Our primary objectives this year included providing clean water to around Somalia by prioritising the residents who were mostly affected by dirty water or drought.



Well digging projects

Mama Asha Foundation is pleased to announce that the numbers of wells constructed have now increased and has now covered the most drained villages affected by the draught.

We proceed with the project by sending out an engineer who looks at the location and land, which he then calculates the measurement depth of the land to the nearest pure water. depending on the zone the measurement vary from 10 ft to 150 ft, our work is mainly done by hand however once it gets over 58 ft it usually needs a rig to finish the job.



Local projects

Our main local project this year was tackling the knife crime and avoid risk of exploitation of the local youth, by organising various football events that and pairing our mentors volunteers to our youth. We have also provided free CV, cover letter and interviewing skills courses to help our young local youth to gain confidence and approachability when applying for jobs.



Upcoming projects:

The charity is collecting sufficient funds to invest on an ambulance van in order to provide urgent care and transport to the victims who are affected by injuries, illnesses that may require hospital recovery will then be transported to the nearest Health Service.



We are proud to have provided 10 wheelchairs that has enabled transportation to victims who suffer from mobility issues.



1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

Turnover

Turnover represents the value, net of value added tax and discounts, of goods provided to customers and work carried out in respect of services provided to customers.

Depreciation

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets over their estimated useful lives.

Plant and machinery	20% straight line
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Deferred taxation

Full provision is made for deferred taxation resulting from timing differences between the recognition of gains and losses in the accounts and their recognition for tax purposes. Deferred taxation is calculated on an un-discounted basis at the tax rates which are expected to apply in the periods when the timing differences will reverse.

Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are taken to the profit and loss account.

Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts, which are those where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset have passed to the company, are capitalised in the balance sheet and depreciated over their useful lives. The corresponding lease or hire purchase obligation is treated in the balance sheet as a liability.

The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease and represents a constant proportion of the balance of capital repayments outstanding.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the profit and loss account as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

Many of the flood-impacted areas are in the path of an ongoing measles outbreak, and a spike in




acute watery diarrhoea, or cholera, is a major threat, he said.

The organization, which is a registered charity, is limited by guarantee and was incorporated In July 2010. The governing document is the company's memorandum and articles of association.

ACHIEVEINENT AND PERFORMANCE

Review of Activities and Income generation

Over the last year Mama Asha Foundation has run a variety of successful projects that have benefited the public as shown below.

2018 was the worst year in Somalia, after been hit by the drought in 2017 and trying to recover. The country has then been hit by the worst rainfall that led to flooding, which



displaced hundreds of thousands of people. The rains signal the end of the drought for some areas of the country but they also sharpen the risks faced by acutely malnourished children. Rain is also known for spreading diseases that are particularly deadly for the victims with low immune systems are fragile and exhausted.

Based on the information sources taken by the humanitarian response, about 3.2 million people are in need of life saving and livelihood support, while over 1.1 million people are internally displaced. The flooding has also damaged water sources, sanitation facilities and other critical infrastructure, and 22 nutrition centres treating over 6,000 acutely malnourished children in areas hosting the displaced, have had to shut down.

Many of the flood-impacted areas are in the path of an ongoing measles outbreak, and a spike in



acute watery diarrhoea, or cholera, is a major threat, he said.

Children displaced from their homes are most likely to be malnourished.



Mama Asha Foundation raised urgent awareness, to local primary school and Somali community. We have managed to collect a reasonable amount of funds, that allowed us to build an immediate shelter for the victims and provided them food and health facilities.

After a public meeting with the community, many mothers have requested our charity



to focus more on the 'knife crime' issue. Based on the figure

taken by "anti-knife UK" campaign, In the year up to November, there have been a total of 272 fatal



stabbings, with at least 1,887 reported knife attacks. During the meeting, we have spoken to the mother of the victim of knife crime and parents of youth offenders of knife crime. Many parents have expressed concern and lack of knowledge and solution in this type of situation. Parents of youth offenders have admitted language and cultural barrier have been a huge problem. Most of them does not have much information of the trial process and years of the sentences. Some of them have also proposed if there were a possibility of having their child extradited, as they believe that prisons in Somalia are more beneficial than in Britain. Mama Asha foundation have explained that although there is an act where one jurisdiction delivers a person accused or convicted of committing a crime in another jurisdiction. Somalia does not meet the requirements to exercise the Extradition Act 2003, as there isn't a bilateral agreement towards the Somali and British government and that Somalia did not sign the Universal Declaration of Human rights.

The primarily solution of the knife crime issue is to accept and possible gang involvement. If parents believe that their son, is showing suspicious sign of being a member of a gang, its very crucial for them to not deny the signs and start anticipating solutions.

Primarily solutions are:

- Increase communication with their son, without being too judgmental, as this will lead create a barrier.
- Change of environment or recreational activity. Signing up their son to activities that he might be interested in. Although this might not be possible for some families who suffers from low income. Mama Asha Foundation have

suggested Youth centres such as Cedars Youth community, based in Harrow. This provides gym, ICT suits and many other more activities.




Mama Asha foundation has held an anti-knife crime event, involving youth campaigning on anti-knife crime. Inviting rappers, youtubers and bloggers. The idea was to gain interest from the youth and encouraging them to stop knife crime. Among the

speakers there were survivals victims, mothers of victims and ex-gang members, which have all shared their experience of knife crime. The concept of the event was to give the youth a reality check of the seriousness of knife crime. However, many parents have explained their consistent disappointed by the way the problem had been dealt by the government, with over the past decade.

Although there still have not been any effective solution, our charity will continue to fight against knife crime and hoping to at least decrease the figures.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 July 2020

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

Turnover

Turnover represents the value, net of value added tax and discounts, of goods provided to customers and work carried out in respect of services provided to customers.

Depreciation

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets over their estimated useful lives.

Plant and machinery	20% straight line
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Deferred taxation

Full provision is made for deferred taxation resulting from timing differences between the recognition of gains and losses in the accounts and their recognition for tax purposes. Deferred taxation is calculated on an un-discounted basis at the tax rates which are expected to apply in the periods when the timing differences will reverse.

Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are taken to the profit and loss account.

Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts, which are those where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset have passed to the company, are capitalised in the balance sheet and depreciated over their useful lives. The corresponding lease or hire purchase obligation is treated in the balance sheet as a liability.

The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease and represents a constant proportion of the balance of capital repayments outstanding.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the profit and loss account as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.
