Report of the Trustees and Directors

Aims and Purposes

Throughout this year, at Ashwood Church we have remained committed to its vision statement of being a spiritually healthy growing church for all ages, and our mission to help people find and follow Jesus.

We pursue this mission within the terms of our charitable objects:

1. To advance the Christian faith
2. To relieve sickness and financial hardship
3. To promote and preserve good health
4. To advance education.

The bulk of the funds handled by the charity continue to be used to further the work of Ashwood Church in Kirkby in Ashfield and the surrounding area in North Nottinghamshire.

Community and Outreach

Foodbank

Foodbank provides short-term support for those referred to us. Over the year, 1786 food parcels were distributed and on average 26 people benefit from this service each week, many of them representing whole families.

Café 22

A growing favourite is our community café which runs every Monday, providing free refreshments and a context for friendship and support networks to grow for over 30 users per week on average.

TWOs Company

Our volunteers actively support this national telephone befriending service which aims to combat loneliness in the community. We find that some users also join Café 22 to extend their friendship and support circles.

There were 16 active conversations by the end of March and 25 trained volunteers.

Safe families

Several Church members volunteer for Safe Families, whose aim is to support families whose children are at risk of going into care.

Ashwood Crafters

This group provides an informal context for up to 30 people to practice and develop their craft skills, on both individual and shared projects.

Men's meetings

Men's Breakfasts were launched weekly in September 2022. Men's food night is run with around 20 men attending monthly. These provide invaluable opportunities to meet and provide / receive support and build relationships in a relaxed social setting.

Detached Youth Work

We have partnered with Ashfield District Council, Frontier Youth Trust & Cycling UK to deliver a bike project. This helps us engage and connect with the young people. The project is based in a garage on a local estate where trained volunteers help young people fix their bikes & give them some skills to help them in the future. There were a total of 33 young people attending the bike project and typically 4 young people attend each week. Our partnerships provide support and training for our volunteers.

Local schools

Ashwood Church staff and volunteers have supported 20 assemblies in local schools this year.

Youth weekend

In February a brilliant church team took 23 young people away on the annual Elevate Refresh youth weekend in Derbyshire.

Centre-based activities

Sunday services

Our Sunday services are increasingly popular and each Sunday, on average 117 adults and 20 children, ranging in age from babes in arms to 90-year olds; an increasingly multi-cultural congregation, drawn from 4 continents. These services provide a context for friendship, teaching, worship and prayer for adults, young people and children. Most people attend in person but we have also continued to broadcast our services online for those unable to attend in person.

There are also extended opportunities for worship and prayer provided at Transformed worship and Touching heaven meetings.

SeeSaw toddler Group

A strong volunteer team run Seesaw toddler group twice weekly in term time and a Summer fun day August. At the year-end there were 491 children registered with SeeSaw and each month there are up to 466 attendances by those children, along with their carers.

Monthly Youth Hangout

Ashwood Church provide a community youth evening. Typically, 17 young people attend these sessions.

Around 30 younger children joined in our monthly 'Friday Night Takeaway' sessions which covered various Biblical characters with games, music fun and stories.

Two free holiday clubs for local primary age children were held in the Ashwood Centre in August and October with the maximum allowed number of 50 attending each of the 3 day events.

Christmas was marked by a number of events: Christmas movie night, Christmas Toddler Party, Carols and candles service, Kirkby Christmas festival carols and crafts.

We regularly run Alpha courses and during the year we were able to run a 13 week course for 20 people who were asking Big Questions of Life.

Personal Development and Pastoral Care

Around 118 adults participate in 8 fortnightly Life Groups which provide an opportunity for spiritual and practical support in a small group setting, working out faith in Jesus Christ in their day to day lives.

The responsibility for pastoral care was transferred from Janet Wright to Bec Goody and was completed on 30th September. Thanks to Janet who has very ably led the pastoral work for 14 years and who, though officially retired, is still volunteering on many teams. The Pastoral hub consists of 7 volunteers and 1 paid worker and they facilitate courses such as freedom in Christ and most members are involved in supporting people on a 1-2-1 basis and may be involved in prayer/support groups for individuals/couples within church.

A separate Pastoral Gathering is involved in helping to facilitate pastoral care, each person within it is connected to different spheres within Ashwood and helps to facilitate further pastoral care.

As part of our regular training for staff and volunteers there were 33 people that completed safeguarding training during the year. In addition, there is a structured food hygiene training programme.

Running a centre for the local community

Long term users of the centre include:

- U3A (including a number of interest groups)

In addition, many local residents hire the centre for parties and other family events.

Sustainability

Our Justice group led the way in us gaining the AROCHA Silver award – Eco credentials. We have worked to optimise the way we use the building in the most sustainable way, ranging from recycling (e.g. paper, plastics and ink cartridges), reducing paper use, e.g. more than 130 people signed up to receive Ashwood News online meaning over two thirds of regular recipients now receive it electronically. We have removed the fluorescent lighting in the main reception and corridors and replacing it with PIR and LED lighting aiming to see a 75% saving in electrical lighting cost.

Despite the above, we have recognised that the Ashwood Centre is no longer meeting our needs in a number of ways:

- The structure is beyond its use by date and is increasingly expensive to maintain and heat
- The building's eco-credentials cannot be upgraded in a cost-effective way.
- We are struggling to fit in the main hall on Sunday due to increasing numbers attending church activities.

We have been working with Ashfield District Council to ensure that our plans to re-develop the site are complimentary to the town centre development plans. During the year £48.3k was raised towards this project, added to which a faith offering in June brought in over £28k, with the resulting total restricted funds at 31st March 2023 standing at £265k.

Leadership

Matt Bell has continued to lead the church, ably assisted by his wife, Claire and 2 further leaders, forming the Senior Leadership Team. In September we sadly said goodbye to Dave Ransome who has served the Senior Leadership for several years. He and his family re-located to a new farm in Derbyshire. The leadership team works alongside 6 part time employees, including pastoral care, youth and community co-ordinators.

Financial support

We are grateful to the many people who donate generously to church funds. Our donors include:

- Friends of Ashwood who support various Ashwood projects

These, along with the room hire income, make possible the activities that we deliver.

The overall income and expenditure for the church is set out below.

Our annual Christmas offering was taken and a total of £4.5k was divided between Safe Families' work in UK and Links Charity work in Malawi.

Money is only part of the picture and our 110 registered volunteers spend many hours delivering the above provisions, leveraging the effectiveness of the Church's activities that glorify God and impact our communities with the Gospel and love of Jesus Christ.

Ashwood Church in a Local and National Context

The church is a member of Churches Together in Kirkby. It is also part of the Evangelical Alliance and the Ground Level Network of Churches, and benefits from and contributes locally to the Ground Level Midland Connection (of churches). The Network provides opportunities to meet together with a wide variety of Churches and access teaching from both Nationally and Internationally recognised speakers, and Ashwood both serves and supports an annual Celebration of prayer, worship and teaching, as well as activities for all ages. Ashwood Church wider leadership team access the training and conference events provided by the Ground Level network, which inspires and informs all aspects of our work as a Church.

Governance

The trustees, who are all unpaid volunteers, welcomed Dom Torr to the board on 14 October 2022. He brings to the board valuable experience as a civil engineer.

Material Events after the year end: Elaine Townsend resigned as director and trustee on 2nd October 2023 after 30 years valued service.

Public Benefit

Principle 2a The beneficiaries must be appropriate to the aims

Principle 2b Where benefit is to a section of the public, the opportunity to benefit must not be unreasonably restricted:

- by geographical or other restrictions; or
- by ability to pay any fees charged

Principle 2c People in poverty must not be excluded from the opportunity to benefit

Principle 2d Any private benefits must be incidental.

Trustees responsibilities in relation to the financial statements.

The trustees are required by company law to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the financial activities of the charity and of its financial position at the end of that year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to :


- a. select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Report to the trustees of Ashwood Church on the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2023 :

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

1. Accounting Policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

1.2 Incoming resources

Voluntary income and donations are included in incoming resources when they are receivable. The income from fundraising ventures is shown gross, with the associated costs included in fundraising costs.

1.3 Resources expended

Resources expended other than that which have been capitalised, are included in the statement of financial activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered. Expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities has been included in these cost categories. Where costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned across the cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of these resources.

1.4 Finance and operating leases

There are none.

1.5 Pension costs

There are none.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised at cost.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost over their expected useful economic lives as follows :

Equipment and furniture	25% on straight line basis.
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Fixtures and fittings	2% on straight line basis.
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Freehold buildings	2% on straight line basis.
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Please note: £230,000 of fixed assets were acquired from Ashwood Community Resource during 2018/19 as part of the merger of the two charities with no monies being exchanged. They were valued at 31.03.19 at this value and will be depreciated from 01.04.19.

1.7 Investment income

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on receipt.

1.8 Taxation

The current activities of the charity are exempt from taxation.

1.9 Fundraising costs

There are none.

1.10 Expenditure on governance of the charity

Governance expenditure includes all expenditure not directly related to the charitable activity or fundraising ventures.

10. Trustees and Other Related Parties.

Mrs J Wright (Spouse of Trustee Mr S Wright) received a salary of £ 4,323 (£10,588 in 2022) as assistant minister in connection with her employment by the trust, in furthering the charity's objects and in accordance with prior approval from the Charity Commission.

Except as stated above no payments other than reimbursements were made to trustees or any persons connected with them during this financial period. No material transaction took place between the organisation and a trustee or any person connected with them.

11. Risk Assessment.

The trustees actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining the free reserves stated, combined with the annual review of the controls over key financial systems carried out on an annual basis will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions.

The trustees have also examined other operational and business risks which they face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

12. Reserves Policy.

The trustees have considered the level of reserves they wish to retain, appropriate to the charity's needs. This is based on the charity's size and the level of financial commitments held. The trustees aim to ensure the charity will be able to continue to fulfil its charitable objectives even if there is a temporary shortfall in income or unexpected expenditure. The trustees will endeavour not to set aside funds unnecessarily.

13. Public Benefit.

The charity acknowledges its requirement to demonstrate clearly that it must have charitable purposes or "aims" that are for the public benefit. Details of how the charity has achieved this are provided in the Trustees report. The Trustees confirm that they have paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit before deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

14. Revaluation Reserve.
