#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, adopted 29 October 2009, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The trustees determine the general management policy of the charity; they review the effectiveness of all operational, financial and compliance systems and controls.

It is the intention of the charity, to encourage new trustees in order to broaden its support. New trustees will need to be approved by all the existing trustees.

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

Education remains the most critical path to social mobility, yet the journey is long and challenging for children living in deprived communities. Entrepreneur Seema Sharma founded Child Action in response to the terrible poverty she witnessed in Mumbai whilst filming "Slumdog Secret Millionaire", which aired on Channel 4 in January 2010.

The documentary followed her journey as a volunteer for three grassroots Non-Government Organisations (NGOs) in Mumbai which work tirelessly to provide underprivileged youth with educational and personal development opportunities. These 3 NGOs are Child Action's local project implementation partners:

1. Doorstep School
2. Toybank
3. Apnalaya

#### **Background:**

As poor families migrate to urban cities such as Mumbai in search of work, they settle into shelters on grounds they do not own, face the risk of eviction and are often missing the crucial papers they need to access services, such as birth certificates and residential papers. For those who overcome these identity barriers, the cost of schooling is prohibitive, the walk to the nearest school is often long and full of hazards to their health and personal safety, and children of families living in informal settlements are not always welcome in schools. As they struggle to put a meal on the table, schooling is low on the priority list and many send children to work instead.

A network of support systems are required to help children to overcome these seemingly insurmountable hurdles.

#### **Vision:**

Our vision is to support preventative strategies which ensure that marginalised disempowered children are given the same opportunities as the general population, with the ultimate outcome of self-reliance and self-sufficiency.

The charity's work reflects the passionate commitment of the trustees to preserve and protect physical and psychological health and wellbeing by assisting in the provision of facilities, support services and equipment not normally provided by the statutory authorities.

#### **Goals:**

- In India: To amplify the work of social entrepreneurs and NGOs already working to increase access to knowledge, education and personal development opportunities for marginalised children.
- In the UK: To foster empathy and understanding of the challenges faced by poor communities in India, and empower young people with entrepreneurial skills to help bring about positive change.

#### **Strategy:**

- Raising Awareness: Providing a 'face' in the UK for its partner NGOs, helping them to 'package' their projects and impact reports in terms which are easily understood by supporters.
- Raising Funds: Remitting between £50,000 and £75,000/ annum to support selected programmes organised and run by each of our partner NGOs.

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Child Action has issued more than £894,000 in donations and grants for education and personal development projects since 2010. Sharma and her husband Professor Sanjay Sharma have personally contributed a substantial proportion of this and the rest comes from trusts, foundations, schools and well-wishers.

This predominantly goes to a trio of grassroots NGOs that Sharma was drawn to when she visited Mumbai to film an episode of Channel 4's "The Secret Millionaire." Toybank distributes toys and games to children to facilitate early learning through play; at Doorstep School she made a lifetime commitment to fund a bus converted into a "School on Wheels" for marginalised children; and at Apnalya she has championed the empowerment of young women living on a Mumbai rubbish dump, enabling them to challenge gender biases and become self-reliant.

This year, Child Action funding enabled the following NGO partner programmes:

1. **Toybank – £47,666 donated** . Toybank provides safe spaces for *education through play* for children. The funds are used to run Games Libraries and Play Centres in urban Mumbai and in rural areas through partnerships between Toybank and Manavlok (NGO) in the Beed district of rural Maharashtra, and between Toybank and Snehalaya in the Ahmednagar district. Our funding provides ongoing support for core operations and local Power of Play Competitions which use innovative metrics for sportsmanship, team work and collaboration to declare winners.

The pandemic changed the operating model for Toybank, funding was redirected to design and launch a Play2Learn Kit of downloadable self-directed playsheets which could be shared using smartphones and used independently at any time of the day to provide:

- Meaningful engagement at home during the lockdown
- Accessible and self-directed learning within safe spaces at home
- Stimulating learning environment fostering critical thinking and problem solving
- Opportunity for normal development, building autonomy and exploration
- Reducing the severity of potential trauma caused by fear and uncertainty
- Enabling caregivers to focus on their responsibilities
- Promoting opportunities for early learning and responsive caregiving

2. **Doorstep School – £30,000 donated**. Education remains the most critical path to social mobility and the closures and restrictions are having an economic impact on poverty struck families which run the risk that many will drop out of school altogether.

Doorstep School brings education to the doorsteps of children living in challenging circumstances, such as on the street or in slum communities. Child Action provided a grant for operations for Door Step School (DSS) to provide 2 "Schools on Wheels" (SOWs) at 4 locations of western suburb of Mumbai city. Three locations are street side locations and one is in the tribal part of Sanjay Gandhi National Park, and each SOW looks after up to 125 children.

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

This year, our donations totaled £ 77,666 ( £71,206 – 2023 ) for new and ongoing projects supported by Child Action. Since the charity was founded on 21 January 2010 it has made £894,175 of charitable donations as follows:

The closing reserves at the year-end were £29,288 (2023 - £43,725) all in unrestricted funds.

The charity does not have a reserve policy as it does not carry any overhead.

Fundraising activities are sponsored by trustees Seema Sharma and Sanjay Sharma so that all funds raised are used for Child Action's charitable work on the ground in India, or in UK schools. The Trustees monitor funds on an ongoing basis in light of recognised risks and also consider the extent to which activities should be planned, extended or modified as circumstances arise.

### Special thanks for Supporters

We are grateful to all our donors and supporters with a special mention for the support we have received from regular and new supporters, and from our youth volunteers.

- The Hemraj Goyal Foundation (HGF) have supported the work done by all three of our NGO partners since 2016, and donated funds to purchase a second School on Wheels with Doorstep School in 2019, committing to ongoing running costs. This doubled our reach and impact at Doorstep School, enabling us to support the ongoing education of up to 250 children. This year we were grateful to receive £35K from HGF
- The Millary Giving Fund have supported Toybank and Doorstep School since 2019. David Millary visited our projects in Mumbai in February 2020 to assess how best to target future support, with a particular focus on using technology to deliver education and opportunities for youth more effectively. This year £22,327 was received via CAF America.
- Sarah Hodgson of Accounting Solutions London and Malta, who has generously provided probono accounting services for Child Action since 2009.

Last but not least we are very grateful for the ongoing support we receive from our 4 youth ambassadors, Anushka Sharma, Shivani Sharma, Nikhil Bahal and Esha Bahal. They help to showcase the work we have been doing with our partner organisations.

### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The trustees are committed to securing ongoing funding to facilitate the development of tangible and intangible infrastructures to support children and their parents.

#### Raising funds

Three key themes will continue to be central to fundraising efforts:

- Major donors – consolidating relationships with grant making organisations and individual donors through progress reporting and opportunities to visit work for themselves .
- Trusts and Foundations – harnessing the ongoing support of more such organisations
- Individual fundraising - generating a strong base for raising funds online through portals such as Global Giving, Justgiving and CAF America.

#### Raising Awareness

Three key themes will continue to be central to awareness raising activities:

- Collaboration – working with individual donors, trusts and foundations.
- Sponsored events – widening the size of our supporter base and generating wider interest in the charity's programmes through networking fundraisers.
- Enterprise4Change.com – continuing to inspire youth in UK schools with our online resource, produced in collaboration with the British Asian Trust ( a Prince's Charity), which provides educational resources for teachers about Mumbai slums and inspires children to make a difference on the global stage.

#### Doorstep School

The launch of our replacement bus to serve 135 children from a tribal community comes with an ongoing commitment to maintain the School on Wheels. In 2019 The Hemraj Goyal Foundation launched an HGF branded School on Wheels in collaboration with Child Action. The current cost of maintaining two SOW's is £30,000/annum - £120/child/annum.

#### Toybank

Building on the success of the past 10 years, Child Action would like to support a sustainable funding stream for "learning through play" opportunities in Mumbai and rural Maharashtra. Toybank is now looking after 78,000 children and over 5,000 teachers across 7 active districts in Maharashtra. We hope to continue to secure regular funding of £30,000/annum for our work with them. Recent support through the Global Giving portal has boosted our fundraising.

#### Apnalaya

There are many programmes in Apnalaya's Integrated Community Development model. Child Action funded core operations to strengthen the NGO's capacity at the beginning of our partnership in 2010, then went on to support pilots which, if successful, would attract institutional funding. These include the *Challenger Programme* for disabled children (2009-2016), *Adopt a Mother* (2016-2018) which harnesses mobile technology to improve healthcare delivery and for new-born children, and *School Saheli* (2019-2021) which empowers adolescent girls to stand on their own feet. Although we are narrowing our focus to the former 2 NGO's, we are proud of the work we have done with Apnalaya.

#### Rotary

Our trustee Seema Sharma has been supporting a team of Rotarians to pilot ILM (Institute of Leadership & Management) leadership programmes for adolescent children in the UK. Working with Rotary Clubs will extend awareness of our work to a more international audience.

The Trustees look forward to building on existing relationships and developing new ones.

#### RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Child Action for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:


- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;



#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

##### Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and with the Charities Act 2011. The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

##### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to the particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable.

Gift Aid receivable is included in income when there is a valid declaration from the donor. Any Gift Aid amount recovered on a donation is considered to be part of that gift and is treated as an addition to the same fund as the initial donation unless the donor or the terms of the appeal have specified otherwise,

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.

Investment income is included when receivable.

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

##### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

##### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

#### OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Education remains the most critical path to social mobility, yet the journey is long and challenging for children living in deprived communities. Entrepreneur Seema Sharma founded Child Action in response to the terrible poverty she witnessed in Mumbai whilst filming "Slumdog Secret Millionaire", which aired on Channel 4 in January 2010.

The documentary followed her journey as a volunteer for three grassroots Non-Government Organisations (NGOs) in Mumbai which work tirelessly to provide underprivileged youth with educational and personal development opportunities. These 3 NGOs are Child Action's local project implementation partners:

1. Doorstep School
2. Toybank
3. Apnalaya

#### **Background:**

As poor families migrate to urban cities such as Mumbai in search of work, they settle into shelters on grounds they do not own, face the risk of eviction and are often missing the crucial papers they need to access services, such as birth certificates and residential papers. For those who overcome these identity barriers, the cost of schooling is prohibitive, the walk to the nearest school is often long and full of hazards to their health and personal safety, and children of families living in informal settlements are not always welcome in schools. As they struggle to put a meal on the table, schooling is low on the priority list and many send children to work instead.

A network of support systems are required to help children to overcome these seemingly insurmountable hurdles.

#### **Vision:**

Our vision is to support preventative strategies which ensure that marginalised disempowered children are given the same opportunities as the general population, with the ultimate outcome of self-reliance and self-sufficiency.

The charity's work reflects the passionate commitment of the trustees to preserve and protect physical and psychological health and wellbeing by assisting in the provision of facilities, support services and equipment not normally provided by the statutory authorities.

#### **Goals:**

- In India: To amplify the work of social entrepreneurs and NGOs already working to increase access to knowledge, education and personal development opportunities for marginalised children.
- In the UK: To foster empathy and understanding of the challenges faced by poor communities in India, and empower young people with entrepreneurial skills to help bring about positive change.

#### **Strategy:**

- Raising Awareness: Providing a 'face' in the UK for its partner NGOs, helping them to 'package' their projects and impact reports in terms which are easily understood by supporters.
- Raising Funds: Remitting between £50,000 and £75,000/ annum to support selected programmes organised and run by each of our partner NGOs.

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Child Action has issued more than £816,000 in donations and grants for education and personal development projects since 2010. Sharma and her husband Professor Sanjay Sharma have personally contributed a substantial proportion of this and the rest comes from trusts, foundations, schools and well-wishers.

This predominantly goes to a trio of grassroots NGOs that Sharma was drawn to when she visited Mumbai to film an episode of Channel 4's "The Secret Millionaire." Toybank distributes toys and games to children to facilitate early learning through play; at Doorstep School she made a lifetime commitment to fund a bus converted into a "School on Wheels" for marginalised children; and at Apnalya she has championed the empowerment of young women living on a Mumbai rubbish dump, enabling them to challenge gender biases and become self-reliant.

This year, Child Action funding enabled the following NGO partner programmes:

1. **Toybank – £50,293 (£67,176 – 2022) donated.** Toybank provides safe spaces for *education through play* for children. The funds are used to run Games Libraries and Play Centres in urban Mumbai and in rural areas through partnerships between Toybank and Manavlok (NGO) in the Beed district of rural Maharashtra, and between Toybank and Snehalaya in the Ahmednagar district. Our funding provides ongoing support for core operations and local Power of Play Competitions which use innovative metrics for sportsmanship, team work and collaboration to declare winners.

The pandemic changed the operating model for Toybank, funding was redirected to design and launch a Play2Learn Kit of downloadable self-directed playsheets which could be shared using smartphones and used independently at any time of the day to provide:

- Meaningful engagement at home during the lockdown
  - Accessible and self-directed learning within safe spaces at home
  - Stimulating learning environment fostering critical thinking and problem solving
  - Opportunity for normal development, building autonomy and exploration
  - Reducing the severity of potential trauma caused by fear and uncertainty
  - Enabling caregivers to focus on their responsibilities
  - Promoting opportunities for early learning and responsive caregiving
2. **Doorstep School – £30,000 (£37,500- 2022) donated.** Education remains the most critical path to social mobility and the closures and restrictions are having an economic impact on poverty struck families which run the risk that many will drop out of school altogether.

Doorstep School brings education to the doorsteps of children living in challenging circumstances, such as on the street or in slum communities. Child Action provided a grant for operations for Door Step School (DSS) to provide 2 "Schools on Wheels" (SOWs) at 4 locations of western suburb of Mumbai city. Three locations are street side locations and one is in the tribal part of Sanjay Gandhi National Park, and each SOW looks after up to 125 children.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

This year, our donations totaled £ 71,206 ( £105,676 – 2022 ) for new and ongoing projects supported by Child Action. Since the charity was founded on 21 January, 2010, it has made a total of over £0.8 million charitable donations as follows:

The closing reserves at the year-end were £43,725 (2022 - £55,037) all in unrestricted funds.

The charity does not have a reserve policy as it does not carry any overhead.

Fundraising activities are sponsored by trustees Seema Sharma and Sanjay Sharma so that all funds raised are used for Child Action's charitable work on the ground in India, or in UK schools. The Trustees monitor funds on an ongoing basis in light of recognised risks and also consider the extent to which activities should be planned, extended or modified as circumstances arise.

#### Special thanks for Supporters

We are grateful to all our donors and supporters with a special mention for the support we have received from regular and new supporters, and from our youth volunteers.

- The Hemraj Goyal Foundation (HGF) have supported the work done by all three of our NGO partners since 2016, and donated funds to purchase a second School on Wheels with Doorstep School in 2019, committing to ongoing running costs. This doubled our reach and impact at Doorstep School, enabling us to support the ongoing education of up to 250 children. This year we were grateful to receive £35K from HGF
- The Millary Giving Fund have supported Toybank and Doorstep School since 2019. David Millary visited our projects in Mumbai in February 2020 to assess how best to target future support, with a particular focus on using technology to deliver education and opportunities for youth more effectively. This year funding has been delayed as we had to register with CAF America to receive funds, and they are expected in January 2024.
- Sarah Hodgson of Accounting Solutions London and Malta, who has generously provided probono accounting services for Child Action since 2009.

Last but not least we are very grateful for the ongoing support we receive from our 4 youth ambassadors, Anushka Sharma, Shivani Sharma, Nikhil Bahal and Esha Bahal. They help to showcase the work we have been doing with our partner organisations.

#### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The trustees are committed to securing ongoing funding to facilitate the development of tangible and intangible infrastructures to support children and their parents.

#### Raising funds

Three key themes will continue to be central to fundraising efforts:

- Major donors – consolidating relationships with grant making organisations and individual donors through progress reporting and opportunities to visit work for themselves .
- Trusts and Foundations – harnessing the ongoing support of more such organisations
- Individual fundraising - generating a strong base for raising funds online through portals such as Global Giving, Justgiving and CAF America.

#### Raising Awareness

Three key themes will continue to be central to awareness raising activities:

- Collaboration – working with individual donors, trusts and foundations.
- Sponsored events – widening the size of our supporter base and generating wider interest in the charity's programmes through networking fundraisers.
- Enterprise4Change.com – continuing to inspire youth in UK schools with our online resource, produced in collaboration with the British Asian Trust ( a Prince's Charity), which provides educational resources for teachers about Mumbai slums and inspires children to make a difference on the global stage.

#### Doorstep School

The launch of our replacement bus to serve 135 children from a tribal community comes with an ongoing commitment to maintain the School on Wheels. IN 2019 The Hemraj Goyal Foundation launched an HGF branded School on Wheels in collaboration with Child Action. The current cost of maintaining two SOW's is £30,000/annum - £120/child/annum.

#### Toybank

Building on the success of the past 10 years, Child Action would like to support a sustainable funding stream for "learning through play" opportunities in Mumbai and rural Maharashtra. Toybank is now looking after 78,000 children and over 5,000 teachers across 7 active districts in Maharashtra. We hope to continue to secure regular funding of £30,000/annum for our work with them. Recent support through the Global Giving portal has boosted our fundraising.

#### Apnalaya

There are many programmes in Apnalaya's Integrated Community Development model. Child Action funded core operations to strengthen the NGO's capacity at the beginning of our partnership in 2010, then went on to support pilots which, if successful, would attract institutional funding. These include the *Challenger Programme* for disabled children (2009-2016), *Adopt a Mother* (2016-2018) which harnesses mobile technology to improve healthcare delivery and for new-born children, and *School Saheli* (2019-2021) which empowers adolescent girls to stand on their own feet. Although we are narrowing our focus to the former 2 NGO's, we are proud of the work we have done with Apnalaya.

#### Rotary

Our trustee Seema Sharma has been supporting a team of Rotarians to pilot ILM (Institute of Leadership & Management) leadership programmes for adolescent children in the UK. Working with Rotary Clubs will extend awareness of our work to a more international audience.

The Trustees look forward to building on existing relationships and developing new ones.

#### RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:


- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;



For those who overcome these identity barriers, the cost of schooling is prohibitive, the walk to the nearest school is often long and full of hazards to their health and personal safety, and children of families living in informal settlements are not always welcome in schools. As they struggle to put a meal on the table, schooling is low on the priority list and many send children to work instead.

A network of support systems are required to help children to overcome these seemingly insurmountable hurdles.

#### **Vision:**

Our vision is to support preventative strategies which ensure that marginalised disempowered children are given the same opportunities as the general population, with the ultimate outcome of self-reliance and self-sufficiency.

The charity's work reflects the passionate commitment of the trustees to preserve and protect physical and psychological health and wellbeing by assisting in the provision of facilities, support services and equipment not normally provided by the statutory authorities.

#### **Goals:**

- In India: To amplify the work of social entrepreneurs and NGOs already working to increase access to knowledge, education and personal development opportunities for marginalised children.
- In the UK: To foster empathy and understanding of the challenges faced by poor communities in India, and empower young people with entrepreneurial skills to help bring about positive change.

#### **Strategy:**

- Raising Awareness: Providing a 'face' in the UK for its partner NGOs, helping them to 'package' their projects and impact reports in terms which are easily understood by supporters.
- Raising Funds: Remitting between £50,000 and £75,000/ annum to support selected programmes organised and run by each of our partner NGOs.

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Child Action has issued more than £736,000 in donations and grants for education and personal development projects since 2010. Sharma and her husband Professor Sanjay Sharma have personally contributed a substantial proportion of this and the rest comes from trusts, foundations, schools and well-wishers.

This predominantly goes to a trio of grassroots NGOs that Sharma was drawn to when she visited Mumbai to film an episode of Channel 4's "The Secret Millionaire." Toybank distributes toys and games to children to facilitate early learning through play; at Doorstep School she made a lifetime commitment to fund a bus converted into a "School on Wheels" for marginalised children; and at Apnalya she has championed the empowerment of young women living on a Mumbai rubbish dump, enabling them to challenge gender biases and become self-reliant.

This year, Child Action funding enabled the following NGO partner programmes:

1. **Toybank – £67,176 donated.** Toybank provides safe spaces for *education through play* for children. The funds are used to run Games Libraries and Play Centres in urban Mumbai and in rural areas through partnerships between Toybank and Manavlok (NGO) in the Beed district of rural Maharashtra, and between Toybank and Snehalaya in the Ahmednagar district. Our funding provides ongoing support for core operations and local Power of Play Competitions which use innovative metrics for sportsmanship, team work and collaboration to declare winners.

The pandemic changed the operating model for Toybank, funding was redirected to design and launch a Play2Learn Kit of downloadable self-directed playsheets which could be shared using smartphones and used independently at any time of the day to provide:

- Meaningful engagement at home during the lockdown
- Accessible and self-directed learning within safe spaces at home
- Stimulating learning environment fostering critical thinking and problem solving
- Opportunity for normal development, building autonomy and exploration
- Reducing the severity of potential trauma caused by fear and uncertainty
- Enabling caregivers to focus on their responsibilities
- Promoting opportunities for early learning and responsive caregiving

2. **Doorstep School – £37,500 donated.** The disruption caused by the Covid-19 pandemic in education has been unprecedented. Education remains the most critical path to social mobility and the closures and restrictions are having an economic impact on poverty struck families which run the risk that many will drop out of school altogether.

Doorstep School brings education to the doorsteps of children living in challenging circumstances, such as on the street or in slum communities. Child Action provided a grant for operations for Door Step School (DSS) to provide 2 "Schools on Wheels" (SOWs) at 4 locations of western suburb of Mumbai city. Three locations are street side locations and one is in the tribal part of Sanjay Gandhi National Park, and each SOW looks after up to 125 children.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

This year, our donations totaled £105,676 for new and ongoing projects supported by Child Action. Since the charity was founded on 21 January, 2010, it has made a total of over £0.75 million charitable donations as follows:

The Trustees monitor funds on an ongoing basis in light of recognised risks and also consider the extent to which activities should be planned, extended or modified as circumstances arise.

#### Special thanks for Supporters

We are grateful to all our donors and supporters with a special mention for the support we have received from regular and new supporters, and from our youth volunteers.

- The Hemraj Goyal Foundation (HGF) have supported the work done by all three of our NGO partners since 2016, and donated funds to purchase a second School on Wheels with Doorstep School in 2019, committing to ongoing running costs. This doubled our reach and impact at Doorstep School, enabling us to support the ongoing education of up to 250 children. This year we were grateful to receive £15K from HGF
- The Millary Giving Fund have supported Toybank and Doorstep School since 2019. David Millary visited our projects in Mumbai in February 2020 to assess how best to target future support, with a particular focus on using technology to deliver education and opportunities for youth more effectively. #### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The trustees are committed to securing ongoing funding to facilitate the development of tangible and intangible infrastructures to support children and their parents.

#### Raising funds

Three key themes will continue to be central to fundraising efforts:

- Major donors – consolidating relationships with grant making organisations and individual donors through progress reporting and opportunities to visit work for themselves in 2023.
- Trusts and Foundations – harnessing the ongoing support of more such organisations
- Individual fundraising - generating a strong base for raising funds online through portals such as Global Giving and Justgiving

#### Raising Awareness

Three key themes will continue to be central to awareness raising activities:

- Collaboration – working with individual donors, trusts and foundations.
- Sponsored events – widening the size of our supporter base and generating wider interest in the charity's programmes through networking fundraisers.
- Enterprise4Change.com – continuing to inspire youth in UK schools with our online resource, produced in collaboration with the British Asian Trust ( a Prince's Charity), which provides educational resources for teachers about Mumbai slums and inspires children to make a difference on the global stage.

#### Doorstep School

The launch of our replacement bus to serve 135 children from a tribal community comes with an ongoing commitment to maintain the School on Wheels. IN 2019 The Hemraj Goyal Foundation launched an HGF branded School on Wheels in collaboration with Child Action. The current cost of maintaining two SOW's is £30,000/annum - £120/child/annum.

#### Toybank

Building on the success of the past 10 years, Child Action would like to support a sustainable funding stream for "learning through play" opportunities in Mumbai and rural Maharashtra. Toybank is now looking after 78,000 children and over 5,000 teachers across 7 active districts in Maharashtra. We hope to continue to secure regular funding of £30,000/annum for our work with them. Recent support through the Global Giving portal has boosted our fundraising.

#### Apnalaya

There are many programmes in Apnalaya's Integrated Community Development model. Child Action funded core operations to strengthen the NGO's capacity at the beginning of our partnership in 2010, then went on to support pilots which, if successful, would attract institutional funding. These include the *Challenger Programme* for disabled children (2009-2016), *Adopt a Mother* (2016-2018) which harnesses mobile technology to improve healthcare delivery and for new-born children, and *School Saheli* (2019-2021) which empowers adolescent girls to stand on their own feet. Although we are narrowing our focus to the former 2 NGO's, we are proud of the work we have done with Apnalaya.

#### Rotary

Our trustee Seema Sharma has been supporting a team of Rotarians to pilot ILM (Institute of Leadership & Management) leadership programmes for adolescent children in the UK. Working with Rotary Clubs will extend awareness of our work to a more international audience.

The Trustees look forward to building on existing relationships and developing new ones.



The funds are used to run Games Libraries and Play Centres in urban Mumbai and in rural areas through partnerships between Toybank and Manavlok (NGO) in the Beed district of rural Maharashtra, and between Toybank and Snehalaya in the Ahmednagar district. Our funding provides ongoing support for core operations and local Power of Play Competitions which use innovative metrics for sportsmanship, team work and collaboration to declare winners.

**Covid-19:** When the pandemic changed the operating model for Toybank, funding was redirected to design and launch a Play2Learn Kit of downloadable self-directed playsheets which could be shared using smartphones and used independently at any time of the day to provide:

- Meaningful engagement at home during the lockdown
  - Accessible and self-directed learning within safe spaces at home
  - Stimulating learning environment fostering critical thinking and problem solving
  - Opportunity for normal development, building autonomy and exploration
  - Reducing the severity of potential trauma caused by fear and uncertainty
  - Enabling caregivers to focus on their responsibilities
  - Promoting opportunities for early learning and responsive caregiving
2. **Doorstep School – £30,000 donated.** The disruption caused by the Covid-19 pandemic in education has been unprecedented. Education remains the most critical path to social mobility and the closures and restrictions are having an economic impact on poverty struck families which run the risk that many will drop out of school altogether.

Doorstep School brings education to the doorsteps of children living in challenging circumstances, such as on the street or in slum communities. Child Action provided a grant of £30K for operations for Door Step School (DSS) to provide 2 "Schools on Wheels" (SOWs) at 4 locations of western suburb of Mumbai city. Three locations are street side locations and one is in the tribal part of Sanjay Gandhi National Park, and each SOW looks after up to 125 children.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

This year, our donations totaled £76,351 for new and ongoing projects supported by Child Action. Since the charity was founded on 21 January, 2010, it has made a total of over £0.5 million charitable donations as follows:

The closing reserves at the year-end were £ 42,623 (2020 - £40,801) all in unrestricted funds.

The charity does not have a reserve policy as it does not carry any overhead.

Fundraising activities are sponsored by trustees Seema Sharma and Sanjay Sharma so that all funds raised are used for Child Action's charitable work on the ground in India, or in UK schools. The Trustees monitor funds on an ongoing basis in light of recognised risks and also consider the extent to which activities should be planned, extended or modified as circumstances arise.

#### Special thanks for Supporters

We are grateful to all our donors and supporters with a special mention for the support we have received from regular and new supporters, and from our youth volunteers.

- The Hemraj Goyal Foundation (HGF) have supported the work done by all three of our NGO partners since 2016, and donated funds to purchase a second School on Wheels with Doorstep School in 2019, committing to ongoing running costs. This doubled our reach and impact at Doorstep School, enabling us to support the ongoing education of up to 250 children. This year we were grateful to receive £25K from HGF
- The Millary Giving Fund have supported Toybank and Doorstep School since 2019. David Millary visited our projects in Mumbai in February 2020 to assess how best to target future support, with a particular focus on using technology to deliver education and opportunities for youth more effectively. This year we were grateful to receive £14,477 from HGF
- Sarah Hodgson of Accounting Solutions London and Malta, who has generously provided probono accounting services for Child Action since 2009.

Last but not least we are very grateful for the ongoing support we receive from our 4 youth ambassadors, Anushka Sharma, Shivani Sharma, Nikhil Bahal and Esha Bahal. They helped design and commission a series of videos to showcase the work we have been doing with our partner organisations.

#### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The trustees are committed to securing ongoing funding to facilitate the development of tangible and intangible infrastructures to support children and their parents.

#### Raising funds

Three key themes will continue to be central to fundraising efforts:

- Major donors – consolidating relationships with grant making organisations and individual donors through progress reporting and opportunities to visit work for themselves in 2022.
- Trusts and Foundations – harnessing the ongoing support of more such organisations
- Individual fundraising - generating a strong base for raising funds online through portals such as Global Giving and Justgiving

#### Raising Awareness

Three key themes will continue to be central to awareness raising activities:

- Collaboration – working with individual donors, trusts and foundations.
- Sponsored events – widening the size of our supporter base and generating wider interest in the charity's programmes through networking fundraisers.
- Enterprise4Change.com – continuing to inspire youth in UK schools with our online resource, produced in collaboration with the British Asian Trust ( a Prince's Charity), which provides educational resources for teachers about Mumbai slums and inspires children to make a difference on the global stage.

#### Doorstep School

The launch of our replacement bus to serve 135 children from a tribal community comes with an ongoing commitment to maintain the School on Wheels. IN 2019 The Hemraj Goyal Foundation launched an HGF branded School on Wheels in collaboration with Child Action. The current cost of maintaining two SOW's is £30,000/annum - £120/child/annum.

#### Toybank

Building on the success of the past 10 years, Child Action would like to support a sustainable funding stream for "learning through play" opportunities in Mumbai and rural Maharashtra. The average cost of establishing and maintaining a rural Toybank library for up to 150 children for 3 years (2016-2019) is £600/annum, and we hope to continue to secure regular funding of £30,000/annum for up to 50 such centres.

#### Apnalaya

There are many programmes in Apnalaya's Integrated Community Development model. Child Action funded core operations to strengthen the NGO's capacity at the beginning of our partnership in 2010, then went on to support pilots which, if successful, would attract institutional funding. These include the *Challenger Programme* for disabled children (2009-2016), *Adopt a Mother* (2016-2018) which harnesses mobile technology to improve healthcare delivery and for new-born children, and *School Saheli* (2019-2021) which empowers adolescent girls to stand on their own feet. This project will be evaluated in January 2021 and included in our next annual report.

#### Rotary

Our trustee Seema Sharma has been supporting a team of Rotarians to pilot ILM (Institute of Leadership & Management) leadership programmes for adolescent children in the UK. Ideas were being developed for Child Action to become involved in taking these programmes to Zambia but the pandemic led to a pause in this programme and it may be picked up again in 2023. Working with Rotary Clubs in the UK and in Zambia will extend awareness of our work to a more international audience.

The Trustees look forward to building on existing relationships and developing new ones.



##### Fund accounting

### OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Education remains the most critical path to social mobility, yet the journey is long and challenging for children living in deprived communities. Entrepreneur Seema Sharma founded Child Action in response to the terrible poverty she witnessed in Mumbai whilst filming "Slumdog Secret Millionaire", which aired on Channel 4 in January 2010. The documentary followed her journey as a volunteer for three grassroots Non-Government Organisations (NGOs) in Mumbai which work tirelessly to provide underprivileged youth with educational and personal development opportunities.

These 3 NGOs are Child Action's local project implementation partners:

1. Doorstep School
2. Toybank
3. Apnalaya

### Background:

As poor families migrate to urban cities such as Mumbai in search of work, they settle into shelters on grounds they do not own, face the risk of eviction and are often missing the crucial papers they need to access services, such as birth certificates and residential papers. For those who overcome these identity barriers, the cost of schooling is prohibitive, the walk to the nearest school is often long and full of hazards to their health and personal safety, and children of families living in informal settlements are not always welcome in schools. As they struggle to put a meal on the table, schooling is low on the priority list and many send children to work instead.

A network of support systems are required to help children to overcome these seemingly insurmountable hurdles.

### Vision:

Our vision is to support preventative strategies which ensure that marginalised disempowered children are given the same opportunities as the general population, with the ultimate outcome of self-reliance and self-sufficiency.

The charity's work reflects the passionate commitment of the trustees to preserve and protect physical and psychological health and wellbeing by assisting in the provision of facilities, support services and equipment not normally provided by the statutory authorities.

### Goals:

- In India: To amplify the work of social entrepreneurs and NGOs already working to increase access to knowledge, education and personal development opportunities for marginalised children.
- In the UK: To foster empathy and understanding of the challenges faced by poor communities in India, and to empower young people with entrepreneurial skills to help bring about positive change.

### Strategy:

- Raising Awareness: Providing a 'face' in the UK for its partner NGOs, helping them to 'package' their projects and impact reports in terms which are easily understood by supporters.
- Raising Funds: Remitting between £50,000 and £75,000/ annum to support selected programmes organised and run by each of our partner NGOs.

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The disruption caused by the Covid-19 pandemic in education has been unprecedented. Education remains the most critical path to social mobility and the closures and restrictions are having an economic impact on poverty struck families which run the risk that many will drop out of school altogether. Child Action has worked closely with its 3 grassroots NGO partners in India to ensure children continue to access educational and personal development opportunities, paying close attention to the nutrition and mental health of the children we look after.

This year, Child Action funding enabled the following NGO partner programmes:

1. **Toybank – £37,901 donated.** Toybank provides safe spaces for *education through play* for children. The funds are used to run Games Libraries and Play Centres in urban Mumbai and in rural areas through partnerships between Toybank and Manavlok (NGO) in the Beed district of rural Maharashtra, and between Toybank and Snehalaya in the Ahmednagar district. Our funding provides ongoing support for core operations and local Power of Play Competitions which use innovative metrics for sportsmanship, team work and collaboration to declare winners.

**Covid-19:** As soon as India went into lockdown in March 2020, some of this funding was redirected to design and launch a Play2Learn Kit of downloadable self-directed playsheets which could be shared using smartphones and used independently at any time of the day to provide:

- Meaningful engagement at home during the lockdown
- Accessible and self-directed learning within safe spaces at home
- Stimulating learning environment fostering critical thinking and problem solving
- Opportunity for normal development, building autonomy and exploration
- Reducing the severity of potential trauma caused by fear and uncertainty
- Enabling caregivers to focus on their responsibilities
- Promoting opportunities for early learning and responsive caregiving

2. **Doorstep School – £34,391 donated.** Doorstep School brings education to the doorsteps of children living in challenging circumstances, such as on the street or in slum communities. Child Action provided a grant of £30K for operations for Door Step School (DSS) to provide 2 “Schools on Wheels” (SOWs) at 4 locations of western suburb of Mumbai city. Three locations are street side locations and one is in the tribal part of Sanjay Gandhi National Park, and each SOW looks after up to 125 children.

**Covid-19:** An additional £4,391 was remitted to help mitigate the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic through:

- Covid-19 awareness programmes
- Supply of emergency food and sanitary products and
- Development of digital learning resources
- Provision of classes within safe spaces within the childrens’ local communities

3. **Apnalaya – £24,500 donated.** Apnalaya has continued to provide mentoring opportunities for girls through *School Saheli (School Mate)*, a group-scholarship pilot for adolescent girls living in Shivaji Nagar who experience multiple cycles of marginalization. This initiative builds on the success of its *Khula Aasmaan (Open Skies)* programme to minimise drop outs, delay the age of marriage and provide skills for livelihood. Our final remittance of £12,000 was made in December 2019 and an impact assessment will be carried out in December 2020.

**Covid-19:** A donation of £10,000 + gift aid (£12,500 in total) was made by a single donor, Amy Beckingham, specifically for Apnalaya to provide emergency help for its communities in the form of rations, supplies, Covid-19 awareness programmes.

This year, our donations totaled £98,033 for new and ongoing projects supported by Child Action. Since the charity was founded on 21 January, 2010, it has made a total of over £0.5 million charitable donations as follows:

The closing reserves at the year-end were £40,801 (2019 - £51,802) all in unrestricted funds.

The charity does not have a reserve policy as it does not carry any overhead. Fundraising activities are sponsored by trustees Seema Sharma and Sanjay Sharma so that all funds raised are used for Child Action's charitable work on the ground in India, or in UK schools. The Trustees monitor funds on an ongoing basis in light of recognised risks and also consider the extent to which activities should be planned, extended or modified as circumstances arise.

#### Special thanks for Supporters

We are grateful to all our donors and supporters with a special mention for the support we have received from regular and new supporters, and from our youth volunteers.

- The Hemraj Goyal Foundation (HGF) have supported the work done by all three of our NGO partners since 2016, and donated funds to purchase a second School on Wheels with Doorstep School in 2019, committing to ongoing running costs. This doubled our reach and impact at Doorstep School, enabling us to support the ongoing education of up to 250 children.
- The Millary Giving Fund have supported Toybank and Doorstep School since 2019. David Millary visited our projects in Mumbai in February 2020 to assess how best to target future support, with a particular focus on using technology to deliver education and opportunities for youth more effectively.
- Sarah Hodgson of , Accounting Solutions London and Malta, who has generously provided probono accounting services for Child Action since 2009.
- Amy Beckingham who made a personal donation of £10,000 (+£2,500 gift aid) to support emergency work by Apnalaya at the start of the lockdown in early April 2020

Last but not least we are very grateful for the ongoing support we receive from our 4 youth ambassadors, Anushka Sharma, Shivani Sharma, Nikhil Bahal and Esha Bahal. They helped design and commission a series of videos to showcase the work we have been doing with our partner organisations.

#### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The trustees are committed to securing ongoing funding to facilitate the development of tangible and intangible infrastructures to support children and their parents.

#### Raising funds

Three key themes will continue to be central to fundraising efforts:

- Major donors – consolidating relationships with grant making organisations and individual donors through progress reporting and opportunities to visit work for themselves in 2020.
- Trusts and Foundations – harnessing the ongoing support of more such organisations
- Individual fundraising - generating a strong base for raising funds online through portals such as Global Giving and Justgiving

#### Raising Awareness

Three key themes will continue to be central to awareness raising activities:

- Collaboration – working with individual donors, trusts and foundations.
- Sponsored events – widening the size of our supporter base and generating wider interest in the charity's programmes through networking fundraisers.
- Enterprise4Change.com – continuing to inspire youth in UK schools with our online resource, produced in collaboration with the British Asian Trust ( a Prince's Charity), which provides educational resources for teachers about Mumbai slums and inspires children to make a difference on the global stage.

#### Doorstep School

The launch of our replacement bus to serve 135 children from a tribal community comes with an ongoing commitment to maintain the School on Wheels. IN 2019 The Hemraj Goyal Foundation launched an HGF branded School on Wheels in collaboration with Child Action. The current cost of maintaining two SOW's is £30,000/annum - £120/child/annum.

#### Toybank

Building on the success of the past 10 years, Child Action would like to support a sustainable funding stream for "learning through play" opportunities in Mumbai and rural Maharashtra. The average cost of establishing and maintaining a rural Toybank library for up to 150 children for 3 years (2016-2019) is £600/annum, and we hope to continue to secure regular funding of £30,000/annum for up to 50 such centres.

#### Apnalaya

There are many programmes in Apnalaya's Integrated Community Development model. Child Action funded core operations to strengthen the NGO's capacity at the beginning of our partnership in 2010, then went on to support pilots which, if successful, would attract institutional funding. These include the *Challenger Programme* for disabled children (2009-2016), *Adopt a Mother* (2016-2018) which harnesses mobile technology to improve healthcare delivery and for new-born children, and *School Saheli* (2019-2021) which empowers adolescent girls to stand on their own feet. This project will be evaluated in January 2021 and included in our next annual report.

#### Rotary

Our trustee Seema Sharma has been supporting team of Rotarians to pilot ILM (Institute of Leadership & Management) leadership programmes for adolescent children in the UK. Ideas are now being developed for Child Action to become involved in taking these programmes to Zambia. Working with Rotary Clubs in the UK and in Zambia will extend awareness of our work to a more international audience.

The Trustees look forward to building on existing relationships and developing new ones.

#### RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and with the Charities Act 2011. The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to the particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable.

Gift Aid receivable is included in income when there is a valid declaration from the donor. Any Gift Aid amount recovered on a donation is considered to be part of that gift and is treated as an addition to the same fund as the initial donation unless the donor or the terms of the appeal have specified otherwise,

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.

Investment income is included when receivable.

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.
