Zimbabwe Victims' Support Fund and its Purposes

During 2024 the ZVSF Trustees in the UK, working with our partners and colleagues in Zimbabwe, have continued to supply food aid to the people of Matabeleland. Indeed, thanks to our supporters in the UK, over the last three quarters of the year, we were able to double the amount of mealie meal supplied in comparison with 2023. This dramatic expansion was necessitated by the failure of the 2024 harvest (due to El Nino) and the policies of the current government.

Pastor Bheki Siziba and the Zimbabwean Administrator, Phaniel Moyo, have been responsible for the distribution of food to the really needy people in Gwanda, Plumtree South, Beit Bridge, Masvingo, Mazwi, Killarney, Spring Farm and Heaney Junction – all these communities are in regions of acute deprivation and food shortage. We also supplied primary schools in Lupane with mealie meal and soya chunks during term times, thereby relieving the school children of hunger. ZVSF has also continued to support the Intuthuko (meaning progress through training and development) Garden Project at Esigodini. We have agreed to pay for the installation of a dedicated bore hole and the consequent relocation of the pump and solar panels. This will help secure sufficient water for the drip feeding of vegetable plants. The activities on the garden are managed by a hard-working committee elected from the 'gardeners' who are aided by Xolani Ndlovu (a pastor at the Presbyterian Church) and ZDDT (Zimbabwe Democracy Development Trust).

In the UK, the Trustees are indebted to Caroline Hastie-Smith who has taken on the demanding role of Treasurer of ZVSF, being responsible not only for maintaining our financial records but also for communicating on financial matters with our partners in Zimbabwe.

Research and Consultation

The Trustees remain in close contact with the partners and colleagues in Bulawayo so that they are aware of local developments. They also monitor Zimbabwean on-line publications and take into account such research as is published by FEWS Net (Famine Early Warning Systems Network – funded by US Aid – recently re-established by the US Government) – which substantiate the reports from our colleagues. Chris Sworn, one of our trustees, spent some time with the team during a visit to Zimbabwe in August 2024 when he was deeply impressed by the gratitude of recipients of ZVSF's food aid programme. Graham Shaw, during his visit to Bulawayo in May 2025, also joined the local team in their relief work and in discussing their future programme.

Advocacy and Information

The Trustees have continued to post relevant information on the ZVSF website in order to communicate with those British people interested in and concerned about the plight of Zimbabweans. They have also opened a Facebook page which focuses on the work of ZVSF in Zimbabwe. They distribute to past and present donors bi-annual reports on the activities of ZVSF, and they promote the work of the Charity whenever and wherever possible by presentations, conversations and digital communications.



During 2023, the ZVSF Trustees in the UK, working with our partners and colleagues in Zimbabwe, have continued to supply food aid to the people of Matabeleland. Their inability to meet their own food requirements was compounded by the problems caused by the collapse of the Zimbabwean dollar.

Pastors Robert Chatindo and Bheki Siziba have continued to supply food to the really needy people in Gwanda, Plumtree South, Beit Bridge, Masvingo, Mazwi, Killarney, Spring Farm and Heaney Junction – all these communities are in regions of acute deprivation and food shortage. We also supplied primary schools in Lupane with mealie meal during term times. As in previous years, 20 tonnes went to Hillside Methodist Church for onward distribution to the needy of Bulawayo, including the Island Hospice, Bulawayo Shelter and a hospice run by Youth for Christ.

ZVSF has also funded the creation of a community garden during 2023. Now known as Intuthuko (which means progress through training and development), it is located on some land at Escadini (some 12 miles outside the urban area) owned by the City Presbyterian Church of Bulawayo. Our funds were used to purchase a solar pump and install a network of rubber pipes which drip feed vegetable (for example: onions, carrots, cabbages and chomolia) plants. The activities on the garden are managed by a committee elected from the 'gardeners' who are aided by Xolani Ndlovu (a pastor at the Presbyterian Church) and ZDDT (Zimbabwe Democracy Development Trust).

Research and Consultation

The Trustees remain in close contact with the partners and colleagues in Bulawayo so that they are aware of local developments. They also monitor Zimbabwean on-line publications and take into account such research as is published by FEWS Net (Famine Early Warning Systems Network – funded by US Aid) – which substantiate the reports from our colleagues. From time to time, one of our Trustees has visited Zimbabwe with a view to ensuring that ZVSF's modus operandi is in line with the needs of the people of Matabeleland. The most recent visit was in August 2024.

Zimbabwe Victims' Support Fund and its Purposes

During 2021, the ZVSF Trustees in the UK, working with our partners and colleagues in Zimbabwe, have continued to supply food aid to the people of Matabeleland. The 2021 maize harvest in Zimbabwe amounted to 2.7m tonnes, 200% above the 2020 level and 130% above the average over the last 10 years. Despite this, there were substantial areas of Matabeleland North and South where the harvest was poor either because of excessive rainfall or because of a shortage of inputs. It is the peoples of precisely these areas whom are targeted with the regular deliveries of mealie meal. Their inability to meet their own food requirements was compounded by the problems caused by the rapidly deteriorating value of the Zimbabwean dollar (which fell by nearly 30% against the US dollar over the year) and the Covid lockdowns (which prevented travel to the major urban centres). Overall, the quantity of mealie meal which was purchased with funds from ZVSF fell from 406 tonnes in 2020 to just 287 tonnes in 2021 - reflecting the reduced need following the good harvest.

Pastor Albert Chatindo who had been responsible for the vast bulk of the food distributed, sadly died in September 2021 and his key role has been passed to two pastors who had been closely associated with him. They have continued to supply food to the really needy people in Gwanda, Plumtree South, Beit Bridge, Masvingo, Mazwi, Killarney, Spring Farm and Heaney Junction - all these communities are in regions of acute deprivation and food shortage. We also supplied primary schools in Lupane with mealie meal when they were not closed because of Covid. As in previous years, 20 tonnes went to Hillside Methodist Church for onward distribution to the needy of Bulawayo, including the Island Hospice, Bulawayo Shelter and a hospice run by Youth for Christ.

The Trustees remain in close contact with the partners and colleagues in Bulawayo so that they are aware of local developments. They also monitor Zimbabwean on-line publications and take into account such research as is published by FEWS Net (Famine Early Warning Systems Network - funded by US Aid) - which substantiate the reports from our colleagues. 

Para 1.20	<p>Zimbabwe Victims' Support Fund and its Purposes</p> <p>During 2020, the ZVSF Trustees in the UK, working with our partners and colleagues in Zimbabwe, have continued to supply food aid to the people of Matabeleland. The 2020 maize harvest was over 1,000,000 tonnes short of the accepted minimum annual requirement. Many Zimbabweans were therefore in a crisis situation without sufficient food to meet their daily needs. The situation was exacerbated by the Covid-19 pandemic which hit people living in urban areas particularly severely as it deprived them of opportunities to participate in the cash economy. There was little evidence of the major relief agencies working in Matabeleland and the privations of the region were intensified by the corruption which is endemic within the Zimbabwean economy. The Zimbabwean dollar continued to lose value against the American dollar and maize stocks within Zimbabwe were exhausted by the end of the year. This necessitated the import of maize from South Africa at considerably inflated prices.</p> <p>A nearly new pick up truck had to be purchased in November 2020 so that the mealie meal distribution programme could be sustained. We were also asked to support the emergency feeding of very young children by importing a product called ePap from South Africa. Otherwise, we remitted sufficient funds to the team in Bulawayo to purchase 406 tonnes of mealie meal – 46% more than in 2019, which was already a record year. Pastor Albert Chatindo is responsible for the vast bulk of the food distributed, supplying 10 kg of food per family per month to people in Gwanda, Plumtree South, Beit Bridge, Masvingo,</p>

		<p>Mazwi, Killarney, Spring Farm and Heaney Junction. We also supplied primary schools in Lupane with mealie meal when they were not closed because of Covid. 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

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of the Zimbabwe Victims' Support Fund ("ZVSF")

I report on the accounts of ZVSF for the year to 31 December 2020, which are set out on page 1.
