income from member movements increased very slightly to £17,510 (2019/20: £17,424). Tax effective individual donations increased by 32.5% to £33,860 (2019/20: £25,554) and non-tax effective individual donations increased by 6% to £12,118 (2019/20: £11,431). Income from trusts increased significantly to £36,554 (2019/20: £13,155). Except for the funds raised specifically for the work of two consultants the level of restricted funds received by Faith2Share remains healthily low which ensures that we have maximum flexibility in applying funds where they are most needed within the network.

In the middle of the year Faith2Share trustees set a budget which included a profit of £15,000 which was largely achieved therefore providing a basis to achieve a neutral balance in the long term.

Investment policy and objectives

The trustees have approved the use of the COIF Charities Investment Fund, whose investments are mainly in equities and follows an ethical investment policy. Other cash reserves are held in bank current and deposit accounts. In a challenging investment market our COIF investment has achieved a capital deficit of £2,803 during the year (2019-20: gain of £11,597)

Going Concern

The Trustees have considered the financial strength of the charity, bearing in mind the exceptional pandemic circumstances which have affected its operations during the past year. Significant cost reductions have already been achieved, and the Trustees have confidence that a satisfactory level of income will continue to arrive. In the first 4 months of the following year a deficit of only £6,000 has occurred, which they consider to be manageable in comparison to the charity's unrestricted reserves of £52,000 at January 2021. Therefore they believe that it is reasonable to view these accounts on a going concern basis.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIOD

Strategic Direction

The Trustees together with the International Director and other major stakeholders have been given an opportunity to review and revise the strategic direction of Faith2Share but as a network of participating agencies the broad direction will continue to be determined by the vision, needs and aspirations of network members. This is likely to ensure a continued focus on the current vision (see 'Clear Vision' below).



Programmatic Plans

Faith2Share has made a commitment to continue working on Whole-Life Discipleship with its member agencies and in collaboration with the Anglican Communion and other churches where possible. This will mean that the series of training consultations around the world will continue at least for the next two years. Increasingly the focus is on training the trainers so that others are enabled to do the training and multiply the impact.

Faith2Share is also committed to continue with the Emerging Mission Programme, focusing especially on under-resourced areas of the world and providing support to our partners there, especially focusing on some of the post-Covid relief and leadership development.

Prayer and financial support

In response to the work of the two consultants who worked with us in 2015-16 we have made significant investment during the past few years in our communication and fundraising activities. One element has been an intentional programme to actively engage over 1,000 people who started receiving Faith2Share communication in 2018.

Faith2Share is also committed to diversifying its support base and will be looking to increase the level of support received from outside the UK (specifically Western Europe and North America).

CLEAR VISION

Through regular meetings with trustees, and dedicated staff 'away days' we continue to clarify the core commitments and areas of work for *Faith2Share* as a network. In communication terms we now regularly use the four simple 'words' (which have provided the structure for this report) to describe our mission. They are:

LEADERSHIP

Accompanying, Mentoring, Consulting and Resourcing
(The core activity of the network)

DISCIPLESHIP

Following Jesus in every aspect of our lives
(The core objective of all our members)

COLLABORATION

Doing mission together whenever and however we can
(The core ethos of the network)

EMERGING MISSION

Encouraging and supporting new movements of God's mission
(The core vision for our life together)

We give thanks to God for his faithfulness and the opportunities afforded to us during 2020-21 to participate in His mission.



Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ending 31 January 2021

1. Principal accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are carried at current market value where available. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015).

The accounting policies which have been consistently applied throughout the year are set out below:

(b) Funds structure

All funds raised by Faith2Share are used in furtherance of its charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are raised on the basis of an agreement or understanding with the donors that their use will be restricted to certain specific projects or activities within the scope of the stated charitable purposes of Faith2Share. These restricted funds are accounted for separately.

Unrestricted funds are spent at the discretion of Faith2Share's trustees for use on any of the charity's general charitable purposes. With the consent of the relevant donors, tax recovered through Gift Aid is generally treated as unrestricted.

(c) Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction.

(d) Incoming resources

Donations and gift aid are recognised in the financial statements when Faith2Share believes it is entitled to them, the income is judged virtually certain of receipt and the amount can be reliably quantified.

Incoming resources from grants, where there are performance or service deliverables required by the terms of grant, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to payment through its performance.

(e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis.

Cost of Sales comprise those activities outlined under 'Purpose' and 'Objectives' at the beginning of the Annual Report.

Fundraising activities are the costs of generating donations and the transactional costs incurred.

Administrative costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. The costs included in this category relate to organisational administration and compliance.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it is incurred.

(f) Investments and investment income

Investments in equity funds are included at their open market value at the balance sheet date. All gains and losses on investments are taken to the Income and Expenditure Statement.

Independent Examiner's statement


