## **Annual Report from the Trustees**

The Board of With Love All Things Are Possible [WLATAP] has continued in the year under review to respond to the humanitarian emergency in Myanmar, much of which is a consequence of the attempted military coup that has done such harm to the people of Burma (Myanmar).

The Board has been guided in this regard by the expanded purposes of the charity that were approved by the Commission in March 2021.

These purposes have remained valuable to guide our work.

WLATAP's charitable goals for the year under review have remained:

1. The relief of poor children living in developing countries with a special emphasis on children with a physical or mental disability by the provision of grants to schools, in particular, but not exclusively, so as to improve their education and their lives
2. The relief of adults and children in developing countries through supporting healthcare and healthcare institutions so as to improve their health and lives
3. The relief of refugees in developing countries to improve their health and lives.

WLATAP has delivered on these purposes through the activities described below. In all of this work, the Board has always been guided by advice and input from Myanmar partners.

### **1. Federal Healthcare project: creating spaces for dialogue**

WLATAP has continued in this year to deliver upon the inclusive healthcare project that it has undertaken since the coup.

As reported in 2022, 2023 and 2024, Burma's early experience of the COVID-19 pandemic, while serious, was mitigated by actions undertaken by the democratic government of the time. These mitigations collapsed with the military coup, and we were asked to develop a practical and action-oriented COVID-19 Action Plan that was delivered to partners during 2023.

In the first four months of the year under review, we continued to work closely alongside a broad range of ethnic healthcare organisations (EHOs) from across Myanmar. Some of these are established pre-coup entities with structures to deliver health needs across their areas. Others are newer, younger, post-coup entities that have come into being to respond to people's needs.

Supported by our Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office [FCDO] donor, WLATAP has enabled wider Federal Health planning. The FCDO grant to WLATAP concluded on 31 July 2024, and it has not been possible for the work to continue.

These funds were used to retain and expand a team of experienced international and local consultants. Our Project Leader was well versed in the healthcare realities of Burma, and he led the recruitment process, as well as the delivery of this complex piece of work.

The vision for this programme was strong – to use healthcare as the vehicle for promoting dialogue across communities. Ours was a participatory process that grew connections and ideas between multiple groups who see a shared future in a federal Myanmar. We worked only at the request of our Myanmar partners, and WLATAP remained a discreet enabler of developments that are building a new devolved health system for the country.

Workshops and activities around federal health planning bring together groups into a dialogue, but those same workshops also lead to practical benefits which are catalysed by this programme. This enables the number of communities engaged in the process to grow, so that new voices are heard and participation is not restricted. The team is especially keen to bring in the voices of women and of younger people who have taken on leadership roles in new organisations.

We enabled groups to come together from Mandalay, Sagaing, Chin, Magwe, Rakhine, Ayeyarwady, Yangon, Mon, Tanintharyi, Kachin, northern and eastern Shan, Karenni and Karen. In the period under review, the programme was joined by the Arakan Heritage Foundation which is working on behalf of Arakan health providers.

Topics discussed by participants include greater equity in healthcare provision, inclusion of all ethnicities and communities and improved service delivery.

During this period, WLATAP supported the formation of a Technical Collaborative Unit (TCU). This was one of the strategic directions decided at the Human Resources for Health workshop in the previous year (reported in WLATAPs 2023-24 report). The TCU can serve as a federal platform for governance improvement and for the modernisation of government service in healthcare.

WLATAP also supported a knowledge sharing discussion designed to prepare for the establishment of a skills laboratory and a competency-based learning environment for pre-service and in-service education and training programmes

Throughout this period, a designated trustee worked with the team to ensure a continued focus on both risk and the protection of vulnerable adults and children. We recognise that Burma is highly volatile in the aftermath of the coup.

The Board also notes specific risks around AML, ABC, ATF and the danger of aid diversion. Funds have therefore been assigned to support a Finance Manager. His role is to keep careful control over budgets and payments.

Board oversight of the project has been provided by meetings of the Project Director, the Finance Manager and the nominated trustee. Reports prepared for the donor have been shared with Board members.

Under the terms of the grant agreement with FCDO, this grant was subject to an external audit. The audit covered the period from 17 May 2023 to 31 July 2024. The audit report, published on 25 November 2024, concluded that:

“In our opinion, the financial report of WLATAP for the period 17 May 2023 to 31 July 2024 is prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with WLATAP’s accounting records and the financial reporting provisions of the contract”.

## **2. Research on Rohingya Muslims in Crisis**

The people of Rakhine State are facing escalating and deepening humanitarian crises. Rakhine, Rohingya, Mro, Kaman – these and other ethnic groups across the country are all of them victims of violence.

The protracted conflict between junta forces loyal to Min Aung Hlaing, the Arakan Army that is in control of much of the state, and other armed groups has exacerbated especially the plight of the Rohingya, a minority group that has faced decades of persecution and displacement.

Caught in the crossfire, they continue to suffer from systemic violence, arbitrary arrests, forced conscription and severe restrictions on their freedom of movement. The political turmoil impedes any meaningful attempts at reconciliation or peacebuilding, leaving the Rohingya in a precarious and vulnerable position. The return of the Rohingya from Bangladesh to Myanmar feels far away.

And yet these same Rohingya are under the protection of the International Court of Justice, which has laid down provisional measures designed specifically to avoid the risk of further acts of genocide in Rakhine State – clearly these measures have failed.

During the reporting period, humanitarian organizations reported a drastic increase in forced recruitment activities, with numerous cases of abductions and forced conscription among young Rohingya men. Additionally, forced recruitment by armed groups has intensified, further exacerbating violence and instability in the region. These developments underscore the critical need for sustained humanitarian aid and international diplomatic pressure to mitigate the worsening conditions.

Efforts to address these issues have been hampered by the ongoing conflict and logistical challenges. The international community's response, although earnest, has not kept pace with the needs on the ground.

Supported by our FCDO donor, WLATAP has enabled the recording of human rights abuses and the preparation of documents drawing attention to the plight of the Rohingya and other marginalised groups in Rakhine.

WLATAP supported a public roundtable event at The Hague on 11 November 2024. The event was co-hosted by the International Institute of Social Studies (ISS), a renowned global graduate school specializing in policy-oriented critical social science, in collaboration with Gerard McCarthy, a professor at the ISS and a published expert on Myanmar.

This event aimed to explore solutions that can advance peace and reconciliation in Rakhine State, addressing the plight of the Rohingya and all those who call Rakhine their home. The conference brought together diplomats, legal experts, human rights activists, academics, students and the Myanmar community to foster a meaningful and productive discussion.

The primary objectives of the event were:

- a) Contextualising the violence in Rakhine State Post-Coup.
- b) Analysing the violence in Rakhine State within the broader context of Myanmar's political turmoil, focusing on how the coup has exacerbated the crisis.
- c) Presentation of new evidence on human rights abuses.
- d) Amplifying voices and agency of those having experienced human rights abuses.

### 3. Special Needs Education

Financial support continued for the Myanmar Special Education Association, which continues with its mission of training special needs teachers inside Myanmar. This has become incredibly difficult as a result of the ongoing civil war. However various classes were held during the year and funds spent on updating written materials and on developing a resource centre.

The intention is to keep this important initiative alive through this very challenging time with the hope that activity can then increase back to historic levels at some point in the future.

### **Report of the trustees**

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 31 March 2025. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out and comply with the Charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

### **Structure, governance and management**

The Charity is a registered Charity, number 1138937, and is constituted under a trust deed dated April 2010, as amended 15 November 2010 and 16 October 2021.

All trustees give of their time freely and no remuneration is provided. Details of trustee expenses and related party transactions are disclosed in note 2 to the accounts.

### **Objectives and activities for the public benefit**

The stated objectives of the Charity are the relief of poverty among children, the advancement of education, and the relief of adults and children in developing countries through supporting healthcare.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy for the year.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission.

The Charity carries out these objectives by:

1. Developing and supporting training programmes to produce special needs teachers in Myanmar.
2. Supporting healthcare for the people of Myanmar.

### **Grant making policy**

Historically, the Charity has made financial contributions to the Eden School in Yangon (Rangoon). In addition, approval has been given for a financial contribution to the Starfish Centre in Yangon. The charity also funds a healthcare programme.

### **How our grants and programmes deliver public benefit:**

The charity's programmes focus on improving healthcare through supporting ethnic health partners in Burma

### **Financial Review**

The Charity's activities are funded entirely through grants and donations. Total income for the year ended 31 March 2025 was **£148,640** (2024: **£487,104**), comprising grants, donations, and interest income. The reduction in income compared with the prior year reflects the completion of major **FCDO-funded projects** during the year.

### **Reserve Policy**

At 31 March 2025 the Charity held unrestricted reserves of £78,815.

The trustees consider this level of reserves appropriate to meet short-term commitments and to support planned activities.

### **Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements**

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom accounting standards. The breadth of organisations participating in our work has expanded during the year under review. We have enabled groups to come together from Mandalay, Sagaing, Chin, Magwe, Rakhine, Ayeyarwady, Yangon, Mon, Tanintharyi, Kachin, northern and eastern Shan, Karenni and Karen.

Topics discussed by participants include greater equity in healthcare provision, inclusion of all ethnicities and communities and improved service delivery.

A highlight of the year was carrying out detailed preparations for a workshop on human resources for health. Despite a collapsed healthcare system in Myanmar after the military coup, local organizations (EHOs, CBHOs, local governments and the National Unity Government) are working hard to deliver healthcare services in conflict affected areas.

However, there are multiple systemic challenges:

- Governance for a decentralised system is missing
- A fragmented Workforce
- Movement of Health Workforces
- Absence of care and training programmes
- Absence of equipment and funding to provide basic health services.

WLATAP facilitated a Workshop on Human Resource for Health in May 2024. Representatives from 18 Organizations/Institutions from all over Myanmar participated. We will report on this workshop in the 2025 Annual Report.

Throughout this year of work, a designated trustee has worked with the team to ensure a continued focus on both risk and the protection of vulnerable adults and children. We recognise that Burma is highly volatile in the aftermath of the coup.

The Board also notes specific risks around AML, ABC, ATF and the danger of aid diversion. Funds have therefore been assigned to support a Finance Manager. His role is to keep careful control over budgets and payments.

Board oversight of the project has been provided by meetings of the Project Director, the Finance Manager and the nominated trustee. Reports prepared for the donor have been shared with Board members.

Under the terms of the grant agreement with FCDO, this grant is subject to an external audit, which was carried out in September 2024. We will report on this in the 2025 Annual Report.

## **2. Healthcare in Chin State project**

With Love All Things Are Possible has been pleased to work with its sister charity Suu Foundation, a 501(c)(3) organisation registered in Delaware, United States of America, to meet the health needs of acutely vulnerable populations in Chin State.

A total of USD 303,137 was received by the Borderland Health Foundation to enable us to undertake this work.

The Chin State in Myanmar grapples with multifaceted health challenges exacerbated by ongoing conflicts, displacement of vulnerable populations, targeted aerial attacks and confiscation of health care commodities while the public health system has collapsed since 2021.

The absence of formal healthcare services often forces communities to rely on informal providers or traditional remedies, perpetuating health risks. Moreover, low health literacy and limited access to essential healthcare exacerbate preventable morbidity and mortality rates.

WLATAP and its partners have worked to provide essential healthcare services guided by local leadership and community empowerment.

Through this project, we were able to be at the forefront of efforts to address health disparities and promote well-being in the region.

WLATAP contracted a Project Lead responsible for donor communication, who recruited a team that included a Medical Lead & Procurement Officer and a Finance Coordinator, in order to enable the smooth running of the project.

The Project Lead worked directly with the Medical Lead to identify and connect with project partners on the ground, to establish project parameters, compose and manage the signing of partner MOU's and the agreement of reporting requirements. These partners did excellent work, and good partnerships have been maintained beyond the life of the project.

The Medical Lead drew up a comprehensive procurement plan, an overall project budget and reporting templates, to be adhered to throughout the project. The Medical Lead remained in contact with supporting partners throughout the project.

WLATAP kept in close communication with partners throughout the project, supporting them to overcome procurement and delivery challenges and enable risk mitigation, which arose through the project. It also managed and delivered of donor reporting and communication both with the donor and project partners.

Chin is a difficult place to work. The most significant challenge encountered during the implementation of mobile clinic operations were security threats posed by the prevailing conflict and military checkpoints. The mobile teams faced security risks while passing through checkpoints, as medical staff were targeted for inspection. Armed clashes were accelerated during the project period in some project areas, mainly in Mara, Hakha and Falam townships. This resulted in a reduction in the number of outreach activities planned.

The project faced some logistical challenges related to the transportation of essential drugs and medical equipment to remote areas within Chin State. Limited road infrastructure and difficult terrain hindered the timely delivery of supplies to mobile and fixed clinic sites.

WLATAP and its excellent in country partners were able to find solutions to these challenges such that our work enabled 67,049 people to receive primary healthcare support through 10 mobile and static clinics across Chin State.

Activities included delivery of the following items and services to the most vulnerable community members across Chin State:

1. Essential medicines for primary health care (antibiotics, palliative and symptomatic)
2. Clean Pregnancy delivery kits
3. Dignity kits
4. Trauma kits
5. Clinic costs (operational and transport costs for mobile and static teams)
6. Referral support for TB, Malaria and HIV patients (in-country, cross border)
7. Portable ultrasound machines
8. Health Education Sessions (carried out at the clinics by staff at no additional cost)
9. Capacity Development Training
10. Screening and Treatment
11. Maternal, neonatal, and child health (MNCH)
12. Antenatal care, delivery, post-natal care, new-born and infant care services
13. Sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) and Family planning supplies

Our work delivered improved health and well-being for vulnerable populations including mothers and children through increased access to and utilization of essential health services. It enabled medical teams in Chin State to deal with the growing threat of malaria and TB across their areas.

This was designed as a short term intervention. We learnt a great deal in the course of delivering this valuable work, and this has enabled us to work with Chin partners on the development of future projects.

The Board would like to record its grateful thanks to the Project Lead and her team, and to the local partners.

### 3. Special Needs Education

Financial support continued for the Myanmar Special Education Association, which continues with its mission of training special needs teachers inside Myanmar. This has become incredibly difficult as a result of the ongoing civil war. However various classes were held during the year and funds spent on updating written materials and on developing a resource centre.

The intention is to keep this important initiative alive through this very challenging time with the hope that activity can then increase back to historic levels at some point in the future.

## **Annual Report from the Trustees**

The Board of With Love All Things Are Possible has continued in the year under review to respond to the humanitarian consequences of the military coup of February 2021 that has caused widespread displacement, and new health and education needs across Myanmar.

The Board has been guided in this regard by the expanded purposes of the charity that were approved by the Commission in March 2021.

WLATAP's charitable goals are:

1. The relief of poor children living in developing countries with a special emphasis on children with a physical or mental disability by the provision of grants to schools, in particular, but not exclusively, so as to improve their education and their lives
2. The relief of adults and children in developing countries through supporting healthcare and healthcare institutions so as to improve their health and lives
3. The relief of refugees in developing countries to improve their health and lives.

In delivery of these charitable goals, WLATAP has continued in this year to deliver upon the healthcare work that our Burmese partners have sought from us.

As reported in 2022, Burma's early experience of the COVID-19 pandemic, while serious, was mitigated by actions undertaken by the democratic government of the time. These mitigations collapsed with the military coup, and we were asked to develop a practical and action-oriented COVID-19 Action Plan.

Our WLATAP project team of international and local experts has developed this further over 2023.

We have worked closely alongside ethnic healthcare organisations (EHOs) from across Myanmar, and with emerging post-coup community based healthcare organisations to build a plan that is both participatory and action-oriented.

The shared growth of this plan is important because our work seeks always to empower community and regional pandemic responses. By enabling these local actors to grow their experience and impact in practical pandemic mitigation, the charity has seen both immediate benefit in pandemic healthcare, and has helped to create experiences that have informed wider discussions on an inclusive and representative future for Myanmar. This has led to preparations for a second area of work for 2023-24 and beyond. Supported by our Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office [FCDO] donor, is moving from the specifics of pandemic mitigation to wider Federal Health planning.

Our intention is that this Federal health Plan will be a participatory process. It seeks to grow the space for dialogue between multiple groups who see a shared future in a federal Myanmar.

The Federal Health Plan will be at least a two year project. It is our view, based on the input from Myanmar colleagues and our WLATAP team, that healthcare will be a privileged space in which both practical support for humanitarian needs and wider discussions of a federal future for the country can take place.

Throughout this year of work, a designated trustee has provided support for the team. The Board takes seriously its responsibility for both risk and the protection of vulnerable adults and children. We recognise that Burma is highly volatile in the aftermath of the coup.

The Board also notes specific risks around AML, ABC, ATF and the danger of aid diversion, and funds have therefore been assigned to support a Finance Manager. His role is to keep careful control over budgets and payments.

Board oversight of the project has been provided by regular meetings of the Project Director, the Finance Manager and the nominated trustee. Reports prepared for the donor have been shared with other Board members.

The Board is delighted that the charity has been able to respond in this way to an immediate and urgent need, and to work with health leaders from across the states and regions of Burma in this way.

The Board acknowledges the invaluable support of the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office in developing and approving this proposal, and recognises with thanks the contribution made by UK-AID to our work. We are deeply grateful for the hard work of our Project Director and his team in delivering this important project.

The charity continued to support special needs education in Myanmar, albeit under very difficult conditions.

Seven training classes were run during the year. In addition, guides were produced concerning teaching, assessment and specialist topics.

The intention is to continue to support the vital work of the Myanmar Special Education Association.

## **Annual Report**

### **Report from the Trustees**

The Board of With Love All Things Are Possible opened this year of activity recognising that there were new ways in which the charity could support the people of Burma, in line with the intentions of the founders. The Board determined that it wanted to respond to needs created by the disastrous consequences of the attempted military coup and the deterioration in health and education for people across all parts of the country.

The Board therefore agreed to expand the purposes of the charity to meet the growing needs of its beneficiaries. On 14 March 2021, the Board received the approval of the Charity Commission to expand its goals to:

1. The relief of poor children living in developing countries with a special emphasis on children with a physical or mental disability by the provision of grants to schools, in particular, but not exclusively, so as to improve their education and their lives
2. The relief of adults and children in developing countries through supporting healthcare and healthcare institutions so as to improve their health and lives
3. The relief of refugees in developing countries to improve their health and lives.

Following this expansion in the charitable purposes of With Love All Things Are Possible, the Board determined to develop a proposal to respond to COVID-19 in Burma.

Burma's early experience of the pandemic, while serious, was mitigated by actions undertaken by the democratic government of the time. These mitigations collapsed with the military coup, leaving Myanmar facing a major public health emergency at a time of political chaos. Many doctors refused to serve the unlawful military junta, and medical personnel were targeted by the military.

Myanmar's health service has suffered decades of neglect, and still lags significantly behind other countries in the region. While increased financial input between 2010 and 2021 lifted Myanmar's investment in health off the very bottom of the world's health investment index, Myanmar's health service remained at the time of the coup poorly equipped to tackle the entrenched health challenges in the country.

The efforts of the democratic government under Daw Aung San Suu Kyi to create a defence against COVID-19 have been dismantled by the coup and its aftermath..

We were asked to developed a proposal to develop a practical and action-oriented COVID-19 plan, working with ethnic health and front line local providers not allied to the junta. The proposal was designed to be a participatory process to empower each level of pandemic response in the fight against COVID-19, and as the first part of a more comprehensive reform of Myanmar's National Health Plan.

By enabling key participants to work together on practical pandemic mitigation, the charity looked to support the creation of a new grammar and experience to inform wider discussions on an inclusive and representative future for Myanmar.

The project was approved by the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office [FCDO] for funding. A first tranche of £56,940 FCDO funding was received on 5/1/22, and a core team was recruited to include an experienced project manager well versed in the healthcare realities of Burma. The project began at this time, and is scheduled to last until April 2023.

The Board has also sought and received funding from a private donor to support this project.

The principal outputs of this project are:

- A realistic Action Plan responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, including practical plans for mitigation, prevention and vaccination
- Coordination of actions to use education and telemedicine programmes as effectively as possible
- A process to enable key healthcare partners to come together, to understand each other and to share expertise for the shared building of better provision across the country, including in areas traditionally under-served by official government provision
- Better engagement with donors willing to support healthcare for the most vulnerable in Burma.

The charity has sought in the project to deliver:

- A shared building of pandemic responses across ethnic and local partners, including civil society, that enable multiple regional healthcare systems to work better and in more coordinated ways
- A growth in trust across ethnic and national health providers
- The creation of a shared plan to enable effective collaboration in future emergency/pandemic events.

The wider impacts of this work were designed to include:

- That the people of Myanmar benefit from an informed, coordinated and practical response to the pandemic
- That ethnic health providers, and civil society groups deliver as much and as best as they can, overcoming one at least of the divisive elements of the coup.
- Improved trust in dialogue as a process to progress common aims.
- A successful operational forum for ongoing discussions and resolution of differences in issues beyond healthcare.

Throughout, the trustees assured that careful attention was paid to risk, recognising that Burma is highly volatile in the aftermath of the coup. The Board recognised specific risks around AML, ABC, ATF and the danger of aid diversion, and funds were therefore assigned to support a Finance Manager able to keep careful control over budgets and payments.

Board oversight of the project has been provided by weekly meetings of the Project Director, the Finance Manager and a nominated trustee. Reports prepared for the donor have been shared with Board members, as have regular financial updates and bank reconciliations.

The Board is delighted that the charity has been able to respond in this way to an immediate and urgent need, and to work with health leaders from across the states and regions of Burma in this way.

The Board acknowledges the invaluable support of the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office in developing and approving this proposal, and recognises with thanks the contribution made by UK-AID to our work. We are deeply grateful for the hard work of our Project Director and his team in delivering this important project.

### **Report of the trustees**

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 31 March 2022. ## **Objectives and activities for the public benefit**

The stated objectives of the Charity are the relief of poor children, their education and the relief of adults and children in developing countries through supporting healthcare.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy for the year.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission.

The Charity carries out these objectives by:

1. Developing and supporting training programmes to produce special needs teachers in Myanmar.
2. Supporting healthcare for the people of Myanmar.

## **Grant making policy**

Historically, the Charity has made financial contributions to the Eden School in Yangon (Rangoon). In addition, approval has been given for a financial contribution to the Starfish Centre in Yangon. The charity also funds a healthcare programme.

## **How our grants and programmes deliver public benefit:**

The charity's programme focus on improving health through supporting a COVID19 Action Plan that provides health improvements to healthcare providers across Myanmar (Burma).

## **Financial Review**

The Charity's work is entirely reliant on grants and donations. Total income for the year from donation, gift aid and interest was £87,240. This was the result of grants and donations to the Charity.

## **Reserve Policy**

The Charity maintains reserves to finance future projects.

## **Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements**
