Objectives

Autism touches the lives of millions of people in the UK. The Autscope Organisation (hereafter referred to by its trading name, Autscope) is principally engaged in organising the Autscope conference, held annually during the summer, which seeks to provide respite, support, information and education to autistic people. It was created by autistic people for autistic people to come together and experience a positive and accepting environment.

At Autscope, autistic people are fully included without having to adjust to the expectations of mainstream society. Presentations do not focus on how autistic people must be fundamentally changed in order to be acceptable. [<https://www.autscope.org/about/concept>]

Autscope's main source of funding is through the fees paid by conference participants, but we also seek donations and grant funding in order to facilitate access to Autscope's services among our target beneficiaries – the majority of whom have incomes significantly below the national average¹.

The charitable objectives of Autscope are:

1. to provide respite and support for autistic people by (i) organising retreat-style conferences at which autistic people can learn, engage in activities, socialise and relax in an autistic-orientated environment and (ii) generally providing them and their families and carers with information, advice and other forms of assistance;
2. to advance the education and awareness of the public in all matters relating to autism and in particular to increase public awareness of the challenges faced by, and the general circumstances of, autistic people and their families, thus encouraging increased acceptance and support of autistic people in the community;
3. to advance and promote the education of autistic people in self-advocacy and in those issues which are of particular interest and/or relevance to autistic people; and
4. to do such other charitable activities for the benefit and/or support of autistic people as the directors in their discretion shall decide.

The main activities undertaken to further the charity's purposes for the public benefit are points 2 and 3 above.

All trustees confirm they have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

Activities

Organising a conference

During the year, the board of directors met monthly to consider the strategic direction of the organisation and make decisions on matters arising. They also established an organising committee overseen by the board but delegated with the responsibility for organising the 2024 Autscope conference. The organising committee was led by an Event Manager with a core team of managers and other volunteers.

It was decided that the event should keep the online element due to its success and the ability to reach a wider audience. In line with Autscope's mission we managed to design and create two environments where the schedule, social structure and presentation topics encouraged the full participation of autistic people either in person or from the comfort of their own homes.

Venue. The board decided to return to The Hayes Conference Centre in Alfreton, Derbyshire, which had proved successful the previous 2 years. It has good accessibility as well as a lot of single rooms and en-suites which is what most people want these days. It also had good links to rail stations and airports. Although this is a more expensive venue than the board would like it is currently the only venue that can cater for our numbers and has the facilities we require that is affordable. Since Covid changed the venue landscape reducing the options available to us the board are aware that finding new venues will continue to be a challenge in the future. Nevertheless, the board considered The Hayes good value in that it could meet the needs of our growth and the higher expectations of participants. For an en-suite room either single or shared it cost £480 per person.

The Hayes Conference Centre also had a variety of good communal areas with the accommodation being attached. There were plenty of ground floor rooms and adapted rooms as well as family rooms with a variety of options. The conference centre was also surrounded by gardens with a seated terrace, lakeside area and it also had a bar.

This venue proved to be well liked with the communal areas for socialising providing plenty of scope for different activities. Though a little larger than most of our other venues it did mean more walking than usual for participants to access some of the activities but on the whole this was not a problem. The larger grounds with the lake also provided a relaxing place for those that enjoyed walking and due to excellent weather people were able to take advantage of the lawns and terrace well into the evening. The food was also generally well liked and of a high standard with special diets catered for but with a large proportion of our participants having unique dietary needs we introduced an assistant to liaise with catering staff who were pleasant, helpful and quickly on hand to sort out any problems.

Transport. The Hayes Conference Centre was only a short journey from Alfreton station which has good connections to mainline stations so we decided to provide transport and assist people with taxis from Alfreton station. We hired a 17 seat minibus and transported people ourselves as it was unfeasible to hire a coach service due to limited providers close to the area and their availability. We were unable to charge for this but many people willingly donated to Autscope which offset the cost.

Costs. Participant registration costs were another key issue considered by the directors. The vast majority of the registration fees paid by Autscape participants cover the cost of hiring the conference venue, including accommodation and catering. Autscape does not seek to make money from the annual conference. Rather, the final fees are set by the Directors with the aim of breaking even. Nevertheless, the Board must ensure that the costs of attending the conference are within the reach of potential participants.

Unfortunately in 2024 we had a new problem which meant we had to significantly increase the fees. Autscape books and secures venues approx 2 years in advance. Deposits paid on these venues has generally been 20% but a change in terms and conditions meant they now required another 30% for the Autscape 2025 event deposit which needed paying before the 2024 event. As Autscape does not hold excess money the only way to afford this deposit was to factor it into the fees for 2024. In theory, with a good turnout we could ensure our deposit was met in the future without having to significantly increase the fees again.

As a result the 2024 was fairly expensive but we were able to provide en-suite rooms and good facilities. It offered access to a residential 3-day conference with full board for £480. We also introduced a lower fee of £450 for people who had no requirements. No requirements rooms are ones we usually do not use because they are in noisy areas or they are of lower standard. However, by introducing this fee it enabled us to fill the venue and use rooms we have previously had to discount. We also had a bursary fund for people on low incomes.

We also added the fourth optional day for an additional £115. This was a relaxation day without any programme so it didn't disadvantage those who could not afford to stay.

For people who were only able to attend the online event we charged £20 which the board considered to be good value considering it gave them access to all the main presentations and online social space.

Registration. This time we opened registration on a first come first served basis as we knew we had a big venue to fill and it was unlikely that anybody would lose out on a place by booking later. We could keep registration open until numbers were required by the venue 2 weeks before the event.

Publicity. Autscape 2024 was publicised in as many places as we could find, and we utilised Facebook and other online facilities as much as possible. However, we have found that a lot of places where we would normally promote the conference no longer accepted advertising. This means Autscape will have to consider how it can reach people in the future.

Merchandise and sensory equipment. This year the board did not purchase any new sensory equipment but they renewed some of the smaller items using for keeping people entertained in the lounge area. A small selection of sensory toys and glow products alongside some soft toys were available to purchase and we had some T-shirts, teddies and hats with the Autscape logo on them which were very popular.

Achievements and performance

The Autscope 2024 Conference

In 2024, Autscope held its 20th annual conference on 28th - 31st August at The Hayes Conference Centre, Alfreton, Derbyshire. This was a live event with an on-line element for which we used Zoom with additional content on Discord.

This year's theme was 'Autistic Joy' which was a purposely broad theme intended to celebrate after 20 years how things had changed and all things which were good about autism. We had presentations and workshops and these were live streamed where possible to the on-line participants.

The live event was attended by 249 adult participants and 16 children attending for the full residential event and a further 15 just attending for the day. This included autistic and non-autistic adults, their children and carers. Of these, 84 also booked for the additional day. We also had a further 179 join us for the online only event. Unfortunately this was less than the previous year but the dates at the end of August were not ideal as in many countries the main summer holiday ended in the middle of August and this meant some people were unable to come. However, whilst the conference was a success the continuing challenge is to try to find reasonably priced other venues and better dates which also meet the accessibility needs of our participants and cater for large numbers.

Autscope 2024 ran for three days during which there were workshops, leisure activities and social opportunities. All of these activities were specifically oriented to the needs and preferences of autistic people, in line with Autscope's core mission. A fourth day was optional for relaxing and winding down.

The Programme. The programme included an excellent set of well-attended and engaging lectures, workshops, and discussions, with a substantial majority of autistic presenters, some new to Autscope (see Box 1). With this being a 20th celebration we decided on the theme of 'Autistic Joy'. The programme included topics such as experiences of Autistic Joy, the joy of engineering and finding joy through sport, drama and creative writing. Presentations were accepted on a competitive basis out of a range of proposals. As in previous years, formal programme lectures came with opportunities for both structured and informal discussion between participants. In addition to the programme of presentations, Autscope also had a diverse range of leisure and social activities. These included our very popular "Sparklies in the Dark" where many people come together to enjoy their love of coloured lights. We also had opportunities to showcase talents in the entertainment evening, plus lightning talks in which participants can share a topic of interest for 5 minutes. We also had a African drumming workshop and volunteers also ran a recreation of the TV show Countdown. People were also able to join home groups enabling participants to get to know each other better and we extended as many social activities as possible to the on-line participants who also had use of Discord.

Box 1: Autscape highlights

Elliot talked about experiences of autistic joy from the findings of a participatory research project conducted at an autism charity. They challenged prevailing academic discourses of autism as a disaster as they found most participants actually reported experiencing joy. They also found that the biggest barrier to joy was the lack of acceptance and understanding by non-autistic people.

Corsin presented a toolkit for dancing together. They explained how they loved to dance and how they could dance wonderfully on their own but found it difficult to dance with others. In wanting to dance with others and spread the joy they felt about dance they researched with a dancer and a dance therapist to come up with a toolkit which they presented with the aid of a film they had made.

Alicja gave a presentation entitled 'Sensory joy to the rescue: emotional containers and portable safe spaces' where they shared practical ways to counteract the more sensitive nervous system that autistic people are renowned to have using sensory joy to help contain overwhelming emotions and prepare for unfamiliar or predictably stressful situations.

Fundraising

Autscape continued to be part of the Give As You Live and PayPal Giving Fund fundraising platforms in order to capture a small but potentially steady stream of donations.

Give As You Live is a fundraising platform for UK charities and their supporters. To make donations on purchases, shoppers just need to sign up to Give As You Live, select The Autscape Organisation as their favourite charity, install a Give As You Live program on their computer, start shopping, and the money (up to 10% of the total online purchase) is donated to the charity. Give As You Live can also be used as a donations platform.

PayPal Giving Fund helps people support their favourite charities online and helps charities raise funds through PayPal, eBay and other technology platforms.

Autscape raised £360 through the Give As You Live donations platform and nothing via their purchases tool. It also raised and £716 via PayPal Giving Fund during the reporting period.

A further £426 was raised from generous donations paid directly into the bank account and Gift Aid earned us £57.

The total amount raised during the reporting period was £1,559

Online lists

Autscape has a 'Community' mailing list with moderators where people who have attended Autscape at various times can come to discuss the conference, share things of interest relating to Autism in general, and maintain social links as an extension of the networking opportunities the

Autscape conference provides. It is also a place where people who cannot get to a conference can communicate with other autistic people in a safe on-line environment.

Autscape also runs various sub committee lists in order for people to become actively involved in organising the conference. The most popular is the programme sub committee where proposals to present at the next conference are discussed.

Unfortunately the number of people using the mailing lists is declining with newer social media platforms becoming more popular. Another challenge of Autscape is to find other ways in which people can come together outside of the conference.

Membership

Attendance at our annual conference or participating in any aspect of Autscape is not dependent on being a member.

The current membership fee is set at £5.00 and members receive information via our members list and announce list. Members who book a place at our annual conference also receive a £5.00 discount on the fee.

Membership stood at 123 people as of 30th September 2024, compared with 170 people as of 30th September 2023.

Social Media

The board also continued to develop its Facebook page to promote and relay information about The Autscape Organisation. This is administrated by a board member and is increasing its followers. We also used X during the reporting period but for ethical reasons we have since closed the account and the board have reviewed the use of social media platforms.

Collaboration

The board have continued Autscape's membership of the European Council of Autistic People. Although this cost £180.39, the board were able to take advantage of the Zoom subscription enabling Autscape to provide a professional online conference to a large number of people. Autscape is represented on the EUCAP board and therefore able to take part in discussions and be informed of issues affecting the European community.

We also collaborated with Auticon and Autistic UK who sponsored us for £200 each.

Technology

We have continued to develop the Autscape website and we used Ticket Tailor for the conference booking system. We also utilised Zoom and Discord for the conference.

Organising committee

The board set up a dedicated organising committee for the Annual Autscope conference who reported regularly to the board through the Event manager so they could monitor the progress. The organising committee had experienced Autscope conference organisers but they were also able to bring in as many volunteers as required to help with various tasks.

Policies

Since fundraising needed to increase, the board made a new Fundraising policy alongside a Refusal and acceptance of donations policy.

The board also put together a Journalist and Filmmakers policy and a Researchers policy to make it clear how we will consider and process the increasing number of requests we receive to write articles, make films and conduct research at Autscope events.

The board also made some minor amendments to the Booking policy prior to opening registration.

Bursary Scheme

The board introduced its first Bursary scheme for the Autscope 2018 conference. The aim being to make Autscope accessible to people who would otherwise not be able to afford to attend.

The board allocated £500 to the bursary fund and the bursary committee considered all applications. The whole amount was used giving 5 people £100 bursary each.

Summary

This was quite a difficult year for Autscope. Having to increase our fees when most people were struggling with a cost of living crisis was not something we wanted to do. However, despite attracting a lower number than we would have liked we still had a successful conference and this shows that for some people the Autscope conference is a special place and there is a need for it to continue. Autscope is more than just a conference despite it having a formal programme of presentations. It has lots of fun activities and its a place where the autistic community can relax as well as learn.

The Autscope board acknowledges that they will have to work on fundraising to keep costs down and provide bursaries for people who find it difficult to afford in the future. We will also work on providing better online conferences that attract more people as this is a lot more affordable and it has the added bonus of us being better able to meet our objective of benefitting society as a whole and reaching and educating more people.

Financial review

Treasurers report

Autscape has continued to make sure its financial procedures are of a high standard and by close monitoring it makes changes to its procedures as and when necessary.

In 2023, Autscape also made a small deficit of £1,711, due to lower-than-expected numbers, and significantly higher venue costs.

In the current reporting period, Autscape made a small deficit of £790, also due to lower-than-expected numbers, and significantly higher venue costs that are difficult for attendees to absorb.

Going forward, Autscape must continue to ensure that fees are sufficient to keep Autscape solvent, whilst also trying to raise funds in the longer term. This means the board needs to take great financial care in the upcoming year.

Regular contributions Autscape receives from attendees also contributed to income – further details of which are in the fundraising report. These came to a total of £1,559.

Accounts / Financial

The total funds held at the end of the financial period was £26,642. For comparison, the state of all funds at the end of the previous year was £27,432

Reserves Policy

The reserves exist so that the charity is able to continue even if there is some expenditure that is unplanned. However, reserves are harmful if they are allowed to build up without limit instead of being spent on charitable activities.

Autscape seeks to find the right balance between the goals of making the charity financially robust and not holding on to excessive funds. Autscape has a simple reserves policy – it aims for the reserves to be between two limits. If the reserves fall under the lower limit, or above the higher limit, the board aim to increase or decrease the reserves as appropriate.

The reserves are currently set at £5,000 for the lower limit and £8,000 for the higher limit.

The free reserves held at the end of the financial period were zero since the venue deposits due before the next event (that had increased very significantly), and other running costs during the year, exceeded the funds available. Due to this, Autscape opened bookings early in 2025 to generate enough cashflow for the venue deposit to be paid.

The board recognises the need to increase reserves to aid cash flow and long term financial viability.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The Autscope Organisation (Autscope) is a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum & Articles of association dated July 2010. The Autscope Organisation is registered as a Charity with the Charity Commission.

Constitution and recruitment of trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as the Board. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association members of the Board are elected to serve for a period of three years after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting. Board members are elected to roles by the board and with the exception of the Chair and Vice Chair who are elected annually, they will usually remain in that role until their time on the board expires.

Changes to the board

There were some changes to the directors and their roles at Autscope between October 2023 and September 2024

Chair/Company Secretary/Treasurer. In October 2023 James Pelham remained as chair until February 2024 when Kacey Clark was elected. Martijn Dekker remained as vice-chair. Richard Chandler remained as the Treasurer and Elaine Binhammer remained as Company Secretary. In January 2024 David Singh resigned from the board and in May 2024 Georgina Watts also resigned from the board

The Board would like to thank all of the people who generously donated to Autscope, those who contributed to our subcommittees, working groups, plan list, and those who assisted at the conference itself.

This report has been prepared in accordance with FRS102 SORP with the special provisions for small companies under the Companies Act 2006.



INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES

For the year ended 30 September 2024

I report on the financial statements of The Autscape Organisation for the year ended 30 September 2024, which are set out on pages 13 to 20.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 ("the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under company law and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the Charities Act,
- to follow the procedures laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission (under section 145(5)(b) of the Charities Act), and
- to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination was carried out in accordance with general Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

Independent examiner's statement

1 Accounting Policies

The principle accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

2 Basis of accounting

2.1 Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The Autscape Organisation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

2.2 Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The charity reported total unrestricted funds at the year end of £26,642 and has already secured a significant amount of funding for the current year. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 to 18 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

3 Income

3.1 Recognition of income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the resources, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is more likely than not that the resources will be received and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

3.2 Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by FRS102 SORP or FRS102.

3.3 Grants and donations

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance or provision of other specified service is deferred until the criteria of income recognition are met.

3.4 Volunteer help

The value of volunteer help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

3.5 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

3.6 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charities' work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

4 Expenditure and liabilities

4.1 Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised when it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

4.2 Charitable activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of delivering a conference and other activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

4.3 Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance cost and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

4.4 Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

4.5 Creditors

The charity has creditors which are measured at settlement amounts less any trade discounts.

4.6 Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

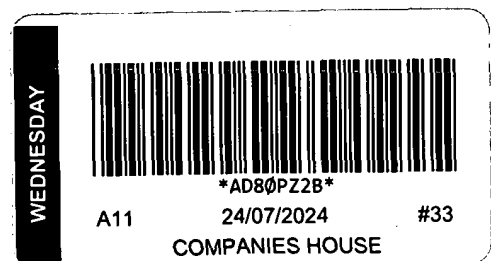

Objectives

Autism touches the lives of millions of people in the UK. The Autscope Organisation (hereafter referred to by its trading name, Autscope) is principally engaged in organising the Autscope conference, held annually during the summer, which seeks to provide respite, support, information and education to autistic people. It was created by autistic people for autistic people to come together and experience a positive and accepting environment.

At Autscope, autistic people are fully included without having to adjust to the expectations of mainstream society. Presentations do not focus on how autistic people must be fundamentally changed in order to be acceptable. [<https://www.autscope.org/about/concept>]

Autscope's main source of funding is through the fees paid by conference participants, but we also seek donations and grant funding in order to facilitate access to Autscope's services among our target beneficiaries – the majority of whom have incomes significantly below the national average¹.

The charitable objectives of Autscope are:

1. to provide respite and support for autistic people by (i) organising retreat-style conferences at which autistic people can learn, engage in activities, socialise and relax in an autistic-orientated environment and (ii) generally providing them and their families and carers with information, advice and other forms of assistance;
2. to advance the education and awareness of the public in all matters relating to autism and in particular to increase public awareness of the challenges faced by, and the general circumstances of, autistic people and their families, thus encouraging increased acceptance and support of autistic people in the community;
3. to advance and promote the education of autistic people in self-advocacy and in those issues which are of particular interest and/or relevance to autistic people; and
4. to do such other charitable activities for the benefit and/or support of autistic people as the directors in their discretion shall decide.

The main activities undertaken to further the charity's purposes for the public benefit are points 2 and 3 above.

All trustees confirm they have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

Activities

Organising a conference

During the year, the board of directors met monthly to consider the strategic direction of the organisation and make decisions on matters arising. They also established an organising committee overseen by the board but delegated with the responsibility for organising the 2023 Autscope conference. The organising committee was led by an Event Manager with a core team of managers and other volunteers.

It was decided that the event should keep the online element due to its success and the ability to reach a wider audience. In line with Autscope's mission we managed to design and create two environments where the schedule, social structure and presentation topics encouraged the full participation of autistic people either in person or from the comfort of their own homes.

Venue. The board decided on The Hayes Conference Centre in Alfreton, Derbyshire, which had proved successful the previous year. It had good accessibility as well as a lot of single rooms and en-suites which were increasingly in high demand. It also had good links to rail stations and airports. Although this is a more expensive venue than the board would have liked it is currently the only venue that can cater for our growing numbers and has the facilities we require that is affordable. Covid unfortunately changed the venue landscape and options available to us with many venues closing down or repurposing themselves. The board are aware that finding new venues will be a challenge in the future. Nevertheless, the board considered The Hayes good value in that it could meet the needs of our growth and the higher expectations of participants. For an en-suite room either single or shared it cost £370 per person.

The Hayes Conference Centre also had a variety of good communal areas with the accommodation being attached. There were plenty of ground floor rooms and adapted rooms as well as family rooms with a variety of options. The conference centre was also surrounded by gardens with a seated terrace, lakeside area and it also had a bar.

This venue proved to be well liked with the communal areas for socialising providing plenty of scope for different activities. Though a little larger than most of our other venues it did mean more walking than usual for participants to access some of the activities but on the whole this was not a problem. The larger grounds with the lake also provided a relaxing place for those that enjoyed walking and due to excellent weather people were able to take advantage of the lawns and terrace well into the evening. The food was also generally well liked and of a high standard with special diets catered for but we encountered a few problems with service though the staff were pleasant and helpful and quickly on hand to sort out any problems.

Transport. The Hayes Conference Centre was only a short journey from Alfreton station which has good connections to mainline stations so we decided to provide transport to and from Alfreton and assist people with taxis if they wanted to go to mainline stations directly. We hired a 17 seat minibus and transported people ourselves as it was unfeasible to hire a coach service due to limited providers close to the area and their availability. It had also proved successful the previous year though we found providing a service to Derby station as well as Alfreton was unnecessary. We were unable to charge for this but many people willingly donated to Autscope which offset the cost.

Costs. Participant registration costs were another key issue considered by the directors. The vast majority of the registration fees paid by Autscope participants cover the cost of hiring the conference venue, including accommodation and catering. Autscope does not seek to make money from the annual conference. Rather, the final fees are set by the Directors with the aim of breaking even. Nevertheless, the Board must ensure that the costs of attending the conference are within the reach of potential participants.

Even though the 2023 venue was fairly expensive the conference was good value for money as we were able to provide en-suite rooms and good facilities. It offered access to a residential 3-day conference with full board for £370. We also had a bursary fund for people on low incomes.

We also added the fourth optional day for an additional £100. This was a relaxation day without any programme so it didn't disadvantage those who could not afford to stay.

For people who were only able to attend the online event we charged £10 which the board considered to be good value considering it gave them access to all the main presentations and online social space.

Registration. This time we opened registration on a first come first served basis as we knew we had a big venue to fill and it was unlikely that anybody would lose out on a place by booking later. We could keep registration open until numbers were required by the venue 2 weeks before the event.

Publicity. Autscope 2023 was publicised in as many places as we could find, and we utilised Facebook and other online facilities as much as possible. The level of promotion for Autscope 2023 appears to have been adequate to achieve an increase in numbers registering for the conference. Autscope may need to consider advertising wider in future years if they are to stay with a bigger venue.

Merchandise and sensory equipment. This year the board did not purchase any new sensory equipment but they renewed some of the smaller items using for keeping people entertained in the lounge area. A small selection of sensory toys and glow products alongside some soft toys were available to purchase and we had some T-shirts, teddies and hats with the Autscope logo on them which were very popular.

Achievements and performance

The Autscope 2023 Conference

In 2023, Autscope held its 19th annual conference on 31st July - 3rd August at The Hayes Conference Centre, Alfreton, Derbyshire. This was a live event with an on-line element for which we used Zoom with additional content on Discord.

This year's theme was 'Advocacy and Autonomy' which was a purposely broad theme intended to explore how the autistic community can advocate for themselves, what support we do/don't need,

and protect themselves from society at large. We had presentations and workshops and these were live streamed where possible to the on-line participants. Unfortunately, due to technical issues we were unable to live stream as well as we had hoped and as a result the board made the decision to refund participants who had signed up for the online only conference.

The live event was attended by 330 participants with the majority attending for the full residential event and a 36 just attending for the day. This included autistic and non-autistic adults, their children and carers. Of these, 86 also booked for the additional day. We also had a further 77 join us for the online only event. This is the largest number of people to have attended an Autscope conference since they began in 2005. While this number attests to the resounding success of Autscope, it is a continuing challenge to try and find venues that meet the needs of mobility impaired participants and are fully accessible whilst still maintaining reasonable costs for all.

Autscope 2023 ran for three days during which there were workshops, leisure activities and social opportunities. All of these activities were specifically oriented to the needs and preferences of autistic people, in line with Autscope's core mission. A fourth day was optional for relaxing and winding down.

The Programme. The programme included an excellent set of well-attended and engaging lectures, workshops, and discussions, with a substantial majority of autistic presenters, some new to Autscope (see Box 1). With the theme of 'Advocacy and Autonomy', the programme included topics such as how autistic community members can speak up for themselves and others, what we can and can't do individually/collectively, and what we can offer to the autistic community, and society at large.

Presentations were accepted on a competitive basis out of a range of proposals. As in previous years, formal programme lectures came with opportunities for both structured and informal discussion between participants. Full details of Autscope 2023 are available on our website at: www.autscope.org.

In addition to the programme of presentations, Autscope also had a diverse range of leisure and social activities. These included our very popular "Sparklies in the Dark" where many people come together to enjoy their love of coloured lights. We also had opportunities to showcase talents in the entertainment evening, plus lightning talks in which participants can share a topic of interest for 5 minutes. Volunteers also ran a quiz night and a recreation of the TV show Countdown. People were also able to join home groups enabling participants to get to know each other better and we extended as many social activities as possible to the on-line participants who also had use of Discord.

Box 1: Autscape highlights

Yo and Josh talked about supported decision making and advocating to increase autistic autonomy. They started by pointing out that autistic people are at risk of being judged to be incapable of making decisions about their lives and how the current legal frameworks in England and Scotland result in decisions being taken for rather than by some autistic people. They went on to say that change is on the horizon, due to the influence of Article 12 UNCRPD, which states that disabled adults should never have the legal right to take their own decisions taken away because of their disability. They then went on to discuss what we know, from research and collective autistic experience, about autistic decision-making and share examples of supported decision-making. They wanted to encourage collective advocacy for effective supported decision-making, within the existing legal frameworks, and with an eye to future progress. In particular, they highlighted the potential of autistic people acting as 'decision supporters' to support other autistic people in autistic friendly ways to make more of their own decisions and increase their autonomy.

Pavan gave a workshop on autistic advocacy in an online world. It was designed to support participants with advocacy and how to make a difference in the online world on online platforms like social media. Participants learnt various skills like making posts more accessible, self-advocacy, and how to make a more positive impact on social media and other online platforms. They also learnt how to stay safe when advocating online, how to avoid burnout when doing online advocacy, knowing when to take a break, as well as familiarising with the features of social media to help keep safe. They also pointed out that online advocacy isn't just social media, it can also be blogging or making videos on YouTube. The aim being to support autistic people with feeling more confident about online advocacy

Kalen and Rin gave a presentation on portal proofing your life: Neurodivergent strategies for independence. They began by asking 'Do you find that stuff just 'goes missing'? You took your shoes off by the door and now only one of them is there. This is due to portals. Portals appear in random places and disappear things completely or transport them somewhere unexpected. Small things like pens, keys and phones are most vulnerable, but money, shoes and swimming kits are also prone to disappearing. Neurodivergent (autistic, ADHD, etc.) people are especially vulnerable to portals in their environment and when you get a lot of neurodivergent people in one household it can be pretty chaotic! As a parent and child duo they gave a range of tips and tricks for neurodivergent living such as the 'portal-proof box' which may help reduce the occurrence and impact of portals on a person's life.

Fundraising

Autscape continued to be part of the Give As You Live and PayPal Giving Fund fundraising platforms in order to capture a small but potentially steady stream of donations.

Give As You Live is a fundraising platform for UK charities and their supporters. To make donations on purchases, shoppers just need to sign up to Give As You Live, select The Autscape Organisation as their favourite charity, install a Give As You Live program on their computer, start shopping, and the money (up to 10% of the total online purchase) is donated to the charity.

PayPal Giving Fund helps people support their favourite charities online and helps charities raise funds through PayPal, eBay and other technology platforms.

Autscape raised £15.38 through Give As You Live and £276.01 via PayPal Giving Fund during the reporting period. When added to the generous amount of donations from individuals, the total amount raised during the reporting period was £1,428.39.

Online lists

Autscape has a 'Community' mailing list with moderators and this is popular with a portion of people who have attended Autscape at various times to discuss the conference, share things of interest relating to Autism in general, and maintain social links as an extension of the networking opportunities the Autscape conference provides. It is also a place where people who cannot get to a conference can communicate with other autistic people in a safe on-line environment.

Autscape also runs various sub committee lists in order for people to become actively involved in organising the conference. The most popular is the programme sub committee where proposals to present at the next conference are discussed.

Membership

Attendance at our annual conference or participating in any aspect of Autscape is not dependent on being a member.

The current membership fee is set at £5.00 and members receive information via our members list and announce list. Members who book a place at our annual conference also receive a £5.00 discount on the fee.

Membership stood at 170 people as of 30th September 2023, compared with 142 people as of 30th September 2022.

Facebook/Twitter

The board also continued to develop its Facebook page to promote and relay information about The Autscape Organisation. This is administrated by a board member and is increasing its followers. We also use Twitter which is generally most active during and just after the conference.

Collaboration

The board have continued Autscape's membership of the European Council of Autistic People. Although this cost £185.61, the board were able to take advantage of the Zoom subscription enabling Autscape to provide a professional online conference to a large number of people. Autscape is represented on the EUCAP board and therefore able to take part in discussions and be informed of issues affecting the European community.

We also collaborated with a group representing people of colour with a view to making Autscape more supportive and better able to meet the needs of people who would like to attend our conference.

Technology

We have continued to develop the Autscape website and we used Ticket Tailor for the conference booking system. We also utilised Zoom and Discord for the conference.

Organising committee

The board set up a dedicated organising committee for the Annual Autscope conference who reported regularly to the board through the Event manager so they could monitor the progress. The organising committee had experienced Autscope conference organisers but they were also able to bring in as many volunteers as required to help with various tasks.

Policies

The board made some minor amendments to the Booking policy to make it easier for the registrar to process bookings.

The board also reviewed the complaints policy and gave authority for the Management committee of an event to handle complaints made about the event up to 60 days after the event and at the event. Previously all complaints had come straight to the board but it was felt that the board were not always the best placed to deal with complaints, particularly minor ones at an event. The policy allows for more serious complaints to still escalate up to the board if necessary.

Bursary Scheme

The board introduced its first Bursary scheme for the Autscope 2018 conference. The aim being to make Autscope accessible to people who would otherwise not be able to afford to attend.

The bursary fund carried forward from the end of the 2022 reporting period was £2000.

The bursary committee considered all applications and we used the whole of the fund granting bursaries to the 17 people who asked for one with amounts ranging between £50 and £200.

Summary

This was our second live event following Covid restrictions and as the first one was close to Covid restrictions being lifted we hoped for an increase in numbers. We achieved this and also managed to maintain quite a high amount of people coming to the online only event. This means we can have a wider benefit to society as a whole in that we can reach and educate people who for one reason or another are not able to attend the live event. Unfortunately we did encounter some technical difficulties including a cyber attack which was beyond our control, which meant the people online missed some of the presentations. Following the event, the board decided it was unfair to charge people who were impacted by this so we refunded all the online fees. Even so the live event was a great success and we are hope that we can continue to build on this in the future.

Financial review

Treasurers report

Autscape has continued to make sure its financial procedures are of a high standard and by close monitoring it makes changes to its procedures as and when necessary.

In 2022, Autscape was able to return to hosting an in-person event. This was well attended but since Covid restrictions had only recently been lifted there was still some trepidation around mixing with large groups and therefore the overall attendance was too low to break even.

In 2023, Autscape also made a small deficit, due to lower-than-expected numbers, and higher costs.

Going forward, Autscape has to ensure that fees are sufficient to keep Autscape solvent, whilst also trying to raise funds in the longer term.

This, along with the fact that the two previous years were online only and brought in little income, means the board need to take great financial care in the upcoming year.

Also contributing to income were the regular contributions Autscape receives from its chosen fundraising platforms, for which you can refer to the fundraising report for further details, and also the generous donations of Autscape attendants and members.

Accounts / Financial

The total assets held at the end of the financial period was £27,432. For comparison, the state of all funds at the end of the previous year was £29,143.

Reserves Policy

The reserves exist so that the charity is able to continue even if there is some expenditure that is unplanned. However, reserves are harmful if they are allowed to build up without limit instead of being spent on charitable activities.

There is balance to be made between the goals of making the charity robust and not holding on to excessive funds. Autscape has a simple reserves policy - it aims for the reserves to be between two limits. If the reserves fall under the lower limit, or above the higher limit, the board have to take action to increase or decrease the reserves as appropriate.

The reserves are currently set at £5000 for the lower limit and £8000 for the higher limit. The free reserves held at the end of the financial period were £1,672 after designating £25,760 for deposits for events in 2024 and 2025. The board recognises the need to increase reserves to aid cash flow and long term financial viability.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The Autscope Organisation (Autscope) is a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum & Articles of association dated July 2010. The Autscope Organisation is registered as a Charity with the Charity Commission.

Constitution and recruitment of trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as the Board. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association members of the Board are elected to serve for a period of three years after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting. Board members are elected to roles by the board and with the exception of the Chair and Vice Chair who are elected annually, they will usually remain in that role until their time on the board expires.

Changes to the board

There were no changes to the directors and their roles at Autscope between October 2022 and September 2023

Chair/Company Secretary/Treasurer. In September 2022 James Pelham remained as chair and Martijn Dekker remained as vice-chair. Richard Chandler remained as the Treasurer and Elaine Binhammer remained as Company Secretary.

The Board would like to thank all of the people who generously donated to Autscope, those who contributed to our subcommittees, working groups, plan list, and those who assisted at the conference itself.

1 Accounting Policies

The principle accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

2 Basis of accounting

2.1 Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The Autscape Organisation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

2.2 Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The charity reported total unrestricted funds at the year end of £27,432 and has already secured a significant amount of funding for the current year. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 to 18 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

3 Income

3.1 Recognition of income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the resources, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is more likely than not that the resources will be received and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

3.2 Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by FRS102 SORP or FRS102.

3.3 Grants and donations

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance or provision of other specified service is deferred until the criteria of income recognition are met.

3.4 Volunteer help

3.5 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

3.6 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charities' work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

4 Expenditure and liabilities

4.1 Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised when it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

4.2 Charitable activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of delivering a conference and other activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

4.3 Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance cost and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

4.4 Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

4.5 Creditors

The charity has creditors which are measured at settlement amounts less any trade discounts.

4.6 Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

Objectives

Autism touches the lives of millions of people in the UK. The Autscope Organisation (hereafter referred to by its trading name, Autscope) is principally engaged in organising the Autscope conference, held annually during the summer, which seeks to provide respite, support, information and education to autistic people. It was created by autistic people for autistic people to come together and experience a positive and accepting environment.

At Autscope, autistic people are fully included without having to adjust to the expectations of mainstream society. Presentations do not focus on how autistic people must be fundamentally changed in order to be acceptable. [<http://www.autscope.org/about/concept>]

Autscope's main source of funding is through the fees paid by conference participants, but we also seek donations and grant funding in order to facilitate access to Autscope's services among our target beneficiaries – the majority of whom have incomes significantly below the national average¹.

The charitable objectives of Autscope are:

1. to provide respite and support for autistic people by (i) organising retreat-style conferences at which autistic people can learn, engage in activities, socialise and relax in an autistic-orientated environment and (ii) generally providing them and their families and carers with information, advice and other forms of assistance;
2. to advance the education and awareness of the public in all matters relating to autism and in particular to increase public awareness of the challenges faced by, and the general circumstances of, autistic people and their families, thus encouraging increased acceptance and support of autistic people in the community;
3. to advance and promote the education of autistic people in self-advocacy and in those issues which are of particular interest and/or relevance to autistic people; and
4. to do such other charitable activities for the benefit and/or support of autistic people as the directors in their discretion shall decide.

The main activities undertaken to further the charity's purposes for the public benefit are points 2 and 3 above.

All trustees confirm they have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

Activities

Organising a conference

During the year, the board of directors met monthly to consider the strategic direction of the organisation and make decisions on matters arising. They also established an organising committee overseen by the board but delegated with the responsibility for organising the 2022 Autscape conference. The organising committee was led by an Event Manager with a core team of managers and other volunteers.

With the end of Covid restrictions this would be the first live event in 2 years. However, as the online conferences we had resorted to had been successful the board decided they would like to keep an online element running concurrently with the live event. In line with Autscape's mission we managed to design and create two environments where the schedule, social structure and presentation topics encouraged the full participation of autistic people either in person or from the comfort of their own homes.

Venue. The board had originally secured Giggleswick school for its 2020 venue which was held over until 2021 due to the Covid lockdown. In 2021 when we were unable to still have a live conference we had hoped that Giggleswick school would still be available. Sadly, the changes brought about through lockdown meant Giggleswick were unable to offer their facilities for 2022. This meant the board had to find another setting. Having not had a live conference for 2 years and having established a larger than expected contingent of online participants the board felt they could risk a larger venue with people voicing opinions that they were looking forward to coming back or coming for the first time.

The board decided on The Hayes conference centre in Alfreton, Derbyshire, which had good accessibility as well as a lot of single rooms and en-suites which were increasingly being asked for. It also had good links to rail stations and airports. Although more expensive than Giggleswick the board considered it good value in that it could meet the needs of our growth and the higher expectations of participants. For an en-suite room either single or shared it cost £330 per person and we also had a limited amount of standard rooms for £295 per person.

The Hayes conference centre also had a variety of good communal areas with the accommodation being attached. There were plenty of ground floor rooms and adapted rooms as well as family rooms with a variety of options. The conference centre was also surrounded by gardens with a seated terrace, lakeside area and it also had a bar.

This venue proved to be well liked with the communal areas for socialising providing plenty of scope for different activities. Though a little larger than most of our other venues it did mean more walking than usual for participants to access some of the activities but on the whole this was not a problem. The larger grounds with the lake also provided a relaxing place for those that enjoyed walking and due to excellent weather people were able to take advantage of the lawns and terrace well into the evening. The food was also generally well liked and of a high standard with special diets catered for but a small proportion of participants would have liked more choice. The staff were pleasant and helpful and quickly on hand to sort out any problems.

Transport. The Hayes conference centre was only a short journey from Alfreton station but with many main line trains going through Derby we decided to provide transport to and from both stations. Unfortunately we were unable to hire a coach company since many had stopped trading due to Covid so we had to resort to hiring a 17 seat mini bus and transporting people ourselves. We were unable to charge for this but many people willingly donated to Autscope which offset the cost.

Costs. Participant registration costs were another key issue considered by the directors. The vast majority of the registration fees paid by Autscope participants cover the cost of hiring the conference venue, including accommodation and catering. Autscope does not seek to make money from the annual conference. Rather, the final fees are set by the Directors with the aim of breaking even. Nevertheless, the Board must ensure that the costs of attending the conference are within the reach of potential participants.

Even though the 2022 venue was fairly expensive the conference was good value for money as we were able to provide en-suite rooms and good facilities. It offered access to a residential 3-day conference with full board for between £295 and £330 depending on booking options. We also had a bursary fund for people on low incomes.

Following the success of adding the fourth optional day in 2019 we also offered this again for an additional £95. This was a relaxation day without any programme so it didn't disadvantage those who could not afford to stay.

For people who were only able to attend the online event we charged £10 which the board considered to be good value considering it gave them access to all the main presentations and online social space.

Registration. This time we opened registration on a first come first served basis as we knew we had a big venue to fill. With covid restrictions only just being lifted we were also unsure how many people would register. The intention was to close registration early if necessary and hold back some places for those who were not quick enough to book straight away so they were not disadvantaged. However, as the venue had a bigger capacity than we were exclusively contracted for and with many people opting to share rooms we found we could keep registration open until numbers were required by the venue 2 weeks before the event.

Publicity. Autscope 2022 was publicised in Asperger United magazine (supplied at no charge), a quarterly magazine written by and for people on the autism spectrum, in addition to being advertised via the Autscope website and word of mouth. The level of promotion for Autscope 2022 appears to have been adequate to achieve an increase in numbers registering for the conference. Autscope still needs to adopt a conservative approach planning advertising to ensure resources and potentially funds are not deployed pushing demand significantly beyond the number of limited places available.

Merchandise and sensory equipment. This year the board did not purchase any new sensory equipment but a small selection of sensory toys and glow products alongside some soft toys were available to purchase and we had some T-shirts, Teddies and bags with the Autscope logo on them which were very popular.

Achievements and performance

The Autscope 2022 Conference

In 2022, Autscope held its 18th annual conference on 8th-11th August at The Hayes Conference Centre, Alfreton, Derbyshire. This was a live event with an on-line element for which we used Zoom with additional content on Discord.

This year's theme was 'Interdependence' which was a purposely broad theme intended to explore how the autistic community rely on each other, what support we do/don't need, and what we can offer to the autistic community, and society at large. We had presentations and workshops and these were live streamed where possible to the on-line participants.

The event was attended by 319 participants with the majority attending for the full residential event and a small proportion just attending for the day. This included autistic and non-autistic adults, their children and carers. Of these, 91 also booked for the additional day. We also had a further 222 join us for the online only event. This is the largest number of people to have attended an Autscope conference since they began in 2005. While this number attests to the resounding success of Autscope, it is a continuing challenge to try and find venues that meet the needs of mobility impaired participants and are fully accessible whilst still maintaining reasonable costs for all.

Autscope 2022 ran for three days during which there were workshops, leisure activities, social opportunities, and the Annual General Meeting. All of these activities were specifically oriented to the needs and preferences of autistic people, in line with Autscope's core mission. A fourth day was optional for relaxing and winding down.

The Programme. The programme included an excellent set of well-attended and engaging lectures, workshops, and discussions, with a substantial majority of autistic presenters, some new to Autscope (see Box 1). With the theme of 'Interdependence', the programme explored the different ways the autistic community rely on each other, what support we do/don't need, and what we can offer to the autistic community, and society at large.

Presentations were accepted on a competitive basis out of a range of proposals. As in previous years, formal programme lectures came with opportunities for both structured and informal discussion between participants. Full details of Autscope 2022 are available on our website at: www.autscope.org.

In addition to the programme of presentations, Autscope also had a diverse range of leisure and social activities. These included our very popular "Sparklies in the Dark" where many people come together to enjoy their love of coloured lights. We also had opportunities to showcase talents in the entertainment evening, plus lightning talks in which participants can share a topic of interest for 5 minutes. Volunteers also ran a quiz night and a recreation of the TV show Countdown. People were also able to join home groups enabling participants to get to know each other better and we extended as many social activities as possible to the on-line participants who also had use of Discord.

Box 1: Autscope highlights

Heta talked about a project which ran from December 2021 to April 2022, where a number of autistic people from five continents worked together as an ad hoc committee, the Global Autistic Task Force on Autism Research, to respond to the article 'The Lancet Commission on the future of care and clinical research in autism'. This collaboration resulted in an open letter and an article that was submitted to a peer-reviewed journal. They described some of the challenges encountered during this process, as well as solutions. They also discussed the possibility and potential benefits of similar future projects with the audience being asked to contribute ideas.

Sue McCowan and Mary Doherty from Autistic Doctors International (ADI) reported on current ADI research, publications and collaborations aimed at improving healthcare services for autistic people. Projects with the Royal College of Psychiatrists, the Royal College of Physicians and the Royal College of Surgeons were discussed, along with research projects in General Practice, including an autism training initiative for GPs. Autistic doctors are in a unique position to educate colleagues and improve services from the inside and they illustrated that through healthy interdependence with their highly valued peer supporters they can model the benefits of open communication between staff, services and users. They explained that when they talk about their own barriers to healthcare, their fellow professionals realise that this is a huge issue for autistic people. They made the point that if they can't access care, who can?

Saffron Baldoza gave a workshop on Interdependence at work: Self advocacy and balance. They explained that 22% of autistic adults are employed - compared to 79% of the general population. Through the lens of interdependence, they examined the key problems in securing jobs and coping in the workplace. They believed the key to success is knowing your rights, self advocacy, and most importantly, striking a balance between the independence of working, and utilising support - i.e. becoming interdependent. The workshop outlined what interdependence means before it delved into Autism, unemployment, and rights. They covered job applications, interview adjustments, and the formal support available when at work, before focusing on adjustments an employer can provide. They also covered personal coping strategies for managing within the workplace. Finally, they guided participants through the creation of a simple workplace adjustments passport that they could share with their colleagues and/or managers. They also provided a more comprehensive 'interdependence at work' toolkit with resources for participants to use.

Fundraising

Autscope continued to be part of the Give As You Live and PayPal Giving Fund fundraising platforms in order to capture a small but potentially steady stream of donations.

Give As You Live is a fundraising platform for UK charities and their supporters. To make donations on purchases, shoppers just need to sign up to Give As You Live, select The Autscope Organisation as their favourite charity, install a Give As You Live program on their computer, start shopping, and the money (up to 10% of the total online purchase) is donated to the charity.

PayPal Giving Fund helps people support their favourite charities online and helps charities raise funds through PayPal, eBay and other technology platforms.

Autscope raised £37.50 via PayPal Giving Fund during the reporting period.

Online lists

Autscape has a 'Community' mailing list with moderators and this is popular with a portion of people who have attended Autscape at various times to discuss the conference, share things of interest relating to Autism in general, and maintain social links as an extension of the networking opportunities the Autscape conference provides. It is also a place where people who cannot get to a conference can communicate with other autistic people in a safe on-line environment.

Autscape also runs various sub committee lists in order for people to become actively involved in organising the conference. The most popular is the programme sub committee where proposals to present at the next conference are discussed.

Membership

Attendance at our annual conference or participating in any aspect of Autscape is not dependent on being a member.

The current membership fee is set at £5.00 and members receive information via our members list and announce list. Members who book a place at our annual conference also receive a £5.00 discount on the fee.

Membership stood at 142 people as of 30th September 2022, compared to 277 people as of 30th September 2021. This decrease is due to a timing anomaly as well as a larger number of people attending the online only event in 2021.

Facebook/Twitter

The board also continued to develop its Facebook page to promote and relay information about The Autscape Organisation. This is administrated by a board member and is increasing its followers. We also use Twitter which is generally most active during and just after the conference.

Collaboration

The board have continued Autscape's membership of the European Council of Autistic People. Although this cost £174.91 the board were able to take advantage of the Zoom subscription enabling Autscape to provide a professional online conference to a large amount of people. Autscape is represented on the board and therefore able to take part in discussions and be informed of issues affecting the European community.

We also collaborated with a group of volunteers who raised money to provide bursaries specifically for people of colour to attend Autscape. The board welcomed this as an initiative that helped 14 people of colour to attend and we have opened a dialogue with people of colour organisations and representatives so we can better meet their needs at future conferences and encourage more people of colour to attend.

Technology

We have continued to develop the Autscape website and we used Ticket Tailor for the conference booking system. We also utilised Zoom and Discord for the conference.

Organising committee

The board set up a dedicated organising committee for the Annual Autscope conference who reported regularly to the board so they could monitor the progress. The organising committee had experienced Autscope conference organisers but they were also able to bring in as many volunteers as required to help with various tasks.

Policies

The board reviewed its Membership policy though it has delayed implementation pending review of associated GDPR policies.

The board also compiled and approved a new Booking policy which incorporates booking terms and conditions including cancellations and will be the standard booking policy for all future events.

The Behaviour policy was also reviewed and amendments made to reflect the changes to the organising structure in that an organising committee/management team and not the board were delegated main responsibility for behaviour at the event. Serious behaviour issues may still be escalated to the board especially those which may require some further action.

Bursary Scheme

The board introduced its first Bursary scheme for the Autscope 2018 conference. The aim being to make Autscope accessible to people who would otherwise not be able to afford to attend.

During the previous two years of only low fee online conferences we did not award any bursaries. As a result the bursary fund carried forward from the end of the 2021 reporting period was £2016.

The bursary committee considered all applications and we used the whole of the fund granting bursaries to the 10 people who asked for one with amounts ranging between £50 and £200. Hopefully we will be able to donate an amount of money to a bursary fund every year from now on.

Summary

Having been impacted heavily by Coronavirus for the previous two years we were pleased to be able to bring back a live conference. Whilst the charity was able to continue to make a difference to the circumstances of its beneficiaries by providing an on-line replacement event, it was thrilling and refreshing to be able to bring back people to real autistic space where participants felt safe and accepted whilst learning and exploring aspects of their own and others' autism. We were also able to use the skills we had acquired through only having on-line events to reach even more people by keeping the on-line facility for those who were not able to get to a live event.

This has a wider benefit to society as a whole in that the more people we can deliver our conference to, the better able we are to educate people about the challenges autistic people face and how they can be better supported and accepted individually and as an autistic community.

Financial review

Treasurers report

Autscape has continued to make sure its financial procedures are of a high standard and by close monitoring it makes changes to its procedures as and when necessary.

In 2022, Autscape was able to return to hosting an in-person event. This was well attended but since Covid restrictions had only recently been lifted there was still some trepidation around mixing with large groups and therefore the overall attendance was too low to break even.

This, along with the fact that the two previous years were online only and brought in little income means the board need to take great financial care in the upcoming year.

Also contributing to an overall net income were the regular contributions Autscape receives from its chosen fundraising platforms, for which you can refer to the fundraising report for further details, and also the generous donations of Autscape attendants and members of £3,844, which came to a total of £3881.

Accounts / Financial

The total assets held at the end of the financial period was £29,143. For comparison, the state of all funds at the end of the previous year was £27,646.

Reserves Policy

The reserves exist so that the charity is able to continue even if there is some expenditure that is unplanned. However, reserves are harmful if they are allowed to build up without limit instead of being spent on charitable activities.

There is balance to be made between the goals of making the charity robust and not holding on to excessive funds. Autscape has a simple reserves policy - it aims for the reserves to be between two limits. If the reserves fall under the lower limit, or above the higher limit, the board have to take action to increase or decrease the reserves as appropriate.

The reserves are currently set at £5000 for the lower limit and £8000 for the higher limit. The reserves held at the end of the financial period were £8,566, with the surplus being used towards the venue deposit for Autscape 2023, demonstrating how Autscape is planning its activities in advance.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The Autscope Organisation (Autscope) is a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum & Articles of association dated July 2010. The Autscope Organisation is registered as a Charity with the Charities Commission.

Constitution and recruitment of trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as the Board. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association members of the Board are elected to serve for a period of three years after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting. Board members are elected to roles by the board and with the exception of the Chair and vice chair who are elected annually, they will usually remain in that role until their time on the board expires.

Changes to the board

There were some notable changes both to the directors and their roles at Autscope between October 2021 and September 2022

Chair/Company Secretary/Treasurer. In September 2022 James Pelham was elected as chair and Martijn Dekker was elected as vice-chair. Richard Chandler remained as the Treasurer and Elaine Binhammer remained as Company secretary.

At the 2022 AGM, Martijn Dekker and James Pelham were re-elected to the board and David Singh, Kacey Clark and George Watts were also elected. Leneh Buckle left the board having completed her term and Peter Marshall did not stand for election having been co-opted following the 2021 AGM.

The Board would like to thank all of the people who generously donated to Autscope and those who contributed to our subcommittees, working groups and plan list, and who assisted at the conference itself.

This report has been prepared in accordance with FRS102 SORP with the special provisions for small companies under the Companies Act 2006.



1 Accounting Policies

The principle accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

2 Basis of accounting

2.1 Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The Autscope Organisation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

2.2 Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The charity reported total unrestricted funds at the year end of £29,143 and has already secured a significant amount of funding for the current year. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 to 18 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

3 Income

3.1 Recognition of income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the resources, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is more likely than not that the resources will be received and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

3.2 Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by FRS102 SORP or FRS102.

3.3 Grants and donations

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance or provision of other specified service is deferred until the criteria of income recognition are met.

3.4 Volunteer help

The value of volunteer help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

3.5 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

3.6 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charities' work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

4 Expenditure and liabilities

4.1 Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised when it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

4.2 Charitable activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of delivering a conference and other activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

4.3 Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance cost and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

4.4 Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

4.5 Creditors

The charity has creditors which are measured at settlement amounts less any trade discounts.

4.6 Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.
