The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 5th April 2025.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 1993 and the Charity reporting and accounting: the essentials November 2016 (CC15d).

Structure, governance and management

The Trust is a registered charity, number 1148254, and is constituted under a trust deed dated 18th July 2012. New Trustees are appointed by the existing trustees by a resolution at a special meeting. The Trust Deed provides for a minimum of 3 trustees. The Trustees do not benefit financially from their Trusteeship.

The Trustees hold at least two ordinary meetings a year to oversee the charity's work. The day to day running of the charity is carried out by volunteers and the charity employs no paid staff. The charity's work overseas is made possible by the voluntary contributions of professionals working in or visiting developing countries to deliver anaesthesia and support.

Risks associated with delivering safe anaesthesia in low-resource settings are taken into consideration by the Trustees. Importantly, only appropriate equipment that is safe, effective and inexpensive to use and maintain is provided by the charity. Equipment is only supplied to end-users who are suitably trained to use it safely. Training and continuing support is provided wherever requested.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity Safe Anaesthesia Worldwide (SAWW) are to preserve and protect good health by: the provision of suitable anaesthetic equipment to deprived areas of the world; and the support of research, education, and training to ensure its effective use, care and maintenance.

Anaesthesia services are crucial to achieving the **United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 3 Good Health and Well-being**, and SAWW's objectives support this goal and in particular the following targets:

- *3.1 By 2030, reduce the global maternal mortality ratio to less than 70 per 100,000 live births*
- *3.2 By 2030, end preventable deaths of newborns and children under 5 years of age, with all countries aiming to reduce neonatal mortality to at least as low as 12 per 1,000 live births and under-5 mortality to at least as low as 25 per 1,000 live births*
- *3.4 By 2030, reduce by one third premature mortality from non-communicable diseases through prevention and treatment*
- *3.8 Achieve universal health coverage, including access to quality essential health-care services*

SAWW's objectives focus on the provision of:

- Safe anaesthesia and pain relief to help women in labour and to reduce the unacceptably high number of women who currently die in pregnancy and childbirth.
- Appropriate anaesthesia for remote low-resource locations to enable essential surgery to treat life-threatening, painful or disabling conditions such as trauma, tumours, hernias, obstetric fistulas, wounds, animal bites, burns, infections and congenital deformities.
- Oxygen therapies for newborns and infants to prevent unnecessary deaths from pneumonia, malaria, sepsis and premature birth.
- Portable anaesthesia equipment for emergency response to save lives of those affected by natural disasters or war.

To achieve its objectives the charity undertakes the following activities:

- The purchase and supply of equipment that is suitable for use in low-resource settings and remote locations, to people in need.
- The delivery of training for medical and technical staff in poor countries, to enable them to deliver safe anaesthesia and maintain equipment in good working order.
- Support for research into ways of improving the safe delivery of anaesthesia in poor countries.

In planning and conducting the charity's activities for the year the Trustees have given due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission.

Day-to-day administration of the charity is carried out by the Trustees and other volunteers. Co-ordination of activities and secretarial support is provided by Carol Newman who is recompensed by Diamedica (UK) Ltd. Voluntary work by numerous individuals has enabled the delivery of anaesthesia training and the provision of research.

Activities

This year SAWW continued to collaborate with DAK International and Partners for Equity (PFE) to improve anaesthesia provision in developing countries. This mutually beneficial partnership enabled us to supply anaesthesia and related equipment to hospitals in need in Somaliland, South Sudan and Zimbabwe.

A rural hospital in Nepal reached out to us for help in equipping a new Special Newborn Care Unit and we were able to supply specialist respiratory equipment to support sick and premature babies. Training equipment that included manikins for teaching anaesthesia intubation techniques were sent to the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). Further assistance was sent to Ukraine in the form of equipment for surgical treatment of wounds.

EQUIPMENT DONATIONS

Recipients of equipment donations during this year were as follows:

1. NEPAL

Two bubble CPAP machines were donated by SAWW to Chaurjhari Hospital, a remote rural hospital in Nepal. Dr Dhiraj Mahara is the only paediatrician at the hospital, which has few resources and lacked specialist equipment. The CPAP devices were needed for a newly established Special Newborn Care Unit. These devices help premature and sick babies to breathe and are invariably lifesaving. An orientation class was held for the staff on how to operate the new CPAP devices and the equipment is now installed and in use to treat vulnerable tiny patients, who would not otherwise survive. Feedback has included the following case studies:

- A critically ill two-year-old boy with severe pneumonia and respiratory distress. With no access to advanced ICU care, the boy was treated with the CPAP machine and after five days, he was strong enough to go home.
- A one-day-old baby with early onset neonatal sepsis and severe pulmonary artery hypertension was admitted and improved very well on the CPAP device, ultimately being discharged back to his delighted family.
- A 34 weeks of gestation preterm baby, nearly 1800g delivered on the road, presented in emergency with lethargic, poor feeding and respiratory distress. Treatment with the CPAP, spoon feeding, and IV fluids, the baby began to recover and is currently still under our care.

2. SOUTH SUDAN

SAWW partnered with DAK International and Partners for Equity (PFE), to donate a Glostavent Helix anaesthesia machine with accessories to the St. Theresa Hospital in Nzara, South Sudan. South Sudan is one of the most fragile states in the world, with violent conflict and political instability. Healthcare is non-existent in many parts of the country. St. Theresa Hospital stands as an outpost of hope for some 300,000 people, serving the south western region of South Sudan, Democratic Republic of Congo, and Central African Republic. The hospital provides critically important services for maternal, child and infant medical care. The

new anaesthesia machine has been delivered, installed and is now in use, with a report on its impact expected in the coming year.

3. SOMALILAND

Somaliland is an impoverished territory in the Horn of Africa. Now peaceful, a civil war destroyed most of the health services, which are now slowly being rebuilt. Foremost among the hospitals is the Edna Adan University Hospital (EAUH), founded by a former midwife and politician and health care advocate, Edna Adan Ismail. The EAUH provides crucial medical care to many Somalilanders who are largely poor rural farmers.

The latest addition to the EAUH is a new operating theatre to increase their capacity to conduct surgical procedures mainly for C-section, hydrocephalus, spina bifida, and cleft palate/lip. A new Glostavent Helix anaesthesia machine was donated by SAWW and DAK International to equip the new theatre and hence enable more surgeries and alleviate supply chain issue and backlogs. Since EAUH is also a training site for new anaesthetists, this will also enable training on newer equipment. The impact of the new machine will be huge in both the hospital and the overall education of future anaesthetists. We await feedback from the hospital in the coming year.

4. UKRAINE

Since the outbreak of war in Ukraine, SAWW has sent items of portable anaesthesia equipment for use in mobile hospitals run out of Odessa to treat wounded patients. During this year, remaining funds raised for Ukraine were used to supply suction cups and stands for anaesthetist Dr Andrey Volna working in Kyiv. His work involves surgically restoring limbs of Ukrainians injured by mines and explosive wounds. This equipment has made a considerable impact, as the surgeons are working intensively in conflict conditions and equipment wears out quickly in these circumstances.

5. ZIMBABWE

An opportunity arose during this year to work with DAK International to donate a Glostavent anaesthesia machine, patient monitors and other equipment to improve patient care at Bulawayo United Hospitals in Zimbabwe. This project was led by Australian Doctors for Africa (ADA) who, following a visit by Professor David Wood (orthopaedic surgeon), undertook a comprehensive scoping study of the United Bulawayo Hospitals and met with the Head of Orthopaedics. Prof Wood reported that the hospital is well run, and that the Orthopaedic Department is staffed by well-trained surgeons but would benefit from provision of equipment and dedicated operating space.

ADA renovated an operating theatre and ward in the Richard Morris Building for use by the Orthopaedic Department, completed in November 2024. An anaesthesia machine, patient monitors and other vital equipment to improve patient care were provided by DAK and SAWW in December 2024. Visiting volunteer medical teams are continuing to provide training and mentoring.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO (DRC)

Congolese Dr. Furaha Nzanu Blaise Pascal received support from SAWW back in 2020 to complete his Master of Medicine in Malawi, where he graduated top of his class. He subsequently returned to his native DRC to work at the teaching hospital of the Université Catholique du Graben of Butembo and at Matanda Hospital, where he is the only anaesthesiologist in the region covering the cities of Butembo and Beni and

surrounding territories. He initiated the first department of Anaesthesia and Critical Care at the University, and started a training program from February 2024 to train locally anaesthesiologists and improve anaesthesia services. He is also conducting refresher courses for nurse anaesthetists as they are the main ones providing the anaesthesia care.

During this year SAWW sent training equipment for the new training courses, which included adult and paediatric intubation training manikins, a Laerdal Baby Anne CPR manikin, laryngoscope sets, oxygen masks, other accessories and text books. These items will help to improve anaesthesia teaching for the whole region and to overcome the lack of skills in currently practicing anaesthesia providers in a region where anaesthesia experts are almost impossible to find.

Plans for the coming year

In the coming year April 2025/2026 SAWW will continue to improve anaesthesia services for those in need. Requests for funding are considered twice a year at Trustees' meetings in March and September.

Equipping rural hospitals

SAWW will continue to provide anaesthesia equipment to rural hospitals in low- and middle-income countries, to enable safe surgery to save lives in the event of emergency surgical procedures. This will include anaesthesia machines, accompanied by monitors that include pulse oximetry and capnography, as well as ventilators and oxygen concentrators.

Collaboration with other groups

SAWW intends to continue to collaborate with other reputable organisations with shared aims to provide anaesthesia training and equipment to hospitals in need. This will include working with Partners for Equity to provide appropriate anaesthesia and monitoring equipment.

Financial review

Income

Total income for the year was £80,978

The charity's principal sources of funding have been donations from charitable trusts, groups and individuals. Donations have been received from the following charitable trusts: DAK Foundation, the Fulmer Trust; the Hillier Trust; the Kathleen Beryl Sleigh Charitable Trust, and Partners for Equity.

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 5th April 2024.

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Day-to-day administration of the charity is carried out by the Trustees and other volunteers. Co-ordination of activities and secretarial support is provided by Carol Newman who is recompensed by Diamedica (UK) Ltd. Voluntary work by numerous individuals has enabled the delivery of anaesthesia training and the provision of research.

Activities

An important step for SAWW in September 2023 this year was joining with Partners for Equity (PFE) to improve anaesthesia provision in developing countries. PFE delivers aid by partnering with local organisations working in communities that are disadvantaged or living in poverty. Thanks to funds from PFE we were able to supply anaesthesia and related equipment to hospitals in Burundi and Madagascar.

We continued to equip rural hospitals in low-income countries by donating appropriate anaesthesia equipment that operates reliably and affordably in low-resource locations. This year we donated equipment to Cameroon, Ethiopia and Somaliland. We also maintained our collaboration with the organisations Global Anaesthesia, Surgery and Obstetric Collaborative (GASOC) and The Zambia Anaesthesia Development Program (ZADP) to deliver anaesthesia training in Cameroon and Zambia.

EQUIPMENT DONATIONS

Recipients of equipment donations during this year were as follows:

1. CAMEROON – TRINITY POLYCLINIC

A portable anaesthesia machine and patient monitor was donated to the lone anaesthetist working at Trinity Polyclinic in Tubah Health District in North West Cameroon. The new machine was to replace a very old drawover anaesthesia machine, donated from the Gulf War (1990-91) that had broken. The new machine enabled surgical procedures to continue at the hospital, mainly C-sections and injuries. Subsequently, internal conflict in the region caused the hospital to temporarily close, but the anaesthetist was able to take the portable machine to another hospital in the region where he used it to continue to treat patients, many of whom were displaced people.

2. CAMEROON – NKWEN BAPTIST HOSPITAL

A donation of a full hospital anaesthesia machine (Glostavent Helix) was made possible by a major donation from an individual. The machine was sent to Nkwon Baptist Hospital in Bamenda, the capital of the North West region of Cameroon, which serves a growing number of patients from beyond the region and neighbouring countries. The hospital has five operating theatres and 12 anaesthesia staff, but had only 2 fully functioning anaesthesia machines, limiting the number of operations that could be performed. The donation of the new anaesthesia machine has increased the capacity of the surgical facilities at the hospital, enabling more patients to be treated and thus preventing suffering and disability.

3. ETHIOPIA

A patient monitor was donated to the Children's Burns Unit in Addis Ababa to accompany a new anaesthesia machine purchased by the hospital. Many children with serious burns need to have their dressings changed daily and this requires sedation and monitoring. Burns are common in African countries, especially in children, due to the use of open cooking fires, causing significant morbidity and mortality. The donated monitor will help in the treatment of these children.

4. SOMALILAND

A ventilator and oxygen concentrator were sent to Gargaar Hospital in Somaliland. Prior to this donation, anaesthetised patients were ventilated manually, which necessitated the anaesthetist pumping air into the

patient's lungs by hand squeezing a bag, sometimes for several hours. This was not safe or convenient, and exhausting for the anaesthetist. SAWW donated a robust gas-driven ventilator to do this job mechanically. The ventilator is driven by an oxygen concentrator that also delivers oxygen and air to the patient, making it efficient and economical to run. This donation has improved the safety for patients undergoing anaesthesia at the hospital.

5. MADAGASCAR

SAWW's new partnership with Partners for Equity enabled the donation of oxygen equipment to the Good News Hospital (Hopitaly Vaovao Mahafaly) in Mandritsara in the North of Madagascar. Oxygen is an essential medicine used to care for patients at all levels of the healthcare system and is often lifesaving, yet is frequently in short supply in LMICs. The donated equipment consisted of two Baby CPAP and two oxygen concentrators to provide vital respiratory care for sick patients and new born or premature babies.

6. BURUNDI

A further donation made possible by Partners for Equity was a hospital anaesthesia machine for the Van Norman Clinic in Bujumbura, Burundi. This hospital cares for an increasing number of patients, especially expectant mothers in need of caesarean sections and who have few choices for maternity care. The Van Norman Clinic deals with some 600 deliveries per month. The new machine will improve anaesthesia provision for the expanding surgical services at the hospital, especial for essential C-sections, to reduce rates of maternal mortality in the region.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Virtual Reality Training Workshops

SAWW continued its collaboration with GASOC (Global Anaesthesia, Surgery and Obstetric Collaborative) to support their training workshops that use virtual reality techniques to teach ultrasound guided regional anaesthesia and advanced airway techniques. Workshops were held in Cameroon with local partner ASCOVIME in Yaoundé and in Zambia partnered with the University of Zambia in Lusaka. Training covered 12 essential airway and regional anaesthesia skills delivered to physicians and non-physician anaesthetists. A total of 105 participants attended across Cameroon, Benin, Zambia and Democratic Republic of Congo. This approach is proving to be a cost-effective and efficient way to deliver training to remote locations.

Zambia Anaesthesia Development Program (ZADP)

The Zambia Anaesthesia Development Program works to develop safer anaesthesia in Zambia through education and training of physician anaesthetists. Like many LMICs, Zambia has a critical shortage of physician anaesthetists to serve a growing population. SAWW supported the work of the ZADP in 2022 and 2023. During this period, 19 Zambian doctors were supported in their speciality training. 153 days of in-country training were provided by ZADP volunteers. Plans for the coming year

In the coming year April 2024/2025 SAWW will continue to improve anaesthesia services for those in need. Requests for funding are considered twice a year at Trustees' meetings in March and September.

Equipping rural hospitals

SAWW will continue to provide anaesthesia equipment to rural hospitals in low- and middle-income countries, to enable safe surgery to save lives in the event of emergency surgical procedures. This will include anaesthesia machines, accompanied by monitors that include pulse oximetry and capnography, as well as ventilators and oxygen concentrators.

Collaboration with other groups

SAWW intends to continue to collaborate with other reputable organisations with shared aims to provide anaesthesia training and equipment to hospitals in need. The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 5th April 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 1993 and the Charity reporting and accounting: the essentials November 2016 (CC15d).

Structure, governance and management

The Trust is a registered charity, number 1148254, and is constituted under a trust deed dated 18th July 2012. New Trustees are appointed by the existing trustees by a resolution at a special meeting. The Trust Deed provides for a minimum of 3 trustees. The Trustees do not benefit financially from their Trusteeship.

The Trustees hold at least two ordinary meetings a year to oversee the charity's work. The day to day running of the charity is carried out by volunteers and there are no paid staff. The charity's work overseas is made possible by the voluntary contributions of professionals working in or visiting developing countries to deliver anaesthesia and support.

Risks associated with delivering safe anaesthesia in low-resource settings are taken into consideration by the Trustees. Importantly, only appropriate equipment that is safe, effective and inexpensive to use and maintain is provided by the charity. Equipment is only supplied to end-users who are suitably trained to use it safely. Training and continuing support is provided wherever requested.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity Safe Anaesthesia Worldwide (SAWW) are to preserve and protect good health by: the provision of suitable anaesthetic equipment to deprived areas of the world; and the support of research, education, and training to ensure its effective use, care and maintenance.

Anaesthesia services are crucial to achieving the **United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 3 Good Health and Well-being**, and SAWW's objectives support this goal and in particular the following targets:

- *3.1 By 2030, reduce the global maternal mortality ratio to less than 70 per 100,000 live births*
- *3.2 By 2030, end preventable deaths of newborns and children under 5 years of age, with all countries aiming to reduce neonatal mortality to at least as low as 12 per 1,000 live births and under-5 mortality to at least as low as 25 per 1,000 live births*
- *3.4 By 2030, reduce by one third premature mortality from non-communicable diseases through prevention and treatment*
- *3.6 By 2020, halve the number of global deaths and injuries from road traffic accidents*
- *3.8 Achieve universal health coverage, including access to quality essential health-care services*

SAWW's objectives focus on the provision of:

- Safe anaesthesia and pain relief to help women in labour and to reduce the unacceptably high number of women who currently die in pregnancy and childbirth.
- Appropriate anaesthesia for remote low-resource locations to enable essential surgery to treat life-threatening, painful or disabling conditions such as trauma, tumours, hernias, obstetric fistulas, wounds, animal bites, burns, infections and congenital deformities.
- Oxygen therapies for newborns and infants to prevent unnecessary deaths from pneumonia, malaria, sepsis and premature birth.
- Portable anaesthesia equipment for emergency response to save lives of those affected by natural disasters or war.

To achieve its objectives the charity undertakes the following activities:

- The purchase and supply of equipment that is suitable for use in low-resource settings and remote locations, to people in need.
- The delivery of training for medical and technical staff in poor countries, to enable them to deliver safe anaesthesia and maintain equipment in good working order.
- Support for research into ways of improving the safe delivery of anaesthesia in poor countries.

In planning and conducting the charity's activities for the year the Trustees have given due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission.

Day-to-day administration of the charity is carried out by the Trustees and other volunteers. Co-ordination of activities and secretarial support is provided by Carol Newman who is recompensed by Diamedica (UK) Ltd. Voluntary work by numerous individuals has enabled the delivery of anaesthesia training and the provision of research.

Activities

This year SAWW responded to anaesthetists who reached out to us from difficult and dangerous situations in Ukraine and Yemen. We continued to equip rural hospitals in low-income countries by donating appropriate anaesthesia equipment that operates reliably and affordably in low-resource locations. This year we donated equipment to hospitals in Cameroon, Ethiopia, Kenya, Somaliland, Uganda and Zambia. We also began a new collaboration with the organisation GASOC to bring virtual reality training to Uganda.

EQUIPMENT DONATIONS

Recipients of equipment donations during this year were as follows:

1. CAMEROON

The Cameroon Baptist Health Service (CBHS) runs non-profit hospitals and numerous health centres that assist the poorest of the poor. Their services are spread over 9 of the 10 Regions of Cameroon and are open 24/7. SAWW contributed to a donation of a portable anaesthesia machine for use by the CBHS for emergency operations.

Nkwen Baptist Hospital, a relatively new CBHS hospital, requested help to establish two intensive care beds, for which CBHS had limited funds and could only afford one ventilator. SAWW assisted by donating an additional ventilator, enabling both new intensive care beds to be properly equipped. Both Helix ventilators can be run from a single oxygen concentrator, making them affordable to run for a low-resource hospital. The new intensive care beds are now providing lifesaving ventilation and care for seriously ill patients.

2. ETHIOPIA

SAWW responded positively to an appeal from anaesthetists in Ethiopia for equipment for hospitals in the north of the country where facilities had been damaged due to the civil war. Jamma Primary Hospital serves a population of over 200,000 people, but lacks reliable mains electricity and its backup generator had been stolen during the conflict. In addition, medical oxygen is supplied in cylinders and occasionally runs out. To ensure that anaesthesia for essential surgery can be conducted at any time SAWW donated a portable anaesthesia machine that functions without electricity, together with an oxygen concentrator to generate medical oxygen from air. Both items of equipment are simple to operate and affordable to run, making anaesthesia available whenever it is needed.

3. KENYA

A basic anaesthesia machine, patient monitor and oxygen concentrator were donated to the small rural hospital in Homa Bay County, Kenya. Nyagowa Elck Dispensary has two anaesthesia staff but without an anaesthesia machine or monitor emergency cases had to be referred to the district hospital, causing delays in treatment, sometimes with tragic results. The hospital is without reliable electrical and oxygen supplies. The equipment donated by SAWW will work reliably even in these hostile conditions and many emergency operations such as caesarean sections, wounds, hernias and accidents are now dealt with promptly, preventing suffering and saving lives.

4. SOMALILAND

Awdal Hospital in Borama, one of the largest cities in Somaliland, provides health care to a population of over 800,000 people. Resources are extremely limited and stretched to capacity. The hospital has two operating theatres, but only one small anaesthesia machine that runs on cylinders of oxygen that makes it extremely expensive to use. SAWW identified a private donor to support the hospital and we assisted in the donation of a full hospital anaesthesia machine (Glostavent Helix) and patient monitor. This machine generates its own oxygen and medical air, making it very affordable to run and has ensured that one of the operating theatres is appropriately equipped at all times.

SAWW only donates equipment that works reliably and economically in resource-poor locations and we will continue to provide help with spare parts and servicing, to ensure the longevity of donated equipment. This year, we were happy to send some minor spare parts to Gargaar Hospital in Somaliland for the anaesthesia machine donated and installed in 2017, which is in daily use.

5. UGANDA

The neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) at Mbale Hospital has transformed the care of premature and sick babies in this region of Uganda. SAWW has previously supported the NICU by donating appropriate equipment, in particular the cost-effective CPAP machines that keep babies breathing. The nurses at Mbale call them 'miracle machines'. SAWW was delighted to assist in the donation of a further lifesaving miracle machine to Mbale Hospital this year.

6. UKRAINE

February 2022 saw the outbreak of war in Ukraine and almost immediately SAWW received appeals from Ukrainian doctors for anaesthesia equipment that would work in emergency situations and mobile hospitals. There was also an enormous response from the public who wanted to help those caught up in the conflict. Whilst aware of the risks associated with sending medical equipment into a war zone, the Trustees agreed that the need to alleviate suffering of people injured in Ukraine could not be ignored and hence much of SAWW's focus this year was on supply of equipment to Ukraine.

SAWW donated portable anaesthesia equipment for mobile hospitals run from Odessa. We provided three portable anaesthesia machines, a ventilator and oxygen supply equipment. There were reports of hospitals running low on supplies of medical oxygen and many hospital facilities in Ukraine have been damaged or destroyed in the war. SAWW sent equipment that can be used to deliver anaesthesia anywhere, even in the most basic emergency conditions, such as field hospitals and mobile intensive care units. This equipment is now being used on a daily basis by anaesthetists who risk their lives to treat patients. Delivery of this equipment was enabled by anaesthetist Dr Andrey Varvinskiy of Torbay Hospital and Scott Cheadle of Help Ukraine.

7. YEMEN

A newly established Yemini Society of Anaesthesiologists contacted SAWW to tell us of the everyday difficulties they face in the training and delivery of anaesthesia due to the civil war. A shortage of even basic equipment for operating theatres had led them to set up a central store of badly needed items. SAWW responded by sending them ten laryngoscope sets with boxes of intubation equipment, and medical reference books, as requested. This equipment is now making anaesthesia safer for patients in Yemen.

8. ZAMBIA

SAWW contributed towards the donation of three CPAP devices to Kapiri District Hospital in Zambia. These devices are crucial for supporting the breathing of premature and seriously ill babies, who would die without respiratory support. These lifesaving CPAP machines are in constant use at the neonatal intensive care unit being run at Kapiri.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Virtual Reality Training in Uganda

A new collaboration was established this year with GASOC (Global Anaesthesia, Surgery and Obstetric Collaborative). SAWW funded a GASOC workshop that utilised virtual reality to teach ultrasound guided regional anaesthesia and advanced airway techniques to 43 anaesthetic officers from 6 regions in Uganda. This was the first time VR had been used to teach anaesthesia and it has enormous potential to improve training and patient safety in remote locations.

Plans for the coming year

In the coming year April 2023/2024 SAWW will continue to improve anaesthesia services for those in need. SAWW's specific plans for the coming year include:

Equipping rural hospitals

SAWW will continue to provide anaesthesia equipment to rural hospitals in low- and middle-income countries, to enable safe surgery to save lives in the event of emergency surgical procedures. This will include anaesthesia machines, accompanied by monitors that include pulse oximetry and capnography, as well as ventilators and oxygen concentrators.

Collaboration with other groups

SAWW continue to collaborate with other organisations with shared aims to provide anaesthesia training and equipment to hospitals in need, including support for GASOCs widening programme of virtual reality training.

Expanding governance and advisory expertise

SAWW currently relies on the expertise and advice from anaesthetists and other medical professionals. We plan to continue to seek to enlist more advisors, ambassadors, educators and potentially board members to guide us in the coming year.





Risks associated with delivering safe anaesthesia in low-resource settings are taken into consideration by the Trustees. Importantly, only appropriate equipment that is safe, effective and inexpensive to use and maintain is provided by the charity. Equipment is only supplied to end-users who are suitably trained to use it safely. Training and continuing support is provided wherever requested.

Changes to the board of Trustees

This year saw the resignation of two founder Trustees, Beverly McGaw and Emma Thompson. Both have supported the charity since its initiation and were crucial to its establishment. Their contribution over the past decade has helped to improve anaesthesia services in poor countries around the world and is greatly appreciated. We wish Beverly and Emma well as they move on to new stages in their lives.

Founder of the charity, Dr Roger Eltringham, stepped down as Chair of the Trustees on 8th March 2022 and was appointed as President of SAWW in recognition of his longstanding and inspirational leadership of the charity and his outstanding contribution to global anaesthesia.

Anne Cox was appointed as a new Trustee on 14th September 2021.

Mike Cox was appointed as the new Chair of the Trustees on 8 March 2022.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity Safe Anaesthesia Worldwide (SAWW) are to preserve and protect good health by: the provision of suitable anaesthetic equipment to deprived areas of the world; and the support of research, education, and training to ensure its effective use, care and maintenance.

Anaesthesia services are crucial to achieving the **United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 3 Good Health and Well-being**, and SAWW's objectives support this goal, and in particular the following targets:

- *3.1 By 2030, reduce the global maternal mortality ratio to less than 70 per 100,000 live births*
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SAWW's objectives focus on the provision of:

- Safe anaesthesia and pain relief to help women in labour and to reduce the unacceptably high number of women who currently die in pregnancy and childbirth.
- Appropriate anaesthesia for remote low-resource locations to enable essential surgery to treat life-threatening, painful or disabling conditions such as trauma, tumours, hernias, obstetric fistulas, wounds, animal bites, burns, infections and congenital deformities.
- Oxygen therapies for newborns and infants to prevent unnecessary deaths from pneumonia, malaria, sepsis and premature birth.
- Portable anaesthesia equipment for emergency response to save lives of those affected by natural disasters or war.

To achieve its objectives the charity undertakes the following activities:

- The purchase and supply of equipment that is suitable for use in low-resource settings and remote locations, to people in need.
- The delivery of training for medical and technical staff in poor countries, to enable them to deliver safe anaesthesia and maintain equipment in good working order.
- Support for research into ways of improving the safe delivery of anaesthesia in poor countries.

In planning and conducting the charity's activities for the year the Trustees have given due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission.

Day-to-day administration of the charity is carried out by the Trustees and other volunteers. Co-ordination of activities and secretarial support is provided by Carol Newman, whose employer, Diamedica (UK) Ltd, generously permits her to assist the charity from her place of work. Voluntary work by numerous individuals has enabled the delivery of anaesthesia training and the provision of research.

Activities

At the start of this year, the Covid-19 pandemic generated an increased demand for medical oxygen to treat patients at hospitals worldwide which resulted a shortage of oxygen generating equipment. Despite this difficulty, SAWW was able to source and donate oxygen concentrators, pulse oximeters and patient monitors, to hospitals in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DR Congo) and Uganda. SAWW provided further support to hospitals in Burundi, Mongolia, Uganda and Tanzania, and established a new collaboration to provide anaesthesia training in Zambia.

EQUIPMENT DONATIONS

Recipients of equipment donations during this year were as follows:

1. DR Congo, Matanda Hospital

In February 2021, Matanda Hospital in north Kivu province began tackling its twelfth outbreak of Ebola, amid the COVID pandemic and in a province affected by armed conflict since 2004. The 400-bed hospital had many patients in respiratory distress and in need of oxygen. SAWW donated four oxygen concentrators with pulse oximeters to improve treatment of patients in the emergency, intensive care and neonatal units. The donation was arranged with the assistance of Congolese anaesthetist Dr Furaha Blaise Pascal.

2. DR Congo, University Clinics of Graben

Dr Blaise Pascal helped us to send a further oxygen equipment and a portable anaesthesia machine to the University Clinics of Graben, Butembo, also in the troubled region of north Kivu. The non-profit hospital had only second-hand oxygen concentrators delivering low flows that were inadequate for their patients' needs and there are no local services to supply or refill oxygen cylinders. The hospital was short of oxygen for patients every day and had no anaesthesia machine. SAWW helped to improve their facilities by donating a portable anaesthesia machine and a patient monitor, to enable emergency surgical procedures, and three oxygen concentrators that each deliver up to 10 litres of oxygen per minute to improve oxygen supplies.

3. Uganda, St Mary's Hospital

SAWW has previously assisted the not-for-profit St Mary's Hospital Lacor, near Gulu, a very poor area in northern Uganda. St Mary's is a teaching hospital that undertakes training of anaesthetic officers who provide the bulk of anaesthesia services in the hospital and the country. In the face of third wave of the Covid pandemic in Uganda, SAWW was able to donate an oxygen concentrator to help alleviate the increased need at St Mary's hospital and boxes of masks to protect staff.

4. Tanzania, Haydom Hospital

SAWW continued to support Haydom Hospital in Tanzania by donating spares and consumables to keep respiratory equipment in good working order. SAWW recognises the importance of helping to maintain donated equipment, to ensure it is not discarded or left unusable due to lack of spare parts. Equipment that is not functional will mean death for some patients.

5. India, Himalayas

A portable ventilator was donated to Manali Hospital in the Kulu Valley, a remote rural area in the Himalayas. The ventilator was for use with a portable anaesthesia machine previously donated by SAWW. Manali Hospital provides affordable care for the poor and carries out some 250 major surgeries each year, as

well as conducting surgical camps to treat patients in outlying areas. The donated equipment will be used both in the hospital operating theatre and on the surgical camps to alleviate suffering of patients in this remote rural region.

6. Zambia, Kapiri District Hospital

A new collaboration for SAWW was made this year with Dr Leah Seaman in Kapiri, a small town in an agricultural region of central Zambia. Dr Seaman has established a special baby care unit at Kapiri District Hospital that has rapidly expanded. As knowledge of the baby unit spread and more babies were referred to it, the unit became overcrowded. With one oxygen concentrator CPAP in constant use, but only able to treat one baby at a time, Dr Leah was desperate to obtain a second one, as all too often difficult choices had to be made as to which baby would receive treatment and survive. She was overjoyed to receive a second oxygen concentrator CPAP donated by SAWW, which that was unpacked and in use within an hour of arriving at the hospital. The staff were all trained and are now competent at using the new device.

7. DR Congo, Nebobongo Hospital

Nebobongo Hospital in north-eastern DR Congo serves an area of over 260,000 people, despite very limited resources. The hospital's old anaesthesia system had given good service for 20 years but had eventually failed and lacked patient monitoring. A new anaesthesia machine and patient monitor were donated at the request of Dr Jean Claude Bataneni, the chief surgeon and medical officer at Nebobongo. This donation was assisted by Dr David Kim, who delivered the equipment in person whilst visiting from the UK and reported that the hospital was now able to perform surgery again in a much safer manner. This will help to improve patient outcomes in the coming years.

8. Mongolia,

SAWW has previously donated anaesthesia machines to Dr Ganbold Lundeg to improve anaesthesia services in rural areas of Mongolia. One million people in the Mongolian countryside cannot have emergency surgery due to a lack of appropriate equipment that will operate in hospitals without reliable electricity or oxygen. A project headed by Dr Ganbold and assisted by anaesthetists from Australia and New Zealand, is developing rural anaesthesia and emergency services at the Soum hospital level by equipping hospitals with draw-over anaesthesia machines accompanied by training. Thanks to a generous donation from supporter, Dr Haydn Perndt, SAWW was able to donate an ECO2 anaesthesia machine and a portable anaesthesia machine to this project.

9. Burundi, Anaesthesia Society ATSARP

A portable ventilator and an oxygen concentrator were donated to Gilles Eloi Rwibuka, President of the Anaesthesia Society in Burundi (ATSARPS). Working to improve the provision of anaesthesia in his country, Gilles had co-authored a study of anaesthesia facilities in Burundi which unsurprisingly found a significant lack of equipment. Over a third of hospitals reported that their anaesthesia machine was not functional and 18% were only partially functional. SAWW was happy to donate the ventilator and oxygen concentrator requested by Gilles, to accompany an anaesthesia machine, to support patients (adult and paediatric) in need of assistance with breathing during and post-operatively.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Zambia Anaesthesia Program

Towards the end of this year, SAWW established a collaboration with the Global Anaesthesia Development Partnerships – Zambia Anaesthesia Program (ZAP).

The ZAP was established in 2011 to support Zambia's first physician anaesthetist training program. It has successfully trained 30 anaesthetists and established the professional organisation: The Society of Anaesthetists in Zambia (SAZ). A further 13 anaesthetists are currently in training, and it is anticipated that further 5 to 8 will be joining in 2022.

Since March 2020, they had to work remotely due to Covid, and there has been little clinical training, as volunteers have been unable to visit, and Zambian faculty have been overwhelmed running COVID wards and ICUs.

In country training is planned to resume in 2022 and SAWW has provided funds to support the costs of in-country volunteers, and 50% of costs of Project Manager's costs in Zambia for 12 months.

Increasing the trained anaesthesia workforce in Zambia is crucial to improving access to safe anaesthesia and surgery.

RESEARCH

No research activities were supported this year.

Plans for the coming year

In the coming year April 2021/2022 SAWW will continue to improve anaesthesia services for those in need. SAWW's specific plans for the coming year include:

Emergency response

February 2022 saw the outbreak of war in Ukraine and in the months following, appeals began to reach us from Ukrainian doctors for anaesthesia equipment that would work in emergency situations and mobile hospitals. Whilst aware of the risks associated with sending medical equipment into a war zone, the Trustees agreed that the need to alleviate suffering of people injured in Ukraine could not be ignored and organised events to specifically fundraise for Ukraine. In the coming year, SAWW will continue to respond where possible to from anaesthetists working in difficult and dangerous locations, including conflict zones.

Equipping rural hospitals

SAWW will continue to provide anaesthesia equipment to rural hospitals in low- and middle-income countries, to enable safe surgery to save lives in the event of emergency c-sections, wounds, hernias, and accidents.

Collaboration with other groups

SAWW intends to continue to collaborate with church groups, schools, clubs and Rotaries, in the UK and overseas, to raise funds to supply appropriate anaesthesia equipment to hospitals in need.

Expanding governance and advisory expertise

SAWW's income and activities continue to grow, despite not currently employing any paid staff. Looking to the future, we wish to continue to expand SAWW's work and to help more people. To achieve this, we plan to enlist more advisors, ambassadors, educators and potentially board members.

Financial review

Income

Total income for the year was £56,260

The charity's principal sources of funding have been donations from charitable trusts, groups and individuals.

The mainstay of the fundraising has been talks delivered by the charity's Medical Director to schools, Rotary clubs, church groups and similar fundraising organisations.

Total expenditure for the year was £66,293

- 19% Training £12,831
- 2% Printed Fundraising materials £1,255
- <1% Governance £179
- <1% Banking and other charges £324

Balance at the end of the year was £8,654

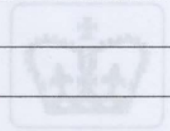

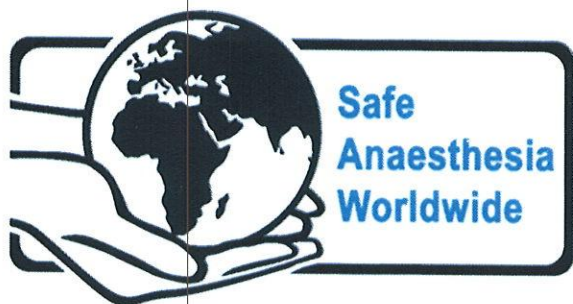

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 5th April 2021.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 1993 and the Charity reporting and accounting: the essentials November 2016 (CC15d).

Structure, governance and management

The Trust is a registered charity, number 1148254, and is constituted under a trust deed dated 18th July 2012. New trustees are appointed by the existing trustees by a resolution at a special meeting. The Trust Deed provides for a minimum of 3 trustees. The Trustees do not benefit financially from their Trusteeship.

The Trustees hold at least two ordinary meetings a year to oversee the charity's work. The day to day running of the charity is carried out by volunteers and there are no paid staff. The charity's work overseas is made possible by the voluntary contributions of professionals working in or visiting developing countries to deliver anaesthesia and support.

Risks associated with delivering safe anaesthesia in low-resource settings are taken into consideration by the Trustees. Importantly, only appropriate equipment that is safe, effective and inexpensive to use and maintain is provided by the charity. Equipment is only supplied to end-users who are suitably trained to use it safely. Training and continuing support is provided wherever requested.

Objectives and activities

Activities

The Coronavirus pandemic affected some of our activities and prevented travel both within the UK and abroad. However, our donations of appropriate anaesthesia and respiratory equipment continued. In the initial phase of the pandemic, Africa appeared to be less affected than Europe and our donations continued to focus on anaesthesia provision. Later, Africa and Asia experienced waves of coronavirus infection and the need for oxygen to treat COVID patients became urgent. Many hospitals in low- and middle-income countries lack adequate supplies of oxygen to treat patients and this situation was made worse by the pandemic.

EQUIPMENT DONATIONS

Recipients of equipment donations during this year were as follows:

1. Uganda, Mbale Regional Referral Hospital, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit

SAWW continued to support Mbale RR Hospital with donated specialist breathing equipment to sustain neonates and preterm babies. The care provided in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Mbale is outstanding and the donated equipment is in use constantly 24/7, saving the lives of thousands of babies. This year SAWW donated four CPAP devices, one portable CPAP machine and numerous spare parts and consumables for CPAP and oxygen equipment.

2. Tanzania, St Kizito Mikumi with Henriette Willigers

SAWW assisted Dr Henriette Willigers to donate a Glostavent Helix anaesthesia machine for St Kizito's Hospital, Mikumi, Tanzania. Henriette raised 50% of the cost and SAWW supplied matched funding to purchase the machine. St Kizito's district hospital is partly supported by a Dutch charity www.mikumi.nl/ Dutch nurses, midwives and doctors regularly visit the hospital and the charity has supported the building of a new delivery ward and an extension for neonatal care, with a School of Nursing currently in progress. This has resulted in an increase in Caesarean sections, other laparotomies, and trauma patients arriving for treatment, creating the need for a new anaesthesia machine.

3. The Gambia, Bansang Hospital

SAWW donated two oxygen concentrators to Bansang Hospital in the Gambia during the COVID19 pandemic when supplies of oxygen were desperately short. Anita Smith, CEO of the Bansang Hospital Appeal, had reported that the hospital was being overwhelmed with COVID cases in addition to patients with malaria, pneumonia and severe malnutrition.

4. Uganda, Jinja Surgical Clinic

SAWW donated a portable anaesthesia machine and textbooks for a new Surgical Centre at Jinja, Uganda, constructed by the charity Ando Modular Aid, to enable surgical treatment of patients with birth defects such as cleft lip and palate and trauma injuries. Doctors from Ando Modular Aid and Interplast were due to undertake surgical missions at the hospital in February and to provide training on the new machine. Unfortunately, the COVID pandemic has caused a delay in this mission, which will now take place at a later date when it is possible.

5. Cameroon, Bafoussam Baptist Hospital

SAWW donated equipment to improve oxygen supply at Bafoussam Baptist Hospital in Cameroon, a faith-based, non-profit organisation that provides care for the poor. SAWW donated three oxygen concentrators with flow splitters, six fingertip pulse oximeters and an oxygen analyser to assist the treatment of patients with respiratory distress, including COVID19 patients.

6. Tanzania, Berger Hospital

SAWW donated a supply of spare parts for the CPAP equipment in use at Berger Hospital in Tanzania to support babies with breathing difficulties.

7. Zimbabwe, Milton Park Medical Centre

SAWW responded to an urgent request from an anaesthetist at Milton Park Medical Centre in Harare, Zimbabwe and donated one oxygen concentrator for treatment of COVID19 patients.

8. Tanzania, Kagera Region

Thanks to a long-running collaboration with Dr Ruth Mathieson and Bellville Rotary Club in Canada, we were able to donate three sets of anaesthesia equipment for use at rural hospitals in the Kagera Region of Tanzania. Each anaesthesia kit consisted of a portable anaesthesia machine, a Lifebox pulse oximeter, an oxygen concentrator, laryngoscope set and textbook. The kits are to be distributed to Huruma Health Centre, Nyakaiga Hospital and Ndolage Hospital, to anaesthesia providers who have attended the safe anaesthesia refresher courses held in 2019.

9. Cameroon, ASCOVIME

SAWW donated a portable anaesthesia machine and a Lifebox pulse oximeter to ASCOVIME, a Cameroonian non-profit organization based in Yaoundé that provides free medical care to poor rural communities.

10. Tanzania, Haydom Lutheran Hospital

SAWW donated spares and consumables to keep the CPAP equipment, ventilator and patient monitor at Haydom Hospital in Tanzania in good working order. SAWW recognises the importance of helping to maintain equipment, especially that donated by SAWW, to ensure it is not discarded or left unusable due to lack of spare parts. Equipment that is not functional will mean death for some patients.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

1. Pan African Nurse Anaesthetists Conference (PANAC)

Sponsorship was provided for the first PANAC due to be held in Kijabe, Kenya in June 2020. However, the onset of COVID19 pandemic caused the conference to be delayed but plans are underway to hold the event at a later date.

2. Sponsorship in Malawi

SAWW helped to sponsor the final year of Dr Uraha Nzanu Blaise Pascal's Masters in Medicine at Malawi University. Prior years had been supported by German-Congolese organization BEBUC (Bourse d'Excellence Gerard Bringmann aux Universités Congolaises) who provided a letter of support and recommendation. Dr Uraha successfully graduated and passed all his exams at the top of his class in February 2021. He plans to return to northern Kivu in the Democratic Republic of Congo to improve anaesthesia services in his native country.

RESEARCH

Two portable CPAP devices were donated to Dr Kunda Mutesu-Kapembwa, Consultant Paediatrician & Neonatologist in Lusaka, Zambia. Dr Kunda is the only neonatologist in Zambia and is the Neonatology National Coordinator for the Ministry of Health. She is working to improve neonatal health in Zambia and will use the two donated Diamedica portable CPAP devices to support premature and sick babies whilst being they are transported from the mother's bed to intensive care facilities. Dr Kunda plans to collect data for a publication and report for the Ministry, the results of which could be the widespread use of this device to save babies' lives in government hospitals in Zambia.

Plans for the coming year

In the coming year April 2021/2022 SAWW will continue to improve anaesthesia services for those in need. SAWW's specific plans for the coming year include:

Response to COVID19

SAWW will continue to focus on improving oxygen supplies at low-resourced hospitals by donating oxygen concentrators and oxygen storage equipment. The COVID19 pandemic has heightened the unmet need for oxygen for treating patients in low- and middle-income countries.

Training

Travel and gatherings of people for training continues to be restricted due to the COVID19 pandemic. We anticipate that SAWW's training activities may be curtailed in the coming year.

Collaboration with Rotary

SAWW will continue to collaborate with Rotary Clubs, in the UK and overseas, to raise funds to supply appropriate anaesthesia equipment to hospitals in need.

Financial review

Income

Total income for the year was £65,470

The charity's principal sources of funding have been donations from charitable trusts, groups and individuals.

The mainstay of the fundraising has been talks delivered by the charity's Medical Director to schools, Rotary clubs, church groups and similar fundraising organisations.

Total expenditure for the year was £60,420

- 98% Medical equipment £59331
- 1% Training £677
- <1% Fundraising £217
- <1% Governance £88
- <1% Banking and other charges £107

Balance at the end of the year was £18,687

An independent examiner, Dennis Jeffrey Treman, retired Nat West Senior Bank Manager, approved the accounts and completed the Independent Examiner's Report required by the Charity Commission.
