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TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 JANUARY 2023

The Trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements for the period ended 31 January 2023 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

Objectives and Activities

Objectives and Aims

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Charity should undertake in order to further the charitable purposes for the public benefit. These activities are summarised below.

Northern Pride was formed in August 2007 after a brief gap in Pride activities following the closure of Pride on the Tyne. A research project was commissioned and carried out by MET Ltd to establish what the North East LGBTQIA+ community would like from a Pride event. These results were fed back into the community in May 2007 and from this feedback a group of volunteers came forward and formed the first Northern Pride committee.

Northern Pride was incorporated as a limited company in 2009 to give the organisation greater accountability and protection and is a registered charity. In 2018 the charity was rebranded, and the new core principles were introduced.

Protect

Protect LGBTQIA+ rights already won and champion these whilst supporting the fight to end equality indifferences that remain at home and abroad.

Promote

Promote a healthy body and mind through access to support and education for the community and our straight allies.

Provide

Provide a series of LGBTQIA+ events including our annual festival to bring communities closer together and celebrate our diversity.

These core principles are the foundations to enable Northern Pride to proudly promote Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer plus, culture through public celebration of our heritage and engaging in education and cultural activities that enrich the community whilst raising awareness of the issue's LGBTQIA+ people face, building mutual respect and working to end homophobia, biphobia and transphobia bullying (HBT) and discrimination.

As an LGBTQIA+ charity the aims of Northern Pride are the promotion of equality and diversity for the public benefit by

- a) The elimination of discrimination on the grounds of sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, and sex characteristics
- b) Advancing education and raising awareness in equality and diversity issues face by LGBTQIA+ people; and

- c) Cultivating a sentiment in favour of equality and diversity to create a safe environment where LGBTQIA+ people can promote and explore their culture and work in the interests of the public benefit to remove any social exclusion.

Northern Pride achieve their aims and objective by holding various events, workshops, seminars and campaigns throughout the year which culminates into the pride festival in July. The first of these pride festivals were held in July 2008 and was attended by over 2,500 people. The three-day festival now includes a March through Newcastle city with entertainment, various LGBTQIA+ safe zones, information stalls, and market stalls across the Town Moor, Newcastle plus an array of satellite events on the buildup to the festival which now attracts over 40,000 people.

Significant Activities and Achievements

2021-2022 saw the return of our first in person festival and the delivery of our UK Pride event.

Our successful bid for the UK Pride status was won in 2018 and was due to be delivered in 2020. We were supported by the UK Pride Organisers Network and the members to delay the event until our first in person event since the pandemic which was delivered in 2022.

The festival was a welcomed return for the city and the community with 70,000 people through the gates over the three-day event. 25,000 people joined the march through the city which focused on our mission for the event, Remember, Resist, Rise Up and was led by nearly 200 people from the trans and gender non-conforming community.

On mission for the festival was to 'elevate and celebrate the north easts LGBTQIA+ community' and one way in which we did this was to ensure that over 90% of all performers, artists, creatives, and activist that took to the main stage, where from the community and from the region.

We introduced a new area in the Community Village, LGBT+ Northern Social Group Zone, which provided space for those that needed neuro divergent support, stim space, and somewhere that was away from loud noise and alcohol. In the Family and Youth Zone we brought in the Unfolding Theatre stage, taking our stage count to 4 for the first time. We also ensured that all artists, creative and performers received paid work to recognise the impact the community had during the pandemic including the loss of income.

After such a success with our digital content during the pandemic, we took brought digital broadcasting to the festival for the first time. Our Live at Pride content was broadcasted backstage, covering off interviews with members of the public, performers, artists, and activists. Live at Pride obtained over 275k impressions with over 20k views.

Our 2022 comms and marketing focus had an increased focus, with a new website that delivered 30k hits over the festival weekend. With 81 pieces of press going out to promote the campaign, with 442m combined reach, 7.8m views of the PR stories. Our brand continues to grow with 8k pieces of merchandise sold worldwide raising vital funds for the charity.

Public Benefit

We continue to acknowledge that our core purpose is to deliver event-based campaigns for the community and support the growth of LGBTQIA+ community allyship, empathy and activism. In 2022 we saw disappointing data including hate crime rises, violence towards the community and rises in mental health issues.

The festival and smaller events that we lead on, or support others with, are vital to foster a positive, safe and inclusive environments to ensure the community can thrive.

Volunteers

The events, including those via digital methods, wouldn't be possible without our fantastic volunteers who give up their time to support us. This can be as little as being a march steward on the main day, helping with collections round the scene, arranging fundraising events or a more active role on the main committee as a co-ordinator or director trustee.

Northern Pride events are run by a team of volunteers with help from specialist consultants and service providers.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

General fund income in the period was £283,374, primarily from grants, event admissions or fees, donations and sponsorships. Expenditure was £348,704, resulting in a net loss of £65,330 (2022: net loss £11,596).

Reserves policy

At 31 January 2023, reserves are -£29,914 (2022: £35,416) due to the organisation running as a not for profit organisation whilst taking particular care to ensure the charity achieves its objectives and satisfies its creditors.

Going concern

In 2022 we saw supporter and sponsor income change due to the financial climate and we fully understand that we must diversify our income to ensure sustainability.

Since 2018 we've tried various types of Friday night ticketed fundraising events. In 2022 a 'Launch Party' was delivered which had significant investment with the aim of raising funds through ticket sales. Production spend was increased to make sure the event would match similar ticketed pride festivals across the UK.

Unfortunately, whilst the event delivered successfully and we received positive feedback from those in attendance, the income raised did not match or supersede the spend on the event. This has led to the charity carrying over a negative balance into the next financial period.

For 2023's festival, a ticketed entry was decided for part of the event where individuals required to a ticket to access some of the attractions, whilst elsewhere a significant grant from North of Tyne Combined Authority has been granted to ensure the event remains free at the point of entry. This mixed model is being monitored closely to ensure we minimise financial risk, whilst maintaining high standard of delivery.

The board continue to work with experts to explore options to ensure the charity can reduce or remove risk based activity entirely, and focus on its activities that are fully funded and deliver the community outreach work and objectives laid out in its constitution, especially in the current hostile environment for many within the community.

Plans for future periods

The board of trustees and key advisory group parties completed an in-depth review an investigation into a paid vs free event status to learn from 2022 and ensure robust plans are in place. For 2023, the Friday event was removed from the program and paid ticket entry into the Festival Arena was introduced. The Community Village was relocated to be the first area on site, and access was kept free to ensure the community still had a free to access pride festival in the northeast.

Focus also moved from relying on commercial income and the charity was successful in a substantial grant from several partners including North of Tyne Combined Authority.

Funds in credit

The general fund was in debit at the end of the period by £29,914.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The Directors of the Company are also Trustees of the Charity. Eligibility for membership of the Charity and membership of the Board of Trustees is governed by the memorandum and articles of association. There are no restrictions in the governing document on the operation of the charity or on its investment powers other than those imposed by Charity law.

The organisation is governed by a Board of Directors, which consists of nominated members. The Board is responsible for the management and control of the Charity and overall direction of its work.

The Directors have the power to co-opt new Directors as set out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Induction and Training of Trustees

Our HR Director continues to monitor our onboarding process for all volunteers, committee members and Directors. This includes relevant operating procedures, confidentiality agreements and other governing documents.

Risk management strategy

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

The trustees regularly review risks and uncertainties. To ensure early mitigation of risks the trustees continually monitor and review financial status and forward forecasts on a quarterly basis.

**NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS
FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 JANUARY 2023**

1. Accounting Policies

1a. Basis of Accounting FRS

Northern Pride Events Limited is a company limited by guarantee in England and is registered in England and Wales. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 3 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are given on page of these financial statements.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all periods presented unless otherwise stated.

1b. Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

The charity receives government grants. Income from government and other grants are recognised at fair value when the charity has entitlement after any performance conditions have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. If entitlement is not met then these amounts are deferred.

1c. Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

1d. Taxation

The charity is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

1e. Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. All funds are unrestricted.

1f. Debtors and creditors receivable/Payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

1g. Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the charity has an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount can be reliably estimated.

1h. Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and instant access bank accounts.

1i. Pensions

The charitable company has no employees and therefore has no pension contributions.

1j. Financial instruments

The charitable company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

1k. Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The charitable company reported net loss of £11,596 in the period. The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

1l. Operating leases

The charitable company has no operating leases.

1m. Donated services and facilities

No amount is included in the financial statements for volunteer time in line with the SORP. Further detail is given in the Trustees' Annual Report.

1n. Change in length of reporting period

The current period was extended by 2 days and the prior period was shortened by one day and so the comparatives are not totally comparable.
