DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2024

The Directors (who are also Trustees of the charity for the purposes of the Charities Act) present their annual report together with the unaudited financial statements of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield (the company) for the year ended 31 August 2024. The Directors confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Charities SORP 2019 applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Structure, governance and management

a. CONSTITUTION

The company is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 27/04/2010 and is a registered charity number 1138867.

The principal objects of the Company are the advancement for the public benefit of education and health, the preservation and protection of public health generally, the relief of persons who are in need, hardship or distress and the prevention and relief of poverty.

b. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Directors who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Trust deed. The appointment of new directors is at the discretion of the existing directors (and/or the Guarantor).

c. POLICIES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF DIRECTORS

Policies for the induction and training of new directors follow those of the Parent and Guarantor, Oasis Charitable Trust.

d. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield (the Company) is a company limited by guarantee, whose registered number is 07237014. It is also a registered charity, number 1138867. The Company is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association of 27th April 2010. The Company is controlled by the Directors who are also the Trustees. Oasis Charitable Trust is the founding member and guarantor. The Company does not have a share capital. Directors are appointed by a majority of Directors or the Guarantor. The Directors have delegated the day to day activity of the Company to the Hub Leader, but retain responsibility for major strategic and governance decision.

The Company was established in furtherance of Oasis Charitable Trust and Oasis Community Partnerships intention to deliver individual and community transformation through local community hubs. As each Hub will need to respond to the issues and needs arising in its own locality and in order to engage local involvement each hub will operate as an independent legal entity but expressing the consistent ethos of Oasis.

e. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Directors have assessed the major risks to which the company is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the company, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

The risks and impact of the cost of living crisis have been assessed by the Directors and they are satisfied that risks have been mitigated wherever possible. We have confirmed grant commitments from our major funders covering the period up to and beyond August 2023.

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DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2024

The Directors consider that Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and, for this reason, the Directors continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the accounts.

Objectives and Activities

The objective of the company is to operate as a catalyst for community transformation by facilitating improvements in the lives of individuals and growth in community activity and cohesion. This will be achieved by identifying and understanding the needs and issues within the community and by applying the Oasis Ethos to everything. The Oasis Ethos is:

- A passion to include everyone
- A desire to treat everyone equally, respecting differences
- A commitment to healthy and open relationships
- A deep sense of hope that things can change and be transformed
- A sense of perseverance to keep going for the long haul

Oasis Hubs will typically include activities in education, youth and children's work, community empowerment, housing, advice and support, personal and spiritual development and health and wellbeing.

Achievements and performance in 2023/24

Oasis Hub Mayfield, known as East Southampton, comprises a range of holistic community work focused in East Southampton (Sholing, Woolston, Weston, Thornhill, Merry Oak, Harefield and Itchen), in partnership with Oasis Academies Sholing and Mayfield. There have been a number of significant developments and achievements in this community provision this year.

A new Strategic Community Development lead has been in post since April 2024, working across Southampton to build connections and develop the Oasis community provision. This leadership capacity is supporting the ongoing development of the hub and identifying potential new programmes and opportunities to support our local community. That enable us to fulfil the Oasis vision of being a place where everyone is included, making a contribution, and reaching their God-given potential

The Harefield Hub

In March of this year, we celebrated the official opening of the Oasis Hub space in Harefield. We took over the lease of this community space from a charity that was closing, SO18 Big Local. This has given us a community base from which to run activities and enabled key aspects of community provision to continue within this geographic location. The space is used to run our own groups and other organisations also have access to the space -including Youth Options to support their detached youth work, the local GP surgery to run patient courses, Local Police and Community Together Meetings and local churches for prayer meetings.

Our own provision includes a morning living room space, bringing people together in the community for company and activity. A core group established in the summer term, with regular meets to do craft and have a hot drink and chat with one another.

Youth Work

Detached and club based youth work has been delivered across the area. The detached work has been delivered in partnership with other youth providers and been targeted to areas with a high incidence of anti-social behaviour. We have been able to use our youth van to provide a focus and support the delivery of this work. This has enabled us to build good professional relationships and increase provision for young people in the area.

At the Harefield hub we have built up a regular youth club with 10 -15 young people attending each session, supported by hub staff and a volunteer team. The group take part in games and activities that give them something constructive to do, enable them to build relationships with trusted adults and learn to play and cooperate with one another. Some sessions also offer a particular focus on life skills, for example creating and caring for 'egg babies' and contributing their voice and views to future developments of provision.

We have also secured a good relationship with Southampton City Council Young Carers Team and work in partnership with them to deliver a fortnightly youth club for young carers from the Harefield Hub. This is 2 groups, one for primary aged children and one for secondary aged young carers. Working with the social work team we provide a fun and safe place for these groups to come together. So that they can have a space that meets their needs, gives them a break from their responsibilities and where they can seek help and advice.

Over the summer holidays alongside our weekly provision, we also took part in a collaboration with other providers and Young Southampton to run activity and consultation sessions across the area. The hub took the lead on the one closest to the Harefield hub and young people had an opportunity to come and try out new activities such as archery and bowling as well as football and some giant games on Bentley Green. We engaged with 60 young people and they were able to share their views about the area, what they wanted to see happen locally and the issues that matter most to them. In addition to the other youth providers local councillors and local police also attended these events which helped the young people see that these people are there to help them too. This built positive connections in the community and provided free fun activities across the holiday.

Our free Saturday club has continued to run at Mayfield Academy. 15 -20 children attend this each week and have the opportunity to take part in a wide variety of sports, games and craft. All the young people spend at least some of the time being active. This helps to build healthy habits and gives them a chance to let off steam in a safe and fun way. Through this we have built positive relationships with families and been able to support with other needs and signpost to our other provision. We have also built our youth volunteering with some young leaders. Giving them the opportunity to volunteer as part of their Duke of Edinburgh Awards and also build their skills and confidence in a supportive way.

A group of 12 identified pupils from Mayfield and Sholing academies have also taken part in the Oasis Aspirations programme. Engaging in youth worker led mentoring sessions and also activities around employability. We have also delivered Grief and Loss courses at both academies to support bereaved students.

Holiday Provision

In all the school holidays throughout the year, including half terms, we have run activity and food programmes. Children who qualify for free school meals have been funded through HAF funding and other families have been able to access the activities at a modest cost. This has been run out of Mayfield Academy enabling the children to benefit from the school facilities, taking part in sports activities, fitness, fun games and craft activities. This summer we also partnered with Plus You, another local charity who provided the meals each day. Over the course of the year we provided 403 hot meals through this programme. These sessions provided a further opportunity for young leaders to volunteer, learning leadership skills and supporting the children who attended.

Oasis Community Pantry

Our community pantry has continued to run successfully from the Highpoint venue supporting people living in the SO18 and SO19 postcodes. Clients have been referred from the Oasis Academies, other schools, GPs and social prescribers. The pantry supports with food needs, allowing people to pay £5 each time they come. They are then able to choose 15 items of shopping coming to an average value of £20 -25. This enables people to be empowered to have choice but also stretch their income. Hub staff and volunteers are also able to signpost people to further advice and support from other agencies. As well as offering additional emergency support referrals for the foodbank and utility bills.

Food donations come from local businesses, members of the public, the academies and we have also continued our relationship with The Big Difference to reduce food waste in the city. This year we have also engaged with the Southampton food partnership to be involved in discussion and plans for Southampton to be a sustainable food place.

We have been able to increase the hours of the pantry lead this year to enable her to spend time on sourcing food donations and completing the necessary administration.

Prom Dress Hire

The prom dress hire enables students to affordably hire a dress or suit for their prom. This increases the affordability of Prom making it accessible to more students and also reduces the waste associated with fast fashion so reduces the environmental impact of prom too. Members of the local community have been generous in donating dresses and suits meaning there is a wide range of choice of styles and sizes. This year we needed to move our storage out of Mayfield Academy and are currently renting space in a community library. Throughout the spring and summer term the venue was opened, supported by hub staff and volunteers to enable students to come and try and choose outfits.

Relationship of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield to other Oasis companies

The Hub has three relationships with the wider Oasis group:

1. With the national group of Oasis organisations
2. With the Oasis Community Partnerships group
3. With Oasis Academies Mayfield and Sholing

These are described below as follows:

1. The national Oasis Group

The Oasis family of charities in the UK has been structured to enable the entire group to benefit from working together towards national objectives while at the same time being able to deliver maximum impact in local communities. The challenge of running a national charity is in ensuring the correct needs are being addressed in local communities, while the advantage is working collaboratively at a national level to minimise cost locally and benefitting from the value of interdependent working. This 'hybrid structure' has been developed to ensure that local ownership and oversight is achieved whilst leveraging economies of scale.

At a national level, Oasis Charitable Trust is responsible for all Oasis' activities in the UK and is the parent company for three national subsidiaries. These are:

1. Oasis Community Learning – a multi-academy chain running 53 academies across England
2. Oasis Community Partnerships – a charity delivering community development work
3. Oasis Community Housing – a housing charity supporting vulnerable adults and young people

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DIRECTORS' REPORT (cont.) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2024

2. The Oasis Community Partnerships Group

Within this group structure, Oasis Community Partnerships is responsible for all of Oasis' community development work in the UK. It is the national holding company for 20 local Oasis Community Hubs and one Trading Company, delivering integrated community development work in a number of targeted neighbourhoods across the country.

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is a local subsidiary of Oasis Community Partnerships, which, in the same way as the group structure, is also a hybrid model. This enables sharing of resources, best practice and central support functions while Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield operates locally in order to respond appropriately to the needs of the local area. As a result, Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield benefits from higher quality and cheaper infrastructure than it would be able to access as an entirely standalone organisation.

3. Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield and its partnership with Oasis Academies

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is governed by a local board of trustees, who are accountable for the financial management of the hub, overseeing the development of projects to meet local needs and ensuring that those projects benefit from any funds raised. As explained about Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is a subsidiary of Oasis Community Partnerships, which in turn is a subsidiary of Oasis Charitable Trust.

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield delivers integrated community development work in the community surrounding Oasis Academy Mayfield (secondary school). One objective of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is to provide wrap around care for students and their parents/carers at the Academies. Therefore, Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield works in close partnership with Oasis Academies Mayfield and Sholing in order to provide integrated and holistic community transformation.

Financial review

The total incoming resources during the year ended 31st August 2024 amounted to £67,299 (2023: £89,081). Expenditure amounted to £76,234 (2023: £72,251). The overall result is a deficit of £8,935 (2023: £16,830 surplus) leaving retained funds of £59,098 (2023: £68,033).

Going concern

The Directors have considered the risks to the Hub, including the cost of living crisis. The Directors have confirmed that the major sources of grant funding are committed, and the delivery of the activities can be adjusted to ensure that guidelines around social distancing can still be applied. Furthermore, the Directors are confident that costs will only be incurred to the extent that funding is secured. The Directors are confident that the Hub has adequate resources to continue operating for the foreseeable future and, for this reason, the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the accounts.

Plans for the future

The new leadership structure of the hub, with the community development lead now in post and a new hub team leader, following the retirement of the previous hub leader, gives us new capacity to develop our provision locally and in partnership with the Oasis Lordshill Hub. All within the Oasis ethos of being inclusive, treating people with respect, being hopeful that things can change and having a long-term perspective.

Ensuring our provision is sustainable and responding to local need is central to our development plans. We will focus on engaging with the local users of the Harefield Hub and other partners in the Harefield area, including the local primary school and churches to develop and deliver provision that meets the holistic needs of families. A key aspect of this will be to recruit and develop a local volunteer team so that there can be a greater variety of activities and opening at the Harefield hub. Meeting the needs of people of different ages across the community. We also plan to tie in the development of provision at the hub and in other venues with supporting a journey to greater independence for our food pantry users, so they no longer need to use it. Including exploring the possibility of providing wellbeing sessions and debt advice.

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DIRECTORS' REPORT (cont.) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2024

In our youth work we will focus on the well-being of young people. We will aim to build a good partnership with Southwest Rail, our current funders. Recruiting a new youth worker to deliver on this project is a key first step and working with other providers in the area to deliver detached work at key sites reducing anti-social behaviour and building relationships with young people to give them trusted adults to talk to and to signpost to other opportunities. We will also be delivering mentoring within the academies. Particularly supporting pupils identified by the academies as needing support with self-esteem, confidence and attendance. As part of this we will work with community rail to deliver confidence to travel sessions, enabling young people to learn about and experience how to plan and undertake a train journey.

Developing further opportunities for young people's voice and leadership across the work of the hub and within the academies is a priority this year. We will support the academies, through hub staff capacity, to take up opportunities to develop student voice. This will include supporting young people from both Mayfield and Sholing to take part in the National Oasis Youth Leadership conference and working on more local projects including piloting a youth Pact meeting with the Police team at Sholing Academy. As well as developing meaningful youth voice with the Hub Council. We will also be exploring opportunities to work with the Lordshill hub to have a stronger voice across the city advocating for issues that matter most to the young people in the communities we serve.

Income generation needs to be a key area this coming year to sustain and develop our provision. As part of this we plan to develop our prom dress hire. Enabling Oasis students to have the early opportunities to choose their outfits but then looking at other groups who may be interested in more affordable hiring for occasions into the summer. For example, students from other local schools, university students and blue light workers. This will enable us to increase our revenue from hire as well as support other groups within the community. As part of this we will also be looking to relocate the stock to enable easier access and to be able to create a fun experience when people come to browse and try on. We will also be seeking other sources of income to support the breadth of our work, including building further links with local businesses and grant funding.

Working closely with the communities of Oasis Academy Mayfield and Oasis Academy Sholing will be at the heart of our plans for the coming year. Supporting wellbeing priorities, including attendance. As well as establishing a partnership with the newly opened Oasis Church Southampton. There will be a focus on linking provision so that we can share resources across the different localities and provide a journey for people to be able to build independence and confidence. Including: establishing a journey from initial referral to the food pantry to being in a position to no longer need this support or to be involved in the running of it to build skills and confidence; and different opportunities in our youth work so young people are able to build their skills and leadership and also be aware of and have the confidence to access other support to meet their needs. Enabling people to feel empowered and have opportunities to fulfil their God given potential will be central to our decision making and ongoing development of provision.

DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENT

The Directors (who are also Trustees of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield for the purposes of charity law) are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. 

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee incorporated and domiciled in the UK and is a public benefit entity. Oasis Community Partnerships is the sole member of the company. The address of the registered office is 1 Kennington Road, London, SE1 7QP. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund.

1.4 Income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy and the likelihood of receipt of the income is gifts and donations are recognised on receipt.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of educational activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred

1.6 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after taking account of any trade discounts due.

1.7 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.8 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2024

1.9 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.10 Financial instruments

The company has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value. Financial assets held at amortised cost comprise cash and bank and in hand, together with trade and other debtors. Financial liabilities held at amortised cost comprise bank loans and overdrafts, trade and other creditors.

1.11 Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates, assumptions about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects the current and future periods.

In the view of the directors, no assumptions concerning the future or estimation uncertainty affecting assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date are likely to result in a material adjustment to their carrying amounts in the next financial year.

1.12 Reconciliation with previously accepted Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the directors have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

The Directors (who are also Trustees of the charity for the purposes of the Charities Act) present their annual report together with the unaudited financial statements of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield (the company) for the year ended 31 August 2023. The Directors confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Charities SORP 2019 applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Structure, governance and management

a. CONSTITUTION

The company is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 27/04/2010 and is a registered charity number 1138867.

The principal objects of the Company are the advancement for the public benefit of education and health, the preservation and protection of public health generally, the relief of persons who are in need, hardship or distress and the prevention and relief of poverty.

b. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Directors who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Trust deed. The appointment of new directors is at the discretion of the existing directors (and/or the Guarantor).

c. POLICIES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF DIRECTORS

Policies for the induction and training of new directors follow those of the Parent and Guarantor, Oasis Charitable Trust.

d. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield (the Company) is a company limited by guarantee, whose registered number is 07237014. It is also a registered charity, number 1138867. The Company is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association of 27th April 2010. The Company is controlled by the Directors who are also the Trustees. Oasis Charitable Trust is the founding member and guarantor. The Company does not have a share capital. Directors are appointed by a majority of Directors or the Guarantor. The Directors have delegated the day to day activity of the Company to the Hub Leader, but retain responsibility for major strategic and governance decision.

The Company was established in furtherance of Oasis Charitable Trust and Oasis Community Partnerships intention to deliver individual and community transformation through local community hubs. As each Hub will need to respond to the issues and needs arising in its own locality and in order to engage local involvement each hub will operate as an independent legal entity but expressing the consistent ethos of Oasis.

e. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Directors have assessed the major risks to which the company is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the company, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

The risks and impact of the cost of living crisis have been assessed by the Directors and they are satisfied that risks have been mitigated wherever possible. We have confirmed grant commitments from our major funders covering the period up to and beyond August 2023.

DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

The Directors consider that Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and, for this reason, the Directors continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the accounts.

Objectives and Activities

The objective of the company is to operate as a catalyst for community transformation by facilitating improvements in the lives of individuals and growth in community activity and cohesion. This will be achieved by identifying and understanding the needs and issues within the community and by applying the Oasis Ethos to everything. The Oasis Ethos is:

- A passion to include everyone
- A desire to treat everyone equally, respecting differences
- A commitment to healthy and open relationships
- A deep sense of hope that things can change and be transformed
- A sense of perseverance to keep going for the long haul

Oasis Hubs will typically include activities in education, youth and children's work, community empowerment, housing, advice and support, personal and spiritual development and health and wellbeing.

Achievements and performance in 2022/23

The Hub is the name given for the fullest expression of Oasis' work, particularly focused in East Southampton (Sholing, Woolston, Weston, Thornhill, Merry Oak, Harefield and Itchen) although the work impacts across the whole city. The work of the Hub incorporates the educational and other work done by, through and in the Academies, as well as the various projects which are run alongside them. The hub has contributed positively to the life of the local community in several ways.

A summary of key projects

Oasis Community Pantry

Our community pantry has been running for 18 months and now has over 200 members and we feed on average 100 families per week.

Our Pantry Lead has overseen the extension of our hours & recent move to the Highpoint centre, which is a more central location for the pantry & has allowed us to support more of the community, not only with their shopping but also support them with advice and referrals to other agencies. People who live in the SO18/19 postcode can apply to become members, although we currently have a waiting list due to high demand. Members pay a £5 membership fee each time they come to the shop. They are then able to choose 15 items to take away. When checking prices members on average receive £20-£25 of products each visit. Members therefore can 'stretch' their income. Food donations are received from various retail companies, local doctors surgeries, schools and we work closely with the Big Difference to reduce food waste. This food scheme has enabled people to have ownership and "buy in" by being members of not only the community pantry but the wider oasis community, rather than just recipients of something they have no control over. Our members have become involved by:

- Volunteering, feedback shared by volunteers shows an increased feeling of self-worth and confidence
- Being involved in decision-making over how the affordable food scheme runs
- Helping shape future programmes at our hub

Christmas Complete Project

With the support of Oasis Mayfield, Oasis Sholing & the SCRATCH project we identified families who needed support during the Christmas period, delivering toys & gifts to children & young people who might otherwise have gone without presents.

Holiday Programmes

We were successful in securing funding from the Southampton HAF project (Holiday activity and food programme) to run holidays activities during Easter, Summer & half-term holidays. The programme offered sports, crafts, and cooking opportunities alongside health & wellbeing sessions. A nutritious hot meal was served daily and through the engagement with families we were able to sign post on to further support as needed.

We also support our disadvantaged families through the 'Cooking at Home' project. Families received a weekly box of fresh ingredients and recipes (written and videos) allowing them to cook a healthy nutritious meal for the family.

We also ran a hugely successful family Christmas event – A roller disco, followed by a Christmas dinner for all the family and a present for every child attending. It was wonderful to see families enjoying an activity they would have been unable to afford.

Youth Work

- Detached youth work - Funding has allowed us to deliver detached youth work. We have identified areas with a high incidence of anti-social behaviour based on community input, local authorities, and police reports. Our youth workers, equipped with the oasis youth van, visit these areas at specific times, creating a safe and inviting space for young people to gather. The youth workers engage with young individuals, fostering positive relationships, and providing support, guidance, and information about available resources and services. This consistent and non-judgmental engagement has helped build trust over time, allowing young people to open up about their concerns and needs. The programme has enabled us to gain feedback from over 300 young people, and is helping to shape future youth work, including regular drop-in sessions at two venues in the area giving the young people access to a safe, warm secure space. In partnership with SCC, Plus you ltd Police and SO19 big local we have been able to deliver two older youth events
- Saturday youth club - Our free club continues to be well received with on average 20 young people attending each week engaging in various activities including sports, crafting & team building. This programme is targeted at the more vulnerable in the community and the increase in confidence and self-esteem we have seen in the young people has been fabulous. This programme also allows us to build positive relationships with the families and signpost to other projects we run.
- Children's Parties utilising the facilities at Oasis Mayfield we continue to offer affordable children's parties with a choice from football, multi-sport, glow sport or disco. With over 150 run in the last year the feedback from the community has been incredibly positive.
- We have delivered grief & loss courses for students at both Oasis Mayfield & Oasis Sholing.

Prom Dress Hire Project

Originating from wanting all students to be able to enjoy their end of year prom fully and knowing some students were finding it difficult to buy a prom outfit, Our prom dress project has gone from strength to strength. Not only is this helping to make Prom more inclusive and affordable, but it is also reducing the waste created by fast fashion, a significant environmental issue in today's society. The local community have really got behind this initiative by donating outfits of which we now have over 250.

Ladies Fitness Programme

With funding from Opening Schools, we have launched our ladies' fitness group this is designed to help women with low confidence, social isolation, and a desire to improve their physical and mental health. It is aimed at women who want to make new friends, build a community, and get fit in a supportive environment. But would struggle in an 'open to all' gym. We will have a maximum of eight ladies per group, ensuring that everyone gets personalized attention from our expert trainer. Our programme is made up of:

- Six weeks beginners' sessions, aimed at introducing ladies to fitness in a gentle and supportive way.
- Six weeks of intermediate sessions, where they build on your fitness gains and work towards more challenging goals with a personalised plan.
- One year of free membership to our fitness suite at Oasis Mayfield. This will give you access to a wide range of equipment and facilities to support your fitness journey.

Being part of the ladies' fitness group is an opportunity to improve both physical & mental health, meet new friends, and build a sense of community, but most importantly have fun.

Church & Chaplaincy

Regular chaplaincy support is provided to the academies and continues to be a strong theme. The Director or Hub and Ethos is a regular presence in the Hub running activities, and providing support to staff, students and families.

Relationship of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield to other Oasis companies

The Hub has three relationships with the wider Oasis group:

1. With the national group of Oasis organisations
2. With the Oasis Community Partnerships group
3. With Oasis Academies Mayfield and Sholing

These are described below as follows:

1. The national Oasis Group

The Oasis family of charities in the UK has been structured to enable the entire group to benefit from working together towards national objectives while at the same time being able to deliver maximum impact in local communities. The challenge of running a national charity is in ensuring the correct needs are being addressed in local communities, while the advantage is working collaboratively at a national level to minimise cost locally and benefitting from the value of interdependent working. This 'hybrid structure' has been developed to ensure that local ownership and oversight is achieved whilst leveraging economies of scale.

At a national level, Oasis Charitable Trust is responsible for all Oasis' activities in the UK and is the parent company for three national subsidiaries. These are:

1. Oasis Community Learning – a multi-academy chain running 54 academies across England
2. Oasis Community Partnerships – a charity delivering community development work
3. Oasis Community Housing – a housing charity supporting vulnerable adults and young people

2. The Oasis Community Partnerships Group

Within this group structure, Oasis Community Partnerships is responsible for all of Oasis' community development work in the UK. It is the national holding company for 19 local Oasis Community Hubs and one Trading Company, delivering integrated community development work in a number of targeted neighbourhoods across the country.

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is a local subsidiary of Oasis Community Partnerships, which, in the same way as the group structure, is also a hybrid model. This enables sharing of resources, best practice and central support functions while Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield operates locally in order to respond appropriately to the needs of the local area. As a result, Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield benefits from higher quality and cheaper infrastructure than it would be able to access as entirely standalone organisation.

3. Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield and its partnership with Oasis Academies

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is governed by a local board of trustees, who are accountable for the financial management of the hub, overseeing the development of projects to meet local needs and ensuring that those projects benefit from any funds raised. As explained about Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is a subsidiary of Oasis Community Partnerships, which in turn is a subsidiary of Oasis Charitable Trust.

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield delivers integrated community development work in the community surrounding Oasis Academy Mayfield (secondary school). One objective of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is to provide wrap around care for students and their parents/carers at the Academies. Therefore, Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield works in close partnership with Oasis Academies Mayfield and Sholing in order to provide integrated and holistic community transformation.

Financial review

The total incoming resources during the year ended 31st August 2023 amounted to £89,081 (2022: £70,389). Expenditure amounted to £72,251 (2022: £30,493). The overall result is a surplus of £16,830 (2022: £39,896) leaving retained funds of £68,033 (2022: £51,203).

Going concern

The Directors have considered the risks to the Hub, including the cost of living crisis. The Directors have confirmed that the major sources of grant funding are committed. and the delivery of the activities can be adjusted to ensure that guidelines around social distancing can still be applied. Furthermore, the Directors are confident that costs will only be incurred to the extent that funding is secured. The Directors are confident that the Hub has adequate resources to continue operating for the foreseeable future and, for this reason, the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the accounts.

Plans for the future

The mission of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is to establish a local place of activity that provides integrated, high quality and diverse services to benefit the whole person and the whole community. The Hub does this by bringing together Oasis' values, resources, expertise, and a diverse range of activities, partnerships and operations.

The Hub's objective for this coming year is to continue all youth, community, and church projects and to expand the current offer to ensure projects maintain their high quality and relevance within the context of the community. The Hub team is determined to ensure projects meet the needs of the whole community.

To take on the lease of the Harefield Hub allowing us to bring our projects together to further support the community, to give us the space to expand the various community projects we have on offer, ensuring that the community needs are at the centre of all we do & the local community are part of the planning & decision making for the hub. Programmes to include:

- Oasis Living room, a warm space with activities, support and refreshments opened to all in the community who are struggling with the cost-of-living crisis.
- Develop & deliver sessions for all ages around social isolation, health & wellbeing and adult education.
- Work with partners to support the community with financial/budgeting issues.
- To connect with different groups in our community so they may thrive together and find capacity to tackle challenges in the future.
- Alongside our adult volunteers, Introduce a youth community volunteer programme involving young people from the local community.

DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENT



1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee incorporated and domiciled in the UK and is a public benefit entity. Oasis Community Partnerships is the sole member of the company. The address of the registered office is 1 Kennington Road, London, SE1 7QP. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund.

1.4 Income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy and the likelihood of receipt of the income is gifts and donations are recognised on receipt.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of educational activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred

1.6 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after taking account of any trade discounts due.

1.7 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.8 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives.

1.9 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.10 Financial instruments

The company has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value. Financial assets held at amortised cost comprise cash and bank and in hand, together with trade and other debtors. Financial liabilities held at amortised cost comprise bank loans and overdrafts, trade and other creditors.

1.11 Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates, assumptions about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects the current and future periods.

In the view of the directors, no assumptions concerning the future or estimation uncertainty affecting assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date are likely to result in a material adjustment to their carrying amounts in the next financial year.

1.12 Reconciliation with previously accepted Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the directors have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

The Directors (who are also Trustees of the charity for the purposes of the Charities Act) present their annual report together with the unaudited financial statements of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield (the company) for the year ended 31 August 2022. The Directors confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Charities SORP 2019 applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Structure, governance and management

a. CONSTITUTION

The company is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 27/04/2010 and is a registered charity number 1138867.

The principal objects of the Company are the advancement for the public benefit of education and health, the preservation and protection of public health generally, the relief of persons who are in need, hardship or distress and the prevention and relief of poverty.

b. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Directors who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Trust deed. The appointment of new directors is at the discretion of the existing directors (and/or the Guarantor).

c. POLICIES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF DIRECTORS

Policies for the induction and training of new directors follow those of the Parent and Guarantor, Oasis Charitable Trust.

d. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield (the Company) is a company limited by guarantee, whose registered number is 07237014. It is also a registered charity, number 1138867. The Company is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association of 27th April 2010. The Company is controlled by the Directors who are also the Trustees. Oasis Charitable Trust is the founding member and guarantor. The Company does not have a share capital. Directors are appointed by a majority of Directors or the Guarantor. The Directors have delegated the day to day activity of the Company to the Hub Leader, but retain responsibility for major strategic and governance decision.

The Company was established in furtherance of Oasis Charitable Trust and Oasis Community Partnerships intention to deliver individual and community transformation through local community hubs. As each Hub will need to respond to the issues and needs arising in its own locality and in order to engage local involvement each hub will operate as an independent legal entity but expressing the consistent ethos of Oasis.

e. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Directors have assessed the major risks to which the company is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the company, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

The risks and impact of the cost of living crisis have been assessed by the Directors and they are satisfied that risks have been mitigated wherever possible. We have confirmed grant commitments from our major funders covering the period up to and beyond August 2022.

DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

The Directors consider that Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and, for this reason, the Directors continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the accounts.

Objectives and Activities

The objective of the company is to operate as a catalyst for community transformation by facilitating improvements in the lives of individuals and growth in community activity and cohesion. This will be achieved by identifying and understanding the needs and issues within the community and by applying the Oasis Ethos to everything. The Oasis Ethos is:

- A passion to include everyone
- A desire to treat everyone equally, respecting differences
- A commitment to healthy and open relationships
- A deep sense of hope that things can change and be transformed
- A sense of perseverance to keep going for the long haul

Oasis Hubs will typically include activities in education, youth and children's work, community empowerment, housing, advice and support, personal and spiritual development and health and wellbeing.

Achievements and performance in 2021/22

The Hub is the name given for the fullest expression of Oasis' work, particularly focused in East Southampton (Sholing, Woolston, Weston, Thornhill, Merryoak and Itchen) although the work impacts across the whole city. The work of the Hub incorporates the educational and other work done by, through and in the Academies, as well as the various projects which are run alongside them. The hub has contributed positively to the life of the local community in several ways.

As with every other charity, Oasis Community Hub Mayfield has been heavily impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. As lockdown restrictions were lifted, we have reinstated our face-to-face services. Our priority was to support the local community who were impacted by the effects of the pandemic.

A summary of key projects

Oasis Community Pantry

We became aware that although there was the option of using a food bank, there was no next step for our community who were struggling with food poverty. This led to the opening of our Oasis Community Pantry. Sholing Football club offered us the use of their old club house and we received funding to refurbish and kit out the provision as a small shop. People can apply to become members. Members pay a £5 membership fee each time they come to the shop. Typically, they would choose 18 items to take away. They fill their basket with what they choose, just like in a shop. They typically take away food worth between £20 -£25 each visit. Members therefore can 'stretch' their income. Food donations are received from various retail companies, and we work closely with the Big Difference to reduce food waste. This food scheme has enabled people to have ownership and "buy in" by being members of not only the community pantry but the wider Oasis community, rather than just recipients of something they have no control over. We now have 60 members and are on average feeding 100 people per week. Our members have become involved by:

- Volunteering, feedback shared by volunteers shows an increased feeling of self-worth and confidence.
- Being involved in decision-making over how the affordable food scheme runs
- Helping shape future programmes at our Hub.

Holiday Programmes

We were successful in securing funding from the Southampton HAF project (Holiday activity and food programme) to run holiday activities during Easter, Summer & half-term holidays.

The programme offered sports, crafts, and cooking opportunities alongside health & wellbeing sessions. A nutritious hot meal was served daily and through the engagement with families we were able to sign post on to further support as needed. We also support our disadvantaged families through the 'Cooking at Home' project. Families received a weekly box of fresh ingredients and recipes (written and videos) allowing them to cook a healthy nutritious meal for the family.

Christmas Complete Project

With the support of Oasis Mayfield & Oasis Sholing we identified families who needed support during the Christmas period, providing toys & gifts to children & young people who might otherwise have gone without presents.

Youth Work

- Saturday youth club has on average 20 young people attending each week engaging in various activities including sports, crafting & team building. This programme is targeted at the more vulnerable in the community and the increase in confidence and self-esteem we have seen in the young people has been fabulous.
- We have been successful in obtaining a grant to purchase a youth van to allow detached youth work to take place in the local community. We have been working with students from Oasis Mayfield & Oasis Sholing to develop a plan for how, what and where we deliver this work.
- We have delivered 116 affordable Children's parties for families.
- We have delivered four grief & loss courses for students at oasis Mayfield & Oasis Sholing.
- We led a grief and loss support session for all of Year 11 at Oasis Sholing after they had a death in their year group.
- After feedback from students, we have developed and run a weekly about life & faith group during break at Oasis Mayfield with Young Life International, offering a safe space for students to discuss and ask questions. On average we have 30 students attending weekly.
- Our Growing Together Club continues to improve the wellbeing of year 7 & 8 students from Oasis Mayfield planting out seasonal veg which when grown is used to make soup for the homeless shelter.

Prom Dress Hire Project

With Oasis Mayfield & Oasis Sholing launching Proms after covid we became aware that many families were going to struggle with the cost of attending school proms. We launched our prom dress/suit hire project. We currently have over 170 dresses and suits that we hire out at a cost of £10.

Chaplaincy

Regular chaplaincy support is provided to the Academy and continues to be a strong theme. The Director or Hub and Ethos is a regular presence in the Hub running activities, and providing support to staff, students and families. A small church group meets on Sunday mornings, focused on the Oasis 9 habits.

Relationship of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield to other Oasis companies

The Hub has three relationships with the wider Oasis group:

1. With the national group of Oasis organisations
2. With the Oasis Community Partnerships group
3. With Oasis Academies Mayfield and Sholing

1. The national Oasis Group

The Oasis family of charities in the UK has been structured to enable the entire group to benefit from working together towards national objectives while at the same time being able to deliver maximum impact in local communities. The challenge of running a national charity is in ensuring the correct needs are being addressed in local communities, while the advantage is working collaboratively at a national level to minimise cost locally and benefitting from the value of interdependent working. This 'hybrid structure' has been developed to ensure that local ownership and oversight is achieved whilst leveraging economies of scale.

At a national level, Oasis Charitable Trust is responsible for all Oasis' activities in the UK and is the parent company for three national subsidiaries. These are:

1. Oasis Community Learning – a multi-academy chain running 53 academies across England
2. Oasis Community Partnerships – a charity delivering community development work
3. Oasis Community Housing – a housing charity supporting vulnerable adults and young people

2. The Oasis Community Partnerships Group

Within this group structure, Oasis Community Partnerships is responsible for all of Oasis' community development work in the UK. It is the national holding company for 19 local Oasis Community Hubs and one Trading Company, delivering integrated community development work in a number of targeted neighbourhoods across the country.

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is a local subsidiary of Oasis Community Partnerships, which, in the same way as the group structure, is also a hybrid model. This enables sharing of resources, best practice and central support functions while Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield operates locally in order to respond appropriately to the needs of the local area. As a result, Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield benefits from higher quality and cheaper infrastructure than it would be able to access as an entirely standalone organisation.

3. Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield and its partnership with Oasis Academies

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is governed by a local board of trustees, who are accountable for the financial management of the hub, overseeing the development of projects to meet local needs and ensuring that those projects benefit from any funds raised. As explained about Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is a subsidiary of Oasis Community Partnerships, which in turn is a subsidiary of Oasis Charitable Trust.

Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield delivers integrated community development work in the community surrounding Oasis Academy Mayfield (secondary school). One objective of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is to provide wrap around care for students and their parents/carers at the Academies. Therefore, Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield works in close partnership with Oasis Academies Mayfield and Sholing in order to provide integrated and holistic community transformation.

Financial review

The total incoming resources during the year ended 31st August 2022 amounted to £70,389 (2021: £9,246). Expenditure amounted to £30,493 (2021: £3,980). The overall result is a surplus of £39,896 (2021: £5,266) leaving retained funds of £51,203 (2021: £11,307).

Going concern

The Directors have considered the risks to the Hub, including the cost of living crisis. The Directors have confirmed that the major sources of grant funding are committed. and the delivery of the activities can be adjusted to ensure that guidelines around social distancing can still be applied. Furthermore, the Directors are confident that costs will only be incurred to the extent that funding is secured. The Directors are confident that the Hub has adequate resources to continue operating for the foreseeable future and, for this reason, the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the accounts.

Plans for the future

The mission of Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield is to establish a local place of activity that provides integrated, high quality and diverse services to benefit the whole person and the whole community. The Hub does this by bringing together Oasis' values, resources, expertise, and a diverse range of activities, partnerships and operations.

The Hub's objective for this coming year is to continue all resumed youth, community, and Church projects and to expand the current offer to ensure projects maintain their high quality and relevance within the context of the community. The Hub team is determined to ensure all projects meet the needs of the community and are aware that those needs may have changed since the Covid pandemic.

- To use academy facilities to launch an Oasis Living room, a warm space with activities, support and refreshments opened to all in the community who are struggling with the cost-of-living crisis.
- To recruit two detached youth workers on a one-year pilot project. Using the youth van to engage with young people at local venues that have been highlighted by our students. The aim is to build relationships, signpost on to other activities and reduce anti-social behaviour. This project is to start in October 22.
- To employ a pantry lead to oversee the operation and expand the pantry opening times from 9.30 to 1pm to 9.30 to 6pm allowing those that work but are struggling to attend.
- To connect with different groups in our community so they may thrive together and find capacity to tackle challenges in the future.
- To continue to scope for a venue that will allow us to bring our projects together giving us space to offer further support to the community, eg social inclusion groups, adult education, health & wellbeing courses.
- Introduce a student community volunteer programme involving students from both academies.

It is the intention of the Directors that in due course Oasis Community Hub: Mayfield will establish and retain sufficient funds to cover the running costs for 3 months.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee incorporated and domiciled in the UK and is a public benefit entity. Oasis Community Partnerships is the sole member of the company. The address of the registered office is 1 Kennington Road, London, SE1 7QP. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund.

1.4 Income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy and the likelihood of receipt of the income is gifts and donations are recognised on receipt.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of educational activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred

1.6 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after taking account of any trade discounts due.

1.7 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.8 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives.

1.9 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.10 Financial instruments

The company has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value. Financial assets held at amortised cost comprise cash and bank and in hand, together with trade and other debtors. Financial liabilities held at amortised cost comprise bank loans and overdrafts, trade and other creditors.

1.11 Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates, assumptions about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects the current and future periods.

In the view of the directors, no assumptions concerning the future or estimation uncertainty affecting assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date are likely to result in a material adjustment to their carrying amounts in the next financial year.

1.12 Reconciliation with previously accepted Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the directors have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.
