The Trustees present their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2022. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the accounts and comply with the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

2. Structure, governance and management

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities:

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of its financial activities for that period, together with its assets and liabilities at the end of the period, and adequately distinguish any material special trust or other restricted fund of the Charity. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether the policies adopted are in accordance with the appropriate SORP on Accounting by Charities and the Accounting Regulations and with applicable Accounting Standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

Legal and administrative information

The governing body of the Circuit is the Methodist Church and the governing body of the Methodist Church is the Conference. The Circuit's governing documents are the Deed of Union 1932 and the Methodist Church Act 1976 which give the authority under which the Methodist Church acts. The Constitution, Practice and Discipline of the Methodist Church governs the activities of the Circuit.

The Circuit is a Registered Charity number 1132962.

Trustees

The Trustees comprise the Ministers and Circuit Stewards who are listed on page 1 together with other appointed representatives, including representatives from all the local churches which are part of the Circuit.

The principal addresses of the Circuit's advisors are listed on page 1.

The Circuit Stewards under the direction of the Circuit Treasurer are responsible for the detailed examination of the financial statements and for presenting them to the Circuit Meeting.

There are 17 local Methodist churches which belong to the Circuit, including 1 which is a class of another church and 2 which are in Local Ecumenical Partnerships. The Circuit belongs to the Yorkshire North & East District which is one of 30 Districts of the Methodist Church in Great Britain.

Training for Trustees is available via the District and information is also available on the Methodist website.

Decisions within the Methodist Church are reached in accordance with the rules and regulations set out in the document entitled "Constitutional Practice and Discipline of the Methodist Church" and under the Methodist Conference. It is in accordance with these regulations that decisions are reached by the Circuit Meeting and other related committees.

The day to day policy and management of the Charity is led by the Circuit Leadership Team comprising the Ministers, Circuit Stewards and other appointed representatives. They report on a quarterly basis to the Circuit Meeting which is the main decision-making body.

Risk Assessment

The Trustees have examined the major strategic business and operational risks which the Charity faces, and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to monitor these risks.

With regard to issues of Safeguarding, the Circuit appoints a Safeguarding Officer who, under guidance provided by the Methodist Church, ensures the necessary training courses are provided and that best practice is followed. Risks associated with the care and maintenance of property are also carefully monitored and again guidance, provided by the Methodist Church, is followed.

3. Financial Review

The Circuit Accounts include the following two unrestricted funds:

- (a) The General Account which is the main operating account through which the expenditure and revenue for both operational and strategic purposes are handled.
- (b) The Model Trust Fund which receives the net sale proceeds of disused churches and manses no longer required. Surplus funds are used for making grants to local Methodist churches or approved projects which seek to fulfil the mission objectives of the Circuit.

In addition, there are three restricted funds which are for specific areas of outreach.

Reserves

It is the policy of the Charity to hold sufficient reserves to provide working capital for its continued operations. At the year end the total net assets were £2,739,425 (2021 £2,845,581) which includes a Permanent Endowment of £3,235 (2021 £3,347) and restricted funds totalling £13,147. The unrestricted funds amount to £2,723,043 and include property used in the work of the charity valued at £2,311,922 leaving unrestricted liquid funds of £411,121 (2021 £521,326). In addition, grants awarded to projects but not yet paid amount to £90,735 at the year-end.

4. Public Benefit Statement

The Trustees wish to confirm that they have complied with the duty in Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission in respect of public benefit in exercising their powers and duties. They have done so via a detailed system of checks and balances involving regular feedback to the Circuit Meeting and through ensuring that actions taken and decisions made are always in accordance with the Constitutional Practice and Discipline of the Methodist Church.

5. Objectives and Aims

Nature and Purposes

The primary purpose for which the Charity is constituted is to advance the mission of the Church in the geographical area it covers which comprises the centre and west of Hull and the towns and villages on its western outskirts. The Circuit's Mission Policy includes the following extract:

"We believe that we are called together by God to be Spirit-led, with a heart for Jesus and a passion for mission. This belief shapes our decision making, our vision and the allocation of our God-given resources and leads us to identify our key priorities for mission. As a Circuit we will seek to support and resource work which meets one or more of the following objectives, and which can be either church or circuit led:

Nature and Purposes (continued)

- a) *Making new disciples and growing in discipleship*
- b) *Establishing fresh expressions of church and church planting*
- c) *Initiatives in mission-shaped ministry*
- d) *Community focussed social action*
- e) *Work with families, young people and children, and older people*
- f) *Reaching the missing generations*
- g) *Building community cohesion"*

The Circuit provides opportunities for churches to work together and support each other, by offering them resources for finance, personnel and expertise which may not be available locally.

The Circuit serves the local churches, the District and the Conference in the support, deployment and oversight of the various ministries of the Church, and in programmes of training.

Objectives

The purposes of the Methodist Church are and shall be deemed to have been since the Deed of Union 1932, the advancement of:

- a) The Christian faith in accordance with the doctrinal standards and discipline of the Methodist Church;
- b) Any charitable purpose for the time being of any connexional, district, circuit, local or other organisation of the Methodist Church;
- c) Any charitable purpose for the time being of any society or institution, subsidiary or ancillary to the Methodist Church;
- d) Any purpose for the time being of any charity being a charity subsidiary or ancillary to the Methodist Church.

The Circuit produces a quarterly preaching plan to ensure regular public acts of worship take place at each of the churches for which it has oversight. Each individual church has responsibility for organising its own regular activities. In addition occasional events, activities and acts of worship are organised on a Circuit wide basis.

Yearly objectives

- To facilitate the local churches to enable them to continue as Christian places of worship where all are welcome.
- To provide resources to enable churches to reach out to the local community and to pursue the objectives set out in the Circuit Mission Policy.
- To continue to develop leadership, governance and management within the Circuit.

Long term objectives

- To develop an increased awareness of the Circuit, its purposes and opportunities amongst local churches and their members.
- To increase the involvement of lay ministry in the life of the Church.
- To develop opportunities for ecumenical working and for working with neighbouring Circuits.
- To ensure the best use of resources in terms of personnel, finance and property.
- To give increased consideration to succession planning.

Strategies for achieving the objectives

The Circuit Staff hold periodic meetings as do the Circuit Stewards. Both groups come together at regular Circuit Leadership Team meetings to consider matters within the Circuit and to seek the best way forward. In addition the Circuit Stewards aim to send a representative to all Church Council meetings of local churches. On a quarterly basis the Circuit Meeting is held where reports are presented covering all aspects of the Circuit's work. This is also the meeting where proposals are submitted, discussions take place and decisions are made.

The Trustees believe they have strong financial controls in position.

Grant making policy

Grants are awarded to schemes and projects submitted by the local churches which meet certain criteria. These schemes and projects can be either for the development of Mission and Ministry Projects or for Property Schemes. The fundamental requirement is that the grants will assist the mission objectives of both the Circuit and the local church to be met. Occasionally grant applications to outside bodies are approved where it is considered that their work is in line with the Circuit's mission objectives. All grant applications are scrutinised by the appropriate Circuit officers and approval is given by the Circuit Leadership Team which has delegated powers.

Extent of the use of volunteers in achieving aims

Volunteers are involved in all aspects of the work of the Circuit and include Local Preachers who regularly lead worship, Circuit Stewards and many others who perform administrative duties and hold representative roles. The level of dependence on voluntary workers within the Circuit is extremely high, as it is in any Church organisation.

6. Achievements and Performance

- Several of our churches continue to struggle to recover from the curtailment of their activities during the Covid pandemic. This has impacted on their income and reserves and has meant that some have had to reduce their financial support to the Circuit. Nevertheless, opportunities have arisen for exploring new ways of worshipping and serving the community and increased use has been made of technology.
- Our local churches have now been grouped into 4 hubs and the intention is that they will work more closely together and explore ways in which they can share resources and plan ahead.
- There is a continuation of missional and outreach activities at many of our local churches, often supported by grant funding from both the Circuit and District.
- Work continues at our Selby Street Mission to provide a welcoming base and drop-in centre where fellowship and support is available. A similar resource is provided at our Mosaic Church and we have successfully obtained significant grant funding to safeguard this work for the future. Princes Avenue Methodist Church continues to provide much needed help and support to refugees and asylum seekers via its Open Doors project.
- We have established working groups including the following:
 1. Way Forward Group – looking at new ways for churches to work more effectively together in hubs
 2. Managers Group – dealing with recruitment of lay employees to manage governance and take some of the burden off circuit stewards
 3. Children and Youth Group – looking at how this work can be developed and grown
 4. Evangelism and Mission Group – looking at new ways to further develop this aspect of our calling in the Circuit
 5. Line Managers' Group – responsible for overseeing matters related to staff employed by both the Circuit and our local churches
 6. Safeguarding Officers' Group – responsible for overseeing this important part of our work
- Discussions are taking place with the Beverley Circuit of the Methodist Church to ascertain whether a future merger of our 2 Circuits would be in the best interests of both Circuits.

Challenges for the future

There are a reducing number of active ordained ministers in the Methodist Church nationally and our challenge locally is to recruit and train more local lay pastors to fill some roles.

In common with national trends, many churches have an ageing and falling membership. This makes it more difficult to appoint suitable and willing volunteers to hold office and we continue to explore alternative ways to reduce the burdens of governance amongst our members. A step forward with this initiative is the appointment of a Circuit Finance Officer and Property Officer. We hope that these appointments to undertake specialist tasks, will ease the burden on volunteers and make the position of Circuit Steward a more attractive proposition, thus encouraging more people to offer to serve in this role.

Despite generous and sacrificial giving by many, there is pressure on some churches to raise sufficient funds to meet their financial obligations in terms of care of their buildings and support of the Circuit. This clearly has the potential to eventually limit the work of the Circuit.

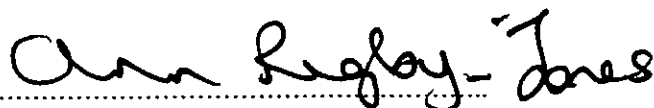
It is with confidence that we will approach these challenges and we trust that with prayer we will fulfil the purposes which God has in store for us.

Notes to the Accounts

1 Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the Charities Act 2011 in accordance with the 2014 version of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities applicable in the UK (effective from 1 January 2015) – the Charities SORP (FRSSE) – in replacement for the SORP's 2005 version specified in its related 2008 Regulations and in accordance with the 'true and fair override' provision contained therein."

2 Funds

The funds held constitute: General Funds held for any purpose of the Circuit which are Unrestricted. The Circuit Model Trust Fund has wide purposes defined in Standing Orders and is categorised as unrestricted. Restricted funds which are held for a narrower purpose. There is also an Endowment fund. Details of each material fund are disclosed in the final note to these accounts. Any funds may be represented by more than just cash.

3 Accounting policies

Basis

These accounts have been prepared on the basis of historical cost except that investments are shown at their market value at the end of the year, on the accruals basis to show a true and fair view of the Circuit's financial position and activities.

Income Recognition

Income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the Circuit becomes entitled to the resources, and the trustees are reasonably certain they will receive the resources; and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Resources Expended

This is recognised when a liability is incurred, or a constructive obligation arises, that results in the payment being unavoidable. Liabilities are recognised as soon as an outflow of economic benefit is considered more likely than not under the legal or constructive obligation committing the Circuit to pay out resources.

Grants

Grants made by the Circuit from its own funds are recognised in full when the Circuit accepts that there is a legal or operational obligation to make the payment.

VAT

Since the Circuit is not VAT registered, all input VAT is charged with the expenses to which it refers.

Tangible fixed assets for use by the Circuit

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year.

The freehold property is shown in the accounts at 2015 deemed values using the buildings insurance value at that date or cost if purchased subsequently. No depreciation is provided on the buildings because the trustees consider the current residual fair value (on the assumption that they had reached the end of their useful economic life by the year-end) to be not less than their current value. Any depreciation would not be material. The properties have been reviewed for impairment.

Investment Properties

Investment properties - no property is currently deemed to not be held for the long term purposes of the charity.

Investments

Investments are valued in the balance sheet at market value at the year end. Investment income is included in the accounts when receivable and any gains or losses on revaluation at the year end are shown in the SOFA.

Debtors and Prepayments

Debtors comprise amounts owed to the Circuit and also include the prepayment of the September stipend in August.

Creditors

Creditors include sundry expenses owing and also the 1st quarter assessment received in August.

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No employees received employee benefits of more than £60,000. There is no accrual for holiday pay as it is immaterial; the holiday the holiday year ends on 31 August. All staff are paid at or above the Living Wage.

Pensions

All Ministers are members of the Methodist Ministers' Pension Scheme (MMPS) which is a defined benefit scheme. The Circuit has also formed its own pension scheme administered by NEST to comply with the requirements of the UK Government's workplace pensions legislation. All lay employees are given the option of belonging to the scheme and the Circuit makes contributions equivalent to 6% of gross earnings for all lay employees who choose to belong to the scheme.

The Circuit owns 8 manses (2021: 8) of which 6 were occupied by Ministers during 2021-22. Manses not required for Ministers are let out on assured short term tenancies until they are required for future occupation by a Minister.

Other buildings comprise Selby Street Mission for which the Circuit has assumed responsibility as Managing Trustee.

Fixtures, fittings and equipment comprises office equipment and a portable baptistry.

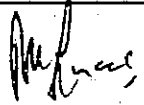

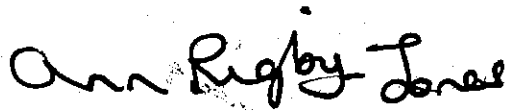

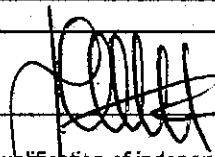
